#### H.P. 215 - L.D. 283

#### An Act Making Unified Appropriations and Allocations for the Expenditures of State Government, General Fund and Other Funds, and Changing Certain Provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 1994 and June 30, 1995

Mandate preamble. This measure requires one or more local units of government to expand or modify activities so as to necessitate additional expenditures from local revenues but does not provide funding for at least 90% of those expenditures. Pursuant to the Constitution of Maine, Article IX, Section 21, two thirds of all of the members elected to each House have determined it necessary to enact this measure.

**Emergency preamble. Whereas**, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the 90-day period may not terminate until after the beginning of the next fiscal year; and

Whereas, certain obligations and expenses incident to the operation of state departments and institutions will become due and payable immediately; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

#### PART A

Sec. A-1. Appropriations and allocations. In order to provide for necessary expenditures of State Government and other purposes for the fiscal years ending June 30, 1994 and June 30, 1995, the following sums as designated in the following tabulations are appropriated or allocated out of any money not otherwise appropriated or allocated.

Sec. A-2. Allotments required. Upon receipt of allotments duly approved by the Governor based upon work programs submitted to the State Budget Officer, the State Controller shall authorize expenditures of these funds, together with expenditures for other purposes necessary to the conduct of State Government on the basis of these allotments and not otherwise. Allotments for Personal Services, Capital Expenditures and amounts for All Other departmental expenses may not exceed the amounts shown in the budget document or as they may be revised by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over these appropriations and allocations, unless recommended by the State Budget Officer and approved by the Governor in accordance with established law.

Sec. A-3. Personal Services funding. The amounts provided for Personal Services in appropriated and allocated accounts are subject to the provision that the total number of positions and the costs of those positions in any account may not vary, during any fiscal year, from either the positions included in computing the total dollars appropriated or allocated for Personal Services or in the specific cost of each position upon which the appropriations and allocations are based. The State Budget Officer shall take the action necessary to ensure compliance with this section except as provided for in section 6 of this Part and as follows.

An appointing authority shall comply with the Civil Service Law, rules and regulations and collective bargaining agreements pertaining to the hiring, promoting, demoting and bumping of state employees. The Legislature shall act upon any recommendation for additional appropriations or allocations in order to fund additional requirements created by complying with this paragraph.

Savings accruing from unused funding of employee benefits may not be used to increase services provided by employees. Accrued salary savings generated from vacant positions within an appropriation or allocation for Personal Services may be used for the payment of nonrecurring Personal Services costs within the account where the savings exist. Costs related to acting capacity appointments and emergency, unbudgeted overtime for which it is impractical to budget in advance may be used with the approval of the appointing authority. Other actions such as retroactive compensation for reclassifications or reallocations and retroactive or one-time settlements related to arbitrator or court decisions must be recommended by the department or agency head and approved by the State Budget Officer. Salary and employee benefits savings may not be used to fund recurring Personal Services actions either in the account where the savings exist or in another account.

The amounts appropriated or allocated for Personal Services include funds for the State's share of state employees' retirement. The State Controller shall transfer the State's share to the Maine State Retirement System as soon as practicable after each payroll is paid.

Sec. A-4. Workers' compensation positions. Limited period positions may be established for former regular employees of the State who presently are receiving workers' compensation payments from the State when that action will enable those employees to return to productive employment with the State. These positions may be established, providing funds are available, only until those employees can be returned to regular positions.

Notwithstanding any other restriction on funds appropriated or allocated, the State Budget Officer, after determining that funds are available, may approve the use of these funds or recommend appropriate action to the Governor when the Governor's approval is required.

Available funds may include amounts appropriated or allocated for Personal Services, including funds in any salary account or special account for state employee salary increases, All Other, Capital Expenditures and unallocated.

Sec. A-5. Personal Services policy and review. The Bureau of the Budget, during this biennium, shall review continually with all departments the status of their manpower levels and staffing patterns for the purpose of determining whether funds and positions are being utilized and managed in the most economical and efficient manner to accomplish the intent of the Legislature. Permanent positions for which funds are appropriated or allocated must be classified positions unless specifically designated otherwise by the Legislature. It is the responsibility of the Director of Human Resources to ensure that classified and unclassified positions are assigned to the proper pay grade and of the State Budget Officer to ensure that the positions are within authorized headcount and funds.

Sec. A-6. Personal Services flexibility. Any classification or reclassification of a position and any allocation or reallocation of a position within the compensation plan made by the Director of Human Resources pursuant to the Civil Service Law and rules become effective on the first day of the fiscal year following approval by the State Budget Officer and the appropriation or allocation of funds for those programs, except that the State Budget Officer, if the officer determines that sufficient funds exist, may authorize an effective date prior to the first day of the ensuing fiscal year. Copies of all actions and certifications must be furnished to the Director of the Office of Fiscal and Program Review.

Sec. A-7. Number of necessary employees. The Governor and the State Budget Officer when next preparing budget proposals for the Legislature may adjust at their discretion the figures in parentheses, representing numbers of positions, to reflect the number of positions that in their opinion are necessary to the proper operation of each department, institution or agency.

Sec. A-8. New or expanded programs. A department may not establish new programs or expand existing programs beyond the scope of those programs already established, recognized and approved by the Legislature until the program and the method of financing are submitted to the Bureau of the Budget for evaluation and recommendation to the Legislature and until the funds are made available for those programs by the Legislature.

Sec. A-9. Seasonal or temporary employees. All appointing authorities are required by chapter 12, section 4C8(c) of the Civil Service Rules, as amended on June 17, 1991, to inform all seasonal or temporary employees of the approximate date of termination of employment at the time of hire. The notice must be given to all employees who are appointed to time-limited positions or appointments.

Sec. A-10. Federally funded programs. It is the intent of the Legislature that, if federal funds are not available as anticipated for programs in this Act, there is no obligation to provide state funds in excess of those listed in this Act. Positions entirely or partially funded by federal or nonstate sources of funds are considered limited-period positions.

Sec. A-11. Travel limitations. It is the intent of the Legislature that out-of-state travel be limited. Any state employee who travels out of State on state business, such as law enforcement, collecting, bidding, industrial development or loans, may continue to do so. The Legislature directs that department heads limit the cost of all travel when it is not absolutely needed. A state employee may not be reimbursed for noon meals, unless the expense is incurred while traveling on state business and lodging is required. Any state employee who attends a seminar or other program that includes the cost of a noon meal as part of the tuition or registration fee is not required to reimburse the State for the meal.

Sec. A-12. Expenditure limitation. It is the intent of the Legislature that expenditures may not be made from any State Government resource, be it state or federal funds, for the purpose of providing any state employee, elected official or appointee with training intended to enhance and promote that person's image as an individual without the authorization of the Governor.

Sec. A-13. Equipment to be reviewed. The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services may choose a designee to conduct a thorough review of all types of equipment, including automobiles, pickups and vans, owned, leased or otherwise available to the departments and agencies of the State, regardless of the source of supporting funds, and make recommendations via the budgetary process for combining their use, providing centralized facilities or eliminating existing equipment and facilities, as believed to be in the most economical and efficient interests of the State. The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services may develop and institute review and control mechanisms considered necessary to ensure that capital equipment purchases authorized by the Legislature are consistent with the intent for which funds were recommended and made available.

Sec. A-14. Motor vehicle replacement policy. The Director of the Bureau of General Services is directed to require that requisitions for replacement motor vehicles include the age and total mileage of the motor vehicle being replaced. For the purposes of this section, motor vehicles are defined as passenger cars and panel and pickup trucks, excluding those vehicles authorized and assigned for pursuit purposes. Under no circumstances are any state vehicles to be used for commuting purposes. It is the intent of the Legislature that motor vehicles be in service for at least 5 years or 75,000 miles before they are replaced. This policy must also be adopted by the State Budget Officer when next preparing a budget document. Exceptions to the established replacement policy require the prior approval of the Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services. The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services may also set appropriate standards with regard to motor vehicle type, size and equipment and direct that all motor vehicles be purchased in accordance with a commodity calendar established by the Director of the Bureau of General Services.

Sec. A-15. Significant action recommended by the State Budget Officer. The Bureau of the Budget shall inform the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs, through the Office of Fiscal and Program Review, of significant action recommended by the bureau in the performance of the budget responsibilities assigned.

Sec. A-16. State Cost Allocation Program. The State Cost Allocation Program shall identify the kind and cost of central services furnished to each state agency from General Fund appropriations annually. The non-General Fund portion of each agency must be assessed for these services as determined by the State Cost Allocation Program procedures to the extent that payments are not expressly prohibited by state or federal law or by the terms of a gift or donation made to the State from private sources. These payments must be credited to the General Fund as undedicated revenue. The State Budget Officer may adjust this assessment to any individual account.

Non-General Fund resources that contribute to funding costs related to general departmentwide functions, such as accounting, personnel administration, maintenance of property records and general purchasing, that have been made available to an account by legislative action may be consolidated into one or more administrative accounts, unless such a consolidation is expressly prohibited by state or federal law. All resources and costs affected by that consolidation must be properly identified and included in the budget process in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 149. When the Legislature is not in session and upon recommendation of the State Budget Officer, the Governor may approve necessary adjustments to these consolidations for a period not to exceed the end of the fiscal year. The Director of the Office of Fiscal and Program Review must be notified of any such action. The unencumbered balance of each administrative account established pursuant to this section must be carried forward at the end of each fiscal year and the budgeted transfers to the administrative account for the ensuing year must be reduced proportionally by the amount of that carried balance.

Sec. A-17. Unified state budget. The Governor, when submitting the budget to the Legislature, shall submit the budget document and the General Fund and Highway Fund bills in a manner that will identify the gross amount of resources for each program. The gross unified budget bills and budget document encompass resources from all funds, including, but not limited to: General Fund, Highway Fund, federal funds, Federal Block Grant Fund and Other Special Revenue funds. Separate gross unified budget bills must be submitted for the General Fund and the Highway Fund.

Sec. A-18. Line category amounts of General Fund and Highway Fund. The amounts included in the unified state budget by line category are the amounts included immediately under the appropriations and allocations section of the individual pages in the budget document for the General Fund and the Highway Fund. These amounts, as adjusted by the Legislature, must be used when preparing work programs by fund for each fiscal year of the biennium.

Sec. A-19. Multiple accounts certification. If any amounts identified to a fund in the source of funds section are to be distributed to more than one account within that fund, the department or agency head responsible for those funds shall certify to the State Budget Officer the amounts included in each account by line category and certify that the sum of the accounts by fund, by line category, equals the approved totals of the program within the Act.

Sec. A-20. Year-end closing. The State Controller may close the books as soon as practicable after the close of the fiscal years ending June 30, 1994 and June 30, 1995. Any bills presented after those dates may be paid from appropriations or allocations for the ensuing year on recommendation of the State Controller if within the amounts of approved allotments.

Sec. A-21. Appropriation and allocation balances at year end. At the end of each fiscal year, all unencumbered appropriation and allocation balances lapse into the fund or the account balance and are not available unless authorized by law. At the end of each fiscal year, all encumbered balances may not be carried more than once.

Sec. A-22. Reorganization of departments. A department or agency may not transfer Positions, Per-

sonal Services, All Other or Capital Expenditures funding between accounts when the expenditures of the fund will allow an action to take place that will cause an increased appropriation or allocation request in the Part I current services budget for any account. Any such reorganization must be submitted in the Part II new or expanded services budget or separate legislation.

Sec. A-23. Appropriation or allocation of funds. Any funds appearing in this Act that are specifically appropriated or allocated in another Act are included in this Act for informational purposes only, as are general ledger accounts. Governmental funds not specifically appropriated or allocated in another Act are appropriated or allocated in accordance with section 1 of this Part.

Sec. A-24. Other appropriation and allocation measures. It is intended that the language in this Act, except for section 23 of this Part, applies to all other appropriation and allocation measures enacted by the Legislature.

Sec. A-25. Allotments in excess of legislatively authorized allocations. Allotments in Other Special Revenue accounts may exceed current year allocations and the unused balance of allocations authorized to carry forward by law under the following conditions provided that Other Special Revenue funds are expended in accordance with the statutes that establish them and for no other purpose:

1. Sufficient cash is available from Other Special Revenue or the unencumbered balance authorized to carry forward by law;

2. Allotment is required to provide for the costs of approved collective bargaining agreements;

3. Failure to allot these available funds could have a significant detrimental impact on current programs;

4. Allotment of these available funds is recommended by the State Budget Officer and approved by the Governor by financial order as an allotment increase in the annual work program;

5. Allotment of these available funds is subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs; and

6. Allotment of these funds does not take effect until 30 days after approval by the Governor.

In case of extraordinary emergency situations, the 30-day waiting period beyond approval by the Governor may be waived by vote of the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs upon written recommendation of

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the State Budget Officer. Dedicated revenue accounts authorized by law to carry unused allocations forward will not be subject to the conditions in this section provided that the request for allotment increase is within the legislatively authorized allocations in this section. It is the intent of the Legislature that authority for unused allocations to carry forward in Other Special Revenue accounts be limited to specific, extraordinary circumstances only.

**Sec. A-26. Allocations**. The following allocations and appropriations are made:

The Maine Science and Technology Commission Foundation, in cooperation with the University of Maine System, the Maine Technical College System and the private sector, is responsible for developing strategies and an action plan for strengthening the State's science and technology infrastructure and enterprise that must include research and development. These strategies and action plan must be considered in the development of the long-term economic development plan for the State. The council shall also consider the research and development strategy undertaken by the Maine Science and Technology Commission Foundation pursuant to Private and Special Law 1991, chapter 68.

4. Financial support for business development. The Maine Science and Technology Commission is reconstituted as the Maine Science and Technology Foundation and as a nonprofit corporation with public and charitable purposes. The duties, activities and operations of the foundation are within the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

#### §13122-B. Purpose

The foundation shall encourage, promote, stimulate and support: research and development of relevance to the State; technology transfer activities that increase the competitiveness of businesses and public institutions of higher education in the State; effective and efficient application of technologies in the public and private sectors; scientific and technological education and training; the development of new commercial products and the fabrication of such products in the State; and cooperative efforts among government, the private sector and universities and colleges for the purposes outlined in this chapter.

### §13122-C. Board of directors

The foundation is governed and all of its powers exercised by a board of directors, which must consist of a minimum of 12 directors from the private sector, a maximum of 10 directors from the public and educational sectors and one director from labor. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly appoint 2 members from the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over

economic development matters to serve as ex officio members. Directors from the public sector must be department commissioners or hold equivalent positions and directors from the educational sector must be presidents or vice-presidents or hold equivalent positions. The Governor shall appoint all directors subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over economic development matters and to confirmation by the Legislature.

### §13122-D. Terms

Directors of the board are appointed for 6-year terms. The initial appointments must be staggered as follows: one third of the directors must be appointed for 2-year terms; one third for 4-year terms; and 1/3 for 6-year terms. Board members may serve no more than 2 full consecutive terms. Public sector directors must serve terms coincident with the terms of their public sector appointments.

# §13122-E. Officers

The board of directors of the foundation shall elect a chair, a vice-chair, a secretary and a treasurer from among its members. Each officer serves for a one-year term and is eligible for reelection. As provided in section 13125, the president is appointed by the board of directors and serves at the pleasure of the board of directors. The president is a director and chief executive officer of the foundation. The president may not be appointed from among the other directors.

### §13122-F. Quorum

A majority of the directors constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business and the acts of a majority of the directors present at any meeting at which a quorum is present are deemed the acts of the board of directors.

### §13122-G. Executive committee

The board of directors may elect an executive committee of not less than 6 members who, in intervals between meetings of the board, may transact such business of the foundation as the board may authorize from time to time. Unless otherwise provided by the bylaws of the foundation, a majority of the committee constitutes a quorum for the transaction of such business and the acts of a majority of the members of the committee present at any meeting at which a quorum is present are deemed the acts of the committee.

### §13122-H. Report

The foundation shall report annually on its activities to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over economic development matters. **Sec. E-12. 5 MRSA §13123,** as enacted by PL 1987, c. 816, Pt. DD, §3, is repealed.

# §13123-A. Duties of foundation

The foundation shall:

**1. State science and technology organization.** Be the principal science and technology organization for State Government;

2. Policy. Recommend to the Governor and the Legislature policies and programs essential to the advancement and integration of science and technology into the State's economic fabric;

3. Regional technology development. In cooperation with the Economic Development and Business Assistance Coordinating Council, review the technological development potential of various regions of the State and cooperate with and make recommendations to the Legislature, state agencies, local governments, local technological development agencies, the Federal Government, private businesses and individuals for the realization of such development potential;

4. Work force analysis. In cooperation with the Department of Labor, collect, analyze and disseminate information and issue periodic reports relating to the scientific and technological work force supply and demands in the State;

5. Emerging technologies. Identify emerging technologies that provide significant promise for the development of job-creating businesses and disseminate relevant information on individuals and businesses involved in such areas to the Department of Economic and Community Development, small business development centers and their subcenters and other state, local and nonprofit agencies and organizations responsible for economic development;

6. Research facilities. Prepare and periodically issue a register of scientific and technological research facilities in the State;

7. Roster. Establish and keep current a roster of high technology firms based in the State;

**8. Biennial report.** Submit to the Governor, the Legislature and its corporators not later than 120 days after the close of each biennial budget period a complete report on the activities of the foundation in the previous biennial period and a statement on its proposed and projected activities for the ensuing biennial budget period and the relationship of these activities to the State's economic development policies. The report must include

evaluation benchmarks for all programs and activities funded by the foundation, recommendations as to further actions that may be suitable for achieving the purposes of this chapter and an accounting of its receipts, expenditures, assets and liabilities at the end of its biennial fiscal period;

9. Conferences and reports. Sponsor and conduct conferences and studies, collect and disseminate information and issue periodic reports relating to scientific and technological research, development and education in the State;

**10. Infrastructure.** Support the development and availability of an overall infrastructure conducive to research, technology development and education in the State;

**11. Research, development and education.** Foster and support scientific and technological research, development, education, training and transfer in the State, through grants and contracts or other appropriate means, in cooperation with the Federal Government, the State Government and the political subdivisions of State Government, educational institutions, nonprofit institutions and organizations, business enterprises and other persons concerned with scientific and technological research, development and education in the State;

12. Small business innovation research. Assist small and emerging science and technology-oriented businesses in applying for federal research grants, including dissemination of information on the availability of any such grants;

13. Cooperation with state agencies and other organizations. In developing and implementing its powers, duties, responsibilities and programs, consider the state economic development strategy and the policies and activities of the Department of Economic and Community Development. All state agencies and public postsecondary institutions shall cooperate and work closely with the foundation in carrying out the purposes of this chapter;

**14. Public awareness.** Make its services and activities known to the public at large;

**15.** Annual audit. Submit to the Treasurer of State, within 120 days after the close of the foundation's fiscal year, its annual financial report certified by an independent certified public accountant, who may be the accountant or a member of the firm of accountants who regularly audit the books and accounts of the foundation, selected by the foundation. The foundation is subject to any further audit and review determined necessary by the Governor or the Legislative Council at the expense of the State;

**16.** Adoption of bylaws. Adopt bylaws, through the board of directors, consistent with this chapter for

the governance of its affairs. The board of directors has the general powers accorded corporations under Title 13-A, section 202;

**17. Employees.** Fix, through the board of directors, the compensation of all employees of the foundation; and

**18.** Other duties. Do all things necessary or convenient to carry out the lawful purposes of the foundation under this chapter.

### §13123-B. Powers

The foundation may:

1. Suit. Sue or to be sued in its own name;

2. Application for and receipt of funds. Apply for and receive funds from any private source or governmental entity, whether by way of grant, donation, loan or any other manner. The State Controller shall pay the foundation's total state allotment for each fiscal year to the foundation on July 1st of that year;

3. Invest funds. Invest, reinvest and use on behalf of the foundation and for any of its purposes funds received from any source for carrying out this chapter, including the use of funds for program and administrative costs, and expand interest earnings on those funds as appropriate to implement this chapter;

4. Real and personal property. Purchase, seek, receive, hold, lease, acquire by foreclosure, operate, manage, license, sell, convey, transfer, grant or lease real and personal property, together with those rights and privileges that may be incidental and appurtenant to the property and the use of the property, including, but not limited to, any real or personal property acquired by the foundation from time to time in the satisfaction of debts or enforcement of obligations;

5. Expenditures and obligations regarding real and personal property. Make all expenditures and incur any obligations reasonably required in the exercise of sound business principles to secure possession of, preserve, maintain, insure and improve real and personal property or interest in real and personal property acquired by the foundation;

6. Securities. Acquire, subscribe for, own, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage or pledge the stock, shares, bonds, debentures, notes or other securities and evidences of interest in or indebtedness of any person, firm, corporation, joint stock company, partnership, association or trust and, while the owner or holder thereof, exercise all the rights, powers and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote;

7. Encumbrance of property. Mortgage, pledge or otherwise encumber any property right or thing of value acquired pursuant to the powers contained in subsection 3, 4 or 5 as security for the payment of any part of the purchase price of the property right or thing of value;

**8.** Equity investments and loans. Make direct equity investments in or loans to science and technologyoriented small businesses in the State or in joint ventures in research and development activities in the State;

9. Contracts and liabilities. Make contracts, including contracts for services, and incur liabilities for any of the purposes authorized in those contracts;

10. Debt. Borrow money for any of the purposes authorized in this chapter; incur debt, which includes the issuance of 501(c)(3) bonds, debt, notes or other evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and secure the same by mortgage, pledge, deed of trust or other lien on its property, rights and privileges of every kind and nature, or any part of or interest in any of them;

11. Seal. Have and use a corporate seal; and

**12.** Other powers. Do any act or thing necessary or useful for carrying out any of its powers, duties or purposes.

# §13123-C. Limitation of powers

The foundation may not enter into contracts, obligations or commitments of any kind on behalf of the State or any of its agencies, nor may it have the power of eminent domain or any other power not provided to business corporations generally. Bonds, notes and other evidences of indebtedness of the foundation may not in any way be a debt or liability of the State or constitute a pledge of the faith and credit of the State.

# §13123-D. Liability of officers, directors and employees

All officers, directors, employees and other agents of the foundation entrusted with the custody of the securities of the foundation or authorized to disburse the funds of the foundation must be bonded either by a blanket bond or by individual bonds with a surety bond or bonds with a minimum limitation of \$100,000 coverage for each person covered by the bond or bonds, conditioned upon the faithful performance of their duties. The premiums for the bond or bonds must be paid out of the assets of the foundation.

# <u>§13123-E. Prohibited interests of officers, directors and</u> <u>employees</u>

An officer, director or employee of the foundation or a spouse or dependent child of any of those individuals may not receive any direct personal benefit from the activities of the foundation in assisting any private entity. This section does not prohibit corporations or other entities with which an officer or director is associated by reason of ownership or employment from participating in science and technology activities with the foundation if ownership or employment is made known to the board and the officer or director abstains from voting on matters relating to such participation. This prohibition does not extend to corporators who are not officers or directors of the foundation.

# §13123-F. General conditions; dissolution

The foundation shall operate as a nonprofit organization consistent with its composition and broad public purposes. The following conditions apply to the operation or dissolution of the foundation.

1. Net earnings of foundation. No part of the net earnings of the foundation may benefit any member, officer, director or employee except that the foundation may pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and otherwise hold, manage and dispose of its property in furtherance of the purposes of the foundation.

2. Dissolution of foundation. The foundation and its corporate existence continue until terminated by law. Upon termination, all property purchased with General Fund money and unexpended General Fund appropriations must be transferred to the State before paying or making provision for the payment of all other liabilities of the foundation. All other property and unexpended funds must be handled according to the provisions outlined in the bylaws of the foundation.

# §13123-G. Liberal construction

This chapter must be construed liberally to effect the interest and purposes of the foundation for an improved science and technology capacity building effort in the State and must be broadly interpreted to effect the intent and purposes and not as a limitation of powers.

# §13123-H. Report

The foundation shall prepare and submit an annual report to the Governor and the Legislature and shall present a report of its activities to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over economic development matters no later than April 1st.

Sec. E-14. 5 MRSA §13124, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 816, Pt. DD, §3, is amended to read:

# §13124. Centers for innovation program

The commission foundation may enter into a matching grant program, involving consortia of college, university or other research institutions, business and government for the purpose of establishing and promoting Centers of Innovation in the State.

**1. Purpose.** The board <u>foundation</u> may make grants under the matching grant program for the following purposes:

A. Development and strengthening of joint research and development efforts, including advanced technological activities, equipment, personnel and similar activities, which that will lead to new technologies and create and preserve jobs;

B. Technical assistance and technology transfer activities on an area-wide areawide or statewide basis to transfer research and development activities into the marketplace; and

C. Technical assistance in identifying and applying new technology to Maine firms.

2. Funding. Centers shall may not receive not more than 50% of their financial support from the commission's foundation's grant program. Applicants for funds provided under this section shall secure financial commitments from profit and nonprofit groups and organizations, including the Federal Government or local and political subdivisions, and shall be are required to submit applications in accordance with policies issued by the commission foundation.

3. Award of grants. The commission foundation shall establish standards for implementation of the program and award of grants. The standards, at a minimum, shall must include the estimated economic impact, the match received from the private sector, other funding leverage, new products, processes or services to be developed, the number of expected new firms or firm expansions, the number and quality of jobs created or retained and the volume of sales and value of productivity generated and other criteria determined by the commission foundation.

4. Advisory boards. Each center shall <u>must</u> have an advisory board composed of representatives of the target industry, public and private <del>post-secondary</del> <u>postsecondary</u> education or other public or private research institutions, representatives of local development agencies, regional municipalities and small business development centers, with industry representatives comprising a majority of the membership on the advisory board. At least one member of the advisory board shall <u>must</u> be a member of the Maine Science and Technology <u>Commission Foundation</u>.

**5.** Applicants. Applicants An applicant for funding must be a public or private nonprofit institution with demonstrated proficiency in:

A. Science and technology research, technology transfer or application of technology; and

B. Grant administration.

### <u>§13124-B. Experimental program to stimulate</u> competitive research

The foundation is responsible for the administration of the Maine Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research, referred to in this chapter as the "Maine EPSCoR Program," which is a partnership effort between the State Government and the Federal Government to strengthen the State's science and engineering infrastructure.

1. Linkage with state policies. The policies, programs and activities of the Maine EPSCoR Program must consider the State's economic, education and science and technology strategies and policies.

2. Policy recommendation. Through the foundation, the Maine EPSCoR Program may recommend to the Governor and the Legislature policies and programs essential to the strengthening of the State's science and engineering infrastructure.

### §13124-C. SBIR technical assistance program

The foundation shall establish a program to provide technical assistance to small businesses based in the State pursuant to the federal Small Business Innovation Development Act of 1982, Public Law 97-219, to develop competitive small business innovation research, or SBIR, proposals for submission to any of the federal agencies participating in the SBIR program.

1. Technical assistance. The technical assistance program may include, but is not limited to, small grants to hire grant writers, networking with scientists and other successful SBIR awardees, seminars on agency-specific solicitations and grant writing.

2. Information. The foundation shall conduct a program to inform small businesses of the federal SBIR program and the state program in order to ensure that all firms have the opportunity to participate in these programs.

3. Rules. The foundation shall establish eligibility requirements and award selection criteria to serve as the basis for technical assistance funding under this program.

4. Availability of federal funds. The provisions of this section are in effect if, and as long as, federal finan-

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cial participation is available pursuant to the federal Small Business Innovation Development Act of 1982.

1. Transition. The complete transition of the Maine Science and Technology Commission, referred to in this section as the "commission," to a nonprofit corporation named the Maine Science and Technology Foundation, referred to in this section as the "foundation," must occur by October 1, 1993, at which time the commission is dissolved. During the transition period the commission is a state agency within the Executive Department. In order for the commission to meet its programmatic obligations during the transition period, the Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall work and cooperate with the commission to ensure continuity in the allocation and disbursement of General Fund money and federal funds to the commission and to assist the commission in making the transition to a nonprofit corporation.

2. Bylaws and other operational materials. In order to provide for an orderly and smooth transition to the initial organization of the foundation, the commission shall prepare and submit the following operational materials for consideration by the board of directors of the foundation at its first meeting: draft bylaws, foundation staff job descriptions, health and employment insurance plans and any other materials necessary for the foundation's board of directors to take action at its initial meeting.

**3. Slate of nominees.** The commission shall serve as the nominating committee for the selection of nominees for members of the board of directors of the foundation and shall submit a slate of nominees to the Governor no later than July 30, 1993.

4. First meeting of foundation. Unless otherwise indicated by the Governor, the nominees for members of the board of directors of the foundation shall assume their responsibilities as board directors in an acting capacity until confirmed by the Legislature. The first meeting of the board of directors of the foundation must be held by October 15, 1993.

5. Chair of commission. The chair of the commission is a director of the foundation for a 3-year term and its chair for the first year of operation of the foundation effective the first meeting of the board of directors and is eligible for reelection after the first year.

6. Executive director of commission. All positions of the commission are abolished. The former executive director of the commission becomes the president and a director of the foundation for the first year of operation of the foundation effective the first meeting of the board of directors and may be reappointed at the pleasure of the board of directors thereafter.

7. Records, property and equipment. All funds, records, property and equipment of the commission must be transferred to the foundation.

8. Funds transferred. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, sections 1585 and 1586, all accrued expenditures, assets, liabilities, balances, appropriations or allocations, transfers, revenues or other available funds of the commission are transferred to the foundation. Specifically, any balances remaining in the Personal Services line category upon the inception of the foundation may be transferred to the All Other line category in order to carry out the objectives of the foundation.

9. Contracts and agreements. All contracts and agreements currently in effect with the commission remain in effect under the foundation until rescinded, terminated or modified by the foundation's board of directors.

10. Rules and procedures. All rules and procedures of the commission remain in effect and apply to the foundation unless expressly repealed or modified by the foundation's board of directors.

Sec. E-25. Evaluation of foundation. The joint standing committee having jurisdiction over housing and economic development matters shall prepare and submit to the Legislature no later than January 15, 1997 an evaluation report on the Maine Science and Technology Foundation. The foundation and its corporators shall cooperate in the conduct of the evaluation to the extent requested by the reviewing committee. At a minimum, the evaluation must include the following:

1. A description and evaluation of the extent to which the statutory purposes of the foundation were achieved in its first 5 years of operation; and

After an aggregate sum of \$10,000,000 has been transferred to the Finance Authority of Maine and an aggregate sum of \$3,000,000 has been transferred to the Maine State Housing Authority pursuant to this subsection, the per barrel fee assessed pursuant to subsection 5 must be reduced by 6¢ per barrel. For the purposes of this subsection, the transfers from the Underground Oil Storage Replacement Fund under Public Law 1993, chapter 6 and under unified appropriations and allocations for fiscal year 1993-94 and fiscal year 1994-95 are not included in calculating the amount transferred from the Ground Water Oil Clean-up Fund to the Underground Oil Storage Replacement Fund.

Any drug provided under this emergency procedure is considered a Medicaid-covered service pending departmental action. 4. Rulemaking. Fringe benefits from state employment of the transferred personnel, including vacation and sick leave, health and life insurance and retirement, remain with the transferred personnel. The rights and benefits under current statutes, rules and collective bargaining agreements continue for all transferred personnel. If these collective bargaining agreements expire, or have expired on the effective date of this Act, the status, rights and benefits of covered employees must be maintained according to applicable labor law principles. All personnel transferred from state employment to the Maine State Retirement System as an independent agency retain all applicable seniority rights and privileges and all other rights and privileges with regard to employment in state service for a period of 2 years from the effective date of this Act. During this 2-year period, the recall provisions of these applicable laws, rules and collective bargaining agreements continue to apply for all state employees with layoff status to the filling of any vacancy in the Maine State Retirement System. State employees who refuse recall to the Maine State Retirement System retain full recall rights to all other agencies of State Government.

After the end of the 2-year period, the state employees transferred to the Maine State Retirement System pursuant to this section have the same rights and privileges as Maine State Retirement System employees hired on and after the effective date of this Act based on current personnel rules, policies and collective bargaining agreements applicable to Maine State Retirement System employees. Transferred employees may choose to be covered under the Maine State Retirement System personnel system and benefits before the 2-year period expires.

The Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall assist the Board of Trustees of the Maine State Retirement System with the orderly implementation of these provisions, completed by the effective date of this Act.

6. Board of trustees. Members of the Board of Trustees of the Maine State Retirement System on the effective date of this Act serve as members of the board in its capacity as an independent agency until their terms expire. New members must be chosen to achieve the qualifications required in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 17102 at the earliest possible date.

7. Transferred employees. All transferred employees that are in the state administrative services, professional and technical services or the state supervisory services bargaining units must be transferred to the same respective units within the Maine State Retirement System.

All transferred personnel who are represented by a bargaining agent on the effective date of this Act continue to be represented by that bargaining agent. Following the effective date of this Act, a petition for decertification or certification of a new bargaining agent for the newly created bargaining unit may be filed in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 26, chapter 9-A and the rules of the Maine Labor Relations Board.

8. Board of trustees as successor employer. For the purposes of applying this Act and collective bargaining agreements governing employees of the Maine State Retirement System, the Board of Trustees of the Maine State Retirement System in its capacity as an independent agency is considered the successor employer to and assumes the obligations of the State.

9. Transition accomplished. The Board of Trustees of the Maine State Retirement System shall appoint an executive director on the effective date of this Act. The Maine State Retirement System shall take the steps necessary for transition and function as an independent agency on and after January 1, 1994. Except as otherwise provided by this Act, all references in the public laws of the State to the Board of Trustees of the Maine State Retirement System refer to the board in its capacity as an independent agency.

10. Transitional hiring. From July 1, 1993 until the Maine State Retirement System is operating in fact as a public instrumentality, the system is authorized to establish additional positions and set work days and hours necessary to implement benefit modifications and other plan changes and to fill those positions by direct hire.

11. Transitional budget. For fiscal year 1993-94 the Maine State Retirement System is authorized to spend money from the system's trust funds for necessary operating expenses, as determined by the board of trustees, in excess of amounts otherwise allocated in this Act.

#### §586-A. Maine Public Education Trust Fund

1. Legislative findings and purposes. The public reserved lands are a public trust originally set aside in townships by Massachusetts and Maine for certain beneficial purposes, including public education. In 1973 the

Legislature, acting as trustee over the public reserved lands, directed the Bureau of Public Lands to manage and when appropriate provide for the consolidation of the public reserved lands with the income derived from the lands to be devoted to certain beneficial purposes, particularly the management and enhancement of the resources and values of these lands for a wide range of public uses. The Legislature now finds that the public reserved lands may generate income that exceeds the requirements of managing these lands and enhancing their public values. In its capacity as trustee, the Legislature determines that a portion of this income, as set aside pursuant to subsection 2, may be dedicated to public education programs benefiting the youth of this State. a beneficial purpose that the Legislature finds in keeping with the original public trust purposes of these lands.

2. Fund established. The Maine Public Education Trust Fund is established as a nonlapsing fund, in this section referred to as the "fund," and any income earned is credited to the fund. All money received from the lease of certain public reserved land in Township 3, Range 4, BKPWKR, Somerset County, Maine, as this lease was originally authorized by Private and Special Law 1927, chapter 113, section 13, as amended, must be deposited with the Treasurer of State and credited to the Maine Public Education Trust Fund. Notwithstanding section 586, this fund is separate from the Public Reserved Lands Management Fund, except when specific allocations are made by the Legislature pursuant to subsection 3.

3. Expenditures from fund. Expenditures from the Maine Public Education Trust Fund are subject to legislative allocation and appropriation. Because the public reserved lands are held in public trust for certain beneficial purposes, money in the fund may be used only as provided in this subsection. After allowance for reasonable administrative costs and after any allocation the Legislature determines appropriate for management and enhancement of the public reserved lands, the fund must be used for programs and facilities that directly benefit the State's system of public schools and other public educational institutions. Without limitation, the benefited programs and facilities may include those of public school systems statewide, selected programs at schools identified by the Legislature as having special values or needs and the University of Maine System.

**Sec. N-2. Appropriation.** The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Part.

# CHAPTER 34

## ENVIRONMENTAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAMS

#### SUBCHAPTER I

# **MAINE CONSERVATION CORPS PROGRAM**

# §2181. Maine Conservation Corps Program

There is established in the jobs training administrative office in the Department of Labor the Maine Conservation Corps, referred to in this chapter as the "Corps," to provide job training, conservation education and work opportunities for the economically disadvantaged, to improve public property for the increased use and enjoyment of the public and to assist nonprofit organizations with projects that serve a valid public purpose and have purposes consistent with this subchapter.

#### §2182. Participants

Participants in the Corps must be economically disadvantaged. Individuals are eligible to participate if their family income is 150% or less of the nonfarm income official poverty line as defined by the federal Office of Management and Budget as revised annually in accordance with the United States Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, Section 673, Subsection 2. Priority must be given to those who are economically disadvantaged as defined by the United States Job Training Partnership Act, Subchapter II, Public Law 97-300. A person is not eligible if that person has left employment or school for the purpose of participating in this program. Corps members may be jointly enrolled in any state or local job training program or human resource development program. Corps members enrolled in the Job Training Partnership program must be enrolled in that program by the service delivery area responsible for the county of residence of the enrollee pursuant to voluntary agreements entered into between the Corps and the service delivery areas.

# §2183. Projects

1. Types of projects. Projects undertaken by the Corps include, but are not limited to, projects such as:

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A. Forestry, nursery and silvicultural operations;

B. Wildlife habitat conservation, rehabilitation and improvement;

C. Recreational area development and improvement;

D. Energy conservation projects;

E. Fish culture and habitat maintenance and improvement and other fisheries or marine resource assistance;

F. Trail and campsite development and improvement;

G. Insect, disease, rodents and fire prevention and control;

H. Erosion, flood, drought and storm damage assistance and control; and

I. Reclamation and improvement of lands disturbed by erosion, mining or other adverse natural or human-made actions.

2. Eligible sponsors. All projects must be undertaken and operated under the sponsorship and cooperation of a public landowning agency or a nonprofit organization. A sponsoring public agency or organization shall contribute to a project by, at a minimum, providing tools, supplies, equipment and technical supervision and plans necessary for project completion.

3. Additional criteria. Projects must be of lasting and worthwhile significance to the people of the State or otherwise serve a valid public purpose, provide meaningful work experience to the enrollees and be labor intensive.

## §2184. Limitations

Projects to be carried out by the Corps are limited to projects on publicly owned lands or, if not on public lands, under the sponsorship and supervision of a nonprofit organization.

#### §2185. Administration

The executive director of the job training administrative office shall employ a director of the Corps in the job training administrative office and may employ other personnel as are required to accomplish the purposes of this chapter.

The Director of the Maine Conservation Corps shall work with other agencies and organizations to design the program to provide maximum work opportuni-

ties, job skills training, improvements to publicly owned property and assistance with projects conducted by nonprofit organizations.

The director shall work with state and local job training agencies, including other service delivery areas and the job service, which shall conduct recruitment and referral of individuals interested in participating in the Corps. Agency collaboration with the Corps is on a voluntary basis.

There is established a dedicated account for the use of the Corps. This account must be used to receive funds contributed by private and public agencies, organizations or individuals and to expend those funds to promote the purposes of this chapter. Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, state agencies may transfer money appropriated from the General Fund into this account for purposes of contributing to projects, services or volunteer stipends that benefit the contributing agency.

# §2186. Corps members

Members of the Corps who are paid wages through the General Fund account of the Corps or through its dedicated account must be compensated at least the minimum wage and must receive personal liability insurance and workers' compensation insurance. Notwithstanding other state laws, Corps members are not deemed employees of the State for the purposes of Title 5, chapter 101.

## <u>§2187. Prohibition against displacement of other</u> employees or involvement in labor disputes

The assignment of members of the Corps may not result in the displacement of existing employees of the sponsor, including any employees who have been temporarily laid off by the sponsor. For purposes of this section, the term "displacement" means both total and partial displacement, including a reduction in the number of hours, wages or other benefits of employment.

# SUBCHAPTER II

# **ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCE**

# **VOLUNTEER EFFORT**

# <u>§2191. Environmental Resource Volunteer Effort</u> <u>Program created</u>

There is established within the Corps the Environmental Resource Volunteer Effort Program to create, promote and manage volunteer and intern opportunities with public agencies that are responsible for protecting, developing, managing or preserving the State's natural resources.

# §2192. Volunteer insurance

The Environmental Resource Volunteer Effort Program must ensure that volunteers are covered by workplace injury and liability insurance.

# §2193. Types of volunteer or intern services

Volunteers and interns may perform work and services that are described in section 2183. Volunteers and interns must be placed in federal, state or local public agencies and perform work or services that benefit the public. The volunteer and intern positions must be sponsored by natural resource-related agencies. A sponsoring agency must contribute to a volunteer or intern position by providing all necessary supervision, supplies, equipment and plans required for the position.

# §2194. Stipends

Sponsoring natural resource agencies may provide stipends to volunteers and interns not to exceed the minimum wage and may reimburse volunteers or interns for work-related expenses.

Funds for stipends must be deposited by sponsoring agencies in an account established by the Corps, as authorized by section 2185. The Corps will disperse stipends to volunteers and interns eligible for those payments.

# <u>§2195. Monetary contributions to the volunteer and intern program</u>

Private organizations and individuals may donate money to the Environmental Resource Volunteer Effort Program for general or specific purposes. The funds must be expended to further the purposes of the program.

Sec. O-5. Transition. The following provisions apply to the transfer of the Maine Conservation Corps from the Department of Conservation to the Department of Labor.

1. Notwithstanding the provision of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, all accrued expenditures, assets, liabilities, balances of appropriations, allocations, transfers, revenues or other available funds in an account or subdivision of an account of the Maine Conservation Corps must be transferred to the proper accounts by the State Controller upon the request of the State Budget Officer and with the approval of the Governor.

2. All agreements, leases, contracts or licenses issued under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, chapter 430 relating to the Maine Conservation Corps prior to the effective date of this Act continue to be valid under the terms of issuance until they expire or are rescinded, amended or revoked.

3. All rules adopted under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, chapter 430, relating to the Maine Conservation Corps, or adopted with regard to this chapter prior to the effective date of this Act must be administered by the Department of Labor and continue in effect until rescinded or amended by the Department of Labor or overturned by a court of law.

4. Employees of the Department of Conservation who are transferred to the Department of Labor are subject to the provisions of this subsection.

> A. The employees retain their accrued fringe benefits, including vacation and sick leave, health and life insurance and retirement benefits.

> B. The employees who are members of collective bargaining units on the effective date of this Act remain as members in their respective bargaining units and retain all rights, privileges and benefits provided by their collective bargaining agreements with respect to state service while employed with the Department of Conservation.

> C. The employees who are members of collective bargaining units may remain as members of the Maine State Retirement System.

D. The Bureau of Human Resources shall assist the Department of Conservation and the Department of Labor with the orderly implementation of these provisions.

5. The Department of Conservation, the Department of Labor and any other state agency affected by the provisions of this Part shall determine the best method of resolving any legal, fiscal, personnel or operational conflict created as a result of this Part and shall submit necessary recommendations for statutory changes to the Second Regular Session of the 116th Legislature for approval by January 1, 1994.

Sec. O-6. Revision clause. Wherever in the Maine Revised Statutes the Maine Conservation Corps in the Department of Conservation is referred to, the reference is amended to read and mean the Maine Conservation Corps in the Department of Labor and the Revisor of Statutes shall implement this revision when updating, publishing or republishing the statutes.

#### PART P

Sec. P-1. 34-A MRSA §1210, sub-§2, as amended by PL 1991, c. 622, Pt. W, is further amended to read:

2. Reimbursement. Except as provided in subsection 6-A, the department shall, under this section, reimburse each county quarterly for each actual day served at that county correctional facility by:

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A. Persons convicted of a Class A, Class B or Class C crime sentenced after March 31, 1987, to serve a term of imprisonment pursuant to Title 17-A, section 1203, subsection 1, or section 1252, subsection 1; and

B. Persons convicted of a Class A, Class B or Class C crime sentenced after December 31, 1988, to serve a term of imprisonment pursuant to Title 17-A, section 1203, subsection 1 or section 1252, subsection 1.

Reimbursement for periods after June 30, 1987 may not be authorized until the reimbursable costs for the operations of the jail are agreed upon by the commissioner and the county commissioners for that county. Reimbursable costs for the operations of the jail must, to the extent practicable, be mutually agreed upon prior to the actual expenditures of funds for those costs. Prior approval of all capital expenditures is required for reimbursement of that expense item. If the commissioner and the county commissioners are unable to agree upon reimbursable costs, they shall jointly select an arbitrator to determine those costs. The arbitrator's decision is final and both the commissioner and the county commissioners are bound by that decision.

The obligation of the Department of Corrections to reimburse counties pursuant to this section may not exceed the actual amount appropriated during the fiscal years 1991-92 and 1992-93 during fiscal year 1993-94 and fiscal year 1994-95.

Sec. P-2. PL 1991, c. 622, Pt. A, §1, under that part designated "DEPARTMENT OF IN-LAND FISHERIES AND WILDLIFE" in the 2nd occurrence of that part relating to "Resource Management Services - Inland Fisheries and Wildlife" is amended by amending the 4th to 17th lines to read:

> Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5. section 1585, provides for the transfer of funds in fiscal year 1991-92 to the Division of Forest Fire Control in the Department of Conservation to reimburse for the fire protection of wildlife habitat. This transfer is considered a "working capital advance" and these funds must be returned to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife no later June 30, 1993 from available General Fund appropriations to the Department of Conservation in fiscal year 1992-93.

Sec. P-3. Department of Marine Resources Shellfish Fund. Notwithstanding any other provision

of law, the Department of Marine Resources is authorized to fund working capital for its Shellfish Fund by transfer of cash from the department's gas tax fund to cover a seasonal cash flow shortfall in the Department of Marine Resources Shellfish Fund. These funds must be returned to the gas tax account by the end of each fiscal year.

Sec. P-4. Funding for the Bureau of State Police. Notwithstanding Public Law 1987, chapter 793, Part B, section 4, the Legislature determines that, for fiscal years 1993-94 and 1994-95, funding for the Department of Public Safety, Bureau of State Police must be provided as follows: Eighty-seven percent must be allocated from the Highway Fund and 13% must be appropriated from the General Fund.

Sec. P-5. Johns Mansville Trust recovery. Funds received by the State from the Johns Mansville Trust as a result of asbestos-related recoveries must be deposited to the General Fund as undedicated revenue on or before June 30, 1994.

Sec. P-6. Lotto \* America working capital. Working capital funds returned to the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations Lottery account from the multi-state lottery association, resulting from the State's withdrawal from Lotto \* America, must be deposited to the General Fund as undedicated revenue on or before June 30, 1994.

Sec. P-7. Discount liquor store. The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services may enter into a lease agreement for the purpose of establishing a discount liquor store in the City of Saco. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services has the authority to increase the level of expenditure of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations beyond the bureau's legislatively approved allocation, to support the opening of a discount liquor store in the City of Saco, upon the recommendation of the State Budget Officer and the approval of the Governor.

Upon receipt of such application containing information required by the commissioner and being satisfied that the applicant has complied with this chapter and regulations promulgated thereunder rules adopted under this chapter, the commissioner shall issue the applicant a license to manufacture and sell beverages.

No person manufacturing or bottling any beverage outside of the State for retail sale within the State shall <u>may</u> sell or offer to sell the same within the State unless such that person shall have has made application and secured a license to sell beverages from the commissioner upon the payment of \$15 the fee specified in this section. The commissioner may issue a license to sell beverages manufactured or bottled outside of the State upon being satisfied from inspection by an inspector of his the department or from a statement from the agency having enforcement of the beverage law in the state where such

the beverage establishment is located, that such the establishment complies with the requirements of this chapter and regulations promulgated thereunder rules adopted under this chapter, and upon his approving such the commissioner's approval of the establishment on the basis of such the inspection or statement.

All such licenses shall run for the current year until the 30th day of June following the date of the issuance, on which date, or on the date provided by the provisions of the Maine Administrative Procedure Act as to license expiration, whichever date is later, they shall terminate unless sooner revoked as provided in section 1802, and shall <u>must</u> be renewed annually thereafter subject always to such revocation.

The fee for a license issued under this section is based on the number of persons employed by the manufacturer or bottler. The fee for a manufacturer or bottler with 5 or fewer employees is \$50. The fee for all other manufacturers or bottlers is \$100.

# CHAPTER 31-A

#### HEALTH OCCUPATIONS TRAINING PROJECT

#### §2159. Scope

This chapter establishes the Health Occupations Training Project to provide assistance to the State's health care facilities facing serious shortages of workers in certain health care occupations by providing job training opportunities for the State's citizens through the State's technical colleges.

# §2159-A. Responsibility

The Department of Labor is responsible for the funding and oversight of the Health Occupations Training Project. The Commissioner of Labor shall implement this project by contracting with the Maine Technical College System to develop and deliver job training programs in health care occupations.

#### §2159-B. Administration and funding

The Maine Technical College System is responsible for administering the Health Occupations Training Project. Funding provided under this chapter must be used exclusively for the development and delivery of health care training programs. Funds provided for this purpose may not be used for administration of the Health Occupations Training Project, for tuition to the State's technical colleges, or for the delivery of health care training programs once the initial development and delivery of a program is complete.

#### §2159-C. Selection of grant recipients

The selection and awarding of grants for funding under this chapter must be in accordance with this section.

**1. Requests for proposals.** The Maine Technical College System shall solicit proposals for health care training projects from the technical colleges by issuing a Request for Proposals.

**2.** Local partnerships. The State's technical colleges shall seek joint partnerships with local job training providers in order to submit joint proposals. If, however, a local job training provider elects not to participate in a project, the technical college may still submit a proposal.

**3. Review committee.** The Maine Technical College System shall award grants based on the decision of a review committee comprised of an equal number of representatives from the Department of Labor and the Maine Technical College System.

4. Contracts. Once a training project has been selected for funding by the review committee, the Department of Labor shall issue a contract to the Maine Technical College System prior to the onset of the program year in which the project will be funded. The Maine Technical College System shall then issue grants to the technical colleges selected for funding under this project.

#### §2159-D. Project goals

The Health Occupations Training Project is a training strategy to increase the supply of health care workers by providing Maine citizens with job training opportunities in health care occupations. The project goal is to provide skill training to participants who are either unemployed and want to enter the health care field or are employed health care workers who want to upgrade their skills. Preference must be given to participants in the state job training system during selection if they have met the minimum criteria for program entry and have met the application deadline as determined in the grant proposal. For purposes of this chapter, the state job training system includes job training programs such as the Job Training Partnership Act, the Maine Training Initiative, the Strategic Training for Accelerated Reemployment Program and the ASPIRE-JOBS program.

#### §2159-E. Annual report

The Maine Technical College System shall report no later than September 15th of each year on the outcome of the job training programs offered through this

chapter. This annual report must be submitted to the Department of Labor and to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over labor matters.

# §2159-F. Repeal

This chapter is repealed October 1, 1995.

"Court order of support" means any judgment or order for the support of dependent children issued by any court of the State or another state, including an order in a final decree of divorce or any judgment or order issued in accordance with an administrative procedure established by state law that affords substantial due process and is subject to judicial review.

2. Noncompliance with a court order of support. An applicant for the issuance or renewal of a license or an existing licensee regulated by a board who is not in compliance with a court order of support is subject to the requirements of Title 19, section 305.

## <u>§305. Enforcement of support obligations; notice to</u> licensing boards and obligor; judicial review

1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

A. "Board" means any bureau, board or commission listed in Title 10, section 8001 or 8001-A, other licensor that is affiliated with or is a part of the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, the Board of Overseers of the Bar and any other state agency or municipality that issues a license authorizing a person to engage in a business, occupation, profession or industry.

B. "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Human Services.

C. "Compliance with a court order of support" means that the support obligor is no more than 90 days in arrears in making payments in full for current support, in making periodic payments on a support arrearage pursuant to a written agreement with the Department of Human Services or in making periodic payments as set forth in a court order of support and has obtained or maintained health insurance coverage if required by a court order of support.

D. "Court order of support" means any judgment or order for the support of dependent children issued by any court of the State or another state, including an order in a final decree of divorce or any judgment or order issued in accordance with an administrative procedure established by state law that affords substantial due process and is subject to judicial review.

E. "Department" means the Department of Human Services.

F. "License" means a license, certification, registration, permit, approval or other similar document evidencing admission to or granting authority to engage in a profession, occupation, business or industry, but does not mean a registration, permit, approval or similar document evidencing the granting of authority to engage in the business of banking pursuant to Title 9-B.

G. "Licensee" means any individual holding a license, certification, registration, permit, approval or other similar document evidencing admission to or granting authority to engage in a profession, occupation, business or industry except an individual holding a registration, permit, approval or similar document evidencing the granting of authority to engage in the business of banking pursuant to Title 9-B.

2. Notice. The department may serve notice upon a support obligor who is not in compliance with a court order of support that informs the obligor of the department's intention to submit the obligor's name to any appropriate board as a licensee who is not in compliance with a court order of support. The notice must inform the obligor that:

> A. The obligor may request an administrative hearing to contest the issue of compliance;

> B. A request for hearing must be made in writing and must be received by the department within 20 days of service;

> C. If the obligor requests a hearing within 20 days of service, the department shall stay action to certify the obligor to any board for noncompliance with a court order of support pending a decision after hearing;

> D. If the obligor does not request a hearing within 20 days of service and is not in compliance with a court order of support, the department shall certify the obligor to any appropriate board for non-compliance with a court order of support;

E. If the department certifies the obligor to a board for noncompliance with a court order of support, the board must revoke the obligor's license and refuse to issue or reissue a license until the obligor provides the board with a release from the department that states the obligor is in compliance with the obligor's support order. A revocation by an agency or a refusal by an agency to reissue, renew or otherwise extend the license or certificate of authority is deemed a final determination within the meaning of Title 5, section 10002; and

F. If the obligor files a motion to modify support with the court or requests the department to amend a support obligation established by an administrative decision, the department shall stay action to certify the obligor to any board for noncompliance with a court order of support.

The notice must include the address and telephone number of the department's support enforcement office that issues the notice and a statement of the need to obtain a release from that office as provided in subsection 8. The department shall attach a copy of the obligor's court order of support to the notice. Service of the notice must be made by certified mail, return receipt requested, or

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by service in hand as specified in the Maine Rules of Civil Procedure. For purposes of this section, authorized representatives of the commissioner may serve the notice.

3. Administrative hearing. An obligor may request an administrative hearing upon service of the notice described in subsection 2. The request for hearing must made in writing and must be received by the department within 20 days of service. The department shall conduct hearings under this subsection in accordance with the requirements of Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter IV. The issues that may be considered at hearing are limited to whether the obligor is required to pay child support under a court or administrative order and whether the obligor is in compliance with a court order of support.

4. Decision after hearing. The department shall render a decision after hearing without undue delay as to whether the obligor is in compliance with the obligor's court order of support. The decision must be based on the hearing record and rules adopted by the commissioner. The decision must inform the obligor that the obligor may file a petition for judicial review of the decision within 30 days of the date of the decision. The department shall send an attested copy of the decision to the obligor by regular mail to the obligor's most recent address of record.

5. Stay. If an obligor timely requests a hearing to contest the issue of compliance, the department may not certify the name of the obligor to a board for noncompliance with a court order of support until the department issues a decision after hearing that finds the obligor is not in compliance with a court order of support.

<u>6. Certification of noncompliance.</u> The department may certify in writing to any appropriate board that a support obligor is not in compliance with a court order of support if:

> A. The obligor does not timely request a hearing upon service of a notice issued under subsection 2 and is not in compliance with a court order of support 21 days after service of the notice;

> B. The department issues a decision after hearing that finds the obligor is not in compliance with a court order of support; or

C. The court enters a judgment on a petition for judicial review that finds the obligor is not in compliance with a court order of support.

The department shall send by regular mail a copy of any certification of noncompliance filed with a board to the obligor at the obligor's most recent address of record.

7. Notice from board. A board shall notify an obligor certified by the department under subsection 6,

without undue delay, that the obligor's application for the issuance or renewal of a license may not be granted or that the obligor's license has been revoked because the obligor's name has been certified by the department as a support obligor who is not in compliance with a court order of support.

**8.** Written confirmation of compliance. When an obligor who is served notice under subsection 2 subsequently complies with the court order of support, the department shall provide the obligor with written confirmation that the obligor is in compliance with the order.

9. Rules. The department shall adopt rules to implement and enforce the requirements of this section.

**10.** Agreements. The department and the various boards shall enter into such agreements as are necessary to carry out the requirements of this section, but only to the extent the department determines it is cost-effective.

**11.** Motion to modify court order of support; stay. Nothing in this section prohibits a support obligor from filing a motion to modify support with the court or from requesting the department to amend a support obligation established by an administrative decision. The department shall stay action to certify the obligor to any board for noncompliance with a court order of support if the obligor files a motion to modify support with the court and notifies the department of the motion or requests the department to amend a support obligation established by the department.

12. Reporting. On or before April 1, 1994, or as soon as economically feasible and at least annually thereafter, all boards subject to this section and the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, Division of Administrative Services shall provide to the department specified information, on magnetic tape or other machine-readable form, according to standards established by the department, about applicants for licensure and all current licensees. The Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, Securities Division shall provide the specified information for only those current licensees that are residents of this State. The information to be provided must include all of the following information about the licensee:

A. Name;

B. Address of record;

<u>C.</u> Federal employer identification number or social security number;

D. Type of license;

E. Effective date of license or renewal;

F. Expiration date of license; and

#### G. Active or inactive status.

13. Effect of noncompliance. The department, upon receipt of the licensee information referred to in subsection 12, shall identify and notify each board and the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, Division of Administrative Services, of the names of any of its licensees who are support obligors subject to this section. The notice must include the social security number and address of the support obligor, the name, address and telephone number of the department's designee for implementing this section and a certification by the department that it has verified that the licensee is a support obligor subject to this section. When the department notifies a board under this subsection, the department shall provide adequate notice of its action to the obligor. The notice must inform the obligor of the right to request a hearing on the issue of whether the obligor is in compliance with a court order of support. The board may not issue or renew a license to a person whose name is on the most recent list from the department until the board receives a copy of the release specified in subsection 8.

14. Subsequent reissuance, renewal or other extension of license or certificate. The board may reissue, renew or otherwise extend the license or certificate of authority in accordance with the board's rules after the board receives a copy of the written confirmation of compliance specified in subsection 8. A board may waive any applicable requirement for reissuance, renewal or other extension if it determines that the imposition of that requirement places an undue burden on the person and that waiver of the requirement is consistent with the public interest.

**15. Program review.** In furtherance of the public policy of increasing collection of child support, the department shall report the following to the Legislature and the Governor on January 31, 1996:

A. The number of support obligors identified as licensees subject to this section;

B. The number of support obligors identified by the department under this section who are not in compliance with a court order of support; and

C. The number of actions taken by the department under this section and the results of those actions.

#### §306. Family financial responsibility

1. Purpose. The Legislature finds and declares that child support is a basic legal right of the State's parents and children, that mothers and fathers have a legal obligation to provide financial support for their children and that child support payments can have a substantial impact on child poverty and state welfare expen-

ditures. It is therefore the Legislature's intent to encourage payment of child support to decrease overall costs to the State's taxpayers while increasing the amount of financial support collected for the State's children. To this end, the Department of Human Services is authorized to initiate action under this section against individuals who are not in compliance with a court order of support.

2. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

A. "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Human Services, a designee or an authorized representative.

B. "Compliance with a court order of support" means that the support obligor is no more than 90 days in arrears in making payments in full for current support, in making periodic payments on a support arrearage pursuant to a written agreement with the Department of Human Services, in making periodic payments as set forth in a court order of support or has obtained or maintained health insurance coverage as required.

C. "Court order of support" means any judgment or order for the support of dependent children issued by any court of the State or another state, including an order in a final decree of divorce or any judgment or order issued in accordance with an administrative procedure established by state law that affords substantial due process and is subject to judicial review.

D. "Department" means the Department of Human Services.

3. Notice. The commissioner may serve notice upon a support obligor who is not in compliance with a court order of support that informs the obligor of the commissioner's intention to certify the obligor to the Secretary of State as an individual who is not in compliance with a court order of support. The notice must inform the obligor that:

A. The obligor may contest the issue of compliance at an administrative hearing;

B. A request for hearing must be made in writing and must be received by the department within 20 days of service;

C. If the obligor requests a hearing within 20 days of service, the department shall stay action to certify the obligor to the Secretary of State for noncompliance with a court order of support pending a decision after hearing;

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D. If the obligor does not timely request a hearing to contest the issue of compliance and does not obtain a release from the department, the commissioner shall certify the obligor to the Secretary of State for noncompliance with a court order of support;

E. If the commissioner certifies the obligor to the Secretary of State, the Secretary of State must suspend any motor vehicle operator's licenses that the obligor holds and the obligor's right to apply for or obtain a motor vehicle operator's license;

F. If the obligor requests a hearing, the obligor shall direct the request to the department's support enforcement office that is responsible for handling the obligor's case; and

G. If the obligor files a motion to modify support with the court or requests the department to amend a support obligation established by an administrative decision, the department shall stay action to certify the obligor to the Secretary of State for noncompliance with a court order of support.

The notice must include the address and telephone number of the department's support enforcement office that issues the notice and a statement of the need for the obligor to obtain a release from that office as provided in subsection 8. The department shall attach a copy of the obligor's court order of support to the notice. The notice must be served by certified mail, return receipt requested, by service in hand, or as specified in the Maine Rules of Civil Procedure. For purposes of this section, an authorized representative of the commissioner may serve the notice.

4. Administrative hearing. An obligor may request an administrative hearing within 20 days of service of the notice described in subsection 3. The request for hearing must be in writing and must be received by the department within 20 days. The department shall conduct the hearing in accordance with the requirements of Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter IV. The issues that may be considered at hearing are limited to whether the obligor is required to pay child support under a court order of support and whether the obligor is in compliance with a court order of support.

5. Decision after hearing. The department shall render a decision after hearing without undue delay as to whether the obligor is in compliance with the obligor's court order of support. The decision must be based on the hearing record and rules adopted by the commissioner. The decision must inform the obligor that the obligor may file a petition for judicial review of the decision within 30 days of the date of the decision. The department shall send an attested copy of the decision to the obligor by regular mail to the obligor's most recent address of record.

6. Stay. If an obligor timely requests a hearing to contest the issue of compliance, the department may not certify the name of the obligor to a board for noncompliance with a court order of support until the department issues a decision after hearing that finds the obligor is not in compliance with a court order of support.

7. Certification. The commissioner may certify in writing to the Secretary of State that a support obligor is not in compliance with a court order of support if:

A. The obligor does not timely request a hearing upon service of a notice issued under subsection 3 and is not in compliance with a court order of support 21 days after service of the notice;

B. The department issues a decision after hearing that finds the obligor is not in compliance with a court order of support; or

<u>C.</u> The court enters a judgment on a petition for judicial review that finds the obligor is not in compliance with a court order of support.

The department shall send by regular mail a copy of any certification of noncompliance filed with the Secretary of State to the obligor at the obligor's most recent address of record.

8. Written confirmation of compliance. When an obligor who is served notice under subsection 3 subsequently complies with the court order of support, the department shall provide the obligor with written confirmation that the obligor is in compliance with the order.

9. Rules. The department shall adopt rules to implement and enforce the requirements of this section.

**10.** Agreement. The department may enter into an agreement with the Secretary of State to carry out the requirements of this section.

**11.** Motion to modify court order of support; stay. Nothing in this section prohibits a support obligor from filing a motion to modify support with the court or from requesting the department to amend a support obligation established by an administrative decision. The department shall stay action to certify the obligor to the Secretary of State for noncompliance with a court order of support if the obligor files a motion to modify support with the court and notifies the department of the motion or requests the department to amend a support obligation established by the department.

**12.** Program review. In furtherance of the public policy of increasing collection of child support, the department shall report the following to the Legislature and the Governor on July 1, 1995:

A. The number of notices served upon support obligors by the department under this section;

B. The number of obligors served notice under this section who request a hearing;

C. The number of hearings held under this section, the results of the hearings and the number of cases settled without a hearing;

D. The number of support obligors certified to the Secretary of State for noncompliance with a court order of support under this section; and

E. The costs incurred in the implementation and enforcement of this section and the department's estimate of the amount of child support collected due to the department's actions under this section.

#### §307. Publication of delinquent child support obligors

**1.** Publication. The Department of Human Services may publish in the State's newspapers the names of delinquent child support obligors who owe unpaid child support. Publication may include the place of residence and the amount of unpaid child support of each obligor.

2. Immunity. Newspapers and their employees are immune from any criminal or civil liability as a result of publication under subsection 1, unless publication is a result of negligent or intentional misconduct.

Sec. V-5. 19 MRSA §448-A, sub-§3, as enacted by PL 1981, c. 657, §2, is amended to read:

3. Fees; Aid to Families with Dependent Children. The department shall by rule establish by rule a schedule of fees for enforcement of support obligations involving recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children. In enforcing support obligations, the department shall impose such fees against the obligor as are mandated by federal law and regulations. The department may impose such other reasonable fees and costs against the obligee or obligor as are not prohibited by federal law and regulations. The department shall regulations. The department may impose such other reasonable fees and costs against the obligee or obligor as are not prohibited by federal law and regulations. The department shall retain all fees and apply them toward the administration of the location, paternity and support enforcement programs.

A. "Applicant" means an individual, state, political subdivision of a state or instrumentality of a state.

B. "Support obligations" means the amount due an obligee for support under a court order or administrative decision and includes any arrearages of support which has that have accrued.

Sec. V-9. 19 MRSA §498-B, sub-§4 is enacted to read:

4. Insurers to provide information. Upon request by the department, a nonprofit hospital or medical service organization authorized under Title 24 or an insurer authorized under Title 24-A must provide to the department a list of persons who have health insurance coverage with that organization or insurer. The information shall be transmitted in a manner prescribed by the department to allow electronic identification of responsible parents who have health insurance coverage.

Sec. V-10. 19 MRSA §498-E is enacted to read:

# §498-E. Health insurance withholding order

1. Issuance of order. The department on its own behalf, on behalf of a custodial parent who applies for the department's support enforcement services or on behalf of another state's Title IV-D agency, political subdivision or agent may issue a responsible parent's employer or other payor of income a health insurance withholding order to enforce a responsible parent's obligation to obtain or maintain health insurance coverage or other health care services for the responsible parent's dependent child or children. A health insurance withholding order must be accompanied by a sworn statement issued by an authorized representative of the commissioner that states the responsible parent is required by a court order or administrative decision to obtain or maintain health insurance coverage or other health care services for the dependent child or children named in the health insurance withholding order and has failed to provide the department with proof of coverage as required by law.

**2. Employer notice.** A health insurance withholding order must be accompanied by an employer notice that contains the substance of subsections 3 to 16.

3. Duty to enroll. An employer or other payor of income served with a health insurance withholding order shall enroll the employee's dependent child or children named in the withholding order as covered persons in a group health insurance plan or other similar plan providing health care services or coverage offered by the employer, if the children are eligible for such coverage under the employer's enrollment provisions, and deduct any required premiums from the employee's earnings to pay for the insurance.

4. Choice of plan. If more than one plan is offered by the employer, the employer shall enroll qualified children prospectively in the insurance plan in which the employee is enrolled or, if the employee is not enrolled, in the least costly plan otherwise available, providing that the plan's services are available where the children reside. If the services of the employee's plan or the least costly plan are not available where the children reside, the employer shall enroll qualified children prospectively in the least costly plan that is available where the children reside.

5. Answer. An employer shall respond to a health insurance withholding order in writing within 30 days of service. The employer shall advise the department of the plan in which the children are enrolled or if the children are ineligible for any plan through the employer. The department shall include a preprinted answer form for the employer's use and shall include the form and a prepaid, self-addressed envelope with each health insurance withholding order.

6. Mistake of fact; affirmative defenses. A responsible parent may claim a mistake of fact or assert affirmative defenses to contest the issuance of a health insurance withholding order. The department shall establish by rule an administrative process for reviewing claims of mistake and investigating affirmative defenses.

7. Duration of order. A health insurance withholding order remains in force until the employee terminates employment, the employer or other payor of earnings is released from the order in writing by the department or release is ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction.

**8.** Change of plan. After it is initially determined in response to a health insurance withholding order that a child is eligible for coverage, the employer must make subsequent enrollment changes to include the child if the group health insurance plan is changed and provide notices of any changes in coverage to the department.

9. Fee. The commissioner may establish by rule a fee that an employer may charge an employee for each withholding and for a change of plan.

**10.** Failure to honor. Failure of an employer or other payor of earnings to comply with the requirements of a health insurance withholding order is a civil violation for which the department may recover up to \$1,000 in a civil action.

**11. Priority of order.** A health insurance withholding order has priority over any previously filed attachment, execution, garnishment or assignment of earnings that is not for the purpose of enforcing or paying a child support obligation. **12.** Employer protected. The department shall defend and hold harmless any employer or other payor of earnings who honors a health insurance withholding order.

**13. Immunity.** The employer may not be held liable for medical expenses incurred on behalf of a dependent child or children because of the employer's failure to enroll the dependent child or children in a health insurance or health care plan after being directed to do so by the department.

14. Employee protected. An employer who discharges, refuses to employ, or takes disciplinary action against a responsible parent, or who otherwise discriminates against that parent because of the existence of the order or the obligation the order imposes upon the employer, is subject to a civil penalty of not more than \$5,000 payable to the State, to be recovered in a civil action. The employer is also subject to an action by the responsible parent for compensatory and punitive damages, plus attorney's fees and court costs.

15. Service. A health insurance withholding order must be served on the responsible parent's employer or other payor of earnings. Service may be by certified mail, return receipt requested, by an authorized representative of the commissioner, by personal service as permitted by Rule 4 of the Maine Rules of Civil Procedure or as otherwise may be permitted by sections 492-A and 494. The department shall send a copy of the health insurance withholding order to the responsible parent at the responsible parent's most recent address of record.

16. Withholding orders combined. The department may combine a health insurance withholding order with a child support income withholding order issued under section 498-C.

**17. Rules.** The department shall adopt rules to implement and enforce the requirements of this section.

Sec. V-11. 19 MRSA §502, first ¶, as repealed and replaced by PL 1985, c. 652, §32, is amended to read:

The following exemptions shall apply to weekly earnings. An amount equal to 30 times the federal minimum wage, as prescribed by the United States Code, Title 29, Section 206(a)(1), shall be exempt from an order to withhold and deliver, garnishment, automatic withholding or any other proceeding under this chapter regarding weekly earnings. Except as otherwise provided in this section, any property otherwise exempt from trustee process, attachment and execution shall be exempt from an order to withhold and deliver, administrative seizure and disposition, and lien and foreclosure under this subchapter. The maximum part of the aggregate disposable earnings of a responsible parent for any workweek which that is subject to garnishment, pursuant to section 504 or 504-A, to enforce any decision entered pursuant to section 498, 498-A, 500 or 515, shall or income withholding may not exceed:

Sec. V-12. 19 MRSA §777-C is enacted to read:

# §777-C. Employment information

1. Employment information. Upon notice by the department, and except as provided in subsection 2, an employer doing business in the State shall report to the department the:

A. Hiring of a person who resides or works in this State to whom the employer anticipates paying earnings; and

B. Rehiring or return to work of any employee who was laid off, furloughed, separated, granted a leave without pay or terminated from employment.

**2. Exceptions.** An employer is not required to report the hiring of a person who:

A. Will be employed for less than one month's duration; or

B. Will have gross earnings of less than \$300 in every month.

The Commissioner of Human Services may adopt rules to establish additional exceptions if needed to reduce unnecessary or burdensome reporting.

3. W-4 form. An employer required to report under subsection 1 may report by mailing the employee's copy of the W-4 form, transmitting a facsimile thereof, sending magnetic tape in a compatible format or by other means as mutually agreed to by the employer and the department that will result in timely reporting.

**4. Report.** An employer shall submit a report within 7 days of the hiring, rehiring or return to work of the employee. The report shall contain:

A. The employee's name, address, social security number and date of birth; and

B. The employer's name, address and employment security reference number or unified business identifier number.

5. Retention of records. The department shall retain the information for a particular employee only if the department is responsible for establishing, enforcing or collecting a support obligation or debt of the employee. If the employee does not owe such an obligation or a debt, the department may not create a record regarding the employee and the information contained in the report must be destroyed promptly.

6. Penalties. An employer who knowingly fails to report as required under this section must be given a written warning for the first violation and is subject to a civil penalty of up to \$200 per month for each subsequent violation after the warning has been given. All violations within a single month are considered a single violation for purposes of assessing the penalty.

Sec. V-13. 22 MRSA §2761, sub-§4, as amended by PL 1987, c. 187, is further amended to read:

4. Illegitimate child. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, in the case of a child conceived and born out of wedlock, the name of the putative father shall may not be entered on the certificate without his written consent and that of the mother. The signature of the putative father on the written consent shall must be acknowledged before an official authorized to take oaths. The signature of the mother on her written consent shall must also be acknowledged before an official authorized to take oaths. If a determination of paternity has been made by a court of competent jurisdiction, then the name of the father as determined by the court shall must be entered on the birth certificate without the father's or the mother's consent. If the putative father executes an acknowledgement of paternity with the department and the putative father is either named in writing by the mother as the father or is presumed to be the father based on the results of blood or tissue-typing tests, the name of the father must be entered on the birth certificate without the father's or the mother's consent.

Sec. V-14. 29 MRSA §791 is enacted to read:

# §791. Family financial responsibility

1. Compliance with support orders. In addition to other qualifications and conditions established by this Title, the right of an individual to hold a motor vehicle operator's license or permit issued by the State is subject to the requirements of Title 19, section 306.

2. Certification of noncompliance. Upon receipt of a written certification from the Commissioner of Human Services as provided for in Title 19, section 306, subsection 7 that a support obligor who owns or operates a motor vehicle is not in compliance with a court order of support, the Secretary of State shall suspend the license and right to operate and obtain the license of the individual so certified. The Secretary of State may not reinstate an operator's license suspended for noncompliance with a court order of support until the Commissioner of Human Services issues a release that states the obligor is in compliance with a court order of support or the court orders reinstatement.

3. Notice of suspension. Upon suspending an individual's license, permit or privilege to operate under subsection 2, the Secretary of State must notify the individual of the suspension. A notice of suspension must

specify the reason and statutory grounds for the suspension and the effective date of the suspension and may include any other notices prescribed by the Secretary of State. The notice must inform the individual that in order to apply for reinstatement, the individual must obtain a release from the Department of Human Services. The notice must inform the individual that the individual may file a petition for judicial review of the notice of suspension in Superior Court within 30 days of receipt of the notice. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, Title 5, section 9052, subsection 1 does not apply to a notice of suspension issued under this section.

4. Temporary license. Upon being presented with a conditional release issued by the Commissioner of Human Services and at the request of an individual whose operator's license, permit or privilege to operate has been suspended under this section, the Secretary of State may issue the individual a temporary license valid for a period not to exceed 120 days.

5. Rules. The Secretary of State shall adopt rules to implement and enforce the requirements of this section.

6. Costs. The Department of Human Services shall indemnify the Secretary of State for legal expenses incurred in defending the Secretary of State's actions to comply with the requirements of this section.

7. Agreement. The Secretary of State and the Department of Human Services may enter into an agreement to carry out the requirements of this section.

Sec. V-15. Pilot program for enhanced support enforcement collections. The Commissioner of Human Services is directed to establish a pilot program for enhanced support enforcement collections utilizing a 3rd-party collection agent or agents. A reasonable number of delinquent cases must be selected for inclusion in this program. The commissioner shall present a report of the results of this program to the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs no later than February 1, 1994. The project is to be funded by an allocation from federal incentive funds.

Sec. X-2. 5 MRSA §4594-D, sub-§§7 and 9, as amended by PL 1991, c. 99, §26, are further amended to read:

7. Mandatory plan review; certification; inspection. Builders of the following newly constructed facilities must submit plans to the Office of the State Fire Marshal, which shall serve as the contractor for the commission for these purposes, to assure ensure that the plans meet the standards of construction required by subsection 3:

- A. Restaurants;
- B. Motels, hotels and inns;
- C. State, municipal and county buildings; and
- D. Schools, elementary and secondary.

Fees for reviews are established by the Office of the State Fire Marshal.

No building permit may be issued by the municipal authority having jurisdiction to issue these permits unless the Office of the State Fire Marshal approves the plans and certifies that the facility covered by the mandatory plan review meets the standards of construction required by this section; if, however, no decision is rendered within 2 weeks of submission to the Office of the State Fire Marshal, the builder may submit the building permit request directly to the municipality with an attestation that the plans meet the standards of construction.

If officials of the municipality in which the facility is constructed, renovated, remodeled or enlarged inspect buildings for compliance with construction standards, that inspection must include an inspection for compliance with the certified plans. The municipal officials shall require that the facility be inspected for compliance with construction standards before the municipal officials permit the facility to be occupied.

9. Waivers; variance. If the commission State Fire Marshal determines in cases covered by mandatory plan

review that compliance with this section and its rules is not technologically feasible or would result in excessive and unreasonable costs without any substantial benefit to persons with physical disability, it the State Fire Marshal may provide for modification of, or substitution for, these standards. In all petitions for variance or waiver, the burden of proof is on the party requesting a variance or waiver to justify its allowance.

Requests for waivers or variances for buildings covered by mandatory plan review are heard by a representative of the commission and a designee of the Office of the State Fire Marshal. A decision must be provided in writing to the party requesting the waiver or variance.

Sec. X-3. 5 MRSA §4594-D, sub-§10, as enacted by PL 1989, c. 795, is amended to read:

10. Appeals. Commission decisions Decisions of the State Fire Marshal on requests for waivers or variances in cases covered by mandatory plan review are subject to review in Superior Court upon petition of the aggrieved party within 30 days after the issuance of the decision for which review is sought. The court may enter an order enforcing, modifying or setting aside the decision of the commission State Fire Marshal, or it may remand the proceeding to the commission State Fire Marshal for such further action as the court may direct.

**Sec. X-4. 25 MRSA §2450,** as repealed and replaced by PL 1983, c. 232, §2, is amended to read:

#### §2450. Examinations by State Fire Marshal

The Commissioner of Public Safety shall <u>adopt</u>, in accordance with requirements of the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, Title 5, chapter 375, adopt a schedule of fees for the examination of all plans for construction, reconstruction or repairs submitted to the Office of the State Fire Marshal. No fee charged pursuant to this section may exceed \$55. A fee charged pursuant to this section may not exceed \$450. The fees shall must be credited to the State Fire Marshal to defray the expenses of that office. Any balance of the fees shall may not lapse, but shall must be carried forward as a continuing account to be expended for the same purpose in the following fiscal years.

#### PART Y

Sec. Y-1. Voluntary employee incentive programs. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 903, subsections 1 and 2, the Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services shall offer for use prior to July 1, 1995 special voluntary employee incentive programs, including a 50% workweek option, flexible position staffing and time off without pay. Employee participation in the voluntary incentive program is subject to the approval of the employee's appointing authority.

Sec. Y-2. Continuation of health insurance. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 285, subsection 7 and section 903, for state employees who apply prior to July 1, 1995 to participate in voluntary cost-saving programs, the State shall continue to pay health and dental insurance benefits based upon the scheduled workweek in effect prior to the participation in the voluntary program.

Sec. Y-3. Continuation of group life insurance. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 903; Title 5, section 18056, subsection 1, paragraph A; and the rules of the Maine State Retirement System, the life, accidental death and dismemberment, supplemental and dependent insurance amounts for state employees who apply prior to July 1, 1995 to participate in voluntary cost-savings programs are based upon the scheduled hours of the employees prior to the participation in voluntary programs.

Sec. Y-4. Provision for living stipend. If during the voluntary unpaid leave of absence a state employee's position is abolished and the employee has no "bumping rights" under the rules adopted pursuant to the Civil Service Law or bargaining agreements and the employee is determined ineligible for unemployment compensation under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 26, section 1192, subsection 5, the State shall provide a living stipend in an amount equal to the amount for which the employee would have qualified when the leave began if the employee is otherwise eligible for unemployment compensation subject to all other terms and provisions of Title 26, chapter 13.

Sec. Y-5. General Fund savings. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 1585, General Fund savings as a result of the voluntary employee incentive program may not be used to fund other state programs but must be held pending a report to be submitted by the State Budget Officer to the First and Second Regular Sessions of the 117th Legislature.

#### PART Z

Sec. Z-1. Mental health services plan. The Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation shall examine the feasibility of consolidating the Bangor Mental Health Institute and the Augusta Mental Health Institute. The department shall present an implementation plan to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources and the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs by January 1, 1994. The plan must recommend the location of the consolidated facility, specify the level of community-based development, including but not limited to private hospital development, needed in order to carry out the consolidation, include timelines for achieving the consolidation and address expected budget implications of the consolidation.

#### PART AA

Sec. AA-1. Reduction in work schedule for legislative employees in fiscal years 1993-94 and 1994-95. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the weekly work schedule for each state employee in the legislative branch is reduced by one hour for payrolls effective in fiscal year 1993-94 and until October 1, 1994 in fiscal year 1994-95. Supervisors are responsible for conferring with employees for the scheduling of the one-hour reduction, subject to operational needs of the department. Each employee must be given at least 14 days' notice of the change in that individual's schedule. Compensation for all legislative employees for the payrolls effective in fiscal year 1993-94 and until October 1, 1994 in fiscal year 1993-94 and until October 1, 1994 in fiscal year 1994-95 must be reduced in accordance with this section.

The reduction in work schedules required in this section does not affect state employee rights and benefits that are established in law and that are based on work schedules in effect prior to the effective date of this

Part. Rights and benefits must be determined as if the work schedules of employees had not been reduced.

Sec. AA-2. Salaries of Legislators. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, each Senator and member of the House of Representatives is entitled to \$7,125 in the 2nd year of the 116th legislative biennium beginning in January 1994 and \$9,975 in the first year of the 117th biennium beginning in December 1994. The salaries of the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the majority and minority leaders and the assistant majority and minority leaders of the Senate and the House of Representatives for the 2nd year of the 116th legislative biennium must be adjusted above the salary of \$7,125 and for the first year of the 117th legislative biennium must be adjusted above the salary of \$9,975 in accordance with the percentage adjustments contained in Title 3, section 2, except that the percentages must be calculated using the salary set by this Part.

Sec. AA-3. Salaries of Representatives of Indian tribes. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, the member of the Penobscot Indian Nation and the member of the Passamaquoddy Indian Tribe elected to represent their tribes at the Legislature are entitled to \$104.50 for each day's attendance during the Second Regular Session of the 116th Legislature beginning in January 1994 and the First Regular Session of the 117th Legislature beginning in December 1994.

Sec. AA-4. Transfer from legislative accounts. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, subsection 1585, or any other provision of law, in fiscal year 1992-93, \$600,000 may be transferred from the available balances in the legislative accounts to the Bureau of General Services, Capital Improvements - Construction and Repairs account, in the Department of Administrative and Financial Services for the purposes of making needed repairs to the Capitol Building. These funds must be alloted by financial order upon the recommendation of the State Budget Officer and approval of the Governor. These funds may not lapse but must be carried forward to be used for the purposes specified in this paragraph.

The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services, in conjunction with the State House and Capitol Park Commission, the Legislative Council and the Maine Historic Preservation Commission, shall work cooperatively to initiate plans to restore and properly maintain the State Capitol Building.

#### §2660-B. Definitions

As used in this subchapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

**1. Commission.** "Commission" means the Maine Public Drinking Water Commission.

2. Community water system. "Community water system" means a public water system that serves at least 15 service connections used by year-round residents or regularly serves at least 25 year-round residents.

3. Division. "Division" means the Division of Health Engineering within the Bureau of Health, Department of Human Services.

4. Fund. "Fund" means the Public Drinking Water Fund.

5. Noncommunity water system. "Noncommunity water system" means a public water system that is not a community water system. A noncommunity water system is either nontransient or transient, as follows.

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A. A nontransient, noncommunity water system serves at least 25 of the same persons for 6 months or more per year and may include, but is not limited to, a school, factory, industrial park or office building.

B. A transient, noncommunity water system serves at least 25 persons, but not necessarily the same persons, for at least 60 days per year and may include, but is not limited to, a highway rest stop, seasonal restaurant, seasonal motel, golf course, park or campground. A bottled water company is a transient, noncommunity water system.

6. Program. "Program" means the Maine Public Drinking Water Control Program.

7. Primacy. "Primacy" means the federally delegated primary enforcement authority to adopt, implement and enforce federally mandated drinking water standards promulgated pursuant to the federal Safe Drinking Water Act as amended.

#### §2660-C. Maine Public Drinking Water Commission

The Maine Public Drinking Water Commission as established by Title 5, section 12004-I, subsection 47-A, is created within the department.

**1. Membership.** The commission consists of the commissioner or the commissioner's designee and 8 other members appointed by the Governor in accordance with the following provisions.

A. Four of the members must represent the water purveying community and must be employed by public water systems. One of the 4 must be employed by a public water system serving a population of less than 500 people, one must be employed by a public water system serving a population of at least 500 but not more than 3,300 people, one must be employed by a public water system serving a population of at least 3,301 but not more than 10,000 people, and one must be employed by a public water system serving a population greater than 10,000 people.

B. Four of the members must represent the drinking water public. At least one of the 4 must be a user of a transient, noncommunity water system and at least one must be a user of a nontransient, noncommunity water system.

C. All members appointed by the Governor must have demonstrated interest, knowledge, experience and expertise regarding public drinking water concerns. The Governor shall seek to appoint members who, to the greatest extent possible, are qualified by interest, education, training or experience to provide, assess and evaluate scientific and tech-

nical information regarding public drinking water concerns, financial and staffing requirements and the adoption of policies, standards and rules.

D. The term of office for members appointed by the Governor is 4 years except that, of the original members appointed, 4 must be appointed for 2 years and 4 must be appointed for 4 years. The Governor shall make all original appointments within 60 days of the effective date of this section. Members may remain in office until their successors are appointed. A member may not serve more than 2 consecutive terms. If a vacancy occurs, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to fill the remaining portion of the unexpired term created by the vacancy.

2. Chair; vice-chair. At the first meeting of the commission, the members shall elect from among themselves a chair and a vice-chair. The chair and vice-chair serve for one-year terms. The chair and vice-chair may continue to hold those offices until their successors are elected. The chair calls meetings of the commission and presides over meetings. The vice-chair serves as the chair in the absence of the chair. The commissioner shall call the first meeting of the commission as soon as all initial appointments to the commission have been made.

3. Meetings. The commission shall hold at least 2 regular meetings each year and may hold additional regular meetings. Special meetings may be called by the chair, by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee or by at least 3 members of the commission. Five members constitute a quorum.

4. Duties. The commission shall:

A. Determine the proportion of program effort dedicated to each type of public water system served by the program;

B. Evaluate existing and projected program workloads;

C. Evaluate existing program resources and project future staffing and resource requirements;

D. Determine funding requirements necessary to meet projected workloads and staffing and resource requirements;

E. Determine an equitable program funding share for each type of public water system that reflects the level of program effort required for that public water system;

F. Determine fee formulas and collection and transfer schedules for each type of public water system;

G. Determine revenue levels to be retained by each type of public water system as reimbursement for

costs incurred in the collection and transfer of fees; and

H. Submit to the department annually by August 1st a report that must include, but is not limited to, a performance evaluation of the program and commission recommendations regarding, but not limited to, program operations, funding and staffing requirements, funding formulas and fee collection and transfer schedules.

5. Compensation. Members of the commission are entitled to reimbursement by the department for expenses as authorized by Title 5, chapter 379.

# §2660-D. Annual work plan on primacy

Annually, by January 1st, the department shall submit to the commission a work plan and budget, listing all funding sources including but not limited to appropriations from the General Fund and allocations from the United States Environmental Protection Agency that are used for the purpose of complying with federal requirements for maintaining primacy.

# §2660-E. Fees related to primacy

In addition to fees authorized under section 9, the commissioner may impose a fee upon each public water system in the State for the purpose of retaining primacy.

1. Rules. The department shall establish fee formulas by rules adopted in accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act. The department must consult with and consider the advice of the commission in preparing the rules. Proposed rules issued by the department under this section must include the fee formulas and collection and transfer schedules developed by the commission. Fee formulas adopted under this section must be equitable. Fees may be based on, but are not limited to, the population served, service connections, volume of water pumped or available seats, campsites, rooms or lots, and may include fixed or graduated fee formulas or combinations of the fee formulas. Fees may be no less than \$50 per year per public water system and no more than \$30,000 per year per public water system.

2. Collection and disposition of fees. Fees adopted under this section cover the period beginning July 1, 1993 and must be collected by each public water system in monthly, quarterly or annual increments. Fees collected by public water systems under this section are state fees and must be enumerated by the public water systems separately from all other charges. The department shall establish schedules for the collection and transfer of fees to the State with the advice of the commission. With the advice of the commission, the department shall establish a reasonable percentage of the fees, not to exceed 2%, that may be retained by each public water system as reimbursement for expenses incurred in the collection of the fees. 3. Suspension and reinstatement of fees. Fees imposed under this section are suspended on the first day of the calendar quarter following any calendar quarter in which primacy is withdrawn by the Federal Government. Fees suspended under this subsection may be reinstated on the first day of the calendar quarter following the quarter in which the State regains primacy.

## §2660-F. Public Drinking Water Fund

The Public Drinking Water Fund is established as an interest-bearing dedicated revenue account. All interest earned by the account becomes part of the fund. All fees collected by the department under this subchapter must be deposited into the fund. Any balance remaining in the fund at the end of the fiscal year does not lapse but is carried forward into subsequent fiscal years. The department may use the fund only to support the program, including the cost of salaries, benefits, travel, capital equipment and other allowable expenses incurred by the program.

# §2660-G. Enforcement

This subchapter must be enforced by the department in accordance with section 2617.

#### §2660-H. Repeal

This subchapter is repealed on June 30, 1997.

A. The assessment shall <u>must</u> be completed prior to admission or, if necessary for reasons of the person's health or safety, as soon after admission as possible.

B. The department shall determine whether the services provided by the facility are medically <u>and</u> <u>socially</u> necessary and appropriate for the applicant and, if not, what other services, such as home and community-based services, would <u>be</u> more <del>appropriately address the applicant's medical needs</del> clinically appropriate and cost effective.

C. The department shall inform both the applicant and the administrator of the nursing home <u>facility</u> of the department's determination of the services needed by the applicant <u>and shall provide</u> information and assistance to the applicant in accordance with subsection 1-A.

D. Until such time as the applicant becomes financially eligible to receive Medicaid benefits, the department's determination shall be is advisory only. If the advisory determination is that the applicant is not medically eligible for Medicaid reimbursement for nursing facility services, the applicant must be advised that the applicant may be required to leave the nursing facility when the applicant no longer has the resources to pay for the services and an appropriate placement has been identified.

E. The department shall perform a reassessment of the individual's medical needs when the individual becomes financially eligible for Medicaid benefits.

(1) If the individual, at both the admission assessment and any reassessment within 180 days of admission, is determined not to be medically eligible for the services provided by the nursing home facility, and is determined not to be medically eligible at the time of the determination of financial eligibility, the nursing home shall be facility is responsible for providing services at no cost to the individual until such time as a placement at the appropriate level of care becomes avail-

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able. After a placement becomes available at an appropriate level of care, the nursing home facility may resume billing the individual for the cost of services.

(2) If the individual is initially assessed as needing the nursing home's facility's services, but reassessed as not needing them at the time the individual is found financially eligible, then Medicaid shall reimburse the nursing home facility for services it provides to the individual in accordance with the Maine Medical Assistance Manual, chapter II, section 50.

F. Prior to performing assessments under this section, the department shall develop and disseminate to all nursing homes facilities and the public the specific standards the department will use to determine the medical eligibility of an applicant for admission to the nursing home facility. A copy of the standards shall must be provided to each person for whom an assessment is conducted.

G. A determination of medical eligibility under this section is final agency action for purposes of the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, Title 5, chapter 375.

1-A. Information and assistance. The department may provide the services described in this section directly or through its designee. If the department chooses a designee to carry out assessments under this section, it shall ensure that the designee does not have a pecuniary interest in the outcome of the assessment.

In designing and phasing in the preadmission assessment program under this section, the department shall collaborate with interested parties including but not limited to consumers, nursing facility operators, hospital operators and home and community-based care providers.

By July 1, 1994, the Department of Human Services shall implement this program statewide. By February 1, 1994, the department shall submit a progress report to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources regarding the program. The report must include, but is not limited to, the number of applicants diverted from nursing facilities and the resulting cost savings; the relative merits of providing services directly by the department, through a request-for-proposal system or through negotiated agreements with existing services providers; the experience regarding case management along with the department's recommendations as to whether case management should be provided by the department, by contract agencies, by agencies that provide no other services or by some combination of those; the number of people who opt for family-based care and the degree to which family members serve as caretakers; and the degree to which preadmission assessments affect the decisions of applicants with private resources.

Sec. FF-14. Development of communitybased opportunities. Sec. FF-15. Medical admission criteria. By October 1, 1993, the Department of Human Services shall amend the medical criteria for admission to a nursing facility. The criteria must:

1. Target nursing facility admissions to applicants who can not be served in less restrictive settings; and

2. Result in applicants being referred to services that are cost-effective and clinically appropriate.

Sec. FF-16. Development of assisted living options. By October 1, 1993, the Department of Human Services shall prepare a plan for the development of assisted living facilities for Medicaid recipients and other people with low income. By October 1, 1993, the department shall submit for federal approval an amendment to the home and community-based waiver program for the elderly that includes assisted living as a service category under that waiver program. By January 1, 1994,

the department shall submit to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources the plan prepared under this section and a progress report regarding federal approval of the proposed amendment to the waiver program.

Sec. FF-17. Respite care. The Department of Human Services shall collect data regarding the degree to which respite care is used by people receiving longterm care services and shall assess the degree to which more respite care services are needed. If the department finds that more respite care services should be developed, it shall consider options for development, including but not limited to the delivery of respite care in nursing facilities. The department shall submit its findings and recommendations to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources by January 1, 1994.

Sec. FF-18. Reduction of beds. The Department of Human Services shall examine options for reducing permanently the number of licensed nursing facility beds in the State. Options must be evaluated for cost-effectiveness, the level of disruption likely to be experienced by consumers and providers and consistency with the State's overall long-term care plans. In considering options, the department shall consult with consumers, providers and other interested parties. By January 1, 1994, the department shall submit its findings and recommendations to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources and the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs. The report must include the number of beds the department recommends removing permanently from the long-term care system, the mechanisms for removing them, the criteria for removing them and a schedule for implementation of the plan that includes an assessment of the level of home and community-based services that would need to be developed in the same time frame.

**Sec. FF-19. Effective date.** Sections 10 and 11 of this Part take effect July 1, 1994.

## PART GG

Sec. GG-1. Adjustments to allocation. Notwithstanding any provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes, allocations made in this Act of Federal Block Grant funds, the Public Utilities Commission Regulatory Fund, the Public Utilities Commission Reimbursement Fund, the Intergovernmental Telecommunications Fund, the Ground Water Oil Clean-up Fund, the Maine Coastal and Inland Surface Oil Clean-up Fund, the Maine Hazardous Waste Fund and the Radioactive Waste Evaluation Fund may be increased or adjusted by the State Budget Officer with the approval of the Governor to specifically cover those adjustments determined to be necessary under any salary plan approved by the Legislature and those reclassifications or range changes that have been approved by the Department of Administrative and Financial Services and submitted for legislative review prior to the effective date of this Act.

Sec. GG-2. Allocation of the Public Utilities Commission Regulatory Fund. Income of the Public Utilities Commission Regulatory Fund for the next 2 fiscal years, from July 1, 1993 to June 30, 1994 and from July 1, 1994 to June 30, 1995, must be segregated, apportioned and disbursed as designated in this Act.

Sec. GG-3. Additional funds. Any additional block grant funds that become available due to the implementation of the block grants and the possible overlapping of other grants may be carried forward for future allocation by the Legislature or may be used to offset any possible reductions in the block grants.

Sec. GG-4. Encumbered balances at year end. At the end of each fiscal year, all encumbered balances of Federal Block Grant funds may not be carried more than once, except that encumbered balances in the Community Development Block Grant may be carried twice and encumbered balances of grant awards for capital construction projects may carry until the completion of the project, provided that the construction was started prior to the end of the year for which the allocation was made.

Sec. GG-5. Exclusion. Exclusive of any other provisions of this Act, up to \$750,000 of the allocation to the Intergovernmental Telecommunications Fund may be expended in each fiscal year of the biennium for Capital Expenditures, not including capital items obtained through lease-purchase agreements or other applicable laws. It is the intent of the Legislature that capital items purchased through the Intergovernmental Telecommunications Fund may not be given, transferred, sold or otherwise conveyed to any other department, agency or account unless the transaction has received specific prior legislative authorization through the budgetary process.

Sec. GG-6. Legislative intent. It is the intent of the Legislature that all departments and agencies be assessed telecommunication charges on the basis of uniform billing procedures and in direct proportion to the services received by those departments and agencies. However, during the 1994-95 biennium, a department or agency may not be required to use resources in excess of levels that have historically been found to be necessary and available to it in order to maintain the current level of service to satisfy those telecommunication charges.

Sec. HH-1. Sanford boarding home beds. The Department of Human Services is authorized to establish a total of 16 boarding home beds in Sanford for fiscal years 1993-94 and 1994-95 to the extent funds are available in the state supplement to the federal supplemental security income program.

1-E. Transfer from Rainy Day Fund; local disaster relief. Notwithstanding subsection 2 and section 1585, an amount not to exceed \$600,000 in fiscal year 1993-94 may be transferred from the available balance in the Rainy Day Fund to the "Administration - Maine Emergency Management Agency" program in the Department of Defense and Veterans' Services to be made available by financial order upon the recommendation of the State Budget Officer and approval of the Governor to be used for the reimbursement of the State's matching share of local disaster relief.

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consumption of alcohol and other drugs and generate new funding for alcohol and other drug services.

# SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICES COMMISSION

# §20065. Membership

**1. Members; appointment.** The Substance Abuse Services Commission, as established by section 12004-G, subsection 13-C, consists of 17 members.

2. Qualifications. To be qualified to serve, members must have education, training, experience, knowledge, expertise and interest in drug abuse prevention and training. Members must reflect experiential diversity and concern for drug abuse prevention and treatment in the State. Members must have an unselfish and dedicated personal interest demonstrated by active participation in drug abuse programs such as prevention, treatment, rehabilitation, training or research in drug abuse and alcohol abuse.

3. Members; representation. The commission consists of the following members:

A. One member of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate and one member of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;

B. One physician experienced in the treatment of substance abuse, appointed by the Governor;

C. One public school superintendent who has experience with school-based substance abuse prevention and education programs, appointed by the Governor;

D. One elementary school educator, appointed by the Governor;

E. One representative from nominations by the National Council on Alcoholism in Maine, Incorporated, appointed by the Governor;

F. One attorney who represents clients involved with the substance abuse system, appointed by the Governor;

G. One educator involved in postsecondary substance abuse education, appointed by the Governor; I. One private sector employer familiar with substance abuse employee assistance programs, appointed by the Governor; and

J. Five members of the public, appointed by the Governor. In appointing these 5 members, the Governor shall select members from outstanding people in the following areas:

(1) Drug abuse prevention;

(2) Drug abuse treatment;

(3) Education;

(4) Employers; and

(5) Persons affected by or recovering from alcoholism, chronic intoxication, drug abuse or drug dependency, evidenced by a minimum of 3 years of sobriety or abstention from drug abuse.

4. Term; vacancies. Terms of appointment begin and expire on June 1st. A vacancy in the commission does not affect the commission's powers, but must be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.

A member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring before the expiration of the term for which the member's predecessor was appointed may be appointed only for the remainder of that term.

> A. The terms of the 8 public members are staggered. Of the initial appointees, 3 are appointed for terms of 3 years, 3 for terms of 2 years and 2 for terms of one year. Thereafter, all appointments are for terms of 3 years, except that a member appointed to fill a vacancy in an unexpired term serves only for the remainder of that term. Members hold office until the appointment and confirmation of their successors. A public member may not be appointed for more than 2 consecutive, 3-year terms.

> B. Members who are members of the Legislature and appointed by the President of the Senate or the Speaker of the House of Representatives serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority.

> C. Members who are commissioners of departments serve for the duration of their tenure as commissioners. A member who serves as a designee of a commissioner serves at the pleasure of that commissioner.

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5. Reappointment; termination. Members may be appointed for 2 consecutive terms only and may serve after the expiration of their terms until their successors have been appointed and qualified and have taken office. The appointing authority may terminate the appointment of a member for good and just cause and the appointing authority shall communicate the reason for the termination to the member terminated. The appointment of a member of the commission is terminated if a member is absent from 3 consecutive meetings without a good and just cause that is communicated to the chair of the commission.

6. Officers. The Governor shall designate one member to chair the commission. The commission may elect other officers from its members as it considers appropriate.

**7.** Subcommittees. The commission may appoint from its membership subcommittees relating to particular problem areas or other matters, provided that the commission functions as an integrated committee.

**8.** Administrative and financial assistance. The office shall provide the commission administrative or financial assistance that from time to time may be reasonably required to carry out its activities. Reasonable and proper expenses of the commission must be borne by the office from available state or federal funds.

# §20066. Meetings; compensation; quorum

**1. Calling meetings.** The commission shall meet at the call of the chair or at the call of at least 1/4 of the members appointed and currently holding office.

2. Frequency of meetings. The commission shall meet at least 12 times a year and at least once a month.

3. Minutes. The commission shall keep minutes of all meetings, including a list of people in attendance. The commission shall immediately send copies of the minutes to the Governor and the leadership of the Legislature, who shall provide for their appropriate distribution and retention in a place of safekeeping.

4. Compensation. Members of the commission are entitled to compensation under chapter 379.

5. Quorum; council action. A majority of the commission members constitutes a quorum for the purpose of conducting the business and exercising all the powers of the commission. A vote of a majority of the members present is sufficient for all actions of the commission.

## §20067. Duties of the commission

The commission, in cooperation with the office, has the following duties.

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**1.** Oversee office. The commission shall oversee the office in the development and implementation of significant policy matters relating to substance abuse.

2. Advise, consult and assist. The commission shall advise, consult and assist the Governor, the executive and legislative branches of State Government and the Judicial Council with activities of State Government related to drug abuse prevention, including alcoholism and intoxication.

3. Serve as advocate; review and evaluate; inform the public. The commission shall serve as an advocate on alcoholism and drug abuse prevention, promoting and assisting activities designed to meet the problems of drug abuse and drug dependence at the national and state levels. With the support of the office, the commission shall review and evaluate on a continuing basis state and federal policies and programs relating to drug abuse and other activities conducted or assisted by state departments or agencies that affect persons who abuse or are dependent on drugs. In cooperation with the office, the commission shall keep the public informed by collecting and disseminating information, by conducting or commissioning studies and publishing the results of those studies, by issuing publications and reports and by providing public forums, including conferences and workshops.

Sec. LL-13. 34-B MRSA §1214, sub-§3, as repealed and replaced by PL 1993, c. 349, §68, is amended to read:

3. Membership. The council is composed of -4.5 members: the Commissioner of Corrections; the Commissioner of Education; the Commissioner of Human Services; and the Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation; and the Director of the Office of Substance Abuse.

Sec. LL-14. Consolidation of substance abuse services programs. All substance abuse services and programs currently in existence throughout State Government, including but not limited to programs implemented by the Department of Education, the Department of Corrections and the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation are consolidated within the Office of Substance Abuse in accordance with the plan required in section 15.

Sec. LL-15. Development of consolidation plan. The Office of Substance Abuse shall review the substance abuse programs existing in State Government and develop a proposal to implement the consolidation of these programs within the Office of Substance Abuse. The Office of Substance Abuse shall develop a consolidation plan that provides quality services in an efficient, cost-effective manner and that continues current educational efforts and provides an appropriate balance between prevention and treatment services. In developing this plan, the Office of Substance Abuse shall: 1. Identify unnecessary duplication of services;

2. Identify essential services that are not currently being provided;

3. Review the levels of funding and staffing in the substance abuse programs administered by other agencies; and

4. Propose the levels of funding and staffing that will be required under the consolidation plan.

Sec. LL-16. Review of federal funding. In developing the consolidation plan, the Office of Substance Abuse shall review the programs, agencies and departments that currently receive federal funds to purchase or provide substance abuse services and determine which programs and funding could be transferred to the Office of Substance Abuse as part of the consolidation plan. In reviewing federal funding, the Office of Substance Abuse shall examine whether restrictions on a transfer of funding exist and the legal and funding ramifications of such a transfer, and shall consider the option of providing services to those programs, agencies and departments through interdepartmental agreements or other mechanisms.

**Sec. LL-17. Report.** The Office of Substance Abuse shall submit its proposal, along with any necessary implementing legislation, to the Second Regular Session of the 116th Legislature no later than December 30, 1993. The plan must address specific organizational structures and changes in staff positions and funding.

Sec. LL-18. Transition. Employees of the former Division of Alcohol and Drug Educational Services within the Department of Education whose positions are transferred to the Office of Substance Abuse under this Act retain their positions within the Office of Substance Abuse and their employee rights, privileges and benefits, including sick leave and vacation. All personnel transferred to the Office of Substance Abuse retain all applicable seniority rights and privileges with regard to employment in the Department of Education subject to agreement by the parties in collective bargaining. The Bureau of Human Resources within the Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall assist with the orderly implementation of this section.

Sec. LL-19. Policy continuity. It is the responsibility of the Office of Substance Abuse to ensure the continuity of the programs and policies transferred to it from the Department of Education by this Act. In order to fulfill that responsibility, the Office of Substance Abuse shall:

1. Establish a separate division for substance abuse prevention and education to oversee the transferred programs and policies; 2. Enter into a memorandum of agreement with the Department of Education establishing a plan, not inconsistent with this Act, that specifies how continuity of services and policy initiatives will be maintained and identifies how program and staff resources will be shared;

3. Utilize the Interdepartmental Council, established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 34-B, section 1214, as a mechanism to identify ongoing policy and service issues or problems and to resolve interdepartmental disputes; and

4. Adopt policies to ensure that for fiscal year 1993-94 and for fiscal year 1994-95 the percentage of allocation of expenditures for prevention activities, education activities and treatment activities is maintained at the same level as in fiscal year 1992-93.

The Office of Substance Abuse shall report to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources by March 1, 1994 concerning the implementation of this section.

1. Prepared food. Every person in the business of selling prepared food in establishments that are licensed pursuant to Title 28-A, chapter 43 for on-premises consumption of liquor is subject to a tax of 7% of the gross receipts of the business from the sales of prepared food.

2. Nursing home care. Every person licensed by the State as a "nursing home" within the meaning of Title 22, section 1812-A is subject to a tax of 7% of the gross receipts of the business from the provision of nursing home patient care including all charges made by the business upon or with respect to patients receiving nursing home care.

#### §2823. Administration

Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, this chapter must be administered in the same manner as Part 3 is administered exclusive of Title 30-A, section 5681. The tax imposed under this chapter is in lieu of a tax under Part 3 that would otherwise apply to the sale of the items or services from which the gross receipts arise. Because the tax assessed by this chapter is upon the person selling the item or service rather than the consumer, Part 3 provisions that are in conflict do not apply. Gross receipts arising from activities excluded from tax under Part 3 are not subject to the tax imposed by this chapter. Exemptions provided in Part 3 that apply to a sale from which taxable gross receipts arise are exemptions for purposes of computing gross receipts except for exemptions pursuant to section 1760, subsection 6, paragraph B and subsection 18 relating to nursing home care. Gross receipts tax liabilities are enforced as trust fund liabilities.

# §2824. Construction

If, for any reason, the tax assessed pursuant to this chapter is determined to be invalid, any tax imposed pursuant to Part 3 in lieu of which a tax under this chapter was imposed is effective as of the date of invalidity of this tax.

# §2825. Report

Nursing home care businesses subject to the tax imposed by this chapter must provide annually, no later than January 30th, a statement to each person paying for nursing home care during the previous calendar year. The statement must show the total gross receipts tax arising from payments by the payor.

2. Income from sale of food requirement. At least a minimum amount of the gross annual income must be from the sale of food for each Class A restaurant or <u>Class A restaurant/lounge</u>. The income from sale of food requirement is based on the population of the municipality in which the Class A restaurant or <u>Class A restaurant/lounge</u> is located. For purposes of this section, "yearround" means operated for more than 6 months in a year.

A. In municipalities having a population of more than 50,000 persons:

(1) Year-round Class A restaurants or Class <u>A restaurant/lounges</u> must have a minimum

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gross annual income of \$50,000 per year from the sale of food to the public on their premises; and

(2) Part-time Class A restaurants or Class A restaurant/lounges must have a minimum gross annual income of:

(a) Thirty thousand dollars from the sale of food to the public on their premises as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 6 consecutive months if the Class A restaurant or Class A restaurant/lounge operates for more than 3 months but no more than 6 months in a year; and

(b) Twenty thousand dollars from the sale of food to the public on their premises as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 3 consecutive months if the Class A restaurant or Class A restaurant/lounge operates for no more than 3 months in any year;

B. In municipalities having a population of more than 30,000 but not more than 50,000 persons:

(1) Year-round Class A restaurants or Class A restaurant/lounges must have a minimum gross annual income of \$40,000 per year from the sale of food to the public on their premises; and

(2) Part-time Class A restaurants or Class A restaurant/lounges must have a minimum gross annual income of:

(a) Twenty-five thousand dollars from the sale of food to the public on their premises as a requirement for a parttime license not in excess of 6 consecutive months if the Class A restaurant or Class A restaurant/lounge operates for more than 3 months and no more than 6 months in a year; and

(b) Twenty thousand dollars from the sale of food to the public on their premises as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 3 consecutive months if the Class A restaurant or Class A restaurant/lounge operates for no more than 3 months in a year;

C. In municipalities having a population of more than 20,000, but not more than 30,000 persons:

(1) Year-round Class A restaurants or Class <u>A restaurant/lounges</u> must have a minimum gross annual income of \$30,000 per year from the sale of food to the public on their premises; and

(2) Part-time Class A restaurants or Class A restaurant/lounges must have a minimum gross annual income of \$20,000 from the sale of food to the public on their premises as a requirement for a part-time license, not in excess of 6 consecutive months if the Class A restaurant or Class A restaurant/lounge operates for more than 3 months and no more than 6 months in a year; and

D. In municipalities having a population of not more than 20,000 persons:

(1) Year-round Class A restaurants or Class A restaurant/lounges must have a minimum gross annual income of \$20,000 per year in sale of food to the public on their premises; and

(2) Part-time Class A restaurants or Class <u>A restaurant/lounges</u> must have a minimum gross annual income of \$15,000 from the sale of food to the public on their premises as a requirement for a part-time license, not in excess of 6 consecutive months if the Class <u>A restaurant or Class A restaurant/lounge</u> operates for no more than 6 months in a year.

**3. Bureau determines applicant would probably qualify.** The commission bureau may issue the license if it determines that the applicant would probably qualify.

4. Licensee for renewal must show proof of meeting income requirement. The commission bureau may not renew any license for the sale of liquor under this subsection unless the licensee furnishes the commission bureau with proof that the previous year's business conformed to the income requirement of this subsection.

5. Class A restaurant/lounges; minors. Minors are not permitted to remain on the premises of Class A restaurant/lounges after 9:00 p.m. except when:

A. The minor is accompanied by a parent, legal guardian or custodian as defined in Title 22, section 4002; or

B. The licensee does not permit consumption of liquor on the premises for a specific period of time or event.

Sec. ZZ-19. 28-A MRSA §1075, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 45, Pt. A, §4, is amended to read:

#### §1075. Auxiliary licenses at ski areas

A. "Premises," as used in this section, means the premises where the qualified catering service is selling and serving liquor, either its principal place of business or the premises where the event being catered is held.

2. Compliance with local option decisions. The commission bureau may license only those qualified catering services whose principal place of business is located in municipalities which that have previously voted affirmatively on questions pertaining to on-premise sales provided in chapter 5.

A. Every event catered by the qualified catering service must also be located in a municipality which that has previously voted affirmatively on questions pertaining to on-premise sales provided in chapter 5.

3. Income from sale of food requirement. At least a minimum amount of gross annual income must be from the sale of food for each qualified catering service. The income from sale of food requirement shall be is based on the population of the municipality in which the qualified catering service is located. For purposes of this section, "year-round" means operated for more than 6 months in a year.

A. In municipalities having a population of over 50,000 persons:

(1) Year-round qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of \$50,000 a year from the sale of food to the public; and

(2) Part-time qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of:

(a) Thirty thousand dollars from the sale of food to the public as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 6 consecutive months if the catering service operates for more than 3 months but no more than 6 months in a year; and

(b) Twenty thousand dollars from the sale of food to the public as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 3 consecutive months if the catering service operates for no more than 3 months in a year.

B. In municipalities having a population of 30,001 to 50,000 persons:

(1) Year-round qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of \$40,000 a year from the sale of food to the public; and

(2) Part-time qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of:

(a) Twenty-five thousand dollars from the sale of food to the public as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 6 consecutive months if the catering service operates for more than 3 months but no more than 6 months in a year; and

(b) Twenty thousand dollars from the sale of food to the public as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 3 consecutive months if the catering service operates for no more than 3 months in a year.

C. In municipalities having a population of 20,001 to 30,000 persons:

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(1) Year-round qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of \$30,000 a year from the sale of food to the public; and

(2) Part-time qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of \$20,000 from the sale of food to the public as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 6 consecutive months if the catering service operates for more than 3 months but no more than 6 months in a year.

D. In municipalities having a population of 7,501 to 20,000 persons:

(1) Year-round qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of \$15,000 a year from the sale of food to the public; and

(2) Part-time qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of \$10,000 from the sale of food to the public as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 6 consecutive months if the catering service operates for no more than 6 months in a year.

E. In municipalities having a population of 7,500 persons or less:

(1) Year-round qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of \$5,000 a year from the sale of food to the public; and

(2) Part-time qualified catering services must have a minimum gross income of \$2,500 from the sale of food to the public as a requirement for a part-time license not in excess of 6 consecutive months if the catering service operates for no more than 6 months in a year.

**4. Bureau determines applicant would probably qualify.** The commission <u>bureau</u> may issue the license if it determines that the applicant for a new license would probably qualify.

5. Licensee for renewal must show proof of meeting income requirement. The commission <u>bureau</u> may not renew any license for the sale of liquor under this section unless the licensee furnishes the commission <u>bureau</u> with proof that the previous year's business conformed to the income requirements of this section.

6. Income from vending machines not included. The income from the sale of food placed in vending ma-

chines must not be included in the minimum dollar requirements of this section.

7. Provision of liquor at places other than principal place of business. Licensed qualified catering services which that would like to provide the service of liquor at locations other than their principal places of business shall file an application with the commission bureau at least 24 hours in advance of any function or event at which liquor is to be sold or served. Application must be made on a form provided by the commission bureau and must contain the following:

A. Date, time and approximate duration;

B. Location;

C. Name and address of the person or persons, firm or corporation making arrangements;

D. Approval by the municipal officers or a municipal official designated by the municipal officers of the municipality in which the catered function or event is to be held, which, notwithstanding the provisions of section 653, may be granted without public notice; and

E. Any other information the commission <u>bureau</u> considers necessary.

8. Ruling on application. The commission bureau shall approve or deny the application to provide service of liquor at a location other than the principal place of business, and shall immediately notify the applicant of its decision.

9. No additional fee. The commission <u>bureau</u> may not charge a fee for provision of the service of liquor at locations other than the principal place of business in addition to the license fee paid by the qualified catering service.

Sec. ZZ-21. Transfer of functions of liquor licensing and taxation. The liquor licensing and taxation functions of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations in the Department of Administrative and Financial Services are transferred to and merged with the Bureau of Liquor Enforcement in the Department of Public Safety on the effective date of this Part.

Sec. ZZ-22. Statutory provisions not impaired. All references in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 28-A to the functions performed by the Division of Liquor Licensing and the taxation division in the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations in the Department of Administrative and Financial Services are deemed to refer to functions of the Bureau of Liquor Enforcement in the Department of Public Safety. To the extent necessary for the Bureau of Liquor Enforcement to perform the duties of the transferred functions, references in Title 28-A to the "commission" or the State Liquor Commission are deemed to refer to the Bureau of Liquor Enforcement. It is the express intent of the Legislature that all provisions of Title 28-A remain fully enforceable and, in order to effectuate this intent, the Commissioner of Public Safety or officials designated by the commissioner may enforce any provision of Title 28-A.

Sec. ZZ-23. Bureau of Liquor Enforcement; transition. All duties and responsibilities of the Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services, with respect to liquor licensing and taxation functions in the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations, become the duties and responsibilities of the Commissioner of Public Safety on the effective date of this Part. The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services and the Commissioner of Public Safety shall submit to the Legislature by September 1, 1993 specific language detailing all transferred functions and responsibilities including a revised budget for fiscal years 1993-94 and 1994-95, commencing July 1, 1993. The report must include recommended statutory changes.

In addition, the following provisions apply to the transfer of liquor licensing and taxation functions from the Department of Administrative and Financial Services to the Department of Public Safety.

1. Notwithstanding the provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, all accrued expenditures, assets, liabilities, balances of appropriations, allocations, transfers, revenues or other available funds in an account or subdivision of an account of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations relating to liquor licensing and taxation functions must be transferred to the proper accounts by the State Controller upon the request of the State Budget Officer and with the approval of the Governor.

2. All agreements, leases, contracts or licenses issued under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 28-A relating to the liquor licensing and taxation functions of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations prior to the effective date of this Part continue to be valid under the terms of issuance until expiration or until rescinded, amended or revoked. All liquor license appeals after July 1, 1993 must be heard by the Hearing Officer of the Bureau of Liquor Enforcement. The Hearing Officer of the Bureau of Liquor Enforcement must be appointed by the Commissioner of Public Safety.

3. All rules adopted under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 28-A relating to liquor licensing and taxation functions of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations prior to the effective date of this Part must be administered by the Department of Public Safety and continue in effect until rescinded or amended by the Department of Public Safety or overturned by a court of law.

## **CHAPTER 410**

#### **PUBLIC LAWS, FIRST REGULAR SESSION - 1993**

4. Employees of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations who are transferred to the Department of Public Safety pursuant to this Part are subject to the provisions of this subsection.

> A. The employees retain their accrued fringe benefits, including vacation and sick leave, health and life insurance and retirement benefits.

> B. The employees who are members of collective bargaining units on the effective date of this Part remain as members in their respective bargaining units and retain all rights, privileges and benefits provided by their collective bargaining agreements with respect to state service while employed with the Department of Administrative and Financial Services.

> C. The employees who are members of collective bargaining units may remain as members of the Maine State Retirement System.

D. The Bureau of Human Resources shall assist the Department of Administrative and Financial Services and the Department of Public Safety with the orderly implementation of these provisions.

Sec. AAA-1. 22 MRSA §4301, sub-§7, as amended by PL 1991, c. 622, Pt. M, §21, is further amended to read:

7. Income. "Income" means any form of income in cash or in kind received by the household, including net remuneration for services performed, cash received on either secured or unsecured credit, any payments received as an annuity, retirement or disability benefits, veterans' pensions, workers' compensation, unemployment benefits, benefits under any state or federal categorical assistance program, supplemental security income, social security and any other payments from governmental sources, unless specifically prohibited by any law or regulation, court ordered support payments, income from pension or trust funds and household income from any other source, including relatives or unrelated household members.

The following items are not available within the meaning of this subsection and subsection 10:

A. Real or personal income-producing property, tools of trade, governmental entitlement specifically treated as exempt assets by state or federal law;

B. Actual work-related expenses, whether itemized or by standard deduction, such as taxes, retirement fund contributions, union dues, transportation costs to and from work, special equipment costs and child care expenses; or

C. Earned income of children below the age of 18 years who are full-time students and who are not working full time.

In determining need, the period of time used as a basis for the calculation is a the 30-day period commencing on the date of the application. This prospective calculation does not disqualify an applicant who has exhausted income to purchase basic necessities if that income does not exceed the income standards established by the municipality. Notwithstanding this prospective calculation, if an any applicant or recipient receives a lump sum payment after an initial application prior to applying for assistance, that payment must be prorated over future months. The period of proration is determined by disregarding any portion of the lump sum payment that the applicant or recipient has spent to purchase basic necessities, including but not limited to: all basic necessities provided by general assistance; reasonable payment of funeral or burial expenses for a family member; reasonable travel costs related to the illness or death of a family member; repair or replacement of essentials lost due to fire, flood or other natural disaster; repair or purchase

of a motor vehicle essential for employment, education, training or other day-to-day living necessities; and payment of bills earmarked for the purpose for which the lump sum is paid. All income received by the household between the receipt of the lump sum payment and the application for assistance is added to the remainder of the lump sum. The period of proration is then determined by dividing the remainder of the lump sum payment by the maximum monthly amount of assistance that the household may receive aggregate maximum level of assistance designated under section 4305. That dividend represents the period of proration determined by the administrator to commence on the date of receipt of the lump sum payment. The prorated sum for each month must be considered available to the household for 12 months from the date of application or during the period of proration, whichever is less, except that an applicant may not be considered ineligible to receive emergency assistance under section 4308, subsection 2, or under section 4310 during the period of proration. The lump sum provisions of this subsection apply only to applicants or recipients who have received prior notice of the provisions.

Sec. AAA-2. 22 MRSA §4305, sub-§3-A, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 489, §§3 and 14, is amended to read:

3-A. Maximum levels of assistance. Municipalities may establish maximum levels of assistance by ordinance. In order to receive assistance from any municipality, the applicant or a duly authorized representative must make file a written application to with the overseer, except as provided in section 4304, subsection 3, and except that in an emergency the application may be made verbally and assistance shall be granted temporarily. Further assistance shall be granted upon completion of a written application and determination of eligibility.

1. Initial and subsequent applications. Any Except as provided in section 4316-A, subsection 1-A, a person who makes an application for assistance, who has not applied for assistance in that or any other municipality during the previous 12 months, must have that person's eligibility determined solely on the basis of need. In determining an applicant's eligibility on an initial application, a municipality may not require performance of workfare except as provided in section 4316-A. All subsequent applications within 12 months in that municipality must be considered in accordance with this chapter and the municipal ordinance. In addition, when a person applies for assistance in any municipality, that person-may not be considered an initial applicant in any other municipality for a period of 6 months from the date of the initial application. Any application filed within 12 months in the municipality where the initial application was filed, or within 6 months in any other municipality, must be considered a subsequent application and considered in accordance with this chapter and the municipal-ordinance. All applications for general assistance that are not initial applications are repeat applications. The eligibility of repeat applicants must be determined on the basis of need and all other conditions of eligibility established by this chapter and municipal ordinance.

2. Emergencies. Any <u>A</u> person who does not have sufficient resources to provide one or more basic necessities in an emergency shall be is eligible for emergency general assistance, although he would be otherwise ineligible even when that applicant has been found ineligible for nonemergency general assistance, except as provided in this subsection.

A. A person who is currently disqualified from general assistance for a violation of section 4315, 4316-A or 4317 is ineligible for emergency assistance under this subsection.

B. Municipalities may by standards adopted in municipal ordinances restrict the disbursement of emergency assistance alleviate emergency situations to the extent that those situations could not have been averted by the applicant's use of income and resources for basic necessities. The person requesting assistance shall provide evidence of income and resources for the applicable time period.

Sec. AAA-7. 22 MRSA §4311, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1983, c. 577, §1, is amended to read:

1. Departmental reimbursement. When a municipality incurs net general assistance costs in any fiscal year in excess of .0003 of that municipality's 1981 most recent state valuation relative to the state fiscal year for which reimbursement is being issued, as determined by the State Tax Assessor in the statement filed by him as provided in Title 36, section 381, the Department of Human Services shall reimburse the municipality for 90% of the amount in excess of these expenditures when the department finds that the municipality has been in compliance with all requirements of this chapter. If a municipality elects to determine need without consideration of funds distributed from any municipally-controlled trust fund which that must otherwise be considered for purposes of this chapter, the department shall reimburse the municipality for 66 2/3% of the amount in excess of such expenditures when the department finds that the municipality has otherwise been in compliance with all requirements of this chapter.

Sec. AAA-8. 22 MRSA §4313, sub-§2, as amended by PL 1985, c. 245, is further amended to read:

2. Burial or cremation. In the event of the death of an eligible person, the funeral director shall notify the overseer prior to burial <u>or cremation</u> or by the end of the next business day following the funeral director's receipt of the body, whichever is earlier. Notwithstanding section 4305, subsection 3, paragraph C, a decision on any application for assistance with burial expenses need not be rendered until the overseer has verified that no relative or other resource is available to pay for the <u>direct</u> burial <u>or cremation</u> costs, but in no case shall the

decision <u>must</u> be rendered <u>more than within</u> 10 days after receiving an application. The father, mother, grandfather, grandmother, children <del>or</del>, grandchildren <u>or siblings</u>, by consanguinity, living within or owning real or tangible property within the State, shall be <u>are</u> responsible for the burial <u>or cremation</u> costs of the eligible person in proportion to their respective abilities. <u>When no</u> <u>legally liable relative possesses a financial capacity to</u> pay either in lump sum or on an installment basis for the <u>direct costs of a burial or cremation</u>, the contribution of a municipality under this subsection is limited to a rea-<u>sonable calculation of the funeral director's direct costs</u>, less any and all contributions from any other source.

**Sec. AAA-9. 22 MRSA §4315,** as amended by PL 1991, c. 622, Pt. M, §24, is further amended to read:

## §4315. False representation

Whoever knowingly and willfully makes any false representation of a material fact to the overseer of any municipality or to the department or its agents for the purpose of causing that or any other person to be granted assistance by the municipality or by the State may be is ineligible for assistance for a period of 90 120 days and is guilty of a Class E crime.

No <u>A</u> person may be denied <u>disqualified from receiving</u> general assistance solely for making a false representation prior to being afforded the opportunity for an appeal. If a person's application has been approved, there shall be no revocation of general assistance during the period of entitlement, until that person has been <u>must</u> <u>be</u> provided notice and an opportunity for an appeal as provided in sections 4321 and 4322.

If the fair hearing officer finds that a recipient made a false representation to the overseer in violation of this section, that recipient is required to reimburse the municipality for any assistance rendered for which that recipient was ineligible and is ineligible from receiving further assistance for a period of 90 120 days.

Any recipient whose assistance is terminated or denied under this section shall have <u>has</u> the right to appeal that decision pursuant to the Maine Rules of Civil Procedure, Rule 80-B.

No recipient who has been granted assistance, in accordance with this chapter, may have that assistance terminated prior to the decision of the fair hearing officer. In the event of any termination of assistance to any recipient, the dependents of that person may still apply for and, if eligible, receive assistance.

**Sec. AAA-10. 22 MRSA §4316-A**, as amended by PL 1991, c. 622, Pt. M, §§25 and 26, is further amended to read:

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## §4316-A. Work requirement

1. Ineligibility for assistance. An applicant is ineligible for assistance for  $90 \ \underline{120}$  days in all municipalities in the State when any municipality establishes that the applicant, without just cause:

A. Refuses to search for employment when that search is reasonable and appropriate;

B. Refuses to register for work;

C. Refuses to accept a suitable job offer under this section;

D. Refuses to participate in a training or , educational or rehabilitation program that would assist the applicant in securing employment;

## E. Quits work after an initial application for assistance;

F. Refuses to perform or willfully fails to perform a job assigned under subsection 2; or

G. Willfully performs a job assigned under subsection 2 below the average standards of that job; or  $\underline{.}$ 

H. Has been discharged from employment due to misconduct as defined in Title 26, section 1043, subsection 23.

A person may not be required to work under this subsection if that person is physically or mentally incapable of performing the work assigned.

If a municipality finds that an applicant has violated a work-related rule without just cause, under this subsection or subsection 1-A, it is the responsibility of that applicant to establish the presence of just cause.

1-A. Period of ineligibility. An applicant, whether an initial or repeat applicant, who quits work or is discharged from employment due to misconduct as defined in Title 26, section 1043, subsection 23, is ineligible to receive assistance for 120 days after the applicant's separation from employment.

2. Municipal work program. A municipality may require that an otherwise eligible person who is capable of working be required to perform work for the municipality or work for a nonprofit organization, if that organization has agreed to participate as an employer in the municipal work program, as a condition of receiving general assistance. The municipality may also require recipients, as a part of the municipal work program, to partici-

pate in a training or , educational <u>or rehabilitative</u> program which that would assist him the recipient in securing employment. The municipal work program is subject to the following requirements.

A. No <u>A</u> person may <u>not</u>, as a condition of general assistance eligibility, be required to do any amount of work that exceeds the value of the net general assistance that the person would otherwise receive under municipal general assistance standards. Any person performing work under this subsection shall <u>must</u> be provided with net general assistance, the value of which is computed at a rate of at least the State's minimum wage.

B. No  $\underline{A}$  person may <u>not</u> be required to work under this subsection for a nonprofit organization if that work would violate a basic religious belief of that person.

C. In no case may an <u>An</u> eligible person performing work under this subsection <u>may not</u> replace regular municipal employees or regular employees of a participating nonprofit organization.

D. In no case may an <u>An</u> eligible person in need of emergency assistance <u>may not</u> be required to perform work under this subsection prior to receiving general assistance. <u>An applicant who is</u> not in need of emergency assistance may be required to satisfactorily fulfill a workfare requirement prior to receiving the nonemergency assistance conditionally granted to that applicant.

E. Expenses related to work performed under this subsection by an eligible person shall must be considered in determining the amount of net general assistance to be provided to the person.

F. General assistance provided by a municipality for work performed by an eligible person under this subsection shall <u>must</u> be:

(1) Included in the reimbursable net general assistance costs; and

(2) Itemized separately in reports to the Department of Human Services under section 4311.

G. A person may not be required to work under this subsection if that person is physically or mentally incapable of performing the work assigned.

**3.** Limitations of work requirement. In no case may any work requirement or training or educational program under this section interfere with a person's:

A. Existing employment;

B. Ability to pursue a bona fide job offer;

C. Ability to attend an interview for possible employment;

D. Participation <u>Classroom participation</u> in a primary or secondary educational program intended to lead to a high school diploma; or

E. Participation <u>Classroom or on-site participa-</u> tion in a training program that is either approved or determined, or both, by the Department of Labor to be reasonably expected to assist the individual in securing employment. This paragraph does not include participation in a degree granting program, except when that program is a training program operated under the control of the Department of Human Services or the Department of Labor.

4. Eligibility regained. A person who has been disqualified by any municipality for not complying with any work requirement of this section may regain eligibility during the 90-day 120-day period by becoming employed or otherwise complying with the work requirements of this section. An applicant who is disqualified due to failure to comply with the municipal work program may be given only one opportunity to regain eligibility during the 90-day 120-day disqualification period, except that if an applicant who regains eligibility is again disqualified for failing to comply with the municipal work program within the initial period of disqualification, the applicant is ineligible for assistance for 120 days and does not have the opportunity to requalify during the 120-day period.

5. Just cause defined. Just cause for failure to meet work requirements or the use of potential resources shall must be found when there is reasonable and verifiable evidence of:

A. Physical or mental illness or disability;

B. Below-minimum wages;

C. Sexual harassment;

D. Physical or mental inability to perform required job tasks;

E. Inability to work required hours or to meet piece work standards;

F. Lack of transportation to and from work or training;

G. Inability to arrange for necessary child care or care of  $\underline{an}$  ill or disabled family member;

H. Any reason found to be good cause by the Department of Labor; and

I. Any other evidence which that is reasonable and appropriate.

The overseer shall may not require medical verification of medical conditions which that are apparent or which are of such short duration that a reasonable person would not ordinarily seek medical attention. In any case in which the overseer requires medical verification and the applicant has no means of obtaining such verification, the overseer shall grant assistance for the purpose of obtaining that verification.

**Sec. AAA-11. 22 MRSA §4317,** as enacted by PL 1983, c. 577, §1, is amended to read:

#### §4317. Use of potential resources

Any An applicant or recipient must make a good faith effort to secure any potential resource which that may be available, including, but not limited to, any state or federal assistance program, employment benefits, governmental or private pension programs, available trust funds, support from legally liable relatives, child-support payments and jointly held resources where the applicant or recipient share may be available to the individual. Assistance shall may not be withheld pending receipt of such resource as long as application has been made or good faith effort is being made to secure the resource.

Any An individual applying for or receiving assistance due to a disability must make a good faith effort to make use of any medical and rehabilitative resources that may be recommended by a physician which, psychologist or other professional retraining or rehabilitation specialist that are available without financial burden and which would not constitute further physical risk to the individual.

Any An applicant who refuses to utilize potential resources without just cause, after receiving a written 7-day notice, shall be is disqualified from receiving assistance until he the applicant has made a good faith effort to secure the resource.

Any An applicant who forfeits receipt of or causes reduction in benefits from another public assistance program because of fraud, misrepresentation or a knowing or intentional violation of program rules committed by the applicant within the 60 days prior to his application for assistance; or a refusal to comply with program rules without just cause is not eligible to receive general assistance to replace the forfeited assistance for a period of 60 days from the date of application for general assistance, except as provided for initial applications the duration of the forfeiture.

Sec. AAA-12. 22 MRSA §4319, as amended by PL 1991, c. 622, Pt. M, §28, is further amended to read:

#### §4319. Liability of relatives for support

1. Relatives liable. A parent or grandparent of a child under 25 years of age and a spouse living in or owning property in the State shall support persons for whom they are legally responsible their children or husband or wife in proportion to their respective ability. Liability for burial expenses is governed by section 4313.

2. Rental payments to relatives. A municipality or the State may decide not to make payments for rental assistance on behalf of an otherwise eligible individual when the rental payments would be made to a parent, grandparent, child, grandchild, sibling, parent's sibling or any of their children, unless the municipality finds that the rental arrangement has existed for 3 months prior to the application for assistance and is necessary to provide the relative with basic necessities.

3. Recovery of assistance provided. A municipality or the State, after providing general assistance to a dependent of a legally responsible parent or grandparent to a person's spouse who is financially capable of providing support, may then seek reimbursement or relief for that support by initiating a complaint to the Superior Court or District Court, including by small claims action, located in the division or county where the legally responsible parent or grandparent spouse resides. The court may cause the legally responsible parent or grandparent spouse to be summoned and upon hearing or default may assess and apportion a reasonable sum upon those who are found to be of sufficient ability for the support of the eligible person and shall issue a writ of execution. The assessment shall may not be made to pay any expense for relief provided more than  $6 \underline{12}$  months before the complaint was filed. Any action brought under this section shall be is governed by the Maine Rules of Civil Procedure. The court may, from time to time, make any further order on complaint of a an interested party interested and, after notice is given, alter the assessment or apportionment.

**Sec. AAA-13. 22 MRSA §4322,** as amended by PL 1989, c. 104, Pt. C, §§8 and 10, is further amended to read:

## §4322. Right to a fair hearing

Any  $\underline{A}$  person aggrieved by a decision, act, failure to act or delay in action concerning his that person's application for general assistance under this chapter shall have has the right to an appeal. If a person's application has been approved, there shall be no revocation of general assistance may not be revoked during the period of entitlement until that person has been provided notice and an opportunity for hearing as provided in this section. Within 5 working days of receiving a written decision or notice of denial, reduction or termination of assistance, in accordance with the provisions of section 4321, or within 10 working days after any other act or failure to act by the municipality with regard to an application for assistance, the person may request an appeal. A hearing shall <u>must</u> be held by the fair hearing authority within 5 working days following the receipt of a written request by the applicant for an appeal. The hearing may be conducted by the municipal officers, a board of appeals; created under Title 30-A, section 2691, or one or more persons appointed by the municipal officers to act as a fair hearing authority. In no event may an <u>An</u> appeal <u>may not</u> be held before a person or body responsible for the decision, act, failure to act or delay in <u>action</u> relating to the applicant.

The person requesting the appeal shall and the municipal administrator responsible for the decision being appealed must be afforded the right to confront and cross-examine any witnesses against him presented at the hearing, present witnesses in his own their behalf and be represented by counsel or other spokesman, and spokeperson. A claimant must be advised of these rights in writing. The decision of such an appeal shall must be based solely on evidence adduced at the hearing. The Maine Rules of Evidence do not apply to information presented to the fair hearing authority. The standard of evidence is the standard set in Title 5, section 9057, subsection 2. The person requesting the appeal shall must, within 5 working days after the appeal, be furnished with a written decision detailing the reasons for that decision. When any decision by a fair hearing authority or court authorizing assistance is made, that assistance shall must be provided within 24 hours. Review of any action or failure to act under this chapter shall must be conducted pursuant to the Maine Rules of Civil Procedure, Rule 80-B. The municipality shall make a record of the fair hearing. The municipality's obligation shall be is limited to keeping a taped record of the proceedings. Costs The applicant shall pay costs for preparing any transcripts which are required to pursue an appeal of a fair hearing authority's decision shall be paid for by the applicant.

Sec. AAA-13. 22 MRSA §4323, first ¶, as enacted by PL 1983, c. 577, §1, is amended to read:

The Department of Human Services shall be responsible, in accordance with this section, share responsibility with municipalities for the proper administration of general assistance. The department shall assist municipalities in complying with this chapter. The department shall annually review and comment on each municipal ordinance and any amendment filed with respect to its adequacy and compliance with this chapter and make any recommendations it deems appropriate to the municipality.

Sec. BBB-1. 12 MRSA §610 is enacted to read:

## §610. Maine State Parks Fund

The Maine State Parks Fund is established within the bureau. The fund receives money from the Maine Environmental Trust Fund in accordance with section 7759, subsection 3. The bureau shall use this money for major and minor capital improvements, maintenance, repairs and operations at existing state parks and historic sites.

The fund is nonlapsing. All funds of the Maine State Parks Fund are subject to allocation by the Legislature. The Department of Conservation may use funds of the Maine State Parks Fund to buy out contracts on state land.

Sec. BBB-2. 12 MRSA §7757, sub-§1, as amended by PL 1993, c. 168, §1, is further amended to read:

1. Establishment. There is established the Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund. It The fund receives money deposited by the Treasurer of State pursuant to section 7759 and Title 36, section 5284, revenues generated in accordance with this section and any money contributed voluntarily to the fund. All money deposited in the fund; and the earnings thereon, must on that money remain in the fund to be used for the management of nongame wildlife and for necessary administrative and personnel costs associated therewith, with the management of nongame wildlife and may not be deposited in the General Fund or any other fund, except as specifically provided by statute law.

Sec. BBB-3. 12 MRSA §7759 is enacted to read:

## §7759. Maine Environmental Trust Fund

1. Fund established. The Maine Environmental Trust Fund, referred to in this section as the "fund," is established as a nonlapsing fund administered by the commissioner for the purposes of improving state parks and historic sites by supporting the Maine State Parks Fund and managing nongame wildlife by supporting the Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund. Money deposited with the Treasurer of State to the credit of the fund may be invested as provided by law. Income from these investments must be credited to the fund.

**2. Fund sources.** The fund receives money deposited by the Treasurer of State pursuant to Title 29, section 252-J and any other gift, grant or other source of revenue deposited for that use.

3. Distribution from fund. After the Treasurer of State has reimbursed the Secretary of State for costs of producing and issuing environmental registration plates in accordance with Title 29, section 252-J, the Treasurer of State shall annually distribute the balance in the fund as follows: A. Sixty percent of the balance must be deposited in the Maine State Parks Fund established in section 610; and

B. Forty percent of the balance must be deposited in the Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund established in section 7757.

This subsection is repealed March 31, 1996.

4. Budget. The commissioner shall submit a budget for each biennium pursuant to Title 5, sections 1663 and 1666.

Sec. BBB-4. 29 MRSA §252-J is enacted to read:

# §252-J Environmental registration plates

The Secretary of State shall issue Maine Environmental Trust Fund registration plates beginning April 1, 1994 in accordance with this section. Environmental registration plates are not required for registration of a motor vehicle but are to allow citizens to participate voluntarily in the Maine Environmental Trust Fund program. A citizen may apply for environmental registration plates and contribute to the Maine Environmental Trust Fund as provided in this section.

1. Issuance of environmental registration plates. The Secretary of State, upon receiving an application and evidence of payment of the excise tax required by Title 36, the registration fee required by this Title and the contribution to the Maine Environmental Trust Fund provided for in subsection 4, shall issue a registration certificate and a set of environmental registration plates to be used in lieu of regular registration plates. The Secretary of State may issue environmental registration plates to a vehicle in any registration class if the designated registration plate for that class does not preclude its use in conjunction with the environmental registration plate design.

2. Plate design; optional environmental vanity plates. The Secretary of State, the Commissioner of Conservation, the Commissioner of Environmental Protection and the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife in consultation with the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over transportation matters shall determine the plate design.

The design must accommodate the use of numbers and letters as provided in section 192. Upon request and as provided by section 192, the Secretary of State shall issue environmental plates that are also vanity plates. Environmental vanity plates are issued in accordance with this section and section 192. The annual service fee of \$15 for vanity plates is credited to the Highway Fund.

3. Temporary facsimile plate. The Secretary of State may issue a facsimile plate for temporary use up to

a 60-day period until the permanent plate is received. The facsimile plate must be attached to the rear plate bracket.

4. Contribution to the Maine Environmental Trust Fund. In addition to the regular motor vehicle registration fee prescribed by law for the particular class of vehicle registered, the annual contribution for environmental registration plates is \$20 which must be deposited with the Treasurer of State and credited to the Maine Environmental Trust Fund established in section 7759.

5. Reimbursement for production and issuance costs. The Treasurer of State shall transfer annually from the Maine Environmental Trust Fund to the Secretary of State \$10 for each set of environmental registration plates issued or renewed. This transfer is to reimburse the Secretary of State for costs associated with production and issuance of the plates.

Sec. BBB-5. Report. The Secretary of State shall submit a report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over transportation matters by January 15, 1996 on the issuance of environmental registration plates during the period April 1, 1994 to December 31, 1995. The report must include the number of applications received for environmental plates, the number of plates issued, the number of environmental vanity plates issued, the production and administrative costs of the program and an accounting of revenues generated for the Highway Fund and the Maine Environmental Trust Fund. The report may include recommendations to the committee on ways to improve the program's operation, to maximize revenues from the program and any steps needed to ensure that all reasonable production and administration costs incurred by the Division of Motor Vehicles are reimbursed.

Sec. BBB-6. Legislative review of distribution of funds. The joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over transportation matters shall review the distribution formula established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 7759, subsection 3 to determine whether the percentages distributed after reimbursement to the Secretary of State should be amended, repealed or continued by law. The committee shall submit its report, including any necessary legislation, to the Second Regular Session of the 117th Legislature by November 1, 1995.

For purposes of this section, an interdisciplinary team includes the person receiving services and a member of the person's family or the guardian of the person receiving services.

2. Payment for service. The <u>Burcau</u> <u>Division</u> of Mental Retardation shall establish a voucher system to allow the interdisciplinary team to incorporate only those services determined critical and otherwise unavailable into a program, including work, habilitation and other services designated in subsection l, when appropriate. The <u>burcau</u> <u>division</u> shall establish a limit on the amount of transitional services available to persons receiving services eligible for services under this section.

**3.** Rules. The <u>Bureau Division</u> of Mental Retardation shall adopt rules in accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act to establish a transitional program under subsections l and 2.

Any funding source must satisfy the requirements of Title XIX of the Social Security Act and the Federal Demonstration Grant Program administered by the Health Care Financing Administration.

> C. The advisory board shall solicit proposals from private entities to administer the Maine Health Program after March 31, 1994. The advisory board shall plan for the transition of program management from the Department of Human Services to a private contractor between August 1, 1993 and March 31, 1994. The advisory board has full authority to effect the transition to the private entity, which shall commence administration of the Maine Health Program on April 1, 1994.

> D. After notice and hearing, the advisory board shall establish guidelines for the administration of the Maine Health Program by the private contractor.

> E. The advisory board shall draft any legislation it determines necessary to govern the Maine Health Program as it will operate after April 1, 1994 and present it for consideration by the Legislature as soon as practical after August 1, 1993.

3. Staff. The Department of Human Services, the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, the State Planning Office and the Legislative Council shall supply staff and other assistance to the advisory. board.

Sec. HHH-1. Transfer of funds. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, \$575,968 must be transferred from interest that has accrued to the Contribution Fund, as described in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 19005, to the General Fund as undedicated revenue by June 30, 1994.

# §929-A. Maine Economic Growth Council

1. The Maine Economic Growth Council; establishment. The Maine Economic Growth Council, referred to in this section and section 929-B as "the council," is established to develop, maintain and evaluate a longterm economic plan for the State.

2. Membership. The council consists of 19 members. The Governor, President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly appoint the following 18 members, 2 of whom shall serve as cochairs of the council:

> A. Fourteen members having a broad range of expertise in areas including but not limited to: labor, environment, business, and education; and

> B. Four members of the Legislature with a demonstrated interest in economic development.

The Commissioner of Economic and Community Development is a member of the council.

**3. Appointments.** The terms of the initially appointed members must be staggered: Six of the initial appointees serve for one year, 6 serve for 2 years and 5 serve for 3 years. The 2 members chosen as cochairs of the council serve for a 3-year term. An appointee may not serve more than 3 years, except those persons appointed initially for terms of one and 2 years. The initial members must be appointed by August 1, 1993.

4. Quorum. Ten members of the council constitute a quorum.

5. Compensation. Members of the council are not entitled to compensation for their services, except for those members of the Legislature appointed to the council who receive the legislative per diem.

# §929-B. Powers and duties

<u>1. Develop a long-term plan for the State's</u> economy. The council shall:

A. Develop and recommend a long-range plan, goals, benchmarks and alternative strategies for a sustainable state economy;

B. Monitor progress in accomplishing the plan's vision, goals and benchmarks; and

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C. Recommend changes in the plan to reflect the dynamics of the international, national and state economy.

**2. Process.** The council shall use the following guidelines when developing the plan described in subsection 1.

A. The process must be long-term and continuous with a 5-to-7-year planning horizon. It must include clear authority for monitoring and evaluating on a regular basis.

B. The process must have a strategic focus and measurable outcomes, with clear goal-setting and performance indicators.

C. The council may appoint working groups and advisory committees as necessary, representing key concerned parties to accomplish the goals outlined in this section.

D. The process must be statewide in scope, using available technology to ensure that all areas of the State have accessibility to the work of the council.

E. Preparation and maintenance of the plan must be through a public and private partnership approach that is objective and nonpartisan.

3. Contents. The plan developed by the council must consist of:

A. A plan for the State's economy based on economic opportunity for all citizens and a shared commitment to sustainable development that recognizes that new forms of cooperation among government, business and society are required to achieve the goals;

B. Benchmarks for accomplishing the plan that are specific, quantifiable performance indicators against which each of the goals that have been set forth to accomplish the vision can be measured;

C. Alternative strategies to accomplish the benchmarks based upon the best practices in Maine, other states and other countries;

D. A strategy for the overall economy, broadly defined and not limited to what is traditionally termed "economic development." The plan must include consideration of education and training, redeployment of state resources, investments in science and technology and infrastructure; and

E. Identification of:

(1) The types of industries and jobs with significant growth potential in the State;

(2) The State's evolving industrial base;

(3) The dynamic national and international markets;

(4) Existing efforts to convert military economies to civilian economies: and

(5) Other relevant studies and evaluations in the private and public sector dealing with the long-term economic growth of the State.

4. Fiscal agent. The Economic Development and Business Assistance Coordinating Council established in Title 5, section 13001, shall serve as the council's fiscal agent providing regular financial reports to the council on funds received and expended and an annual audit. The council shall seek funds and accept gifts, if necessary, to support the council's objectives.

5. Staff support. The council shall contract with the Maine Development Foundation for staff support to fulfill the requirements for carrying out the purposes of this section.

6. Report. The council shall report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over housing and economic development matters. The council shall recommend its plan to the committee biennially at the beginning of each new Legislature, except that the first plan must be presented by January 1, 1994. The recommended plan must be used by the Economic Development and Business Assistance Coordinating Council as a guide to deliver economic development services.

1. Economic Conversion Division: establishment. The Economic Conversion Division, referred to in this section as the "division," is established within the Office of Business Development to implement the recommendations of the Task Force on Defense Realignment and the Economy.

2. Administration. The Economic Conversion Division is located in the Department of Economic and Community Development with staff provided at the discretion of the commissioner. The division may seek and accept funds from outside sources for carrying out the purposes of this section.

3. Responsibilities. The Economic Conversion Division, in conjunction with the Office of Business Development and the Task Force on Defense Realignment and the Economy, shall perform the following functions:

> A. Serve as a clearinghouse for any firm, community or worker concerning economic conversion or defense dislocation assistance:

> B. Coordinate all interagency state economic conversion and diversification resources, activities and programs;

> C. Provide necessary support and coordination of established and future regional conversion task force efforts in the State;

> D. Pursue federal economic conversion assistance programs; and

> E. Assist the Task Force on Defense Realignment and the Economy in monitoring shifts in federal defense spending trends and related impacts on the State's major defense-dependent firms and military installations, in serving as a liaison and legislative advocate to the Governor, Legislature and congressional delegation on conversion activities and related matters, and in developing a public awareness program on the State's defense dependency, conversion efforts and related assistance programs.

4. Annual report. The Economic Conversion Division and the Task Force on Defense Realignment and the Economy shall jointly prepare and submit an annual report to the Governor and the Legislature and shall present a report of their activities to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over economic development matters no later than April 1, 1994.

5. Sunset. Authorization for the Economic Conversion Division expires on July 1, 1995. The Office of Business Development shall provide its recommendations to the Governor and the joint standing committee of the

# §7101. Telecommunications policy

1. Universal service. The Legislature declares and finds that the 50-year effort to bring affordable, universally available telephone service to the public has served the State well; universal telephone service has contributed to the State's economic, social and political integration and development; the public benefits from universal telephone service because each telephone subscriber receives a more valuable service when virtually anyone else in the State can be called; and a significant rate increase may threaten universal service by forcing some Maine people to discontinue their telephone service. It is the policy of the State that telephone service must continue to be universally available, especially to the poor, at affordable rates.

2. Economic development. The Legislature further declares and finds that a modern state-of-the-art telecommunications network is essential for the economic health and vitality of the State and for improvement in the quality of life for all Maine citizens. Therefore, it is the goal of the State that all Maine's businesses and citizens should have affordable access to an integrated telecommunication infrastructure capable of providing voice,

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data and image-based services. The State shall consider policies that:

A. Encourage economic development;

B. Employ methods of regulation that encourage the development and deployment of new technologies; and

C. Encourage acceptable service applications that support economic development initiatives or otherwise improve the well-being of Maine citizens.

**3. Report.** The commission shall provide the Legislature with a report on the status of the telecommunications industry in Maine no later than December 31, 1994. The report must include the following:

A. The extent to which the dual communications policy goals of universal service and economic development are being achieved;

B. The actions taken by the commission to further these goals, including the status of any alternative approaches to regulation; and

C. Recommendations for legislation.

2. Terms; compensation. Public and legislative members serve 2-year terms and may be reappointed. 1. Membership. The council consists of  $\frac{13}{17}$  members as follows:

A. The Commissioner of Economic and Community Development;

B. The Commissioner of Labor;

C. The Chief Executive Officer of the Maine Development Foundation;

D. The Chief Executive Officer of the Finance Authority of Maine;

E. The Executive Director of the Maine Science and Technology Commission;

F. The President of the Maine World Trade Association;

G. A member representing the University of Maine, appointed by the Chancellor of the University of Maine System;

H. A member representing the University of Southern Maine, appointed by the Chancellor of the University of Maine System;

I. The President of the Maine Technical College System;

J. The Director of the United States Small Business Administration Small Business Development Subcenter Program at the University of Southern Maine;

K. The Executive Director of the Maine State Housing Authority;

L. The Director of the State Planning Office; and

M. The Executive Director of the Maine State Retirement System:

N. The Commissioner of Education;

O. The Commissioner of Environmental Protection;

P. The Commissioner of Transportation; and

Q. A member representing the Maine Association of Regional Councils, appointed by the President of the Maine Association of Regional Councils.

2. Quorum; voting. <u>Seven Nine</u> members of the council constitute a quorum, which is necessary for voting on issues before the council. A majority vote of those voting is necessary for official action of the council.

**4. Staff.** The council shall provide for its staffing. The council may raise and expend funds from the private sector <u>or from federal resources</u> to support council staffing and other expenses.

**5.** Chair. The council shall biennially elect a chair, except that the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development shall chair the council for the first term ending January 1, <del>1994</del> 1996.

Sec. PPP-3. 5 MRSA §13002, sub-§1, ¶A, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 854, Pt. D, §1, is amended to read:

A. Economic development regions are subject to the following.

(1) No later than February 1, <del>1993</del> <u>1994</u>, the council shall provide to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over economic development matters a preliminary report that inventories existing economic development regions and resources, analyzes the effectiveness of those regions in carrying out their mission and proposes a system of economic development regions to provide comprehensive economic development and business assistance services throughout the State.

(2) Following presentation of the report required by subparagraph (1), <u>but no later than</u> <u>June 1, 1994</u>, the council shall adopt by rule a system of economic development regions for the State that identifies each region and a proposed system of delivering economic development and business assistance services within each region.

(3) As part of the regional system adopted under subparagraph (2), the council shall provide a procedure by which a person, firm, organization or municipality adversely affected by the establishment of a delivery system of economic development and business assistance services may appeal to the council for a change in the delivery system to meet the needs of the affected entity or person.

(4) In adopting a system of economic development regions for the State, the council shall establish regions that best meet the needs of municipalities and the private sector with respect to developing a regional strategy and a regional delivery system of economic development and business assistance services. In identifying the regions, the council shall consider existing regional designations used by other state and federal agencies.

(5) In establishing regions, the council shall provide for the efficient and convenient delivery of economic development and business assistance services to all users within each region. Services provided within a region and economic development and business assistance services provided by state and federal agencies must be coordinated to provide users with the most efficient services possible. Services may be provided across regional lines as the council determines appropriate.

(6) The council members shall develop an annual work program to identify interagency coordination efforts and shall meet quarterly on this issue.

Sec. PPP-4. 5 MRSA §13002, sub-§8, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 854, Pt. D, §1, is amended to read:

8. Report. At a minimum, the council shall provide the Governor and the Legislature with a biennial report by December 1st beginning in 1995 that describes the economic activity in each region, the extent to which the goals and objectives of each regional strategy are being met; and the successes and the failures of policies and programs and includes an evaluation of the interagency coordination efforts of the members of the council and any other information determined important by the council.

## <u>§13063-A. Maine Education and Training Export</u> Partnership

1. Establishment. The Maine Education and Training Export Partnership, referred to in this section as the "partnership," is established to engage in charitable, educational and scientific activities and, in furtherance of those activities, to stimulate the development, dissemination and widespread application of education, training and technical assistance suitable and adaptable to the social, cultural and economic conditions of developing countries.

The partnership is a state-chartered, nonprofit organization. The partnership shall carry out its purposes in support of and in coordination with the private entities operated for profit, private nonprofit organizations and institutions and public and private educational institutions that constitute the international education, training and technical assistance industry in the State.

2. Purpose. The partnership shall assist its member organizations and encourage participation from all interested companies, organizations and institutions to:

> A. Promote the development and dissemination of education, training and technical assistance programs appropriate for foreign countries; and

> B. Identify market opportunities and potential contracts in foreign countries that match the technologies and expertise available in the State and coordinate and submit appropriate proposal responses.

3. Board of directors. The Board of Directors of the Maine Education and Training Export Partnership consists of up to 15 members appointed by the Governor, subject to review by the joint standing committee having jurisdiction over economic development matters and confirmation by the Legislature. A majority of the directors must be from the private sector, which includes all organizations outside State Government and Federal Government. The directors must be appointed from the member organizations or must be involved in a related business field or possess experience or familiarity with education, training, technical assistance or international commerce. The board shall elect a chair from its membership.

The board of directors shall:

A. Establish membership criteria and a dues structure;

B. Establish a fee structure associated with participation in partnership contracts;

C. Establish dues, fees and limited services available to nonmembers; and

D. Develop the work plan and implementation schedule for the partnership's activities.

4. Adoption of bylaws. The partnership shall adopt bylaws consistent with this section for the governance of its affairs. The partnership shall do all things necessary or convenient to carry out the lawful purposes of the partnership under this section.

5. General powers. The partnership may:

A. Sue or be sued in its own name;

B. Apply for and receive funds from any private source or governmental entity, whether by way of grant, donation, loan or any other manner;

C. Assist public and private entities in developing proposals and charge such fees for this service as it determines appropriate; and

D. Make contracts, including contracts for services, and incur liabilities for any of the purposes authorized in those contracts.

6. Dissolution of the partnership. The partnership may not be dissolved unless the Legislature provides for its dissolution. Upon dissolution of the partnership, the directors, after paying or making provision for the payment of all liabilities of the partnership, shall cause all of the remaining assets to be transferred to the State.

7. Annual report; audit. The partnership shall provide an annual report and an independent audit of its financial status and activities to the Governor, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over economic development matters and the members of the partnership. The partnership is subject to any further audit and review determined necessary by the Governor or the Legislative Council at the expense of the State.

In addition to financial information on the partnership, the annual report must include, but is not limited to, the following:

A. A list of members and other organizations who have participated in partnership activities;

B. A summary of coalitions formed to develop proposals;

C. A status of applications and proposals in progress; and

D. A summary of the activities of the partnership for the year and proposed work plan for the upcoming year.

The Committee to Study the Retirement System, referred to in this section as "the committee," is established and consists of 4 members who must be impartial and without any direct financial interests in the Maine State Retirement System appointed as follows: Two members appointed by the Governor, one member appointed by the President of the Senate and one member to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each appointing authority has power to veto the commission members chosen by the others. A member of the committee may not be a legislator, a member of the Maine State Retirement System, a person eligible to be a member of the Maine State Retirement System or a member or employee of an organization representing persons eligible to be members of the Maine State Retirement System.

Each member appointed must have previous experience with a public or private pension system or have a current working knowledge of institutional investment practices or standard pension administration and management practices.

All appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this Act. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council must be notified by all appointing authorities once selections have been finalized.

The first meeting of the committee must be convened by the Executive Director of the Legislative Council within 14 days after the appointment of the committee. At the first meeting, the committee shall elect a chair from among its members.

1. Expenses. All members of the committee are entitled to receive per diem reimbursement in the amount of the legislative per diem and must be reimbursed for expenses upon approval of the chair and application to the Executive Director of the Legislative Council.

2. Duties and responsibilities. The committee shall review all aspects of the Maine State Retirement System to ensure its present and future fiscal soundness, including, but not limited to:

A. The underlying causes of the unfunded liability including underfunding, benefit modifications and experience losses and methods of reducing the number of years of amortization of the unfunded liability; B. The equity of the current benefit structure, in comparison to other pension systems offered in Maine and other states, including a comparison of benefits available to different classes of employees and the effectiveness of the current benefit structure in meeting the statutory goals of recruiting and retaining qualified employees and assisting members to make provision for their retirement years and a comparison of the benefit structure to comparable public and private sector retirement plans;

C. The affordability of the current benefit structure and the State's ability to meet its short-term and long-term benefit obligations. Review must address the system's current funding schedule and actuarial assumptions;

D. The Legislature's obligations and rights concerning benefit modifications in view of the decision of the Maine Supreme Judicial Court in <u>Spiller</u> <u>v. State</u>, Decision No. 6551, Law Docket No. KEN-93-191; and

E. Other aspects of the laws, operations and procedures of the system that relate to its benefit structure, financial stability and fiscal soundness that the committee considers necessary to carry out the review required in this subsection.

In comparing the Maine State Retirement System with other public and private pension systems, the committee shall make recommendations relating to the need for the Maine State Retirement System to make appropriate changes if advisable.

3. Staff. The committee may contract for those professionals it requires to assist it. The committee shall contract with an independent actuary to review the system. In addition, the committee may request staff assistance from the Legislative Council. On request of the committee, assistance must be provided by the Maine State Retirement System, the Department of the Attorney General, the State Planning Office and any other agency of the executive department.

4. **Report.** The committee shall report its findings and recommendations, including any necessary implementing legislation, to the Governor and to the Joint Standing Committee on Aging, Retirement and Veterans by January 15, 1994.

5. Savings priority. Any savings realized as a result of the study required by this section must be appropriated first to restore cost-of-living adjustments in retirement benefits for persons with less than 10 years creditable service on July 1, 1993 who have not reached normal retirement age, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 17001.

Sec. SSS-2. Calculation and transfer. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 1585, the State Budget Officer is authorized to calculate the amount in sections 5 to 7 of this Part that applies against each Federal Expenditure Fund, Other Special Revenue or internal service fund account for all departments and agencies based on the personal services allocations to those accounts. The State Budget Officer shall cause the calculated amount to be transferred from each account.

Capital reserve funds may secure interest rate swap agreements pertaining to eligible enterprises which that demonstrate the ability to honor the swap agreement as determined by the authority and which that do not have as a principal element space for retail sales or professional office space, as defined by the authority. Any commitment with respect to a mortgage loan executed and delivered pursuant to this section shall be is conclusive evidence of the eligibility of the mortgage loan for insurance and the validity of any such commitment or contract shall be is incontestable in the hands of a mortgage lender, swap counterparty or lender to the authority except for fraud or misrepresentation on the part of the mortgage lender, swap counterparty or lender to the authority. Mortgages secured by capital reserve funds under this section are made legal investments for all insurance companies, trust companies, banks, investment companies, savings banks, savings and loan associations, executors, trustees and other fiduciaries, public and private pension or retirement funds and other persons.

6. Obligations outstanding. The authority shall may not have at any one time outstanding obligations to which this section is stated in any agreement of the authority to apply in principal amount exceeding \$75,000,000, less the amount of revenue obligation securities to which section 1053 is stated in the trust agreement or other document to apply. #### PART KKKK

Sec. KKKK-1. 36 MRSA §1811, as amended by PL 1991, c. 591, Pt. XX, §§1 and 2 and affected by §§7 and 8, is further amended by adding 3 new paragraphs at the end to read:

On or before May 15th of each year, the State Budget Officer shall present a final estimate of General Fund revenues for the current fiscal year, taking into consideration an estimate of the Revenue Forecasting Committee. If estimated General Fund revenues for the current fiscal year exceed those of the prior fiscal year by 8% or more, on a base-to-base comparison excluding one-time revenue gains and losses, revenue in an amount equivalent to that generated by 0.5% of the tax on the sale of personal property and taxable services taxed at a rate of 6% on the effective date of this paragraph must be transferred by the State Controller to the Maine Rainy Day Fund as described in this section.

Each month following a fiscal year during which General Fund revenues exceed those of the previous fiscal year by 8% or more, on a base-to-base comparison excluding one-time revenue gains and losses, the State Controller shall transfer an amount equivalent to that generated over the preceding month by 0.5% of the tax on the sale of personal property and taxable services taxed at a rate of 6% on the effective date of this paragraph to the Maine Rainy Day Fund until such time as the tax imposed by this chapter is reduced.

If General Fund revenues for any fiscal year, as determined by the State Controller at the close of the fiscal year following the end of that fiscal year, exceed those of the previous fiscal year by 8% or more, on a base-to-base comparison excluding one-time revenue gains and losses, the tax on the sale of those tangible personal property and taxable services taxed at a rate of 6% on the effective date of this paragraph shall fall by 0.5% on the subsequent October 1st, unless the Legislature takes action to prevent the reduction.

**Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act takes effect when approved.
