along the northern boundary of said Lot 74, thence southerly along the western boundary of said Lot 74 to Lot 1 of Map 12, thence westerly along the northern boundary of said Lot 1, thence southerly along the western boundary of Lots 1, 2 and 3 of Map 12 to the southwest corner of said Lot 3, thence easterly along the southern boundary of said Lots 3 and 2 to the southwest corner of Lot 4 of Map 12, thence northerly along the western boundary of said Lot 4, thence easterly along the northern boundary of said Lot 4, thence southerly along the eastern boundary of said Lot 4 to the southwest corner of Lot 42 of Map 28, thence in a straight line across Lots 5 and 6 of Map 12 to the northwest corner of Lot 41 of Map 28, thence southerly along the western boundary of said Lot 41, thence easterly along the southern boundary of said Lot 41, to the northwest corner of Lot 7 of Map 12, thence southerly along the western boundary of said Lot 7, thence easterly along the southern boundary of said Lot 7 to the western boundary of Lot 39 of Map 28, thence southerly along the western boundaries of said Lot 39 and Lots 1 and 3 of Map 29 to the northern boundary of Lot 9 of Map 12, thence easterly along the northern boundary of said Lot 9 to the western boundary of Route 131, thence southerly along the western boundary of Route 131 to a point opposite the southwestern corner of Lot 6 of Map 29, thence crossing Route 131 to the intersection of the southwestern corner of said Lot 6 and a stream that empties into the body of water known as Tenants Harbor, thence easterly along the stream to the body of water known as Tenants Harbor, thence easterly and northerly along the shore of Tenants Harbor and Ripley Creek to Route 131, thence crossing Route 131 to the point at the beginning; and its inhabitants constitute a standard district under the name "Tenants Harbor Standard Water District" and referred to in this Act as the "district."

**Sec. 2. P&SL 1997, c. 17, §2** is amended by adding at the end a new paragraph to read:

The district is authorized to provide service to persons or entities located outside the territory of the district whose water sources are contaminated or potentially contaminated by hazardous substances provided that the cost of the extension of facilities to such persons or entities is funded by the State pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 38, section 1364, subsection 5.

**Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act takes effect when approved.

Effective April 16, 1999.

## CHAPTER 9

### H.P. 650 - L.D. 900

#### An Act to Reestablish the Municipal Boundary between Pownal and Durham

**Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:**

**Sec. 1. Boundary Line.** The boundary between the Town of Durham in the County of Androscoggin and the Town of Pownal in the County of Cumberland shall begin at a one inch diameter pipe monument set to replace a disturbed 5/8 inch diameter iron rod at the Northeasterly corner of the Town of Pownal incorporated March 3, 1808 described in the Public and General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, 1808, chapter 79, and further described on a plan entitled "Standard Boundary Survey of the Durham, Freeport, Pownal Common Townline Corner" dated January 31, 1995 and revised on February 17, 1995 and on March 31, 1995, recorded in the Cumberland County Registry of Deeds in Plan Book 195 Page 123 and in the Androscoggin County Registry of Deeds in Plan Book 38 Page 141; thence N56°-09'-45"W, 16,918.3' passing through several intermediate monuments to a four inch by four inch by fourteen inch tall granite monument set with a 2 inch diameter brass disk marked "Durham Pownal Municipal Boundary..."; thence N56°-52'-45"W, 2849.3' passing through an intermediate monument, to an eleven inch by four inch by twenty-four inch tall granite monument found marked "D P 1841" on the Easterly bank of Chandler Brook, so called; thence N55°-39'-40"W, 1761.9' passing through an intermediate monument, to a twelve inch by twelve inch by eight inch by twelve inch tall granite monument found marked "D P 1834" on the Westerly side of the Runaround Pond Road, so called; thence N56°-06'-00"W, 3368.4' passing through 2 intermediate monuments to a six inch by six inch by fifteen inch tall granite monument with a three inch brass disk marked "Town of Durham Town of Pownal Municipal Boundary..." set on the westerly side of the Auburn Road, so called; thence N56°-09'-45"W, 1832.8' passing through an intermediate monument to a six inch by six inch by twenty-four inch tall granite monument with a 3 inch diameter brass disk marked "Town of Durham Town of Pownal Municipal Boundary..." set at or near the Southeasterly line of the Town of New Gloucester, the Town of Durham in the County of Androscoggin being on the Northeasterly side of said line and the Town of Pownal in the County of Cumberland being on the Southwesterly side of said line.

The bearings noted above are based on Grid North, Maine State Coordinate System of 1983, West Zone.

The within described boundary line being the same shown on a plan entitled "Standard Boundary Survey: Durham & Pownal Municipal Boundary Retracement Survey" dated December 22, 1998 by Mann Associates, Inc. to be recorded in the Cumberland County Registry of Deeds and the Androscoggin County Registry of Deeds.

## CHAPTER 10

S.P. 342 - L.D. 996

### An Act to Strengthen the Criminal Justice Response to Domestic Violence

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

**Sec. 1. Allocation.** The following funds are allocated from Other Special Revenue funds to carry out the purposes of this Act.

## CHAPTER 11

H.P. 1065 - L.D. 1496

### An Act to Amend the Charter of the Kennebunk Sewer District

**Emergency preamble.** Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

**Whereas,** this legislation requires referendum approval before it can take effect; and

**Whereas,** this referendum is connected with the Kennebunk town meeting to be held on June 8, 1999; and

**Whereas,** unless this Act is enacted before that date, the referendum will require a special election, which would be a considerable financial burden on the Town of Kennebunk; and

**Whereas,** in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

**Sec. 1. P&SL 1955, c. 69, §1,** as amended by P&SL 1995, c. 7, §1 and affected by §2, is further amended to read:

**Sec. 1. Territorial limits.** The territory ~~and the inhabitants of the Kennebunk Sewer District is identical to the boundaries~~ of the Town of Kennebunk situated between the Atlantic Ocean and the southeasterly side of the Maine Turnpike and the territory of the Town of Kennebunk situated on the northwesterly side of the Maine Turnpike and described on the March 1994 Town of Kennebunk tax maps as follows: Map 36, Lot 5; Map 36, Lot 6; P/O 36, Lot 7; P/O 36, Lot 7A; Map 36, Lot 7B; P/O 37, Lot 5; Map 45, Lot 18; Map 45, Lot 18A; Map 45, Lot 19; P/O 45, Lot 14; P/O 78, Lot 18; Map 88, Lot 15; Map 88, Lot 24; Map 88, Lot 24A; Map 88, Lot 24B; Map 89, Lot 1; Map 89, Lot 20 and the inhabitants of that territory are a public sewerage district and a body politic and corporate under the name of "Kennebunk Sewer District," which is a system of public sewerage constructed, maintained and operated for the public health and welfare and for the benefit of the residents and of the property in the town served by the sewerage facility, in the manner, with the rights, duties and immunities described in this Act.
