#### **CHAPTER 100**

#### H.P. 1625 - L.D. 2125

Resolve, Regarding Legislative Review of Chapter 50: Variance From Educational Qualifications for Issuance of an Interim Forester License, a Major Substantive Rule of the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, Office of Licensing and Regulation

**Emergency preamble. Whereas,** Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

**Whereas,** the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter II-A requires legislative authorization before major substantive agency rules may be finally adopted by the agency; and

Whereas, the above-named major substantive rule has been submitted to the Legislature for review; and

Whereas, immediate enactment of this resolve is necessary to record the Legislature's position on final adoption of the rule; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

**Sec. 1. Adoption. Resolved:** That final adoption of Chapter 50: Variance From Educational Qualifications for Issuance of an Interim Forester License, a provisionally adopted major substantive rule of the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, that has been submitted to the Legislature for review pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter II-A is authorized.

**Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

#### H.P. 1632 - L.D. 2135

Resolve, Regarding Legislative Review of Chapter 21: Statewide Standards for Timber Harvesting in Shoreland Areas, a Major Substantive Rule of the Department of Conservation

**Emergency preamble. Whereas,** Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

**Whereas,** the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter II-A requires legislative authorization before major substantive agency rules may be finally adopted by the agency; and

Whereas, the above-named major substantive rule has been submitted to the Legislature for review; and

Whereas, immediate action on this resolve is necessary to record the Legislature's position on final adoption of the rule; and

Whereas, regulatory consistency continues to be an important public policy goal for the health of Maine's forest economy and natural resources; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Sec. 1. Adoption not authorized. Resolved: That final adoption of Chapter 21: Statewide Standards for Timber Harvesting in Shoreland Areas, a provisionally adopted major substantive rule of the Department of Conservation, that has been submitted to the Legislature for review pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter II-A is not authorized; and be it further

**Sec. 2. Report. Resolved:** That the Commissioner of Conservation, no later than January 2, 2003, shall report back to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over forestry matters with recommendations for a regulatory framework and an implementation plan for the Maine Forest Service to assume existing responsibilities of the Department of Environmental Protection and the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission for timber
