#### **CHAPTER 519**

#### H.P. 1378 - L.D. 1968

An Act To Make Supplemental Appropriations and Allocations for the Expenditures of State Government and To Change Certain Provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 2006 and June 30,

Mandate preamble. This measure requires one or more local units of government to expand or modify activities so as to necessitate additional expenditures from local revenues but does not provide funding for at least 90% of those expenditures. Pursuant to the Constitution of Maine, Article IX, Section 21, 2/3 of all of the members elected to each House have determined it necessary to enact this measure.

**Emergency preamble. Whereas,** acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the 90-day period may not terminate until after the beginning of the next fiscal year; and

Whereas, certain obligations and expenses incident to the operation of state departments and institutions will become due and payable prior to June 30, 2006; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

# Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

#### PART A

Sec. A-1. Supplemental appropriations and allocations. There are appropriated and allocated from various funds for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2006 and June 30, 2007, to the departments listed, the following sums.

The following Other Special Revenue funds accounts are exempt from these calculations: the Public Reserved Lands Management Fund account and the Submerged Lands Fund account in the Department of Conservation; the Baxter State Park Authority account; the AMHI and BMHI Disproportionate Share accounts and the Public Drinking Water Fund account in the Department of Health and Human Services; the Truancy, Dropout and Alternative Education account

in the Department of Education; the Administrative Revolving Loan and Project account in the Department of Environmental Protection; the Kennebec Fisheries account in the Department of Marine Resources; the Nongame Endangered Species account, Resource Management - Land account, Fisheries and Hatcheries OPS - Lake and River Protection Fund account, Enforcement Operations - Lake and River Protection Fund account, Maine Wildlife Park Fund account, Public Information and Education - Lake and River Protection Fund account and Maine Outdoor Heritage Fund account in the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife; the Audit - Unorganized Territory account in the Department of Audit; and the Certified Seed Fund account in the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources; the Energy Conservation - Stripper Well account in the Department of Administrative and Financial Services; the Attorney General, Legal Assistance to Other Agencies, Consumer Fraud Division/Rust Book, Anti-Trust, Legal Services and Human Services - Division of accounts in the Department of the Attorney General; the Dirigo Health Fund account in Dirigo Health; the Land for Maine's Future Fund account in the Executive Department; the Maine Historic Preservation Commission account in the Maine Historic Preservation Commission; the Special Administrative Expense account in the Department of Labor; and the Turnpike Enforcement account in the Department of Public Safety.

**Sec. D-2. PL 2005, c. 12, Pt. II, §2** is amended to read:

Sec. II-2. Calculation and transfer; Other Special Revenue health insurance savings; **negotiated plan.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the State Budget Officer shall calculate the amount of savings in this Part that apply against each Other Special Revenue funds account for all departments and agencies from savings in the cost of health insurance and shall transfer the calculated amounts to the General Fund by financial order upon the approval of the Governor. These transfers are considered adjustments to allocations in fiscal year 2005-06 and 2006-07. The State Budget Officer shall provide the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs a report of the transferred amounts no later than November 1, 2005. The following Other Special Revenue funds accounts are exempt from these calculations: the Public Reserved Lands Management Fund account and the Submerged Lands Fund account in the Department of Conservation; the Baxter State Park Authority account; the Augusta Mental Health Institute and Bangor Mental Health Institute Disproportionate Share accounts and the Public Drinking Water Fund account in the Department of Health and Human Services; the Truancy, Dropout and Alternative Education account in the Department of Education; the Administrative Revolving Loan and Project account in the Department of Environmental Protection; the Kennebec Fisheries account in the Department of Marine Resources; the Nongame Endangered Species account, Resource Management - Land account, Fisheries and Hatcheries OPS - Lake and River Protection Fund account, Enforcement Operations - Lake and River Protection Fund account, Maine Wildlife Park Fund account, Public Information and Education - Lake and River Protection Fund account and Maine Outdoor Heritage Fund account in the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife; the Audit - Unorganized Territory account in the Department of Audit; and the Certified Seed Fund account in the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources; the Attorney General, Legal Assistance to Other Agencies, Consumer Fraud Division/Rust Book, Anti-Trust, Legal Services, and District Attorney -Forfeiture accounts in the Department of the Attorney General; the Maine Historic Preservation Commission account in the Maine Historic Preservation Commission; and the Turnpike Enforcement account in the Department of Public Safety.

**Sec. E-1. 5 MRSA §1583-A, first ¶,** as amended by PL 2005, c. 12, Pt. T, §2, is further amended to read:

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, limited period limited-period, project or other temporary positions may be established by financial order so long as the end date for those positions does not exceed the statutory adjournment date for the next regular session of the Legislature for a period not to exceed 2 years. Temporary positions established by financial order may not be continued past the statutory adjournment date for more than 2 years unless the Legislature specifically appropriates or allocates funds to continue those positions.

- B. Who is not domiciled in Maine, but maintains a permanent place of abode in this State and spends in the aggregate more than 183 days of the taxable year in this State, unless he the individual is in the Armed Forces of the United States.

The geographic location of a political organization or political candidate that receives one or more contributions from the individual is not in and of itself determinative on the question of whether the individual is domiciled in Maine. The geographic location of a professional advisor retained by an individual may not be used to determine whether or not an individual is domiciled in Maine. For purposes of this subsection, "professional advisor" includes, but is not limited to, a person that renders medical, financial, legal, accounting, insurance, fiduciary or investment services. Charitable contributions may not be used to determine whether or not an individual is domiciled in Maine.

The refundable credit allowed by this subsection is in lieu of the credit that is allowed to the taxpayer by subsection 1 or that would otherwise be passed through to its partners or shareholders, if any. The credit is allowed only for tax years that begin on or after January 1, 2006 but before January 1, 2010. The credit may not exceed \$500,000 per year, and unused credit amounts may be carried forward only through the 2009 tax year. In the event that more than one national historic landmark developer qualifies for the refundable credit allowed by this subsection, the maximum annual credit amount and credit carryforward limitations established by this subsection apply to all such developers collectively, and if necessary the State Tax Assessor shall prorate the credits between those developers based on their respective share of qualified expenses incurred. For the purposes of this subsection, "national historic landmark developer" means a person that owns 2 or more structures located in the Kennebec Arsenal District National Historic Landmark.

The Commissioner of Education, with advice from the advisory board established pursuant to Title 20-A, section 19109, shall submit a report that includes findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation to revise and update Title 20-A, chapters 606-B and 801, for presentation to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs and the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters during the Second Regular Session of the 123rd Legislature no later than January 31, 2008.

## §13090-L. Media production certification

- 1. Generally. A media production company that intends to undertake a media production in this State may apply to the department to have the production, or a portion of the production, certified under subsection 3 for purposes of media production reimbursement pursuant to Title 36, chapter 919-A and the credit under Title 36, section 5219-Y.
- **2. Definitions.** As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
  - A. "Media production" means a single-medium or multimedia feature film, television show or series, video, commercial, photographic project, interactive computer or video game or other program intended for a national audience and fixed on film, video tape, computer disk, laser disc or other delivery medium that can be viewed or reproduced and that is exhibited in theaters or by individual television stations or groups of stations, television networks or cable television stations or via other means or licensed for home viewing or use.

"Media production" does not include:

- (1) A news, current events or public programming show or a program that includes weather or market reports;
- (2) A talk show;
- (3) A sports event or activity;
- (4) A gala presentation or awards show;
- (5) A finished production that solicits funds; or
- (6) A production produced by a media production company if records, as required by 18 United States Code, Section 2257, are to be maintained by that media production company with respect to any performer portrayed in that production.

- B. "Media production company" means a person engaged in the business of producing a media production.
- C. "Media production expense" means an expense directly incurred during the creation of a media production. This term includes wages and salaries of individuals employed in the production on which taxes have been paid or accrued; the cost of construction, operations, editing and related services, still and motion photography, sound recording and synchronization, lighting, wardrobe and accessories; and the rental of facilities and equipment, including location fees. The term does not include expenses incurred in marketing and advertising a media production or in printing or otherwise disseminating a media production.
- D. "Person" has the same meaning as in Title 36, section 111, subsection 3.
- 3. Requirements for media production certificate. Applications for a media production certificate must be made on a form prescribed and furnished by the department. The applicant must:
  - A. Provide the names of the principals involved in the media production and contact information for them;
  - B. Provide a certificate of insurance for the media production;
  - C. Provide financial information that demonstrates that the media production is economically sound and that at least \$250,000 of media production expense will be incurred in Maine during a period of 12 consecutive months;
  - D. Provide data demonstrating that the media production will benefit the people of the State by increasing opportunities for employment and will strengthen the economy of the State;
  - E. Agree to include, in all certified media productions, an on-screen credit for the State of Maine. The exact wording and size of that credit must be determined in rules adopted by the Maine State Film Office and the department. The Maine State Film Office or the department may, at its discretion, exempt media productions from this requirement. Rules adopted pursuant to this paragraph are routine technical rules as defined in chapter 375, subchapter 2-A;
  - F. Provide evidence that the media production company is not owned by, affiliated with or controlled by, in whole or in part, a person that is in default on a loan made by the State or a loan guaranteed by the State; and

G. Provide any other information required by the department.

To qualify for a media production certificate, a media production company must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the commissioner that the media production company has met, or will meet, the expectations and requirements under paragraphs B, C, D, E, F and G. If the department determines that the applicant does not qualify for a media production certificate, it must inform the applicant of that determination in writing within 4 weeks of receiving the application. As soon as practicable, the department shall issue a media production certificate for a media production that The department shall include with the qualifies. certificate information regarding qualification for a tax reimbursement and credit certificate pursuant to subsection 4 and procedures for claiming reimbursement under Title 36, chapter 919-A and the credit under Title 36, section 5219-Y.

- 4. Tax reimbursement and credit certificate. Within 4 weeks of completion of a certified media production, the media production company shall confirm its compliance with the requirements of subsection 3 with respect to the certified media production. Upon determining compliance by the media production company, the department shall issue to the company a tax reimbursement and credit certificate. The tax reimbursement and credit certificate entitle the media production company to claim the reimbursement provided by Title 36, chapter 919-A and the credit under Title 36, section 5219-Y.
- 5. Department to provide information to State Tax Assessor. The department shall provide to the State Tax Assessor copies of tax reimbursement and credit certificates issued in accordance with subsection 4, together with any other information reasonably required by the State Tax Assessor for the administration of media production reimbursement under Title 36, chapter 919-A and the credit under Title 36, section 5219-Y.
- 6. Rulemaking. The department shall develop rules as necessary to administer this section in cooperation with the State Tax Assessor. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are routine technical rules as defined in chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.
- **Sec. GG-2. 36 MRSA §5219-Y** is enacted to read:

## §5219-Y. Certified media production credit

1. Credit allowed. A media production company, as defined in section 6901, subsection 5, is allowed a credit against the taxes imposed by this Part in an amount equal to the Maine income tax imposed on income directly related to a certified media production as defined in section 6901, subsection 1.

If the media production company realizes income from a certified media production and also has Mainesource income from other sources, the credit allowed under this section is based on a fraction of the media production company's entire Maine income tax liability for the year. The fraction is equal to the media production company's compensation paid during the tax year related to the certified media production divided by the media production company's total Maine compensation paid. For purposes of this paragraph, "compensation" has the same meaning as in section 5210, subsection 3. If the calculation provided by this paragraph does not fairly reflect the tax liability associated with the media production company's certified media production, the media production company may petition for, or the State Tax Assessor may require, the employment of another reasonable method to make an equitable determination of the Maine tax associated with the media production company's certified media production.

2. Limitation. The credit allowed by this section may not reduce the tax otherwise due under this Part below zero and may be used only in the year in which the certified media production income is generated. Taxpayers claiming a credit under section 5219-W are not eligible for this credit.

### **CHAPTER 919-A**

### MEDIA PRODUCTION REIMBURSEMENT

### §6901. Definitions

As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

- 1. Certified media production. "Certified media production" means a media production that has been certified by the Department of Economic and Community Development for eligibility for reimbursement under this chapter in accordance with Title 5, section 13090-L.
- 2. Certified production wages. "Certified production wages" means wages that are paid during the project period by a media production company that has been issued a tax reimbursement certificate in accordance with Title 5, section 13090-L and that are subject to withholding pursuant to chapter 827. "Certified production wages" does not include any wages in excess of \$1,000,000 paid to a single individual for personal services rendered in connection with a particular certified media production.

- 3. Commissioner. "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services.
- **4. Media production.** "Media production" has the same meaning as in Title 5, section 13090-L, subsection 2, paragraph A.
- 5. Media production company. "Media production company" has the same meaning as in Title 5, section 13090-L, subsection 2, paragraph B.
- 6. Project period. "Project period" means the period of time, not to exceed 12 consecutive months, that a media production company is engaged in the business of producing a media production or productions.
- **7. Resident of Maine.** "Resident of Maine" means a person who:
  - A. Filed as a resident individual under Part 8 on that person's most recently filed Maine income tax return;
  - B. If no income tax return was required, who could have filed as a resident individual under Part 8 if a return had been required; or
  - C. Was claimed, or could have been claimed, as a dependent on the Maine income tax return of an individual who filed as a resident individual under Part 8 on the filer's most recently filed Maine income tax return.

## §6902. Reimbursement allowed; procedure; audits

- 1. Generally. A media production company certified pursuant to Title 5, section 13090-L is allowed a reimbursement equal to 12% of certified production wages paid to employees who are residents of Maine and 10% of certified production wages paid to other employees.
- 2. Procedure for reimbursement. On or before the 15th day of the month immediately following receipt of a tax reimbursement certificate pursuant to Title 5, section 13090-L, subsection 4, a media production company shall report to the State Tax Assessor and to the Department of Economic and Community Development that portion of certified production wages paid during the project period, together with any additional information the assessor may reasonably require. The assessor shall report to the commissioner the reimbursement amount to which a media production company is entitled. The commissioner shall deposit the reported amounts on or before June 30th of each year in a media production reimbursement account established, maintained and administered by the commissioner and shall pay the

reported amounts to each certified media production company on or before July 31st of each year.

3. Audit process. This chapter may not be construed to limit the authority of the State Tax Assessor to conduct an audit of any media production company certified pursuant to Title 5, section 13090-L. When the assessor determines that a distribution larger than that authorized by this chapter has been received by any person, the assessor may enforce repayment of the overpayment by assessment pursuant to the provisions of chapter 7 or may apply the overpayment against subsequent reimbursements made pursuant to this chapter. If the assessor determines that an overpayment is the result of fraud on the part of a media production company, the assessor may disqualify that company from receiving any future distributions pursuant to this chapter.

- 2. Chief advocate. A chief advocate shall direct and coordinate the program of the office.
  - A. The chief advocate shall report administratively to the commissioner and advise, consult with and inform the commissioner on the issues described in this section.

- B. The chief advocate shall select other advocates needed to carry out the intent of this section who report only to the chief advocate.
- C. Both the chief advocate and all other advocates are classified state employees.
- 3. Duties. The Office of Advocacy, through the chief advocate and the other advocates, shall:
  - A. Receive or refer complaints made by clients of the department and represent the interests of clients in any matter pertaining to the rights and dignity of clients;
  - B. Intercede on behalf of these clients with officials of the institutions, facilities and agencies administered, licensed or funded by the department, except that the Office of Advocacy may refuse to take action on any complaint that it considers to be trivial or moot or for which there is clearly another remedy available;
  - C. Assist clients in any hearing or grievance proceeding of the department;
  - D. Refer clients to other agencies or entities for the purpose of advocating for the rights and dignity of these persons;
  - E. Act as an information source regarding the rights of all clients, keeping itself informed about all laws, administrative rules and institutional and other policies relating to the rights and dignity of the clients and about relevant legal decisions and other developments related to the field of mental health and mental retardation, both in this State and in other parts of the country;
  - F. Make and publish reports necessary to the performance of the duties described in this section. The chief advocate may report findings of the office to groups outside the department, such as legislative bodies, advisory committees, commissions, law enforcement agencies and the press, and may authorize the advocates in the office to so communicate. At least annually, the chief advocate shall report both in person and in writing to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over mental health and mental retardation matters; and
  - H. Make all necessary reports to the commissioner to assist the department in assuring compliance with the community consent decree, Consumer Advisory Board et al. V. Glover, No. 91-321-P-C (D. Me., September 28, 1994), as it relates to the responsibilities and functions of the Office of Advocacy.

- 4. Access to files and records. The Office of Advocacy, through the chief advocate and the other advocates, has access, limited only by the law, to the files, records and personnel of any institution, facility or agency administered, licensed or funded by the department. All persons with knowledge about an incident related to client care, including client-to-client assault, staff-to-client assault, client-to-staff assault, excessive use of seclusion or mechanical or chemical restraint, incidents stemming from questionable psychiatric and medical practice or any other alleged abuse or neglect, shall immediately report the details of that incident to the Office of Advocacy. A copy of an incident report must be provided to the Office of Advocacy by the person making the report.
- 5. Confidentiality. Requests for action must be treated confidentially as follows.
  - A. Any client request for action by the office and all written records or accounts related to the request are confidential as to the identity of the client.
  - B. The records and accounts referred to in paragraph A may be released only as provided by law.
- **6.** Client; definition. For the purposes of this section, "client" means a person receiving, seeking or requesting services for persons with mental retardation.
- 7. Protection for advocate. An advocate may not be disciplined or sanctioned for any actions taken on behalf of a client.
- **8. Budget.** When submitting a budget request to the Legislature, the department and the Governor shall provide that any funds for the Office of Advocacy be listed in a separate account.

## **CHAPTER 914-A**

## MAINE USE TAX COMPLIANCE PROGRAM

### §6581. Program established

The Maine Use Tax Compliance Program, referred to in this chapter as "the program," is established to encourage delinquent taxpayers to comply with the provisions of chapter 215, to enable the State Tax Assessor to identify and collect previously unreported use tax and to improve compliance with the State's use tax laws. The program applies to use tax liabilities incurred by a person prior to January 1, 2006.

## §6582. Definitions

As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

- 1. Lookback period. "Lookback period" means the period from January 1, 2000 to December 31, 2005.
- **2. Program period.** "Program period" means the period from July 1, 2006 to December 31, 2006.

## §6583. Administration; conditions for participation

The State Tax Assessor shall administer the program. Participation in the program is conditioned upon each participating taxpayer's agreement to forgo the right to protest or pursue an administrative or judicial proceeding with regard to use taxes paid under the program. A participating taxpayer that timely

submits the special use tax return as required by subsection 2 with no material misrepresentations or material omissions and that timely makes the use tax payment or payments required by subsections 3 and 4 is absolved from further liability for use taxes incurred prior to January 1, 2006 and is also absolved from liability for criminal prosecution and civil penalties and interest related to those taxes. The following conditions apply to the program.

- 1. Limited to unknown liabilities. The program is limited to unknown liabilities only. For purposes of this subsection, an "unknown liability" is a use tax liability that has not been assessed at the time the special use tax return described in section 6584 is received by the assessor.
- 2. Return filed and tax liability reported. A participating taxpayer must properly complete and file with the assessor, before the end of the program period, a special use tax return as described in section 6584 reporting all previously unreported and unpaid State of Maine use tax liabilities incurred by the taxpayer during the lookback period.
- 3. Tax paid; 3 high years. Except as provided by subsection 4, a participating taxpayer must pay in full, by the end of the program period, the use tax liability incurred by the taxpayer during the 3 calendar years of the lookback period with the highest use tax liability as reported on the special use tax return described in section 6584. A participating taxpayer must agree to forgo the right to seek a refund of, or file a petition for reconsideration with respect to, the tax paid with the return.
- 4. Payment plans allowed; interest. A participating taxpayer may elect to make payment of the taxes reported under the program after the expiration of the program period, but only pursuant to a payment plan approved by the assessor. A payment plan approved by the assessor may not provide for payments beyond December 31, 2007. Interest at the rate established pursuant to section 186 accrues on any payments made after the expiration of the program period.

## §6584. Program return

The State Tax Assessor shall prepare and make available special use tax returns for taxpayers who wish to participate in the program. The return must be signed by the taxpayer under penalty of perjury. The return and associated program guidelines prepared by the assessor are not rules within the meaning of that term in the Maine Administrative Procedure Act. The assessor shall deny any special use tax return that is inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter or that is filed after the conclusion of the program period.

# §6585. Undisclosed and future use tax liabilities; other settlements

Nothing in this chapter may be construed to prohibit the State Tax Assessor from instituting civil or criminal proceedings, including but not limited to an audit, against any taxpayer with respect to any amount of use tax incurred during or after the lookback period that is not disclosed on either the special use tax return filed by the taxpayer in connection with the program or another return filed by the taxpayer with the assessor. Nothing in this chapter may be construed to limit a taxpayer's right to protest or pursue an administrative or judicial proceeding with regard to an assessment of such undisclosed taxes. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the assessor may, prior to July 1, 2006, compromise an unknown use tax liability on terms substantially equal to the terms set forth in this chapter, and in such a case the taxpayer is absolved from liability for criminal prosecution and civil penalties related to those taxes.

The Superior Court, as established, shall consist consists of 15 justices until June 30, 1986, and 16 17 justices thereafter, and such Active Retired Justices as may be appointed and serving on the court, learned in the law and of sobriety of manners. The Chief Justice of the Superior Court shall assign the Justices of the Superior Court to preside at various locations of the court. Whenever it becomes necessary, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court may designate a Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court or any Active Retired Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court to hold a term of Superior Court. The Chief Justice of the Superior Court may, when necessary, assign an Active Retired Justice of the Superior Court to hold a term of Superior Court. The Chief Justice of the Superior Court may designate any Justice of the Superior Court and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court may designate any Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court to hold one or more sessions of the Superior Court, separate from the session presided over by the justice holding the regular trial term.

- 1. Appointment. District Court Judges shall be are appointed as follows.
  - A. The Governor, subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over judiciary matters and to confir-

mation by the Legislature, shall appoint to the District Court 33 36 judges. At least one judge must be appointed from each district who is a resident of a county in which the district lies, except that in District 3 there must be 2 judges appointed who are residents of a county in which the district lies; in District 6 there must be 2 judges appointed who are residents of a county in which the district lies; and in District 9 there must be 2 judges appointed who are residents of a county in which the district lies. Each District Court Judge has a term of office of 7 years.

The Chief Judge, with the approval of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court, shall designate one of the District Court Judges as Deputy Chief Judge who has all the duties, powers and responsibilities of the Chief Judge when the Chief Judge is unable to perform them because of illness, absence or disability.

    - (d) "Sustainably managed" means:

- (i) A forest management and harvest plan, as defined in section 573, subsection 3-A, has been prepared for the eligible timberlands and has been in effect for the entire time period used to compute the amount of the subtraction modification under this paragraph; and
- (ii) The taxpayer has received a written statement from a licensed forester certifying that, as of the time of the sale, the eligible timberlands have been managed in accordance with the plan under subdivision (i) during that period.
- (2) To the extent they are included in the taxpayer's federal adjusted gross income, the following amounts must be subtracted from federal adjusted gross income:
  - (a) For eligible timberlands held by the taxpayer for at least a 10-year period beginning on or after January 1, 2005 but less than an 11-year period beginning on or after January 1, 2005, 1/15 of the gain recognized on the sale of the eligible timberlands;

When assistance is requested under this subparagraph, the director or the director's designee may enter and examine the timberlands for the purpose of determining whether the timberlands have been managed sustainably.

In the case of timberlands owned by an entity that is treated as a pass-through entity for income tax purposes, the land must be treated as eligible timberland if ownership and use of the land by the pass-through entity satisfies the requirements of this paragraph. If the owner of the eligible timberlands is an S corporation, the taxpayer must subtract the owner's pro rata share of the gain. If the owner of the timberlands is a partnership or limited liability company taxed as a

  - B. "Organic material" means material that produces energy when burned, including organic waste, municipal sludge and sewage and oceanic and terrestrial crops.
  - C. "Pollution-reducing boiler or furnace system" means a boiler or furnace system placed into operation on or after January 1, 2006 that, without increasing the total output of nitrogen-oxygen compounds, burns organic material while:
    - (1) Eliminating the amount of emissions of oxides of nitrogen that would have resulted from using air for combustion; and
    - (2) Meeting standards established by the department.
- 2. Tax credit; transferability. A business that uses a pollution-reducing boiler or furnace system on the site of its business, certified by the department, is entitled to a credit against taxes due under this Part. The amount of the tax credit is equal to 1.5¢ per kilowatt-hour or its equivalent in heat energy produced by the pollution-reducing boiler or furnace system, but in no case may the credit exceed the amount of tax owed pursuant to this Part. The department shall annually certify the number of kilowatt-hours or its equivalent in heat energy produced by a certified pollution-reducing boiler or furnace system. Tax

credits earned pursuant to this section may be carried over from one tax year to the next.

- 3. Other boiler or furnace system. A business that modifies a boiler or furnace system placed into operation prior to January 1, 2006 may qualify for the tax credit pursuant to subsection 2 if the existing boiler or furnace system is certified by the department as used in conjunction with technology that:
  - A. Eliminates the amount of emissions of oxides of nitrogen that would have resulted from using air for combustion; and
  - B. Meets standards established by the department.

The amount of the tax credit is limited to the kilowatthours or equivalent in heat energy produced certified by the department as attributable to the technology used in the boiler or furnace system.

  - B. Any contractual agreement for administrative or managed behavioral health care services must include utilization review functions for all categories of services;
  - C. The administrative services organization or managed care organization may perform ratesetting functions without regard to current levels of reimbursement for providers of services; and
  - D. During the first year of any contract, the administrative services organization or managed care organization shall contract with all providers of mental health services that meet departmental requirements and receive MaineCare funding as of June 30, 2006.

  - B. In a municipality where the responsibility for final adoption of the school budget is vested by the municipal charter in a council, this paragraph applies, except that the petition and referendum

provisions apply only if the municipal charter does not otherwise provide for or prohibit a petition and referendum process with respect to the matters described in this paragraph.

- (1) A majority of the entire membership of the school board or committee must approve the additional amount in a regular budget meeting.
- (2) An article approving the additional amount must conform to the requirements of section 15690, subsection 3, paragraph B and be approved by a majority of the entire membership of the council in a vote taken in accordance with section 15690, subsection 5 or, if the council votes not to approve the article, by a majority of voters voting in a referendum called pursuant to subparagraph (4).
- (3) If an article is approved by the council pursuant to subparagraph (2), the voters may petition for a referendum vote on the same article in accordance with subparagraph (4). If a petition is filed in accordance with subparagraph (4), the vote of the council is suspended pending the outcome of the referendum vote. Upon approval of the article by a majority of the voters voting in that referendum, the article takes effect. If the article is not approved by a majority of the voters voting in that referendum, the article does not take effect. Subsequent to the vote, the school committee or board may again propose an additional amount, subject to the requirements of this section.
- (4) If a written petition, signed by at least 10% of the number of voters voting in the last gubernatorial election in the municipality, requesting a vote on the additional amount is submitted to the municipal officers within 30 days of the council's vote pursuant to subparagraph (2), the article voted on by the council must be submitted to the legal voters in the next regular election or a special election called for the purpose. The election must be held within 45 days of the submission of the petition. The election must be called, advertised and conducted according to the law relating to municipal elections, except that the registrar of voters is not required to prepare or the clerk to post a new list of voters and absentee ballots must be prepared and made available at least 14 days prior to the date of the referendum. For the purpose of registration of voters, the registrar of voters must be in session the secular day preceding the elec-

tion. The voters shall indicate by a cross or check mark placed against the word "Yes" or "No" their opinion on the article. The results must be declared by the municipal officers and entered upon the municipal records.

- C. A school administrative district or community school district that meets the eligibility criteria in paragraph A must have its local contribution adjusted as follows.
  - (1) For each municipality in the district that meets the eligibility criteria in paragraph A, the municipality's local contribution as determined pursuant to Title 20-A, section 15688 must be reduced by an amount equal to the transition amount determined in paragraph B.

A reasonable certainty that severe physical or mental impairment or injury will result to the person alleged to be mentally ill as manifested by recent evidence of his the person's actions or behavior which demonstrate his that demonstrates the person's inability to avoid or protect himself the person from such impairment or injury, and, after consideration of less restrictive treatment settings and modalities, a determination that suitable community resources for his the person's care are unavailable; or

# Sec. BBBB-2. 34-B MRSA §3801, sub-§4, ¶D is enacted to read:

- D. For the purposes of section 3873, subsection 5, in view of the person's treatment history, current behavior and inability to make an informed decision, a reasonable likelihood that deterioration of the person's mental health will occur and that the person will in the foreseeable future pose:
  - (1) A substantial risk of physical harm to the person as manifested by evidence of recent threats of, or attempts at, suicide or serious bodily harm;
  - (2) A substantial risk of physical harm to other persons as manifested by recent evidence of homicidal or other violent behavior or recent evidence that others are placed in reasonable fear of violent behavior and serious physical harm to themselves; or

- **7-A.** Progressive treatment program. "Progressive treatment program" or "program" means a program of court-ordered services provided to participants under section 3873.

"Severe and persistent mental illness" means a diagnosis of one or more qualifying mental illnesses or disorders plus a listed disability or functional impairment that has persisted continuously or intermittently or is expected to persist for at least one year as a result of that disease or disorder. The qualifying mental illnesses or disorders are schizophrenia, schizoaffective disorder or other psychotic disorder, major depressive disorder, bipolar disorder or a combination of mental disorders sufficiently disabling to meet the criteria of functional disability. The listed disabilities or functional impairments, which must result from a diagnosed qualifying mental illness or disorder, include inability to adequately manage one's own finances, inability to perform activities of daily living and inability to behave in ways that do not bring the attention of law enforcement for dangerous acts or for acts that manifest the person's inability to protect the person from harm.
- 10. Inability to make an informed decision.

  "Inability to make an informed decision" means being

unable to make a responsible decision whether to accept or refuse a recommended treatment as a result of lack of mental capacity to understand sufficiently the benefits and risks of the treatment after a thorough and informative explanation has been given by a qualified mental health professional.

11. Assertive community treatment. "Assertive community treatment" or "ACT" means a selfcontained service with a fixed point of responsibility for providing treatment, rehabilitation and support services to persons with mental illness for whom other community-based treatment approaches have been unsuccessful. Assertive community treatment uses clinical and rehabilitative staff to address symptom stability; relapse prevention; maintenance of safe, affordable housing in normative settings that promote well-being; establishment of natural support networks to combat isolation and withdrawal; the minimizing of involvement with the criminal justice system; individual recovery education; and services to enable the person to function at a work site. Assertive community treatment is provided by multidisciplinary teams who are on duty 24 hours per day, 7 days per week; teams must include a psychiatrist, registered nurse, certified rehabilitation counselor or certified employment specialist, a peer recovery specialist and a substance abuse counselor and may include an occupational therapist, community-based mental health rehabilitation technician, psychologist, licensed clinical social worker or licensed clinical professional counselor. An ACT team member who is a state employee is, while in good faith performing a function as a member of an ACT team, performing a discretionary function within the meaning of Title 14, section 8104-B, subsection 3.

**Sec. BBBB-4. 34-B MRSA §3832, sub-§1,** as amended by PL 1983, c. 580, §10, is further amended to read:

- 1. Patient's right. A patient admitted under section 3831 is free to leave the hospital at any time after admission without undue delay following examination by a licensed physician or a licensed clinical psychologist, except that within 16 hours of the patient's request unless application for admission of the person under section 3863 is not precluded, if at any time such an admission is considered necessary in the interest of the person and of the community initiated within that time.
- **Sec. BBBB-5. 34-B MRSA §3863, sub-§2,** ¶**B,** as amended by PL 1997, c. 438, §2, is further amended to read:

- (1) The superintendent of a state mental health institute may file an application for an order of admission to the progressive treatment program with the District Court.

  - (a) A finding that the person meets the criteria of paragraph B;
  - (b) A finding that an assertive community treatment team is available to provide treatment and care for the person; and
  - (c) A provision in the order that requires the person to return to the state mental health institute pursuant to subsection 5 in the event of failure to fully participate and deterioration of the person's mental health so that hospitalization is in the person's best interest and the person poses a likelihood of serious harm as defined in section 3801, subsection 4, paragraph D.

#### B. The person must:

- (1) Be 21 years of age or older;
- (2) Have been clinically determined to be suffering from a severe and persistent mental illness;
- (3) Have been under an order of involuntary commitment to a state mental health institute at the time of filing of the application for progressive treatment; and
- (4) Have been clinically determined to be in need of the progressive treatment program in order to prevent interruptions in treatment, relapse and deterioration of mental health and to enable the person to survive safely in a community setting in the reasonably foreseeable future without posing a likelihood of serious harm as defined in section 3801, subsection 4, paragraph D. A determination under this subparagraph must be based on current behavior, treatment history, documented history of positive responses to treatment while hospitalized, relapse and deterioration of mental health after discharge and inability to make informed decisions regarding treatment.

- 3. Duration of participation. Except as provided in subsections 4 and 5, participation in the progressive treatment program must be for a term of 6 months. Participation ends if a person successfully completes the program in accordance with subsection 4 or is hospitalized pursuant to a court order entered under subsection 5. Participation in the program is temporarily suspended if the person is voluntarily rehospitalized and recommences upon discharge from the hospital.
- 4. Successful completion. A person who fully participates in the program and who follows the individualized treatment plan successfully completes the program upon expiration of 6 months or certification by the assertive community treatment team physician or psychologist that the person is no longer in need of the services of the program.
- 5. Termination of participation. Failure of a person to fully participate in the program and follow the individualized treatment plan may result in termination of participation in the program and rehospitalization under this subsection.
  - A. If the person does not fully participate in the program and follow the individualized treatment plan and if the assertive community treatment team physician or psychologist determines, based on clinical findings, that as a result of failure to fully participate or follow the individualized treatment plan the person's mental health has deteriorated so that hospitalization is in the person's best interest and the person poses a likelihood of serious harm as defined in section 3801, subsection 4, paragraph D, the assertive community treatment team physician or psychologist shall complete a certificate stating that the person requires hospitalization and the grounds for that belief. The person may agree to hospitalization or may be subject to an application for readmission under paragraph B.
  - B. A person who participates in the progressive treatment program may be rehospitalized on an emergency basis under the provisions of section 3863 if the judicial officer reviewing the certificate under section 3863, subsection 3 finds that rehospitalization is in the person's best interest and that the person poses a likelihood of serious harm as defined in section 3801, subsection 4, paragraph D. This paragraph does not preclude the use of protective custody by law enforcement officers pursuant to section 3862.
  - C. A person who participates in the progressive treatment program may be committed under section 3864 if the court reviewing the application finds that hospitalization is in the person's best interest and that the person poses a likelihood of

- serious harm as defined in section 3801, subsection 4, paragraph D.
- D. If the person has an advance directive or durable power of attorney or a guardian, the advance directive may be admitted into evidence and the attorney in fact or guardian may provide testimony and evidence to the court in any proceeding under this subsection. The court shall consider but is not required to follow any directions within the advance directive or durable power of attorney document or testimony from the attorney or guardian.
- **6. Repeal.** This section is repealed July 1, 2010.
- **Sec. BBBB-15. Implementation.** Implementation of the progressive treatment program under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 34-B, section 3873 is subject to the following provisions.
- 1. The Department of Health and Human Services shall undertake a thorough review of the needs of persons who are eligible to participate in the progressive treatment program and the resources currently used to provide services to meet those needs. The department shall analyze the current costs of community-based care and hospitalization in community hospitals and state mental health institutes for persons who would be eligible to participate in the program. By October 1, 2006 the department shall report to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services with proposals for funding the progressive treatment program to the maximum extent possible by redirection of existing resources and use of funds that will not be needed because of participation in the program.
- 2. Operation of the progressive treatment program is limited for fiscal year 2006-07 to a project that may serve up to a maximum of 25 persons who are hospitalized on an involuntary basis at the Riverview Psychiatric Center, to be served by a combination of state employees and contracted staff, and up to a maximum of 25 persons who are hospitalized on an involuntary basis at the Dorothea Dix Psychiatric Center, to be served by community providers. During fiscal year 2006-07 the development of new resources or redirection of existing resources for a new assertive community treatment team is limited to one team serving persons who were previously hospitalized at Riverview Psychiatric Center and one team serving persons who were previously hospitalized at the Dorothea Dix Psychiatric Center.
- Sec. BBBB-16. Educational and training materials. The Department of Health and Human Services shall develop and distribute educational and training materials with input from interested consumer, advocacy and professional organizations

describing assertive community treatment, guardianship, advance directives, convalescent status, the process for medications for hospitalized patients and the progressive treatment program for distribution to the courts, judges, providers of mental health services, law enforcement officials, consumers, family members and the general public.

Sec. BBBB-17. Department rules on progressive treatment program. The Department of Health and Human Services shall amend its Maine-Care rules in Section 17, "Community Support Services," to prohibit any provider of assertive community treatment from rejecting any person participating in the progressive treatment program.

**Sec. BBBB-18. Reports.** The Department of Health and Human Services shall submit reports describing the progress in the implementation and the measurable outcomes of the progressive treatment program to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters on or before April 1, 2007 and January 1, 2008, 2009 and 2010.

Sec. CCCC-1. Reimbursement of heating costs. Notwithstanding any provision of law or rule to the contrary, the Department of Health and Human Services shall amend its rules for the reimbursement of nursing facilities and residential care facilities to provide a one-time payment for increased heating costs incurred during the 2005-2006 heating season for nursing facilities and residential care facilities to be paid before July 1, 2006. The amount of \$400,000 appropriated from the General Fund for this purpose must be used to reimburse residential care facilities for increased heating costs, regardless of any limitation otherwise applicable to reimbursement for residential care facilities. The amount of \$300,000 allocated from Other Special Revenue Funds for this purpose must be used as the state share of Medicaid reimbursement, to be matched by federal financial participation funds, to reimburse nursing facilities for increased heating costs, regardless of any limitation or cap on routine costs otherwise applicable to the reimbursement for nursing facilities. If the full costs of heating for the 2005-2006 heating season cannot be met with the funds appropriated and allocated under this Part, the Department of Health and Human Services shall distribute the funds appropriated in this Part in proportion to the share of the total annual heating costs of these facilities funded through the General Fund that are set forth in each facility's recent MaineCare audited cost report for its fiscal year ending in 2004. If the MaineCare audit for 2004 has not been completed at the time of calculating the distribution of funds under this section, then the cost

report for the fiscal year ending in 2004 as filed with the Department of Health and Human Services must be used. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are routine technical rules as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

- B. A determination under rules adopted pursuant to subsection 3 that a drug or category of drug is not covered by the MaineCare program is a final agency action subject to review under the Maine Administrative Procedure Act.

# An Act To Maintain Standards for the Plumbing Profession

  - B. A minimum of 2,000 hours of work in the field of plumbing installations as a journeyman-in-training under the supervision of a licensed master plumber, as long as the work experience is obtained within 4 years of the date upon which the applicant was issued a journeyman-in-training license. A journeyman-in-training license must be issued upon sworn application to any person who has satisfactorily completed one academic year of instruction in plumbing at a board-approved technical college or community college or a registered Department of Labor joint apprenticeship program and who has obtained a passing grade, as determined by the board on the journeyman's examination.

# An Act To Amend the Laws Governing Permanency Guardians

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- **Sec. 1. 22 MRSA \$4038-C, sub-\$7,** as enacted by PL 2005, c. 372, \$6, is amended to read:
- 7. Effect on inheritance rights and public benefits. The appointment of a permanency guardian does not affect the inheritance rights between a child and the child's parent or parents.

The appointment of a permanency guardian may not affect the child's entitlement to benefits due that child from any 3rd person, agency or state or the United States. The Except as required by federal law or regulation, the permanency guardian's resources and income are <u>not</u> counted in determining eligibility for any public benefit to which the child may be entitled.

The permanency guardianship does not affect the rights and benefits that a Native American derives
