Dear Senator Pray:

The Aging, Retirement and Veterans Committee has before it for consideration L.D. 1617, AN ACT to Modify Early Retirement Plans for State Employees Hired after September 30, 1983. This is the second bill referred to Committee this session addressing special plans for groups of state retirees.

The Committee feels this is a very complex issue and that a change such as that proposed in L.D. 1617 would have far reaching implications. Rather than deal with the issue of special plans in a hasty manner near the end of the session, we ask permission to carryover L.D. 1617 to the Second Regular Session of this Legislature.

The Committee wishes to actively study the policy questions raised by the bill during the interim. By doing so we will be ready to recommend appropriate action to be taken next session. To carry out our analysis, we request authorization to meet twice during the interim.

The enactment of the Alcohol Premium law initiated a new process for the planning and funding of alcoholism services in Maine. The Joint Select Committee on Alcoholism Services of the 110th Legislature commissioned a study by the Foundation Associates of the alcoholism systems in the state. This study and the Committee's review of the interdepartmental plan for alcoholism services and allocation recommendations have pointed out several areas that need further investigation. These areas include prevention, evaluation, employee assistance programs and shelters.

6. Reason for study

The Committee has identified the need to study these areas of concern in order to enable the Legislature to be better prepared to evaluate the interdepartmental plan and allocation recommendations for the next fiscal year and, if necessary, to make changes in the planning process to accommodate identified needs.

3. Analysis of the problem

Increasing the use of peat for a variety of purposes is an active public policy question. A peat task force operating under the aegis of the University of Maine at Orono has focused on at least two major areas where expanded use of peat could benefit the State: in Agriculture as a soil amendment and as an alternative energy source. The committee on Agriculture is particularly interested in the potential advantages that peat could afford to Maine in its attempt to increase food production. This issue converges neatly with the need to develop a food policy statement for Maine, an issue the Joint Committee on Agriculture will study in the interim. A study by this committee will enable the Legislature to evaluate the benefits provided in using more of the state's peat reserves and weigh any potential environmental consequences.

5. Reason for study

Peat is an abundant natural resource in the State of Maine, but it is a non-renewable item and the extent of peat reserves are not known. AT the same time, however, several sections of the Maine economy are setting their sights on the increased use of peat, raising serious public policy questions about its appropriate uses as well as conservation considerations. Research at the University of Maine has proceeded to a point where the Legislature has the opportunity to study the issues and develop a posture to facilitate sensible utilization policies.

6. Members of subcommittee

The committee on Agriculture proposes to establish a 5 person subcommittee to study the use of peat. The subcommittee intends to meet 3 or 4 times during the off-session to pursue this inquiry.



RECOMMENDED COMMITTEE STUDY

1. COMMITTEE: Joint Standing Committee on Business Legislation.
2. SUBJECT OF STUDY: Regulation of the Financial Services Industry.
3. PRIORITY NUMBER: This is the second study request by the committee; nonetheless, the committee believes that this subject demands equal priority with the other request.
4. COMPLETION DATE: Second Regular Session, 111th Legislature.
5. ANALYSIS OF THE PROBLEM: A wide variety of financial services are currently provided by several different industries, including banks, insurance companies, investment and securities firms, private employee benefit plans and retail merchants. Due to federal deregulation and market factors, traditional distinctions between these fields and between market areas are vanishing at an alarming rate.

Meanwhile, State regulation continues to treat providers of financial services as distinct entities. Increasingly, State regulation finds itself incapable of addressing problems which arise due to the lack of resources or authority to regulate whole sectors of the industry. Some symptoms of the problem include:

- (1) Diminishing jurisdiction and resources of the Bureau of Consumer Credit Protection, due to the exodus of covered creditors to the system of federally-chartered financial institutions;
- (2) Loss of control by the Bureaus of Banking and Consumer Credit Protection by virtue of the exportation of integral parts of financial institutions across State borders, e.g., by the sale of credit card accounts to out-of-state interests, thus avoiding State jurisdiction over terms of credit;
- (3) Related to the previous point, the actions of other states and the federal government in regulating the financial services industry are having a substantial impact both on the State's ability to regulate this industry and for native Maine financial services companies to compete for funds;
- (4) The lack of a coordinated policy to address the forthcoming "financial supermarket," which could have drastic effects on Maine consumers and industry; and
- (5) The jeopardization of even current levels of regulation due to the inadequate resources being dedicated toward this effort.

6. REASON FOR STUDY: In the current and recent previous sessions, the Legislature as a whole and the Business Legislation committee in particular have been asked to address a number of the issues involved in this area through literally dozens of piecemeal measures. The difficult issues of interstate banking, bank insurance, consumer credit regulation, and insurance regulation are themselves only individual facets of the revolution in financial services delivery. While in some areas, such as interstate banking, the State of Maine has been a pioneer, in many areas the State is failing to address pressing issues which strike at the root of our ability to protect consumers while maintaining competitive equality for Maine's financial services industry and adequate capital for industrial development.

The purpose of this study is to begin a systematic review of this area, with an eye toward heading off problems before they occur. This process will require education of legislators in the current state of the financial services industry, and its regulation in Maine, other states and under federal law. It will further require the assistance of State regulators from the several areas of government responsible for these areas.

The final result is less likely to be a comprehensive legislative proposal than a hopefully educational report to the Legislature, and the establishment of some fundamental directions for further action.

7. MEMBERS OF SUBCOMMITTEE: While the committee plans to address this study through the use of a subcommittee, the membership of the subcommittee has not yet been determined.
