Dear Senator Pray:

Thank you for your letter of August 28th authorizing the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources to proceed with its studies as follows:

- Identification of Areas requiring further protection within the Allagash Wilderness Waterway (5-member subcommittee)
- Public Lands (5-member subcommittee)
 - (a) Development of State Policy on Residential Camp Leases (including lease rates)
 - (b) Charging fees for access to Public Lands

The Committee requests authorization for the following:

- (1) A site visit for the Allagash Subcommittee. This would be a full day (2 nights) from a base in the Ashland area and would include Telos/Chamberlain/Churchill by power boat with the ranger from Telos. That would allow observation of cutting practices on both public and private lands.
- (2) A site visit for the Public Lands Subcommittee to observe residential camp leases. This would take a full day (2 nights) from a base in Aroostook County, perhaps near Winterville.
- (3) Expansion of the Public Lands Subcommittee to 8 members to allow full participation by Committee members.
- (4) One full Committee meeting to receive Subcommittee reports and wrap up both studies.




We believe this will allow the Committee to be well informed and to conduct useful studies within a minimum budget. The Committee has requested Representative Hall and Senator McBreairty to be at the Council meeting September 6th to present our request.

2. The proposed trip down the Allagash Wilderness Waterway not be taken since it does not appear that this would provide the best means of evaluating the impact of clearcutting.

You are welcome to discuss these changes in your plan with the Council at its September 6th meeting. Please let me know if you have any questions. I look forward to hearing from you regarding the assignment of members to the two subcommittees.

JOINT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING THE CONGRESS
OF THE UNITED STATES TO DENOUNCE THE
INHUMAN AND GENOCIDAL TREATMENT OF
BAHA'IS IN IRAN

WE, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and Senate of the State of Maine of the First Special Session of the One Hundred and Eleventh Legislative Session assembled, most respectfully present and petition the United States Congress, as follows:

WHEREAS, the persecution of members of the Baha'i religious community in Iran has received world-wide attention; and

WHEREAS, most recently, the entire civilized world was shocked by the news from Iran of the execution by hanging of women members of the Baha'i faith; and

WHEREAS, reports of attempted forced conversions to Islam of Baha'is in Iran and wholesale deliberate starvation of Baha'i communities have been made public; and

WHEREAS, executions of Baha'is for no other reason than their religious preference continue in Iran; and

WHEREAS, these violations of human rights on the part of the Iranian authorities constitute violations against all civilized norms of behavior, as incorporated within such expressions of world opinion as the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights, and, indeed, violate the very principles of Islam, itself; and

WHEREAS, the Baha'i religion has a long and continued association with the State of Maine through

1 the Green Acres Center at Eliot, and other official
2 groups; now, therefore, be it

3 RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the First Spe-
4 cial Session of the 111th Legislature, do hereby de-
5 nounce the inhuman and genocidal treatment of the
6 Baha'is in Iran by the present government of the
7 Ayatollah Khomeini as a "crime against humanity," and
8 we do further resolve that copies of this expression
9 of our outrage and concern be sent to members of our
10 state's delegation in Congress, the President of the
11 United States, the Secretary of State, the
12 Secretary-General of the United Nations and the Per-
13 manent Iranian Delegation to the United Nations.
