The Chair, Rep. Gwadosky, called the Council to order at 11:17 a.m., in the Speaker's Office.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Summary of the May 19, 1993, Council meeting was approved and placed on file. (Motion by President Dutremble, second by Rep. Paradis; unanimous).

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Sally Tubbesing presented the following items for the Council's consideration:

Item #1: Progress Report on Various State House Improvements

Ms. Tubbesing reported that more than \$600 has been collected to plant flowers in the gardens surrounding the State House. She suggested that any monies that were left after paying for the flowers be used for bulbs to be planted in the fall.

She then updated Council members on the status of the investigation of the fence and wall. She has received preliminary estimates for both recasting and replacing the missing fence posts — totalling \$10,000 and noted that it would take 10-12 weeks for delivery of the fence posts. Finally, she reported that an initial survey of the granite wall that serves as the foundation for the fence has revealed that improper drainage and lack of routine maintenance are the primary causes of the deterioration of both the wall and fence. She is working to develop a phased approach to repair of these elements and will bring a proposal to the Council when the information has been assembled.

No Council action was required on this item.

Item #2: Preliminary List of Statutory Studies to be Staffed through the Council

Ms. Tubbesing drew Council members' attention to a listing of the bills that are still pending that would create study commissions to be staffed by the Legislative Council. She noted that the Council has, in past years, arranged to have such bills tabled in the Senate in order to give the Council an opportunity to ensure that staff resources were adequate to support all of the proposed studies and to set priorities.

Motion: That this item be tabled until a complete list is available. (Motion by President Dutremble; second by Rep. Paradis; unanimous).

In discussion that followed the vote, members expressed their support for a letter to be sent to all Committee Chairs from the Council Chair asking them to set priorities for studies.

Item #3: Status of Bills in Committees

Ms. Tubbesing referred Council members to a status report that summarized the status of bills still in committee, and Martha Freeman briefly described the significance of the information in the various columns. A general discussion ensued about the presiding officers' desire to get all of the remaining bills on the calendar by the middle of the next week and the fact that this would involve staff in all 3 offices - OPLA, OFPR and the Revisor's -- working through the Holiday weekend. Ms. Freeman observed that the non-partisan staff were committed to help leadership meet their targets, regardless of whether this involved weekend work. John Wakefield reiterated Ms. Freeman's statement; however, he reminded Council members that the fact that the holiday weekend would be extended by a shutdown day for the executive branch presented an obstacle for completing some fiscal notes.

Item #1: Request from Judiciary Committee for Council Authorization of a Staff Study on Federal and State Access Laws

Motion: That the request be tabled pending the Council's review of all study requests. (Motion by Speaker Martin; second by Rep. Whitcomb; unanimous).

Item #2: Requests to Carry Bills Over to the Second Regular Session

In response to a question, Sally Tubbesing reported that the list included requests from Committees to carry over 35 bills. Rep. Whitcomb asked if the Council had considered reviewing all of the carry over requests it had already approved and perhaps paring the list. Rep. Gwadosky responded that he did not think the total number approved for carry over was unusual given the Committees' intense participation in the budget process.

Motion: That all of the requests be approved. (Motion by President Dutremble; second by Sen. Carpenter; unanimous).

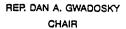

Item #1: After Deadline Bill Requests

Item #2: Requests to Carry Bills Over to the Second Regular Session

Motion: That the pending requests to carry bills over be approved. (Motion by Speaker Martin; second by Senate President Dutremble; unanimous).

Item #3: Funding for Reapportionment

Senator Esty noted that because the development of a redistricting plan was still in progress, the two redistricting caucuses continued to work. He then suggested that the Council has a responsibility to assure that both caucuses are able to continue their work and offered the following motion to that end.

Motion: That \$10,000 of the remaining balance in the Commission Chair's account be distributed equally to the Democratic and Republican caucuses so that the continued work of the caucuses can be properly supported. (Motion by Sen. Esty; second by Speaker Martin).

Discussion: In response to Rep. Zirnkilton's question about what the money would be used for, Speaker Martin specified the preparation of briefs to submit to the Supreme Judicial Court, which now has responsibility for drawing the plan. Rep. Zirnkilton then asked if this money could be used for related expenses, such as attorneys, and the Speaker replied affirmatively.

The motion was approved unanimously.

Following the vote, the Chair, Rep. Gwadosky, clarified that the Council's action would result in the addition of \$5,000 to the original budget of \$50,000 for each caucus.
