

Item #1: Remarks by the Bureau of General Services regarding the Structural Soundness of the State House. (Request of Rep. Patrick E. Paradis; tabled at October 24 meeting).

Motion: That the item be tabled. (Motion by Rep. Paradis; second by Speaker Martin; unanimous).

NEW BUSINESS

Item #1: Recommendation from State House & Capitol Park Commission to Award Contract for Restoration of State House Retaining Wall.

> Ms. Tubbesing drew members' attention to information in their packets regarding the bids that had been received for repair and restoration of the granite retaining wall that surrounds the State House. She stated that the State House Commission had worked with the Bureau of General Services to prequalify both contractors and stone masons for this project and that all of the firms who bid had been prequalified.

Motion: That the Executive Director be authorized to enter a contract with Granger, Northern, Inc., with the provision that the work on the north steps and the iron fence be issued as amendments to the contract as funds become available.

(Motion by Speaker Martin; second by Sen. Bustin; unanimous).

Item #2: Consideration of Legislators' Appeals of Council Action on Bill Requests

The Chair, Rep. Gwadosky congratulated Ms. Matheson on behalf of the entire Council. He noted that the Search Committee had had the good fortune to consider several qualified applicants and that the Committee's recommendation to the Council reflected Ms. Matheson's ability, her suitability, her genuine interest in the legislative institution, and her drafting skills.

Motion: That the Executive Director and the newly-appointed Revisor be authorized to fill the vacant Principal Analyst position and that the Council delegate to the Search Committee the authority to consider their recommendation. (Motion by Speaker Martin; second by Sen. Bustin; unanimous).

Sen. Esty inquired whether this review would not be more appropriately delegated to the Personnel Committee, and the Speaker replied that the sole intent of his motion was to ensure timely review of the recommendation. The motion stood.

SUBJECT: "Disclaimer Statement" for LD's

At the Council's direction, we have developed a "disclaimer" which will be printed at the end of **most** of the bills and resolves that are printed during the Second Regular Session. Representatives from 3 staff offices involved in drafting - Revisor, Policy & Legal Analysis, and Fiscal & Program Review - collaborated in developing this statement.

The statement is:

"This document has not yet been reviewed to determine the need for cross reference, stylistic and other technical amendments to confirm existing law to current drafting standards."

The statement will be located at the bottom of the last page of all bills to which it applies, following the Statement of Fact.

It is important to point out that some initial bills will continue to be fully-drafted and, thus, will not carry the disclaimer statement. These include:

- Budget bills
- Bills developed by the Audit & Program Review Committee
- Bills reported by committee pursuant to Joint Order
- Errors bills
- Recodifications; and
- Constitutional Resolutions

We hope this statement reflects your interest in flagging the new bill drafting protocols and would be happy to discuss it with you.

Dear Mr. Chair:

We request authorization to convene the Human Resources Committee for the purpose of reviewing the facts in the Greene Acres Manor case and discussing related mental health services issues. We have enclosed a request from the Long-term Care Ombudsman to discuss these issues with the Committee.

Many residents of Greene Acres need specialized mental health services that may or may not be available. The ability of the Department of Human Services to find appropriate homes for them is certainly in doubt, especially given the ongoing reduction of capacity in the nursing home sections of BMHI and AMHI.

Also related to this problem is the plan being developed by the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation to consolidate BMHI and AMHI into a single facility. We would like to meet with the Department to receive a status report on that plan.

We request authorization to meet for 1 day in addition to the committee planning day already authorized. Depending on the date selected for the planning day, we would anticipate holding our second meeting on the next day.

Task Force to Study the Safe Mobility of Maine's Aging Population (P.L. 1993 Chapter 297)

Dear Chair Gwadosky,

You may recall that the Task Force to Study the Safe Mobility of Maine's Aging Population was established by the 115th Legislature to (Sec. C-1) "review transportation alternatives for an aging population, licensing provisions for the driving population, highway travel considerations for an aging population and educational programs to improve driving performance and confidence." Since there were no general funds available to fund the task force's work, the legislation further provides that (Sec. C-9 Funding) " [t]he Legislative Council may accept on behalf of the task force grants and other sources of outside funding to hire staff and carry out the task Force's activities."

Although applications for financial support were made to several organizations, including the National Safety Council, the Maine Community Foundation, and the Bureau of Highway Safety, no direct financial support has materialized. However, I am happy to present to you and the other members of the Legislative Council the following offers of in kind contributions:

- 1. The Southern Maine Area Agency on Aging has given me a desk from which to work on the task force's activities, and to pay my photocopying, telephone, and postage expenses.
- 2. The Edmund S. Muskie Institute of Public Affairs has agreed to co-sponsor a conference with the task force, February 25, 1994, at the University of Southern Maine Portland Campus (see attached letter.) The title of the conference is *Safe Mobility for Maine's Aging Population: Transportation as a Lifelong Need*. Senator Joseph Brannigan has accepted an invitation to give the opening remarks for the conference, and six guest speakers have agreed to come at their own expense. (Some will come at their personal expense; others await approval from their respective organizations.) They are: 1) Dr. Loren Staplin, the Scientex Corporation, Lansdale, Pennsylvania; 2) Donn Maryott, Director of the Senior Highway User Program for New York State; 3) Dr. Germaine Odenheimer, Geriatric Neurologist, Harvard Medical School; 4) a speaker from the Washington office of the American Association of Retired Persons; 5) Dr. Tom Ranney, Liberty Mutual Research Center, Hopkinton, Massachusetts; and 6) Jackie Anapolle, National Mobility Institute, Boston, Massachusetts. I have offered to take guest speakers to dinner at my personal expense, and to put them up at my home or the homes of family or friends.

3. In addition to sending a guest speaker, the American Association of Retired Persons has also offered to pay for lunch for approximately twenty people for a task force meeting and

to print the task force's final report (see attached letter.) I will ask AARP if the task force may use this luncheon offer to help pay for lunch for conference attendees.

- 4. Several members of the task force, including myself, have furnished photocopying and postage for the task force's activities.
- 5. I am speaking with Maine Public Television and the University of Southern Maine public access channel about television coverage of the February conference for possible use in a documentary about safe mobility for Maine's aging population. Maine Things Considered has already expressed interest in covering the conference.
- 6. I am applying to several universities for student interns to help me with the staffing and research responsibilities for the task force. These universities include the University of Southern Maine Policy Scholars Program, the Muskie Institute, Bates, Bowdoin, Colby, and the Margaret Chase Smith School of Public Administration in Orono.
- 7. I am applying to the Maine Association of Dispute Resolution Professionals for pro bono facilitation; former Representative Merle Nelson has volunteered to help facilitate the task force's activities, as has Mr. John Forssen.
- 8. I have applied to Legal Services for the Elderly for help with legal questions; Attorney Tim Vogel, an expert in elder law, has agreed to provide pro bono legal advice, but not research, and I have spoken with Attorney Howard Reben about the possibility of providing the task force with pro bono legal advice.
- 9. I am applying to UNUM Charitable Foundation for a grant to conduct a survey of transportation opinions and needs of senior Maine citizens.

I hope I have not burdened you with unnecessary detail, but I want to do everything properly. My main concern for the task force has been the resources to assure public outreach and participation. This is a difficult task without funds for postage and photocopying. However, we will work with newsletters, bulletins, radio, television, press releases, and what resources we can ourselves provide for direct mail to interested parties. The truth may very well be that necessity will make us resourceful and creative, and produce a better result for the effort.

This letter is to bring you up to date on my efforts on behalf of the Task Force to Study the Safe Mobility of Maine's Aging Population since my November 23 correspondence, .

I have made significant progress in three areas:

- 1. The February 25, 1994 conference, Transportation as a Lifelong Need, at the University of Southern Maine. Five guest speakers have confirmed their participation, at their own expense. Dr. John Eberhard, of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and Chair of the Transportation Research Board's Committee on the Safety and Mobility of Older Drivers has agreed to be the keynote speaker. Dr. Eberhard is the foremost authority in the country on research, planning, and policy for older drivers. Additionally, Dr. Loren Staplin, Ms. Jackie Anapolle, Mr. Donn Maryott, and a speaker from AARP have confirmed their participation. To do the best job I can with no financial resources, I have spoken with the Department of Conferences at the University of Southern Maine. That organization is in a position to help the Task Force with the conference in such a way that the cost of services will be covered by the registration fees of those participating. (Please see the enclosed Estimated Conference Costs.) Brochures, publicity, and promotion of the conference will be done by members of the Task Force. The Department of Conferences is sending me a contract, which I will forward to Sally Tubbesing as soon as I receive it. I have explained to Cathy Lebel, Director of the Department of Conferences that the Task Force is explicitly forbidden to incur any expenses, and all costs for the conference must be covered by the registration fees. Conferences typically cost \$50 to \$75 per person, so it is possible to raise the registration fee. My goal, however, in setting low prices, is to make the conference affordable to as many participants as possible. My goal is 250 participants.
- 2. Facilitation. After a long and difficult search, I have secured *pro bono* facilitation for the Task Force. It will be provided by Mr. Cush Anthony and Mr. David Plimpton, President of the Maine Association of Dispute Resolution Professionals.
- 3. Legal research. I have secured *pro bono* legal research for the Task Force. Ms. Marsha Osgood, a second year USM law school student, specializing in elder law, has agreed to undertake the necessary legal research, and Mr. Howard Reben, an attorney with the firm of Sunnenblick, Reben, Benjamen & March who is also active with the American Civil Liberties Union, has agreed to help frame the legal issues and questions and to supervise Ms. Osgood's work.



As I stated in my last letter to you, if this level of detail is excessive and the Legislative Council prefers not to be burdened, please tell me so. In truth, however, I must confess that, on behalf of the Task Force, I am very pleased to be able to offer these fine resources to the Legislative Council and the State of Maine. The Council knows, better than I, that much critical national policy is made at the state level. With this Legislative Task Force, the State of Maine has the means to positively, compassionately, and creatively impact transportation policy and planning for the aging population throughout the nation.

I sincerely thank you for your time and consideration, and I look forward to hearing from you. Please feel free to call me if you or other members of the Council have questions about any of the Task Force's activities.

Members of the 116th Legislature:

During the Second Regular Session of the 116th Legislature, the Office of Fiscal and Program Review will implement a new procedure for estimating the cost of state mandates on local units of government in Maine. When requested to estimate the cost of a mandate, this office will be contacting municipalities selected to participate in a representative sampling methodology and extrapolate from information collected.

Please find enclosed a brief explanation of the procedure that will be used by this Office in estimating the fiscal impact of state mandates. The complexity of assessing the fiscal impact at the local level will likely slow down the procedure for turning around legislation after committee action, particularly for bills with a state mandate. We, therefore, will be asking committees to expedite specific requests for mandate estimates as early as possible. We hope you will bear with us as we implement these new procedures.

FISCAL NOTE PROCEDURE for STATE MANDATES (<u>Municipal Fiscal Notes</u>) 116th Second Regular Session

1. Mandate Identification - All Bills that include a state mandate will be identified with an internal contact code (during initial reading if possible). This contact code will make it possible to generate a list of all potential mandate bills. This list will be forwarded to all municipalities participating in Municipal Fiscal Note Sample and to Maine Municipal Association. Sample municipalities, the Maine Municipal Association or other interested parties should notify the Office of Fiscal and Program Review if a bill they believe has a state mandate is not on this list.

2. Initial Fiscal Note on original bills - In the memorandum distributed by this Office, state mandates will be identified only. No costs will be estimated initially (unless sufficient information is provided at the same time as other fiscal information, i.e. if departments or state agencies have reliable data available which will allow an accurate estimate of the municipal or county costs or if an estimate can be made without contacting sample municipalities). Maine Municipal Association or other interested parties with data available to generate a reliable estimate of the local costs should forward that information to the Office of Fiscal and Program Review. Pursuant to 3 MRSA, §163-A, sub-§12, this information will be included with other fiscal note information.

3. Fiscal Notes on Committee Amendments - If a bill that contains a mandate is going to be reported out favorably from a committee, the Office of Fiscal and Program Review will initiate the procedure to estimate the cost. If the committee decides to exempt the mandate from funding by including a Mandate Preamble and requiring a two-thirds favorable vote in both Houses, the Office of Fiscal and Program Review will only try to assess a very rough estimate of the cost and scope of the mandate. If the committee decides to fund the mandate, a more accurate assessment of the total cost of the mandate and an appropriation section for the bill will be provided.

4. Fiscal Notes on Floor Amendments - Given the limited amount of time available to assess the fiscal impact of floor amendments, the Office of Fiscal and Program Review will, at a minimum, identify mandates. If time permits, an estimate of the cost will be provided.

5. Other Requests for Municipal Cost Estimates - The Office of Fiscal and Program Review will attempt to provide estimates of the local fiscal impact of other proposed legislation as requested based upon available resources.

6. Municipal Fiscal Note Sample - Twenty-five towns have been selected to participate in a representative sample (see attached sheet). The sample was selected to provide geographic, population and spending diversity. When a request for an estimate of the cost of a mandate has been initiated, OFPR staff will contact the towns in the sample and extrapolate from the data collected to provide an estimate of the cost of the mandate.

7. Special Appropriations Table - All bills which include a non-exempted state mandate will be placed on the Special Appropriations Table until the end of the session, along with all other bills which have a General Fund cost. Those bills with a state mandate that have been exempted from the funding requirement and that do not have any other General Fund impact will not be placed on the Special Appropriations Table.
