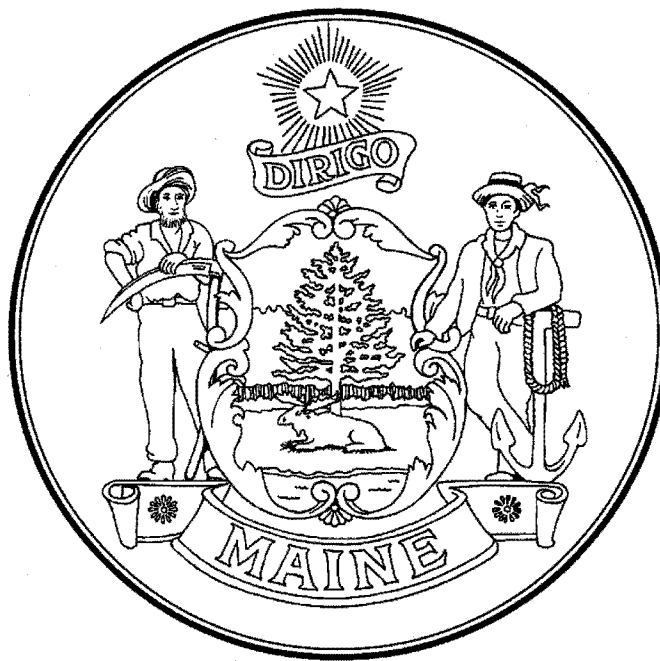

SUBJECT: Proposed Renovations and Repairs for 1997 Interim

As you know, Chapter 24 P.L., which comprises the FY 98-99 biennial budget, includes language that directs the State Controller to transfer \$850,000 to the Fund for State House Preservation and Maintenance on July 1 of this year and, again, on July 1, 1998. I have been working with Earle Shettleworth and our Master Plan Team of architects and engineers to develop a scope of work for your review and approval that will

- a) Advance our efforts to address critical life safety issues that we have identified in our work to date;
- b) Continue our efforts to restore the public areas of the State house; and
- c) Be feasible within the available time and budget.

The team has reviewed several options and proposes a package that includes the following:

- ◆ Installation of Perimeter Drainage System
- ◆ Fire Escapes: Structural Upgrade
(required to meet code)

- ◆ Fourth Floor Corridor Restoration
(includes installation of smoke doors; and smoke protection in West Wing; installation of “skeleton” for sprinkler system; lighting upgrade; patching and painting).
- ◆ Electrical and Lighting Upgrades in Information Services Offices and Legislators’ Computer Room and General Repairs in these areas.
- ◆ Replacement of one set of exterior doors (to be determined).

We propose to prequalify both the general contractor and key subcontractors, consistent with past practice and must begin the prequalification process within the next 2 weeks in order to be in a position to start work on July 1. Those who are prequalified are then invited to bid on the proposed work. We will continue to refine both the specifications and the budget estimates for each project as we proceed with the prequalification phase; and we will return to the Council with a specific recommendation to award a contract in mid to late June.

Recommendations:

1. That the Legislative Council authorize the Executive Director to proceed with initiating the process for prequalifying principal contractors and subcontractors for work on the State House during the 1997 interim.
2. That the Council give provisional approval to the proposed projects, with the understanding that the final scope of work, including estimated costs, at a subsequent Council meeting.



Dear Representative Mitchell and Senator Lawrence:

The Business and Economic Development Committee has discussed the responsibilities of the committee in regard to the Government Evaluation Act. Under the current review schedule outlined in statute the committee must review a total of 48 agencies by the year 2005. Both the Department of Community and Economic Development and the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation are on the 1997 review schedule in addition to 18 boards and independent agencies. Given the volume of information to review, the Committee has developed a revised review schedule and submit it to the Legislative Council for approval. The committee's proposed schedule is as follows:



The proposed schedule is based upon the desire to achieve a balance in the committee's responsibility to the Government Evaluation process and related session activities. As proposed, the committee would meet to review the two departments and the Maine Development Foundation beginning in the interim and continuing into the second regular session. To accomplish this, the committee would request submission of the program evaluation report from the three identified agencies on an accelerated timetable. By statute this report must be submitted to the committee of jurisdiction no later than November 1, in order to conduct the review beginning in the interim the committee would request a submission date of August 1 to ensure adequate time for review. The other agencies would be notified of the committee's intent to delay the review process with the caveat that a specific date would be provided by the end of the second regular session. 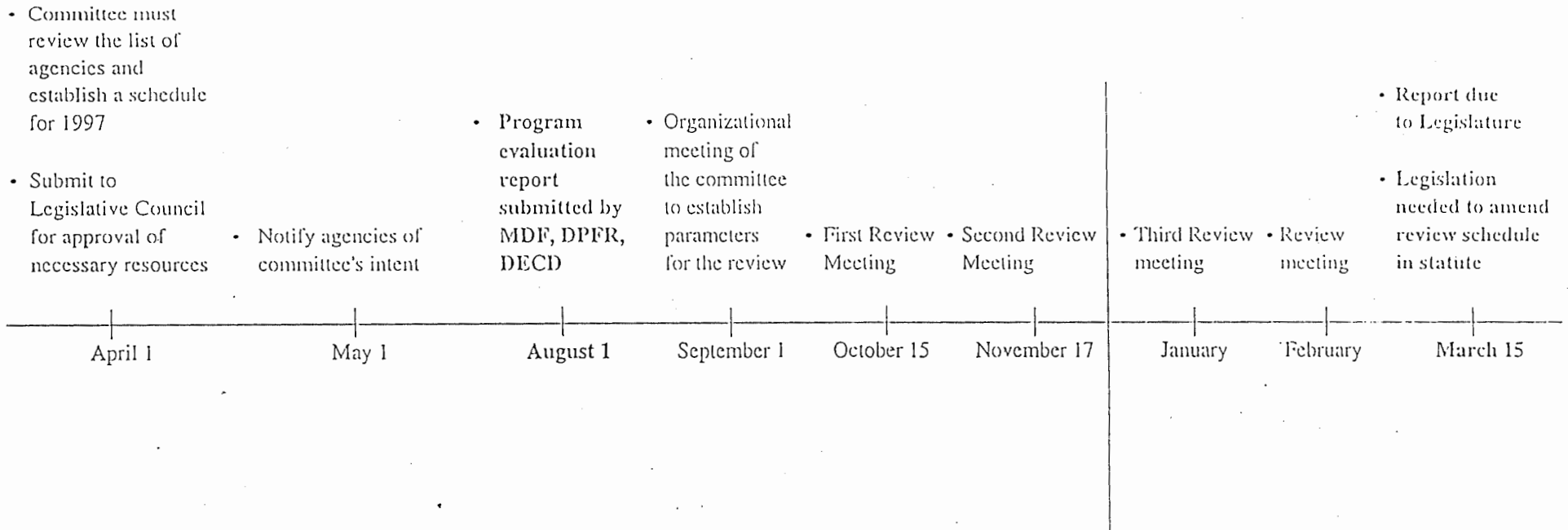

Re: Major substantive rules of the Board of Nursing filed for legislative review

This matter is before you on such short notice because major substantive rules by the Board were submitted yesterday afternoon for legislative review. The Administrative Procedure Act specifies filing requirements for rules submitted during a regular session of the Legislature, but not for those filed during a special session. Therefore, we are seeking guidance as to how to proceed before formally accepting the rules that might commit the Legislature to a review this session. The procedure adopted for these rules will set the standard for treatment of future rules filed at times other than during a regular session.

Discussion

These provisional rules relate to patient care services by unlicensed health care assistive personnel. The Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services generally has jurisdiction over this policy area.

Agencies may adopt major substantive rules only provisionally and then must submit the rules to the Legislature for review before they may be finally adopted and implemented by the agency. The Administrative Procedure Act requires agencies to file provisionally adopted rules with the Legislature at least 45 days before statutory adjournment of a regular session (May 4th in a regular session). Rules that are filed in a timely manner in a regular session must be acted on by the Legislature before the end of the session in which they are reviewed or the agency may adopt them without further review or approval. Several provisional rules were filed during the First Regular Session and were carried over to the First Special Session by an emergency resolve. This was necessary to preserve the opportunity for the Legislature to review those rules because of an early adjournment of the First Session before the review could be completed.

The Board of Nursing rules are the first rules filed for review during the Special Session. The APA contains no rule filing requirements or limitations for a special session. Consequently, the Legislature has some flexibility on how to handle those rules. As the administrative arm of the Legislature it seems appropriate for the Council to decide the issue much as it rules on after deadline bill requests. The basic options for the Legislature are:

1. Reject the filing at this time because the rules were not filed within 45 days of the end of the Regular Session and direct the agency to resubmit them to a subsequent regular session. This option would delay implementation of the rules about one year.
2. Accept the rules for review and print a rules review resolve, refer it to committee and handle the resolve this session. This option would permit implementation of the rules later this year if approved but would require an expedited review by the committee.
3. Accept the rules for review, making clear in the acceptance letter to the agency that the Legislature is under no obligation to do so and is not bound to act on them this session due to the limited time for review. In that case, a rules review resolve could be printed, referred to committee, and either be dealt with by the committee within the next few weeks if it has time or be carried over to the next session. If the resolve is carried over, it may delay implementation of the rule by up to a year.

Recommendation

The third option seems to offer the most flexibility to the Legislature, while remaining consistent with current law. Since the Legislature would be in possession of the rules, it may review them as time permits either now or anytime in the Second Regular Session. Furthermore, if a second special session were called before January, the Legislature could, if it wished, easily deal with the rules then if it retains the rules in its possession. Finally, if the Legislature retains possession of the rules, it will remove any confusion on the part of the agency as to whether it is authorized to proceed with implementation of the rules. However, if the Legislature rejects the filing as untimely, the agency could refile the rules next session but at a time of its, not the Legislature's, choosing.

Chapter 6 REGULATIONS RELATING TO COORDINATION AND OVERSIGHT OF PATIENT CARE SERVICES BY UNLICENSED HEALTH CARE ASSISTIVE PERSONNEL

SUMMARY: This chapter sets forth regulations governing coordination and oversight by registered professional nurses of patient care services provided by unlicensed health care assistive personnel.

Sec. 1. Definition

For purposes of this chapter, unlicensed health care assistive personnel are personnel who are not licensed by the board to practice nursing.

Sec. 2. Coordination and Oversight

1. General Authority

Except as otherwise provided by Chapter 5, and in accordance with this chapter, the registered professional nurse may coordinate and oversee unlicensed health care assistive personnel for specific tasks for specific patients, consistent with patient safety. Except as provided by 32 M.R.S.A. Section 2102(2)(G), the registered professional nurse shall not coordinate and oversee unlicensed health care assistive personnel for health counseling, teaching or any task that requires independent, specialized nursing knowledge, skill or judgment.

2. Elements of Coordination and Oversight

A. Factors to be considered

Factors to be considered by the nurse as to whether that nurse may coordinate his/her services with unlicensed health care assistive personnel, consistent with patient safety, include without limitation: acuity of the patient; stability of the condition of the patient; training and capability of the unlicensed health care assistive personnel; nature of the tasks; and the setting in which care is to be delivered.

B. The nurse's responsibility

The nurse who coordinates and oversees services provided by unlicensed health care assistive personnel shall do the following:

- (1) identify the needs of the patient, consulting the plan of care
- (2) identify the task to be performed by the unlicensed health care assistive personnel
- (3) provide directions regarding the task to be performed
- (4) determine the ability of the unlicensed health care assistive personnel to perform the task
- (5) monitor reporting and documentation of the task
- (6) ensure that the unlicensed assistive personnel assigned to that nurse's patient reports directly to the nurse for the performance of nursing tasks.
- (7) evaluate performance of the task and patient outcome, and initiate corrective action when necessary.

Statutory Authority: 32 M.R.S.A. Sections 2102(2)(H) and 2152(A)(1)

Effective Date

D. Basis Statement

This rule is being adopted at the direction of the 116th Legislature. Its newly created statutory language in 32 MRSA Section 2102(2)(H) adds "coordination and oversight" to the definition of registered professional nurse. This rule is adopted to implement that language.

E. Only two comments were received. One was in support of the rule as proposed. (Atch A), and the other wanted exclusionary language added (Atch B)

The latter comment was not included because consumer directed care does not come under the purview of the Law Regulating the Practice of Nursing.
