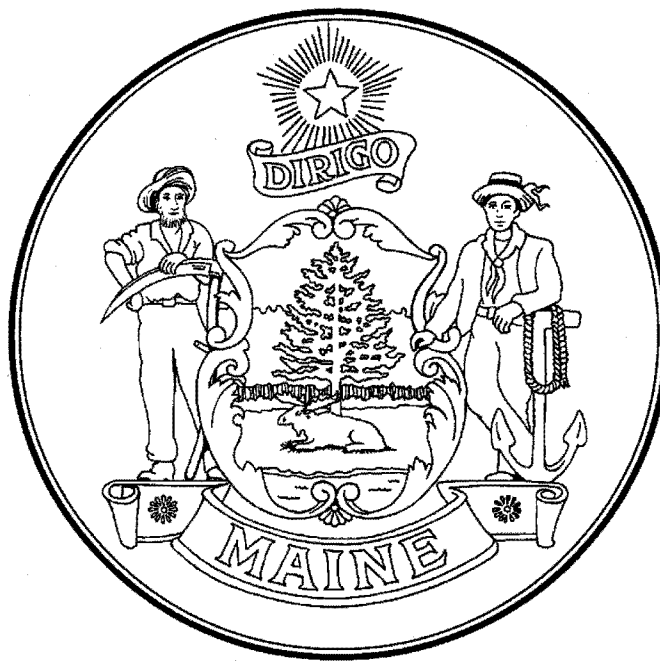

## MEETING SUMMARY

**November 20, 1997**

### CALL TO ORDER

The Chair, Speaker Mitchell, called the Legislative Council to order at 2:40 p.m. in the Legislative Council Chambers.

The Chair, Speaker Mitchell, suggested that the Council move directly to **NEW BUSINESS, ITEM #1**, in deference to those legislators who were present. Without objection, the Council proceeded to take up this item out of order.

### NEW BUSINESS

#### **Item #1: Consideration of Legislators' Appeals of Council Action on Bill Requests**

Before proceeding with consideration of the individual requests, Speaker Mitchell reported that the Revisor's Office had received 211 appeals by the November 4th deadline and noted that this compared to 95 appeals two years ago. Recognizing the many legislators who were present to present their appeals in person, she stated that the Council would consider appeals in reverse alphabetical order, but would give

precedence to take those legislators who had long distances to travel. She reviewed procedures briefly, and urged legislators to limit their remarks so that all would have an opportunity to speak.

The Council proceeded to consider the appeals that had been filed. With the unanimous support of the Council, the Chair, Speaker Mitchell, announced that legislators whose appeals had been successful, would have one week from receipt of the letter announcing the Council's action to file information related to bill requests.

A summary of the Council's action has been distributed and is also available on the Legislature's WEB site.

The Council proceeded to consider other items listed on the agenda under **NEW BUSINESS**.

Ms. Tubbesing drew members' attention to the material in the agenda packet related to this item, noting that Ms. Mary Jane Beyer had requested that the Legislature review rules adopted by the Department of Human Services related to Medicaid Eligibility. Ms. Tubbesing reported that she had referred the request for review to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services in accordance with the law and that the Committee has the option of deciding whether or not to schedule a meeting to review the rule. Correspondence from the Committee indicates that the Committee will schedule a review in January.

This item required no formal action by the Legislative Council at this time.

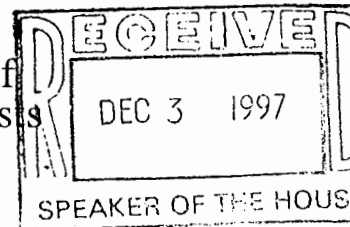


Dear Speaker Mitchell:

Dear Speaker Mitchell:

Resolves 1997, Chapter 66 created the Task Force on State and Federal Tax Filing to develop a mechanism for a single-form filing and payment system for state and federal tax payments and withholdings for small businesses. The Resolve authorizes the Task Force to meet up to four times and report by January 1, 1998. The Legislative Council may grant an extension upon application by the Task Force.

The Task Force has met four times, beginning November 24, 1997. We knew at that initial meeting that time alone would not allow us to complete the proposed work by January 1, 1998. We have begun to make progress, but the IRS representatives were unable to participate until the third meeting. Based on the experience in this State and in other states, developing a cooperative state-federal response to tax and related questions is a fairly long process. We have identified a few improvements that can be made without involving the federal government, but to carry out the central charge of the Resolve will require ongoing discussions and negotiations with the IRS.

We therefore request an extension of the Task Force reporting date to January 1, 1999. In addition to a central legal issue that must be resolved, there are two tasks which must be accomplished. First, we need to determine the best way to simplify filing and payments to benefit the small businesses in Maine. Second, we need to work cooperatively with the IRS to identify and resolve all the practical details of carrying out a simplified system. We envision monthly meetings of the Task Force, which officially includes a local IRS representative and an IRS representative based in Washington, D.C. U.S. Rep. Tom Allen has directed his staff to participate in the process as well, which will be very helpful should federal legislation be necessary.



The Task Force's legislative recommendations consist of the extension of the reporting date until January, 1999, no limit on the number of meetings and financial support for the continuation of the Task Force, including expenses for public members.

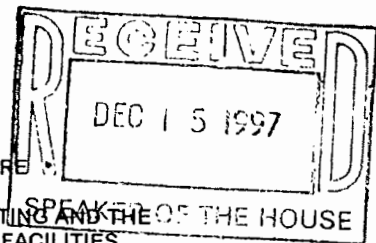

On behalf of the members of the Commission to Examine Rate Setting and the Financing of Long-term Care Facilities I'd like to thank you for granting our request for an extension on our reporting deadline until November 1998.

As we continue to collect information, our sense of the magnitude of the study increases; we expect to be very busy indeed next interim. We have discussed the resources and time we feel we will need in order to do a credible job. We feel we will need 10-12 meetings to complete our business. We also believe we will need to bring in at least 2 consultants from other states to talk with us about issues related to rate setting in the long-term care industry. It appears we will be able to bring these experts to us for the cost of their expenses, which we estimate will be in the area of \$2,500 each. Factoring in miscellaneous expenses, including postage costs for our mailings, we have determined we will need an additional appropriation of \$10,000.

We understand there is a study underway to examine the manner of funding studies in the future. Since we do not know what the resolution of that study may be, we are submitting, in accordance with our authorizing legislation (Section 7 of Chapter 81 of the Resolves of 1997), the attached interim report with proposed legislation to provide the funding we recommend. We have filed the legislation with the Revisor of Statutes for processing.

**Interim Report of the  
Commission to Examine Rate Setting and the Financing  
of Long-term Care Facilities**

The Commission to Examine Rate Setting and the Financing of Long-term Care Facilities Commission, established by Resolves of 1997, Chapter 81 (copy attached as Appendix A), was directed to examine a variety of issues related to the long-term care industry and to issue its report with necessary legislation by December 15, 1997.

On November 13, 1997, the commission submitted a letter to the Legislative Council requesting an extension of its deadline until November 1998 (letter attached as Appendix B). On November 20, pursuant to the authority granted under Resolves of 1997, Chapter 81, Section 7, the Council approved the requested extension.

The commission was called to its first meeting on November 3, 1997. It held three subsequent informational meetings on November 12, 19 and December 3 in which it received voluminous data concerning various aspects of the long-term care industry. The commission will hold an additional planning session on December 17 and expects to resume its study in April, 1998, following the Second Regular Session of the 118th Legislature.

**Findings and Recommendations**

In order to complete its examination of the complex issues outlined in Resolves of 1997 Chapter 81, the commission finds it will require supplemental funding. The commission expects to need to hold ten to twelve meetings during the 1998 interim. It also finds that in order to obtain an adequate understanding of the complex issues surrounding rate setting for long-term care facilities, it will need to bring before it at least two expert consultants. The commission estimates that the cost of funding the expenses of the consultants, who will come from out of state, will be approximately \$2,500 a person. In order to fund this expense, to continue to fund expenses and per diem for legislative members and to cover miscellaneous costs of copying and mailing materials, the commission recommends the commission receive supplemental funding of \$10,000.

Pursuant to its authority under Resolves of 1997, Chapter 81, Section 7, attached to this report as Appendix C is draft legislation which implements the commission's recommendation for supplemental funding.

I am writing on behalf of the Commission to Examine Rate Setting and the Financing of Long-term Care Facilities to request an extension of our reporting deadline.

As you know, the resolve establishing this study commission was signed into law as an emergency on June 12th. Under the terms of the resolve, the first meeting was to be held before the end of July. The resolve establishes a reporting deadline of December 15th.

As the Legislature clearly understood, the scope and magnitude of this study are significant. The issues surrounding rate setting for long-term care facilities are many, interrelated and difficult. The time-line established for the commission by the resolve provided some five months to undertake the study.

However, as you are well aware, the appointments to this commission were only recently completed. As a result, we were first convened on November 3, forty-two days before our deadline to issue a report.

Members of the commission are unanimously of the opinion that the issues raised by the study are complex, difficult and cannot be treated quickly or in a cursory manner. The commission has received data showing that the nursing facilities in the state currently carry on the order of a quarter billion dollars of debt, a sizable chunk of which is backed by the State's moral obligation. The commission feels it would be imprudent to produce any recommendations that could impact the repayment of this debt without first undertaking a thorough examination of the industry and the financial implications of any changes we might recommend. This will obviously require substantial time.

Commission members are of the opinion that the commission has insufficient time to undertake a credible study and to produce a report that will be of use to the Legislature. We also note that the issues raised by the study are sufficiently interrelated that it seems inappropriate and counter-productive for us to focus on some subset of the issues for

study; a report on such a subset of issues would likely amount to little more than a recitation of the interrelationship of those issues with other issues not examined.

We have been meeting weekly in an effort to begin the examination of the issues. We have been reviewing data and have developed a better sense of the scope of the study and the time we feel is needed to complete it. We have reviewed data on the financial condition of the industry (including long-term debt, financial ratios and comparisons with other states), staffing levels, the quality of care assessment system and the case mix reimbursement system. The data is voluminous and raises as many important questions as it answers.

In the process of examining the data we have noted a number of issues not specifically identified in the resolve that we feel need to be examined in the course of any serious study of the subject. The list is dynamic but presently includes these issues:

- What is the interface of the long-term care industry with the rest of the health care industry (how do decisions affecting one impact the other)?
- What are the effects of regulatory requirements on the industry (e.g., nurse time spent filling out forms)?
- How should and does the State's moral-obligation backing of industry debt affect state policy decisions with regard to the industry?
- How viable and stable is the industry today?
- What is the quality of current industry management and how can it be assessed?
- How do staffing levels relate to quality of care?
- What are the financial effects of the recent federal repeal of the so-called Boren Amendment?
- How will managed care impact the industry and how will it affect the State's control over the quality of care?

Based on our evaluation of the scope and magnitude of the study, the commission unanimously requests an extension until November 1998.


We are aware that the session begins in January. We are also aware that there are a number of issues associated with extending this study into the session, including the serious scheduling difficulties it will create for a number of members of the commission and the reduced availability of legislative staff.

We are asking for an extension to the next interim in order to avoid the difficulties associated with attempting to conduct the study during the session. This extension would allow us to set the work aside during the session and to recommence work in earnest after the session finished. Our report and recommendations would be available to the Legislature in the following session.

**Emergency preamble.** Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

**Whereas,** this resolve is necessary as an emergency measure to provide funding for the Commission to Examine Rate Setting and the Financing of Maine's Long-term Care Facilities to continue its work immediately following the Second Regular Session of the 118th Legislature; and

**Whereas,** in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now therefore,

**Sec. 1. Extended study. Resolved:** That the Commission to Examine Rate Setting and the Financing of Maine's Long-term Care Facilities, established by Resolves of 1997, Chapter 81 and granted a reporting extension until November, 1998 by the Legislative Council on November 20, 1997 pursuant to authority granted under that resolve, shall submit its report, together with any necessary implementing legislation, to the First Regular Session of the 119th Legislature by November 30, 1998.

# Interim Report on the Medical Liability Demonstration Project

December 1997

---

*Purpose* The Bureau of Insurance of the State of Maine is required to compile an interim report on the Medical Liability Demonstration Project by December 1, 1997 pursuant to Title 24 M.R.S.A., Section 2978. By law, this report shall include:

- ♦ The number of claims brought against physicians in the project alleging malpractice as a result of incidents occurring on or after January 1, 1992.
- ♦ The results of any closed claims described in this section, including defense costs and indemnity payments as a result of settlement or verdict.
- ♦ The status of all open claims described in this section, including defense costs, indemnity payments and any amounts held in reserve in the aggregate by medical specialty area.
- ♦ The effect of the project on the medical liability claims experience and premiums of those physicians in the project.

---

*Conclusions* The law does not require the Bureau to draw conclusions on the effectiveness of the project based in this interim report. The final report is due on December 1, 2000. The Bureau would like to highlight that in the five years of claims data collected we have only one case in which a physician asserted that the protocols were followed as a defense. In this case, it was reported that the court found that the physician was not in compliance with the Medical Liability Demonstration Project Protocols (See the highlighted line in Exhibit II, Page 2 for the details on this claim).

In addition, based upon currently available data, we are unable to conclude whether the Medical Liability Demonstration project has had an effect on the claims experience or the premiums of those physicians participating in the project.

*Data*

*Limitations*

The data included in this report was submitted from the insurance companies licensed in Maine who write insurance in the four specialty areas - anesthesiology, emergency medicine, obstetrics and gynecology, and radiology. These four specialty areas comprise the Demonstration Project. In order to test the accuracy of the data, several data checks were conducted before compiling the exhibits included in this report. The data checks included verifying that the date of incident occurred within the period starting 1/1/87 and ending 12/31/97. Those claims that did not were discarded from the study (approximately 450 claims). We also checked the specialty areas reported to us for each claim and found that several did not fall within the four specified in the Demonstration Project. These claims were also discarded (40 claims).

Lastly, we had one company report 368 claims in which the specialty area was not identified, nor did they identify the physician's status as a participant in the project. Due to the large volume of claims falling into the latter category, the company was directed to verify these claims and provide the information necessary to complete the study. For this report, we have excluded those claims until we have received updated information from the company. We hope to provide you a revised report including these claims by mid January 1998. This additional data will change the Exhibits in this report, but it is unlikely that the conclusions stated above will change. We expect that we will have only one claim in which the defense was asserted, and that the claims experience and the premiums of the physicians in project were not affected by the implementation of the protocols under the Demonstration Project.

## Legislative Video Production

Much of this initial meeting focused on getting this project started. The idea for a legislative video, available mainly for educational purposes, arose from Representative Kontos' meetings with other State leaders. Currently, Washington State and New Jersey already have videos available.

After a brief preview of the Washington video, discussions focused on the videos costs, funding and distribution. Ted Miles of Spring Point Media, during prior discussions with Washington's video production team, determined that the approximate cost of producing the video would be \$25,000. This figure counted 1000 copies of the video, as well as in-kind contributions. Everyone agreed that this was a fairly accurate figure.

A discussion on possible funding sources centered on four areas:

- corporate contributions
- in-kind contributions
- non-profit sources
- legislative funding

Barbara Merrill suggested making several copies of the video and soliciting several corporations for \$500 or \$1000 contributions each. Barbara Merrill and Representative Kontos agreed to meet early in December to develop a list of potential corporate donors.

Ted Miles, Barry McCrumb (Time Warner) and Trudy Deverce agreed to meet prior to the next meeting to draft an initial budget for the project.

Secretary of State Dan Gwadowsky discussed the idea of increased Public Service Announcements. PSA's could be used to inform the public about new laws or other legislative initiatives. Barry McCrumb agreed to work with the SOS's office to develop some pilot PSA's.

It was agreed that the next meeting would take place December 15th @ 1:30pm at State Cable in Augusta.

The early portion of this meeting focused on fundraising issues. Rep. Kontos, Barry McCrum, and Barbara Merrill had agreed at the last meeting to form a sub-committee to begin looking into fundraising. Barbara Merrill reported that her initial calls had showed that there was interest in funding this project from the corporate sector. It was suggested that a fund-raiser be held in Hallowell on January, with invitations going out from Legislative Leadership to possible corporate contributors. A screening of the Washington Video would also be planned at the reception.

Discussions also focused on how we would receive and allocate any funds that were given. Tony Vigue (CTAM), Ted Miles (SMTC), Barry McCrum (NECTA) and Ted Potter all agreed to follow up further and report back to the group at the next meeting.

Trudy Deblois and Ted Miles presented the group with a initial budget. (Enclosed)

Polly Bennell agreed to begin the process of drafting a script. Ted Miles and Polly pointed out that the Washington State Video included approximately 20 interviews. It was agreed that our video would probably require fewer interviews.

Polly raised the question of timing for the video. Rep. Kontos said that she would like to have the footage of the legislature covered during the upcoming session, while individual interviews could be scheduled anytime. Given the proximity of their studio, it was agreed that footage and interview would be done by State Cable in Augusta, with post production being handled by Andrea and Ted Miles at SMTC.

It was also agreed that an advisory group would be created to begin discussions on deciding who would appear in the video and what unique elements of the Maine Legislature would be highlighted. The group plans to meet December 22 at the Statehouse.
