**SUMMARY OF NOVEMBER 20, 1997 COUNCIL MEETING**

The Summary of the November 20, 1997 Council meeting was accepted and placed on file.

## **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Sally Tubbesing turned to Meg Matheson, who reported that all bills that had been accepted by the Council at its initial screening meeting in October had been finally drafted and sent out for sponsor review and signature. She further stated that she anticipated that virtually all bills that had been accepted for introduction would be available for sponsor signature by the time legislators returned in January.

This item did not require Council action.

## **NEW BUSINESS**

### **Item #1: Requests for Extension of Study Deadlines**

Before taking up individual requests, the Chair, Speaker Mitchell, stated that she had established a Study Subcommittee to examine all aspects of the current system and procedures for the creation and initial organization of interim study commissions and that she had asked this Subcommittee to report to the Council in January.

Turning to the requests, she noted that Council members needed to be aware that extensions beyond mid-January are problematic. Most of the interim study commissions are staffed by the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis; and those staff must now turn their full attention to the work of the Joint Standing Committees. The Speaker asked David Boulter for his comments, and Mr. Boulter reinforced the need to keep in mind that in the "short session", committee deadlines will come quickly and require the full attention of staff.

The Council proceeded to consider the following requests.

- **Task Force to Study Strategies to Support Parents as Children's First Teachers**  
(letter from Rep. Christina Baker, Chair)

**Discussion:** Sally Tubbesing pointed out that this Task Force is staffed by the Department of Human Services.

**Motion:** That the request to extend the deadline to January 15, 1998, be approved.  
(Motion Rep. Saxl; second by Rep. Campbell, unanimous).

- **Blue Ribbon Commission to Study the Effects of Government Regulation and Health Insurance Costs on Small Business in Maine** (letter from Rep. Arthur Mayo, Chair)

**Motion:** That the request to extend the Commission’s deadline to January 16 be approved. (Motion by Sen. Rand; second by Sen. Kieffer, unanimous)

- **Task Force to Study Equal Economic Opportunity for All Regions of the State** (letter from Rep. Marc Vigue, Chair)

**Note:** The extension of this deadline requires legislation, and the Council supported the inclusion of the necessary language in an “omnibus” bill which the Revisor’s Office has been assembling. The Council did not take a formal vote on this request.

- **Task Force to Study the State’s Regional Service Center Communities** (letter from Rep. Richard Farnsworth, Chair)

**Discussion:** The Speaker noted that this Task Force is not staffed by legislative staff.

**Motion:** That the request to extend the reporting deadline to January 15 be approved. (Motion by Rep. Saxl, second by Sen. Rand, approved 6-1)

- **Commission to Study Insurance Fraud** (letter from Sen. Lloyd P. LaFountain, III, Chair)

**Motion:** That the request to extend the reporting deadline to January 15 be approved. (Motion by Senate President Lawrence, second by Sen. Kieffer, unanimous)

- **Legislative Task Force to Study Registration for In-Home Personal Care and Support Workers** (letter from Sandra Bethanis, R.N., Chair)

**Motion:** That the request to extend the reporting deadline to January 15 be approved (Motion by Sen. Pingree, second by Senate President Lawrence, unanimous).

- **Commission to Study the Funding and Distribution of Teletypewriter and Other Telecommunications Equipment for People with Disabilities** (memo from Sen. Sharon Treat, Chair)

**Motion:** That the reporting deadline be extended to January 15 only. (Motion by Sen. Rand, second by Senate President Lawrence, unanimous).

## **Item #2: Requests for Additional Meeting(s)**

- **Commission to Study the Unemployment Compensation System** (letter and memo from Sen. Sharon Treat, Chair)

**Motion:** That the reporting deadline be extended to January 15 and that the Revisor of Statutes be instructed to incorporate the necessary language in legislation. (Motion by Rep. Campbell, second by Senate President Lawrence, approved 6-1)

- **Joint Standing Committee on Taxation** (letter from Sen. Richard P. Ruhlin, Senate Chair and Rep. Verdi L. Tripp, House Chair)

The Chair, Speaker Mitchell, stated that the presiding officers had already approved this request.

- **Joint Select Committee on Research and Development** (letter from Sen. Mary Cathcart and Sen. Richard Bennett, Co-Chairs)

**Motion:** That the request to extend the reporting deadline to January 15 be approved (Motion by Senate President Lawrence; second by Sen. Kieffer, unanimous)

- **Task Force on State and Federal Tax Filing** (letter from Rep. Scott Cowger, Chair)

The Chair, Speaker Mitchell, recognized Rep. Scott Cowger, who chairs the Task Force. Rep. Cowger reported that the Task Force had had 4 meetings, but that its progress had been slowed by the absence of a representative from the Internal Revenue Service until early December. He stated that he was planning to submit legislation to extend the work schedule and to seek additional funds. The Council took no formal action on this request in view of the fact that legislation had been filed.

Speaker Mitchell emphasized that this was a Council issue and Rep. Cowger agreed to submit an Interim Report by January 1. The Council took no formal action on this item.

- **Commission to Examine Rate Setting and the Financing of Long-term Facilities** (letter from Joseph M. Kozak, Chair)

David Boulter clarified that the Council had already approved an extension for this Commission to November 30, 1998, and that legislation had been submitted to accomplish this. Senator Pingree, who is a member of this Commission agreed to follow up with Mr. Kozak. The Council took no further action at this time.

**Item #3: Medical Liability Demonstration Project: Interim Report Submitted by the Bureau of Insurance Pursuant to 24-A MRSA, § 2978 (Executive Summary enclosed)**

**Motion:** That the Interim Report be accepted and placed on file (Motion by Sen. Rand, second by Rep. Saxl, unanimous)

**Item #4: Proposal to Produce a Video on the Legislative Process (request of Rep. Kontos)**

The Chair, Speaker Mitchell, recognized Rep. Kontos, who reported that a group of interested parties has been exploring the concept of producing a video on the legislative process. The group includes the Secretary of State's Office and the Clerk of the House. She and Senator Pingree had seen a video from New Jersey, and it helped them understand what a valuable public education tool this could be. Rep. Kontos said that the informal planning group had been working with Spring Point, a video

production facility affiliated with Southern Maine Technical College and determined that the estimated cost of producing a 25-minute video is \$25,000. She noted that her group has also begun consulting with potential funding sources, including Time Warner Cable, and that the group proposes to host a fund-raising event in January.

Speaker Mitchell stated that others had discussed the importance of this kind of product and suggested that Rep. Kontos contact the Maine Development Foundation. Senate President Lawrence encouraged Rep. Kontos to involve the Senate in this project, and Rep. Kontos stated that she had discussed the project with both Sen. Pingree and Rep. Campbell recently, noting that it was critical for this project to have bipartisan and bicameral support. She announced that the group's next meeting was December 22 and invited participation. Rep. Kontos recognized Barbara Merrill, noting that she had been helpful in developing a fund-raising plan, and Ms. Merrill reported that the initial response from corporations to her "soft calls" was very enthusiastic, and stressed the importance of bipartisan endorsement of the project if fundraising is to be successful.

The Chair, Speaker Mitchell, thanked Rep. Kontos and asked her to return to the Council in January with more detailed information about the entire proposal.

The Council took no formal action on this item.

**Item #5: Request to Pay Maine's Annual Dues to the Assemblée Internationale des Parlementaires de Langue Francaise (AIPLF) for period 1993-1997 (letter from Senator Paradis)**

**Motion:** That this item be tabled, pending the collection of additional information regarding the Legislature's prior payments to the organization by the Executive Director. (Motion by Senate President Lawrence; second by Rep. Saxl, unanimous)

**Item #6: After Deadline Bill Requests**

Requests to introduce legislation to the Second Regular Session were considered by the Legislative Council. A summary of the Council's action on these requests is attached to this meeting summary.

SUBJECT: Legislature's Payments to the Assemblée Internationale des Parlementaires de  
Langue Française (A.I.P.L.F.)

At the December meeting, you asked me to research the Legislature's payments to the A.I.P.L.F. in prior years. We have reviewed both Legislative Council files and the financial records maintained by our office back to 1982.

The records indicate that the first time the Legislature paid dues to the A.I.P.L.F. as an associate member was in July 1986. The request to pay dues equivalent to \$760.00 in U.S. dollars was presented to the Council by then Speaker John L. Martin and unanimously approved; and the dues were paid in July 1986. The next record of payment of dues to the A.I.P.L.F. appeared in September 1994, when \$2,382.50 was paid. The Council minutes in June and July of that year reflect that the issue was presented to the Council by Senate President Dutremble, at the request of Senator Paradis. After discussion, the Council eventually voted unanimously to approve payment of the dues for the current fiscal year only.

The dues prior to 1994 have never been paid; and no dues have been paid since the single payment in 1994. The request to pay for the 5-year subscription to the Association's publication is the first such request for which we have any record.

I am writing to request payment of 51,730 France (or \$8,592.35, according to today's exchange rate of .1661) for the State of Maine's current and past annual dues to the *Assemblée Internationale des Parlementaires de Langue Française (AIPLF)*, as well as payment for 5 years subscription to the publication *Parlements et Francophonie*. **Item #2: 1993 Laws of Maine, Volume III**

The Chair, Speaker Gwadosky, noted that Volume III of the Laws of Maine was out and that this was the first year in memory that the volume had been available prior to the July 14 effective date for most legislation. At his invitation, Meg Matheson reported that the timely delivery of the publication was attributable to the decision to produce camera-ready copy in house, a decision which also achieved cost savings.

No Council action was required on this item.

**REPORTS FROM COUNCIL COMMITTEES****Committee on Total Quality Management in the Legislature**

The Chair, Speaker Gwadosky, drew members' attention to the letter from Rep. Kontos, who chairs the TQM Committee, and pointed out that new member orientation has been identified as the highest priority for the Committee's work this summer.

No Council action was required.

**Personnel Committee**

The Chair, Speaker Gwadosky, noted that the Committee was scheduled to meet on August 3 to begin performance reviews of the Office Directors.

No Council action was required.

**OLD BUSINESS****Item #1: State House Dome Lighting: Progress Report**

The Chair, Speaker Gwadosky, drew members' attention to the memo from Ms. Tubbesing, which reported results of a meeting related to the lighting design for the Dome. He noted that while the memo required no action by the Council, he wished to have the Council's consensus recorded. There was no objection.

**Item #2: International Association of French-Speaking Parliamentarians**

**Motion:** That the Council approve payment of the dues for the current fiscal year. (Motion by Sen. Dutremble; second by Rep. Jacques).

**Discussion:**

Rep. Whitcomb asked if the dues to the Council of State Governments had been paid; and, after consultation with Dick Sawyer, Administrative Services Director, the Chair, Rep. Gwadosky, reported that the annual dues to both NCSL and CSG had been processed for payment. Rep. Whitcomb then stated that he had supported the visits that French-speaking parliamentarians from other countries had made to Maine as well as Maine legislators' participation in these activities; however, he expressed concern that the Council have the opportunity to consider dues for all groups at the same time. Sen. Esty concurred and further observed that Sen. Judy Paradis had gone to Haiti through A.I.P.L.F. to oversee the recent elections. Senate President Dutremble also agreed with this, but noted that it was important for the Council to act on the dues to A.I.P.L.F. immediately in order to allow Maine to participate in the annual meetings in New Brunswick in early August.

The motion was approved unanimously.

**NEW BUSINESS**

- Item #1: Request from the Maine State Museum for Authorization to Use Capitol Park for a Civil War Encampment

Motion: That the request be approved (Motion by Sen. Esty; second by Senate President Dutremble; unanimous).

Rep. Whitcomb sought clarification that the group had fulfilled all of the conditions placed on their use of the Park for a similar purpose last year; and Rep. Jacques, referring to the letter from Mr. Phillips, noted that they had.

- Item #2: Request from the Office of Health Planning and Development for Council Support of a Conference for Legislators on Rural Health Issues

The Chair, Speaker Gwadosky, drew members' attention to the letter, noting that it requested use of the House Chamber as well as financial support from the Legislature.

Motion: That the request be approved (Motion by Sen. Bustin; second by Rep. Jacques).

At this point, the Chair, Speaker Gwadosky, recognized Helen Zidowecki, representing the Maine Office of Rural Health. Ms. Zidowecki indicated that the conference date had been changed from mid-November to January 18. Speaker Gwadosky posed the question about whether the group's request required Council action; and Sen. Bustin concurred, noting that the use of the House Chamber was not a Council issue. She encouraged Council members, however, to support the conference itself.

**Motion:** That the Council approve payment of per diem and expenses to the members of the Legal Affairs Committee for one meeting. (Motion by Rep. Jacques; second by Sen. Cahill; unanimous).

**Item #3: Requests to Authorize Payment of Annual Dues to the International Association of French-Speaking Parliamentarians (A.I.P.L.F.)**

Senate President Dutremble reported that he had been asked by Sen. Judy Paradis to bring this item before the Council. Sen. Paradis had informed him that Maine had not paid its dues for several years, and that unless Maine paid its dues of \$2,000 for the current year, it would no longer be considered a member in good standing. After brief discussion, Council members asked Ms. Tubbesing to obtain additional information from the organization.

**Motion:** That the item be tabled. (Motion by Sen. Cahill, second by Rep. Jacques; unanimous).

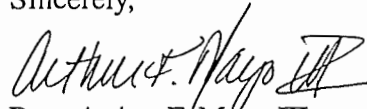

RE: **Extension Request**

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Pursuant to the authorizing legislation that established the Commission, I am requesting a further extension beyond the January 15, 1998 reporting date approved by the Legislative Council on December 18, 1997 (see Resolves 1997, c. 72, § 5). The Commission requires another extension for the following reasons:

1. The Commission was not convened until December 5th;
2. The Commission has held two subsequent meetings, including a public hearing, in which Commission members have begun to explore the range of issues involved in the six charges entrusted to the Commission; however to accommodate the needs of Commission members and other people with hearing- or speech-impairments, our Commission meetings are limited to only three hours (which is the maximum time that interpreters are able to provide interpretation services);
3. The interpreters contracted with the Legislature have already been reserved through Wednesday, January 21st for other Legislative meetings and the lead time necessary to schedule other interpreters for the next Commission meeting may take up to two weeks, therefore, the Commission will not be able to conduct another meeting before the January



15th deadline; and

4. Commission members will not have sufficient time between now and the January 15th reporting deadline to properly consider the complex issues before them and to complete the multiple tasks involved in preparing findings and recommendations, including any necessary legislation, for consideration by the 118th Legislature.

At the Commission's January 6th meeting we agreed on the following course of action, pending approval by the Legislative Council. We plan to schedule the fourth Commission meeting later in January to continue our deliberations and prepare an interim report on or before February 6, 1998. We intend to make preliminary recommendations and agree on an interim report, including proposed legislation to address short-term funding needs, to be considered by the 118th Legislature. We further propose that the Legislative Council postpones the Commission's activities until after the 118th Legislature adjourns and, at the same time, extends the Commission's work until Wednesday, September 30, 1998. This extension will permit Commission members with the time necessary to more thoroughly address the complex issues before them, including Public Utilities Commission rate regulation, the Americans with Disabilities Act, and federal Telecommunications Law.

In summary, I am requesting an extension until February 6, 1998, for the Commission's interim report and proposed legislation to be presented to the Legislature. Furthermore, I am requesting that the Commission's final report and any necessary legislation can be prepared for consideration by the 119th Legislature.

I trust that the Legislative Council will consider this request at its next scheduled Council meeting. Please contact me should you require any further information. On behalf of the Commission, thank you for your consideration of this request.

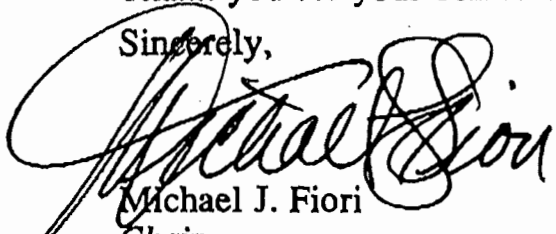

The 19 member Task Force to Study the Feasibility of Creating a Maine Mobility Fund, established by Resolves of 1997, chapter 73, held its first meeting on Friday, December 19, 1997 in room 134 of the State House. Fifteen of the 19 appointed members were present for the meeting, including three of the four legislative members.

At the conclusion of that meeting, a majority of the Task Force members voted to request that the Council extend our reporting deadline to October 15, 1998, with the understanding that we would hold our next meeting sometime around June 1, 1998. Resolves of 1997, chapter 73, authorizes the Council to grant such a request. Our current reporting deadline is January 1, 1997.

This request is necessary because a large majority of the members of the Task Force are of the opinion that several months, at a minimum, are needed to complete our work on the complicated and substantive issues before us. As requested by the Legislative Council of the 118th Maine State Legislature on November 20, 1997, the following is an interim report on the work of the *Task Force to Review the Applied Technology Centers and Applied Technology Regions*, established pursuant to Chapter 74, Resolves of 1997.

The Task Force to Review the Applied Technology Centers and Applied Technology Regions, established pursuant to Chapter 74, Resolves of 1997 and hereafter referred to as the Chapter 74 Task Force, comprises the following eleven members, one appointed by the Governor, two appointed jointly by the President of the Maine Senate and the Speaker of the Maine House of Representatives, five representing other organizations, and three ex officio:

Joanna M. Jones of Bath Iron Works, the former Chair of the Maine Human Resource Development Council, appointed by the Governor to represent the business community;

Senator Mary E. Small of Bath, appointed by the President and the Speaker to represent the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs;

Representative John L. Tuttle, Jr., of Sanford, appointed by the President and the Speaker to represent the Joint Standing Committee on Legal and Veterans Affairs;

John R. Turcotte, Superintendent of MSAD #67 in Lincoln, appointed by the President of the Maine School Management Association as a superintendent who is a member of the cooperative board of an applied technology region;

Anthony H. Krapf, Superintendent of MSAD #59 in Madison, appointed by the President of the Maine School Management Association as a superintendent who is a member of the advisory committee of an applied technology center;

Denis L. Howard, Director of Maine Applied Technology Region 7 in Belfast and the President of the Maine Association of Vocational Education Administrators;

Dr. Donald Cannan, Director of the Lewiston Regional Technical Center, appointed by the President of the Maine Association of Vocational Education Administrators;

Staff assistance to the task force is being provided by Yvonne Damborg, formerly of MCVE, and Lloyd Keast of MDOE.

The first meeting of the Chapter 74 Task Force held on November 20, 1997, called together at the invitation of Representative Elizabeth H. Mitchell, Speaker of the House and Chair of the Legislative Council.

The first meeting was primarily organizational; all votes were unanimous. Philip A. Dionne, former Chair of the Maine Council on Vocational Education, was elected chair of the task force. As provided in Section 7 of Chapter 74, a request for an extension of the January 1, 1998 deadline for the submission of a report to the Second Regular Session of the 188th Legislature and the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs was forwarded to the Legislative Council. The second meeting of the task force was set for December 30, 1997.

Later on November 20, 1997, the request for an extension was granted by the Legislative Council.

The second task force meeting was held as scheduled on December 30, 1997; this meeting was primarily informational. Gary Leighton, MDOE Supervisor of School Finance, presented an overview of State funding of applied technology regions and centers. Phillip McCarthy, Legislative Analyst for Education and Cultural Affairs, distributed a "Summary of Applied Technology Education Legislation Referred to the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs and the Joint Standing Committee on Legal and Veterans Affairs during the 118th Maine State Legislature (1st Regular and 1st Special Session)." Chair Philip A. Dionne offered an overview of the State applied technology statute (M.R.S.A. 20-A, Chapter 313) and an analysis of current Cooperative Agreements between school units affiliated with applied technology regions and centers.

Detailed minutes and attendance rosters for each task force meeting are available from the MDOE (Workforce Education Team, 287-5854).

The next meetings of the Chapter 74 Task Force have been scheduled for January 15 and 29, 1998, and will primarily be focused on data gathering and analysis. The Task Force expects to work systematically through each of the seven issues specified in Section 4 of Chapter 74, and currently anticipates being able to complete its work and present a report and a set of recommendations to the Legislature by the new deadline of March 1, 1998.

Resolve, to Study Registration for In-home Personal Care  
and Support Workers

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, Maine citizens who require in-home personal care and support are living in a variety of settings and receiving that care from providers whose background information may be difficult to obtain; and

Whereas, without access to background information consumers can not make informed decisions in the hiring and employment of their personal care and support workers; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Sec. 1. Task force established. Resolved: That the Task Force on Registration of In-home Personal Care and Support Workers, referred to in this resolve as the "task force," is established to study the registration of personal care and support workers who work in homes, assisted living centers, residential care facilities and supported living arrangements; and be it further

Sec. 2. Task force membership. Resolved: That the task force consists of the following members:

1. The Commissioner of Human Services or the commissioner's designee and a member of the Division of Licensure and Certification of the Department of Human Services chosen by the commissioner;

2. The Commissioner of Public Safety or the commissioner's designee;

3. The Commissioner of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services or the commissioner's designee;

4. The following members are jointly appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House:

A. One member of the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services and one member of the Joint Standing Committee on Criminal Justice, of whom one member must be from each major political party;

B. One representative of providers of in-home personal care and support;

C. One representative of an assisted living center, residential care facility or supported living facility;

D. One representative of consumers receiving consumer directed care;

E. One representative of the long-term care ombudsman program; and

F. One representative of the Legal Services for the Elderly, Inc.; and be it further

Sec. 3. Appointments; meetings. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council must be notified by all appointing authorities once the selections have been made. Within 15 days of the appointment of all members, the Chair of the Legislative Council shall call and convene the first meeting of the task force. The task force shall select a chair from among its members; and be it further

Sec. 4. Duties. Resolved: That the task force shall:

1. Examine laws from other states relating to the registration of personal care and support workers providing services in homes, assisted living centers, residential care facilities and supported living facilities;

2. Examine registration, recording and reporting systems for personal background information and criminal record checks of personal care and support workers working in homes, assisted living centers, residential care facilities and supported living facilities;

3. Evaluate different registration, recording and reporting systems, including, but not limited to, the impact on consumer choice and consideration of timeliness and cost for consumers, persons providing care, agencies or entities employing persons providing care and payors for care, including the State and the Medicaid program; and

4. Make recommendations, together with any necessary implementing legislation, on the subject of registration of personal care and support workers providing services in homes, assisted living centers, residential care facilities and supported living facilities; and be it further

Sec. 5. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the Department of Human Services shall provide staffing assistance; and be it further

Sec. 6. Voluntary service. Resolved: That the members of the task force shall serve without compensation or reimbursement of any type; and be it further

Sec. 7. Report. Resolved: That the task force shall submit its report, together with any necessary implementing legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services and the Second Regular Session of the 118th Legislature no later than January 1, 1998. If the task force requires an extension, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant the extension.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

Title: An Act Regarding the Employment of Unlicensed Assistive Personnel

Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §1717 and 1718 are enacted to read:

§1717. Registration of personal care agencies

1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings:

- A. "Activities of daily living" means tasks that are routinely performed by an individual to maintain bodily function, including but not limited to mobility, transfers in position between sitting, standing and prone positions, dressing, eating, toileting, bathing and personal hygiene.
- B. "Unlicensed assistive personnel" means individuals employed to provide hands on assistance with activities of daily living to individuals in homes, assisted living centers, residential care facilities, hospitals and other health care settings. Unlicensed assistive personnel does not include certified nursing assistants employed in their capacity as certified nursing assistants.
- C. "Personal care agency" means a business entity or subsidiary thereof not otherwise licensed by the Division of Licensing and Certification that hires and employs unlicensed assistive personnel to provide assistance with activities of daily living to individuals in the places in which they reside, either permanently or temporarily. An individual who hires and employs unlicensed assistive personnel to provide care for that individual is not a personal care agency.
- D. "Hires and employs" means meeting any of the following criteria:
- a. Defines the scope of the position, recruits, selects, trains, declares competent, schedules, directs, supervises and terminates individuals who provide personal care.

2. Registration of personal care agencies. Beginning July 1, 1998, a personal care agency not otherwise licensed by the department shall register with the department. The annual registration fee is \$25.

3. Prohibited employment and contracting. A personal care agency may not employ permanently or hire a long-term contract as unlicensed assistive personnel:

- A. A person who has been convicted of abuse, neglect or misappropriation of funds in a health care setting; or
- B. A person who has worked as a certified nursing assistant and has been the subject of a substantiated complaint, by a State Survey Agency, of abuse, neglect or misappropriation of funds in a health care setting.



4. Policies. Beginning July 1, 1998 a personal care agency shall adopt policies regarding the hiring and continued employment of unlicensed assistive personnel who have been convicted of crimes.

5. Penalty.

A. Any person who operates a personal care agency without registering with the department commits a civil violation for which a forfeiture may be adjudged of \$500 per day of operations.

B. Failure to conduct criminal background checks by either a registered personal care agency or an agency/business licensed by the Division of Licensing and Certification may be adjudged \$300 per omission.

§1718. Criminal record check required.

Beginning July 1, 1998 a personal care agency subject to Section 1717 and a business entity licensed by the Division of Licensing and Certification must request a criminal record check on all unlicensed assistive personnel who are hired on or after July 1, 1998, whether they are hired as employees or as independent contractors, within 14 days of the beginning of employment. Prior to hiring unlicensed assistive personnel, a personal care agency or business entity, licensed by the Division of Licensing and Certification, must provide written notice to the individual applicants that a criminal record check will be conducted. A personal care agency or business entity, licensed by the Division of Licensing and Certification, may request a criminal record check of unlicensed assistive personnel employed before July, 1998. If a criminal record check reveals a record of conviction, a personal care agency or business entity, licensed by the Division of Licensing and Certification, must inform the applicant of the finding.

Sec. 2. Report required. The Commissioner of Human Services shall report to the joint standing committee having jurisdiction over health and human services matters on or before January 1, 1999, on the feasibility of establishing a statewide system for checking the criminal history of unlicensed assistive personnel and a registry for maintaining records of criminal convictions and substantiated complaints of abuse, neglect or misappropriation of funds in a health care setting by the year 2000. The following characteristics should be considered; the system for checking for criminal convictions should be nationwide; the registry should be statewide; the cost should be reasonable; there should be a single point of access for the public; funding must be provided to the Department of Human Services and the Bureau of Identification; and the Department of Human Services shall adopt rules regarding the system and the registry.

## **Statement of Fact**

Registration for Personal Care Agencies and business entities, licensed by the Division of Licensing and Certification, with corresponding penalties for failure to register or perform criminal background checks, as well as definitions of a Personal Care Agency, Unlicensed Assistive Personnel and Activities of Daily Living, are the major components included in the proposed bill under Title 22 MRSA, Section 1717.

In addition, Title 22 MRSA, Section 1718, requires criminal record checks for Unlicensed Assistive Personnel hired as of July 1, 1998. The Commissioner of Human Services shall report to the joint standing committee having jurisdiction over health and human services matters on or before January 1, 1999, on the feasibility of establishing a statewide system for checking the criminal history of Unlicensed Assistive Personnel and a registry for maintaining records of criminal convictions and substantiated complaints of abuse, neglect or misappropriation of funds in a health care setting by the year 2000.
