SUMMARY OF March 8, 1999, COUNCIL MEETING

Motion: That the Summary be accepted and placed on file. (Motion by Sen. Rand; second by Rep. Shiah; unanimous).

REPORTS FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND COUNCIL STAFF DIRECTORS

Sally Tubbesing drew members' attention to a report that Margaret Matheson had prepared to summarize the status of the Revisor's Office's efforts to complete drafting of initial bill requests. She stated that the other Directors would also provide Council members with written reports in the interest of preserving the time at this meeting for the Council's discussion of the Computer Migration Project.

This item required no formal Council action.

REPORTS FROM COUNCIL COMMITTEES

Migration Project Steering Committee

Senate President Lawrence, who chairs this Committee, drew Council members' attention to a briefing paper in their packets that summarized the scope of both the overall Migration project and of the proposed first phase, which is designed to be a process review. He led members through the material, noting that the Legislative Process Review would include the following:

- validation of the assumptions, processes, and technologies used in developing the Bill Drafting and Bill Status System design and specifications used in the request for Proposal, and recommendation of modifications to these if required;
- integration of the Senate, House, and Committee processes/systems into the overall migration plan;
- assessment of the adequacy of the information technology environment; and
- identification and implementation of any "quick wins" that are identified in the course of the process review.

In the discussion that followed, Council members raised the following questions:

- 1. Whether this work was related to the Y2K work that the Council had previously approved in that it would involve the use of offshore resources. (Rep. Campbell)
 - Senate President Lawrence responded that this is a completely separate project, which is designed to help the Committee and the Council identify areas where the legislative process might be streamlined.
- 2. Discussion of KPMG's billing rate for this work. (Speaker Rowe)

Speaker Rowe, who had previously questioned the rate, stated that the information Mr. Mayotte had provided to the Council clearly indicates that the blended rate quoted by KPMG includes the firm's indirect costs. Given this and the fact that this would be a fixed price contract, he had concluded that the rate compares favorably with other work with which he is familiar.

Motion: That the recommendations presented by the Migration Oversight Team be approved to 1) proceed with a multiple-phase Migration project; and 2) approve a fixed price contract with KPMG LLP for the first phase of the Migration Project -- a Legislative Process Review -- whose specific scope of work will be defined by the Migration Oversight Team, with the provision that the Migration Team will bring forward to the Legislative Council, or the Presiding Officers, as appropriate, all policy matters requiring resolution, clarification, or action resulting from the Migration Project. (Motion by Sen. Rand; second by Rep. Shiah; unanimous).

NEW BUSINESS

Item #1: After Deadline Requests

After deadline requests were considered by the Legislative Council. The Council's action on these requests is included on the attached list.

Item #2: Request from CSG/ERC for Payment of Dues to Support ERC's Eastern Trade Council

The Chair, Senate President Lawrence, recognized Senator Kontos and asked her to present the item. Senator Kontos, who is one of Maine's two members of the Executive Committee for CSG's Eastern Regional Conference, drew members' attention to a letter from the ERC office requesting payment of Maine's dues to the Eastern Trade Council (ETC), an organization that the member states have established to serve as a analyst for public/private sector cooperation in export trade promotion in the eastern region.

Senator Kontos reported that she had worked with the Governor's Office and the Department of Economic and Community Development to fund the dues in 1998, the inaugural year of the ETC, but that she had come to the Legislative Council because she believes that the ETC should really be a legislative activity. In response to a question from the Chair, Senate President Lawrence, she stated that executive branch agency involvement in the ETC in other states is really limited to those agencies that have specific responsibility for developing international trade. Senator Kontos advocated developing a long term approach to funding these dues; and the Chair, Senate President Lawrence, suggest, that the Executive Branch share in the long term solution.

Senator Kontos then noted that she had asked Sally Tubbesing to determine whether there were any funds available in the Legislature's current budget that could be used to pay at least a portion of the \$5,500 dues for the current fiscal year (FY 1999). Ms. Tubbesing reported that there are balances in two accounts that are used to pay dues to other organizations - the Commission on Uniform State Laws and the Interstate Cooperation Commission - totaling \$4,397, and that these funds would not normally be used for any other purpose.

Motion: That the Council approve the allocation of the balances in two accounts - the Commission on Uniform State Laws and the Interstate Cooperation Commission -- totaling \$4,397 for payment of Maine's dues to support the Eastern Trade Council in FY 2000 and FY 2001; and that the Council present an amendment to the Part 2 request that has been submitted for the balance; and, further, that the Executive Director be directed to include these dues in future biennial budget requests. (Motion by Rep. Saxl; second by Speaker Rowe; unanimous).

Migration Project - The contract with KPMG LLP for the first phase of the Migration Project as approved by the Council at its March 22nd meeting was signed by the President and Speaker on March 25th. Work will start on Monday, April 12, 1999 and is scheduled to complete in four months.

Year 2000:

WANG application software Year 2000 correction work being performed by CST2000 is proceeding to the schedule established in the project plan. The vendor has completed the review of the applications to identify all the code containing dates or date routines. Actual code correction has started. The corrected applications will not be installed until after the session is completed. Testing of the corrected code will take place in a separate test environment before it is put into production.

The Executive Branch has established a contract with PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP to assess the readiness of Agencies for Year 2000. The Legislature is looking into the options for using this service to assess its own readiness. If this is worthwhile, a recommendation will be made to the Council in May or June.

Indexing the Legislative Record:

Working overtime to maintain progress on the 117th. There have been delays in establishing the contract for printing.

STATE HOUSE RENOVATIONS KEY DECISIONS REQUIRED REGARDING SCOPE OF WORK DURING THE 1999 INTERIM

April 5, 1999

- General Upgrade of Systems and Finishes
 - a) Replacement of all exterior windows and reconditioning of wood frames;
 - b) Installation of mechanical and electrical systems including sprinkler system, upgrade of electrical systems, heating, ventilation and air conditioning in a manner that both achieves compliance with all relevant codes and preserves the historical and architectural character of the building;
 - c) Renovation of all bathrooms in this wing and relocation of women's bathroom on the first floor;
 - d) Installation of security devices in accordance with a plan to be finally approved by the Council by April 30;
- Renovation of the Senate Chamber, in a manner consistent with the scope of work comparable to that completed in the House Chamber last summer, which includes:
 - a) Renovation of the front dais area to accommodate technology and to support enhanced work flow in a manner that is consistent with accessibility requirements;
 - b) Replacement of members' desks, chairs, and carpet;
 - c) A comprehensive treatment of all finishes (plaster, paint, and wood surfaces);
 - d) Integration of the sound system and the electronic voting/request to speak system.
- Reassign of the Appropriations Committee Room in accordance with the schematic design dated March, 1999;
 - Expands the hearing room to increase the seating capacity.
 - Provides work space (caucus offices) to be assigned to members of the Committee.



STATE HOUSE RENOVATIONS
