MEETING SUMMARY December 8, 2003

CALL TO ORDER

The Vice-Chair, Speaker Colwell, called the Legislative Council meeting to order at 2:12 p.m. in the Legislative Council Chamber.

SUMMARY OF THE NOVEMBER 18, 2003 COUNCIL MEETING

Motion: That the Meeting Summary of November 18, 2003 be accepted and placed on file. (Motion by Rep. Bruno, second by Sen. Davis, unanimous).

REPORTS FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND STAFF OFFICE DIRECTORS

Executive Director's Report

David Boulter, Executive Director, reported that a dedication of the portrait of former Governor King is scheduled for Saturday, December 27th, 10:00 a.m.

Mr. Boulter also reported that the interpretive panel information regarding the dioramas should be completed by museum staff in January. The benches for the diorama area should also be completed and installed in January.

The 2002 contract with Granger Northern, Inc., the managing contractor for the work at the State House has been signed for renovation work in the State House. The notable change in this contract is that the Legislature now has provisions that are intended to ensure timely work. A stipulated penalties provision has been added to the contract in the event of a failure to perform work in a timely manner.

Mr. Boulter announced the appointment of 2 staff persons:

Patricia Barney, Accounting Technician in the Office of the Executive Director. Ms. Barney's first day of employment is December 15, 2003.

Howard Boucher, Facilities Support Staff in the Office of the Executive Director. Mr. Boucher began working on December 8, 2003. Mr. Boulter introduced Mr. Boucher to the members of the Legislative Council.

The Vice-Chair, Speaker Colwell, on behalf of the entire Legislative Council, welcomed Mr. Boucher to the Legislature.

No Council action required.

Fiscal Report

Grant Pennoyer, Director, Office of Fiscal and Program Review, reported to Council members that the timing of the December Council meeting precluded a report on final November revenues. Based on a preliminary review of the revenue figures, General Fund revenue was under projections by approximately \$18 million based on the old forecast, which he believed to be timing issues. When the Administration's report is released in the next week or so, the new forecast will be reflected and Mr. Pennoyer believes it will be close to budget.

He also reported that the Tax Amnesty program appears to be generating revenue at the amount projected.

A clarification was requested regarding information Mr. Pennoyer provided regarding negative variance and year-to-date balances for sales tax. He said that hopefully sales tax will hold up throughout the year. The Revenue Forecasting Committee is waiting for information about the Holiday season and, therefore, the committee did not change the forecast amounts for the short term.

• Office of Information Services' Report

Bill Drafting System

Paul Mayotte, Director, Legislative Information Services, reported that the Legislature, through the Attorney General's Office, has sent a letter to HP clarifying the Legislature's position on what is an acceptable performance for the bill drafting system. HP informed the Legislature on December 5, 2003 that it would be installing the final version software in early January, 2004. Mr. Mayotte said he has made it clear to HP that the legislative session begins January 7, 2004 and the ability to support them would depend on the needs

of the Legislature. HP also proposed for improving performance of the application installing a larger and faster server for the bill drafting system at their expense. HP has been informed that the Legislature wants the software fixed, and will not accept a hardware option to address a software problem.

The Legislature is seeking modifications to the software warranty to provide coverage through a complete legislative session.

SPAM Filtering

The level of incoming SPAM emails is approximately 4,200 per week, which were successfully screened by SPAM filers.

Office of Policy and Legal Analysis

David Elliott, Director, Office of Policy and Legal Analysis, reported that a majority of the studies will be completed by the end of December. A copy of the Progress Report on Legislative Studies is attached for the Legislative Council's reference.

Office of the Revisor of Statute

Margaret Matheson, Revisor of Statutes, reported to the Legislative Council that as of Thursday evening, December 4, 2003, all legislators' bills that had been accepted at the October 22 and November 18, 2003 Council meetings, with two exceptions that had been sanctioned by the Presiding Officers, are out for legislator signature, the total being 160. In addition, approximately 70 agency and independent agency bills have been sent out to the agencies. Cycle two changes are now being received. The Secretary of the Senate, Clerk of the House and Revisor's Office have worked together to expedite the handling of signatures for the bills.

No Council action required.

REPORTS FROM COUNCIL COMMITTEES

Personnel Committee

The Personnel Committee had met earlier in the day. Rep. Richardson was not in attendance but had requested that the Speaker chair the meeting. Speaker Colwell reported on the following:

1. Administrative Leave for Christmas Holiday

Speaker Colwell said the Personnel Committee discussed and voted unanimously to recommend administrative leave for legislative employees. He offered the following motion:

Motion: That legislative offices be closed on Wednesday, December 24th beginning at noon and all day on Friday, December 26th, and that all legislative employees who are in pay status as of December 24th be granted paid administrative leave for that time. (Motion by Speaker Colwell, second by Sen. Treat, unanimous).

2. Request to Amend Military Leave Provision of Personnel Policies

Speaker Colwell asked Mr. Boulter to summarize this matter. A member of the Personnel Committee has made a request to amend the military leave provision of the personnel policies handbook for legislative staff members who are serving in the Iraqi conflict. A draft proposal was prepared and reviewed by the committee. The proposal makes technical corrections to be consistent with federal and state law.

Under the proposal, employees who either volunteer or are ordered to active duty to serve in the Iraqi conflict would continue to have their health insurance paid to the same extent that it is paid for while they are working for the Legislature. The employee's current share of health insurance costs is paid by the State and 60% of the dependent care coverage is paid by the State. Currently, if an employee is called to active duty, up to 30 days is paid for in that manner. There is no requirement that employers pay beyond the 30 days. Members of the armed forces are eligible for military health insurance under TRICARE as soon as they are ordered to active duty. TRICARE does include medical coverage for dependents. The proposed change would provide a legislative staff member who is called to service in the Iraqi conflict, the option of whether to receive health care coverage under TRICARE or continue with the insurance provisions offered by the Maine Legislature, for a period of up to 18 months. The Personnel Committee recommended approval of the following motion:

Motion: That the Legislative Council adopt the suggested revisions to the military leave provisions of the personnel policies and guidelines for legislative employees, in place of the current provisions. (Motion by Speaker Colwell, second by Sen. Treat, unanimous).

Rep. Duplessie suggested that the Personnel Committee consider a long-term policy regarding military leave at some time in the future.

3. Human Resources Position

Speaker Colwell requested that Executive Director Boulter provide an update on the human resources position for the legislature. Mr. Boulter reminded members that in February, 2003 the Legislative Council unanimously authorized the creation of a human resources position to serve the legislature and asked that he develop a funding proposal that allowed the position to be funded within existing budgeted resources. The information was presented to the Legislative Council at an earlier meeting and had been tabled so members could assess the information and authorize the position when it believed it most appropriate to do so. The position will be funded within existing budgeted resources by using vacant positions and transferring some positions that are full-time to session only. Mr. Boulter said the Personnel Committee believed that it is the appropriate time to authorize the human resources position and unanimously recommended approval of the funding plan.

Motion: That the Legislative Council authorize the Executive Director's Office to establish a Human Resources Director position and fill the position effective April 1, 2004. The position is to be funded within existing budgeted resources and in accordance with the position changes identified in the proposed funding plan. (Motion by Speaker Colwell, second by Rep. Bruno, unanimous).

Item #5: Eastern States Legislative Fiscal Officers Association Meeting

Mr. Pennoyer said the Association invited Maine to host the annual meeting of the Eastern States Legislative Fiscal Officers Association in 2001, but due to significant turnover in his office, Maine declined. Maine has now been invited to host the annual meeting in 2004. The estimated funds available from the Association to support Maine hosting the meeting in 2004 is approximately \$4,600. Mr. Pennoyer expects that approximately \$3,000 would be generated from registration revenue. Mr. Pennoyer requested that the Legislative Council approve his request that Maine host the 2004 meeting and to make a contribution to the Eastern States Legislative Fiscal Officers Association to help fund the meeting in the amount of \$2,500.

Motion: That the Legislative Council agree to host the Eastern States Legislative Fiscal Officers Association Annual Meeting in 2004 and to assist in the funding of the meeting in an amount not to exceed \$2,500. (Motion by Sen. Treat, second Sen. Gagnon, unanimous).

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING (Executive Session)

Motion: That, in accordance with 1 MRSA section 405, subsection 6, the Legislative Council enter into an executive session with its counsel and negotiators for the purposes of discussing labor contracts and proposals involving MSEA and its represented legislative employees. (Motion by Sen. Treat, second by Rep. Bruno, unanimous).

The Council proceeded to go into Executive Session at 3:00 p.m.

Fiscal Briefing for the Legislative Council

January 13, 2004 Meeting

1. General Fund and Highway Fund Revenue Variances for December 2003 (Summary Sheet Attached)

General Fund

Total General Fund revenue was over budget by \$16.3M for December and is now running ahead of budget for the 1st half of FY04 by \$11.9M.

- o Individual Income Tax Up by \$10.7M in Dec./Up by \$11.0M for FY-T-D
- o Sales Tax Up by \$4.6M in Dec./Up by \$4.4M for FY-T-D
- o Cigarette Tax Up by \$0.6M in Dec./Up by \$0.7M for FY-T-D
- o Estate Tax Up by \$1.6M in Dec./Up by \$0.5M for FY-T-D
- o Insurance Taxes Up by \$0.7M in Dec./Down by \$1.2M for FY-T-D
- o Corporate Income Tax-Down by \$2.1M in Dec./Down by \$1.9M for FY-T-D It is too early to determine yet whether this positive variance, particularly, the individual income tax variance, will hold up through the remainder of FY04.

Highway Fund

Total Highway Fund revenue was over budget by \$1.8M in December; increasing the positive variance to \$3.8M through the 1st half of FY04. Motor Vehicle Registration and Fees revenue variances account for \$0.9M of the December variance and \$2.7M of 1st half variance over and above the upward revision to the forecast for this revenue line. Fuel taxes also were ahead of budget, \$1.2M for December and \$1.0M for the 1st half.

2. Revenue Forecasting

- The Consensus Economic Forecasting Commission (CEFC) and the Revenue Forecasting Committee (RFC) met in a joint meeting on Monday, January 12, 2004 at the State Planning Office to review process and discuss proposed changes to the process and to discuss FY04 revenue revisions. The RFC adopted an increase of Other Revenue of \$2,066,000 in FY04 associated with 2 unusual and unanticipated events an insurance settlement affecting fine revenue and the sale of the Maine Mall affecting Real Estate Transfer Tax.
- The CEFC will be meeting Wednesday, January 27, 2004 to review and potentially revise the current economic forecast. CEFC has a statutory reporting date of February 1st.
- The RFC has not yet set its meeting schedule, but will meet sometime in mid-February to review and update the revenue forecasts for the General Fund, Highway Fund and Fund for a Healthy Maine. The RFC has a statutory reporting date of March 1st.

In accordance with the Joint Rules, the Council will consider After Deadline Bill Requests at that time, including the request(s) you have filed with the Revisor's Office. In addition, the Council is required by Joint Rule 35 to decide all requests for Memorials (Joint Resolutions that memorialize another governmental agency or official) for introduction.

You should plan to attend this Council meeting or present your request(s) to a member of the Legislative Council prior to the meeting. The Council may, but is not obligated to, table a request until the following meeting if the sponsor is not present, so it will have the benefit of information from the sponsor when it votes.

The Council's review of After Deadline Requests is pursuant to Joint Rule. Please be advised that the Council asks that all sponsors <u>first</u> research whether there is an existing bill or LR available to a committee that could accommodate their request. The review procedure then will be as follows:

- 1. The Council Chair, President Beverly Daggett, will read the name of the sponsor and the title of the request.
- 2. Once recognized to speak by the Chair, the sponsor may proceed to the microphone. The sponsor should be prepared to concisely answer the following:
 - Why the bill request is "late" (filed after the cloture date);
 - Why the bill request constitutes an emergency such that the Legislature needs to consider the bill this session; and
 - Whether the likely committee of jurisdiction has a bill already referred to it that could be amended to include the proposal.

Council members may also ask questions related to the content or the intent of the bill to clarify the request, although sponsors generally are not asked to speak to the merits of the bill.

3. Following the questions Council members will vote on bill requests individually; a roll call vote is required pursuant to Joint Rule.

A complete list of the Council's action on After Deadline Requests is distributed to Council members and all sponsors as soon after adjournment of the Council meeting as possible. The list and the roll call votes are available in the Executive Director's office if you should have any questions.

The Commission to Study Public Health met for the first time last Friday, December 5, in a productive meeting that reflected the members' great interest in the subject and willingness to accomplish the duties and tasks the Commission has been given. Based upon the study's enabling legislation, the Commission identified 10 detailed areas for which the Commission is expected to report findings and recommendations. The Commission believes that the most efficient and appropriate way to address these many issues is to form subcommittees, and tackle each issue in a smaller group. In order to appoint and organize these subcommittees, the Commission requests permission to meet on Friday, January 23, 2004 (not a session day) for this purpose.

The Commission also has decided to submit legislation to the Second Regular Session of the 121st Legislature enabling the Commission to continue its work in the interim after the Second Regular Session and submit a report, including recommended legislation, no later than December 1, 2004. We believe these steps will enable the Commission to do the important work with which it has been entrusted.


Permission to Meet; Request for Deadline Extension
