Legislative Council Chair, President Edmonds convened the meeting at 5:35 P.M. with a quorum of members present.

SUMMARY OF MARCH 26, 2008 MEETING OF LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Motion: That the Meeting Summary of March 26, 2008 be accepted and placed on file. Motion by Representative Pingree. Second by Senator Rosen. Motion passed unanimous (8-0). [Representative Crosthwaite and Senator Martin absent for vote.]

President Edmonds asked if there was any objection to taking an item out of order. Hearing none, the Chair then moved to New Business, Item 1: Presentation of Reproductions of Original Maine Constitution

David Cheever, State Archivist, Maine State Archives presented four of the fourteen pages of the reproduction of the original Maine Constitution that have been framed for public display and given to the Legislature for its use. The location of the display will be considered by the Facilities Committee at a future meeting.

Fiscal Report

Grant Pennoyer, Director, Office of Fiscal and Program Review, reported the following.

Revenue Update

Total General Fund Revenue - FY 2008 (\$'s in Millions)

General Fund revenue was over budget by \$18.6 million in March, reflecting the March 2008 revenue revision, which reduced budgeted FY 2008 General Fund revenue by \$26.9 million. For the fiscal year-to-date (FYTD), General Fund revenue was over budget by \$22.1 million or 1.2%. March's growth was very strong at 11.2% over last March's revenue and increased the growth rate for the FYTD to 1.5% over the same period in FY 2007. This FYTD growth rate was only 0.5% through February.

March corporate income tax receipts were very strong in March, above revised projections by \$8.7 million reversing a negative variance and posting a positive variance of \$7.6 million through March, a 7.1% variance.

Individual income tax revenue had a positive variance of \$12.8 million in March, mainly the result of refunds being significantly below projections. Heading into the month of April with the April 15th tax filing deadline, individual income tax has accumulated a positive variance of \$12.1 million.

Highway Fund revenue was slightly over revised budgeted revenue in March (adjusted downward by \$2.3 million for FY 2008 in the March forecast). For the FYTD, Highway Fund revenue was above budget by \$0.5 million or 0.2%. Highway Fund revenue through March showed negative growth of 0.3% over the same period in FY 2007.

Cash Balances

The average total cash pool balance in March was \$369.2 million, which was well below the average balance of the last 6 years for March of \$519.6 million. With the passage of the budget, allotments should be adjusted to "curtail" expenditures in anticipation of the bill becoming effective on June 30th. This reduction of expenditures in combination with March's strong revenue performance and the normal individual income tax positive cash flow in April should help improve the General Fund cash position. The General Fund balance, excluding reserve balances (\$159.3 million) and internal borrowing (\$241.9 million), was a negative \$283.3 million. March generally has the lowest General Fund cash balances during the fiscal year.

Information Technology Report

Paul Mayotte, Director, Office of Legislative Information Services, reported the following.

Wireless Network Service (Update):

Full wireless service for Legislators is being maintained using a temporary server/router installation. Installation of a permanent wireless server/router is planned for the interim period.

Legislative Web Page (Update):

Postings of amendments to the Legislature's Website are being monitored for the timely availability of the information. Automation of the process to post LDs and amendments to the Website is planned for the interim period.

REPORTS FROM COUNCIL COMMITTEES

There were no reports from Legislative Council committees or subcommittees.

President Edmonds asked if there was any objection to taking two items out of order. Hearing none, the Chair then moved to New Business, Item #2: Suggested Protocol for Deciding Study Requests and Item #3: Consideration of Proposed Legislative Studies.

NEW BUSINESS

ITEM #2: Suggested Protocol for Deciding Study Requests.

Mr. Boulter reviewed the suggested protocol for deciding study requests with the Legislative Council, as follows:

Requirements Relevant to Studies in the First Regular Session

Under the terms of the Joint Rules of the 123rd Legislature, section 353, all joint orders and legislation proposing legislative studies regardless of funding source must be placed on a special study table. The Legislative Council must review proposed studies and establish priorities for allocation of budgetary and staffing resources.

For studies authorized by the Legislative Council, the Legislative Council must provide funds sufficient to enable the committee to reasonably conduct and complete the requirements of the studies.

Also under the Joint Rules, the Legislative Council must adopt a policy relating to preparing study legislation. On May 24, 2007, the Legislative Council unanimously adopted a policy on legislative studies for the 123rd Legislature. Joint Rules and the related council policy specify the manner of appointment, selection of chair, compensation of members, report date and other relevants as part of study legislation.

Suggested Protocol for Authorizing Legislative Studies

- The Legislative Council will review study requests alphabetically by policy area.
- Voting will by a show of hands, and each Legislative Council member's vote on each bill will be recorded. The record of each vote will be made available for public inspection following the meeting. A 2/3rds majority is required to authorize any study reporting to a subsequent Legislature.
- Committee chairs and others are welcome to observe the Council's deliberations on the study requests, but discussion of the requests will be confined to council members and staff. However, Legislative Council members may ask questions of committee chairs and other legislators regarding the proposed study if needed.
- Unless otherwise specified by the Legislative Council, authorized studies are to be drafted consistent with applicable standards and policies approved by the Council. Floor amendments to authorized studies making Council-authorized changes will be prepared in the name of the Senate Assistant Majority Leader, except for studies tabled in the House will be in the name of the House Assistant Majority Leader.

Policy Issues Needing Decision

- Number of authorized meetings and meeting location-Recommendation: Unless otherwise specified by the Legislative Council, the number of study meetings is not to exceed four (4) and meetings are to be held in the Augusta area.
- Studies conducted using non-General Fund sources-Recommendation: When a study committee is required to be funded by outside funds, the study committee may not convene until sufficient funds are received to pay for the study.
- Interim committee meetings-Recommendation: Unless authorized by law or joint order, joint standing committees may not meet during the interim for any purpose without the prior written approval of the presiding officers. Committees wishing to meet must submit a written request to meet to the presiding officers indicating the number of meetings requested, the purpose of the meetings and the date of the meeting. Committee clerks will not be authorized for interim committee meetings.

Motion: That the Legislative Council accept the suggested protocol for considering proposed legislative studies. Motion by Representative Tardy. Second by Senator Mitchell. **Motion passed (10-0).**

ITEM #3: Consideration of Proposed Legislative Studies

Eight proposed studies were presented to the Legislative Council for its consideration. The Legislative Council's action on the study requests are included on the attached list.

ITEM #4: Consideration of After Deadline Bill Requests

Senator Martin made a motion to accept for introduction after deadline bill request LR 3652 "An Act to Amend the Charter of Northern Maine General." Second by Representative Pingree. **The motion to accept LR 3652 for introduction passed (9-0).** [Rep. Crosthwaite absent for vote]

The Legislative Council considered and acted on four other after deadline bill requests. The Legislative Council's actions on these requests are included on the attached list.

The Legislative Council then returned to the other items on its agenda.

ITEM 1: Legislative Council Actions Taken by Ballot

A copy of the list of actions taken by ballot by the Legislative Council since its March 26, 2008 meeting is attached. No further action by the Legislative Council is required.

Item #5: CSG/ERC 2010 Request that Maine Host Annual Meeting in Portland

Council of State Governments/Eastern Regional Conference has requested that Maine host the annual meeting of CSG/ERC in Portland, Maine in August 2010. Maine last hosted the annual meeting in 1997. Expected turn-out is 600 delegates and their families.

Mr. Boulter explained that the Legislature would need to establish a host committee to organize and oversee Maine's responsibilities, nominate legislators to serve as ERC chairs, retain a conference coordinator/planner, organize and host all social programs at the annual meeting, host a reception in Vermont in 2009, host several dinners and receptions during the annual meeting, and raise or appropriate approximately \$250,000 as Maine's financial contribution.

Senator Martin noted that Maine has hosted such meetings in the past, and while the meetings can bring many benefits to the host city and Maine generally, they require an enormous amount of advance preparation and commitment on the part of the Legislature. He concluded that hiring a conference coordinator to assist with key responsibilities and the logistics of hosting the CSG/ERC annual meeting is essential. Other members generally agreed and felt Maine would benefit from hosting the meeting. The Legislative Council postponed a decision on the request until the May council meeting after members have had an opportunity to review the request and the commitments required to host the annual meeting.

Legislative Council Executive Director's Report

May 21, 2008

- The YMCA Youth in Government program took place this month in the State House. 137 students and 17 advisors participated, representing 15 schools. The schools participating were from across Maine, including schools in York, Franklin, Washington and Aroostook counties. In planning for the 2009 program, the program director has requested to hold the program either April 3-5th or May 1-3rd, with preference for the April weekend.
- 2. The Legislative Digest of Bills and Resolves for the 123rd Legislature, 2nd Regular and 1st Special sessions is being prepared by staff from the offices of Policy and Legal Analysis and Fiscal and Program Review. The digest should be ready for distribution to all legislators by the first week in June.
- 3. Landscaping work is on-going in Capitol Park this month with a focus on the northwest portion of the park. Overgrown and dead or dying vegetation is being removed, and remaining plantings are being pruned.

1. Revenue Update (see attached)

- General Fund revenue was over budget by \$23.2 million in April, increasing the Fiscal Year-to-date (FYTD) positive variance for General Fund revenue to \$45.3 million or 2.0%. April's strong growth increased the growth rate for the FYTD to 3.1% over the same period in FY 2007.
- This year's pleasant "April Surprise" from individual income tax receipts resulted in a positive variance of \$30.6 million in April and \$42.7 million for the FYTD in this category. Corporate Income Tax collections also exceeded projections and were \$11.0 million over budget for the FYTD. Even the Sales Tax remained over budget for the FYTD.
- The Cigarette Tax, Estate Tax and Insurance Companies Tax remained under budget for the FYTD as did the Other Revenue category.
- The Other Revenue category was under budget by \$6.3 million in April. \$5.5 million of this was because the payment from Maine Beverage Company related to the profit sharing from liquor sales was budgeted in April but not received until May.

• Highway Fund revenue was under budget by \$1.2 million in April and by \$0.6 million or 0.3% for the FYTD. Negative growth in Highway Fund revenue continues through April and the prospect for a turnaround does not seem likely with fuel prices at record levels. The fuel tax variance was the major contributor to the FYTD negative revenue variance. The decline in gas tax consumption appears to be accelerating.

2. Cash Balances (see attached)

• The average total cash pool balance in April was \$446.4 million up from March's \$369.2 million average balance. However, April's balance was well below the average \$550.2 million balance of the last 6 years for April. For the General Fund, while reserves are high so is the amount of internal borrowing.

3. Budgeted Ending Fund Balances (see attached)

- The attached <u>budgeted</u> fund balance reports do not reflect revenue or other variances from budgeted actions through the close of the 123rd Legislature's 1st Special Session.
 - The General Fund budgeted ending balance is \$0.9 million for FY 2008 and \$1.4 million for FY 2009.
 - The Highway Fund budgeted ending balance is \$0.1 million for FY 2008 and \$0.1 million for FY 2009.
 - The Fund for a Healthy Maine budgeted ending balance is \$3.6 million for FY 2008 and \$3.4 million for FY 2009.



Legislative studies

We are tracking 12 legislative studies this interim. A list of those studies is attached. All of these studies will involve one or more of the nonpartisan staff offices in either a staffing or drafting role, or both.

As you will note, one of these studies is a "staff study" on teacher confidentiality which is to be conducted by OPLA pursuant to Public Law 2007, chapter 666. Because the language in this public law allows OPLA to undertake this staff study only upon the approval of the Legislative Council, a copy of a proposed work plan for that staff study is also attached for your review.

Legislators' Handbook

The Office of Policy and Legal Analysis has begun its biennial process of updating the Legislators' Handbook. The Legislators' Handbook is published every two years by OPLA, under the auspices of the Legislative Council.

Part of this process involves soliciting comments from other Legislative staff offices on the content of the handbook, particularly on those portions of the Handbook that relate most directly to the work of each particular office. An invitation was mailed to each legislative staff office director on Monday of this week inviting them to review the 2006 Legislators' Handbook and to make any suggestions for corrections, additions, deletions or clarifications that they may wish to see incorporated into the updated 2008 edition. My goal is to have the printed updated *Legislators' Handbook* printed by mid-August.

Legislative Digest of Bill Summaries and Enacted Laws

The "Legislative Digest of Bill Summaries and Enacted Laws" (aka the "bill summaries") for the 563 bills considered during the Second Regular and First Special Session has gone to the printers. A proof is expected next week and I anticipate the Digest will be distributed to legislators, legislative staff, and others by mid-June. The Digest summaries of all bills and adopted amendments and all laws enacted or finally passed during the Second Regular and First Special Sessions of the 123rd Maine Legislature.

Joint Order

(4-1) On motion by Senator MARTIN of Aroostook, the following Joint Order: S.P. 933

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Legislature intends that this order supercede House Paper 1665; and be it further

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Joint Standing Committee on Criminal Justice and Public Safety, referred to in this order as "the committee," shall meet to study issues related to sex offender registration laws as follows.

- 1. Convening of committee; meetings. The chairs of the committee shall call and convene the first meeting of the committee, which may be no later than June 15, 2008. The committee may meet 3 times.
 - 2. Duties. The committee's duties include:
 - A. Using other states' models for tiered systems based on risk and other examples of sex offender classification and assessment and creating a system of classification based on risk to be applied to each person required to register under the Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act of 1999 in order to classify registrants based on their risk of reoffending and the degree of likelihood that they pose a danger to the community;
 - B. Creating processes to apply the risk assessment and evaluate its use so that due process concerns are met and each risk assessment analysis provides useful information to those in the criminal justice system and others who receive that information; and
 - C. Reviewing the current list of registerable sex offenses and determining if changes to the current Maine sex offender registry and to the Maine sex offender registry website should be made.
 - 3. Staff assistance. The Legislative Council shall provide staffing services to the committee.
- 4. Compensation. Pursuant to Joint Rule 353, members of the committee are entitled to receive the legislative per diem and reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses related to their attendance at authorized meetings of the committee.
- 5. Report. No later than November 5, 2008, the committee shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, for the consideration of the First Regular Session of the 124th Legislature. Pursuant to Joint Rule 353, the committee is not authorized to introduce legislation. The joint standing committee of the 124th Legislature having jurisdiction over criminal justice and public safety matters may, pursuant to Joint Rule 353, introduce a bill during the First Regular Session of the 124th Legislature to implement the recommendations on matters relating to the study.

An Act To Amend Teacher Confidentiality Laws

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- Sec. 1. 20-A MRSA §13004, sub-§2-A, as enacted by PL 1983, c. 470, §11 and amended by PL 1999, c. 547, Pt. B, §78 and affected by §80, is further amended to read:
- 2-A. Complaints confidential. Complaints, charges or accusations made and investigated pursuant to section 13001 13020, replies to those complaints, charges or accusations, and any other information or materials that may result in action to deny, revoke or suspend certification shall be are confidential. Any charges or information filed by the commissioner with the District Court in support of a petition to revoke or suspend certification and any decision of the court shall be are public records. The department shall report all denials, revocations, suspensions, surrenders and reinstatements of certification that are not under appeal or still subject to appeal to a national association of state directors of teacher education and certification within 30 days of the action. In reports to the national association of state directors of teacher education and certification, the department may not disclose any information designated in this subsection as confidential.
- Sec. 2. Study by Office of Policy and Legal Analysis. Upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall review and summarize the extent to which laws in other states and jurisdictions permit the dissemination of confidential information pertaining to denials, revocations, suspensions, surrenders and reinstatements of teaching certificates to applicants for teacher certification or recertification and for professional licenses or credentials for other comparable professions. In conducting this analysis, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall review the apparent conflict between the confidentiality requirements placed on information received by the Commissioner of Education as set forth in the criminal history record check provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 6103 and the provisions set forth in Title 22, section 4011-A that require persons, when acting in a professional capacity, to report their knowledge or reasonable suspicions of the abuse or neglect of a child to the Department of Health and Human Services. The Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall submit a report with findings to the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs by November 5, 2008.

I represent a non-profit law library consortium, LLMC, that serves over 900 law library members located in the U.S., Canada and many other countries, dedicated to the preservation of and increased access to legal and governance-related materials. Over the past three decades we have converted over 105,000 volumes of law books into space-saving microforms. In the past five years we have begun to reformat all of that material and more into digital form for delivery on-line to our subscribers. The full range of titles we offer in both formats is described in depth on our free corporate web site www.llmc.com.

Among the areas upon which we are currently focused is the law and governance-related literature of your State of Maine. Our goal is to offer as many of the Maine primary legal titles as possible. Among these, of course, are the *Maine Supreme Court Reports*, for which we understand you as Secretary of State have copyright-release authority. We already have scanned and offer on-line all of the volumes of this title up to 1923. The purpose of this letter is to request permission to scan and offer additional volumes that either are or may be under copyright protection.

What we are seeking is a non-exclusive, limited license to scan all volumes of the *Maine Supreme Court Reports* from 1923 on for purposes of dissemination via *LLMC-Digital*, our non-profit group's online subscription service. The license term we seek is for 99 years, or earlier if the copyrights involved in the separate volumes should expire before then, and we would agree in advance to an automatic expiration of the license period should LLMC ever change its non-profit character or be absorbed by a for-profit corporate entity.

While the nature of our non-profit mode of functioning does not provide us the luxury of offering to pay royalties, we would be happy to insert a statement at the beginning of each volume published that "Permission to reprint has been granted by the State of Maine", as well as including an acknowledgement of the hardcopy donor source should it be any Maine state agency. More tangibly, if desired we also would be happy to provide copies of the digital scans at no cost for the use of the State of Maine or any of its agencies. If additional information regarding the extent of this request or regarding LLMC and its operations are required, I would be happy to provide them in response to a letter or e-mail or telephone call addressed to one of the numbers below.
