

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INTRODUCTION

This volume contains the titles and summaries of the 63 bill requests filed before cloture, rejected at the Legislative Council's October 31st meeting and appealed by the appeal deadline on October 8th. The council accepted 117 of 288 requests at its October 31st meeting. Part 7 contains a record of the vote for the requests and is sorted by sponsors' names in alphabetical order. Each sponsor's appeal notice is reproduced as received followed immediately by the ballot for the appealed request. Part 8 contains a list of appealed bills by broad subject. Part 9 contains a list of bill requests accepted by broad subject. Part 10 contains a list of accepted bill requests in order alphabetically by sponsor.

It is my intention to appeal the Council's rejection of the following bill request:

LR 2541 Resolve, to Remedy the Inequity Created by Opt Out Charges for Smart Meters

This is an emergency because the installation of these meters, which have been in progress this past year, will be completed during the first quarter of 2012 and the cost of opting out is unfairly affecting the elderly, the poor and other vulnerable citizens who cannot afford the up to 100% tax on their electricity delivery charge to opt out, whether for reasons of privacy or for health concerns.





Please reconsider the rejection of the precloture bill request filed for introduction in the Second Regular Session of the 125th Legislature on the following grounds:


- 1. The 123rd Legislature enacted an amendment in June of 2007 to a subsection definition of zoning ordinance to one paragraph (Title 30-A MRS §4314(3)), *but failed* to make the same amendment to another similarly worded sub-section that required the same definition (Title 30-A MRS §4352(2). This Amendment corrects the prior omission.
- 2. This omission, if left uncorrected, could result in unnecessary litigation by:
 - a. empowering municipalities to enact ordinances that directly conflict with dimensional standards contained in their Comprehensive Plans and causing citizens to challenge such enactments in court; and
 - b. causing citizens to petition the courts for declaratory judgments on the unconstitutionality of the State statute (allowing municipalities to significantly alter abutting property value circumventing the controls contained in the municipal comprehensive planning process).
- 3. The State Planning Office has been contacted and agrees that the prior amendment was incomplete and should be corrected.

For the above reasons, I respectfully request this appeal be granted and the Amendment allowed to continue for consideration by the Second Regular Session.



I respectfully appeal the Council's rejection of LR 2351: Resolve, To Improve Care Options for Sufferers of Serious Illness.

Maine faces a crisis with respect to end-of-life care. This fall, I learned Maine has no plan in the face of this crisis.

Already, too many Mainers die painfully and without options for home or hospice care. This avoidable situation will worsen without a plan. We are the oldest state in the nation, and by 2030 fully 58% of our population is expected to be over 65.

Maine ranks 28th out of 50 States in Medicare Hospice utilization with 37.8%. Many areas of the state still have no access to hospice or palliative care options. Also, recent data shows that one in four Americans dying each year is a veteran. Mainers deserve better.

Before voting, please consider whether you feel basic hospice or palliative care options should be available to you or to a loved one in time of need.

Acting now does not necessarily require major new public expense. Both the Hospice Association and the health care practitioners I am working with believe we can wait no longer to create a plan to address this crisis. They are eager to get to work.



I respectfully appeal the Council's rejection of LR 2364, An Act To Prohibit the Sale of Computer Programs for the Purpose of Evading Sales Tax.

This summer, new computer programs called "zappers" became a widespread concern among state tax officials. These sophisticated tax-evasion programs are legal in Maine and most other states. Many states are now moving forward to ban them.

Maine may have more reason to worry than most states. Across our border, the Canada Revenue Agency has found that one in three restaurants audited have used zappers, robbing others taxpayers of about \$1 million per incident. Quebec has been especially hard hit, losing \$417 million to zapper fraud in just one fiscal year and identifying over 230 zapper cases.

In the U.S., zapper expert Richard Ainsworth, a featured presenter this summer at NCSL, believes literally billions in fraud are being committed in individual states each year.

As my House Chair, Rep. Knight, said recently to Mal Leary, zappers are subversive and should be outlawed in Maine. This bill would allow us to act.



I submit this proposal at the request of the Maine Association of Substance Abuse Providers.

As you know, our battle against drug abuse must be waged on all three fronts: education, treatment, and regulation. This bill will help us ensure effective treatment and prevent recidivism by highest-risk users.

Specifically, the bill proposes a competitive, RFP approach for quality sentencing and treatment to ensure accountability and results in areas of greatest need. It proposes to do this by redeploying an existing federal funding stream. Both components will generate discussion and therefore require a hearing.

Due to the bath salts epidemic, some areas such as greater Bangor and Waterville are especially in need, and might be ideal candidates for this need-based, competitive funding.

Re: LR 2591, An Act to Secure the Safety of Electrical Power Transmission Lines

This legislation proposes to substantially solve two problems simultaneously.

The first problem is the biohazards of electromagnetic fields around power lines. The second problem is the vulnerability of our power lines, themselves, to potentially catastrophic damage from geomagnetic solar storms, and from electromagnetic pulse (EMP) characteristic of nuclear explosions well known as most likely to come from terrorists, accidents, or hostile nations -- that could leave us without electric power for months or years.

The GRID Act passed the U.S. House unanimously in August of 2010, but was gutted in the Senate. It responded to the urgent threat assessment about EMP (a term used also for solar storms) by the U.S. Congressional EMP Commission, the Strategic Posture Commission, and the National Academy of Sciences, directing that power lines, among other infrastructure, be "hardened" against such threats.

The vital, emergency importance of this was summarized by Peter Pry, a former CIA analyst and executive director of the EMP Commission, who said, "Within 12 months of an EMP attack or a massive solar flare, between two-thirds to 90 percent of the U.S. Population would perish" from lack of electricity. Solar storm activity has been increasing and scientists expect it to peak in 2012 and 2013, as new power lines are being constructed in Maine. Just a few weeks ago we barely missed one that still caused an aurora over Alabama and interrupted power in several dozen power districts in the South. An 8-hour difference in when it struck would have been a tragedy. Scientists say the question of a strike is not "if," but "when."

On Aug. 1, 2010, Pry said that NASA reported that satellites had detected a coronal mass ejection, or CME, "heading toward the Earth's direction," and the federal government issued a warning that a giant electromagnetic pulse from the solar storm might damage the electric grid of the United States. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said that it could have caused a "devastating impact on the national power grid." (Newsmax article of Oct. 14, 2010) In 1859 a strike extensively burned out much of the insulation of the national telegraphy system.

There are known, available, low-cost hardening fixes that power companies could readily implement. They would also reduce electromagnetic fields around power lines. It is timely as we commence power line construction, that we consider this legislation. UMO stands ready to offer its support, language has been developed in New York, national agencies are pressing for action, and government certified contractors are prepared to consult. If it's important enough to be considered by Congress, and shown to the public on C-Span, considered an emergency by scientific experts, it's vital for Maine to consider steps to protect her own. Please support hearing LR 2591.

Dear President Raye,

I am writing to appeal the October 31 decision of the Legislative Council to reject LR 2616 "An Act to Improve Municipal Campaign Reporting Requirements". This bill would require a 42 day pre-general election campaign report for municipal candidates.

Currently there is only an 11 day pre-general election report required for municipal candidates. In the City of Portland we just had a high profile mayoral campaign with 15 candidates. When the 11 day reports were filed one candidate reported raising over \$83,000 and others raised over \$40,000 each. While these contributions were being made throughout the summer months and thousands of dollars were being spent on various expenses, the voters were in the dark until 11 days before the election. I strongly feel that the general public has a right to know this information much sooner.

An additional 42-day pre-general election report is in the public interest and improves our campaign disclosure laws. This requirement would also be in alignment with state candidate reporting requirements, most of whom raise and spend far less money than some of the candidates for Mayor did in Portland this year.


Perhaps this bill would not be necessary for many of our smaller communities where candidates raise and spend very little money. I am open to an amendment to only require this earlier report for municipalities of a certain size and would welcome this discussion in the Veteran and Legal Affairs Committee which I serve on.

If you consider the amount of campaign fund raising and spending that just took place in Portland I hope you will agree with me that the time has come to consider requiring a 42-day municipal campaign report in addition to the 11-day report, at least for the larger municipalities.

I think this bill deserves a public hearing and discussion in the second regular session. Please support allowing it to go forward. Thank you.

LR 2599 An Act To Address Research and Teaching and in Maine's Institutions of Higher Education.

The goal of the legislation is to allow private colleges/universities to enter into cooperative agreements with state agencies, most typically DHHS. LR 2599 meets the Legislature's emergency standard because of its budget implications and the need to provide real alternatives for the state to enter into cooperative agreements.

According to OPEGA, the State of Maine spent \$22.8 Million in FY '07 of which \$4.9 million was general fund and an additional \$4.2 million was special and other revenue fund. Maine taxpayers contribute \$9.1 Million and federal pass thru grants are equal to \$13.7 million.

The problem is that current Law (Title 5, section 1825-B(2)(E) limits cooperative agreements to the University of Maine System and Community Colleges. This prevents state agencies from entering agreements with private entities even if the public universities lack the capacity.

Many states, allow private entities to compete with state entities for these cooperative agreements. In Maine, it would be great if the state could use expertise at places like Bowdoin, Colby, Husson and the University of New England, in addition to the great partnerships at the University of Maine and Community College System. We believe this would inject some competition in these contracts and could result in savings for the state, as well as serve as a tool to utilize diverse resources to make sure the state is getting the very best support it can.

This is a budget matter for the state, and without an enhancement of the current system, the state will be limited in its ability to enter new cooperative agreements and save taxpayer dollars.

This letter is to notify you of my intent to appeal the Legislative Council's decision on LR 2602, An Act to Provide Tort Claims Immunity for Non-Maine Regional Transit. I appreciate the opportunity to explain the merits of this bill and why it should be allowed in the upcoming session. I believe you will find this legislation meets the emergency criteria.

LR 2602 was brought to my attention by officials from Kittery and the surrounding towns because there are limited transportation options since the closure of the Memorial Bridge. There is a disconnect for pedestrian and bicycle travelers between the two states and state border communities because Memorial Bridge is the only bridge to allow for pedestrian and bicycle use. There is also a demand for public transportation in Kittery, the shopping outlets, Eliot, and the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. This means of transportation is essential for helping our businesses and residents along the state line. Unfortunately, there are no public transportation companies from Maine in the area; however, a New Hampshire transit system, COAST, was approached by some of the towns to provide the service.

But, the company is currently prohibited by the New Hampshire Local Government Center, under which their property and liability coverage is provided through their pooled public risk management programs, to further extend their service into Maine. The concern is that their operations in Maine are not subject to similar TORT Claim protections as they are in New Hampshire, thereby exposing the New Hampshire Local Government Center Property-Liability Trust risk pool to greater risk. Without protection in Maine Law, the transit business faces insurance issues and is thus reluctant to expand its services. This is an emergency measure because it is important that we keep our state open and accessible during the bridge closure. It is important in helping our businesses and residents.

I am writing to formally request reconsideration of LR 2375 for the following reasons:

- 1. The issue of low cost renewable energy is one of the most important and time sensitive issues facing our State. It has huge impacts on both the economy and the environment.
- 2. The Maine Legislature and government has recognized this requirement by expediting the permitting process for wind projects which have not demonstrated low cost or the dependable and efficient production of electricity. At the same time the impact of wind sites may not have fully considered the impact of those sites on tourism, wildlife, nearby property values and human health.
- 3. Concurrently, dams in Maine are being removed without adequate consideration of their specific potential to produce low cost renewable electricity.
- 4. Once a dam has been removed it is unlikely that it would ever be replaced.
- 5. The permitting of dams and the federal licensing process is complex and costly.

Due to the complexity and importance of the requirement for <u>low cost, renewable</u> energy it is in Maine's vital interest to have a moratorium on the removal of hydroelectric capable dams. The moratorium should last until a process is in place to evaluate the potential electricity production capability of existing dams. If it is the Legislative Council's goal to limit the number of complex issues addressed by the second session of the 125th Legislature, the legislation could require an investigation and report to ensure that all the issues are developed to be addressed by the first session of the 126th Legislature. The legislation should also make provisions for dam removal for safety or clear cost considerations.



Please consider this my written appeal from the decision of the Legislative Council to deny my request for introduction of LR 2419: An Act to Guarantee Basic Preventive Dental Health Services for Children in Maine.

The American Dental Association (ADA), as well as all evidence-based dental practice criteria, recommend that children (beginning at age 1) have regular fluoride treatments in order to significantly reduce the risk of dental disease. Unfortunately, some major dental insurers have now altered such basic preventive care, and have limited their reimbursements to only once a year for fluoride treatments, despite definitive evidencebased standards that have been set by the ADA. I believe that is a mistake and this is one area in which a mandate is appropriate and critical.

Dental professionals tell us that this current policy will cause some children in Maine to experience high levels of dental disease that would otherwise be prevented. I respectfully suggest this makes this matter an "emergency" in terms of dealing with it right away.

I might also add that it is my understanding that MaineCare already <u>does</u> provide these services to low income Mainers.

Interestingly enough, many Delta Dental affiliates around the Country have signed a letter to United States DHHS Secretary Kathleen Sebelius calling upon federal regulators to endorse a set of dental services that <u>include</u> adopting the ADA's recommendations on use of fluorides and dental sealants. Included in this list of Delta's is Maine's largest dental insurer, Northeast Delta Dental, who has also asked that the essential dental benefit being developed apply ADA evidence-based guidelines on fluoride.

This relatively inexpensive fluoride treatment will save Mainers large amounts in the long run. I respectfully suggest the Council reconsider its position and allow this bill to go forward this session.

I am hereby requesting that the Legislative Council revisit LR 2325, An Act to Create an Equal K-12 Educational Funding Model. You are no doubt aware that you represent 54 communities, 13 of which get 0 in state GPA funding. That inequity has been created by an ill conceived school funding model which places disproportionate emphasis on property valuation while ignoring the underlying needs of our children, many of whom in your rural district and mine have extensive special needs and participate in the free and reduced lunch program.

Our K-12 educational funding allocation methodology reveals a legislature that has for too long out sourced its policy making prerogative to a funding model that not only violates equal protection principles, but is also amended annually. Is it not the time to say that every child deserves the equal support of the state?


In June of 2010, Dr. David Silvernail and Ida Batista of MEPRI issued a report on *The Impact* of the Relationship Between Maine's Funding Formula Changes and Student Achievement, the conclusion of which was "there appears to be no relationship between funding formula changes and student achievement".

If indeed the funding formula has little or no impact on student achievement-then why not discard it and realize the attendant cost savings?

Funding for education should flow equitably on a per pupil basis to provide a universally high quality education. Economic growth and retaining Maine's rural character rely on attracting and keeping young families and providing quality education in every community.

For many residents of coastal and waterfront communities, this is clearly an **emergency**. Property taxes for year round residents of these communities continue to rise unabated, as school populations shrink and state wide valuation falls. Mandated programming and special need requirements further exacerbate this situation. Small businesses and young families are leaving as property taxes render their homes unaffordable. In short, this policy is turning many of these towns intoretirement communities. I do not believe this to be your vision for the future of rural and coastal Maine.
