LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MEETING SUMMARY October 30, 2013

CALL TO ORDER

Legislative Council Chair Mark Eves called the October 30, 2013 Legislative Council meeting to order at 10:33 a.m. in the Legislative Council Chamber.

Speaker Eves convened the meeting at 10:33 a.m. with a quorum of members present.

SUMMARY OF AUGUST 28, 2013 MEETING OF LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Motion: That the Meeting Summary for August 28, 2013 be accepted and placed on file. Motion by Representative Berry. Second by Senator Willette. Motion passed unanimous (10-0).

REPORTS FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND COUNCIL OFFICES

Executive Director's Report

David Boulter, Executive Director, provided a written report as follows:

1. Filming in State House

Numerous scenes for the movie, *Catatonk Blues*, were filmed in the State House on October 3 and 4, 2013 in accordance with Legislative Council approval. The cast and crew of the film were very appreciative of their use of the State House and, overall, everything went smoothly and professionally. The film is expected to be released early next summer.

2. Water leaks in State House

Numerous leaks in the heating system in the State House have been discovered over the past several months. A preliminary review indicates that the leaks may be the result of corrosion and subsequent leaking at piping joints, the cause of which is unknown at this time. An engineering firm is currently investigating the extent and cause of the piping failures.

3. YMCA Youth in Government Program

The State YMCA of Maine will hold its annual civic education program on legislating for high school youth in the State House on Friday through Sunday, November 15-17, 2013. Planning for the program is underway.

Fiscal Report

Grant Pennoyer, Director, Office of Fiscal and Program Review, reported on the following:

General Fund revenue was above budget projections by \$20.0 million (6.7%) in September and \$13.3 million (2.2%) for the first quarter of FY 2014. The 6.3% growth rate for the first quarter of FY 2014 revenue differs significantly from a projected decline that was budgeted for FY 2014.

Individual Income Tax was \$19.1 million above budget projections in September, about a third of which reflected a timing issue between August and September relating to withholding payments. \$10 million of this positive variance was due to the strong performance of September's estimated tax payments.

Sales and Use Tax revenue was \$4.0 million above budget projections in September and \$7.6 million through the first quarter. Taxable sales growth in the Building Supply and

Automobile/Transportation sectors has been the major factor contributing to this positive variance.

Corporate Income Tax collections have fallen \$2.9 million (6.8%) below budget for the first quarter of FY 2014. Preliminary data for October indicate that this negative variance will likely remain roughly the same after October.

Highway Fund revenue was above budget by \$1.1 million in September and \$1.4 for the first quarter of FY 2014. Monthly revenue in the Fuel Taxes category continues to fluctuate relative to budget, but through the first quarter this category was \$1.3 million above budget.

Fall Revenue Forecast Update

The Consensus Economic Forecasting Commission (CEFC) began its fall revenue forecast update with 2 meetings in October. Friday, October 18th, was an information gathering session followed a week later by a meeting to update the economic forecast that is used in the tax models to forecast the major tax revenue sources. At that meeting, the CEFC revised the economic forecast for job growth and income growth downward. These changes will have a negative effect on the tax model forecasts of the major tax lines. However, some of this negative effect may be offset when the models are targeted based on recent higher than anticipated revenue.

The Revenue Forecasting Committee (RFC) will meet on Thursday, November 21st, to finalize the fall revenue forecast prior to its statutory reporting date of December 1st.

In response to an inquiry from Representative Fredette, Mr. Pennoyer gave a very brief summary on the fiscal status of state accounts. He explained that General Fund revenue for September was very good and the Highway Fund also had a better than expected month. Revenues for October appear to be on track. The CEFC, in its preliminary assessment, did lower the forecast for employment and personal income which would usually have the effect of lowering the economic forecast. But there may be some offsetting effect from the recent positive revenue variance particularly in the individual income tax.

Interim Legislative Studies Report

Marion Hylan Barr, Director, Office of Policy and Legal Analysis, provided a written report as to the current status of the interim legislative studies and commissions. (Refer to status report in preliminary agenda materials.)

REPORTS FROM COUNCIL COMMITTEES

1. Personnel Committee

Speaker Eves, Chair of the Personnel Committee, gave the following report.

The Personnel Committee held a meeting earlier today, October 30, 2013 to consider the following matters:

1. Request for Part-time Limited Period Position in OPEGA through FY2015

The committee considered Director Ashcroft's request to establish a part-time limited period Legislative Analyst position in the Office of Program Evaluation and Government Accountability through FY15 to assist in completing assigned projects in OPEGA. After discussion, the committee voted to recommend that the Legislative Council authorize OPEGA to establish a part-time position through fiscal year 2014, after which time the Legislative Council will evaluate the need to extend the position.

Motion: That the Legislative Council authorize OPEGA to establish a part-time, limited period legislative analyst position through FY14 using unspent balances to pay the costs of the position, after which time the Legislative Council will evaluate the need to extend the position. Motion by Speaker Eves. Second by President Alfond. Motion passed unanimous (10-0).

2. Request for Temporary Disability Income Benefits for a Partisan Staff Member

The committee considered a request by an employee in a Legislative Leadership office for temporary disability income benefits. The request is consistent with the provisions for temporary disability income benefits under the Legislative Council's personnel policies and guidelines. Upon the recommendation of the Executive Director, the committee voted unanimously to approve the request. No Legislative Council action is required.

3. Reappointment of David E. Boulter as Executive Director of the Legislative Council to a new 3 year term.

The committee noted that Executive Director Boulter is seeking reappointment as Executive Director and scheduled a time next month to discuss his reappointment.

2. State House Facilities Committee

Representative Berry, Chair of the State House Facilities Committee, presented the following report.

The State House Facilities Committee met on Wednesday, August 7th to consider the following matters:

1. Renewed MOU with Maine Public Broadcasting Network

The committee reviewed a draft renewal memorandum of understanding (MOU) that has been negotiated with Maine Public Broadcasting Network (MPBN) for televising legislative proceedings during the 2nd regular session of the Legislature. The committee was comfortable with the agreement but added a provision that would allow other news media to

have reasonable use of the state-owned room to be used by MPBN as a broadcast studio and press room on a schedule established by MPBN. MPBN supports the memorandum of understanding as drafted, including the added provision. At its meeting, the committee voted unanimously to recommend that the Legislative Council approve the MOU. That item is on the Legislative Council agenda for later today.

2. MPBN request that the Legislature purchase new cameras for House and Senate Chambers

After a brief discussion, the committee members concluded that consideration of new cameras or other broadcasting equipment should not be decided on in 2013 but be deferred until 2014 when the facilities committee could then consider the request in the context of other capital improvement needs for 2014.

3. Capital improvement procurement policy

In light of the absence of a committee member, this matter was tabled to a future meeting.

4. Electric car charging stations

Executive Director Boulter gave the committee an update on the investigation into the feasibility of installing several charging stations on the State House campus, equipment and installation costs, potential for private sector donations and potential locations. The committee will continue its discussion at a future meeting.

OLD BUSINESS

Item #1: Council Actions Taken by Ballot Since the August 28, 2013 Council Meeting

NEW BUSINESS

Item #1: Suggested Protocols for Deciding Legislator Bill Requests

Executive Director Boulter summarized the suggested procedures for deciding legislator bill requests. He drew Legislative Council members' attention to several key aspects of the proposed protocol, including that the initial motion on each bill request will be presumed to be a motion to accept the bill request for introduction in the Second Regular Session, along with a presumed second to that motion. Also for procedural consistency, unless otherwise stated, each motion is presumed to have been made by the vice-chair of the Legislative Council, seconded by the chair. See the attached procedures.

Motion: That the Legislative Council adopt the suggested procedures for deciding Legislator bill requests. Motion by President Alfond. Second by Senator Haskell. Motion passed unanimous (10-0).

Item #2: Consideration of Requests to Introduce Legislation in Second Regular Session of the 126th Legislature

The Legislative Council proceeded to consider and vote on three hundred ninety-nine (399) bill requests in accordance with the adopted protocol, and using an electronic voting system. The Legislative Council authorized ninety-nine (99) bills for introduction in the Second Regular Session, tabled four (4) bill requests and declined to authorize two hundred eighty-nine (289) bill requests. Out of the 399 requests, seven (7) bill requests were withdrawn by the sponsor prior to the Legislative Council's vote. The Legislative Council's action on the bill requests is attached.

Item #3: Memorandum of Understanding between Maine Public Broadcasting Network and Maine Legislative Council for Broadcasting Legislative Proceedings

Representative Berry made a motion to table this matter to a future Legislative Council meeting. Motion by Representative Berry. Second by President Alfond. **Motion passed unanimous** (9-0-0-1, with Representative Fredette absent).

Item #4: Request to Use State House and Grounds for Critical Incident Response Exercise on Tuesday, November 5, 2013

Capitol Police Chief Gauvin briefed the Legislative Council as to the nature of the request by the Maine National Guard, Maine Emergency Management Agency and law enforcement agencies to use the State House and grounds for a critical incident response training exercise on Tuesday, November 5, 2013 (Operation Vigilant Guard). Chief Gauvin explained that the exercise will

begin late in the day, around closing time, so as to have minimal impact on employees or legislative operations. Signs will be placed to inform people of the exercise. There is no intention to practice tactics; the exercise is more of a command coordination, communication coordination and actual logistics training. Representative Berry then asked Mr. Boulter to make sure that staff are made aware of the training exercise before it begins.

Motion: That the Legislative Council approve the request to use the State House and grounds as part of a critical incident response training exercise for emergency responders on Tuesday, November 5, 2013. Motion by Representative McCabe. Second by Representative Willette. Motion passed unanimous (9-0-0-1, with Representative Fredette absent).

Item #5: Dates for Legislative Policy Forums in January and February 2014

Mr. Boulter reviewed the memo by the Maine Development Foundation describing its plans to hold 4 legislative policy forum breakfasts for legislators in early 2014, and its request that the Legislative Council establish the dates for those forums. After discussion, Speaker Eves suggested the dates of January 14, January 16, January 28, and January 30, 2014.

Motion: That the Legislative Council approve the dates for the Legislative Policy Forums to be conducted by the Maine Development Foundation as follows: January 14, January 16, January 28, and January 30, 2014. Motion by President Alfond. Second by Senator Thibodeau. Motion passed unanimous (8-0-0-2, with Representatives Fredette and Willette absent).

Item #6: Request for Voluntary Budget Savings from the Legislature

Motion: That the Legislative Council refer the request by the director of the Governor's Office of Policy and Management for the Legislature to voluntarily identify budget savings to the Legislative Budget Subcommittee for its review and recommendation. Motion by President Alfond. Second by Senator Haskell. Motion passed unanimous (8-0-0-2, with Senator Thibodeau and Representative Fredette absent).

Item #7: Legislative Council Meeting Schedule for 2014

Legislative Council Chair Speaker Eves informed the Legislative Council members of the Legislative Council Meeting Schedule that he has established for calendar year 2014 which is noted below. Executive Director's Report November 21, 2013

1. YMCA Youth in Government Program

The YMCA of Maine's Youth in Government program was held in the State House on November 15-17, 2013. About 150 high school students from across the state attended this annual civic education program to learn about the legislative process.

2. Maine Development Foundation

The Maine Development Foundation is continuing its preparation for the Legislator Policy Forums on the topics identified in its letter to the Legislative Council last month (health insurance marketplace, ways to care for Maine's aging population and opportunities, and entrepreneurs and innovation in Maine) and on the days in January established by the council. A schedule will be developed and distributed when one is finalized. The first policy forum is scheduled for Tuesday, January 14, 2014.

General Fund revenue was over budget by \$4.6 million (1.8%) in October and \$17.9 million (2.1%) for the first four months of FY 2014. The 6.1% growth rate for the first four months remains significantly higher than the decline budgeted for FY 2014.

Sales and Use Tax revenue was \$5.0 million over budget in October and \$12.6 million for the fiscal year-to-date (FYTD). Taxable sales growth for the first quarter of FY 2014 grew 6.9% led by the Building Supply and Automobile/Transportation sectors. This growth rate is significantly above the budgeted rate.

Individual Income Tax was under budget in October by \$8.0 million, but remained \$5.3 million over budget for the FYTD. October's variance may be largely related to timing issues in withholding and refunds. Refunds were under budget for the month by \$9.4 million with roughly \$7 million paid out on the last day of the month.

Corporate Income Tax was slightly under budget in October and remained \$2.9 million (6.5%) below budget for the FYTD.

The Cigarette and Tobacco Tax and Insurance Companies Tax categories both had sizeable positive variances for October creating solid FYTD positive variances for both categories.

Highway Fund revenue was over budget by \$0.9 million in October and \$2.3 for the first four months of FY 2014. Stronger Gasoline Tax collections, potentially spurred by lower gasoline prices, have built up a positive variance of \$1.3 million for the fiscal year. Bureau of Motor Vehicle revenue has also been performing well, aided by strong automobile sales grow in the early part of this fiscal year.

3. Fall Revenue Forecast Update

The Revenue Forecasting Committee is meeting on Thursday, November 21st, to finalize the fall revenue forecast in time for its statutory reporting date of December 1st.

RENEWED MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING AND LIMITED LICENSE AGREEMENT

BETWEEN MAINE PUBLIC BROADCASTING NETWORK AND MAINE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Whereas, the Maine Legislative Council ("Legislative Council") and Maine Public Broadcasting Network ("MPBN") have discussed the public benefits of televising legislative proceedings on a free over-the-air channel devoted to covering the proceedings of the Maine Legislature during a 6-month pilot program;

Whereas, the Maine Legislature currently broadcasts the legislative sessions of the Maine Senate and the House of Representatives by video and audio streaming them over the Internet using legislative facilities, equipment and networks;

Whereas, the Maine Legislative Council desires that certain legislative proceedings be televised so they may be viewed by as wide an audience as possible for the benefit of the residents of Maine;

Whereas, Maine Public Broadcasting Network and the Maine Legislative Council first entered into a Memorandum of Understanding in January 2013 that resulted in Maine Public Broadcasting Network broadcasting legislative proceedings on a pilot basis during the 1st Regular Session of the 126th Legislature at no cost to the Maine Legislature or to television viewers;

Whereas, the parties now desire to enter into a new Memorandum of Understanding that will result in MPBN continuing to televise legislative proceedings for the 2nd Regular Session of the 126th Legislature; and

Whereas, the Maine Legislative Council and Maine Public Broadcasting Network agree to collaborate to achieve the purposes of this Agreement and agree that the intent of this Agreement is to ensure that MPBN programming gives television viewers an accurate, impartial and unedited view of the flow, content and conduct of legislative proceedings;

Now, therefore, the Maine Legislative Council grants permission to MPBN to install certain broadcasting equipment in legislative areas and to televise the proceedings of the Maine Legislature on an-over-the-air television channel subject to the following conditions:

1. Quality of the Legislative Broadcasts. MPBN has assessed the quality of video broadcasts of the House and Senate proceedings and has determined that they are suitable for its over the air use. The cameras in the Senate Chamber support high definition resolution video although downstream broadcast equipment would need to be upgraded or replaced to support high definition resolution broadcasting. The cameras in the House Chamber are do not support high definition resolution video. The Legislative Council will use its best efforts to upgrade, within existing resources and using existing video equipment, the broadcast quality of the video feeds from cameras in the Senate from standard to high

definition resolution. The Legislative Council will provide those video transmissions of the Senate and the House to MPBN. The Legislative Council will take reasonable measures to provide broadcast quality transmissions of the legislative proceedings from its equipment and feeds to MPBN but is not obligated to purchase equipment or make any improvements or operational modifications if MPBN later determines that the transmission quality becomes undesirable. The Legislative Council will provide MPBN access to the Senate and House video feeds from the point of the media closet located in the Welcome Center to offices MPBN currently leases in the Cross Building.

- 2. <u>Televising Legislative Proceedings.</u> MPBN will provide an over-the-air digital channel devoted to televising proceedings of the Maine Legislature and such channel shall be referred to as the "Maine Capitol Connection Channel." Each broadcast must state prominently that the Maine Capitol Connection Channel is a collaborative project of the Maine Legislature and MPBN. Furthermore, the parties have determined that agreement on operating protocols and procedures is essential to the success of this pilot program and MPBN agrees to comply with the provisions contained in Attachment A, which is attached and made a part of this Agreement.
- 3. <u>Timing of the Legislative Broadcasts.</u> Maine Public Broadcasting Network will strive to televise the legislative proceedings as they occur but may delay or rebroadcast them at other times as MPBN deems appropriate for the convenience of television viewers.
- 4. Content and Format of the Legislative Broadcasts. The Legislature shall retain complete control over the content of the House and Senate video feeds and audio feeds; however, MPBN will exercise appropriate editorial control over the Maine Capitol Connection Channel broadcasts consistent with the terms of this Agreement, including Attachment A.
- 5. Recording, Preserving and Archiving. MPBN will maintain the recorded coverage on a daily basis for a 24 hour period, but will not maintain a permanent archival record of the broadcasts made during the period of this Agreement without the express written consent of the Legislative Council. MPBN may record legislative proceedings for the purpose of rebroadcasts of such content by MPBN.
- 6. Equipment Maintenance and Insurances. With the exception of legislative cameras that are installed in the House and Senate chambers and legislative sound equipment, MPBN will provide all equipment, including without limitation cameras and studio equipment, necessary for Maine Capitol Connection Channel broadcasts and agrees to maintain them in good working order. MPBN will maintain in force adequate general liability insurance for activities relating to Maine Capitol Connection at all times during the period of this Agreement. Access to maintain, service or repair such equipment is authorized subject to approval by the Director of Legislative Information Technology and is limited to MPBN employees authorized by the Executive Director of the Legislative Council in accordance with established building security protocols. When access to the State House or the Cross Building is necessary outside of regular business hours for equipment repairs, it must be arranged through the State's Building Control Center, upon the express approval of the Director of Legislative Information Technology.

7. <u>Termination of License</u>. This Agreement becomes effective upon approval of the Legislative Council and execution of this Agreement by both parties and remains in effect through the second regular session unless terminated earlier in accordance with this Agreement. This Agreement supersedes the Memorandum of Understanding entered into by the parties on January 29, 2013.

If at any time, the Legislative Council or the presiding officer of the House or the Senate chooses to interrupt a legislative broadcast, the council or the presiding officer may do so without prior notice and for whatever reason deemed appropriate. However, if the Legislative Council decides to cease televising the legislative broadcasts altogether, it agrees to do so only after forty-five (45) days written notice to MPBN.

If at any time MPBN chooses not to transmit the legislative broadcasts in accordance with this license, it may cease transmissions and disconnect and remove its equipment only after providing forty-five (45) days written notice to the Legislative Council. Removal of its equipment will be at MPBN's expense.

8. <u>Limitations to Scope of License</u>. This Agreement authorizes the installation of certain equipment on legislative property and the transmission of the legislative proceedings in accordance with the terms herein and does not and may not be interpreted to grant by implication any further rights or privileges, including, but not limited to, any intellectual property rights in legislative broadcasts.

MPBN may not transfer this Agreement and limited license to any other person or entity without written approval of the Legislative Council. This limited license is nonexclusive and the Legislative Council and the Legislature retain the right at all times to grant any other entity the same or similar license or any other licenses or authorizations without limitation.

9. Installation of Equipment. MPBN may install and operate broadcasting and directly-related equipment in specified areas in the State House and Cross Building for the period of this Agreement only. All such equipment, except for equipment installed in MPBN-leased offices in the State House Press Corps suite, must be identified in Attachment B-1 of this Agreement. Installation and maintenance of cameras and other equipment, other than those housed inside Rooms 168 and 176 in the State House Press Corps suite and inside Room 104 of the Cross Building, must be accomplished under the supervision of the Director of Legislative Information Technology and must be in a manner that is compatible with and does not: disrupt or damage legislative equipment, transmissions or areas; disrupt the historic or architectural integrity of any such room or area; or disrupt the proceedings or functions of the legislature. Further, such installation must allow for installation of legislatively-controlled video kill switches, so-called, in legislatively-controlled areas of the Cross Building and the State House.

MPBN is responsible for all costs of its equipment, including its installation, maintenance, repair, replacement and use. MPBN may not access, connect to, move, disconnect, disrupt, alter, tamper with or use legislative wiring, equipment, software or facilities except with the express approval of the Director or the Executive Director of the Legislative Council. Furthermore, MPBN may not arrange for or allow access by any person not an employee of

MPBN, including contractors, to any legislative facility, equipment, software or wiring without such express approval of the Director or the Executive Director. Installation of wiring and equipment in Room 104 and in the corridor leading to Room 104 must in compliance with all applicable building and electrical codes and be accomplished under the supervision of the Director of Property Management, DAFS. MPBN may not access, connect to, move, disconnect, disrupt, alter, tamper with or use State wiring, equipment, software or facilities in the Cross Building not under the control of the Legislative Council except with the express approval of the Director of Property Management.

Any such violation of these provisions is grounds for immediate termination of this Agreement.

- 10. Cooperation with Others. MPBN agrees to work with cable television providers in the state for the purposes of broadcasting legislative proceedings over cable television networks in addition to the over-the-air broadcasts by MPBN. MPBN agrees to offer access to the video and audio feeds to cable television providers and local access television channels. MPBN agrees not to charge local access television, cable providers or cable television viewers for such access, use or viewing during the term of this Agreement. MPBN agrees to make available a portion of Room 104, Cross Building, a state-owned facility, to other news organizations and Legislators at reasonable times and for reasonable duration for the purpose of holding and reporting on news conferences related to legislative and other governmental activities. Such availability must be identified on a schedule developed and posted by MPBN and must be on a first-come, first served basis, and MPBN may not charge for such use.
- 11. MPBN Rights to Capitol Connection Designations. MPBN owns, solely and exclusively, all right, title and interest in and to the designations "Maine Capitol Connection" and "Maine Capitol Connection Channel" (the "MCC Marks"), including without limitation: all trademark rights, trade name rights, service mark rights and any other intellectual property rights embodied therein, and all good will associated with the MCC Marks.
- 12. Parties. The parties to this Agreement and the parties' contact information are as follows.

Attachment A

Operating Protocols and Procedures

Guiding Principle and Agreement:

MPBN will strive to present "gavel-to-gavel" coverage of legislative proceedings without editorial content so as to accurately present what is seen and heard by a visitor to the Senate or House chamber gallery during a legislative session or a legislative committee room during a legislative hearing or work session. MPBN agrees to abide by the following protocols and procedures when broadcasting or recording the proceedings of the Maine Legislature.

A. Programming Parameters

- 1. MPBN will demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Legislative Council its technical capacity to produce high quality video coverage of the Maine Legislature before transmitting such coverage for the first time during the 2nd regular session of the 126th Legislature.
- 2. The Managing Editor is MPBN's onsite Supervisor. The Managing Editor will make the day-to-day decisions about what events to broadcast and the extent of those broadcasts.
- 3. The board of directors and officers of MPBN will not make day-to-day decisions about what events to broadcast or the extent of those broadcasts as provided in MPBN's Board of Trustees' policy on editorial integrity adopted in 1998 that protects journalistic integrity of individual programs and series from inappropriate influences.
- 4. When the Senate and the House of Representatives are in session at the same time, the Managing Editor will decide which will be broadcast live and which will be recorded for later broadcast.
- 5. MPBN will abide by its "Guiding Principles of MMC," as described in Attachment C, attached, to the extent it is not inconsistent with and does not conflict with the provisions of this Agreement.

B. Recording Notification and Parameters

- 1. The Managing Editor will provide to each member of the Legislative Council, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council, the Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the Senate, a tentative weekly schedule of the legislative sessions, public hearings and work sessions and any other legislative proceedings it intends to cover during the following week. Should the legislative schedule change or the Managing Editor make a change to the broadcasting schedule, MPBN will provide a revised notice if MPBN's programming is to be changed no later than the evening before the session or meeting or as soon as practical after the change is published.
- 2. If MPBN wants to broadcast a chamber session, public hearing or work session that it had not previously scheduled, it may do so upon notification to the presiding officers or committee chairs, as applicable, and reasonable notice to the Executive Director of the

Legislative Council, Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House.

For each committee proceeding to be covered by MPBN except public proceedings of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs in whose room cameras will remain for the session, the Managing Editor will notify the clerk of the committee and upon such notification the committee clerk will be responsible for arranging for a notice to be posted at the door to the committee stating that the proceeding is being covered by MPBN for television broadcast. The notice must be posted well before the start of the proceeding but in any event no later than 15 minutes prior to the scheduled start of the meeting.

- 3. Prior to the start of a committee hearing or work session, the Managing Editor will notify the committee chairs and staff if a hearing will be broadcasted or recorded.
- 4. MPBN will broadcast or record proceedings only after the presiding officer or presiding committee chair gavels the session, hearing or work session to order and only until the presiding officer or presiding committee chair adjourns or recesses the chamber session, hearing or work session. Low-level "background" audio may not be broadcast or recorded. Signal transmission must terminate immediately after the proceedings are adjourned or recessed; only background audio may be covered and video coverage must be limited to a general view of the room without close-up shots until such termination is completed.
- 5. The presiding officer or presiding committee chair may direct the immediate termination of a broadcast without prior notice in the event of an emergency or if a person in attendance poses a risk of harm to those present.

C. Broadcast Content

- 1. During the term of this Agreement, MPBN anticipates that it will provide coverage of the proceedings of many or all of the joint standing and joint select committees of the Legislature, upon prior notice as provided under paragraphs B (1) and (2) above, using temporary cameras that will be removed following coverage of each proceeding.
- 2. The Managing Editor will attempt to provide equal coverage of Senate and House sessions and, to the greatest extent possible, committee action.
- 3. If a chamber or committee recesses or adjourns, MPBN will attempt to identify the procedural status of the chamber or committee (e.g., "The committee is at ease in order to caucus"). During these times of recess, MPBN's broadcast, to the greatest extent possible, will default to a wide angle camera shot of the chamber or the angle used by the Legislature's cameras.
- 4. The Managing Editor will not broadcast any activities not produced or authorized by MPBN.
- 5. Broadcasts are expected to show proceedings "gavel to gavel." Should on-air time not allow for complete coverage of a proceeding, to the greatest extent possible, the entire proceeding must be available for later broadcast. If the Managing Editor decides to break

away from an on-going proceeding, MPBN will inform television viewers, either through a voice over or through on-air graphics, that the remainder of proceeding may be seen at another time specified. If broadcast of the full proceeding is not possible, MPBN, at its discretion, may broadcast a portion of the public hearing or work session provided any legislative measure that is the subject of the hearing or work session is broadcast in its entirety.

- 6. Recordings or broadcasts are limited to proceedings of the full committee or the Senate or the House while they are in session. MPBN will not interview or record or broadcast remarks or statements from any person in the chambers or any committee room at any time except those remarks or statements made as part of the formal legislative proceeding or the formal Caucus "response" to a State of the State address.
- 7. To the extent feasible, the Clerk of the House or the Clerk's designee will arrange for the microphone at the Speaker's rostrum in the House Chamber to remain on during the singing of the National Anthem and delivery of the prayer at the start of each House session and a microphone in the House Gallery to be placed and remain on during any musical performance held during a House session.

D. Cameras & Sound Equipment

- 1. During the term of this Agreement, cameras and related equipment may not be permanently installed except that MPBN may place and maintain up to three standard or "robotic" cameras in Room 228 and up to two co-located cameras in the State House Welcome Center for the period 45 calendar days prior to the convening of the Second Regular Session to three days following adjournment sine die of that session. MPBN intends to use the video feeds from the House and Senate; it does not intend to place additional cameras in the chambers. If it does seek to place cameras in a chamber, it must notify the Senate President and the Senate Secretary or the House Speaker and the House Clerk, as applicable. Cameras must be placed in a location and manner that is unobtrusive, will not be disruptive of the proceeding, and will not create a safety hazard or interfere with seating or ingress or egress. Placement of cameras is subject to approval by the Senate Secretary for the Senate chamber, Clerk of the House for the House chamber, Executive Director of the Legislative Council and presiding committee chair for committee rooms and the Executive Director for all other rooms. MPBN and the Executive Director will discuss and agree upon, in advance of any broadcasts, suitable locations for placement of cameras in committee rooms.
- 2. The focal-length range of the cameras lens used in the committee room must be sufficient to provide for proper framing of each member or other person speaking. Cameras must be silent in motion and not require lighting that interferes with the proceedings in any way or noticeably increases the room temperature.
- 3. MPBN will use the legislature's sound system to record or broadcast audio of the legislative proceedings in the chambers and committee rooms. If an additional microphone is needed to amplify audience comments during a news conference in the Welcome Center, MPBN may place a single microphone on a floor stand for the duration of the news conference, after which it must be removed.

E. Camera Shot & Audio Selection

- Cameras must focus only on speakers recognized by the presiding officer or presiding committee chair. Camera shot selection must accurately convey the proceeding as it transpires. Close-ups shots will be limited to speakers recognized by the presiding officer or committee chair.
- 2. To the greatest extent possible, MPBN will avoid sensational or dramatic camera shots and extreme close-up shots. MPBN will not make any editorial attempt to explain, interpret or in any way add context to legislative proceedings by showing reactions of legislators, staff or other persons to legislation or statements made during such proceedings.
- 3. To the greatest extent possible, MPBN will avoid camera shots in which materials on legislators' or legislative staff's desks or electronic devices are discernible.
- 4. MPBN will avoid any audio or video broadcast or recording that MPBN considers, using its best judgment, to be sensational, inflammatory, inappropriate or invasive to personal or private materials or communications.
- 5. To the greatest extent possible, MPBN will not focus audio or video coverage on a person who has not been recognized at that time by the presiding officer or committee chair.
- 6. The video must default to a display of a wide angle view whenever the chamber or a committee is in recess. When the cameras are not broadcasting or recording in the committee room, they must be angled toward the floor or a wall.

F. Keyed Information and Graphics

- At the beginning of the session or committee hearing or work session, the full name of the
 legislative body or committee will be displayed onscreen so it may be easily read by viewers.
 To the greatest extent possible, MPBN will inform viewers periodically during a broadcast
 that Legislators may be absent from the chamber or committee room due to their other
 legislative responsibilities and committee assignments.
- 2. During committee hearings or work sessions, the committee name and date of the hearing or work session will be identified through the use of a lower-third key, crawl or full-screen graphic. This information must appear on screen periodically, if not continually.
- 3. Legislators will be identified by name, party affiliation, town of residence (for State Representatives) and county of residence (for State Senators) when they speak. When speaking, the House Speaker, Senate President and majority and minority leaders will also be identified by their Legislative Leadership title. In committee proceedings, committee members will be identified in the same manner.
- 4. Legislative staff who participate in the proceeding will be identified by their position title.
- 5. The name and affiliation, if any, of those persons who testify at committee proceedings will be identified onscreen whenever possible. The Managing Editor and the Legislative Council

will collaborate to identify the best way to collect and relay this information.

- 6. When legislation is being heard in committee, the bill number and short title will be identified and displayed onscreen periodically, if not continually, to remind viewers of the issue under consideration. When practicable, the prime sponsor of such legislation will be identified when the bill is presented.
- 7. During voting, the bill number and short title will be displayed to the maximum extent possible. If the short title does not adequately describe the measure under consideration. MPBN will display additional information onscreen or through a voice over to explain the vote being taken. In order to facilitate the identification of the measure, the Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the Senate will use their best efforts, within existing resources, to provide MPBN with a digital feed of the information displayed on the voting board during legislative consideration of a measure.
- 8. To the maximum extent possible, MPBN will display committee votes on legislation and votes in the chamber, and may display a clearly-readable camera shot of the chamber voting boards when a vote is taken.
- 9. Pre-produced crawls or full-screen graphics will be prepared to explain how viewers may obtain more information (including the Legislature's website address), and explain frequently used terms, e.g., caucus, divided report, indefinitely postponed, recede and concur and point of order. The crawls or graphics will be introduced at appropriate times during broadcast or recording of the proceeding and will be also shown during breaks in floor action.
- 10. At the conclusion of each committee proceeding that has been recorded or broadcast, the full name of the committee and date of the hearing will be identified. To the greatest extent possible, a summary of the bills considered and legislative action taken by the committee will also be displayed.
- 11. MPBN will identify to viewers whether an event is being broadcast live or recorded.
- 12. Correct identification of speakers and issues is crucial to increasing public understanding of the legislative process. Identifying speakers, including legislators and persons testifying, and keeping track of bills will require diligence by MPBN, and MPBN is responsible for ensuring sufficient quality control measures to accomplish such timely identification.

G. Program Editing

- 1. Once MPBN begins coverage of one chamber, it will continue the recording or broadcasting, to the greatest extent possible, until that body adjourns or recesses.
- 2. If the chamber is at ease, MPBN will remain with that chamber, to the greatest extent possible, until it adjourns or recesses.
- 3. Original recorded or live floor action or legislative hearings or work sessions may not be edited except to the extent they are required by law to be edited (e.g., emergencies or use

of profane language).

- 4. Rebroadcast floor action or legislative hearings or work sessions may be edited as long as the consideration of a legislative measure is presented in its entirety and notice of such editing is given to viewers.
- 5. Rebroadcast material will be aired, to the greatest extent possible, with current bill status and the actual date on which the floor action or legislative hearing or work session occurred being displayed on screen.
- 6. To ensure viewers receive an accurate view of the flow, content and conduct of floor action or legislative hearings or work sessions, MPBN shall exercise its best judgment in determining the period during which that material will be rebroadcast.

H. Voice Over

MPBN may provide a "live" voice over operator to explain terms and other general information during proceedings, such as procedural motions. MPBN will not make editorial comments about the proceeding or the matters that are subject to the proceedings but provide a voice over solely to educate the public about the legislative process and the role of the participants.

I. Non-Partisan Nature

Programming will be complete, balanced, and fair without regard to political parties, partisanship or ideology. MPBN coverage of legislative proceedings and deliberations will be unedited except as specified in this Agreement. MPBN will accurately broadcast the proceedings and deliberations to the viewers, and MPBN will not editorialize on such deliberations or proceedings.

J. Use of MPBN Material

MPBN broadcasts of legislative proceedings under this Agreement and any reuse of such broadcasts may not be used for commercial, political, political campaigns, lobbying or partisan purposes, and MPBN agrees to so note in its broadcasts or other dissemination of the proceedings. However, MPBN may allow rebroadcasts of excerpts of its broadcasts by bona fide news organizations provided MPBN is credited as the source of the content.

K. Modifications

During the term of this Agreement, the Legislative Council reserves its rights to supplement or modify the provisions contained in this Attachment after prior consultation with MPBN. Any such supplement or modification must be in writing and approved by the Legislative Council.

MPBN's Guiding Principles for Maine Capitol Connection Channel

The Maine Capitol Connection Channel ("MCC") will use its best efforts to:

provide programming that is fair, accurate, balanced and without regard to partisanship or ideology and advances the knowledge Maine citizens have of their government. MCC coverage is intended to offer viewers access to the deliberations of their government;

provide programming which will be scheduled by the Managing Editor in a manner that recognizes the role of timeliness in the value of information. Programming with content which does not lose value through immediacy may be delayed and replayed;

provide programming and scheduling of telecasts which will reflect a variety of possible subject matter and deliberating bodies. Balance shall also reflect the importance of covering issues of interest to particular geographic areas; and

provide programming and scheduling consistent with MCC's mission with the understanding that MCC's resources are limited. Programming will be consistent with the standards of MPBN, with its Managing Editor making day-to-day programming decisions.

<u>November 21, 2013</u>

Deciding Appeals of Legislative Bill Requests Turned Down By the Council

Requirements relevant to bills in the Second Regular Session

- 1. Under the terms of the Maine Constitution, Section 1 of Article IV, Part Third, Legislative Power, the business of the second regular session **must be limited** to budgetary matters; legislation in the Governor's call; legislation of an emergency nature admitted by the Legislature; legislation referred to committees to study and report by the Legislature in the first regular session; and legislation presented to the Legislature by written petition of the electors (direct citizen initiative).
- 2. Under the 126th Legislative Council's Rules of Procedure, any action of the Council requires the affirmative vote of at least 6 members.
- 3. Under Rule 203 of the Joint Rules of the 126th Legislature, any vote of the Legislative Council to accept or reject a bill or resolve for introduction under the procedures established under the Joint Rules must be taken by the yeas and nays, and that vote must be recorded and made available for public inspection.
- 4. Under Rule 217 of the Joint Rules, a bill that has been introduced and finally rejected in a regular or special session may not be introduced in a subsequent session of the same Legislature except by a vote of 2/3 of both chambers. Therefore, determinations as to the relevancy of Rule 217 will be made by the presiding officers outside of this meeting.

Suggested Protocol for deciding appeals

- A. The Legislative Council will review appeals in alphabetical order by Sponsor.
- B. For procedural consistency, when voting on an appeal of a bill request that was denied, the initial motion on a bill will be presumed to be a motion to accept the bill request for introduction in the second regular session along with a second to that motion. (Yea is to let in a bill; nay is to reject the bill for introduction). Also for procedural consistency, unless otherwise stated, each motion is presumed to have been made by the vice-chair of the Legislative Council, seconded by the chair.
- C. In order to review all legislative appeals in a timely manner, voting will be by electronic vote or a show of hands, with each Council Member's vote on each bill being recorded. The record of each vote will be made available by the Office of the Executive Director for public inspection following the meeting.
- D. Legislators who have appealed a decision of the Legislative Council will be given a brief opportunity to orally present their appeal to the Council. A time limit of 2 minutes will be observed for Legislators making an appeal. Only by leave of the Chair of the Legislative Council may a person who is not a Legislator Sponsor address the Council.
- E. <u>Discussion of a bill request will be limited to whether it is appropriate for introduction under Constitutional provisions for second regular session bills, and will not speak to the merits of the bill itself.</u> If a bill was turned down because it is closely related to another legislative request or to a carryover bill, the burden is on the Sponsor to convincingly distinguish his or her bill request from the closely related one.

Request for authority to convene Task Force on Adult Learners

Part GGGGG-1 of PL 2013, c.368, An Act Making Unified Appropriations and Allocations for the Expenditures of State Government, General Fund and Other Funds and Changing Certain Provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 2013, June 30, 2014 and June 30, 2015, established the Task Force on Adult Learners to study issues related to the more than 200,000 adults in the State who have obtained some postsecondary education but who have not earned an associate or baccalaureate degree or obtained a professional certificate. The legislation specifies in detail the charge of the task force. The task force is required to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the Joint Select Committee on Maine's Workforce and Economic Future no later than February 1, 2014.

The legislation required all appointments to be made by July 26, 2013, that date being 30 days after the effective date of Chapter 368. Of the 13 members of the task force, 10, comprising a majority, have been appointed as of November 12, 2013. The three members who have not yet been appointed are:

- One representative of a statewide membership organization advocating for business, appointed by the Governor
- One representative from a statewide organization representing small business owners, appointed by the Governor
- The Commissioner of Education or the commissioner's designee

Pursuant to Section GGGGG-1, if 30 days or more after the effective date of the legislation have passed and a majority but not all appointments have been made, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for the task force to meet and conduct its business. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council is directed to call and convene the first meeting of the task force.

Because the membership of the task force remains incomplete nearly 5 months after the effective date of the legislation establishing the task force and because the task force needs a minimum of several months to properly meet its charge to study the issues delineated in the legislation and make its recommendations, I am requesting authorization from the Legislative Council for the task force to meet and conduct its business.

If the Legislative Council grants authority, I will plan to provide proper paper notice and call and convene the task force by early December.

PART GGGGG

Sec. GGGGG-1. Task Force on Adult Learners. The Task Force on Adult Learners, referred to in this Part as "the task force," is established.

- 1. Membership. The task force consists of 13 members as follows:
- A. The Chancellor of the University of Maine System or the chancellor's designee;
- B. The President of the Maine Community College System or the president's designee;
- C. The Commissioner of Economic and Community Development or the commissioner's designee;
- D. The Commissioner of Labor or the commissioner's designee;
- E. The director of the office within the Department of Education concerned with adult education and family literacy or the director's designee;
- F. The Commissioner of Education or the commissioner's designee;
- G. The Chair of the State Workforce Investment Board or the chair's designee;
- H. One representative of a statewide membership organization advocating for business, appointed by the Governor;
- I. One representative from a statewide organization representing small business owners, appointed by the Governor;
- J. One representative of a nonprofit organization dedicated to postsecondary degree attainment by nontraditional students, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- K. One representative of a statewide foundation dedicated to promoting sustainable economic growth for this State, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- L. One representative of the board of a local workforce investment area designated pursuant to the federal Workforce Investment Act of 1998, Public Law 105-220, appointed by the Speaker of the House; and
- M. One representative from a labor union in this State, appointed by the Speaker of the House.
- 2. Appointments; convening of task force; chair. All appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this Part. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have

been completed. After appointment of all members, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council shall call and convene the first meeting of the task force at which the chair of the task force must be elected from among its members. If 30 days or more after the effective date of this Part a majority of but not all appointments have been made, the executive director may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for the task force to meet and conduct its business.

- 3. Duties. The task force shall study issues related to the more than 200,000 adults in the State who have obtained some postsecondary education but who have not earned an associate or baccalaureate degree or obtained a professional certificate. The task force shall develop a multisector statewide strategic plan to increase postsecondary degree completion rates among the adult population that includes both short-term and long-term strategies to increase degree completion rates by nontraditional students in the State and shall develop proposed legislation related to these strategies.
 - A. In conducting its study and formulating recommendations, the task force shall:
 - (1) Review available literature and best practices related to degree completion by nontraditional students, including any other task force reports related to degree attainment;
 - (2) Convene appropriate subcommittees to gather additional information and recommendations to ensure a broad-based view of degree attainment by nontraditional students in this State. These groups must include, but are not limited to, adult students currently enrolled in a college transitions program, the State Workforce Investment Board, the boards of the local workforce investment areas designated pursuant to the federal Workforce Investment Act of 1998, Public Law 105-220, career and technical education centers and the Maine Centers for Women, Work and Community within the University of Maine System;
 - (3) Review available data and research on degree completion by nontraditional students in Maine and New England and nationally;
 - (4) Assess the current status of degree completion by nontraditional students in Maine, including available support services, academic programs, student funding options and adult learner initiatives in progress; and
 - (5) Identify barriers to degree completion by nontraditional students.
 - B. The task force shall make recommendations to:
 - (1) Develop a multisector statewide strategic plan to increase postsecondary degree completion rates among the adult population;
 - (2) Make the most effective use of local, state and federal resources, including leveraging private foundation investment;
 - (3) Align high school graduation, workforce training and adult education expectations to public postsecondary institution admission and placement requirements;
 - (4) Promote seamless transfer and expansion of credits granted through prior learning assessment, including credits for employer-based training programs;

- (5) Develop a statewide outreach and support campaign to reach the target population of adults with some postsecondary education but no degree or professional certification;
- (6) Create programs that accelerate certificate and associate and bachelor's degree attainment;
- (7) Identify financial resources that support degree completion by nontraditional students through grants or scholarships; and
- (8) Identify redundancies in programs and initiatives that serve adult learners and recommend program elimination or, when appropriate, consolidation and collaboration.
- 4. Staff assistance. The University of Maine System and the Maine Community College System jointly shall provide necessary staffing services to the task force.
- 5. Report. The task force shall submit its report, including the recommendations required by subsection 3, together with any necessary implementing legislation no later than February 1, 2014 to the Joint Select Committee on Maine's Workforce and Economic Future, which may report out a bill to the Second Regular Session of the 126th Legislature.



Pursuant to Joint Rule 353, section 7, we write to request an extension of the Advisory Committee's reporting deadline to December 15, 2013 and to hold a fifth meeting on December 9, 2013.

As you know, the Advisory Committee was established to advise the Legislature regarding the interests of individuals and employers with respect to Maine's health benefit exchange. Although the Advisory Committee has already had 3 day- long meetings and has scheduled a fourth meeting for December 2, we feel it is necessary to have an additional meeting to complete our work and make preliminary recommendations. We believe that additional time is necessary because federally-facilitated health benefit exchanges in Maine and other states continue to face ongoing technical and implementation issues. The Advisory Committee will be better equipped to develop our preliminary recommendations if we can determine whether or not these issues can be resolved in a timely manner.

We recognize that an additional meeting will add to the costs for the Advisory Committee and the Legislature as a whole. We hope that you will consider any budgeted, but not expended, costs for interim committee meetings in making your decision. For example, the Joint Standing Committee on Insurance and Financial Services has been authorized to hold 2 interim committee meetings, but has decided not to meet during the interim. Three legislative members of the Advisory Committee are members of the Joint Standing Committee on Insurance and Financial Services.

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Loring Development Authority of Maine Fiscal Year 2013 Annual Report July 1, 2012 – June 30, 2013

PARAGRAPH 1A: DESCRIPTION OF THE AUTHORITY'S OPERATIONS AND STATUS REPORT

Loring Development Authority (LDA) is responsible for the redevelopment of the properties formerly comprising the Loring Air Force Base in order to create jobs and new economic activity following the base's closure. Accomplishing that mission requires LDA to manage the 3,700-acre business-commercial and industrial park including a 1,600-acre aviation complex; serve as landlord and supply municipal-type services to approximately 24 businesses, residents, and employers who collectively employ approximately 1,100 employees and occupy approximately 1.6 million square feet of space in nearly 80 major buildings; support Loring's businesses and employers as well as Loring's 395 residents by operating a water treatment plant, water distribution system, and a wastewater collection system; maintaining and plowing 26 miles of roadways; performing grounds maintenance on hundreds of acres of developed and developable property; and providing for fire and ambulance services, law enforcement services and wastewater treatment; and working with prospective new Loring businesses to develop opportunities to reuse additional facilities and properties, create additional employment and economic activity both at Loring and in the broader region.

Employers at Loring represent industrial, manufacturing, agriculture, forestry, telecommunications, commercial, back-office, education, health care, recreation, conservation and aviation sectors. A profile of the employers at Loring, included in Addendum-4 at the end of this report, illustrates the significant level and diversity of economic activity generated by the reuse of facilities at Loring Commerce Centre.

FISCAL YEAR 2013 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The following summarizes the LDA's accomplishments for fiscal year 2013, which support its primary mission of job creation and facility absorption on Loring Commerce Centre.

BANGOR GAS/PENOBSCOT NATURAL GAS. Bangor Gas acquired the leasehold interest to the LDA's pipeline this year. LDA had previously leased rights to Loring BioEnergy, LLC and Bangor Gas acquired the former Loring BioEnergy rights and obligations. LDA and Bangor Gas worked out a formal Assumption Agreement effectively placing Bangor Gas in the position of Loring BioEnergy with respect to the rights to use the existing 6" pipe which will be converted to transmit natural gas. Bangor Gas also assumed Loring BioEnergy's payment and other obligations such as maintenance of the right of way and insurance. Bangor Gas is preparing to use the pipeline in multiple phases. In the first phase, 62 miles of the pipeline was activated, from Union Street in Bangor to Madawamkeag. Reactivation required the detailed inspection, conversions of the major facilities and replacing valves with natural gas valves, replacing damaged sections of pipe and clearing about 52 miles of the right-of way to a width of 25 feet. Bangor Gas plans to build a lateral to bring natural gas to Lincoln Paper and Tissue, and to the Lincoln community, by November 2014. Phase two includes reactivation from Bangor to

Searsport, with the rebuild of rectifier sites in Searsport, Hampden and Lincoln. Phase three would be to place the pipeline into service from Madawamkeag to Houlton in 2015.

LORING BIOENERGY, LLC. On September 24, 2010 the LDA and Loring Bioenergy (LBE) executed closing documents on a real estate transaction that included the lease of the Searsport to Loring pipeline and the 50-foot pipeline right-of-way. Since the closing, the lease of the pipeline was foreclosed upon by LBE's lender and was sold to Penobscot Natural Gas Company (PNG), the parent of Bangor Gas (see previous paragraph). Loring Holdings (LH) continues to work towards development of remaining rights in the pipeline corridor which it had previously obtained through a sublease. LH is working on two separate projects that would utilize the corridor. One is a transmission project known as the Maine Power Express that would deliver power from Loring to southern New England to help address increased demand for renewables. The other project would require natural gas, possibly in a new line, to be delivered to a gas-fired generation plant, to be located at Loring because of its potential to serve a thermal host such as a manufacturer or processor.

LORING SOLAR ONE. LDA entered into a Solar Power Lease Agreement with Loring Solar One, LLC, from Washington, Maine. The company completed the installation of a solar panel array on the south side of the LDA's office building and began providing electricity to LDA in February 2013. The demonstration project provides no financial exposure for the LDA; the price that the LDA pays for the generated electricity is set at 95% of what would otherwise be paid on an annual basis. A net metering arrangement includes the LDA office building and maintenance shop. The pilot project, designed to generate approximately 60,000 KW per year, will provide opportunities to develop and evaluate emerging energy solutions. The term of the agreement is 20 years with an option to purchase the solar array after seven years.

PELLETCO. LDA entered into a Heat Purchase Agreement with PelletCo, LLC for the purchase of heat supplied by the company's biomass pellet fired boilers at two buildings at Loring. Installation, operation and maintenance of the boilers and purchasing and delivery of pellets is provided by the company. LDA's costs include the metered cost of heat at \$29.00 per MMbtu with a 3% annual increase. LDA is also responsible for ash removal and disposal. The agreement is for 4 years, renewed annually for an additional 4 years, (a 4 year rolling renewal term). The existing oil-fired heating systems in the 2 buildings will remain in place to serve as a back-up for the pellet systems. LDA pays only for heat delivered to the buildings.

Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) Initiative. LDA worked with private and public local and state officials on a statewide initiative to secure one of six Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) UAV test site designations and establish a UAV test range in Maine. With the help of an industry consultant, the advantages and challenges of securing an FAA UAV designation in Maine were identified. Maine has strong advantages in its available infrastructure at Loring and Brunswick, uncluttered airspace, and access to northeastern and Canadian aviation technology companies and research facilities. Its main challenges, including its lack of experience in the UAV field and the brief amount of time available for developing the proposal, meant that approximately \$400,000 would be needed to secure the services of consultants to develop the extensive FAA proposal. A grant request from the Maine Technology Institute for the consultant fees was unsuccessful and the project did not move forward. There remains a possibility of teaming with another state for UAV testing in the future.

AIRSPACE WORKING GROUP. In October 2012, prior to any public knowledge of FAA's plans to designate six test ranges, as a development project encouraged by the "Mobilize Maine" initiative, a working group was formed to explore the potential for UAV testing at Loring. To be successful, the group felt that a test center must take advantage of the FAA's Certificate of Authorization (COA) process and enjoy access to some special use airspace.

APPLIED THERMAL SCIENCES & UAV ACTIVITY. Applied Thermal Sciences (ATS), a company that collaborated with the UAV test center initiative, presented its designs and plans for propulsion systems, rockets and ramjets to the LDA Trustees. ATS is looking for a launch and test set for newly designed devices which are to be used to propel smaller commercial payloads, such as "cube" satellites into orbit. Some of the systems have been successfully tested in Washington County but Loring's airfield would be an ideal location for developing and testing this type of UAV. ATS is interested in bringing some of its work to Loring.

ALTAEROS ENERGIES. Altaeros, a small development stage company with roots at MIT conducted tests of its airborne wind turbine using Loring's Arch Hangar and a portion of the airfield last year and the company returned again this year. Altaeros' innovation is a wind turbine in a helium-filled housing. The device can be deployed and retrieved quickly and moved from place to place making it ideal for military operations in forward areas or as a replacement for diesel generators in remote areas not served by transmission lines. Another important advantage is that there is no capital tied up in the construction of large towers as traditional turbines require. Altaeros was very pleased with the Loring Commerce Centre as a test site and indicated its interest in returning for future research and testing operations should the need arise.

THREE RING BINDER PROJECT. In July 2012, LDA hosted the Maine Fiber Company and Tilson Technologies ribbon cutting ceremony for the 3 Ring Binder (3RB) kick off in Aroostook County. Federal funding dedicated to upgrading the communication infrastructure in rural areas made the 3RB project a reality in Maine. Maine Fiber Co. installed dark fiber (144 and 288 strand fiber optic cable) in selected areas in the state including the Loring campus, making dark fiber available at competitive rates, which is good for businesses using high volumes of data. Most of Loring's business locations will be within a few hundred feet of this new resource. As a direct result of the 3RB announcement, the LDA has been in discussions with a cloud computing center to locate a facility at Loring. More information can be found at the Maine Fiber Company web site: www.mainefiberco.com

TIN CUP LAND COMPANY. Tin Cup Land Company, owners of the residential units at Loring and the Limestone Country Club, decided last year to dissolve the company, divide its interests, and obligations and create two separate businesses. When the transaction is closed, Weatherhead Management will operate the residential units and Phairways Enterprises will operate the golf course and country club.

FRONTIER TRANSPORT. LDA Trustees approved the renewal of Frontier Transport's lease for nosedock #22. The new 5-year lease will allow the company to continue to use Dock-22 in support of its agricultural business operations.

SITEL LEASE. Sitel, a global leader in telephone-based customer service, expanded its call center operations to Loring in 1997 and continues to operate here. The company extended its lease for another five-year period beginning in May of 2013. Sitel officials have always indicated that the workforce they have at Loring performs very well and compares very favorably with their other locations.

NORTHERN GIRL, LLC. Northern Girl is a Van Buren company that had approached the LDA through the Northern Maine Development Commission looking for an interim solution for facility space that would accommodate organic vegetable processing. The company determined that the kitchen area of Loring's NCO Club would allow it to start operations until a facility is ready in Van Buren. Northern Girl proposed a scenario for the NCO kitchen, where it may be developed as an incubator-style shared kitchen for small food processers. Northern Girl also discussed developing a Regional Food Hub concept that involves small producers from throughout the broader region rebuilding the food system in Maine.

ROOSTOOK CAR CLUB. Roostook Car Club, a model car racing group, is leasing space in Building 8702 for their racing events. The dedicated group of volunteers and hobbyists hope to develop their hobby into a business as interest in model car racing grows.

LORING TIMING ASSOCIATION. Loring Timing Association has organized annual land speed racing events at Loring for the past few years and is very pleased with venue as well as with the turn out of the events. This event attracts participants from across the U.S.

AUTOCROSS EVENT. Cumberland Motor Club Inc. held another successful autocross precision driving event at Loring this year. The event consisted of automobiles, including high performance cars, being operated within a defined course. Although the race events do not attract huge crowds they do bring visitors to the area who provide increased traffic to restaurants, hotels and other businesses.

PROSPECTS. Active prospects include a wood products manufacturer, an agricultural product processor, a company seeking to do rocket launches, a recycler of wood waste, a device manufacturer, a data technology company that would use the dark fiber resource and a film studio in need of facilities for a new studio and for editing and post production activities.

EMERGENCY SERVICES RESTRUCTURED

The Town of Limestone decided that it would not renew the three-way fire services agreement with the Town of Fort Fairfield and the LDA. The contract ended on June 30, 2013. After negotiations with Limestone to keep the three-way agreement in place failed, a new arrangement for fire services was developed. Limestone appointed a volunteer Chief to oversee its volunteer fire department and the LDA hired three full-time and one part-time EMT certified firefighters to staff the department at Loring. [In the three-way arrangement, the fire chief and the paid firefighters were employed by Fort Fairfield.] The Limestone and Loring firefighters support each other in the event of an emergency. This arrangement continues to provide coverage on a 24/7 basis for the frequent alarms at Loring Job Corps Center and for the entire community without overburdening volunteer firefighters.

The arrangement also facilitates a new arrangement for ambulance services in Limestone, Caswell and at Loring. Crown Ambulance employees team up with Loring firefighters to provide full-time ambulance coverage in Limestone. The new contract with Crown Ambulance replaces the agreement Loring had with the City of Caribou's Fire and Ambulance Department. Although LDA appreciates the many years of professional and reliable services provided by Caribou, Loring is within the boundaries of Limestone and it is important that Loring and Limestone be more in alignment regarding municipal services going forward.

Water Supply System Upgrades. LDA and the Air Force entered into a Memorandum of Agreement, which included a payment to LDA of \$1.5 million for upgrades to the water treatment plant and distribution system. The MOA and payment addresses the Air Force's responsibility to provide potable water to Loring, where groundwater contamination prevents the use of wells. The funding matched a \$1,132,000 grant from the Economic Development Administration. The grant provides for 50% of the costs of a \$2,264,000 project to upgrade Loring's drinking water treatment infrastructure. Upgrades will allow the plant to perform at its rated capacity of 2.3 million gallons per day, making it possible to support large water users. The work is being completed in two phases. Phase one upgrades treatment systems and is intended to improve water quality. This phase along with the rebuilding of the fishway on the water impoundment dam is complete. Phase two, scheduled to be complete next summer, includes the repair the concrete weir and intake structure, rebuild one filter bed, place a portable emergency generator at the facility and complete building improvements.

SMALL BUSINESS FACILITIES UPGRADES. LDA's \$1 million Small Business Administration (SBA) earmark grant is funding improvements to facilities for small business uses. The former library was the first building improved with SBA funds, a new roofing system including insulation was installed, protecting the building from water damage and saving on heating costs. Other buildings improved to date include the LDA office building, the former NCO Club, three smaller (2,000 sq.ft.) buildings, Building 8410, a 22,000 square foot hangar, the Sitel building exterior and back suite, a small industrial building, and the former bowling center, which is now an open-space industrial facility. Additional work to be completed with SBA assistance is similar in design — facilities suitable for small business operations will be improved; energy efficiency is a priority.

INFLOW AND INFILTRATION (I&I) REDUCTION AT LORING COMMERCE CENTRE. Reduction of the I&I of ground and surface water in Loring's wastewater collection systems is an ongoing project. The first three phases of the sewer line replacement project are complete. However, a large rain event maxed out the sewer line's capacity and clearly demonstrated that the LDA needs to continue to the next phase of I & I reduction work.

JOB CORPS. Due to a budget shortfall Job Corps suspended new student enrollments for part of the year. The student body at Loring Job Corps dropped to about 100 below its average number of students and some staff members were laid off. Job Corps student enrollment levels were curtailed nationally. The reduction in enrollments means that fewer students will benefit from the program and fewer people will be employed by Job Corps. The reduced employment level will negatively impact the funding LDA receives through the Loring Job Increment Financing Fund, which is based on the state income tax withholdings from employees at Loring.

FEDERAL "SEQUESTER". DFAS staff experienced furloughs due to the sequester. The federal furloughs will also reduce the funding LDA receives through the Loring Job Increment Financing Fund, which is based on the state income tax withholdings from employees at Loring.

LD 260, AN ACT TO EXTEND FUNDING FOR THE LORING JOB INCREMENT FINANCING FUND. LD 260 was passed, changing the termination date for the Loring Job Increment Financing Fund (the "Fund") to 2026. The fund provides a significant source of revenue to the LDA and was scheduled to be sunset in 2016. Senator Troy Jackson and Representative Bernard Ayotte proposed the legislation that extended the program.

LD 1843: OVERSIGHT OF QUASI-INDEPENDENT STATE ENTITIES. LDA Trustees adopted a policy for organizational oversight as required by the new legislation. The policy incorporates LDA's existing policy on purchasing and travel and adds new requirements, for tracking and reporting contributions.

LORING INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDING. Two years ago LDA financed the paving of approximately 10% of Loring's roadways at a cost of \$350,000. LDA held discussions with state officials about the potential for the LDA to obtain funding from a future transportation bond issue for on-going roadway re-surfacing and maintenance. The transportation bond issue is the most likely vehicle to provide such funding as Loring's roads are considered "private" and therefore on the same legal footing as the street through a Maine University campus. This year legislation to authorize a \$50 million state bond for infrastructure and site improvements at two former military installations was discussed. The bond was developed but was not moved forward for the bond referendum this November.

ENERGY COSTS REDUCTION OPTIONS. An energy audit identified potential for energy savings for LDA buildings. A variety of energy alternatives were identified as potential means to reduce energy costs for the LDA. One option is Compressed Natural Gas (CNG), which costs about 70% of fuel oil, but requires the significant upfront cost of installing dual fuel burners, underground piping and a docking station. The pay back for the CNG conversion would be about four years. Propane was also considered, with lower installation costs than CNG, attractive current pricing for commercial customers and a very short payback period. Pellets offer a potential solution with a pay back of a few years and a cost of about 50% of fuel oil. Pellet burners have been installed at two LDA buildings and propane is being considered for others as funding allows for the conversions to be made.

MARKETING EFFORTS

ADVERTISING. The LDA launched a new hard copy and digital campaign through the Maine Economic Development Guide, an official publication of the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development. The ad appears in the hard copy magazine and in the online guide at businesselimate.com/maine. Advertisements were created in-house and provided electronically to publishers.

An advertisement/sponsorship for radio coverage was purchased for the annual Limestone 4th of July Festivities.

WEBSITE. A new Loring.org website has been completed and seamlessly launched, with a simplified layout and quick access for browsers. The site was designed to provide downloadable data for available facilities, up-to-date information, ease in making in-house changes and an efficient delivery of board meeting documents.

PROMOTING LORING

Loring's facilities, attributes and contact information are available on numerous business development websites such as The Maine Chamber, Maine Better Transportation Association, The Yellow Pages online, Hangars.com and other aviation interests.

Following a request for proposals to provide real estate services, the LDA signed an Exclusive Right to Sell Listing Agreement with Re/Max Central to provide Sales Agent services and

exposure on the Multiple Listing Service for designated Loring properties. The goal is to promote Loring properties, for sale or lease, to the widest possible audience. For properties not specifically listed, LDA maintains an "Open Listing" and encourages all real estate brokers to bring prospective purchasers or commercial lessees to Loring.

PUBLIC OUTREACH

STAKEHOLDER & BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT MEETINGS. The LDA President & CEO regularly leads tours and presents Loring's buildings and assets to potential tenants and visitors. He also promotes Loring and northern Maine when participating in speaking engagements and meetings regionally and state-wide.

WEEKLY MEETINGS. The LDA President & CEO regularly meets with area business leaders in the region to discuss trends and opportunities for business development in Aroostook County and to coordinate regional marketing efforts

PUBLIC BOARDS AND AFFILIATIONS. The LDA President & CEO serves in a voluntary capacity on regional and state-wide Boards, networking within various communities and acquainting people with Loring Commerce Centre, the State of Maine's largest industrial, business and aviation complex.

OTHER ACTIVITIES & EFFORTS

REAL ESTATE BROKERS. LDA selected Re/Max to list some facilities in an Exclusive Listing contract for selected commercial properties. An exclusive listing opportunity provides an incentive for the selected broker to promote Loring properties, increasing potential sales. The exclusive listing contract is for specific properties. An Open Listing is maintained for properties not specifically listed.

LIMESTONE REAL ESTATE TAXES. The town of Limestone bore a large share of the impact of the closure of Loring Air Force Base and could not absorb the cost of providing municipal services at the 8,700 acre commerce center. LDA provides those services at Loring but does not have the ability to levy taxes. When a property at Loring is sold it becomes a part of the Limestone tax base. LDA Trustees and members of the Limestone Select Board began discussing a gain-sharing arrangement to assist with the costs of municipal services at Loring.

MOBILIZE MAINE. LDA continues to collaborate with DECD and the Northern Maine Development Commission (NMDC) on the Mobilize Maine effort — a proactive, assets based grassroots approach to economic development. The asset mapping component has been completed. DECD, Fairpoint Communications and the six economic development districts identified renewable energy and information technology as two areas of economic promise for Aroostook County. LDA's President & CEO is a member of the Mobilize Northern Maine group and serves on its committee for the Renewable Energy cluster. An information technology cluster is examining ways to utilize Aroostook's comparative advantage in the area of fiber optics for data farms and other IT related businesses.

LEAD-LEADERS ENCOURAGING AROOSTOOK DEVELOPMENT. LDA President Carl W. Flora serves on the Board of Directors of LEAD.

KEEPING INFORMED. When relevant to the LDA's activities, LDA staff members actively participate in community and state economic development efforts, serving on various boards, attending workshops, development forums and trainings, keeping abreast of programs and other opportunities available to businesses.

LDA FUNDING

STATE OF MAINE. In October 2012, the LDA received an appropriation from the State of Maine for \$200,000. This funding continued to be used for match funding for grants and for marketing and operating expenses. It is important to note that funding for an appropriation for LDA was not included in the state's current budget; state appropriation funding for LDA has ceased. The State did not provide financial support for operating expenses at the Loring Applied Technology Center through fiscal year 2013.

TAX INCREMENT FINANCING FUND. The Loring Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Program allows the LDA to receive 50% of the Maine State Income Tax withheld from incremental jobs created at the Loring Commerce Centre to fund municipal type services provided at Loring. Contributions to this fund for fiscal year 2012 totaled \$838,882.50. These funds are used to fund municipal service costs and maintenance of public infrastructure.

PROPERTY SALE, LEASE, MUNICIPAL SERVICES AND MISCELLANEOUS REVENUES. During fiscal year 2013, the LDA received revenues from its tenants, from the sale of land and personal property and from miscellaneous revenues in the amount of \$3,089,688.

KATAHDIN TRUST COMPANY. LDA has two lines of credit from Katahdin Trust Company to assist in the management of cash flow; one line for \$1,000,000 and the second for \$250,000. At the end of FY 2013, funds advanced under the line of credit totaled \$1,163,000. This debt was retired in August 2013.

KATAHDIN TRUST COMPANY. The LDA secured a \$200,000 short-term loan from Katahdin Trust Company to supplement cash flows until grant reimbursement funds were received from the Economic Development Administration. The debt was retired in July 2013.

SBA GRANT. In FY11 LDA secured a \$1 million federal appropriation which is administered through a grant from the Small Business Administration. The funding is for the upgrading of facilities in support of small businesses; the project is close to completion.

EDA GRANT. In FY11 LDA was awarded \$1,132,000 from the Economic Development Administration for the upgrade of Loring's water supply infrastructure; about 75% complete.
