NEW BUSINESS

Item #1: Consideration of After Deadline Bill Requests / Addendum

The Legislative Council considered and voted on the bill requests in accordance with the established protocol. Of the 13 bill requests, the council authorized 12 requests for introduction in the 1st Regular Session of the 127th Legislature, 1 was tabled. Of the 3 joint resolutions, the council took no action on the 3 previously tabled items. Of the 2 Late-filed Major Substantive Rule requests, the council authorized 2. The Legislative Council's actions on the requests are included on the attached list.

The Legislative Council then returned to the other items on its agenda.

REPORTS FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND COUNCIL OFFICES

Executive Director's Report

Grant Pennoyer, Executive Director, reported on the following:

1. Heating and Plumbing Issues

Work to reconnect two remaining heating units that have been off line due to leaks in the supply line is in the process of being scheduled. The work to correct one of the two heating units in the Legislative Conference Room is going to be delayed until after the session due to the amount of the work required to resupply the unit. The work to resupply and connect a heating unit in a staff office within the Governor's Office will be scheduled as soon as a part arrives to tap into existing supply lines in the ceiling of the Legislative Conference Room.

2. Installation of Backup Cooling System for Computer Server Room

The backup cooling system for the Computer Server Room is now installed. We were fortunate that despite all the bitterly cold weather this winter, we did not experience an issue with regular cooling units that can fail when we have extremely cold weather.

Fiscal Report

Chris Nolan, Director, Office of Fiscal and Program Review, reported on the following:

Total General Fund Revenue - FY 2015 (\$'s in Millions)

General Fund revenue was under budget by \$14.2 million (4.4%) for January but still \$4.7 million (0.3%) over budget for the fiscal year through January. These variances reflect the December revenue forecast, which increased budgeted revenue for FY 2015 by \$45.5 million.

Individual income tax revenue was \$6.1 million under budget for the month of January driven largely by refunds exceeding budgeted amounts. Fiscal year to date individual income tax revenue is \$6.8 million over budget. Estimated payments were \$1.9 million over budget which could be an indicator that April receipts may be higher than forecasted. Corporate income tax revenue was \$4.2 million under budget for the month due largely to refunds. Estimated corporate income tax payments were over budget by \$1.2 million. The sales and use tax category came in \$2.1 million (1.9%) over budget budget for the month and is 2.1 million (0.3%) above budget for the fiscal year to date. Total taxable sales for the month of December (January revenue) were 8.8% higher than December 2013. Reduced energy prices contributed to this increase.

Other significant revenue variances for January reflected purely timing issues in the monthly distribution of revenue for FY 2015 including the Transfers for Tax Relief Programs category, which was over budget by \$4.9 million for January. Lottery revenue was under budget by \$1.4 million for January due to a large jackpot payout in December.

Highway Fund Revenue Update

Highway Fund revenue was under budget by \$1.6 million (6.0%) in January but still over budget by \$0.9 million (0.5%) for the fiscal year through January. These variances reflect the December revenue forecast, which increased budgeted Highway Fund revenue for FY 15 by \$7.5 million.

Motor fuel excise taxes were \$1.5 million under budget driven mainly by special fuel. These taxes are due on the last day of the month, and since the 31st was on a Saturday, that day's receipts (just under \$1.2 million) were posted in February. Motor vehicle registration and fees revenues were \$0.5 million under budget in January. The majority of this variance related to title fees directly related to car sales.

Cash Balances Update

Average cash balances increased in January after a slight drop off in December. January's total cash balance of \$678.0 million was well above both last year's balance for January of \$499.0 million and the ten-year average for January of \$515.4 million. General Fund internal borrowing decreased in January to \$116.8 million from \$155.5 million in December and was significantly lower than last January's borrowing. The average Highway Fund balance of \$53.6 million in January increased from December's average of \$28.6 million that reflected the early December annual payment for the Local Road Assistance program.

Item #2: Proposed Legislative Council Policy on Legislative Studies

Ms. Hylan Barr reviewed the proposed Legislative Council Policy on Legislative Studies as well as the background and procedures relevant to this policy. Mr. Pennoyer explained that the proposed policy is consistent with the ones for previous years.

Senator Hill asked if there were any changes that the Council should be considering. Mr. Pennoyer pointed out that the provision requiring prior approval by the Legislative Council of non-conforming studies before being reported out of committee has not been enforced or followed in the past. Ms. Hylan Barr pointed out that any change to this section of the policy

would require a change to the Rules. The Council decided to consider this matter further with the idea that the Rules Committee would also consider it.

Motion: That the Legislative Council adopt the proposed Legislative Council Policy on Legislative Studies for the 127th Maine Legislature. Motion by Senator Mason. Second by Senator Cushing. **Motion passed unanimous (6-0-0-4**, with Senator Alfond, Representatives Eves, Fredette and Espling absent).

Item #3: Request to serve lunch to attendees of Maine Credit Union Day in the Hall of Flags on April 2, 2015 (Request by the Maine Credit Union League)

Ms. Elise Baldacci, Director of Governmental Affairs for the Maine Credit Union League (MCUL), requested that for its event, Maine Credit Union Day, to be held in the Hall of Flags on April 2, 2015, the Maine Credit Union League be given an exemption to the limitation on food served as established in the *Legislative Council Policy on the Use of the Hall of Flags*.

Mr. Pennoyer explained the request by the Maine Credit Union League to serve a meal to legislators in the Hall of Flags on "Maine Credit Union Day". He also drew Legislative Council members attention to the *Legislative Council Policy on the Use of the Hall of Flags* adopted in January 2006. Under the policy, food is allowed in the Hall of Flags subject to limitations, including that with few exceptions, the food served may not constitute a meal. The request by MCUL would not be consistent with the policy and, therefore, would require Legislative Council approval.

Motion: That the Legislative Council approve the request by the Maine Credit Union League to serve lunch in the Hall of Flags on April 2, 2015. Motion by Senator Cushing. Second by Representative McCabe. **Motion passed unanimous (6-0-0-4**, with Senator Alfond, Representatives Eves, Fredette and Espling absent).

Legislative Council

Executive Director's Report March 26, 2015

1. <u>Heating and Plumbing Issues</u>

A new leak in the heating system developed late last week in the west wall of the Legislative Conference Room. The affected supply and return lines have been isolated and shut off to stop any further water damage. However, this means that the Legislative Conference Room and the Governor's Chief of Staff's office are without heat until repairs can be completed. Electric heaters have been placed in the Legislative Conference Room as a temporary heat source. We are in the process of scheduling the repairs, which will need to take place on a weekend or in the evening.

2. Update on Living Memorial from the Summit Display

At its January 8th meeting, the Legislative Council approved Rep. Golden's request to display the Living Memorial from the Summit in the Hall of Flags with a time to be determined by the Executive Director and Rep. Golden. The display is now tentatively planned for the two-week period that will begin the Tuesday after the Memorial Day weekend, May 26th. The display's planned location will be in the southeast corner of the Hall of Flags.

3. Facebook Page for Law and Legislative Reference Library

The Law and Legislative Reference Library is in the process of developing and setting up a Facebook page as a means of expanding connections with potential patrons and the library community at large. Libraries use Facebook to post information about their resources and events, and Facebook's algorithm steers that information toward users who are likely to be interested in it. Other libraries in the state have requested to "friend" the Law and Legislative Reference Library. The proposed page development will make that possible. The new Facebook page will be an additional tool that the Law and Legislative Reference Library uses to meet its statutory mission of providing for "the informational needs of the Legislature, other branches of State Government, and the citizens of Maine." No other Nonpartisan Offices are planning any such social media initiatives.

4. 2015 Senate and House Registers Update

The Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House are in the final stages of proofing the 2015 Senate and House Registers. The release of this very popular booklet was delayed to capture the results of the recent special election to replace former Rep. Dickerson from Rockland. This pocket size booklet is printed once each biennium as soon as possible during the First Regular Session of each Legislature. It includes a wealth of information about individual Legislators and includes the complete Joint Rules of the Legislature. The Secretary and the Clerk are going to time the release of this booklet in order to incorporate some recent changes that were unanimously approved by the Joint Select Committee on Joint Rules, but not yet passed by the full Legislature. The booklet also includes the Legislative Code of Ethics that was adopted by the 100th Legislature. Some interest was expressed by some members of the Joint Select Committee on Joint Rules to update that Legislative Code of Ethics, which has been unchanged for more than 50 years. If this update to the code can be implemented expeditiously, the Secretary and Clerk will incorporate an adopted update to the Legislative Code of Ethics in this year's booklet.

5. Legislative Council Policies and Procedures Posted on the Web

There are numerous policies and procedures that have been adopted by the Legislative Council over the years, which have not been readily available to the Legislature. The Executive Director's Office recently completed a web page under the Legislative Council's heading with links to each of the adopted policies and procedures grouped by subject matter. Some of these policies have not been updated for many years. I am planning to work with the Council and the appropriate Council committees to review these policies and procedures and incorporate appropriate updates. The link to the page is:

General Fund revenue was over budget by \$37.8 million (34.0%) for February, increasing the positive variance for the fiscal year through February to \$42.4 million (2.2%).

Individual income tax revenue was \$51.9 million over budget for the month of February driven largely by lower refunds than budgeted. Maine Revenue Services has consistently processed refunds this tax season, so this situation could be an indicator that refunds were over estimated. The next few months will be an indicator of whether this situation is an anomaly for the month or an indicator that refunds were over estimated. Corporate income tax revenue was \$6.7 million under budget for the month due largely to refunds. These refunds are for 2013 final corporate returns. Review of the remaining returns is expected to be completed over the next few months and this line is still expected to be close to budget for the year. The sales and use tax category came in \$2.8 million under budget but continues to track close to budget for the fiscal year to date. February's revenue (January sales) appears to have been negatively affected by the weather.

Other significant revenue variances for February reflected purely timing issues in the monthly distribution of revenue for FY 2015, including the Transfers for Tax Relief Programs category, which was over budget by \$2.1 million for February but only slightly over budget for the fiscal year to date.

Highway Fund revenue was under budget by \$0.1 million (-0.4%) in February but still over budget by \$0.8 million (0.4%) for the fiscal year through February.

Long-term trailer registration fees were under budget by \$1.2 million in February due to a significant February payment received at the beginning of March. These revenues are over budget for the fiscal year to date by \$0.4 million. Motor vehicle registration fees were over budget by \$0.5 million in February and continue to run close to budget year to date. Title fee revenue is \$0.4 million under budget and appears to be adversely affected by the winter storms.

3. Cash Balances Update

Average cash balances decreased slightly in February after an increase in January. February's total cash balance of \$675.4 million was still well above both last year's balance for February of \$444.1 million and the ten-year average for February of \$485.9 million. General Fund internal borrowing decreased in February to \$113.0 million from \$116.8 million in January and was significantly lower than last February's borrowing of \$190.5 million. The average Highway Fund balance of \$54.2 million in February was slightly above January's average of \$53.6 million and was significantly higher than last February's balance of \$33.2 million.

Re: Late-filed Major Substantive Rule

For your consideration, the Maine Department of Transportation has submitted the following explanation as to why the major substantive rule, LR 1956 "Rules for Permitting Overlimit Commercial Vehicles of Specified Configurations to Travel Designated Routes", was late-filed and as such is part of the after deadline list.

The major substantive rules were required as a result of legislation enacted during the Second Regular Session of the 126th Legislature. LD 1076 was not enacted as an emergency bill, therefore was not effective until 90 days post adjournment. Work began on the drafting of these extensive rules this past fall. The rules required extensive cooperation and input from Secretary of State – Bureau of Motor Vehicles, as well as the Maine State Police; coordinating the three entities was difficult at times and added to the process. A key staff person with the Maine State Police was on extended medical leave for a 6-week period during this time, and our Chief Engineer, the individual mainly responsible for the engineering analysis required by LD 1076, was out at various times this past fall for medical reasons.

Please find enclosed major substantive rule change documents for review by the legislature. Please see the Checklist for Major Substantive Rules Filings for a list of documents included.

This major substantive rule change will replace a requirement to report to the Prescription Monitoring Program (PMP) the filling of controlled substances within seven (7) days to not later than the close of business on the next business day of the controlled substance after it has been dispensed. By reducing the dispenser reporting timeframe, the rule change supports more informed prescribing for all healthcare providers and will improve detection of questionable activity that may signal drug diversion and/or misuse.

This change also aligns the rule with statutory definitions in 32 M.R.S §13702-A for dispensing and delivery. Reporting of the date the medication is delivered along with the date the prescription was filled will provide more accurate and timely data to all PMP end users.

The provisional rule change will not impose any economic cost on municipalities or counties. An Economic Impact Statement summarizes any potential impact on small businesses.

This DHHS rule change is late-filed as the Office of Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services (SAMHS) sought to amend previously proposed rule change after considering comments received during the public comment period, October 8, 2014 through November 7, 2014. Some time was needed for the Office of the Attorney General and the DHHS Commissioner's Office to closely review and consider the appropriateness of the amended changes proposed by SAMHS. The Department made changes to the Final Rule from the Proposed Rule, in response to comments, and also on the advice of the Office of the Attorney General. Explanations of the changes can be found in the document, "Summary of Comments and Responses".
