With the assistance of the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis and the Office of Fiscal and Program Review, the Revisor's Office has annotated the list in an attempt to identify:

Requests that appear closely related to other requests that have been filed for consideration in the 2nd Regular Session.

These requests are not necessarily duplicate requests. We have grouped together for your consideration and ultimate determination bills with a similar goal or purpose that could potentially appear in the same bill or that clearly deal with the same set of issues.

Requests that appear closely related to a bill that has been carried over to the 2nd Regular Session.

If a carryover bill, either by its subject matter or its title, appears potentially broad enough to incorporate a request if it were proposed as an amendment, we have identified the request as being closely related to that carryover bill.

• Requests that may require a ruling from the Presiding Officers under Joint Rule 217, which limits the introduction of a measure that has been finally rejected in a previous session of this Legislature.

This notebook also contains other information that may be useful for the Legislative Council in the screening meeting, including a list of bill request titles arranged alphabetically by sponsor, a list of carryover bills, a list of approved studies, and a list of department and agency bills submitted for the Second Regular Session, arranged by subject matter.

This notebook is not being distributed to the public by the Revisor's Office; however, a copy of the list of bill requests is available to the public on the Legislature's website and copies of the lists, with the comments, will be available at the October 22, 2015 meeting of the Legislative Council.



#### INTRODUCTION

This volume contains the bill requests submitted by Legislators before cloture on September 25, 2015 that are proposed for introduction in the Second Regular Session of the 127th Legislature. The requests are listed in Part 2 and are arranged by subject matter. Each request is indicated by a title, followed by a short summary of the bill request and, where applicable, cross-references to other requests that appear to be related. We have also identified requests that may be precluded by Joint Rule 217 with cross references to the possible conflicting LDs from last session.

The graph below shows categories of bill requests for this session and the past three second regular sessions.

Two years ago, in 2013, out of a total of 399 precloture legislator requests to review, 99 were admitted at the initial screening and 43 at the appeal screening for a total of 142 legislator bills accepted at the screenings.

Four years ago, in 2011, out of a total of 288 precloture legislator requests to review, 117 were admitted at the initial screening and 15 at the appeal screening for a total of 132 legislator bills accepted at the screenings.

Six years ago, in 2009, out of a total of 374 precloture legislator requests to review, 130 were admitted at the initial screening and 32 at the appeal screening for a total of 162 legislator bills accepted at the screenings.

This year a total of 20 agency and independent bills were filed, as compared to 47 in 2013, 57 in 2011 and 75 in 2009.

Additionally, the workload of the Legislature includes 176 carryovers for the upcoming session, as compared to 207 in 2013, 131 in 2011 and 88 in 2009.

#### **Constitution of Maine**

#### **Article IV**

#### **Part Third**

#### Legislative Power.

Section 1. To meet annually; power of Legislature to convene itself at other times; extent of legislative power. The Legislature shall convene on the first Wednesday of December following the general election in what shall be designated the first regular session of the Legislature; and shall further convene on the first Wednesday after the first Tuesday of January in the subsequent evennumbered year in what shall be designated the second regular session of the Legislature; provided, however, that the business of the second regular session of the Legislature shall be limited to budgetary matters, legislation in the Governor's call; legislation of an emergency nature admitted by the Legislature; legislation referred to committees for study and report by the Legislature in the first regular session; and legislation presented to the Legislature by written petition of the electors under the provisions of Article IV, Part Third, Section 18. The Legislature shall enact appropriate statutory limits on the length of the first regular session and of the second regular session. The Legislature may convene at such other times on the call of the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House, with the consent of a majority of the Members of the Legislature of each political party, all Members of the Legislature having been first polled. The Legislature, with the exceptions hereinafter stated, shall have full power to make and establish all reasonable laws and regulations for the defense and benefit of the people of this State, not repugnant to this Constitution, nor to that of the United States.

The Child and Adult Care Food Program is a federally funded nutrition program through the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), that works to ensure nutritious meals and snacks are served to eligible children and adults in qualifying care facilities. Here in Maine, the program is administered by the Department of Health and Human Services, but many facilities that would otherwise be eligible for the program find the application convoluted and confusing.

This bill would be the vehicle to streamline the application, make the application available online, and would create consistent guidelines. Not allowing this bill through would mean one more year of lost opportunities to feed more children in and outside of school settings at YMCA's, Boy's Clubs, etc.

As you know, childhood hunger is a silent epidemic that affects all corners of Maine. With nearly half of all school age children suffering from food insecurity, it is imperative that we act as quickly as possible to ensure children don't go hungry.

Right now, there are 12,770 students in Maine that qualify for reduced lunch. This means that while their families are considered low-income, they are not low enough to qualify for free lunch, and these students must make a partial payment with each meal they receive. For many families, this co-pay is still unaffordable, and children either don't eat because they can't pay, or accumulate a debt with the school, putting food service directors in the position of being a debt collector.

Money should never be an obstacle to children eating. This bill would eliminate the co-pay for students who qualify for reduced lunch. Not allowing this bill to go forward will mean that these children and families will have a harder time accessing food in and out of school for one more school year.



I am submitting a request for appeal for LR 2137, "An Act To Increase Access to Call Location Information by Law Enforcement Agencies." The difference between the Kelsey Smith Foundation laws and current Maine law is as follows: The Kelsey Smith laws require a telecommunications provider to immediately turn over cell phone location information in response to a request from law enforcement, without a search warrant and without imposing any internal review criteria, when law enforcement is responding to a situation that involves the threat of serious physical danger. Maine law generally requires a search warrant for access to cell phone location and content information but provides an exception to the search warrant if law enforcement is responding to a situation that involves the threat of serious physical danger. Maine law does not affirmatively state that the telecommunications provider must immediately turn over cell phone location information without imposing internal review criteria. The Kelsey Smith Act will ensure law enforcement can receive critical information when needed and without hesitation.

Maine law granting law enforcement access to cell phone location and content information in the event of a threat of a situation of serious physical injury should be strengthened to provide law enforcement with the full set of tools that it needs to carry out their duties. Telecommunication providers should have a clearly stated legal obligation to turn over the information. This proposal would strengthen Maine law and eliminate any vagueness that could lead to delays that increase the danger to victims of crime. Maine law should be strengthened by enactment of a proposal that would state that if law enforcement makes a request to a telecommunications provider for cell phone location or content information in response to an emergency situation that involves the threat of serious physical danger, the telecommunications provider shall release to law enforcement the requested information without delay and without imposing any internal review criteria.

I am submitting a request for appeal for LR 2351, "An Act To Protect Firefighters by Prohibiting the Use of Certain Flame-retardant Chemicals in New Upholstered Furniture." The Chemical Safety Improvement Act is bipartisan legislation introduced in the United States Congress to reform and modernize the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA), which regulates the introduction of new or already existing chemicals. The bill has passed in the House and will likely pass in the Senate before the end of the year. Over 84,000 chemicals are registered for use in the United States. Of those, only 200 have been tested and five have been banned as "dangerous." Because of this inaction, individual states have started to ban particular chemicals.

Although flame retardants will be reviewed by the EPA, the process can take upwards of 15 years. It is almost certain that any version of the Chemical Safety Improvement Act will pre-empt, prospectively, the ability of states to enact their own standards. Maine must act now to prohibit the sale of residential upholstered furnishings. Furthermore, advocates for this legislation agree that any chemicals deemed 'safe' in the EPA process will be exempt from the prohibitions prescribed in the final legislation. Several Maine manufacturers have already developed chemical-free solutions to making furniture more fire safe. More than 50 furniture companies are already selling flame-retardant free products.

Lastly, supporting documentation will be presented on November 19, 2015 showing rates of specific cancers in firefighters that is disproportionate to rates suffered by the general public. Strong scientific evidence shows that chemical flame retardants are hazardous to human health. For this reason, LR 2351 meets the threshold of 'Emergency Legislation' and should be considered in the second session of the 127<sup>th</sup> Legislature.

The decision of Maine's Legislative Council to reject this critical Tribal legislative effort must be reconsidered and reversed in the circumstances. Instead, Tribal Gaming must be given equal consideration or, even preferred consideration, to existing State authorized gaming activity if only, and for no other reason, than to stand with federally recognized Tribes that are attempting to establish their own gaming businesses that can begin to alleviate a well reported health, safety, unemployment and funding crisis that has gone on unnecessarily and for far too long. As Senator Garett Mason can confirm, it has been concluded by WhiteSand Gaming, who are qualified and objective industry experts, that gaming in Maine has been a booming business for the current gaming industry, the State and local governments in two of Maine's regions; Oxford and Bangor and there is a basis for expansion now. This submission urges this Council to reverse it's rejection of the Aroostook Tribe's request for Maine's support for an equitable distribution of significant gaming profits from an existing casino in Bangor that would be equal to the distribution the law currently provides from the Oxford Casino to the Passamaquoddy and Penobscot Tribes. The Maliseet and Mi;kmaq have been, without good reason and without equal consideration, ommitted in any effort by the Bangor casino or the state legislature to provide equitable funds from slot machine profits to help the extreme economic conditions and joblessness of these Tribes. LR2345 is clearly, equally justified as an emergency legislative proposal. Notwithstanding LR's 2162 and 2164, this bill to exempt all four Federally recognized Indian tribes located in the State of Maine from state gaming laws would provide clear and appropriate recognition in Maine of the United States Supreme Court ruling in California v. Cabazon Mission Indians (1987), which clearly recognizes our Tribal right to own and operate a Tribal casino, and a more secure maintenance structure for the operation of such a Tribal casino, especially one having 350 or less slot machines and located on Tribal lands more than 80 miles from any existing Maine casino.

The operation of four, modest Tribal casinos would create much needed jobs and raise critically needed revenue for Tribal and Municipal Government programs. If the locations of such Tribal casinos are on Indian lands then, as permitted in all other 49 united States, the tribes in this State would have equal benefit of the 1987, United States Supreme Court ruling mentioned above and have total control and responsibility for their gaming operations with the usual shares being provided to both State and local governments and communities, especially those situated around the Tribes, which are all presently situated in the poorest regions of the State. All operational decisions in developing and operating such modest casinos would be the sole responsibility of respective Tribal owners provided they remain in compliance with this proposed, emergency legislation.

I have mentioned previously submitted supporting documentary, and historical evidence in support of these proposed bills. Specifically, please review page 19 of the previously submitted and attached 2012 Houlton Band of Maliseet Indian's Community Economic Development Study and the entire, also previously submitted and attached MITSC Report of 2013 regarding extremely high Maliseet unemployment and poor living conditions resulting in an average life expectancy of 54 years of age. Reconsideration of Rejection of Maliseet Tribal Proposed Emergency Legislation - LR 2391 - An Act To Alleviate Tribal Unemployment by Removing Barriers to the Granting of Commercial Lobster and Crab Fishing Licenses to Members of the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians

Whereas current Maine Law, as a result of the passage of LD 953 during the 126<sup>th</sup> Maine Legislature - for issuing a Maliseet Tribal commercial lobster and crab fishing license requires 1000 hours of experience, it has been relatively impossible, since the enactment of that law, for Members of the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians to practice this important and traditional economic activity, which has both provided sustenance to Tribal Members for thousands of years in the Maine coastal region and provided fish for Tribal trade since, at least, the birth of the Nation. Current State law has proven itself to be an insurmountable barrier to Tribal Members who are otherwise willing and capable of accessing marine organisms along the Maine coast. Current law does not recognize current Maliseet Tribal needs or Tribal fishing capacity and thereby prevents Members from qualifying for lobster and crab licenses that are clearly more readily available to non-Tribal citizens within the State who often benefit from such apprenticeship opportunities being more readily available to them from Non-tribal family or existing, non-Tribal license holders thus unfairly benefitting from State law and effectively controlling for themselves the allocation of such lobster licenses, and thereby unfairly benefitting from current State laws relating to apprenticeships.

The proposed three-year waiver of this 1000 hour, practically unattainable, lobster fishing apprenticeship requirement for Maliseet prospective lobster fishermen would remedy this historically evolved and currently unfair situation. Tribal Members are currently poised to organize, invest in and otherwise establish and operate Maliseet lobster fishing businesses, create much needed Tribal jobs and enterprises immediately and over the next three years. This temporary waiver of such "limited entry" requirements will recognize historical and contemporary Tribal fishing capacity that, especially with a further three years of lobster fishing, can thereafter be itself ready to provide such apprenticeship training to future Tribal Members and immediately create much needed Tribal fishing jobs; fishing jobs that will not otherwise be created despite diligent efforts by prospective Maliseet lobster fishing apprentices these past two years to secure such training opportunities in the non-Tribal community. This is, relative to other proposed bills, a true emergency. The goal here is to feed Maliseets and alleviate the highest rates of unemployment in the State...a necessary focus in these difficult economic times by our Maliseet Tribal Government on behalf of our Maliseet People. For public safety this bill amends current law by requiring background checks for private sales/transfers of handguns. The bill does prohibit a person from selling or giving a handgun to another person unless the person receiving the handgun undergoes a background check. If a person sells or gives a handgun to another without a background check, it is a civil violation for which a minimum of \$100 must be adjudged. This bill applies ONLY to private transactions since gun dealers are already required to perform background checks. The fines will help offset any cost of enforcement. Supported by most, if not all, county Sheriffs and local Police Chiefs. This is a common sense urgent public safety bill that helps to insure that people with criminal backgrounds and certain mental illnesses do not obtain handguns. I am submitting this appeal on behalf of Unum for the rationale set out below. I hope you will agree that the subject matter of this proposed bill should be considered during this upcoming session.

During this time of rising costs, especially for healthcare, this bill seeks to protect working Maine families' most important asset – their income stream – should they lose the ability to work due to accident or illness. Available data demonstrates that 70 percent of all working Mainers do not have access to private disability income protection. Many of those families would fall into the state's welfare system as federal Social Security Disability Income benefits are typically delayed (if available at all) for a period of 12-24 months. Also, state mandated worker's compensation insurance is inadequate protection since it only covers on-job injuries which comprise less than 10 percent of all disabilities. This legislation will raise awareness of the value of private disability income protection, provide incentives for employers to offer the coverage and facilitate the use of opt-out enrollment which results in lower premium rates for consumers and which will also increase the number of working Maine citizens whose income is protected should they be unable to work due to disability.

This bill would eliminate the requirement that a person lawfully caring a concealed handgun without a permit must immediately disclose that fact to a law enforcement officer during the course of any arrest, detainment or routine traffic stop.

This legislative item is of a time sensitive nature because it seeks to address a new policy, which has very recently gone into effect across Maine without ever receiving a public hearing or committee review to examine potential unintended effects. This policy was attached as an amendment to LD 652 on the floor of the House of Representatives, but had never been previously discussed or examined by the Committee on Criminal Justice and Public Safety.

There are constitutional concerns about this policy, including how it may violate an individual's 5th Amendment right to remain silent. Most fundamentally, however, beyond constitutional concerns, there are basic questions about vague and imprecise language, which leaves many questions about how this policy will be practically implemented. Even if the general policy were to remain in place, I believe it is important to clean up and clarify the language in statue before we get too far along in the implementation of this policy.

Simply put, this new policy never received a public hearing or a proper committee process. I hope we can have that process now and tackle any avoidable negative consequences from this new policy.

This bill was brought to me by Richard Erb of the Maine Health Care Association. Currently, there is a five-year asset test in place for individuals seeking nursing home care through Medicaid. This asset test is intended to prevent individuals, capable of paying privately for nursing home care, from hiding their assets with family in order to receive Medicaid benefits they would not otherwise qualify for. This legislation seeks to apply that same five-year asset test to Medicaid qualifications for Private Non-Medical Institutions (PNMIs) and home-based care.

This legislative item is of a time sensitive nature for two reasons. First, many of Maine's PNMIs and home-based care centers are struggling to keep their doors open. This policy will help keep our PNMIs and home-based cares centers solvent by identifying individuals who should be paying privately (based on their means) instead of relying on taxpayer-subsidies that compensates providers at lower reimbursement rates. Second, this legislative item could help achieve immediate savings in the current budget, which can help us fund other legislative priorities.

#### **Background**

The Maine Educational Center for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (MECDHH) began in a one-room schoolhouse in October of 1877 in Portland, Maine. Along with the construction of a new school in 1957 on Mackworth Island in Falmouth, the school became Governor Baxter School for the Deaf (GBSD) named after our benefactor, Governor Percival Baxter. Over the years, the services provided for deaf and hard of hearing children throughout the state of Maine expanded. To better reflect this growth, we became The Maine Educational Center for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing in 2005.

Like many educational programs, MECDHH has ambitions, goals, and obligations that sometimes exceed our annual budget. We maintain a substantial, aging physical plant that requires ongoing maintenance and repairs. Our programs have expanded and evolved in accordance with best practices in deaf education. In recent months, the school's board and administration have considered raising private dollars to supplement the annual state appropriation that has provided 100% of its funding since its inception. We already have a non-profit foundation partner that is willing and able to act as MECDHH's fiscal agent, which will maximize the use of any potential private donations to support our mission and keep administrative costs to a minimum.

#### Why this Bill is Necessary and Urgent

While planning our efforts to solicit and accept private funds, MECDHH's board members and administration learned from the Maine Attorney General's Office that such efforts are not currently allowed under Maine statute. This bill will make the statutory changes necessary to allow for private fundraising.

The need is urgent because the MECDHH on Macworth Island had been subletting part of its property to a local private elementary school, but that school recently relocated and terminated its lease. This leaves the center with a significant revenue hole to fill in the immediate future. With a good deal of planning already underway, our board and staff are poised to tap into our network of alumni, friends and supporters, but we must first comply with state law.

I respectfully request an appeal for a second session submission that was rejected at the Legislative Council meeting on October 22<sup>nd</sup>. The proposed legislation is LR 2496, "An Act To Repeal the Service Provider Tax on So-called Appendix C Private Nonmedical Institutions."

Since the Private Nonmedical Institutions (PNMI) tax was instituted in 2006, the amount of taxes collected has increased by \$1.5 million. When the tax rate increase takes effect in January 2016, this tax will increase taxes by another \$2.2 million per year. Because there have not been MaineCare rate increases to offset these increased costs, the additional tax is paid by the PNMI facilities and by their private pay residents.

The Appendix C PNMI tax only applies to elderly assisted living facilities that accept MaineCare. If a facility is completely private pay, they are not included in the tax. However, if private pay residents happen to live in a facility accepting MaineCare, they will be subject to the tax. Many elderly private pay residents are stunned to find out that Maine taxes them on the dollars they are spending to fund their own long term care. This causes them to spend down to MaineCare eligibility faster.

Unlike the nursing home tax, this PNMI tax does not automatically generate matching federal dollars through the Medicaid program. For that reason, it does not work as effectively as a nursing home tax. Although 40 states use some form of the nursing home tax, Maine is the only state that tries to accomplish the same thing in assisted living. The reason is that under federal regulations, it doesn't work very well.

Why an emergency?

There is sometimes the perception that health care taxes aren't "real taxes", but this PNMI tax actually does come out of the pockets of underpaid assisted living facilities and the private pay residents they serve. The PNMI tax has been bad policy that punishes facilities that accept MaineCare and penalizes people who saved their money to pay for their own care instead of relying on MaineCare.

I am submitting a request for appeal for LR 2184 "An Act to Allow a Part of the Town of Caribou to Secede and Form the Town of Lyndon," on behalf of the Caribou Succession Committee. The rationale for this appeal relies on the secession statute and its legislative history. In 2013, the 126<sup>th</sup> Legislature amended M.R.S.A. Title 30-A, Part 2, Subpart 2, Chapter 113 CONSOLIDATION, SECESSION AND ANNEXATION, Sections 2171 & 2172. The reason for the amendment, as stated in Emergency Legislation LD 1561, An Act to Amend the Laws Governing Secession from a Municipality, was because "the law regarding the municipal secession process is unclear as it pertains to residents attempting to secede from a municipality." In an effort to make the secession process clear, Section 2171–C-1 was added to the law. It now reads in the part pertaining:

**Legislative authorization to proceed:** Within one year following the public hearing held pursuant to section 2171-C, a representative from the secession territory shall cause legislation to be submitted to the Legislature to obtain the authorization of the Legislature to proceed with the secession process. Unless authorization to proceed is received from the Legislature, the question of secession may not proceed to the advisory referendum held pursuant to section 2171-D.

The new law *does not specify* to which session of the legislature that the legislation must be submitted, nor does it say that a citizen's initiative undertaken in accordance with this statute must be synchronous with the first session of any legislature. Some question whether this omission was intentional and the lack of specificity can only be construed by citizens to mean that the Legislature is expected and obligated to consider a bill request for the authorization to proceed in either session of the legislature. Given that the public hearing was held in Caribou on June 11, 2015, the one year deadline *forces* this issue to be addressed during *the Second Session of the 127<sup>th</sup> Legislature*. A 20 month delay over a technicality is unreasonable and will cause an extreme hardship for many residents of the secession territory.

Thank you for the opportunity to appeal your previous decision on LR 2543, An Act to Change the Size Restriction on Soft-shell Clams, and to explain my reasoning for why I feel this meets the emergency requirement for the upcoming legislative session.

This is a jobs bill. Clamming is the second most valuable commercial marine fishery in Maine behind only lobsters. The bill would change the size restriction on soft-shell clams from the current minimum shell length of 2 inches to a prohibition on possession of soft-shell clams with shell lengths that are less than 1.5 inches or greater than 3.5 inches.

Since 1984 when a 2-inch law was established for economic, not biological, reasons, clamming coastwide has not rebounded to levels observed prior to that time, especially during the 1970's. With increasing seawater temperatures trending higher each year, clam landings continue to decline to levels that will not sustain the current numbers of clammers along the coast.

Lowering the current law from 2-inches to 1.5-inches will create new jobs in the clamming industry and sustain those that exist. This law will put more money in the pockets of clammers, clam buyers, and others that process, sell, and ship clams to market. This is an economic development bill.

This is also a conservation bill because an upper size limit, similar to that which exists for lobsters and green sea urchins, protects a large spawning stock ensuring enough spawned to continue strong populations into the future.

This bill is both a conservation and economic development bill wrapped into one, and is necessary now to help a failing industry become strong and vibrant once more before it is gone.

I would like to formally request that the Legislative Council reconsider its decision on LR 2298, "An Act To Allow Municipalities To Regulate Transportation Network Companies," which I have sponsored.

THE BACKGROUND: The municipal airports in the State of Maine provide a critically important connection to the national air transportation system. In order to safely and efficiently manage these unique transportation facilities, municipal airports must have the tools to regulate their operations including ground transportation. Under the current law passed last year airports are pre-empted from any regulation of the category of "Transportation Network Companies (TNCs)" such as Uber, Lyft and others. At the Portland International Jetport over 200,000 passengers arrive and depart each month in the summer; all in relatively narrow time slots throughout the day that cause distinct high traffic peaks. The Jetport must actively manage and regulate all commercial ground transportation such as taxis, livery, shuttle, and charter bus to preempt congestion and promote efficiency and safety at the terminal curbside.

THE PROBLEM: This has already caused significant congestion and confusion at the Portland International Jetport as TNC driver's attempt to solicit fares through their TNC smart phone applications which are georeferenced by location. The TNC driver who is physically closest to the passenger requesting service receives the fare, incentivizing drivers to continuously circle airport roadways, attempt to park in loading/unloading only areas, and loiter in the terminal in order to be as close as possible to arriving passengers. All other commercial ground transportation operators at the Portland International Jetport are required through the establishment of its rules and regulations to queue in designated locations and pay fees associated with their operation. The number of TNCs and TNC drivers will continue to grow and the problems being experienced today will only become worse over time in the absence of regulation.

THE SOLUTION: Other airports across the country have already established rules and entered into agreements with TNCs in order to alleviate the problems now being experienced at the Portland International Jetport. TNCs have established geo-fences on airport campuses that consider all TNC drivers entering the campus as equidistant to the airport then allocate fare assignments based on a first-in/first out process; as well as designated waiting areas for their drivers outside of the roadway system to avoid congestion. All of these options for the prudent management of TNCs at airports in Maine have been pre-empted by the recent change and this proposed bill would seek to allow this narrow area of regulation.

THE TIMING: This bill is correctly under consideration for the second session as the law's impact on airports was precipitated by an action of the first regular session and it is appropriate to correct that oversight in a timely manner. Thank you for your time and thoughtful consideration of this appeal.

I would like to formally request that the Legislative Council reconsider its decision on LR 2497, "An Act To Strengthen the Economic Well-being of Maine's Workforce by Ensuring Employees Can Earn Paid Sick Time," which I have sponsored.

Maine currently does not require employers to provide paid sick leave, which means that nearly 200,000 Maine workers in the private sector cannot earn paid sick leave. Thousands of Maine workers are unable to earn even one paid sick day to care for themselves or their family and are unfairly forced to choose between their health and their paycheck. The impact on a family when a bread winner must take unpaid leave from work is devastating.

The bill I have submitted seeks to rectify this injustice and ensure that more workers in Maine earn paid sick days. The measure is loosely based on the Massachusetts law and would require that employers of 11 or more employees allow workers to earn 56 hours (7 days) paid sick time.

Paid sick leave laws are beginning to surface in many parts of the country. On Labor Day this year, President Obama issued an executive order requiring federal contractors and subcontractors in 2017 to allow all employees who work on federal contracts to accrue up to seven days of paid sick leave each year.

It is time Maine stepped up to the plate and showed workers how valuable they are to our economy. I thank you for your time and thoughtful consideration of this appeal.

Increasingly the Department of Education is reassigning students to schools outside of their resident districts. This risks causing unwarranted increases in uncompensated local cost to districts which are compelled to receive these students. In certain circumstances, this results in the state transferring unusual costs of special education to the taxpayers of receiving districts.

The request proposes to amend 20-A §5205. Other exceptions to the general residency rules to add language to the effect that: transfers effected by Commissioner of Education or the State Board of Education shall not result in any reduction of state liability for the subsidy of special education costs for individual transferred students.

This simply removes any potential motivation of state-level cost savings from the decision-making process of the Commissioner of Education when overriding transfer decisions mutually reached by the superintendents of sending and receiving school districts.

The urgent need is that, under the current accelerated policy of state-initiated student transfers, schools, beyond any control of their own, are increasingly and unpredictably subject to significant additional expenses for special education well after their budgets are finalized and publicly validated.

An unintended consequence at the intersection of the federal Affordable Care Act and the 2011 statutory changes to Maine's insurance statutes now will prevent schools with fewer than 50 employees operating within Alternative Organizational Structures from purchasing consistent insurance benefits for all their employees.

Because of this, it is now impossible for these schools to continue to negotiate common district-wide employment contracts. This divides larger and smaller schools which otherwise operate coherently under a shared and efficient educational mission.

This request seeks to amend <u>20-A MRSA §1001</u>, sub-§14 (E) and <u>24-A MRSA §2803-A</u>, sub-§2 to allow school districts in an Alternative Organizational Structure with common employment contracts to purchase a single group health insurance policy.

The emergency results from the fact that, beginning in July 2017, under the ACA, school districts with fewer than 50 employees will no longer be eligible to purchase insurance benefits through their current policy providers. Without this proposed fix, district contracts which include these benefits will have to be renegotiated and Alternative Organizational Structures will be out of compliance with their governing Interlocal Agreements and underlying state statutes.

Dear President Thibodeau and Members of the 127<sup>th</sup> Legislative Council,

This bill is an emergency because it fixes a problem that has already made one retiree destitute this year, and we need to act to ensure that does not happen to more elderly Maine people. This bill request is to require fair and proportional adjustment of awards in Workers Comp lost income awards, preventing a person's own contributions to their retirement being used against them.

Currently when a Workers Comp award is made of an ongoing monthly benefit, the employer is allowed to reduce that by half the worker's Social Security retirement benefit monthly amount, regardless of that employer's percentage contribution overall toward earning that worker's retirement benefit. Multiple employers could apply one-half even though collectively, not individually, they made half of the SS contributions while the employee made the other half in FICA withholding. It is fundamentally unfair to the worker, particularly when they have been self-employed at times and made not only the employee contribution but also the employer contribution which is now being used against them by an employer that caused them harm. The net - an employer should be able to reduce an award by the share of the retirement benefit that is proportional to their actual share of SS contributions, no more or less.

This problem was brought to my attention by a constituent of Sen. Dutremble, a retiree that has to choose between bills and groceries because of her workplace injury and this flawed formula. She couldn't afford her apartment and lost it. We need to fix this before this happens to more Maine people. That is why it is an emergency.

The same formula correction in the previous legislature was reported out Unanimous OTP in LCRED, went under the hammer in both bodies, and became law without the governor's signature - except that bill applied to pension plan contributions instead of Social Security Retirement Benefits. Now that we are aware of the the same flaw in the SS RB formula - it must be corrected for fairness and consistency.

I have discussed this with Paul Sighinolfi, who agrees it is the same issue.

I ask for your support of this bill which should have just as straightforward a path to law as the pension plan correction.

President Thibodeau and Members of the 127th Legislative Council,

This bill is an emergency because Maine has a serious drug problem, and it is essential that we do all we can to prevent our youth from getting involved with drugs.

We owe it to them to pursue access to treatment, support for recovery, prosecution for drug dealing, and most important for keeping our children off of drugs - prevention. Solving Maine's serious drug addiction problem makes all avenues worth the legislature's attention.

This bill would strengthen prevention among our most vulnerable population - school children.

School Health Coordinators, which were defunded in 2012, were effective in changing culture within schools and getting students to reduce risky behavior. That includes lowering levels of addiction. This bill would pilot a more scaleable \$500,000 Coordinated School Health model in the most at-risk school systems. That funding would come from the \$5 million litigation settlement within the Fund for a Healthy Maine, which is currently unallocated.

This model, which I helped community and school health experts develop, would have one well-trained school health coordinator for a school district, not one per school. And it would rely on that person working with a staff member in each school receiving a stipend to implement prevention and positively influence student culture within each school.

We can't solve a drug problem without preventing new youths from taking up drugs and changing youth culture and teaching them to make healthy decisions. We owe it to school children and our communities to tackle the scourge of drug abuse and substance addiction from this angle, as well as all the other angles.

I'm asking you to let this bill move forward so important work on this issue can begin now.

President Thibodeau and Members of the 127th Legislative Council,

This bill is an emergency because we now have boards and commissions unable to constitute a quorum and do their statutorily defined job for Maine.

It would provide a solution to the problem of boards such as the Board of Corrections and Land for Maine's Future board, which are hobbled by unfilled vacancies due to the Governor not nominating new members.

It would empower the Senate President to make nominations, in place of the governor, if the governor fails within six months of vacancy to submit a nomination that is not withdrawn. 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#### LR 2260 An Act to Update the Laws Governing the Maine Veterans' Home

A critical piece of this legislation needed NOW is to increase the borrowing authority of the Maine Veterans Homes. Through VA construction grants, MVH can leverage 65% of the costs of modernizing and rebuilding aging MVH facilities, which over the next decade could reach \$200 million. These projects are needed to modernize MVH facilities and meet the industry trend and growing competition toward small-house, person-centered care delivery, which is the VA mandate for SVHs. In addition, MVH's three big Homes (Augusta, Bangor, and Scarborough) subsidize its smaller facilities (Caribou, South Paris, and Machias) and make it possible to serve veterans in those areas. MVH is prepared to move ahead with one or two of the major projects (Augusta/Scarborough), but it cannot proceed without more borrowing authority. These would be revenue bonds – no State liability incurred. If MVH cannot keep up with VA mandates for SVHs or its competitors in these urban markets, MVH risks financial viability as a whole.

#### The Maine Student Loan Borrower Bill of Rights

A recent study by the Institute for College Access and Success found that Maine's college students leave school with some of the highest loan debt in the country. The average Maine student graduates with nearly \$31,000 in student loans – putting Maine in the undesirable position of having the 6th highest average college loan debt nationally.

College graduates should be the driver of community economies. Historically, they have been the people most likely to make major purchases and invest in the local economy in ways those who have not graduated college cannot. But high student loan debt eliminates the discretionary income that otherwise helps college graduates achieve financial success and contribute to local economies.

Worse still, when a student is unable to pay their loans back, the federal government has extraordinary powers of collection – they are able to freeze bank accounts, seize tax returns, and even withhold necessary social security payments. Unlike other types of debt, those who are unable to repay their student loans have little means of escaping, as discharging a student loan in bankruptcy is nearly impossible.

Without intervention, the student debt crisis will continue to weigh on Maine's economy, turning a generation of community leaders, homebuyers, and business owners into debtors who cannot afford to achieve their dreams. The Maine Student Loan Bill of Rights would rein in the worst student loan servicer abuses and help Maine students get a handle on their debt by establishing an Ombudsman to handle complaints, advocate for students, and inform Maine's college graduates of their repayment options.

Bills introduced in this session must be matters that constitute an emergency. For Maine's students – particularly those veterans attending for-profit colleges – these matters couldn't be more urgent. Delaying these bills or failing to approve them for introduction means that tens of thousands of Maine students and college graduates will continue to be mired in student debt they cannot repay, watching as opportunities to be the kind of citizens that drive the Maine economy slip away for another year.

#### The Maine Tuition Integrity Act

The Maine Tuition Integrity Act is seeks to address the discrepancies between for-profit colleges and their non-profit counterparts. According to a 2012 Senate investigation, for-profit colleges have higher tuitions and worse outcomes than traditional colleges. In Maine, for example, a two-year degree from Kaplan will cost a low-income student over \$15,000. Compare that to the less than \$7,000 spent by low-income students at Eastern Maine Community College.

Perhaps this higher tuition rate could be justified if students at Kaplan were better-trained and more well-equipped to repay their loans. But, according to new data released by the US Department of Education, graduates of the school are actually worse off. A full 68% of low-income students who attend Kaplan fail to make student loan payments that reduce the principal of their debt, where only 35% of Eastern Maine's students are struggling to reduce their overall college indebtedness.

Worse still, for-profit colleges are known to target veterans. That's because, while the schools are private, up to 90% of their revenues may come from federal taxpayer dollars. However, due to a quirk in the law, tuition dollars from the Veteran's Administration and Department of Defense are not included in the 90% ratio. Therefore, veterans are valuable assets to for-profit college recruiters. Indeed, a 2014 analysis of for-profit revenues found that over 100 schools, including Kaplan, actually take more than 90% of their revenues from federal taxpayers when GI Bill dollars are included.

Two recent actions by the Department of Defense and Consumer Financial Protection Bureau demonstrate the urgency of this legislation. First, in early October, the Department of Defense announced that University of Phoenix will no longer be allowed to recruit active duty military members on US bases, or utilize taxpayer funds meant to pay for active to military members to attend college. The University of Phoenix has a reputation of aggressively recruiting members of our military, despite continued poor outcomes for their graduates.

Then in late October, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau won a half-billion dollar judgment against the former for-profit behemoth Corinthinan Colleges - the parent company of Everest College and Wyotech – for defrauding former students of education and aggressive and deceptive recruiting practices. Corinthian was an active and poorly regulated presence in Maine before their bankruptcy in the Spring of 2015.

It is clear that more needs to be done to protect students and veterans from schools that sell them degrees with little accountability for their outcomes, and the taxpayer dollars that fund these schemes. Attached to this letter are complaints from students across Maine about the tactics of for-profit schools and their struggles to repay their debt. For too many, for-profit schools are draining the very financial resources that should put students and their families on the path to success – not economic ruin. The Maine Tuition Integrity Act will go a long way to ensure that for-profit colleges are offering degrees that pay off for Maine students.

We are the oldest state in the country and getting older. Let's face it – we won't achieve robust economic growth if this trend continues. Other states already understand the need to attract and support educated immigrants to build their labor force and economy, and appreciate that motivated immigrants can be an essential component of a sound economic development strategy.

Why is this an emergency? We simply do not have time to wait. Based on successful European models and examples in other states, Maine should develop a highly coordinated pathway system that is easily understood and navigated by immigrants to integrate into our workforce and community.

LR 2367 is a concept draft which would set up an "Office of Immigration" located at the Department of Labor to attract and support immigrants to build our labor force and economy.

In addition, we should create pilot projects in several communities that enhance access to services and training for immigrants and have defined, measurable outcomes in place. Among other things, we should:

- Expand funding for Adult Education to provide ongoing, intensive English classes and work with businesses to provide more in depth understanding of the culture of the workplace, the labor market, and the economic landscape.
- Expand resources for the Welcoming Center for asylum seekers at Adult Ed.
- Measure and evaluate outcomes as we go along.

Again, as we look to develop a younger, well-trained and motivated workforce to incent economic investment, attracting motivated immigrants to our state can be part of the solution. None of us goes back very far before our own relatives were immigrants. We should embrace this opportunity.

Dear Members of Legislative Council:

I wish to appeal the rejection of LR 2281, <u>"An Act to Require an Environmental Impact Statement for a Dredging Project in the Penobscot River Watershed and To Require that the Dredging Activity Be the Least Environmentally and Economically Damaging Alternative Available" for consideration in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Regular session of the 127<sup>th</sup> Legislature.</u>

This bill can be considered an emergency because the application for a Water Quality Certification on the proposed dredge project near Mack Point has been withdrawn, and it is likely to be re-filed in the near future. This makes it the ideal time to require an <u>Environmental Impact Statement</u> (EIS).

An EIS is a very reasonable and common component of such applications going back to the earliest days of the Clean Water Act; and it is especially appropriate in this project since the Penobscot River has served as the flushing mechanism for waste chemical contaminants for tanneries, paper mills and other manufacturing operations along the waterway for at least 150 years. It is highly likely that heavy metals in those chemical wastes have accumulated at or near the proposed dredge site at the mouth of the river. Add to that the decade-long dumping of mercury into the river by Holtrachem Corp. of Orrington.

The dredge project, as proposed, will remove almost 1 million cubic yards of sediment from the channel approach area near the shipping port at Mack Point, and then dump it all a few miles away in an established lobster breeding habitat. This could have a devastating impact on the only thriving fishery resource that remains in Penobscot Bay and the Gulf of Maine.

If I have learned anything in my 4 terms representing the Midcoast region, it is the importance of the lobster fishery to the economy of coastal Maine. If a properly conducted EIS reveals no significant contamination in the dredge spoils, then many of us can reconsider our opposition to the project. If it reveals major contamination, then the people of Maine deserve to know that before dredging operations begin.

Thank you for your consideration of this request.

Please let this letter serve as a request to appeal the Legislative Council's decision on the following bill: LR 2249, "An Act To Create Improved Consumer Protection against Long-term Care Insurance Premium Rate Increases."

As you are aware, this bill would amend the laws governing long-term care insurance to implement certain safeguards based on consumer age and limit the amount and number of increases over a defined period of time.

The mispricing of past long-term care insurance products and the soaring premium increases now being imposed upon Maine's Long Term Care Insurance consumers has become quite problematic, with some premiums facing a 100% increase. These premium notices being sent to thousands of policyholders are forcing Maine Long Term Care Insurance consumers to make tough choices that they never could have planned on, or shouldn't have had to plan on.

The choices are: 1) modify the plan design by reducing benefits, such as reducing or removing inflation protection, reducing the benefit period, increasing the elimination period (thus making the insured responsible for greater out of pocket cost sharing), reducing the benefit amount, reducing the home care benefit, or removing riders with such changes to bring the premium back to its original cost, 2) paying the increased premium and keeping the benefits the same, or 3) dropping the coverage altogether and ultimately passing the potential increased financial burden on the State's MaineCare program.

The end results will be more and more dependency on the already fiscally challenged MaineCare budget. Implementing consumer pricing safeguards on Long Term Care Insurance premiums is a first step in an effort to bring more and more Maine Long Term Care Insurance consumers to embrace this product as a viable retirement planning tool and as a result will ultimately reduce the MaineCare burden.

Please let this letter serve as a request to appeal the Legislative Council's decision on the following bill: LR 2334, "An Act to Amend Certain Education Standards."

This bill would authorize the Commissioner of Education to designate a school administrative unit (SAU) to enroll a student who lives in an SAU without a school or a contract with another SAU. It would address the same issues outlined in LD 1448, filed in the waning days of the First Regular Session.

A legal case has been brought forth that caused the AG's office to bring the concerns to the Department of Education and to the Education Committee for remedy. In this case, the parent alleged that the Maine Department of Education, along with two school districts, denied the student a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE). Briefly, the case involved a student living in a town that did not operate a high school and the student was tuitioned to a neighboring community high school. When the student started to have severe behavioral incidents, he was removed from the high school but other surrounding schools would not accept him as a student for almost an eight-month time period.

The admonition in the Conclusion from a Drummond and Woodsum Legal update provided at a special educators meeting indicated that that there would be more cases like this brought in the future and in fact, the DOE has been sued again in the late summer of 2015. The claim is based on a constitutional right to a FAPE. Cases where constitutional rights are at issue can become quite expensive in both the remedy and the payment of attorney's fees for the plaintiff (which are the responsibility of the State should the plaintiff prevail). The Department must be able to find a remedy for a student who has been disinvited.

LD 1448, which was killed on reference, was the vehicle to grant to the Department the ability to ensure that the student does indeed have access to a FAPE. Putting that bill off to next January leaves the State (through the DOE) exposed to more suits and puts valuable education resources at risk. I think the timing of debating the bill during the Second Regular Session of the 127<sup>th</sup> Legislature is appropriate.

Currently, According to the Office of Child and Family Services (OFCS), Maine DHHS is removing approx. 900 youth per year from their families who are in jeopardy within their current family situation. This bill will be giving equal consideration to both kinship and foster families as Maine DHHS manages this serious situation within Maine families.

Congress amended the state plan under Title IV-E of the Social Security Act to include "Kinship Care". The law requires that the state shall consider giving "preference" to an adult relative over a non-relative caregiver when placing a child in care.

L.R. 2413 seeks to avert harm to children by allowing a provision in law giving a biological grandparent preference over a foster parent by automatically granting grandparents standing in court as an intervenor. L.R. 2413 will allow grandparents to stand before a judge at the PPO (Preliminary Protection Order Hearing) and explain to the judge why it would be in the best interest for the court to allow the child to live with them in compliance with the kinship law instead of the possibility of the child facing emotional harm resulting from being put into foster care with a stranger in a faraway location. LR:2413 will help Maine come into better compliance with federal funding laws under their Title IV-E state plan by granting grandparents intervenor status at the PPO phase of the hearing before the child is harmed by the unnecessary removal.

#### Why this bill demands urgent Legislative attention:

This bill will immediately assist in placing the number of our kids that continue to come into state care equal consideration with biological family before placing them care with people the youth may not know.

Should Legislative Council be willing to consider this bill, but are unconvinced about its emergency nature, this bill would be a good candidate to be combined with L.D. 1224, "An Act to Amend Child the Child Protective Services Laws". This is a bill that I sponsored that is being carried over to this upcoming Second Session.

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

I respectfully request the Legislative Council reconsider its earlier decision regarding LR 2320, "An Act to Promote Post Secondary Education Attainment and Degree Completion." Waiting an additional year to put in place a higher education attainment goal for Maine leaves us further behind a majority of US states in their efforts to strengthen their workforce and potentially would result in our state being at a significant competitive disadvantage.

The Georgetown University Center on Education and the Workforce estimates that 65% of U.S. jobs by 2020 will require some form of post-secondary education. For Maine's working population age 25 - 64, college attainment is 39.9% compared to 46.7% in New Hampshire, 45.5% in Vermont and 51.5% in Massachusetts. Clearly there is much work to be done across New England but most so in Maine. Currently 31 states, from A to W (Arizona to Washington), have in place higher education attainment goals and various mechanisms to help optimally position themselves for future economic health. LR 2320 seeks to maintain the momentum of recent work in Maine around higher education attainment and workforce development and make sure Maine is economically competitive.



Maine's recovery from the great recession has lagged the rest of the country, and in part this can be attributed to our lower level of post-secondary degrees and certificates. The graph on the left from the Georgetown University Center on Education and the Workforce illustrates the stark difference of employment for those with high school diplomas or less and others with some level of higher education. Maine employers, families, and higher education institutions are deeply concerned by our current situation and are at the ready to move us forward. The Maine Chamber of Commerce and Maine Development Foundation have been trying to focus attention on this issue since 2010 with their series of reports. The last report issued a year ago "Making Maine Work: Preparing Maine's Workforce" addresses the "quality of Maine's workforce - the education, skills and knowledge Maine workers need to meet the needs of employers and create opportunities for themselves and others." The Education Coordination Committee crafted

"Statewide Education and Workforce Development Strategic Plan" which provides goals, objectives, and specific actions. Without a statewide goal, however, Maine's leaders have no benchmark by which to measure progress, evaluate the effectiveness of strategies and adjust implementation based on findings. LR 2320 will refocus our key stakeholders on multi-pronged efforts to strengthen our workforce and sustain the focus for the requisite period of time.

I respectfully request that the Legislative Council reconsider its decision regarding LR 2329, "An Act To Facilitate the Use of State Education Subsidies," which I sponsored.

This legislation attempts to address the difficulties local school districts face as a result of the requirement to hold town votes on budgets before the passage of a biennial state budget. Often local leaders and town citizens are forced to vote on their budgets without accurate information on how much money they will be receiving from the state. This bill would allow communities to vote for or against special warrant articles to bridge potential funding gaps.

The short legislative session is the opportune time to tackle legislation that would address the issue of the misalignment of the state and local budget time lines and the unfavorable results this creates. The 2015/2016 biennial budget has been passed; and notwithstanding any unforeseen changes, communities have viable state education funding amounts in order to proceed with their budget processes for the academic year 2016/2017. A decision by the legislature this spring 2016 will mean that local leaders will have a clear understanding of whether they may present voters with the advance warrant article for 2017/2018 school year. The budget process for this school year begins in the fall of 2016.

Similarly, if consideration of this issue is delayed until the first session of the 128th legislature, districts then will have no certainty around the availability of the special warrant along with no certainty of state funding levels -- compounding their difficult tasks.

I hope you will consider allowing LR 2329 to move forward through the legislative process this session. This common sense measure provides our towns with the flexibility they need to accurately vote on their local budgets.

I would like to formally request that the Legislative Council reconsider its decision on LR 2461, "An Act to Include Energy from Combined Heat and Power Facilities as Part of the Maine Renewable Energy Portfolio Standard," which I have sponsored.

Maine's Renewable Resource Portfolio Standard (RPS) requires that competitive electricity providers supply at least 30% of their electric sales in Maine using electricity generated by eligible renewables and certain energy-efficiency resources. Electricity generated by efficient combined heat and power (CHP) facilities built before 1987 are eligible as "qualified facilities" under the RPS standard. This bill would simply allow new, modern and cleaner CHP facilities constructed between 2016 and 2019 to be eligible.

The Maine Long Term Capacity RFP is typically issued in the 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of each calendar year to solicit offers for the long term supply of energy to ratepayers that provide both environmental and economic benefits. With the Long Term Capacity RFP upcoming, new CHP facilities would have the opportunity to provide efficient, clean, and cost effective energy to ratepayers while lowering energy costs to industry if allowed to bid.

The passage of LR 2461 would help CHP plants under development in the state have a platform to competitively supply excess power to Maine utilities. Plants under development, including the Rockland Energy Center ("REC"), also help to expand Maine's natural gas infrastructure to more rural areas of the state. The REC project in particular will enable businesses and residents in the greater Waldo County area to finally have access to clean and affordable natural gas through the construction of gas distribution infrastructure by a private company. For one manufacturer alone, the annual energy savings would exceed \$3M dollars.

Large scale CHP plants will help Maine realize its long term energy goals as well as enable positive private investment into our communities. #### **Appeal Summary:**

Grandparents, also referred to as kinship families, are part of a system in Maine called kinship care. Maine youth sometimes come into a child welfare system due to emergency situations within the family such as drug addiction, parental mental illness, and incarceration of the parent or other emergency life events where these parents are unable to care for their children. There are three types of kinship care Maine:

- <u>Informal Kinship Care</u>- Arrangements made between the parents and other family members *without* the involvement of the child welfare system or family/juvenile court systems.
- <u>Voluntary Kinship Care</u>- Children live with relatives and the child welfare system is involved, but the State *does not* have legal custody of the children.
- Formal Kinship Care- Children are placed in the legal custody of the State by a Judge and the child welfare system and then places the children with grandparents or other kin.

Maine relies on the practice of diverting children away from the child welfare system into informal or voluntary placements with relatives when it is appropriate, as evidenced by the high number children that come into kinship care. The 2010 Federal Census shows that in Maine, 16,883 Grandparents have their grandchildren living with them in one of the above categories. Kinship care research confirms this is the best option for children who cannot live with their parents as it helps sustain family, community and cultural bonds.

Why this bill demands urgent Legislative attention: The State of Maine DHHS pursues a right policy of placing Maine youth into kinship care whenever possible and in the best interest of the child. Kinship families are stepping up by the thousands to support their families in crisis. But without legal custody or guardianship, it is very difficult for relative caregivers to make needed health care decisions or make needed school or educational decisions for these youth in their care. You see many of these families do not want or can't afford a legal relationship with the children in their care, as many times relatives step in to help stabilize the situation for these children on a temporary basis with the understanding that the parent(s) will resume care once they are able. These living arrangements can last for years and often become permanent.

#### **Appeal Summary:**

This bill looks to create 'defacto parent' within Maine Statutes as it only exists in case law. Maine currently has over 16,000 grandparents and/or Kinship families who are caring for their grandchildren or nieces and nephews (2010 Federal Census). This particular type of family unit requires Maine statutes to be prepared for this and other related questions that need answers to be available now.

Some "law" is never enacted by the legislative branch of government, but rather, the law develops over time as Maine Justices are forced to make decisions about certain judicial patterns that do not exist formally in Maine statute. This is the extent of how Maine's defacto parenthood law currently exists.

This bill will bring together the Maine Judicial system, Maine's Law community and Maine's Kinship community to create a basis to coexist with the Maine Grandparents Visitation Act, as this statute serves to protect an existing relationship between a grandparent and a child. This Act is also narrowly adapted to advance the compelling state interest *that is not* an unconstitutional breach of the parent's fundamental right to direct care, custody and control of that child. I feel that a 'defacto parent' law can also be adapted in a limited way.

#### Why this bill demands urgent Legislative attention:

There are over 16,000 grandparents in Maine who have their own grandchildren living with them. When these family units require the help of the Maine Judicial system, the laws of the State of Maine should reflect this shift. This bill will bring these interested parties together now to serve Maine's youth who seek permanency in a family.

I would like to formally request that *LR 2245*, *An Act To Ensure Consumer Protection in Laws Governing Foreclosure*, be part of the appeal process scheduled for the next meeting of the Legislative Council on Thursday, November 19<sup>th</sup>.

Last year in Maine there were around 4,000 new foreclosures in Maine, only 13% of those were successful of coming out of foreclosure. This number does not include the number of foreclosures that are still remaining in limbo of being finalized. These foreclosures that are still in the process of being finalized see a low success rate due to the long drawn out process. The purpose of this bill is to expedite the process in which these foreclosures get cleared up and allow these properties to get back on the tax rolls.

LR 2245 replicates Nevada's current law that creates mandatory mediation 135 days after a foreclosure is filed. This means both sides must come to some type of an agreement 135 days after the foreclosure is filed. Nevada has seen a very high success rate of 86% with this law on the books. Not only will this law save both parties involved money, it will save time in court, and stress of having proceedings drag on over a long period of time. During a time when mill jobs are being lost in the pulp, paper, and forestry products across the state and everyday people being less able to afford to pay their bills, this bill is crucial to getting these issues finally cleared up.

I respectfully request an appeal for a second session submission that was rejected at the Legislative Council meeting on October 22<sup>nd</sup>. The proposed legislation is LR 2271, "An Act To Clarify Financial Responsibility in Gestational Carrier Agreements."

Last session, the Legislature enacted LD 1017 as PL 2015, <u>Chapter 296</u>, the "Act to Update Maine's Family Law." I was the sponsor of that law. LR 2271 proposes a small amendment to that legislation. It does not undo or in any way amend the provisions that were adopted but merely supplements that law to address an issue not covered in the bill as enacted. The law enacted last session specifies that the "intended parents" of a child adopted via surrogacy shall have financial responsibility for the costs of the child <u>upon birth</u>. That law, however, is silent as to financial responsibility for the costs of birth. On more than one occasion, a Maine hospital has had to suffer a financial loss for the costs associated with delivering a child in a surrogacy situation when neither party to the surrogacy arrangement paid the bill for delivery.

As supporters of this law, the Maine Hospital Association has spoken with the surrogacy attorney primarily responsible for crafting the relevant portions of the law adopted last year. It appears that that attorney does not object to the change sought by the Maine Hospital Association. She does want the opportunity to have input on the language submitted in order to protect against any unintended consequences. I will ensure that that occurs.

Why an emergency?

LR 2271 proposes to amend a comprehensive rewrite of the surrogacy law and creates a brand new regulatory scheme. However, it has not yet gone into effect. And will not do so until July 1, 2016. It makes the most sense to adopt necessary amendments prior to the scheduled effective date. That can only happen in the second session of the 127<sup>th</sup> Legislature rather than at some future time. Please allow LR 2271 be presented for consideration in the second session of the 127<sup>th</sup> Legislature.

Many batteries enter the market in Maine packaged with or contained in battery-operated products. It is imperative that product manufacturers source their batteries only from producers that are participating in a state-approved stewardship program for battery recycling. Members of the National Electrical Manufacturing Association (NEMA) Dry Battery Section, PRBA'- the Rechargeable Battery Association, and the Corporation for Battery Recycling (CBR) are united in support of legislation that would establish a mandatory, "all-battery" recycling program in Maine.

The industry has devised a legislative model that would require "producers" to fund and implement a statewide recycling network for consumer and small, industrial use batteries. The program will accept both primary (i.e., single-use) and rechargeable batteries through a broad network of collection sites at no cost to the public. Manufacturers of rechargeable batteries and battery-containing products have funded recycling of rechargeable batteries since 1996 when the industry established the Rechargeable Battery Recycling Corp (now Call2Recycle), a voluntary program that recovers all types of rechargeable batteries (under 11 pounds), cell phones and, in selective areas, single-use batteries. Call2Recycle collects a large volume of batteries in Maine but is burdened with a significant number of "free-riders" that increase the cost burden on responsible, participating members. This is a severe financial drain that threatens the long-term viability of the program.

#### Why an emergency?

The Joint Committee for Environmental and Natural Resources is working on updating the waste management program within the state. Product stewardship, managing a waste from cradle to grave, is one of the most important programs the state has to reduce waste materials from going to a landfill. This proposed bill will put into statute a product stewardship program for batteries and will help relieve the aforementioned cost and administrative burden on local and municipal waste management programs for recycling primary batteries.

Unfortunately there is a problem third party certification requirements and auditors. These "auditors answer to no one and often create a hostile environment for the farmer. In fact some Organic Dairy farms have switched to out of state certifiers, although all certifiers are allegedly equivalent. The proposal for bill LR 2206 will address the issue of third-party certification issues.

This bill would provide a third party, the Maine Dairy Board, to hear the disagreements around the audit. They, the Board, could help mediate proper and necessary corrective actions required to meet the audit. If the Board is unsuccessful then the Farmer could proceed to any legal action that might be required.

The Maine Brewers' Guild, upon encouragement from BABLO, is seeking to amend the language of this law to allow for <u>all manufacturers</u> to be able to provide retail licensees samples of products. Currently, this privilege is only granted to <u>small breweries or wineries</u> (A 'small brewery' is defined by their production of beer. A small brewery is a brewery that produces no more than 1,500 barrels, or 50,000 gallons of beer per year).

As a result, one of the bigger breweries in Maine who was unaware of this law recently received a fine after a sales representative left a sample with a retail licensee, a seemingly reasonable sales practice. LR 2395 would permit sales representatives who work for breweries and wineries of all sizes to provide samples of products to retail licensees.

#### Why an emergency?

Sales Representatives are a key part of introducing retailers to new products. BABLO has only recently begun to enforce this provision. Several other outdated and long unenforced statutes were quickly repealed during previous legislative sessions. The Legislature needs to act quickly to bring this law into accord with the trade practices that have been in place for many years in this industry in order for Maine's breweries and wineries to avoid unnecessary fines. We have BABLO's support for LR 2395

Currently, manufacturers (i.e. breweries, distilleries, and wineries) who also serve food and have an on premise liquor license are required to have a separate entrance or physical separation, such as a wall or separate doorway from outside, between their on premise and off premise areas. Gritty's in downtown Portland is a good example of someone who is operating under this law right now.

This will be a benefit to brewpubs in the state as it will eliminate a law that is a burden and creates uneven requirements between manufacturers with tasting rooms and manufacturers who serve food. Please note that these manufacturers will maintain all assurances that taxes are appropriately accounted for and records maintained.

#### Why an emergency?

Three years ago, the Maine legislature legalized the selling of samples in brewery tasting rooms where guests can also buy beer to take home with them as part of the same transaction. However, due to a quirk in how liquor licensing works, if a tasting room or brew pub serves food, they are currently prohibited from selling bottled beer to take home from within the same space. Instead, they are required to have a separate gift shop where bottles could be sold.

As our rapidly growing industry continues to evolve and attract more and more visitors to our state, it is critical that tasting rooms and brew pubs be permitted to sell beer to take away regardless of whether or not food is part of their business model.

Please consider this letter of appeal regarding LR 2414 "An Act to Conform Maine Law to the Requirements of the American Dental Association Commission on Dental Accreditation."

LR 2414 proposes to align our state statutes with standards set by the Commission on Dental Accreditation. Obviously, it is important that Maine align its dental statutes with these newly established national standards.

In August, we had good news. The Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) recognized the midlevel profession of dental therapy on a national level. CODA develops the national standards for all dental professions including dentists, dental hygienists, and now they have developed standards for dental therapists. While on the surface this bill might appear to deal with "adult" control issues, it actually involves the emotional, academic, and sometimes physical safety of a student.

Superintendents approve 92% of transfer requests. In 2014 they approved 2,302 of them. This year, as of September 30<sup>th</sup>, 189 were denied and appealed to the commissioner. In all but 12 of those cases the commissioner overruled the local authorities.

This issue is having an enormous negative affect state wide. The stories from the field are alarming. Students are transferring because they received a poor grade, to play on a different ball team, to be with boy or girl friends, to get away from one parent that has household rules and expectations, to get away from a child with lice, to avoid a difficult assignment - the list is endless. The reasons given in nearly all of these cases of appeal to the commissioner are "My child is being bullied" or "my child is not receiving a good education". Often times students are transferring multiple times, while teachers are left to pick up the pieces due to lack of any continuity in the child's life.

Let me share a specific example: As a superintendent I once had request for transfer. When I discussed this with the other superintendent I discovered that the "Mom" had "given" the student to a registered sex offender in order to pay off a drug bill. DHHS and local law enforcement were involved. We each denied the request, and sure enough it was overturned by the Commissioner's office. We did get it straightened out, but at a significant expense of time that could have been better spent at both the local and state level.

While we would all like to think that parents make decisions in the best interest of their children, to do so is naive. Read the headlines of our local papers, or watch the evening news. Some of the most bizarre mentally ill people in our society are featured each and every day. Many of them are parents or decision makers for youngsters.

Thank you for re-considering this request, and I fully respect the difficult task that you have.

As sponsor of LR2350 "An Act To Amend the Laws Governing the Withdrawal of a Single Municipality from a Regional School Unit" I am formally requesting this bill be reconsidered as part of the appeals process for November 19th. This is an emergency bill based on my concerns and also those of my constituents and the budgetary impact it is having on the Town of Burlington and others throughout the state.

After years of unsuccessfully trying to work with the RSU to bring the towns educational costs down to a reasonable level, the town by an affirmative vote of 96 to 10 on August 9, 2014, started down the path of withdrawal. Like so many of our rural towns Burlington's student population is going down. We are competing for young families to move into our town with an adjacent town that has school choice. The town pays over \$14,000 per student, well above the state rate. More importantly we want to offer increased educational opportunities to our students and can do so with another school just 15 miles from us.

Currently in state statute there are timelines that must be met for the municipalities to get proposals to the school district, however there are none for the district, which can and does allow delaying tactics. In a letter to acting Commissioner Desjardin, Chair Patrick MacEachern states "Since the initial proposal was sent to SAD 31 (1/22/15), SAD 31 has had the proposal for comment in their hands for 181 days. The Burlington Withdrawal Committee has had the proposal for comment in our hands for 41 days. (This is as of 9/2/15)" In response to the concerns of Burlington Withdrawal Committee Acting Commission Desjardin stated "While I appreciate your concerns, I do not have the legal authority to intervene with the withdrawal agreement negotiation process."

I suggest 30 days and this language would apply to all parties. The statute contains no explicit requirement that the RSU is to bargain in *good faith*, only that it bargains. This is very costly to both parties with no end in sight. Also there is no provision that allows the Commissioner/DOE to step in. I do not want to abolish home rule but there are many statutes that give the Commissioner "may" authority to suggest a course of action as a last resort. The Education Committee could best help with all these issues in this upcoming session. Don't get me wrong; I believe this process shouldn't be easy but, it should be an obtainable one, which it is not now! This request should be recognized as an emergency so the Legislature can review these deficiencies of the current statute. The students and municipalities of Maine deserve to have this bill brought before the upcoming legislature. We need to have a public hearing and due process.

To summarize the way the statute is written, all the school unit has to do is look at the proposal and say thank you, but NO, and that is the end of it.

I am unable to be with you on the 19th, however Representative Maker has agreed to speak on my behalf should you have any questions. Thank you for your time and your thoughtful consideration.



Dear Senator Thibodeau,

I'm writing to appeal the decision to not accept LR 2454: "An act to clarify Medicaid Managed Care Ombudsman Services" as an emergency bill to be taken up this session.

As a licensed health insurance agent who enrolls Maine individuals in Marketplace and Medicare health plans, since the opening of the exchange, consumers are more confused than ever over how to navigate access to healthcare in Maine. They need all the help they can get. This is not the time to cut a valuable program that not only aids some of Maine residents' most complicated health access cases, but also aids insurance brokers/agents/navigators/assisters, and publicly educates and informs consumers regarding where to seek assistance. In June, 2015 DHHS cut the funding to for the Ombudsman contract stating it no longer needed the services - that the Department could handle the outreach and education itself. Additionally, there was no general fund money expended to finance this contract.

The purpose of this bill is to clarify Medicaid's Managed Care Ombudsman Services, which will ensure that the services continue as REQUIRED by federal and STATE law. It is important and is an emergency for the following reasons as well:

- The contract under this statute allows DHHS to deliver outreach without using any general fund dollars or tying up any state FTEs to do so. Without this contract the state may have to fund the outreach by appropriating extra unnecessary state funds.
- 2. Since 2006, these duties were successfully performed through privately raised funds, which were matched by federal dollars. In 2014 HelpLine calls alone under this contract increased six fold.
- 3. Ombudsman services ensure government accountability in Medicaid.

Without Ombudsman services under this contract, DHHS will have to invest in training and possibly hire additional personnel to provide the required outreach and education. Because of the contract, fewer people have to call DHHS because consumers are educated on all options; including, Marketplace plans, FQHC's, free clinics, PHIP, Prescription Assistance, and hospital free care. As an agent, I've referred clients to CAHC (the previous contractor), which has been able to resolve eligibility disputes; thus reducing costly and time-consumer appeals and questions that would otherwise be directed to DHHS.

Please reconsider LD 2454.

LR 2219 seeks to increase the minimum wage, clarify the authority of municipalities and counties to enact ordinances governing employment and make changes to the laws governing the employment of minors.

This legislation is needed to further efforts at increasing the minimum wage in Maine. The decision to change Maine's minimum wage has always rested with the Legislature and should continue to do so. It is widely anticipated that there will be a ballot referendum on increasing the minimum wage. While we cannot prevent such a referendum from moving forward, we can reassure Maine citizens and the business community that we are capable of fulfilling our responsibilities by agreeing on a wage schedule ahead of that vote. Organizations such as Maine Retailers and the Maine State Chamber of Commerce are deeply concerned that a higher wage will pass by referendum, thereby binding the legislature.

This bill increases Maine's minimum wage to \$10 an hour by the year 2020 and requires county-wide votes to increase a wage locally unless a municipality has already passed its own wage before the law goes into effect.

I believe that this bill is a very responsible endeavor for the Maine Legislature, and it may be the compromise we need to find common ground and help Maine's low wage workers. The difference with my proposal this session is the pre-emption. Areas would still be able to establish a unique minimum wage, but that decision would have to be made by an entire county rather than a single municipality.

I am writing to request an appeal of the Legislative Council's decision on the following bill: LR 2371, "An Act To Amend the Maine Guaranteed Access Reinsurance Association Act."

The Maine Guaranteed Access Reinsurance Association (MGARA) was created in 2011 to stabilize premiums in the individual market by providing reinsurance against high-risk claimants, thereby mitigating the impact these claims placed on premiums. In practice, this was achieved by allowing health carriers to cede high-risk members to the reinsurance pool, where these members' claims would be paid largely by an assessment on health plans on all lines of health insurance business, and by premiums paid by the ceding carrier.

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) created a temporary federal reinsurance program that would go into effect on January 1, 2014, terminating at the end of 2016. In order to avoid double assessments to fund two different programs, the Maine Legislature passed legislation in 2013 suspending the MGARA reinsurance program. The legislation also permits MGARA to resume operations upon the expiration of the federal reinsurance program. While MGARA served an important purpose prior to the ACA, lawmakers should consider whether MGARA would continue to serve that purpose in a new healthcare landscape.

LR 2371 would amend or repeal the MGARA reinsurance program because this mechanism is no longer needed. First, premiums charged to individual health plan members enrolled in ACA compliant products introduced on or after January 1, 2014, are largely subsidized by federal tax dollars in the form of tax credits. According to recent data, more than 60,000 Mainers enrolled through Healthcare.gov received a premium tax credit, which reduced each enrollee's premium by an average of more than \$300 per month. Furthermore, because these tax credits are calculated based on the cost of health plans in the exchange, the amount Maine residents will receive in the form of tax credits will increase if health plan premiums increase. Second, the assessment mechanism required under MGARA places an additional burden on health insurance premiums, particularly for small and large businesses in Maine. In essence, the assessment on small and large group health plans subsidies individual health plan rates.

Because health insurance plans are required to file their 2017 rates by mid-2016 and need to know whether to include the MGARA assessment in those rates, it is important that action on this legislation is taken during the 2016 legislative session. Absent legislative action, MGARA will resume operation in 2017.

There is no denying that Maine has a severe drug crisis on its hands. Last year alone, more than 200 people in this state died of a drug overdose, the highest rate of drug overdose deaths Maine has seen on record. I believe that there is a strong commitment from lawmakers to be proactive in helping find solutions that tackle this epidemic. Education must be a part of that mix.

LR 2478 would transfer \$2 million from the Fund for a Healthy Maine into a grant program, which would be administered by the Maine Department of Education. A school district would be able to apply for a grant to fund drug abuse education programs that they are interested in providing within their schools.

Many schools in Maine already are providing some sort of drug awareness education program; however, in response to the drastic increase in the use of heroin and other opiate-based drugs, these programs need to be enhanced to effectively combat the consumption of these potentially-fatal drugs. It is my belief that LR 2478 fits the mission perfectly of how to use monies from the Fund for a Healthy Maine and provides an essential resource for our schools throughout Maine that want to do all they can in helping to reverse this trend and to prevent drug use among our youth.

I respectfully request an appeal for a second session submission that was rejected at the Legislative Council meeting on October 22<sup>nd</sup>. The proposed legislation is LR 2555, "An Act to Amend the Law Regarding the Diversion Alert Program."

Diversion Alert is an innovative, statewide program that provides monthly drug arrest reports to <u>over</u> <u>2,000</u> medical professionals. The monthly reports help prescribers and pharmacists identify and respond to patients at risk for overdose, in need of treatment, or engaged in illegal prescription drug distribution. Diversion Alert is NOT the same as Maine's Prescription Monitoring Program, which is a federally funded database prescribers use to review prescription drugs dispensed to patients. Diversion Alert provides new, actionable information for medical professionals that enables them to more effectively address patient prescription drug abuse and diversion.

LD 2555 also seeks to move the program from the Office of the Attorney General to the Department of Public Safety (DPS). Many believe that DPS would be a better fit for Diversion Alert as they are knowledgeable on the issue and already have other programs to combat drug abuse.

Why an emergency?

Last session, the Legislature enacted LD 1307, "An Act to Fund the Maine Diversion Alert Program." I was also the sponsor of that bill. While we did receive funding with the passage of that law, LD 1307 only provided one-time funds of \$95,000 which run out after June 2016. I believe that this essential program needs continued funding to further help the people of Maine. In addition to the lives positively impacted by Diversion Alert, the total estimated cost savings to Maine's health care system which may result from the identification of patients abusing and diverting prescriptions is \$1,502,900 - \$3,176,204 per year.

Diversion Alert is an essential component to Maine's efforts to address prescription and illegal drug abuse. LR 2555 would authorize funding for Diversion Alert for the 2016-2017 fiscal year.

I am submitting a request for appeal for LR 2407, "An Act To Increase Access to Opiate Addiction Treatment in Maine." This bill proposes increased access to opiate addiction treatment by setting the MaineCare reimbursement rate for outpatient Methadone treatment at a level equal to the rates in effect prior to the 2010/2012 cuts. Opioid addiction has risen to the level of a public health crisis in Maine with two major summits being convened in the past 3 months to discuss this epidemic. All parties agree that treatment must be part of the strategy to combat this growing problem. A component that adds to the crisis is that two of Maine's treatment centers have recently closed due to funding issues; Mercy of Westbrook and Spectrum Health Systems in Sanford. Numerous constituents reached out to me when the news broke that Spectrum would be closing; many of them had friends or family members who were benefiting from the progress and recovery that Spectrum was providing. Over the past several years, the number of Mainers seeking treatment for heroin has tripled, while the number of patients in treatment has been flat or declining. We must act to combat this drug problem we all talk about wanting to solve.

The solution is a combined effort of education, prevention, treatment and enforcement, it cannot be solely enforcement. As of 2010 it costs roughly \$46,000 per person in prison, while it costs approximately \$5,000 per person for evidence-based treatment. Addiction is a disease not a crime and we need to start treating it as such. We have the opportunity to be proactive instead of reactive and we must act now. Failure to support treatment will cost the General Fund budget far more over time.

Methadone treatment is the most studied and cost effective form of treatment. Every month that we delay action means more emergency room visits, crimes, children being placed in protective services, overdoses, incarcerations and death. There is no doubt that this should be constituted as emergency legislation.
