

INTRODUCTION

This volume contains the titles and summaries of the 77 bill requests filed before cloture, rejected at the Legislative Council's October 23rd meeting and appealed by the appeal deadline on October 30th. The council accepted 134 of 397 requests at its October 23rd meeting. Part 6 contains a record of the vote for the requests and is sorted by sponsors' names in alphabetical order. Each sponsor's appeal notice is reproduced as received followed immediately by the ballot for the appealed request. Part 7 contains a list of appealed bills by broad subject. Part 8 contains a list of bill requests accepted by broad subject. Part 9 contains a list of accepted bill requests in order alphabetically by sponsor.

Following the Legislative Council meeting on October 23 to decide which bill titles to proceed with for the 2nd Session of the 129th Legislature, I am formally appealing the decision to not let in two bill titles that I have submitted.

In regards to LR 2722 "An Act to Provide a Death Benefit for Volunteer and Part-Time Firefighters", I believe that following this year's tragedy in Farmington, Maine needs to immediately take action to take care of the spouses and children of our volunteer firefighters who put their lives in danger every day for their community. Today, if a volunteer firefighter was to die on duty, their spouse and children could lose not only their parent, but also a breadwinner. LR 2722 would provide a death benefit to parents and children beyond an amount that is severely behind compared to our New England neighbors.



Dear President Jackson,

Earlier this year, I was contacted by a constituent with a horrifying and heart-wrenching story about her husband's untimely death. Richard Charest had been working for a funeral home transporting remains in a Ford Flex minious that was jerry-rigged for this purpose. One evening while he was driving remains to the funeral home, his vehicle was rear-ended, which sent the coffin through the back of his seat, breaking his spine and killing him.

Thankfully, this is the only instance I know of something like this happening, and most funeral homes use vehicles specifically built for transporting remains. But without specifying safety standards, we risk the lives of others in Richard's situation.

LR 2971, "An Act To Require Employee Safety within the Funeral Industry" is simple in that it specifies three safety measures to ensure that vehicles used in the funeral industry are equipped in a way that in the event of an accident any floors, platforms, or containers do not become dislodged in a way as to cause harm to persons in the vehicle. The bill also includes penalties for violation of these provisions.

While no piece of legislation will bring Marie's beloved husband back, we can enact these safety provisions in his memory, potentially saving others from this awful fate. We could wait until 2021, but by then it may be too late.

I urge you to allow consideration of LR 2971 in the coming year. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to ask.

I believe that this proposal achieves Emergency status in light of a recent U.S. Supreme Court Decision, Janus v. American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, which addresses the compelled payment of dues or fees as a condition of employment. Regardless of what one's opinion may be of this decision, it certainly can create confusion and uncertainty on the part of public sector employees regarding state versus federal law. Given the primacy of federal law, it only makes sense to bring state statute into conformity, and it should be done as soon as possible. The particulars can be discussed within the legislative process, as all bills are, but the urgency of clarification certainly warrants Emergency status.

In 2019, the Maine Legislature passed LD 946, "An Act to Protect the Privacy of Customer Online Information." This bill exempts what are commonly referred to as edge providers – the websites, online services and social media platforms that put Mainers' data most at risk. Every other state in the country that has passed online privacy legislation, including California, Vermont, Nevada, Delaware and Oregon included these entities. And every other state with legislation still pending or likely to pass in 2019, such as Massachusetts and New Jersey, drafted their laws to include the online actors with the riskiest data practices.

Companies like Google and Facebook will understand the Maine Legislature to have given them a green light to collect, sell and manipulate the data of Maine residents. We cannot claim in good faith to have protected online privacy unless we correct this glaring omission.

Emergency legislation is warranted to correct these omissions errors before the law goes into effect in July 2020.

I look forward to addressing the Council to discuss this proposal and to clarify its need for inclusion as emergency legislation for the upcoming session.

It is my desire to appeal the Legislative Council's decision whereby L.R. 2729 was not accepted for consideration during the Legislature's Second Regular Session.

With school construction costs ever-increasing, it is imperative that we make revisions to a law passed in the early 1990s that has gone beyond the Legislature's original intent. Primarily established as a system where an owner's representative, to be employed and overseen by a school's building committee on behalf of the local school board and handled by the Bureau of General Services, was permitted and paid for, the owner's representative position is now administered by the Department of Education. Established qualifications have diminished the role to include only architects and engineers, leaving less than a handful to supervise all projects across the State. Experienced applicants, such as individuals with construction proficiency, are eliminated at the initial request for proposal phase.

Objective individuals who can understand acceptable and sensible construction details, procedures, cost savings, and oversight on behalf of the local building committee are needed. They will, in turn, report to the school's building committee, school board, and municipality, not the Department of Education, which only hires architects and engineers to oversee themselves.

I respectfully appeal the Council's rejection of LR 2632, An Act To Implement Recent Changes to the Laws Regarding Unclaimed Property in Lawyer's Trust Account.

Last session, the Legislature enacted LD 1483, which amended the Unclaimed Property Act to clarify the procedure for disposing of funds presumed abandoned in a lawyer's trust account. This statute took effect on September 19, 2019.

Also last session, the Legislature passed a new version of the Unclaimed Property Act, which took effect on October 1, 2019. Because the new version of the Unclaimed Property Act did not include the language of LD 1483, that new law was abrogated as of October 1, 2019.

LR 2632 seeks to put back into the Unclaimed Property Act the language that was approved and passed by the Legislature last session. It will not be a time-consuming bill at the committee or floor level. It will also have a minimal, if any, fiscal note.

Please reconsider your earlier action and allow this language fix to move through the legislative process this session.

Recently, there has been a public conversation in Maine sparked by some license plates that feature explicit language. This legislation is indeed an emergency because people should be made aware of the dangers to their mental health before purchasing and consuming marijuana products, especially those with higher THC. These concerns should be even more prevalent with the recent sickness and deaths associated with vaping higher THC products.

In Canada, they have warning labels on their marijuana products on any product containing THC above 10 micrograms per gram, and the product is required to feature a red icon, along with a message highlighted in yellow, carrying a health-related warning. The message associated with higher THC reads, "WARNING: Regular use of cannabis can increase the risk of psychosis and schizophrenia. Higher THC content can increase the risk of psychosis and schizophrenia."

I strongly encourage the Legislature to study this issue, and improve Maine's warning labels, modeling Canada's system. Canada has a wide variety of different warnings that apply to products containing marijuana in an effort to educate consumers and warn them about serious side effects from misusing or overusing products.

It is my intention to appeal the Legislative Council's rejection of my bill request, LR: 2887, An Act To Amend the Statute Regarding Endangering the Welfare of a Child To Include Allowing Children Access to Loaded Firearms without Permission.

This bill is an important clarification of current law. It is not a new law, nor an expansion of current law, and it will not result in additional costs to the state. It simply adds a conduct to those already enumerated in current law, further clarifying what constitutes child endangerment.

This clarification is vital to ensure that there is proper notice to Maine people, so that the law can be enforced appropriately by law enforcement and the judiciary. It is necessary because LD 44, which passed last session and created a new Class C crime for reckless violation of duty of care or protection resulting in serious bodily injury or death of a child, was not funded and has been carried over on the AFA table. Due to the seriousness of the issue, and because LD 44 did not become law, there is still an existing and urgent need to provide the clarity which could prevent the death or maining of Maine children and the ripple effects of these tragedies for Maine families and communities.

There are many examples of specific cases where the publication of this law as a deterrent could have helped prevent a terrible accident, or saved a child's life, such as last year's Oakland tragedy in which an 8-year-old boy perished after finding a loaded shotgun.

I look forward to addressing the Council to discuss the emergency nature of this proposal.

Subject: Justification for L.R. 2731: "An Act To Improve Prisoner Transport Safety by Specifically Authorizing Transport of Prisoners by Transport Officers".

I would like to thank you and the other members of the Legislative Council for this opportunity to present the need for this legislation.

As with so many parts of our public service organizations, the positions that are created have evolved over time in order to meet increasing demands. This legislation is being presented as a result of this process being incomplete as it pertains to the position entitled "Transport Officer" in the county correctional system.

While the history of how we got to where we are today could cover several pages, the crux of the matter is that staff who are carrying out their duties are in the position of dealing with some very dangerous and potentially violent individuals. Because of the important functions performed by Sheriff's department across the state, the responsibility for transporting these individuals between court appearance and other needs, places these Transport Officers at significant risk if they are to successfully complete their job assignments.

In the case of the Transport Officer position, there is a significant gap that has been identified in the evolution of the position. That gap is the fact that there has been no legislation to define the authority of the position. This gap places any Transport Officer at risk of liability should there be a need to use force in the management of their duties. This legislation merely aligns the authority of the Transport Officer with that of a Deputy thus defining the authority they have in carrying out their job functions. It also places the officer's liability at the same level as that of the deputy.

This is an urgent issue since the Sheriff's departments are currently operating with increased liability due to the existence of the legislative gap.

I wish to appeal the recent decision by the Legislative Council regarding LR 2702, "An Act To Increase the Automatic Draft Authority for Licensed Insurance Producers."

Currently insurance companies can only extend draft paying authority for claims to its agents and producers up to a limit of \$5,000, a practice that has been in place for over 20 years. In today's world \$5,000 does not go far when you have lost everything. My proposal would increase that amount to \$10,000; and in the case of a declared catastrophe, like the ice storm several years ago, the companies can increase that to \$20,000, temporarily.

Imagine it you suffered from a severe fire loss to your home or business and the first person you see has the ability to hand you a check to start the recovery process. Whether it is to establish a new place to live, purchase new clothing for your family or re-establish your business in a new location, receiving that financial help immediately eases the pain of the loss.

Why is this request an emergency? Most of our severe losses in Maine occur between December and April – fire losses from wood stoves, wind storm losses like we recently experienced, coastal storms, building collapses from the weight of ice and snow and the list goes on.

Since it is unlikely this proposal will receive any objectionable testimony as the insurance carriers want this increased authority and the Insurance Bureau has no opposition, we could have these modifications in place soon after we convene in January.

My request is about providing Maine people and businesses with the needed financial resources to rebuild their lives. I believe Mainers deserve that. I hope you do, too, and will reconsider your decision so we can do exactly that.

Please accept this appeal of the recent Legislative Concil decision to reject my proposed bill, LR: 2720 An Act To Allow a Qualifying Religious or Other Entity To Self-insure for Automobile Insurance and allow me the opportunity to address its merits before the council.

Members of a local Mennonite church came to me last winter looking for relief from the requirement to purchase auto insurance by becoming self-insured. Under current statute, it appears members of the group could self-insure, but they would need to provide proof of financial responsibility of \$175,000 for each vehicle. The bill I entered would allow the group to self-insure multiple vehicles for this amount, which is similar to statute found in several other states. States with specific statute allowing the Mennonites to meet auto insurance financial responsibility requirements while avoiding contracting with an insurance company include: Georgia, Illinois, North Carolina, Kentucky, Maryland, Wyoming, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Ohio.

The number of Mennonites in Maine is low compared to other regions of the country. The members in the local church currently own about 12 vehicles. There is another church in Brownfield with members owning up to 50 vehicles. I'm not aware of others, but know the number relocating to Maine continues to grow. The Mennonites believe they are required to provide for their own, including payment of any auto accident related expenses. They attempt to stay from "under the yoke" of the government or insurance companies. For example, the federal government exempts them from participating in the Social Security or Medicare programs. Some of the states mentioned include that in statute as a requirement to allow them to self-insure. This bill may also help other not for profit groups as well.

In the medical world an emergency exists when a person is exposed to the risk of significant harm or death. An emergency requires prompt action, not a delay due to insurance company impediments.

In the 1960s, insurance companies began requiring doctors to obtain pre-approval or "prior authorization" for certain procedures and treatments. Initially this practice focused on containing costs and eliminating unnecessary treatments, but over the past 20 years it has increasingly delayed needed care. Insurers hold on to Mainer's money. It costs us time, money and our health. A recent survey by the American Medical Association found that 91% of doctors felt that these delays had a "significant or somewhat negative impact" on patient outcomes, and 1 in 4 doctors surveyed reported that these delays had led to serious adverse events.

This past session, the legislature passed LD 249, "An Act to Ensure Protection of Patients in Medical Reviews by Health Insurance Carriers" and LD 705, "An Act Regarding the Process for Obtaining Prior Authorization for Health Insurance Purposes." The former required that prior authorizations be carried out by providers with relevant experience, while the latter requires a 48-72 hour response to requests for prior authorization, and restricted its use for Medication Assisted Treatment for opioid use disorder.

LR 2690, "An Act Regarding Prior Medical Authorizations for Certain Medical Procedures" finishes the job, by bringing Maine into compliance with the 2014 Consensus Statement of the American Hospital Association, America's Health Insurance Plans, American Medical Association, American Pharmacists Association, Blue Cross Blue Shield Association and Medical Group Management Association.

Thank you for the opportunity to appeal the 5-5 decision of the Legislative Council on LR 2767, An Act To Amend the Laws Governing Requirements for the Construction of Transmission Lines by Incumbent Transmission and Distribution Utilities.

Due to the passage in 2019 of new Renewable Portfolio Standards (LD 1494) and solar and distribution general policies (LD 1711) in Maine and the increasing demand for renewables by other states within our New England grid, Mainers can expect to see more proposals for elective transmission lines within and through our state. These proposals may come as soon as 2020, when our Public Utilities Commission (PUC) finalizes rules for renewable procurements for LDs 1494 and 1711. We cannot wait until mid to late fall 2021 to improve our process for approving these lines and assuring that Maine ratepayers receive the benefits they deserve for the use of the infrastructure they have funded.

Many Mainers have made it clear that they were confused by and unhappy with the opaque process by which a limited group of people determined a benefits package for Maine in exchange for approval by the PUC of the New England Clean Energy Connect project (a.k.a, CMP Corridor). I believe we owe it to our constituents to provide them with an improved, standardized, and transparent process for the approval of future elective transmission projects. We also owe it to ourselves and our clean energy future to make sure that all project developers have access to the same information about the grid as our current transmission and distribution utilities do, so that they can compete fairly to bring clean energy solutions to Maine.

Thank you for the opportunity to appeal the 5-5 decision of the Legislative Council on LR 3083, An Act To Improve Agricultural Productivity through the Protection of Native Pollinator Species.

There is a growing body of scientific research indicating that certain neonicotinoid pesticides (neonics) are particularly harmful for our native pollinator species (namely, bees and butterflies) because of their toxicity and persistency in the environment. As importantly, Maine farmers, gardeners, and entomologists are noting a decline in the insects that do the important work of pollination. This has a negative effect on many farmers' bottom lines, since they now need to hire hives of bumblebees to visit their farms and pollinate their plants.

The longer we wait to remove the most toxic of these pesticides from homeowner and landscaper use, the more devastating the damage will be. This bill would not ban all neonics and all of their uses, since there are worse chemicals available to replace them and it is not helpful to interfere with our agricultural producers, many of whom are already pursuing alternative pest management strategies. Instead, it aims to remove just four neonics from non-agricultural use. This targeted approach is based on the best available science to remove the most harmful of pesticides available for sale today. I think that many people buy these pesticides assuming that they would not be available for sale if they were very harmful. Unfortunately, most consumers do not have the time to research which least-harmful chemicals they should use. That is where a thoughtful, data-driven bill honed through the public input of the legislative process can help.

It is clear that the use of motorized scooters is on the rise. These scooters have become far more accessible to users, as national rental companies have begun to roll out these motorized scooters in communities across the country. According to the National Association of City Transportation Officials riders took 38.5 million trips on shared electric scooters in 2018.

Unsurprisingly, this uptick has been accompanied by a dramatic rise in scooter-related injuries and deaths. According to data from Consumer Reports, e-scooters injury rate is 2.2 per 10,000 miles traveled, compared to .05 per 10,000 vehicle miles traveled for motorcycles and 0.1 per 10,000 miles travelled for cars.

This legislation would simply align helmet regulations for electric scooters with the existing regulations on bicycles. Considering that motorized scooters travel at a higher average speed than bicycles, this is a logical step that will prevent injuries and fatalities among Maine teenagers. Our teenagers' safety is of critical importance to our state's health and future. Given the rapid emergence of these vehicles, it is necessary that we take action sooner rather than later.

I look forward to addressing the Council to discuss the emergency nature of these proposals.

I am writing to appeal the Legislative Council's decision regarding LR 2818, "An Act To Provide an Appeals Process for Administrative Suspensions of Provisional Driver's."

This legislation was submitted after an unsuccessful attempt to help a constituent. My constituent has been looking after a young man for the past 3 or 4 years who has a very difficult home life. My constituent has helped the young man obtain his driver's license, find a job, and regularly lent him his vehicle, getting him on the path to become self-sufficient.

Unfortunately, the young man was pulled over, while in the probationary period, for driving with an expired inspection sticker, and also had his cousin in the vehicle. As a result, he was given close to \$400 in fines and lost his license. A 17-year-old in Rumford, without any family support, finding the money to pay \$400 in fines is obviously beyond reach. Furthermore, his loss of license caused him to lose his job. If he manages to stay on track with pulling his life together, this set back is severe and will take years for him to recover.

Just last session the Legislature took steps to limit the cases where losing a driver's license would be a penalty. We collectively realized that taking away one's license takes away a person's ability to work and support themselves, and that loss of license should largely be in response for driving infractions.

My bill will create an appeal process for cases like this young man and allow probationary drivers to make their case. Currently, there is no discretion allowed in the law and there should be. Circumstances must be taken into account when harsh penalties and ramifications are debilitating. While this situation is likely uncommon, this predicament is not one into which we allow other young people to find themselves. This bill is clearly an emergency. Young people make mistakes, and need to learn great caution taking on the responsibility of operating a vehicle, but their punishment must fit the crime.

It is my desire to appeal the Legislative Council's decision whereby L.R. 3068 was not accepted for consideration during the Legislature's Second Regular Session.

Until this year, tobacco settlement payments have been predictable and relatively consistent, averaging about \$47.5 million in "initial" and "base" payments since inception. This year's revenue projections, however, paint a very different and concerning picture. It is now apparent that we are facing both a temporary plunge in revenue in FY21 and FY22 (~\$35 million/year), and a longer-term recalibration of average base payments for FY23 and beyond (~\$40 million/year).

Pairing this revenue re-projection with the unfortunate pattern in recent years of using Fund for a Healthy Maine dollars to supplant medical care expenditures in the General Fund, means there will no longer be enough revenue to support current expenditures – public health and medical care – being funded by tobacco settlement dollars. Consequently, there is a possibility that the Maine CDC may not have the resources it needs to confront the vaping epidemic and other threats to our children's health and productivity.

L.R. 3068 offers one solution through the creation of a trust that would balance the tobacco settlement budget in two years, guarantee funding for Maine's tobacco program, as well as provide resources for our highest public health priorities. More importantly, L.R. 3068 allows us to have the conversation – to take a planful approach to finding better ways to protect the tobacco settlement and stabilize funding for public health and prevention so we are supporting healthy families and a healthy workforce for years to come.



Dear Senate President Jackson,

I wish to appeal the Legislative Council's denial of allowing me to introduce LR 2649, "An Act To Allow Public Members of the Maine-Canadian Legislative Advisory Committee To Receive Reimbursement for Travel Expenses," during the second regular session.

In 2019, you appointed me to the Maine-Canadian Legislative Advisory Committee, an act for which I am eternally grateful. The law also allowed you and Speaker Gideon to appoint public members.

Because some of the duties of the Commission involve meeting with representatives of Canada at different locations, Chapter 419 Public Law, "An Act To Increase International Cross-border Partnerships To Benefit Maine's Economy," was passed to allow reimbursement to Commission members for expenses in attending these meetings. I am told that this is done through an appropriation to the executive branch, not to the legislative branch.

One of the people you and Speaker Gideon appointed was an energetic, insightful 81-year-old retired French speaking individual with experience in municipal, legislative and state service from a community with a long history of serving Canadian tourists. He is a great asset on the commission given his extensive knowledge of government, fluency in French and past participation in Maine-Canadian relations. However, as a retiree, he lives on a fixed income.

Recently committee members were asked to attend the Conference of New England Governors and Eastern Canadian Premiers in New Brunswick, where leaders from all over New England and the Eastern Canadian provinces convene to discuss issues of mutual importance, including energy, rail services, tourism and cross border ownership of enterprises. It was an important two-day event where all different kinds of New England and Canadian leaders, policy makers and experts were to convene in one place to discuss issues of mutual interest.

After Commission members registered for the conference, booked accommodations, and arranged car-pooling for transportation, it was learned that, due to a flaw in the law, only the expenses of legislators could be compensated out of this fund and not the expenses of the public members.

As a result, much to his embarrassment, this public individual I mentioned had to admit that he did not have enough personal resources to participate in the conference that he would have to resign from the commission because he did not have the finances to support his participation. I personally asked him to wait to see if the legislature could rectify the situation so that the Commission would not lose the benefit of his experience.

I am asking you to reconsider the approval of LR 2649, "An Act To Allow Public Members of the Maine-Canadian Legislative Advisory Committee To Receive Reimbursement for Travel Expenses," to rectify this problem and allow members if the public of modest means to serve their government. I believe you will discover that there are many similar commissions where public members who serve on legislative or gubernatorial appointed boards are reimbursed for their expenses. I personally know that when I was asked by Governor King to serve on the Board of Maine Public Broadcasting Corporation after leaving the legislature in 2001, public members were entitled compensation for travel expenses. There are many other examples I could cite. It would be a shame to have the Maine-Canadian Legislative Advisory Committee not follow a similar practice.

Dear Senator Jackson:

I am writing to appeal the Legislative Council's recent decision regarding LR 2769, as noted above. LR 2769 would increase the fee paid to municipalities by depuration companies from \$.50 per bushel of clams harvested to \$2.00 per bushel. Depuration companies are permitted to harvest softshell clams in clam flats rated Conditionally Restricted or Restricted where commercial and residential license-holders are excluded. Depuration companies in turn, pay a per-bushel fee to the municipality where the clam flat is located, to harvest these clams. The per-bushel depuration fee has not increased in 20 years.

Depuration fees are used by municipalities and regional shellfish management groups to "ensure sustainable harvest practices and optimum utilization of soft-shell clam resources" (2018 Georges River Regional Clam Management Plan) through management of clam resources, including re-seeding, water sampling, shoreline surveys, and water measuring and testing. Local municipalities adopt and regularly update management plans to provide for sustainable management of this resource. License fees, depuration fees and fines are used to fund these efforts.

Statewide, softshell clam landings have decreased over the last 20 years, from 1,036.17 metric tons in 2000 to 659.82 metric tons in 2018, while the value of clam landings has risen from \$9,545,531 to \$12,864,545 and the price has increased from \$42.50 per bushel (\$0.85 per pound) to \$90.00 per bushel (\$1.80 per pound), an increase in price of 47%.

Increasing the fee paid by depuration companies from \$.50 per bushel to \$2.00 per bushel will provide additional resources to municipalities and regional shellfish management groups so they can improve the water quality required to sustain this natural resource, and continue to provide a valuable product enjoyed throughout the State of Maine and beyond.

Dear President Jackson,

Thank you for your consideration of LR 2700, "Resolve, Directing the Department of Environmental Protection To Evaluate Emissions from Heated Aboveground Petroleum and Storage Tanks." I urge you to please vote "YES" on appeal and to allow this measure to be considered by the Legislature.

Today in South Portland and surrounding communities, residents are very concerned about the air quality that may be affected by the Petroleum Storage Tanks based in South Portland. Much of this concern stems from an air quality violation which South Portland learned of through a consent decree filed against Global Partners, LP, the operators of the storage tanks and facility. One concern was that area residents had not known about the air quality violation until the matter appeared in court, after the violation itself was reported. This situation led me to introduce LD 1706 during the previous session, and the bill was subsequently signed into law.

However, citizen concerns have not dissipated. Although municipalities will now be informed when an air quality violation is committed, there remains the issue whether the tanks pose a threat to the air quality and health of people in the area. I continue to hear from my constituents on a regular basis about how concerned they are that their health is at risk just by living in our community. It is not right to have to live in doubt like this.

LR 2700, as drafted and supported by Maine Department of Environment Protection, would require the Department to study methods to estimate, measure and control emissions and provide a report with recommendations. DEP has indicated that they believe this would be a positive step to take. This is a matter of public health, and we must not delay this important work. Let's show the residents of South Portland and the surrounding communities that we can n make progress helping to ensure their health and well-being.

I greatly appreciate your thoughtful consideration of the importance of LR 2700 and the matters raised in this legislation. I welcome any questions you may have.

Dear President Jackson:

Currently, oil tankers close to the Maine coast are allowed to purge dangerous gases from their cargo tanks. These gases pose health risks to people, so this practice must be banned to protect the health and safety of folks in Maine. Tankers should wait to purge these gases until they are farther out to sea, where they should then take precautions to protect their crew. We must err on the side of caution and prohibit this practice now, rather than waiting a year and hoping people don't get sick. If we wait, we're playing with fire.

This urgent issue was brought to my attention by a constituent, Mike Ames, who operated crude oil tankers in the Alaskan oil trade from 1978 to 2016. Coming across Penobscot Bay one day, he met an outbound Irving tanker coming out of Searsport. The tanker appeared to be operating at full sea speed close to shore. The emissions coming from the vessel's stack indicated to Mr. Ames that auxiliary machinery was operating. He felt that the most likely explanation was that the tanker was purging these dangerous gases. Then, downwind of the vessel, he felt vapor residue in the air. Purging is something that oil tankers have to do on a regular basis, but they should not do it so close to shore. Although this practice is highly dangerous, it's not currently illegal in Maine waters. Therefore, Maine must ban the practice.

President Jackson:

I am writing this letter of appeal for LR 2746 — "An Act to Clarify the Rights of Parties in Certain Foreclosure Actions". This bill aims to create an equitable foreclosure process for all parties. A reliable process will help to ensure Mainers continue to have access to affordable mortgage loans. We must maintain a robust real estate and mortgage market for our citizens and the economy!

The rate and availability of mortgage loans are based on the cost of funds and the risk associated with the loan transaction. Lenders could consider a mortgage a "high risk transaction" if they felt they had no recourse in the event of default. The current foreclosure process has denied lenders the right to collect on debts owed due to a minor defect in procedure, leading to a dismissal of the foreclosure. Losing a foreclosure without the opportunity to recover money lent has a huge impact on local Maine banks and credit unions.

This bill protects consumers in foreclosure, To demonstrate, highlighting two important components,;

- (1) PASSAGE OF THIS BILL WOULD NOT CHANGE THE COURT'S ABILITY TO LEVEL SANCTIONS AGAINST A LENDER. This bill specifically states the court can still impose sanctions against a lender who has acted with malfeasance, up to and including a dismissal of the action with prejudice, which would void and discharge the mortgage.
- (2) THIS BILL DOES ALLOW LENDERS WHO ACTED IN GOOD FAITH TO REMEDY THE DEFECT, BUT IT DOES NOT PERMIT THEM TO PASS ADDITIONAL COSTS ON TO THE BORROWER. Upon the approval of the court, the loan would return to its status at the time of the foreclosure filing. The borrower has no liability for interest, penalties, or other costs, including legal fees, incurred from the date of the filing of the foreclosure complaint to the date of judgment.

No lender wants to foreclose on a borrower; however, <u>banks and credit unions lend their depositors' and members' money and</u>, as fiduciaries, have a duty to ensure the money is paid back. The Maine Bankers Association and the Maine Credit Union League strongly support this bill.

I ask for your vote to allow LR 2746 An Act to Clarify the Rights of Parties in Certain Foreclosure Actions to move forward in the legislative process and have a public hearing.

President Jackson:

I am writing this letter of appeal for LR 2752 – "An Act to Restore Fish Passage for Anadromous Fish". This bill would create a fund at the Department of Marine Resources to construct, restore or enhance dams for anadromous fish passage. Restoring fish passage is key to a watershed's conservation. Reopening a watershed to once-abundant anadromous fish species – such as alewife and salmon – helps to restore the ecological balance of the watershed. Restoring fish migration also helps to revitalize a source of income for local fishermen and provide low-cost bait to local lobstermen.

Section 2 of the bill provides an appropriation for restoring the Whiting Mill Pond Dam located at the head of the tide in Whiting, Maine and installing a fishway to allow for anadromous fish passage. Located at the intersection of Routes 1 and 189, the Mill Pond creates the scenic heart of the Whiting village. Quite simply, the Mill Pond forms Whiting's identity and sense of place. Unfortunately, the dam has not received sufficient structural maintenance for many years, nor has fish passage been maintained. The dam is now considered hazardous, is in severe disrepair and prevents passage of all native migratory fish except eels. The Mill Pond plays a vital role in the current preparedness plan for fire suppression in Whiting and neighboring areas and, as such, the disrepair and neglect of the Mill Pond Dam is a serious vulnerability and weakness.

The Mill Pond Dam is currently owned by the Downeast Salmon Federation ("DSF"), who is working with the Town of Whiting and other partners to restore fish passage in the Orange River watershed. Maine Coast Heritage Trust has made the restoration of the Orange River Watershed its flagship project, noting it is "one of the most significant conservation and restoration opportunities on the coast of Maine". Reopening the watershed to once-abundant anadromous fish species - such as alewife and salmon - would be a major first step in restoring the ecological balance of the Orange River watershed and have farreaching impacts on Cobscook Bay, one of the most biodiverse marine ecosystems in the northeast Atlantic.

In view of these facts, I ask for your vote to allow LR 2752 – "An Act to Restore Fish Passage for Anadromous Fish" to move forward in the legislative process and have a public hearing.

Please accept this appeal of LR 3086, An Act to Create Frequent Users Systems Engagement Collaborative.

Homelessness has reached a crisis level in our State with reports of over 5,000 people, including 2,500 students, the highest percentage reporting from Kennebec County. The cost of our state and local day to day reaction to this crisis is unsustainable. Currently, taxpayers spend \$500,00 - 1 million per year on each chronically homeless individual in homeless shelters, emergency rooms, jails, policing measures on the street, school resources and transportation services (McKinney Vento), and in prison. More importantly, the outcomes are extremely poor.

It is my intention to appeal the Council's rejection of the following bill request:

LR 2707, An Act To Fund the Land for Maine's Future Program

Currently, funding for Land for Maine's Future depends on bonding. In recent years, the Legislature has not been able to pass bonds for Land for Maine's Future, putting projects to preserve land at risk.

I respectfully request further consideration of this important and time-sensitive legislative request for the following reasons:

The egg industry and humane organizations agree: the future of the egg industry is cage-free. It's imperative to pass LR 2897 in 2020 so egg producers can plan for the future of their businesses in an economically viable way when major egg buyers are demanding a switch to cage-free.

LR 2897 offers certainty to egg producers by establishing a reasonable timeline and by simply requiring the industry's own cage-free standards. Those standards (promulgated by the United Egg Producers) are clear, sensible, and widely in use. Without this type of legislation for basic minimum standards, a race to the bottom occurs in egg production that could undercut food safety and animal welfare.

More than 200 of the world's leading restaurant and grocery companies are requiring their suppliers to switch to cage-free systems, including McDonald's, Burger King, Hannaford, Shaw's, Walmart, Dollar Tree, IHOP, and Denny's. Nearly identical laws to LR 2987 have passed this year in Oregon and Washington with the egg industry's backing, and collaborative legislative efforts are underway in multiple other states as well,

This compromise measure is backed by the United Egg Producers and the New England Brown Egg Council, as well as the Humane Society of the United States and other leading animal protection groups.

The current statute and resultant guidelines contain definitions that are both ambiguous to interpret and difficult to use in a Geographic Information System (GIS) when creating municipal shoreland zoning maps. There are at least six municipalities in Washington County alone that are struggling with this issue. While the partnership between the University of Maine at Machias and the Washington County Council of Governments has created a GIS model to aid with the technical and financial challenges, there are still several problems with the statute that are a burden on municipalities.

In the earlier session, I had submitted a bill which would have expanded the dispatch protocols for the state's E911 system. It became clear to me as we worked that bill, that we needed more detailed input from across the system to map an appropriate path forward, and that simply implementing the additional protocols would have been disastrous. We passed that bill, and held those stakeholder meetings this summer; the PUC should be releasing its report in the near future.

I had hoped to retain the forty-five-cent surcharge that funds much of the E911 system, even though that revenue stream has not been fully utilized in the past, because it is clear that there are significant funding needs across the system that we should be able to address without further harm to local property-tax-payers. Given the perennially short funding for legislative interests, it was no surprise that Appropriations found another use for that revenue stream. Unfortunately, the revenue that remains is insufficient to meet the existing operational costs, so we must make some change as soon as possible to avoid falling short of funds.

Given what we learned this summer, I feel sure that we can make the needed changes to more fully support the public safety answering points (PSAPs) to ensure that they have the needed technology and personnel without further strain to local resources. For those reasons, I ask that the Council consider allowing this bill to be heard this session.

Under the Every Student Succeeds Act, schools share students' directory information with the United States Military. Maine schools are not currently required to provide notice to parents of what information they share with outside institutions or to ensure that this notice is provided in a clear manner. However, FERPA requires that a school disclosing "directory information" of students give parents/guardians "reasonable notice" to opt out of sharing such information. Consequently, there is a conflict between FERPA and the practices of many Maine school districts. LR 2902 requires schools to place notice on the emergency contact form sent to all parents/guardians at the beginning of the school year so that parents/guardians are aware of their right to opt out of sharing student directory information.

LR 2902 should be accepted this legislative session because the bill facilitates school districts following FERPA and Maine state law in the way they release student contact information to the United States Military. Schools should not have policies which contradict state and federal law.

I write to appeal the decision of the Legislative Council regarding LR 2742, An Act To Establish a Structured Reentry Program for the reentry of Persons from Correctional Facilities into the Community.

Maine is in the grips of a serious opioid epidemic, and a large percentage of incarcerated citizens suffer from substance abuse disorder. Due to a lack of funding, many are released with little to no support, often resulting in additional crime, victimization, overdose and death. The number of incarcerated people suffering from mental illness has also drastically increased as mental health institutions have down-sized or closed. Many leave correctional facilities with little medication and no mental health provider.

To curb the ongoing social issues caused by these tragedies, a reentry program such as "Structured Three Phase Reentry" will provide necessary programming to battle addiction and provide mental health care.

Another barrier to success is the fact that most men and women leave DOC facilities with basic education and very little vocational training, no job placement or little in the way of job prospects. Expanding education and vocational opportunities substantially reduces victimization, strengthens public safety and transforms criminals into law-abiding, taxpaying citizens.

Participating in the Structured Reentry Program enhances incarcerated citizens' chances of success upon reintegration into the community, reducing recidivism. As of May 2019, Maine State Prison housed 315 incarcerated citizens with less than a year on their sentence. How many will be prepared for society after being released from a maximum security prison with no job prospects, no place to live, no concrete plan of direction, no money and little to no reentry programming and support?

Affording incarcerated citizens the opportunity to participate in a reentry program such as "Structured Three Phase Reentry" will result in substantially reduced recidivism, a vast improvement in public safety and taxpayer dollars saved. Most importantly, fewer victims will suffer the trauma of crime. That, in itself, is priceless. For these reasons, I ask you to allow the 129th Legislature to consider LR 2742.

I write to appeal the decision of the Legislative Council regarding LR 2983, An Act To Authorize the Preparation of Racial Impact Statements for Certain Legislation. LR 2983 would allow legislators to request racial impact statements for criminal justice-related bills, ensuring that lawmakers can consider potential unintended consequences of seemingly race-neutral criminal justice legislation in order to address the alarming racial disparities in our legal system.

Although Maine's population is approximately 95% white, the most recent information from the Department of Corrections shows that at least 15.5% of men and 11% of women incarcerated in Maine's prisons are people of color. This vast overrepresentation of people of color, especially Black people, in Maine's prison system is an indication that our laws are producing different outcomes for people of color. We cannot wait to take action if we are going to address the racial disparities within our legal system. This bill alone will not solve the problem, but it represents a practical first step.

Racial impact statements are tools for lawmakers to examine—before they vote—the potential racial disparities a piece of legislation could create. These statements are akin to the fiscal notes that the Office of Fiscal and Policy Review creates to predict unforeseen fiscal considerations. Just like fiscal notes can prevent lawmakers from enacting costly legislation, racial impact analyses can prevent the Legislature from furthering the disproportionate impact the criminal justice system has on people of color. Maine would not be the first to implement such a system; states as ideologically diverse as Connecticut, Florida, Iowa, New Jersey and Oregon have such mechanisms in their laws, and legislatures in eight other states have considered legislation to implement racial impact statements.

We know by looking at incarceration that we have a racial injustice problem in our legal system. We, as legislators, must act immediately to stem the flow of laws that affect people differently based on the color of their skin. I urge the Legislative Council to reverse its decision on LR 2983.

I write to appeal the decision of the Legislative Council regarding LR 3080, An Act To Amend the Laws Regarding Summonses for Certain Misdemeanor Offenses. This bill would help address the immediate and ongoing jail funding crisis by reducing incarceration for low-level, non-violent crimes without jeopardizing public safety.

LR 3080 would reduce cycles of re-incarceration and recidivism by eliminating life disruptions caused by incarceration, such as the inability to work, care for children and loved ones, pay taxes, obtain schooling and contribute to one's community.

Maine's violent crime rate is the lowest in the country, and our property crime rate is fourth-lowest in the nation. Yet our jails consistently report operating in the red, forcing sheriffs and jail administrators to come to the Legislature every session requesting more and different funding. Jail beds are costly (around \$100 per day), yet many of the individuals in Maine jails are being held for low-level, non-violent crimes that do not justify a secure facility. For example:

- Misdemeanors, or crimes punishable by less than a year in jail, are a leading cause of pretrial jail stays;
- In 2017, the Class E crime of "Violation of Condition of Release" was the leading reason for jail stays in Androscoggin, Cumberland and Oxford Counties and within the top ten reasons for jails stays in Penobscot, Piscataquis, Waldo and Washington Counties, and there is no reason to think this has changed today; and,
- Failure to pay fines or fees was in the top ten reasons for jail stays in Cumberland, Oxford, Penobscot, Piscataquis, Waldo and Washington Counties.

Incentivizing police officers to issue summonses instead of arresting people for low-level, non-violent crimes will save significant money, help families stay together and keep people employed.

As we continue our conversation about jail funding, this proposal can be a key component of the solution. I respectfully urge you to allow LR 3080 to be considered by the 129th Legislature.

I am writing today to formally request an appeal of LR 2820, "An Act to Reduce Pay Disparity in Maine Schools". While it is to be commended that the Department of Education is working to resolve this issue internally, helping lower income school districts improve the quality of their educational offerings is critical. This bill does that by guaranteeing that every school district is reimbursed through the Regional Adjustment component of Essential Programs and Services formula at the state average (1.0). It does not reduce those school districts which are above 1.0, but does increase those which are below 1.0 over a three-year period.

I understand the temptation to hold off on this matter until the next biennial budget, and see the value in taking a comprehensive look at how the EPS formula can be improved to better ensure a higher quality of education statewide, yet, issues like the one I have outlined above are exactly the types of concerns that should be addressed during an emergency session when legislators have fewer bills and more time to work though the nuances of each proposal. Additionally, as the Department itself has indicated a desire to address school funding issues in the coming year, this legislation may be an appropriate vehicle to do so.

I am writing today to formally request an appeal of LR 2835, "An Act to Establish Separate Prosecutorial Districts in Downeast Maine." If approved, this bill would allow the people of Hancock and Washington counties to vote on whether to share a district attorney or establish separate offices, and if approved, establish an orderly process for dissolving Prosecutorial District 7, that will not conflict with state law.

Under the proposal, Hancock and Washington counties would vote on a referendum question during the November 2020 General election on whether to stay in DA 7 or dissolve it. If the people vote to stay, the process ends there. If they vote to dissolve, each county would have time to seek out other partners or establish their own DA office like Aroostook County has. The counties would have a year to sort this out and introduce any necessary legislation prior to the 2022 DA election. DA 7 would not be dissolved until January 1, 2023, the start of the new DA's term of office.

By rejecting this appeal now, that decision will be taken out of the voters hands as legislation will not be able to be introduced until January 2021. Assuming it then cleared the legislature in June 2021, people voted in November 2021, and was approved by both counties, candidates for the new DA districts would have less than a month to decide whether to run. The 130th could also carry it over, creating further chaos and disarray.

Hancock and Washington counties are radically different. Hancock is smaller, more urban, and more closely connected to larger service centers such as Bangor, whereas Washington County is much more rural, spread out, and geographically diverse. To drive this point home, it takes two hours (or more) to get from Steuben in the west to Danforth in the north; and an hour and a half to get to Calais in the east. These differences have created an imbalance in access to justice which has only grown over the years as demographics in both counties have changed since the introduction of prosecutorial districts in the 70s. At the very least, the voters of both counties should have a chance to weigh in before electing their next district attorney to a four year term.

I would like to appeal your decision to not let LR 2686, "An Act To Ensure Maine Cable Service Franchises Are Nonexclusive" move forward. This legislation is indeed an emergency because current Maine law conflicts with federal law.

Here is the Federal Statute that says all cable franchises must be non-exclusive:

"(1) A franchising authority may award, in accordance with the provisions of this subchapter, 1 or more franchises within its jurisdiction; except that a franchising authority may not grant an exclusive franchise and may not unreasonably refuse to award an additional competitive franchise."

And here is the Maine Statute which incorrectly states that exclusive franchises may be awarded: "5. Franchise agreements or contracts. The State specifically authorizes municipal officers pursuant to ordinances to contract on such terms and conditions and impose such fees as are in the best interests of the municipality, including the grant of **exclusive** or nonexclusive franchises for a period not to exceed 15 years, for the placing and maintenance of cable television systems and appurtenances, or parts thereof, along public ways and including contracts with cable system operators that receive the services of television signal transmission offered by any public utilities using public ways for such transmission."

Dear President Jackson,

I would like to appeal your decision to not let LR 2873, "An Act To Remove Barriers to Entry to the Profession of Dental Therapy and Expand Access for the Underserved Dental Patient Population" move forward.

The 128th Legislature has been largely focused on access to affordable healthcare, and we have passed a number of bills to help with that effort. LR 2873 is another piece of legislation in this effort. Dental care can be hard to find in rural Maine. It is not uncommon for patients to drive over an hour for a regular cleaning. Dental Therapists can help to mitigate this problem.

A dental therapist is a licensed professional practicing as part of an expanded dental team. This bill is an emergency because sadly current law prevents Dental Therapists licensure due to updated A.D.A. Commission On Dental Accreditation certification standards, and also prevents Maine student applicants from applying to Dental Therapy programs as well as practicing in Maine.

Licensed Dental Therapists would provide treatments beyond the level of hygienist. Since 2009, Minnesota's Licensed Dental Therapists have shown significant patient growth in settings that serve not only the general population but low-income, uninsured and under-served populations, especially in a dental health professional shortage area similar to Maine.
