

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INTRODUCTION

This volume contains the titles and summaries of the 105 bill requests filed before cloture, rejected at the Legislative Council's October 25, 2021 meeting and appealed by the deadline on November 1, 2021. The council accepted 107 of 329 requests at its October 25th meeting. Part 7 contains a record of the vote for the requests and is sorted by sponsors' names in alphabetical order. Each sponsor's appeal notice is reproduced as received preceded immediately by the ballot of the vote at the October 25th meeting for the appealed request. Part 8 contains a list of appealed bills by broad subject. Part 9 contains a list of bill requests in order alphabetically by sponsor.

It is my intention to appeal the Council's rejection of the following bill request:

LR 2417, An Act To Establish the Commission on the Future of Maine's Intertidal Lands.

Currently in Maine, court precedent on intertidal lands is based on the interpretation of centuries-old directives. For change to occur, legislative action must be taken, otherwise the court will continue to rely on outdated precedent. Establishing a commission to examine and make recommendations on the state's intertidal lands during the second regular session would put the 131st Legislature in a strong position to consider those recommendations and propose legislation. The timing on this is ideal.

I look forward to addressing the Council to discuss this proposal and to clarify its need for inclusion as emergency legislation for the upcoming session.

Dear Speaker Fecteau and honorable members of Legislative Council,

This bill idea was brought to me by the Maine Prosecutors Association and the Maine Sherriff's Association and is supported by both organizations. Last April, at the onset of the pandemic, the state's child abuse hotline received a 32 percent drop in calls. While that may sound like good news, it's just the opposite. Experts believed that with schools closing, less reports were being made, not that less kids were in need of help. It doesn't take much to verify these suspicions. While calls and reports dropped, the number of children in Maine's custody rose 7 percent from January to October of last year. There is no time to spare, we have to pull every lever we have.

The current Class D crime of endangering the welfare of a child under § 554, sub-§1, ¶C is established when a person violates a duty or care or protection to a child and thereby recklessly endangers the child. This bill amends the crime by enacting more serious penalty provisions if the person's reckless violation of the duty of care or protection results in death of or serious bodily injury to the child.

Thank you for your time, and I urge you to vote to allow this bill to be considered during the coming legislative session.

Dear Speaker Fecteau and honorable members of Legislative Council,

Maine is losing too many children to abuse and neglect. Over the last 10 years, over 100 Maine children have died because of abuse and neglect, in addition to thousands of children that are subjected to similar situations in our state daily. The need for oversight of the Child Protective Process has become self-evident. When Nebraska faced similar challenges, the state created more rigorous oversight to protect kids. This bill is modeled off a law implemented there with success. Last April, at the onset of the pandemic, the state's child abuse hotline received a 32 percent drop in calls. While that may sound like good news, it's just the opposite. Experts believed that with schools closing, less reports were being made, not that less kids were in need of help. It doesn't take much to verify these suspicions. While calls and reports dropped, the number of children in Maine's custody rose 7 percent from January to October of last year. There is no time to spare, we have to pull every lever we have. The reality is the Ombudsman's office doesn't have the oversight and power sufficient to force change in OFCS to sufficiently protect Maine kids.

This bill would create a new Office of Inspector General that would be able to provide ongoing oversight for the Department and Child Protection to appropriately address the crisis we face. The status quo isn't working, it's time to think outside of the box.

Thank you for your time, and I urge you to vote to allow this bill to be considered during the coming legislative session.

This bill would add to the definitions of "serious harm" and "jeopardy" in the Child and Family Services and Child Protection Act reference to one or more adults in the home who have been previously convicted of any crime of violence, including but not limited to Class D domestic violence assault, without documented proof of successful completion of a state-certified batterers' intervention program. It would similarly amend the laws regarding protection orders and guardianship of minors to provide guidance to the court in ordering protection orders and appointing guardians.

This bill is necessary because it will amend the law to exclude municipal firefighters and other emergency responders from what is currently written in sub-section 1-B of the <u>State Employee</u> <u>Health Insurance Program</u> which outlines ineligibility for qualifying for the Maine Public Employees Retirement System, "members of the Maine Municipal Association and employees of counties and municipalities and instrumentalities thereof." The Professional Firefighter of Maine asked for this bill to ensure that we can explicitly exclude them from the definition of ineligibility and clarify this law. This will strengthen the Retired County and Municipal Law Enforcement Officers and Municipal Firefighters Health Insurance Program.

Health care and retirement benefits are an important part of attracting and retaining local public safety professionals and we are already facing a shortage of emergency workers. Thank you for your time, and I urge you to vote to allow this bill to be considered during the coming legislative session.

I would like to appeal the Legislative Council's decision rejecting my second session bill, LR 2173, "An Act Regarding the Application of Antimicrobial Agents by School Facilities Staff."

On December 31, 2020, Governor Mills implemented an Executive Order suspending the requirements in 22 M.R.S.A. §§ 1471-C(5) and 1471-D(l), and Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry Board of Pesticides Control Rule (BPC Rule) Ch. 01-026, Ch. 10, § 2 (I) regarding the powered application of general use antimicrobial agents by certain personnel. Many schools in my district utilized the suspension of rules to disinfect their facilities, and did so without incident.

Now that this Executive Order is no longer in effect, staff must go through hoops in order to continue to use the technology they have been using safely for months. This bill would allow school and Emergency Medical Services who were exempted under the Governor's Executive Order, to remain exempt from certification and licensing requirements.

I ask that you reconsider your decision to not let this legislation move forward. Thank you.

Dear Speaker Fecteau,

I would like to appeal the Legislative Council's decision rejecting my second session bill, LR 2215, "An Act To Provide for a Religious Exemption from All Vaccine Mandates."

First, this legislation was meant to only apply to the COVID-19 vaccinations, however, my aide misinterpreted my intentions. Therefore, should this legislation move forward, I would want it drafted to only apply to COVID-19 vaccines.

Second, this legislation is becoming more and more emergency as the days tick by. The Governor's mandate requiring healthcare employees to be vaccinated is already having drastic effects on our healthcare system. Emergency Medical Services are being suspended or curtailed across the state. On Tuesday, October 26th Legislators received an email from Maine Health indicating that: "MaineHealth hospitals have 67 patients languishing in our Emergency Departments waiting for appropriate behavioral health placement. [...] At the same time, our hospitals also have over 100 patients who are ready for discharge, but are awaiting skilled or nursing facility placement. These patients would better be served in less restrictive settings, but are stuck awaiting discharge to an appropriate level of care. The long-term care crisis is affecting patients across settings. To keep patients who no longer need acute care in the acute care setting is not patient-centered care. [...] The end result: yesterday morning, we had a total of 23 inpatient beds available for patients <u>across our entire system</u>."

Clearly something must be done to address this crisis. Twenty-three inpatient beds across the entire MaineHealth system is, frankly, terrifying. I ask that you reconsider your decision to not let this legislation move forward. Thank you.

Dear Speaker Fecteau:

It is my intention to appeal the Council's rejection of LR 2122, An Act To Prohibit a Regulated Utility from Disconnecting Service to a Designated Public Safety Facility without 60 Days' Advance Notice.

Increasingly, public safety facilities require electricity to be fully functional. Lifesaving equipment for ambulances and fire trucks requires charging. Police are adopting EVs. Even diesel engines typically use electric block heaters in the wintertime. Gas and water utilities are likewise essential to the public safety role. LR 2122 would work with our utilities to design a formal notification process that protects public safety by avoiding disconnections that may otherwise result in tragedy.

Twice in recent years that I am aware of, CMP has nearly shut down public safety facilities in Maine. In each case, the issue was a billing error relating to CMP's billing system, which is based on Boston and is often not well suited to towns that pay multiple bills for multiple buildings and meters.

Most recently, a CMP worker arrived to shut down the volunteer fire department in Bucksfield on June 30. Had no one been present, the building would have been shut down. The Council may also hear from Bradley Plante on this matter: Mr. Plante was Interim Town Manager when the error occurred.

I trust the Council will want to do all it can to avert such potential safety problems in the future. I look forward to addressing the Council on Nov. 18 to discuss this proposal and to clarify its need for inclusion as emergency legislation for the upcoming session.

It is my intention to appeal the Council's rejection of LR 2124, An Act To Require the Public Utilities Commission To Specify the Percentage Increase or Decrease in the Delivery Portion of an Electricity Customer's Bill in All Communications Relating to Delivery Rate Adjustments.

Electricity bills include both supply charges, which are market-driven, and delivery charges, which are established by the PUC's three appointed commissioners.

If a given set of commissioners wants to downplay the impact of a rate increase they have allowed, they may describe the percentage increase to the overall bill, while failing to mention the increase they have allowed. This may be understandable politically, but it lacks honesty and transparency. It is done too often, it needs to stop, and it needs to stop now.

By requiring the PUC to fully and consistently disclose the impact of its own decisions, LR 2124 will provide for proper public understanding.

Now is a crucial time for such transparency, since fuel prices are increasing sharply and Maine electricity delivery rates are also increasing by double digits year over year. By early January, we expect very challenging headlines relating to electricity costs. We owe it to Maine's captive utility customers to be fully transparent as they make important consumer decisions.

I look forward to addressing the Council on Nov. 18 to discuss this proposal and to clarify its need for inclusion as emergency legislation for the upcoming session.

It is my intention to appeal the Council's rejection of LR 2493, An Act To Improve Intensive Behavioral Health and Public Safety Case Management Services by Providing a Pay Increase to Intensive Case Managers.

Maine recently increased pay to child protective caseworkers, but did not do so for intensive case managers. It is past time to consider making ICMs whole by restoring them to parity with child protective staff. Both are critically important functions.

Intensive Case Managers' duties include public safety and ensuring adherence to court orders for those found not criminally responsible for usually serious crimes, which include murder of children and/or adults, aggravated assault, arson, sex offenses, and other harmful acts.

A few years ago, Child Protective Caseworkers (a pay grade lower than ICMs) and their supervisors received a \$5/hr stipend. As a result, ICMs and their supervisors are now paid less, and are looking to be made whole with Child Protective Case Managers.

LR2493 is essential to maintaining public safety and staff retention. A \$5/hr stipend would make Intensive Case Managers whole with Child Protective Caseworkers. It is my understanding that the increase would affect approximately 40 positions.

I look forward to addressing the Council on Nov. 18 to discuss this proposal and to clarify its need for inclusion as emergency legislation for the upcoming session.

I am writing to appeal the Legislative Council's decision regarding LR: 2400 "An Act To Create the Logging Contractor Relations Program."

Logging companies are suffering immensely because of lost market opportunities, increased operational costs and increased bureaucratic requirements. They need assistance that is specific to their businesses to assist with efficiency and profitability. Currently, there is no one in public service at the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry that is dedicated specifically to the their needs, similar to landowners, foresters and farmers.

The Maine Forest Service has at least 25 licensed foresters on staff but no one from the logging industry to assist with logging issues. Licensed foresters have tremendous knowledge on forestry policy, but generally have a bias or conflict of interest with respect to the well-being of logging businesses.

The Maine Forest Service has shared private and confidential information regarding logging company practices with outside organizations in the recent past. It has also worked against logging contractors blatantly in other public proceedings to ensure some in the private sector have an advantage over others. These practices have put logging companies at risk. It is clear that as a result of this conflict, the logging community should have an advocate that works to protect the best interest of logging companies but can also assist with issues pertaining to logging companies in a private and confidential manner.

The Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife has a landowner advocate that works to educate landowners but also to advocate on their behalf. The Department of Agriculture Conservation and Forestry has a mission to assist farmers directly and does a very good job at it. DACF needs a similar position to work with the logging community directly.

Earlier this year, the Legislature passed and the Governor signed L.D. 1618, Resolve, To Place a Temporary Moratorium on the Approval of Any New Motor Vehicle Registration Plates and Initiate a Registration Plate Working Group. As you may know, there are parties who had embarked on meeting the standards for a new specialty plate when this moratorium was enacted. My bill, L.R. 2146, will allow these organizations, who have already invested time and money in developing a specialty license plate, to continue the process.

This bill is of particular interest to two organizations who have already invested considerable resources to secure new specialty plates. First, Barbara Bush Children's Hospital was in the process of launching its plate into the commercial, motorcycle and trailer markets when the Bureau of Motor Vehicles ordered it to stop. This will deprive the hospital of funds that would be used to provide life-saving services to the state's most vulnerable children.

Second, Maine Outdoor Brands (MOB), an "alliance of Maine's outdoor product, service and retail companies united to drive Maine's \$3 billion outdoor recreation economy," has collected thousands of signatures — and dollars — from Mainers who want to support its mission. MOB board members are concerned that they will lose all of the money invested in the plate and have to return money to all who have reserved one. Further, it's quite possible that cancelling these orders will damage the organization's credibility through no fault of its own.

I have no issue with L.D. 1618. I understand that a pause in this program is warranted. However, it's not fair to the Barbara Bush Children's Hospital or to Maine Outdoor Brands to change the rules in the middle of the game. My bill will simply "grandfather in" groups whose specialty plates have been approved by the state and are already far along in the process. I urge you to reverse your decision and let this bill be heard in this coming session. Thank you for your consideration.

Dear Speaker Fecteau,

The Help Fix ME (HFM) program in the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry (DACF) distributes vouchers to qualified individuals who can't afford to spay their pets. This program is funded through a small fee on commercial pet foods. Its goal is to minimize the proliferation of stray animals all over the state.

In January of this year, I sent a letter to DACF Commissioner Beal outlining the concerns of a group of professionals who have witnessed the program's decline in recent years (see attached). These include Susan Hall and Sharon Secovich of Spay Maine; Esther Mechler, Executive Director of Marian's Dream; and the executive directors of several Maine shelters. These individuals were the original advocates and supporters when the program began some twenty years ago.

According to Ms. Mechler, who has over 30 years' experience in this field at the state and national level, we must attend to HFM because the phone often goes unanswered and the voicemail is always full; turnaround time for those who do receive vouchers is so long that an unwanted litter is often born in the meantime; paperwork and checks to providers are often lost; the program regularly shuts down for no apparent reason; there is little transparency and no clear oversight of the program, and most importantly, the number of spaying vouchers redeemed has dramatically declined (pre-Covid).

In response to my letter, DACF began to address these problems. However, progress has been slow. My proposed bill, LR 2247, would allow the Legislature to mandate the outsourcing of HFM if sufficient measurable progress is not made in the near future (exact time frame to be determined). Current statute already allows DACF to issue Requests for Proposals for this purpose. There are several organizations in Maine that could capably manage the program. And DACF has only one employee who manages this program as one of many other job responsibilities, so we won't be "cutting state jobs" by outsourcing this particular program.

The failure of Help Fix ME results in thousands of unwanted animals with no hope of finding homes. I urge you to reverse your decision and allow the Legislature its proper role of oversight of the executive branch and intervention when appropriate. Many thanks for your consideration.

Since before the pandemic, towing companies faced an increasingly unbearable cost burden resulting from removal and storage of abandoned vehicles. Unlike typical tow jobs that involve a customer who pays for tow services, the cost to tow an abandoned vehicle and then the many associated bureaucratic and administrative costs imposed by the state during the process of transferring ownership of the vehicle cause tow companies around the state extreme hardship. The longer the state paperwork process takes, the longer the vehicles are stored in tow lots and the greater the cost incurred by those companies. The pandemic has dramatically slowed down bureaucratic processes, resulting in increased delays and higher costs.

This bill would raise the daily storage rate from \$30 to \$50, a slight increase that would still make a meaningful difference for tow truck owners and drivers.

Last session, the Legislature overwhelmingly approved <u>LD 1242</u>, "An Act To Ensure Appropriate Oversight of Maine's Medical Marijuana Program," which gave lawmakers, caregivers and patients a voice in the rulemaking process for Maine's medical use of marijuana program (MMUMP) regulations. We made great strides in ensuring that those who utilize the program, as well as caregivers who supply patients, have their voices heard. Now, as a new rulemaking package approaches, it is critical that we once again act in a timely fashion to ensure that everyone has a seat at the table, and that we prevent harmful new regulations from hurting our dedicated caregivers and the patients who rely on them.

The bill proposes to do a few things:

- 1) It protects patient safety by requiring a batch number to be added to labels for product in MMUMP. The required Batch Number will facilitate product recall if necessary. This would be an alternative safety measure instead of the harmful "track and trace" system, which discriminates against caregivers without internet access.
- 2) It clarifies the definition in the MMUMP for "tincture," the crux of pediatric and geriatric treatment in the program.
- 3) It clarifies the process and procedure for certification of pediatric patients, bringing it into statute. It requires a medical provider who certifies a minor patient, to provide the parent/guardian with a means to contact the doctor on and off business hours when necessary
- 4) It calls for release of monthly sales data from the Department of Revenue Services for the MMUMP. Citizens, legislators, and municipalities have a right to analyze and consider this data when making decisions about the program in their communities.

This bill deals with safety and transparency in MMUMP – which are two aspects of any government program that should never be delayed. Impending rulemaking also requires us to act now, rather than later.

Thank you for your consideration. I would urge you to vote "yes" to allow this bill to be considered in the coming legislative session.

I write to respectfully appeal the Legislative Council's decision to reject the request for introduction of LR 2261: An Act To Restore Funding to the State's Tobacco Prevention and Control Program. This bill would restore critical funding for the state's tobacco prevention and control program. In SFY 2022-2023, this important program saw a funding cut of \$5 million per year. As a result, the program will reduce investments in critical areas, including evaluation and surveillance, mass-reach health communications/counter-marketing, tobacco cessation programming, and targeted prevention and treatment efforts aimed at reducing tobacco use among populations that disproportionately use tobacco (e.g., LGBTQ populations, rural populations, racial/ethnic minorities, individuals with low-income, and individuals with mental and behavioral health conditions), the same populations disproportionately affected by COVID-19.

The rate of e-cigarette use among Maine youth nearly doubled from 2017 to 2019 (the last year for which we have data: 28.7% vs. 15.3%), with some of the greatest increases seen in Piscataquis (26.6% vs. 6.7%) and Oxford (30.9% vs. 12.3%) counties. Cutting program funding creates more space for the tobacco industry to hook Maine kids on their harmful products. While we are in the midst of a global pandemic, fighting a virus that attacks our lungs, we need to be doing all that we can to prevent tobacco use and to help current smokers to quit.

Unfortunately, national and Maine data show increased tobacco product sales during COVID-19 and school staff report ongoing challenges with the youth e-cigarette epidemic, including increased levels of addiction among students who are vaping. At a time when Maine employers are facing staffing shortages and increased health care costs, and when Maine and the rest of the nation continue to wrestle with the COVID-19 pandemic, maintaining investments in proven programs that keep our population healthy and reduce health care costs is necessary.

Tobacco use contributes to higher risks for serious illness from COVID-19 and is the leading preventable risk factor for numerous other diseases that are the leading causes of death of Maine people – cancer, heart disease, lung disease and stroke. Smoking is associated with increased risk for dementia and Alzheimer's disease.

In Maine, our tobacco use rates for both children and adults are higher than national averages. Maine also has the 6th highest rate of tobacco-related cancer cases and the 11th highest rate of tobacco-related cancer deaths in the nation. Smoking causes 2,400 deaths each year in Maine, including 30% of all cancer deaths. Tobacco use is a leading cause of health disparities. Smoking is estimated to cost Maine \$811 million in direct health care costs, including \$262 million in annual Medicaid costs. Smoking costs each Maine household an estimated \$1,339 each year in state and federal taxes because of smoking-caused, government expenditures; and costs Maine employers \$647 million in lost productivity.

Maine's revenue forecasts are projecting surpluses and the state's rainy-day fund is at a historically high level. In addition, Maine is bringing in nearly \$200 million/year in tobacco-related revenue. Restoring the funding cut to Maine's tobacco prevention and control program will result in a program funding level that is less than 5% of the state's tobacco-related revenue; yet it will pay dividends in terms of lives and health care costs saved.

Now is not the time to turn the clock back on significant gains the state has made in reducing tobacco use. If we do, we will pay for it not only in lives, but also in growing health care costs and reduced productivity. I respectfully request that Legislative Council reconsider its decision and support the introduction of LR 2261.

Aquifer extraction approved by one local community for commercial or other purposes may indeed draw water from one community, but because aquifers typically cover a span of several communities and can be connected to a vital network of bodies of water that impact many habitats, local extraction can have far broader regional consequences. What one town allows for extraction can in fact impact many communities and other bodies of water. Therefore, it would be wise for the State of Maine to have an overarching policy applicable to all communities, to protect localities and habitats regionally, given that one community's policies can impact many more.

Additionally, when water extraction for commercial or other use could potentially threaten the existence of an aquifer permanently, that meets the threshold of a compelling state interest and the state should act accordingly to mitigate such circumstances.

I respectfully request the Legislative Council review this proposal further, as I believe it to meet the criteria of Emergency Legislation.

As various mining companies are currently pursuing up to three different areas in Maine of which we are aware, it is timely that we modernize our outdated mining excise tax before any mine is permitted in Maine.

The tax rate has not been updated since 1981 and can currently be as low as 0.9%, compared to a higher rate of 3-7% in all other states. Whatever rate we can negotiate would be much better for our state than the current rate we have, far off from the acceptable standard.

The language in the excise tax law contradicts parts of recently changed laws to mining operations. This should be clarified. In the 128th legislative session, many legislators were aware the mining excise tax was non conforming to the mining bill that was passed and should have been updated. A previous proposal, LD 1283: An Act to Modernize the Mining Excise Tax, was a concept draft introduced as a remedy. Stakeholders sought to continue to work on this issue and introduce legislation in a future session. With several interested mining companies actively seeking projects in Maine, I find it logical that now is the time we finally update the tax rate to more modern standards before any projects advance.

For the past few decades, Federally Recognized Tribes have sought from the State of Maine the right of "Indian Gaming" that was authorized by Congress in 1988 and made available to most Tribes throughout the United States. Part of the intent of this federal law was to support the economic and social welfare of Tribal Communities, especially those struggling in rural America. To date, this economic tool has not been made available to the Federally Recognized Tribes known in Augusta as the Malisset, Micmac, Passamaquoddy, and Penboscot.

Over the past three decades, the Maine Legislature has often supported Tribal Gaming overwhelmingly and has negotiated in good faith with Tribal communities to find resolution mutually beneficial for the Tribes and the State. As the Legislative Branch is the branch that has most actively been working with Tribes on issues of gaming, economics, and sovereignty, it would be most efficient and effective for the Legislature to be granted authority to conduct a formal process of carrying out government to government negotiations with Federally Recognized Tribes. This would allow the best path forward for Tribes to participate in an economic venture that could strengthen their resources needed to respond to many emergency situations that exist in their community.

Thank you for your consideration of LR 2258, "An Act To Allow Customers To Opt Out of Paper Delivery Tickets." I urge you and my other colleagues on Legislative Council to please vote "YES" to allow this measure to be considered by the Legislature in the Second Regular Session.

This resolution would allow customers to opt out of paper delivery tickets for fuel deliveries and to receive email delivery tickets instead. As it stands, every time a fuel truck driver delivers to a home, they are required to provide a "meter stamped" ticket that proves to the customer they received the gallons they're being billed for. However, most meters in the trucks are electronic and linked to the truck's computing system. This means that most customers receive an email immediately. Many customers like receiving an emailed copy over a paper copy because it's faster, easier to keep records, doesn't waste paper and comes directly to them.

With the current computing system so widely used automatically providing a digital receipt, it's redundant for most customers to get both an email and a hard copy ticket. Furthermore, it slows down the delivery system. Most trucks can't move until metered transaction is completed, so drivers are bogged down by inefficiencies as they prepare the paper slip and walk back to the residence in sometimes perilous conditions to deliver the ticket. At a time when it is so essential to have access to heating fuel, efforts to make the system more safe and efficient are pertinent. Additionally, fewer direct interactions between customers and drivers lowers contact points for both parties. This increases workplace safety for the drivers who are going from door to door during the pandemic.

The Maine Energy Marketers Association support changing the law to allow for electronic emailed tickets so that drivers have more efficient fuel routes. The current statue requires the paper delivery ticket, and there is a fine for violating the law. It's an outdated policy that was established in 1973 and needs immediate change.

I am writing to you because I would like to appeal the Legislative Council's decision regarding LR 2303, An Act To Prohibit Invasion of Privacy on Property by Surveillance Cameras. If accepted, this bill will lawfully prohibit the harassment and invasion of private property by the use of fixed or mounted camera surveillance devices directed toward the aggrieved person's private property.

I consider this bill an emergency because, although the Legislature passed a bill to prohibit the invasion of privacy with the use of aerial surveillance, such as drones, that bill—now law—does not protect against the invasion of privacy by fixed or mounted cameras recording activity on private property. For two years, since one of my constituents first brought this issue to my attention, I have consulted with local and state police, as well as the York County District Attorney Kathryn Slattery, and all parties agree that the current legislation does not resolve this issue. In other words, there is a clear need for a specific prohibition on this particular violation of privacy rights.

If we regulate and restrict the use of fixed or mount surveillance cameras and devices with LR 2303, then we can protect, and strengthen, privacy protections across the State of Maine.

If accepted, this bill would have the potential to establish a program for the storage of prescription drugs, firearms, and dangerous weapons. This bill proposes to make funding available for persons to purchase gun storage units with a state grant that would cover a percentage of the cost.

I consider this bill an emergency because, although the Legislature passed <u>LD 1140</u>, An Act To Establish a Sales Tax Exemption for the Purchase of Firearm Safety Devices, the Legislature must do more to prevent accidental firearm deaths. <u>According to the CDC</u>, the data shows that 163 Mainers died from firearm deaths in 2019. In fact, Maine's firearm mortality rate was 11.5 which is over 6 times the homicide rate in the State of Maine.

In preparation for this upcoming session, I have met with the Department of Public Safety, the Executive Branch, and the Sportsman's Alliance. Everyone agrees that this bill would promote gun safety in the State of Maine. Speaker Fecteau and Distinguished Members of the Legislative Council,

I am writing to day to appeal your rejection of LR 2181.

The situation is that the Dept of Corrections is allowed by the Dept of IFW to farm 5 acres of an 8 acre field in the Bud Leavitt Wildlife Management Area in Charleston. Currently, they are farming 2.5 acres and have tilled the other 2.5 acres and added nutrients to ready it for planting next year.

The problem is there isn't any water source in the field and, of course, watering the crops significantly increases the yield. The unfortunate issue is that they must haul water from the Correctional Facility over a half mile away to the vegetable plot. During the dry spells the past couple of seasons they were hauling 2500 gallons of water per day in a 500 gallon container. That's 5 trips per day. Then the crops are watered by hand. In the later part of the season they were only using 1000-1200 gallons a day.

The solution is to allow this bill to go forward and, hopefully, it will get passed, allowing a well in the field. Once the well is established, an irrigation system can be installed to water the doubled crop acreage and cut down considerably on the hassles associated with hauling water.

Thank you again for allowing me to appeal in writing and I am willing to appear in person to justify my request.

I hope the Legislative Council will revise their decision and allow this bill to proceed for the Second Regular Session of the 130th Legislature.

This bill is an emergency. During deliberations on other bills related to the retired teacher health care program, we learned current state statute required funding to cover the unfunded liability of the state and teacher retiree health care program to be placed into an irrevocable trust. However, there is no evidence such a trust was created. Not only will this Resolve help us attempt to understand the history of the state's efforts to create a trust to protect these funds, but we believe moving the current funding into a trust could save the state significant resources.

My hope with this Resolve is to both understand how we can help move the state forward in creating the trust for these funds, as currently called for in the state law, and also to create a reporting system to make sure this important task is completed.

I am appealing the rejection of 2 bills as follows:

LR: 2254 An Act To Amend the Composition and Powers of the Deadly Force Review Panel

LR: 2255 An Act To Repeal the Law Regarding the County Jail Reimbursement Fee

Rationale:

LR 2254 is a bill that will add three civil liberty members to the Panel in place of three of the law enforcement members. The Panel is currently stacked with 11 out of 15 members who represent law enforcement. This bias has hampered the work of the Deadly Force Review Panel, which has ended up just rubber stamping the "justified" rulings by the Attorney General's Office. Currently, the Attorney General's Office has ruled every police use of deadly force justified, even in cases where the victim was unarmed. The current tabulation in Maine is approximately 190-0, all justified. A state that is unwilling to admit to mistakes is not a functioning democracy. In Maine, the state and police are always right, the people are always wrong. It reminds one of the terrible lessons we learned in George Orwell's "Animal Farm". This bill will bring forth more civilian oversight to this process. The bill will also empower the Panel to rule a police shooting unjustified, a practice that is being adopted today in may other states that are adopting independent civilian police oversight and criminal justice reforms, resulting in accountability that will enhance the public's faith in law enforcement.

LR 2255 is a bill I brought forward because several criminal defense lawyers have told me that several judges are still assessing jail fees as part of a prison or jail sentence. People convicted and sentenced to County jail are already fined and sentenced to jail time. Adding jail costs to the sentence of an incarcerated individual amounts to double jeopardy. An incarcerated individual is already required to pay fines, restitution to victims, and to serve time behind bars. The taxpayers are already funding the jails. Adding jail costs to a sentence just guarantees that the incarcerated individual will never succeed on the outside once released. Fines, restitution, and or jail time are the accepted punishment among the vast majority of judges. However, a couple of judges are still adding jail costs to a sentence, despite the fact that the vast majority of justices no longer use this practice for the reasons I have outlined above.

I am writing to appeal the Legislative Council's decision regarding LR: 2127 "An Act Regarding the Authorization of Services Performed by Emergency Medical Services Personnel."

This legislation was summited to continue to work on trying to solve the rural healthcare crisis we have in Maine. Last session I worked with the folks from Jackman and others to pass LD 1290 "An Act To Amend the Statement of Purpose of the Maine Emergency Medical Services Act of 1982 To Include Emergency Responses That Do Not Require Transportation." Since then they have discovered an additional language issue that has significant implications for EMS clinicians and clinics operating right now. Here is the description of the issue I received from Dr. Jonnathan Busko who I worked on the prior legislation with.

In 2019, subsection 7 was added to MRS 32 § 85, which reads:

32 M.R.S. § 85(7)

7. Delegation. This chapter may not be construed to prohibit a person licensed as an emergency medical services person from rendering medical services in a hospital setting if those services are:

A. Rendered in the person's capacity as an employee of the hospital; [PL 2019, c. 609, §1 (NEW).]

B. Authorized by the hospital; and [PL 2019, c. 609, §1 (NEW).]

C. Delegated in accordance with section 2594-A or 3270-A. [PL 2019, c. 609, §1 (NEW).]

The intention was to be clear that EMS licensees could also work in non-EMS settings under delegated practice without oversight from MEMS (since they would not be working under their EMS license). Immediately after this went into effect, not only emergency departments but also non-hospital settings such as urgent care centers and clinics across the state hired EMTs and paramedics to augment their clinical staff. In a recent discussion with Maine EMS and the Board of Medicine, there is concern that right now there are dozens of physicians, PAs and EMS licensees working in these non-hospital settings who are unknowingly violating the EMS statute and potentially the delegated practice statute,

We believe this rises to the level of an emergency because if not rectified, this could lead to immediate disciplinary actions up to and including license suspension for these EMS providers, physicians, and PAs.

Here is the proposed language we would like to make to the current legislation.

32 M.R.S. § 85(7)

7. Delegation. This chapter may not be construed to prohibit a person licensed as an emergency medical services person from rendering medical services in a hospital *or other healthcare facility* setting if those services are:

A. Rendered in the person's capacity as an employee or contracted agent of the hospital or healthcare facility;

B. Authorized by the hospital or healthcare facility; and

C. Delegated in accordance with section 2594-A or 3270-A,

In the recent review of bill submissions for the Second Session, the Council rejected LR: 2390 An Act To Amend the Maine Jobs, Trade and Democracy Act. I am writing to appeal this decision. This bill is vital to our ability to conduct the important business of the Citizen Trade Policy Commission (CTPC).

The CTPC plays an important role in surfacing issues to be addressed with the federal executive branch and our congressional delegation, and also provides crucial information and insights for Maine's executive leadership and legislators as we consider the conditions and interests of Maine's workers and businesses. Without the CTPC, we have no organized function focused on studying trade issues.

Since the start of the 130th Legislature, the CTPC has been unable to meet to perform its function. The Maine Jobs, Trade and Democracy Act currently specifies that the CTPC "shall contract for staff support for the commission." Despite extensive efforts by the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis (OPLA), we were unable to identify and hire a qualified person to fill the CTPC staff role, which requires a specialized skill set for a very part-time job.

LR: 2390 would amend the <u>Maine Jobs, Trade and Democracy Act</u> to allow OPLA to provide the necessary staff support to the CTPC. This would align the operations of the CTPC with other commissions, allowing the CTPC to utilize OPLA's qualified staff when the legislature is not in session. This administrative change will enable the CTPC to operate smoothly and without the kind of interruption we've experienced this year.

I look forward to addressing the Council on Nov. 18 to discuss this proposal and to clarify its need for inclusion as emergency legislation for the upcoming session.

This bill would ensure that college athletes in Maine are allowed to earn compensation from the usage of their name, image and likeness (NIL). Timely action on this issue is important because of a recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling. On June 21, 2021, The US Supreme Court ruled in *NCAA v Alston* that NCAA rules restricting certain types of financial benefits to student-athletes violated anti-trust laws. The Court rejected the NCAA's attempts to be immune from anti-trust laws. A summary of this case can be found here: <u>https://www.jdsupra.com/legalnews/ncaa-v-alston-case-8094242/</u>.

Shortly following this ruling, on June 30, 2021, the NCAA approved an interim NIL policy allowing college athletes to be compensated for use of their name, image and likeness. It also allowed college athletes to engage with NIL management companies and agencies.

Because the NCAA has only adopted an interim NIL policy, 29 states expeditiously approved laws to protect the rights of student-athletes. Several other states have active legislation pending. Information about this legislation can be found at <u>https://businessofcollegesports.com/tracker-name-image-and-likeness-legislation-by-state/</u>.

Maine should join this effort by considering this piece of legislation in the upcoming session, which would protect the rights of Maine-based college athletes to earn compensation for the usage of their name, image or likeness.

I would like to appeal the Legislative Council's decision rejecting my second session bill, LR 2217, "An Act To Establish Statewide Residency Restrictions for Sex Offenders."

As I stated in my bill request: "Sex offenders must register and maintain that registry either for life, or for the specified amount of time a court decided; however, there is no state restriction in statute to restrict where they live. Municipalities can adopt ordinances concerning where they can live." My bill would require the same residence restrictions across the state.

I submitted the bill after conversations with a young woman who was sexually abused from the ages of 6 to 15 by her mother's boyfriend. He accepted a plea deal to serve 18 months in prison and to be a lifetime registrant on the sex offender list. Since his release in 2012, he's been allowed to continue renting out his trailer park in the Baileyville area, often to single mothers with children. Concerned conversations with his probation officer only resulted in their hands being tied since they can't take away his income bearing trailer park, nor can they control who chooses to live there. My constituent continues to tell her story to schools, on the internet, and was briefly featured on a CBS documentary (*Sex. Consent. Education.*)

Maine is 1 of 20 states that doesn't restrict where sex offenders live. Very few municipalities have "Residency Restriction Ordinances" thus the need for such a Statewide policy.

I ask that you reconsider your decision to not let this legislation move forward. Thank you.

It is my intention to appeal the Legislative Council's rejection of LR 2314, An Act To Reduce Homelessness by Improving the General Assistance Program for Recipients and Landlords.

Maine is experiencing a housing crisis like never before. For the 20,000 Mainers at risk of experiencing homelessness and the 5,500 Mainers who are experiencing homelessness who do not qualify for Section 8 through HUD or BRAP and Shelter + Care vouchers through DHHS due to immigration status or because they are on the 25,000-household waitlist to receive them, General Assistance is the only potential source of rental payments made directly to the landlord. However, landlords report that General Assistance offers less rent than the three other rental programs in Maine and is not reliable because recipients have to apply every month. The result is that landlords choose not to rent to people with GA, which exacerbates the current homelessness crisis with 400-600 new arrivals to Maine who are living in shelters and motel rooms paid for by GA, which is much more expensive for the State and municipalities on the financial side than paying for apartments and incredibly destabilizing for the families and children currently in the homelessness system.

This bill seeks to align the payments standards and reliability of all of our housing programs, which will be a significant step to more quickly house those currently living in homelessness.

I look forward to addressing Legislative Council on Nov. 18 to discuss this necessary proposal and its urgent nature. Thank you for your consideration.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic has greatly exacerbated Maine's behavioral health crisis. Families, struggling to live, work and care for their children and seniors during a pandemic, with all of the stress that comes with that, on top of the stress everyone was feeling pre-pandemic, are in need of behavioral health support, which includes mental health and substance use disorder supports. MaineCare does not require co-pays and deductibles for these important services, but employer-based insurance does. For reference, behavioral health co-pays generally cost \$40 per visit and \$160 per month.

For families with a child expressing suicidal ideations, which is common in Maine with suicide being the second most common cause of death in Maine for children ages 10-24, or a parent trying to keep their job while suffering from depression, these costs prohibit folks from accessing these essential services they need to stay healthy. This bill seeks to remove those costs for behavioral health services.

I am writing today to appeal to the Legislative Council to reconsider LR 2229 "Resolve, To Address Maine's Direct Access Worker Shortage." Maine is facing a critical shortage of direct access workers, including nurses, drug counselors, health home workers, and more. Just this week it was announced that one of the few drug and alcohol detoxification centers outside of the Portland area is closed for the foreseeable future due to staffing shortages. The closure comes as drug overdoses have skyrocketed in 2021, and as health care facilities across the state are struggling to stay fully staffed.

We cannot afford to lose a single person who is ready, able, and qualified to work on the front lines. Under Maine law, however, people who have criminal records with certain crimes that immediately disqualify them from working as a direct access worker are being excluded from the workforce, regardless of the changes they have made in their lives since being convicted of the crime or whether the crimes would have any bearing on their ability to do the job.

An immediate disqualification for some crimes is of course reasonable. However, I was surprised to learn from the Maine Recovery Advocacy Project that people in recovery are disqualified for up to ten years from working as a drug counselor, although they have completed the requirements to become licensed and have entered sustained recovery, if they have been charged with certain crimes. This is concerning as people in recovery are often in the best place to aid others with substance use disorder to find and stay on their own path to recovery and we are in desperate need of more counselors.

This bill seeks to expand the people available to work as a direct access worker and address some of the workforce shortage we see in Maine. I hope you will reconsider your decision and approve LR 2229 Resolve, To Address Maine's Direct Access Worker Shortage to be heard during the emergency session.

Our state's own Climate Action Plan released last December estimated that every \$1 invested in pre-disaster risk reduction avoids \$6 in disaster damages. If there were time to wait, we could hedge our bets. But the data is clear that much of Maine's infrastructure is a ticking time bomb. According to data from the Federal Highway Administration, Maine's bridges are in worse conditions than almost every other state, with close to 13 precent of our bridges in poor condition. Maine's bridges are in worse conditions than almost every other state with nearly 13 percent of our bridges in poor condition, according to data from the Federal Highway Administration. Only five states rank worse than Maine in bridge conditions.

To make matters worse, much of our infrastructure is one flood away from disaster. It is avoidable. An article from Bangor Daily News found that nearly a quarter of Maine's infrastructure facilities, such as utilities, hospitals and emergency services, are already at risk of disabling floods and that the threat will continue to grow the longer we wait to act. The article identifies Gardiner, Yarmouth, Bath, Rockland, Bangor, Skowhegan and Old Town as having a 50 percent or higher risk of infrastructure flooding right now, more than double the state average. This bill would create a state "infrastructure bank" that would essentially be a lending agency that supports infrastructure projects while sustaining itself by recouping funding from the economic benefits the projects create. LR 2426 is one way we can address this problem now and for the foreseeable future.

The cost of prescription medication is out of control and that it's hurting Mainers. That's why we as Maine legislators have prioritized efforts over the past few years to require additional insurance coverage for costly prescriptions, cap out-of-pocket costs, and require drug manufactures to be more transparent in their pricing. Though we have made progress, our work is far from over. We should use every lever that is available to us as a state to try to drive down costs.

One lever that we are not yet using to its fullest extent is our ability to "name and shame" drug makers who are engaging in price gouging or are increasing the price of their existing drugs without a clearly supported rationale. We have passed extensive rules regarding the collection of data from drug makers and PBMs, but we have not yet done enough with that data once it is received. One of the next steps we should take immediately is to direct the Maine Health Data Organization (MHDO) to compile and publicize data on prescription drugs which have had unsupported price increases in the prior year. By getting this information out to the public in a usable format, we can better "name and shame" the companies who are engaging in predatory pricing behavior. Lowering prescription costs is an urgent matter. We cannot afford to delay the use of this data that may help deter future price increases and help drive down costs.

This bill would amend the language in 2-B of Maine's minimum wage law to make clear that restaurants and not just "banquets and private clubs" may apply service charges to help them compensate employees at or above the rates required by law.

Many of Maine's restaurants are still struggling to stay afloat in the wake of pandemic-related revenue losses. To make matters more difficult, labor costs are skyrocketing as restaurants compete to recruit and retain employees while, at the same time, the cost of goods is increasing due to supply chain difficulties.

Section 2-B's silence on restaurants exposes operators to legal liability: in the past, the provision has been interpreted as a prohibition on restaurants charging service fees, but in more recent times, the Department of Labor seems to have relaxed that interpretation. We need to clarify the law so our restaurants can react with confidence to the challenges they face today.



This letter serves as a formal appeal of the Council's decision to reject LR 2394, "An Act To Prevent the Prohibition of the Use of Refrigerants," for consideration during the Second Regular Session of the 130th Legislature.

Earlier this year LD 226, "An Act To Limit the Use of Hydrofluorocarbons To Fight Climate Change," was signed into law. This bill, combined with the federal American Innovation and Manufacturing Act (2020), will put into place regulations phasing down the use of hydrofluorocarbons (HFCs) in certain types of equipment - commercial refrigeration (supermarket systems), chillers, and stationary air conditioners. Building codes in Maine do not currently allow for the next generation, low global warming potential refrigerants to be used. The prohibitions on HFCs go into effect as soon as January 1, 2022 for commercial refrigeration systems, January 1, 2024 for chillers, and January 1, 2025 for air conditioners. These deadlines mean it is critically important the building codes in Maine are updated in 2022 to allow for the transition to alternate refrigerants to begin on time. Without the code update, manufacturers will not be able to comply with Maine's or EPA's forthcoming regulations. There will not be compliant equipment available until the code update takes place. Further, Maine will not be able to achieve the greenhouse gas emission reductions that result from phasing down HFCs until the codes are updated to allow the transition to take place.

It is my intention to appeal the Council's 5-5 rejection of LR 2424, An Act To Update and Clarify the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act and Provide for Greater Transparency.

LR 2424 is a medical marijuana bill that I submitted to be considered as part of this year's legislative session. I realize that multiple medical marijuana bills were submitted to the Legislative Council this year, but I believe that LR 2424 is the only one that offers some detail about what lawmakers ought to be seeking from the Office of Marijuana Policy's upcoming rulemaking.

During this past session, I worked diligently with a committee of folks who had concerns about the set of rules submitted last spring by the OMP. The resulting bill, LD 1242, was sponsored by five Democrats, four Republicans and one Independent Libertarian. That bill passed overwhelmingly by a vote of 117-25 in the House and was not roll-called in the Senate. Its success has allowed our coalition to follow up through the submission of LR 2424, in which we now move from halting problematic rulemaking to affirmatively seeking better parameters as the OMP prepares to restart the rulemaking process. This is a timely and time-sensitive effort to provide proper follow-through and ensure the Legislature does not abdicate its role in setting good policy.

I look forward to addressing the Council on Nov. 18 to discuss this proposal and to clarify its need for inclusion as emergency legislation for the upcoming session.

This bill would require the treatment of leachate from active, state-owned waste disposal facilities to reduce the concentration of perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances to the extent feasible with available technology prior to its shipment to a wastewater treatment facility. It would require the Department of Environmental Protection to adopt rules to establish the technology requirements, ensuring the implementation of the requirements within 3 years, and for the monitoring of the efficacy of the installed system.

As we have become acutely aware following the contamination throughout Fairfield and elsewhere in Maine, PFAS is a group of man-made chemicals that are extremely persistent— meaning that once released they are not going to breakdown — earning them the moniker of "forever chemicals."

Currently, the leachate from Juniper Ridge is processed by a facility releasing into the Penobscot River. The impact of this on the river and its fish has been of significant concern. We must ensure that our state-owned landfill follows best practices for disposing of its leachate, and that means ensuring it is appropriately treated for PFAS, either onsite or at a specialized facility. Federal funds were recently secured in the FY22 Interior Appropriations bill to install a specialized treatment system for PFAS waste at the Anson-Madison wastewater facility which could potentially meet this need.

I look forward to addressing the Council to discuss this proposal and to clarify its need for inclusion as emergency legislation for the upcoming session.

It would require a municipal officer from the municipality where the agricultural fair or festival is to occur to approve the application for sale of marijuana at the fair or festival. It would require an individual license to be obtained by an adult use marijuana store for each location at which the marijuana store wishes to engage in off-premises sales.
