In convention of the members-elect of the One Hundred and First Legislature.

This day being the day designated by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Maine, the members-elect of the House of Representatives assembled in the Hall of the House at ten o'clock A.M. and were called to order by Harvey R. Pease, Clerk of the House of 1961.

Prayer was then offered by the Rev. Mr. Douglas H. Robbins of Augusta.

The members-elect stood at attention during the playing of the National Anthem.

were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor and inform him that a quorum of the members of the House of Representatives-elect had assembled in the Representatives' Hall and request his attendance to administer to them the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Mr. Thaanum subsequently reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and the Governor was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the Representatives-elect for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon His Excellency, Governor John H. Reed, attended by his Council, came in and administered to the members-elect and they subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to discharge their official duties.

GOVERNOR REED: It is an extreme pleasure for me, as your Governor, to be here and to administer the oath of office to you, and to congratulate you on becoming members of Maine's One Hundred and First Legislature.

Mrs. Reed joins me in welcoming you to the capital city and with our wish that this be a pleasant and productive session. There will be many occasions on which we will have the pleasure of joining you, occasions of a social nature and an official nature. The first one of course on the social agenda will be the inaugural ball tomorrow night, and we sincerely hope that all of you will join us for that function, as well as many others during the tenure of your stay here in Augusta.

I am certain that you are well aware of the many vital tasks that you have before you. I don't believe that any other Maine Legisla-

ture in the history of our great State has been so well informed as to the problems that you will be facing. As a result of your reading and your studying and as a result of the pre-legislative conference held at the University of Maine, I am certain that you are prepared and you are cognizant of the magnitude of the problems that you will be faced with to solve. I have every confidence that you will solve these problems, will face up to them and meet them realistically.

However, my purpose this morning is not to devote a lot of time to a long and lengthy address. Tomorrow I will have the pleasure of addressing you at length concerning my thoughts and my recommendations for Maine's next two years. But today as I have the chance to administer the oath of office, I naturally reflect back upon the time at which I had the privilege of being a member of this body. Time marches on and it is surprising that I noted it was back in 1955, so yesterday I pulled out the biographical sketch just as a matter of interest to see how many members are presently in this body and who I served with at that time. Surprisingly enough there are only eighteen of your one hundred and fifty-one members who were present in the 97th Legislature in 1955, just eight years ago. This represents an eighty-eight percent turnover in the body. Now I don't know exactly what you conclude from that except the vagaries of political life, and the fact is that we take our turn, we are here to serve, we do the best we can, and then we move on and others come to take our place; and I am certain that you likewise will enjoy as I have the fond memories and recollections of associations and relationships that you will have one with another here during your deliberations.

I am equally certain that at one time or another each of you will agree and disagree with every other one of your fellow members, but when the session is finally concluded, I am equally certain that you will all agree that it has been a very fruitful and worthwhile experience, and in this experience I

want to say that I would be most happy to cooperate with you on any problems you have. I look forward with pleasure to associations and meetings with you in the executive end of the State House, and may I say that the door to our Executive Department is always open to discuss problems of any nature that you have.

And so we have, you and I together, a wonderful opportunity to serve our fellow citizens, an opportunity to be of service and also to enrich our own personal experience as we pass through life, and in this end and in this task that you are now setting up to accomplish, I wish you well and am confident that you will do a job and do it well in the months ahead. Thank you very much.

and thereupon Honorable David J. Kennedy was declared duly elected as Speaker of the House of the One Hundred and First Legislature.

Speaker Kennedy was then escorted to the rostrum by the gentleman from Old Orchard Beach, Mr. Plante, where he assumed the

Chair amid the applause of the House, the members rising.

Mr. PLANTE: Dave, as spokesman for the Democratic Party, I want you to know that we are fully cognizant of the fine reputation that the Maine House of Representatives enjoys throughout the nation for its proper decorum. I want to assure you that we certainly will support you in such efforts to continue this fine reputation, and I personally want to congratulate you for having been elected Speaker of the House. My best wishes. (Applause)

The SPEAKER: I thank the gentleman from Old Orchard Beach, Mr. Plante, for his gracious introduction and for conducting me to this seat of honor.

Ladies and Gentlemen of the House of Representatives: I have searched my mind but I haven't been able to find the proper words to express the thanks that I owe to you people for advancing me to this honorable position. I am particularly grateful this morning to you for entrusting me with this assignment for two reasons. I am proud of the honor extended to me naturally, but I am particularly proud and especially pleased for the people of Washington County, and allow them to share your favor. There has been a lapse of one hundred and three years since my county has enjoyed the honor of having a presiding officer over this body. The Honorable Fred A. Pike of Calais was elected Speaker of this House in the year of 1860. According to the record, he served with dignity and distinction. During that session our sixteenth and last county was incorporated under Chapter 146 of the Public Laws of 1860. Knox, the new county, was made up of towns formerly under the jurisdiction of Waldo and Lincoln. Trial Justices were provided for by appointment of the Governor and consent of the Council during that period, and in our last session of the Legislature the District Court Act foreshadowed their end. Governor Morrill's message to the Legislature reveals that the problems of state were not far different than we have in these times. There were needs to be met then even as now; needs of our

correctional institutions, health and education.

It might be interesting to you to know that the contingent fund of the Governor and Council in that year amounted to a mere \$6,000 and the Speaker's salary was \$345.00.

I am intentionally this morning refraining from revealing to you the total budget of that year in the fear that some of my more conservative friends might be persuaded that we should turn back the years of time and appropriate accordingly. However, when I say to you that the representative of my area received a total amount for his services during his tenure of \$180.00, I am sure it would restrain any desire you might have on your part for a change.

We are now, ladies and gentlemen, opening a new session, and even though the problems may be old and familiar ones, they deserve our most careful and thoughtful consideration. While I do not have any advice for you members this morning, as I look over the faces of the old members, I can recall that you do take these matters to your serious attention. Let us not try and hurry this session, but give every measure careful and serious deliberation, so that when we leave and adjourn this House and this Legislature, we may return to our homes with the testimony of a good conscience.

Ladies and Gentlemen, the Chair awaits the pleasure of the House.
