STATE OF MAINE Department of the Attorney General Augusta

January 6, 1965

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the 102nd Legislature:

Pursuant to Article V, Part 4, Section 2, of the Constitution, I am transmitting herewith two bonds of the Honorable Eben L. Elwell, Treasurer of State, each in the amount of \$250,000, one written by Seaboard Surety Company of Portland, Maine, bearing date of January 6, 1965, and the other written by Maine Bonding and Casualty Company of Portland, Maine, bearing date of January 6, 1965, each being payable to the State of Maine.

ORDERED, the House concurring, that free telephone service be provided for each member of the Senate and House to the number of 50 calls, of reasonable dufrom Augusta to points within the limits of the State of Maine, and that each member of the Senate and House be provided with a credit card to be certified to by the Secretary the Senate and Clerk of the House. respectively, the cost of this service to be paid to the New Eng-Telephone and Telegraph Company at regular tariff rates; and be it further

ORDERED, that free telegraph service be provided to each member of the Senate and House to the number of twenty messages of reasonable length, from Augusta to points within the limits of the State of Maine, and that each member of the Senate and House be provided with a card, to be certified by the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House respectively; the cost of this service to be paid to Western Union Telegraph Company at regular tariff rates. (S. P. 27)

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the members and officers of the Legislature be furnished with express and parcel transportation for all packages and department reports in a exceeding \$5.00 for each member and officer thereof, and that such transportation be furnished and expended under the direction of the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House respectively, and the unexpended balance at the close of the year 1965 shall be available for use in 1967. (S. P. 29)

(S. P. 30)
