Friday, May 7, 1965

Senate called to order by the President.

Mr. SHIRO of Kennebec: Mr. President, I move that the Majority Report be accepted.

Mr. JACQUES of Androscoggin: Mr. President and members of the Senate: Maybe it would be well for you to look at what the bill really means. It changes the name of the Society to the "Maine As-sociation of Historical Societies and Museums." This has not been done in the past. I remember that a few years ago we had a de-bate in the Senate for almost an hour and a half when the Portland Symphony Orchestra wanted to be called the Maine Portland This was Symphony Orchestra. turned down because we did not want to use the word "Maine." Naturally the word "Maine" builds up the organization and sometimes the organization does not function properly and the name "Maine" is not well thought of. This is one of the reasons I signed the "Ought not to pass" report and others felt the same way. I think, Mr.

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President and members of the Senate, if we start this here today, tomorrow we will have the Maine Band Association and we will have the Maine Chiropractic Association and they will come here asking to use the word "Maine" in their organization. I hope that the Senate does not go along with this.

along with this. Mr. SHIRO of Kennebec: Mr. President, the majority of the committee felt that it was suitable to allow this association to change its name simply by add-ing the word "Maine" to it. This bill was sponsored by Senator Snow of Cumberland County and he spoke before the committee. I do not know if he is a member of this particular association, perhaps he may be. However th e change of name by allowing them to use the word "Maine" is not without precedent. This, of course, is a non-profit organization or a charitable organization and there are many precedents in the state for allowing this. We had one individual check with the Attorney General's office and there was no objection by the Attorney General's office. We felt that it would not become confused with any official department or agency of the State of Maine. I urge that the majority report be accepted and I would ask for a division. Mr. JUTRAS of York: Mr. President, I would like to go on record as agreeing with Senator

Jacques of Androscoggin County. Mr. SNOW of Cumberland: Mr. President, I would like to have you note that the bill is co-sponsored by Senator Hoffses in whose community this organization has its headquarters. The purpose of the Association of Historical Societies and Museums is to promote a close liaison among historical societies and museums in the State of Maine and to stimulate discussion of mutual problems and practices to assist the several societies and museums in developing educational programs and strengthening their organizations, and so forth. I do not feel, Mr. President, that this can be compared to the situation two years ago where the symphony orchestra in Portland wished to

change its name to the Maine Symphony Orchestra. The reason for denying this was that it singled out an orchestra from one community and gave it a state designation. This is statewide organization, and as Senator Shiro has pointed out there is precedent for this action. As far as the advantages to the society are concerned, I think that it is obvious in that it will help those interested in locating this association and working with it to identify it. I would also note that one of the trustees of this organization is Miss Edith Hary, who is well known to all of us, and she appeared as one of the proponents on behalf of the bill. She agrees with what I have said as to the purposes of the organization and as to the value of making this change. I would urge the Senate to vote to accept the majority "Ought to pass" report.

Mr. SMITH of Cumberland: Mr. President, this is quite a thing. With all due respect to my colleague, Mr. Snow, I have been around quite a while, and in regard to the use of the word "Maine" I have known some respectable establishments that have been requested by legislatures in the past to take "State of Maine" off of their titles, so I will go along wholeheartedly with Mr. Jacques. I think that the name "State of Maine" should be used only by the State of Maine.

Mr. CAHILL of Somerset: Mr. President, I would like to ask a question. In the title of this organization where would the name "Maine" be placed?

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Somerset, Senator Cahill, puts a question throuh the Chair to any Senator, who may answer i. they so choose.

Mr. SNOW of Cumberland: Mr. President, it would be called the Maine Association of Historical Societies and Museums, in other words the word "Maine" would appear at the beginning.

Mr. CAHILL of Somerset: Mr. President, I agree with both parties, however, I believe if the name is Maine Association of Historical Societies and Museums it could very well do what Mr. Jacques is opposed to by inferring that it was a society sponsored by the state whereas if it was called Association of Historical Societies and Museums of Maine it perhaps would not be associated as an organization sponsored by the State. I do not know if I am clear on that or not.

Mr. SNOW of Cumberland: Mr. President, I apologize to the Senate. I erred in stating the name which would be adopted. If this legislation is enacted the name sought is the "Maine League of Historical Societies and Museums."

On motion by Mr. Hoffses of Knox the bill was tabled until the next legislative day pending the motion of the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Shiro, to accept the majority "Ought to pass" report.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair would inform the Senator that it is, having been held at the request of the Senator.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Carter of Kennebec, the Senate voted to reconsider its former action whereby the bill was recommitted to the Committee on Business Legislation and further voted to substitute the bill for the report.

Thereupon, the bill was given its first reading and tomorrow assigned for second reading.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair would like to recognize in the back of the Senate Chambers 28 pupils from the 4th grade of the Wiscasset Grammar School chaperoned this morning by Miss Silver and Mrs. Hanson. We welcome you here this morning and hope that you enjoy and benefit from your visit here. You are from the town of Wiscasset in the County of Lincoln and the Chair would like to introduce to you the Senator from your County. Senator Sproul. (Applause)

On motion by Mr. Jacques of Androscoggin, the Senate voted to take from the table the 64th tabled and unassigned item (H. P. 832) (L. D. 1059) bill, "An Act Relating to Junk Yards"; tabled on May 6 by that Senator pending passage to be engrossed; and on further motion by the same Senator, the bill was passed to be engrossed in concurrence. ⁶ Mr. Harding of Aroostook was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate.

Mr. HARDING of Aroostook: Mr. President and members of the Senate, if you will check your desks, you will notice that the Secretary has been good enough to prepare for each Senator, a list of the items he has tabled unassigned. I realize that the reasons that you have tabled some of these items are varied and I don't wish to go into that. However, I do know that in many cases the reasons they are tabled that you wish to make an is amendment or wish to discuss the particular bill with your people back home.

Now, we are moving, I hope, towards the end of the session and it would be very helpful if on these tabled items where you have just a minor matter to be taken care of you can do it and get them off the table, especially now that the committees have finished with the work and you will have time to have the amendments drawn and presented and to do a good job on your bill. So it would be helpful to us if you will bear that in mind. That is the purpose of this list being given to you of the items that you have on the table. Thank you.

The Adjournment order having been returned from the House, read and passed in concurrence, the Senate

Adjourned until Tuesday next at 10:00 o'clock in the morning.
