In convention of the memberselect of the One Hundred and Third Legislature.

Corrected Tabulation of the Vote for Representative to the Legislature at the General Election held on November 8, 1966.

As a result of a recount of the ballots cast at the General Elec-tion on November 8, 1966, in the Towns of Cornish, Limerick, Newfield, Parsonsfield, Shapleigh and Waterboro for the office of Representative to the Legislature, I hereby submit a corrected tabulation for Mr. Raymond H. Bradeen and Mr. George A. Carroll in accordance with the facts as determined at such recount. A copy of signed agreement relating the thereto is attached herewith and made a part of the record.

Raymond H. Bradeen of Waterboro received 917 votes, instead of 918 votes, and

George A. Carroll of Limerick received 930 votes, instead of 912 votes.

Therefore, George A. Carroll of Limerick having received a plurality of the votes cast in his respective district appears to have been elected, instead of Raymond H. Bradeen of Waterboro.

For the purpose of ascertaining the presence of a quorum, a certified roll of the Representativeselect was called by the Clerk of the One Hundred and Second Legislature.

The elected membership of the House being 151, 149 memberselect having answered to their names, a quorum was found to be present.

After Recess

Called to order by the Clerk.

At this time, a message was received from the Senate borne by Senator Johnson of Somerset that the Senate had been duly organized by the election of Honorable Joseph B. Campbell as President, Jerrold B. Speers as Secretary, and Waldo H. Clark as Assistant Secretary, and that the Senate was ready to transact such business as might come before it.

On motion of Mr. Hanson of Gardiner,

were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor and inform him that a quorum of the members of the House of Representatives-elect had assembled in the Representatives' Hall and request his attendance to administer to them the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Mr. Hanson subsequently reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and the Governor was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the Representatives-elect for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon His Excellency, Governor John H. Reed, attended by the Council, came in and administered to the members-elect and they subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to discharge their official duties.

GOVERNOR REED: Now that you have attended to that duty, let me congratulate you on assuming your oath of office and embarking upon your assignments and re-sponsibilities as a member of the House of Representatives of this 103rd Maine Legislature. I consider this a rather history-making oath taking, history-making from the standpoint that you will be of course the first Legislature to occupy these beautifully renovated chambers. Certainly I want to congratulate all of those who have played a part in the designing and the carrying out of the refurbishing that has placed this excellent chamber in such a beautiful condition.

I recall with fond memories commencing my career twelve years ago today in Seat 139 and the years have sped by very rapidly, but always of course the memories remain of the wonderful experiences that one does have in serving in the Maine Legislature. Today I am not going to talk to you at any great length, but I do have a few remarks that I would like to deliver.

You have been charged by Maine people with the responsibility of conducting the state's business the coming biennium. during Similar to your predecessors, you will be confronted with many problems during your service as members of the Legislature. It is not in my province to suggest guidelines to you. Briefly however, I will outline what in my opinion has been done in recent years and the ways in which these accomplishments have come about.

During my terms of office as Governor I am proud that Maine has made rapid and tangible progress toward the full development of both human and natural resources. Unprecedented numbers of new business ventures have been established in each of the past several years bringing new jobs and new prosperity to our state.

The Vacationland four-season concept has become a reality. Annually record numbers of tourists, visitors and vacation and recreation seekers move to and from our state taking advantage of modern facilities from the mountain ski slopes to the sandv beaches. This vital resource can and must grow.

State backed credit for new recreational and industrial ventures can now be obtained through one of a number of agencies. The Maine Industrial Building Authority, the Maine Recreation Authority and the Maine Industrial and Recreational Financial Approval Board stand ready to work toward uplifting the economic plateau of our state.

You will be faced with increasingly complex problems in the

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field of education. Under this administration education has thrived. It must continue to do so in order for Maine to reach full economic strength. As the result of a recommendation which I made to the 102nd Legislature the Advisory Commission on the Higher Education Study was formed and recently their report was submitted. As you review the report you will find their conclusions stimulating and challenging. It is my hope that many of these recommendations will be implemented.

A rapidly expanding and increasingly complex federal-state relationship is placing an ever growing burden on officials of state government. Programs of Health and Welfare, Water Improvement, Highway construction and conservation, to mention but a few, must now respond to increased federal control. Failure to comply means loss of funds. You must give your strict attention to programs which include federal participation to meet these pressing needs.

I take a great measure of pride in the sound fiscal responsibility that has prevailed in state government during my administration. Living within one's means may not always be the most popular thing to do, but it is certainly the most prudent and in the long run the most efficient.

The reins of state government will change hands here tomorrow, and I am proud and pleased that this transition will take place with the state's business in order. Maine, during my administration, has maintained sound fiscal responsibility. I strongly believe that this is the most efficient and effective method of conducting the state's business.

Important decisions concerning financial matters will confront each of you during your terms as legislators. These decisions will be difficult ones to make. I urge you to maintain a posture of sound fiscal policy for the best interests of the taxpayers and citizens of our state.

During my years of service to the citizens of Maine I have endeavored to render honest, continuous and effective service toward the betterment of all Maine people. It has been my goal to keep the best from the past and seek out only the finest of the new. I believe Maine's integrity and tradition have been preserved and that together we have successfully reached many new heights. The rewards I have received have come from the people themselves, their warmth, consideration and their genuine concern for the future of Maine.

I certainly want to thank all the members of this Legislature who have worked with me in the past, men and women of both parties who I admire and respect. I also want to thank all of those in state government, who are truly dedicated and wonderful people.

My wife Cora, my daughters Cheryl and Ruth and I have enjoyed sharing our years as Maine's first family with the many thousands of our fellow citizens who have visited with us in the Blaine House. We shall forever cherish fond memories of life in the Executive Mansion and leave with the wish that our successors may be as happy as we have been.

Now, I offer each of you my very sincerest personal best wishes in your duties with the 103rd Maine Legislature. I am confident that you will meet the challenges with determination and success. Good bye and good luck.

SPEAKER KENNEDY: The Chair thanks the Minority Leader for his most gracious act, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Maine House of Representatives:

Mr. JALBERT: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: For the outgoing Clerk and the incoming Clerk, this occasion serves as anniversaries.

Our outgoing Clerk came upon the Halls of the House ten years ago today to serve as one of the youngest Legislators in the Nation. He served well then; succeeded himself and was elected by our party as the Assistant Floor Leader, then the Floor Leader. He then was elected Clerk to serve in the 102nd Legislature, and I am sure that all of us who were here then will say now to this young man, Jerome, a job very well done and success on your new venture. (Applause, the members rising).

For the incoming Clerk, also an anniversary. Bertha Johnson came here as a young, young lady twenty years ago when I came here twenty years ago today, as a young, young man. Bertha served very, very well under the tutorship of our revered and admired former Clerk, the Honorable Harvey R. Pease.

Among several sterling her qualities, Bertha possesses the quality or the virtue of loyalty which few of us have. Bertha possesses this virtue thoroughly and as proof of it when she told me as well as others she did not become a candidate for Clerk of the House until such time as she knew for certain that her friend and former tutor Harvey Pease would not be a candidate.

I know that all of us here having known Bertha so many years would only say to her in advance that we know she will do a splendid job, and from all of us to you Bertha, welcome aboard. (Applause, the members rising).

Mr. PLANTE: Mr. Speaker, I would be less than grateful if I let this moment pass without expressing my thanks to all of the members of this House whom I have served with along a journey of ten years. On my tenth anniversary I am happy to say that I must have led a charmed life in the fact that I don't think, as hard as I tried to represent the loyal opposition, that I alienated a single member of the majority party during my four terms in the House, and it was our code as Clerk of the very ably House, assisted bv Howard W. Cunningham, to treat one and all fairly and decently irrespective of politics.

I am happy to say that the friendships which I have estab-lished over the years will serve me a good long time after I have left this wonderful House that has been for ten years my second home. I have grown up here in more ways than one, ably assisted by many of you, and I shall be eternally grateful for all of your kindnesses and courtesies, and I am leaving here without a bit of animosity and I am leaving here very happy knowing that you are in wonderful hands and all will go well with Bertha Johnson and Regis Strout at the helm in the Clerk's office

In closing, may I wish you wonderful days ahead and may God bless you all. (Prolonged Applause, the members rising).

ORDERED, that the House Rules 1 through 59 be repealed and the following adopted in place thereof:

RULES OF THE HOUSE

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE SPEAKER

1. It shall be the duty of the Speaker to take the chair at the

hour to which the House shall have adjourned, call the members to order, and after the appearance of a quorum, cause the journal of the preceding day to be read;

To announce the business before the House in the order in which it is to be acted upon;

To receive and submit to vote all motions and propositions regularly moved or that necessarily arise in the course of proceedings, and announce the result;

To restrain the members when engaged in debate, within the rules of order, and to enforce on all occasions, the observance of order and decorum among the members;

To decide all questions of order. subject to an appeal to the House:

To receive all messages and other communications and announce them to the House;

To authenticate by his signature bills that have passed to be enacted and resolves finally passed:

To name the members who are to serve on committees, unless the House otherwise directs;

To appoint the member who shall take the chair when the House has determined to go into committee of the whole;

To name a member to perform his duties during his absence for a time not exceeding the remainder of the day;

And to appoint a Clerk and an Assistant Clerk of the House to fill any vacancy that may occur in said offices while the Legislature is not in session, to serve until the House in session shall elect a Clerk or Assistant Clerk.

2. The Speaker may address the House on points of order, in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

DUTIES OF THE CLERK

3. The Clerk shall keep a journal of what is done by the House: read papers when required by the House or Speaker; note the answers of members, when the House orders or when a question is taken by yeas and nays; notify committees of their appointment and of the business referred to them; authenticate by his signature all the orders and proceedings of the House not authenticated by the Speaker; have charge of all the documents and papers of every kind confided to the care of the House; bear all messages and transmit all papers from the House to the Governor or to the Senate, unless the House shall otherwise order; make up the payroll of the members; and in the absence of the Speaker at the hour for meeting, shall preside until a Speaker pro tempore be chosen; and at the close of the session shall file in an orderly manner all papers and documents in possession of the House, passed upon or received during the session; and at the commencement of the next legislature shall preside until the election of the Speaker; and record the doings of the House until a new Clerk shall be chosen and gualified; and in the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall be Clerk pro tempore, with power to appoint an assistant.

CHAPLAINS

4. Every morning the House on assembling shall join with the Chaplains in religious service followed by the National Anthem on the first legislative day of each week.

MONITORS

5. One monitor shall be appointed by the Speaker for each division of the House, whose duty shall be to see to the observance of the rules of the House. If any member shall transgress any of the rules of the House, and persist therein, after being notified thereof by any monitor, it shall be the duty of such monitor to give information thereof to the House.

COMMITTEES

6. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, whose duty shall be to consider all subjects referred to them and report thereon:

On Ways and Means,

- On Leave of Absence,
- On Bills in the Third Reading,
- On Engrossed Bills,
- On Elections,

To consist of seven members each;

On Rules and Business of the House,

To consist of three members and the Speaker ex officio.

7. In all elections by ballot, of committees of the House, the persons having the highest number of votes shall act as chairman. In case two or more persons receive the same number of votes, the committee by a majority of their members shall elect a chairman.

RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS

8. The seat which a member draws at the commencement of the session shall be his during the session, unless he shall have leave by the Speaker to change it and no other person shall be permitted to occupy a member's seat at any time during a session of the House.

9. No member shall sit at the desk of the Speaker or Clerk, except by the permission of the Speaker.

10. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Speaker shall name the person to speak, but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the Chair shall speak first.

11. No member shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order or correct a mistake; or be allowed to stand up to the interruption of another while any member is speaking, or pass unnecessarily between the Speaker of the House and the person speaking; or stand in an alley, or sit or stand covered, during the session of the House.

12. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without first asking leave of the House.

13. No member shall speak out of his place without leave from the Chair, nor without first rising and addressing the Speaker; and he shall sit down as soon as he is done speaking.

14. No member shall act as counsel for any party, before a joint committee of the legislature, or a committee of the House.

15. Every member shall make out and deliver to the Clerk or to the Legislative Finance Officer a statement of the number of miles usually travelled in going from his residence to the seat of government.

16. Every member who shall neglect to give his attendance to the House for more than six days after the session commences shall. on making his appearance therein be held to render the reason for such neglect; and in case the reason assigned shall be deemed the House sufficient, such by member shall be entitled to receive pay for his travel, and not otherwise; and no member shall be absent more than two days without leave of the House; and no member shall have such leave, unless it be reported by the Committee on Leave of Absence; and no leave of absence shall avail any member who retains his seat more than five days from the time the same was obtained.

17. Any member having obtained leave of absence, and having in his possession any papers relating to the business before the House, shall leave the same with the Clerk.

18. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the rules and orders of the House and the House has determined that he has so transgressed, he shall not be allowed to vote or to speak, unless by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.

19. Every member who shall be in the House when a question is put where he is not excluded by interest shall give his vote, unless the House for special reasons shall excuse him, and when yeas and nays are ordered, no member shall leave his seat until the vote is declared; in all elections by the House, or on joint ballot of the two houses, no member shall leave his seat, after voting, before a return of the House is had.

20. When the galleries shall be ordered to be cleared or shut, the matter which may occasion such order shall be kept secret by each member, until the House shall order such injunction of secrecy to be taken off.

21. No person not a member or officer of the House, except members of the Senate, its secretary

and assistant, the Governor and Council, heads of state departments and bureaus, Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court, Chaplains of the Senate and reporters of the proceedings and debates of the House, shall be admitted within the Representatives' hall, unless invited by some member of the House. While the House is in session only members and officers of the House and officers of the Senate on official business shall be admitted inside the rail, except members of the press, who shall occupy places at the press table, and except guests bearing cards issued by the Speaker.

PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES

22. After reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

1st. Senate papers, and first reading of accompanying bills and resolves.

2d. Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.

3d. Reception of petitions, bills and resolves requiring reference to any committee.

4th. Orders.

5th. Reports of committees and first reading of accompanying bills and resolves.

6th. Bills and resolves reported by Committee on Bills in the Third Reading, and on their passage to be engrossed.

7th. Bills on their passage to be enacted.

8th. Orders of the day.

The Speaker shall announce each item of business in its turn, and no paper shall be taken up out of its regular order, except by the unanimous consent of the House. No business shall be transacted in the House after the hour of 9:00 p.m. The orders of the day shall take precedence of all other business at the expiration of the morning hour.

23. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to make up daily a calendar of bills, resolves and other papers, assigned for that day's consideration. and also a calendar of bills and resolves which have had their first reading, and showing the disposition that has been made of each.

24. The unfinished business in which the House was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have preference in the orders of the day and shall continue to be among the orders of the day for each succeeding day until disposed of and no motion or other business shall be received, without special leave of the House, until the former is disposed of.

25. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but—

1st. To adjourn.

2d. To lay on the table.

3d. For the previous question.

4th. To commit.

5th. To postpone to a day certain.

6th. To amend.

7th. To postpone indefinitely. which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the Senate shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

1st. To recede.

2d. To concur.

3d. To insist.

4th. To adhere.

26. A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.

27. A vote to lay a proposition on the table shall not preclude the further consideration of it on the same day.

28. When motion for the pre-vious question is made, the consent of one-third of the members present shall be necessary to authorize the Speaker to entertain it. No debate shall be allowed until the matter of consent is determined. The previous question shall be submitted in the following words: Shall the main question be put now? No member shall speak more than five minutes on the motion for the previous question, and while that question is pending a motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate. A call for the yeas and nays, or for division of a question, shall be in order after the main question has been ordered to be put. After the adoption of the previous question, the vote shall be taken forthwith upon amendments, and then upon the main question.

29. Propositions to amend by striking out and inserting dates. numbers, and sums, are not divisible; but all propositions, otherwise divisible, shall be divided at the request of any ten members. A motion to strike out being lost, shall neither preclude amendments, nor a motion to strike out and insert.

30. In filling blanks and assigning times for the consideration of business, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

31. When a proposition consists of several paragraphs or sections, amendment of one of them shall not preclude amendment of a prior paragraph or section.

32. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

No amendment to a bill or resolve shall be acted upon by the House until the same has been printed or reproduced and distributed to the members under the direction of the Clerk, unless the same shall bear the recommendation of the Committee on Rules and Business of the House that such printing or reproduction be dispensed with; and any amendment not so printed or reproduced or bearing such a recommendation, shall lie on the table until printed or reproduced or until said Committee has recommended that such printing or reproduction be dispensed with. All amendments presented or filed with the Clerk for printing or reproduction shall bear the signature of the member presenting or filing the same.

34. After a motion or order is stated or read by the Speaker, it shall be regarded as in the possession of the House, and shall be disposed of by the vote of the House. But any motion or order may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision or amendment, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn except by consent of the House.

When a vote having been 35. Speaker, declared bv the is doubted, the members for and against the question, when called on by the Speaker, shall vote again without further debate. Bu⁺ a call for the yeas and nays shall be in order at any time before such a vote is made certain and declared.

36. When a motion has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority, or in the negative on a tie vote, may move to reconsider on the same or succeeding day. A motion to reconsider shall not be postponed or laid on the table without a certain time assigned for its further consideration. When a motion for reconsideration has been decided the vote shall not be reconsidered. A motion to reconsider shall not be in order more than once on the same question.

37. When a member shall move or give notice of his intention to move, a reconsideration of any vote, the papers to which the motion relates shall remain in possession of the Clerk until the question of reconsideration shall have been decided, or the right to move such a question is lost.

38. In all elections by ballot, of the House, a time shall be assigned for such election, at least one day previous thereto.

39. When the reading of a paper is called for which has been before read to the House, and the same is objected to by any member, the question of reading shall be determined by a vote of the House.

40. Every question of order which shall be decided on appeal shall be entered on the journal of the House with the decision thereon.

41. A proposition to require the opinion of the justices of the Supreme Judicial Court, as provided by the Constitution, shall not be acted upon until the next day after such proposition is made.

42. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the House, and all bills and resolves to be introduced in the House, shall bear the signature of the member or member-elect presenting them and a brief descriptive title and shall be deposited by the member presenting them in a box placed for that purpose in front of the Clerk's desk, unless otherwise provided under the rules. All such petitions, memorials, papers, bills and resolves, which are deposited in said box before one o'clock in the afternoon of each day shall be removed therefrom by the Clerk. and shall be introduced and received in the House on the following day, at which time they shall be presented to the House by the Speaker or such other person as the Speaker may request, and referred to the proper committees. unless the House shall otherwise order.

43. All bills in their third reading, and resolves in their second reading, shall be committed to the standing Committee on Bills in the Third Reading, to be by them examined and corrected. The director of legislative research shall be the clerk of the Committee on Bills in the Third Reading.

44. All resolves appropriating money or land, shall have their second reading on such day subsequent to that of their first reading as the House may assign.

45. All engrossed bills and resolves shall be committed to the standing Committee on Engrossed Bills to be strictly examined; and if found by them to be truly and strictly engrossed, they shall so report to the House, and the question shall be taken without any further reading, unless on motion of any member, a majority of the House shall be in favor of reading the same as engrossed.

46. Every bill or resolve, providing for the grant of money, land, or other public property, which may be laid on the table by leave, and any report of a grant, shall be accompanied by a written statement of facts in each case; and no such bill or resolve shall be considered before such statement is made, or pass without being read on two several days. 47. No new bill or resolve of a public nature shall be received, except it be reported by a committee, unless the House otherwise order, and all bills and resolves not reported by a committee, shall be laid upon the table for one day, before further action thereon.

48. No act or resolve shall be passed affecting the rights of individuals or corporations, without previous notice to such individuals or corporations.

49. No bill shall pass to be engrossed until it shall have had three several readings: the time for the second and third readings shall be assigned by the House; but if no objection is made, the second reading may be by the title, and at the time of the first. Every resolve which shall require the approval of the Governor, shall have two several readings; and the second reading shall be subject to the provisions of the third reading of bills.

50. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the Senate, without notice thereof being given to the House by the Speaker.

51. When a bill or resolve shall be returned by the Governor with his objections, the question shall be stated by the Chair: Shall this bill become a law not withstanding the objections of the Governor? and the same in substance in case of a resolve; which question may be postponed to a day within the session, not exceeding one week, or may be committed. But no other question shall apply to bills and resolves originating in either branch.

The rules of parliamentary 52.practice comprised in Reed's any other standard Rules. or authority, shall govern the House in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not with the standing inconsistent rules and orders of the House, and the joint rules of the Senate and House of Representatives.

53. No rule or order of the House shall be dispensed with unless two-thirds of the members present shall consent thereto.

54. No rule or order of the House shall be altered or repealed,

nor shall any new standing rule or order be adopted, unless one day's previous notice thereof be given in each case; and such notice shall be entered on the journal.

be entered on the journal. (On motion of Mr. Benson of Southwest Harbor, the Order was tabled pending passage and specially assigned for tomorrow.)

Mr. Susi of Pittsfield presented the following Order and moved its passage:

ORDERED, that the members of the House proceed with selection of seats; that a choice of seats be granted to Floor Leaders and Assistant Floor Leaders of the Majority and Minority parties; that two monitors' seats be reserved for the monitors appointed by the Speaker; that those members who have physical impairments other than impaired hearing be given a choice of seats; that the lady members be given a choice of their seats; and be it further

ORDERED, that (a), a member of the 102nd Legislature may retain either his old seat number or his aisle seat should it still exist in the present seating arrangement; that (b), should item (a) result in any conflict (i.e., that a seat bear the number belonging to a returning member of the 102nd Legislature and also be the aisle seat of another returnee), then seniority will prevail; that (c), returnees who had aisle seats that no longer exist in the present seating arrangement, and those eliminated under item (b) would have next choice; that (d), returnees not previously provided for would have next choice; that (e), the balance of the seats would be available to members not qualifying under previous provisions by lot.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Pittsfield, Mr. Susi.

Mr. SUSI: Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House: I would like to give some background to this order. For many decades the location of the seats in this House remained the same. Through the years, in deference to the seniority of returning members of this House, the House has in the past extended to them the courtesy of retaining their old seats when the new session began. A special problem has arisen at this time due to this new seating arrangement which eliminates two of the previous aisles and presents a situation wherein the seat numbers and the locations assigned in the 102nd Legislature, the last Legislature, do not correspond with the numbers and locations which are presently in effect under this existing seating arrangement.

Should this body wish now to continue the practice over the past of affording the returning members this same courtesy, it is apparent that certain adjustments should be offered to accomplish this purpose. Although we could enter into an extended controversy on the exact details of how this was to be accomplished, I believe that this order is a reasonable and fair resolution of our problem and I would ask that you give it your favorable consideration.

Thereupon, the Order received passage.

In the House, the Communication was read and referred to the Committee on Gubernatorial Vote in concurrence.

House at Ease

Called to order by the Speaker.

At this point, the Senate entered the Hall of the House of Representatives amid applause and a Joint Convention was formed.

In Convention

President Campbell of the Senate in the Chair.

On motion of Senator Johnson of Somerset, the following members were appointed a committee to receive, sort and count votes for the Secretary of State: On the part of the Senate:

Senator JOHNSON from Somerset; Senator ROSS from Piscataquis, and Senator HARDING from Aroostook. On the part of the House: MR. DENNETT from Kittery, MRS. BAKER from Orrington, Mr. RICHARDSON from Stonington, MR. JEWELL from Monticello, MR. LEVESQUE from Madawaska, MR. BRENNAN from Portland. and MR. LOWERY from Brunswick,

Having attended to the duties assigned. Senator Johnson for the Committee, reported as follows:

Total number of votes cast:169Necessary for choice:85Joseph T. Edgar had117Carlton Day Reed Jr. had52

Which report was Accepted and Joseph T. Edgar having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared elected Secretary of State for the political years 1967 and 1968.

On motion of Senator Harding of Aroostook, it was voted that by unanimous consent of this Convention the nominees for the remaining State offices to be named by this Convention be placed before the Convention by the Chairman, and that the respective contests be resolved by the same vote division as recorded in the prior division.

The Chair thereupon placed before the Convention the names of the nominees for State Treasurer, with the resultant vote:

Total number of votes cast169Necessary for a choice85Michael Napolitano had117Eben L. Elwell had52

The Chair declared the Honorable Michael Napolitano elected State Treasurer.

The Chair next placed before the Convention the names of the nominees for election as Attorney General, with the resultant vote: Total number of votes cast 169 Necessary for a choice 85 James S. Erwin had 117 Richard J. Dubord had 52

The Chair declared the Honorable James S. Erwin elected as Attorney General.

The Chair next placed before the Convention the names of the nominees for election as Executive Councilors with the resultant vote:

The Chair declared the Honorables Fred Hanscom, L. Robert Porteous, Jr., Richard Morton, Kenneth Robinson, Richard Willey, Lewis O. Barrows, and E. Perrin Edmunds the duly elected Executive Councilors for the political years 1967 and 1968.

On motion of Senator Hildreth of Cumberland, it was

ORDERED, that the Secretary be directed to notify the Honorable JOSEPH T. EDGAR of his election as Secretary of State; NAPOLÍ-Honorable MICHAEL TANO of his election as State Treasurer; Honorable JAMES ERWIN of his election as Attorney General; and the Honor-ables LEWIS O. BARROWS, E. PERRIN EDMUNDS, FRED HANSCOM, RICHARD MORTON, L. ROBERT PORTEOUS, KENNETH ROBINSON, JR. and RICHARD WILLEY of their elections as Executive Councilors for the political years 1967 and 1968.

Subsequently, the Secretary reported that he had notified the officers as directed.

On motion of Senator JOHNSON of Somerset, it was

ORDERED, that a message be sent to the Governor informing him of the election of Honorable JOSEPH T. EDGAR as Secretary of State; Honorable MICHAEL NAPOLITANO as State Treasurer; Honorable JAMES ERWIN as Attorney General; and the Honorables LEWIS O. BARROWS, E. PERRIN EDMUNDS, FRED HAN- SCOM, RICHARD MORTON, L. ROBERT PORTEOUS, JR., KEN-NETH ROBINSON, and RICHARD WILLEY as Executive Councilors for the political years 1967 and 1968.

The President appointed Senator Johnson of Somerset to convey the message.

Subsequently, that Senator reported that he had delivered the message with which he was charged.

The purpose for which the Joint Convention was formed having been accomplished, the Chairman declared the same dissolved.

The Senate then retired to its Chamber amid the applause of the House, the members rising.
