Senator from Kennebec, Senator Levine.

Mr. LEVINE: Mr. President, I rise today to speak to the Members of the Senate. I am in opposition to the good Senator from York, Senator Lovell's Motion to Accept the Minority Ought to Pass Report on this Bill.

The title of the Bill sounds very good to everyone concerned, "An Act Concerning Open Alcoholic Beverage Containers in Motor Vehicles"; however, I see a great many Vehicles"; however, I see a great many problems in this if we should enact this Bill. I will read just one short section. They speak of the definition of an open bottle and so on, and then one section reads "unless that bottle, can or other receptacle is kept in the trunk of the vehicle, if that vehicle is equipped with a trunk, or kept behind the rear seat of the vehicle, if the vehicle is not equipped with a trunk. In other words, if you drive a station wagon or a pick up truck, or some form of four wheel drive motor vehicle, all you have to do is dump that bottle behind the seat, and you are in compliance with the law

Also there is an Amendment on this Bill which defines open containers, and part of that definition reads "Liquor bottles or other receptacles with the top secured shall not be con-sidered as open." In other words, if someone wants to drink beer and drive down the road, they will simply stop drinking from cans and start drinking from bottles and secure that cap.

These are just a few of the problems that I foresee here. Because of that, I do not think this law would be very effective.

Also, I would like to propose to the Senate a couple of other small problems that might arise. For instance, some person, I will say myself - I go to a club or bottle club or a night club or party at a private dwelling, whatever, and there is someone there that is really in no condition to drive himself home. Well, not wishing to see anyone die on the highway, I would give that person a ride home. Now if my car is stopped by an officer to check for anything, and this person I am giving a ride to has a pint in his pocket, or a bottle on him, and it is not securely fastened, then I am responsi-ble for that. I can be fined for it.

Also there is a slight problem here, and I have heard that this problem can be taken care of by the discretion of the police officers. I am not at all sure we should pass laws that are left to the discretion of a police officer. I do not feel we should have very much discretionary lee-way, because if the law is on the books, it should be enforced. What, for instance, if my wife is tak-ing some bottles back to the store, and there is a bottle in the back seat half full of beer. In that case, if a police officer wished to, he could issue her a summons for being in violation of the law. These are a few of the small problems here.

I really want to speak today on something that has been bothering me a good deal in the last few weeks. We have done a lot of talking in here about how all of us are agreed that we want to do something about the problem of abuse of alcoholic beverages in and out of motor vehicles. But let us be very careful that we do not jump the gun on this. We have to be very careful that we do not vote for just any Bill that comes along that sounds like it might do the job. We are going to be emotionally involved in these Bills necessarily. We have made a promise to the people of the State of Maine that we are going to try to do something legislatively, if possible, to help solve these problems.

I think this piece of Legislation should not be passed. I agree, I signed the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report on it in the Liquor Committee. I have serious doubts about how germane this actually is, how it might be enforced, if at all, and I would move to defeat the Motion.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Hickens. Mr. HICHENS: Mr. President and Members

of the Senate: In due respect to the remarks just made by the Senator from Kennebec, I do think that we should proceed slowly and not jump at every straw that seems to blow before us for the protection of the young people especially in our State, but I do think that with the arguments presented two or three weeks ago on L. D. 4, and the papers that came along with it, that many of our young people would go over into New Hampshire and bring back beer, and would not wait until they got all the way home, they would be drinking it on the way back. I think this is one of those safety precautions which this Bill provides, which would prevent some of the violations of the law which might result from their bringing the beer back into the State.

Last week I was discussing this Bill with a member of the State Police force, and he told me that 90 percent of Maine people think that the law prohibits open bottles in the cars right now, and he said it was a sad thing that this Bill was ever presented because it brings this out to the public, that it is not a law, and it was his opinion, and it is my opinion also, that we have to pass this law now, because there would be so many flagrant violations if it were not passed. I support the Motion of the Senator from

York, Senator Lovell. The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Merrill.

Mr. MERRILL: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: You know, yesterday the Presiding Officer of this Body recognized a former Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Clifford, and Senator Clifford, one of the Bills he was always in favor of every two years when he was here, was the Bill to create a unicameral Legislature, and I was always against it, because I thought that there was a good need to have one Body to be a check on the other, and I thought that the primary check that was always needed was for a Body to take a look at well motivated Bills to make sure that there would be some relation between the accomplishment and the motivation. If ever I have seen a broad disparity between good motivation and what would be accomplished, it is in this Bill.

It is presently against the law, obviously, to operate a motor vehicle while intoxicated. It is presently against the law to consume alcoholic beverages while in an automobile, and that law itself sometimes is enforced to the absurdity. Two years ago I was involved with a case, not, I can assure you, as the accused — but I was in-volved in a case in which a man drove up from Massachusetts to enjoy the Maine scenery, went to the store and bought himself an Italian sandwich and a beer, drove down the road and drove off onto a wide shoulder, sort of a scenic look-out point, unrolled the wrapper from the Italian sandwich, took the top off the beer and took one drink and was arrested for drinking while in a motor vehicle, and was prosecuted to the full extent of the law. He was a law abiding citizen, so he did not force the state to extradite him from Massachusetts, but came up here and took a day off from work.

I think that the law we have presently, if it is enforced, is strict enough. There are major problems, of course, in any enforcement of this kind, and by taking away the requirement that the person be seen drinking, you do not overcome some of those problems, which involve proving the contents of the container, which involves some expense. I think when you look at the absurd length that you have to go to in definition to have a Bill of this kind, what is revealed, in fact, is the fact that you are going a little too far. To stop somebody from drinking or to stop somebody from being drunk in an automobile, you are making a law that he cannot drink in an automobile. To stop him from drinking in the automobile, you are making a law that he cannot have an open container in an automobile. How much beverage has to be in the container before he has violated the law. That question was touched on by the Senator

Inal question was touched on by the senator from Kennebec, Senator Levine. It could be a very legitimate concern in the future. I think if ever there was a Bill that there was a need for the other Body to, by unicameral responsibility, to exercise as it passes through the books, it is this one.

I move Indefinite Postponement of this Bill

and all its accompanying papers. The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from York, Senator Lovell.

Mr. LOVELL: Mr. President, this Bill had a good hearing in front of the Liquor Control Committee, and the Liquor Control Committee felt that the Bill was out of line due to the extent, as the good Senator from Kennebec has stated, that you can throw the bottle in the back in your trunk or in back of the back seat, so ac-Amendment "A". In so rewriting the Bill, we made it to the extent that the container had to be open in the car, and cut it down to a good Bill be open in the car, and cut it down to a good Bill to the extent that if a person was caught drink-ing while driving, it is not against the law now unless their blood count is .10 or over, so conse-quently we felt that they should not be allowed to drink while driving. We have many people in my area drinking beer from containers or cans while driving their car to and from, or around the Town. The Police do not seem to do much about if about it.

This law is not a very great law to that extent. It would probably be hard to enforce. But it will give a little leverage to police departments to stop the younger people in particular from drinking in parking lots with their girl friends, in front of shopping centers, and screeching out onto the streets, and at the same time it will stop the person from drinking and having an open container in his car, and drinking from that bottle. But, on the other hand, he can put the cap on the bottle, if he is quick enough, and he is watching for the police, as most everybody is watching for the police if they are drinking if he can put the cap on the bottle quick enough, then it is perfectly legal. All he has got to do is get the cap on the bottle.

Now the good Senator from Kennebec, Senator Pierce, has an Amendment that he wants to put on it to make it a little more strict.

wants to put on it to make it a little more strict. I would hope that you would vote against Indefinitely Postponing this Bill, and let Mr. Pierce put on his Amendment. Thank you. The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Merrill. Mr. MERRILL: Mr. President and Members of the Senate: With all due respect, I think that the arguments of the Senator from York out-

'the arguments of the Senator from York out-line the absurd effect of this well-intentioned Bill, unless there is a feeling on the part of the Senate that the ability to put a cap on a liquor bottle fast enough to avoid the policeman getting to your car is in some way a substitute for the sobriety test

The PRESIDENT: Is the Senate ready for the question? The pending question before the Senate is the Motion by the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Merrill, that the Senate Indefinitely Postpone L. D. 103 and all of its accompanying papers. The Chair will order a Division.

Will all those Senators in favor of Indefinite Postponement please rise in their places to be counted.

Will all those Senators opposing Indefinite Postponement please rise in their places to be counted.

21 Senators having voted in the affirmative, and 10 Senators in the negative, the Motion to Indefinitely Postpone does prevail.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Merrill.

Mr. MERRILL: Mr. President, having voted on the prevailing side, I would move recon-

sideration of that Senate Vote. The PRESIDENT: The Senator from Cumberland, Senator Merrill, now moves the Senate reconsider its action whereby it voted to Indefinitely Postpone this Bill. Will all those Senators in favor of reconsideration please say 'yes". Those opposed will please say "no."

A viva voce vote being had, The Motion to Reconsider does not prevail.
