Was reported by the Committee on Bills in the Second Reading and read the second time. The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the

Mr. KELLEHER: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: This bill was dis-cussed in some detail last Friday and it passed the approval of this House by one vote. I attempted at that time to discourage supporters of this bill based on one very simple issue that I think is very prevalent across the State of Maine, and that is the problem of the availability of beer and wine for the youngsters of this state.

I am sure that a great many of you are fami-liar with this bill which would allow in the retail stores the sale of alcoholic beverages. Instead of 17 year olds supervised by 18 year olds, it is the old erosion process, now it is down to the age level of 16.

When the drinking age bill was raised in this state to 20, there was considerable debate in this House on how the retail stores would be able to sell their merchandise with youngsters under 20 years of age. At that time, it was the wisdom of both sides of the aisle concerning the drinking age bill that was before the legislature to leave the sales provision at 17, under the supervision of 18 year olds. I think it was crystal clear at that time, and my problem is, ladies and gentlemen, I am seeing here again today the erosion of the process of the allowability of 16 year olds to sell beer and wine in stores under supervision.

I have got a feeling this morning that there is going to be an attempt to suggest that this House may want to table the bill because of alleged amendments to be offered. That is all right in itself, except I think I understand the process and know what delaying tactics can mean.

The lobby that is supporting this bill, at least one of them was running around breathlessly out on the third floor because of the fact they could feel that the attempt by this body was to kill it. The votes perhaps are here this morning. I would hope that if they are here, we would not accept any motions except the one I am going to make right at the moment, and that is that I move, Mr. Speaker, that this bill and all its accompanying papers be indefinitely postponed. When the vote is taken, I respectfully request the yeas and nays. The SPEAKER: The gentleman from

Bangor, Mr. Kelleher, moves that this bill and all its accompanying papers be indefinitely postponed.

The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Cape Elizabeth, Mrs. Masterton.

Mrs. MASTERTON: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: There is no attempt, I believe, to have any delaying tactics on this bill. It is a fact that an amendment is being prepared to make it a little bit more palatable for those who are opposed to it. It was a very close vote.

In addition, the Small Grocers Association is meeting at 12 noon today, and I would like to extend to them the courtesy of talking over this amendment and seeing how they respond to it.

Mr. Speaker, I request that this bill be tabled-1 would like to have somebody table it for me.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cumberland, Mr. Garsoe.

Mr. GARSOE: Mr. Speaker, I move that this

item be tabled for one legislative day. Whereupon, Mr. Kelleher of Bangor requested a vote

The SPEAKER: The pending question is on the motion of the gentleman from Cumberland, Mr. Garsoe, that this bill be tabled pending the motion of Mr. Kelleher of Bangor to indefinitely postpone and tomorrow assigned. All those in favor will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Limestone, Mr. McKean, moves that we reconsider our action of earlier in the day whereby Bill "An Act to Restrict Access to Allagash Lake in the Allagash Wilderness Waterway," Senate Paper 254, L. D. 728, was referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources in concurrence.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Waldoboro, Mr. Blodgett. Mr. BLODGETT: Mr. Speaker, I would

object to this, and I would hope that we would oppose such a motion.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Limestone, Mr. McKean.

Mr. McKEAN: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I have discussed this bill purposely with the committee chairmen on Fisheries and Wildlife. There is a question on the limiting of inland fisheries, this being salmon fishing, togue fishing, and the purpose of what I am going to do would for discussion with the committee chairmen to get the exact purpose of this particular bill. As it stands right now, the bill is more in line with fish and wildlife than it would be energy and natural resources. Therefore, I wish you would give us the opportunity to check further into the exact purpose of the bill. The SPEAKER: The Chair will order a vote.

The pending question is on the motion of the gentleman from Limestone, Mr. McKean, that the House reconsider its action of earlier in the day whereby L. D. 728 was referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources in concurrence. All those in favor will vote yes. those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken.

Whereupon, Mr. Blodgett of Waldoboro re-quested a roll call vote.

The SPEAKER: For the Chair to order a roll call, it must have the expressed desire of one fifth of the members present and voting. All those desiring a roll call vote will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken, and more than one fifth of the members present having expressed a desire for a roll call, a roll call was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Waldoboro, Mr. Blodgett.

Mr. BLODGETT: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: L. D. 728 is an issue not dealing exclusively with fishing but it has to do with the rule-making procedure and those rules made by LURC. For this reason, the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources deals with this on a regular basis and has, in fact, asked LURC to make some changes in their rules and regulations and it would be appropriate, therefore, that the Energy and Natural Resources Committee handle this particular bill rather than the Inland Fisheries and Game

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lincoln, Mr. MacEachern. Mr. MacEACHERN: Mr. Speaker, Ladies

and Gentlemen of the House: I feel that this bill should go to Fisheries and Wildlife. If you have read the bill, the bill does nothing but prevent someone from going up a stream in a canoe to Allagash Lake. The pond that they land their airplanes on with their canoes is outside the Allagash Wilderness Waterway and most of the activity that this restricts is without the waterway. I feel that it should come under the jurisdiction of Fisheries and Wildlife

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Milo, Mr. Masterman.

Mr. MASTERMAN: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: Representative Mac-Eachern showed vividly where this area is. It is on the Allagash Waterway, but he is perfectly right when he says that they don't land there.
