#### After Recess

Senate called to order by the President.

At this point a message was received from the House of Representatives through William Garsoe of Cumberland informing the Senate that the House of Representatives was assem-bled and awaiting the Senate for a Joint Convention of both branches of the Legislature.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec Senator Katz

Senator KATZ: Mr. President, I want to call the Chair's, and the Senate's attention, the fact that this is the recess portion of our first Legislative Session which we began yesterday. In the fulfillment of our constitutional duties as specified by the constitution, we are going to proceed to elect the Treasurer and the Secretary of State, and, probably the Attorney General, also.

At this point, the Senate retired to the hall of the House of Representatives where a Joint Convention was formed.

Report of Joint Select Committee on GU-BERNATORIAL VOTE. STATE OF MAINE

The Joint Select Committee of the One Hundred and Ninth Legislature on returns of votes for Governor given in the several cities, towns and plantations of this State for the political years 1979, 1980, 1981 and 1982, has attended to its duty and asks leave to report that the whole

number of votes returned for Governor was 370,258; and that Joseph E. Brennan of Portland had 176, 493 votes; Herman C. Frankland of Bangor had 65,889 votes; Linwood E. Palmer, Jr. of Nobelboro had 126,862 votes; James B. Longley of Lewiston had 628 votes and Others had 386 votes

On motion by Senator Katz of Kennebec, ORDERED, that a message be sent to the House of Representatives proposing a Conven-tion of both branches of the Legislature to be held at 6:30 P.M. at the Augusta Civic Center for the purpose of administering to the Honora-ble JOSEPH E. BRENNAN, Governor-elect, the oath required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties

Which was Read and Passed.

The President appointed, Senator Katz of Kennebec, to deliver the message, the Senator then returned to the Hall of the House of Representatives and subsequently reported that he had performed the duties with which he was charged.

On motion by Senator Pray of Penobscot: ORDERED, the House concurring, that a Committee of three on the part of the Senate, with such as the House may join, be appointed to wait upon the Honorable JOSEPH E. BREN-NAN, and inform him that he has been duly elected Governor of the State of Maine for the political years 1979, 1980, 1981 and 1982. (S. P. 25)

Which was Read and Passed. Sent down forthwith for concurrence.

At this point a message was received from the House of Representatives, through Rep-resentative James E. Tierney of Lisbon Falls. informing the Senate that the House concurs in the recent proposal for a Joint Convention, to be held at the Augusta Civic Center at 6:30 o'clock, for the purpose of administering to the Honorable Joseph E. Brennen, Governor-elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

On motion by Senator Pierce of Kennebec. ORDERED, the House concurring, that a Joint Select Committee of three on the part of the Senate with such as the House may join, be appointed to consider the Governor's Message and report a reference of its several subjects to appropriate committees.
