Passed to Be Enacted **Emergency Measure**

An Act to Increase Eligibility Levels for the Elderly Householders Tax and Rent Refund Act (H. P. 1877) (L. D. 1862) Was reported by the Committee on En-

grossed Bills as truly and strictly engrossed. The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the

gentleman from Scarborough, Mr. Higgins. Mr. HIGGINS: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gen-tlemen of the House: It has been kind of a long and winding road the last day or two surrounding this particular bill and I hestitate to even talk too much about it. I kind of got discouraged the last day or so because I had a feeling that perhaps some petty politics was being played with this particular issue. I don't need to go too far into the issue at hand and explain that anymore than to say that I think it is unfortunate if we are trying to play politics with the elderly

The bill that you have before you is the same bill that we enacted when we were in special session in December. It does do two things the Speaker alluded to one of them earlier today

What it does do, it allows those people who qualified for the program the opportunity to get their refund checks under the Elderly Rent Refund Act immediately. They will not have to wait until March 10; they won't have to reap-ply. The money is there. Taxation is ready, willing and able to send the checks out, and it will allow them to get them immediately without having to wait

The other thing that the bill does, along with the Attorney General's opinion, is that it clears up some misconstrued ideas. I guess, over whether or not the low cost drug program is retroactive. It states very clearly that it is not retroactive, that anybody who is eligible for the program will become eligible as of today, or whenever the Governor signs this bill, and not on March 10.

So it does those two things - it maks people eligible for the elderly drug program today in-stead of on March 10, and it also allows the checks to be given out immediately without having to wait another six weeks. I think that is important. I think we all understand the reason why, especially with the weather we have had in the last couple of weeks

As I say, I even hesitated to rise but I did not want to clear up the two points and just perhaps clear up the record as to where I stand on the issue, and I hope you will join with me in

giving this your unanimous support. The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Owl's Head, Mrs. Post.

Mrs. POST: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: I want to make just one further clarification or correct something that was said. People will not become eligible for the drug program when this bill is actually enacted, but individuals will become eligible for the elderly drug program when they are individually certified as being eligible for the Tax and Rent Refund Program. Some of those people are already on computer; those are the people who filed last year. The Bureau of Taxation already has some applications that have been sent in.

But particularly because of the drug program. I would urge people across the state if they do in fact have the forms for the elderly tax and rent refund, to send them in as soon as possible, particularly if there are needs as far as the drug program is concerned. The SPEAKER: The pending question is on

passage to be enacted. This being an emergency measure, it requires a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to the House. All those in favor will vote yes; those opposed will vote no. A vote of the House was taken.

132 voted in favor of same and none against, and accordingly the Bill was passed to be enacted, signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.

By unanimous consent, ordered sent forthwith.
