Mr. ROLDE: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: Very briefly, I would just like to say a few words about Amnesty International and also remind you that this afternoon, at twelve o'clock, in the Legislative Council Chamber, Mr. Michael Posner, who is the Executive Director of the Lawyers' Committee for International Human Rights and a member of the Amnesty International Board of Directors, will speak on the organization and on international human rights.

Briefly, just to tell you about Amnesty International, it is an organization that has won the Nobel Prize, and its main goal is to deal with, on a totally even-handed basis, what they call prisoners of conscience, those people who have been in prison in any country not for what they have done, not for any acts that they have committed, but simply for stating their beliefs. So, anyone who is a terrorist would not be helped by this organization, only somebody who is in person simply because of what he thought was right.

I have also distributed to you a copy of their publication called "The Matchbox." I hope you will have a chance to read it, and you can see just on the cover the even-handed distribution of their efforts, because they are dealing with freeing a political prisoner in South Korea, which is a non-communist country, and a political prisoner in Cuba, which is a communist country. That very much symbolizes their efforts. They deal with prisoners behind the Soviet Union, as well as prisoners in fascist

Argentina.

My own involvement — I have been a member of their national organization for some time. I have written letters on behalf of prisoners in both types of countries. I also want to say there is a chapter in Augusta, there are a couple of chapters in Maine. If anybody is interested and cannot get to hear Mr. Posner, they can talk to me about any further interest they might have. It is very useful to have legislators as members, because when you write to other governments to try and help prisoners, it is very useful if you do have people who are in government themselves.

The SPEAKER pro tem: The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Portland, Mrs. Nelson.

Mrs. NELSON: Mr. Speaker, I move acceptance of the Majority "Ought Not to Pass" Report.

The SPEAKER pro tem: The gentlewoman from Portland, Mrs. Nelson, moves that the Majority "Ought Not to Pass" Report be accepted.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Island Falls, Mr. Smith.

Mr. SMITH: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I hope you will vote against the motion before you and vote with me to accept the Minority Report.

When I first introduced this bill, I contacted a few people with the low-income program and I felt after talking with them that it was a good bill. When the bill was printed, I contacted some lobbyists and the pharmacists that were opposed to it. I asked why. The answer was, we are doing it now. Well, I said, if so, what is the problem? I got no answer. A few days later, the same person came to me again and said they were not going to oppose it, but at the hearing they did oppose it and offered an amendment. The amendment would make law what is now a regulation and I feel that maybe, just maybe, when made law those pharmacists would comply with it.

The original bill would require generics to be dispensed unless the doctor stated otherwise. The amendment will allow the pharmacists to decide whether or not the generic drug is of equal quality, and if they feel it is not, they would prescribe the brand name. On the original bill the doctor would be contacted for that decision. My reasoning is that if a drug that has been prescribed to you by your doctor does not agree with you, you would let your doctor know, not the pharmacist.

I have been taking generic drugs for over four years for a heart condition. I have talked with other members of this body and they have been taking generic drugs and find no problems and it saves considerable money. The generic drug which I take costs me \$5.95 for 100, which includes postage. The state pays \$9.61 for 100 of the same generic drug and \$19.24 for the brand name. The state is supposed to be buying it wholesale.

Generic drugs have been referred to by some pharmacists as junk, made in bathtubs, and they would not prescribe them to anyone. In 1972, Henry E. Simons, M.D., of the FDA, then the head of the Bureau of Drugs, stated: "On the basis of the data that we have accrued to date, we cannot conclude there is a significant difference in quality between generic and brand name products tested. Both large and small pharmaceutical firms have had quality control problems." In 1978, in testimony concluded in House Subcommittee on Consumer Protection and Finance, Donald Kennedy, PHD, then AFD Commissioner, affirmed that in FDA's view there is no widespread difference in the quality among drugs approved by the FDA, whether they are sold under the generic name or under heavily advertised brand names. We all know the cost of advertising and who pays for that.

The elderly have the greatest need for drugs; in general, the lowest income. The state should have much to say about low-income drug programs. In every instance, it saves taxpayers money and provides the service to all who qualify. It was stated at the hearing that we are making second-class citizens of our elderly by making them take generic drugs. The VA prescribes generic drugs, and I believe anyone would be wrong to classify our veterans as second-class citizens.

There is an old saying: "what's in a name?" In this case, it is dollars. The United States Department of Agriculture gives out cheese to those who qualify. I do not believe that you will find a brand name on the cheese and I do not believe that the people who get the cheese ask if it is Kraft, Borden's or any other brand.

Please vote no on the motion before you. I would ask for a roll call.

The SPEAKER pro tem: The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Portland, Mrs. Nelson.

Mrs. NELSON: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: I don't think anyone here is against generic drugs. We know that they are, in many cases, equal to the value of the regular drug but that is not the issue. The issue that was brought before our committee was, should all generic drugs be used in place of prescribed drugs for the elderly. There are only three kinds of illnesses which this refers to, and that is high blood pressure, heart disease and diabetes.

Right now, at this very moment, the pharmacists must do what this bill requires them to do. There is no need for this bill because already in regulation it appears. Once a regulation has gone through the proper procedures, it has all the effects and all the strengths of a law; so, in fact, what this gentleman is trying to do, with all good intentions, is already being done. So we in our committee, who listened to the hearing and had three workshops on it, who have spoken to the people in the department and found out indeed wherever necessary, wherever needed, wherever possible, generic drugs are indeed substituted in these cases. We don't need this; we don't need it, it is being done.

We have asked the department to remind the pharmacists that a rule and regulation has, indeed, all the force of a law, and they have promised that they will send out to remind the pharmacists that that is true.

Ladies and gentlemen, we don't need extra laws on the books. God knows, we have enough already. This is one piece of legislation we don't need because we are doing it, we are doing it now, we are doing it well. PLease support the "ought not to pass" motion.

The SPEAKER pro tem: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Island Falls, Mr. Smith.

Mr. SMITH: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I think as she pointed out, it is now regulation, but as I said before, the pharmacists' lobbyist was opposed to it. He said, we are already doing it. Well, if they are already doing it, why are they opposed to it? It is simply that a law seems to have more affect on people than just having regulations. I have an item here: Many pharmacists do not stock the generic drugs because they are less profitable, they complicate their inventory, and that is a matter of fact.

The SPEAKER pro tem: A roll call has been requested. For the Chair to order a roll call, it must have the expressed desire of one-fifth of the members present and voting. Those in favor will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken, and more than one-fifth of the members present having expressed a desire for a roll call, a roll call was ordered.

The SPEAKER protem: The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Portland, Mrs. Nelson.

Mrs. NELSON: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: Just one last comment. May I quote from a relatively famous person from France who says it so much better than I—"what have our legislators gained by selecting a hundred thousand particular cases and actions and applying them in a hundred thousand laws to them? The most desirable laws are those that are the rarest and simplist and most general, and even I think it would be better to have none at all, to have them all in such numbers as we have.

We have it, it is on the books, there is no problem and I ask you to please support the "Ought Not to Pass" Report.

The SPEAKER pro tem: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Island Falls, Mr. Smith.

Mr. SMITH: Mr. Speaker, Members of the House: I think there is a problem or I wouldn't have this bill before you.

The SPEAKER pro tem: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question is on the motion of the gentlewoman from Portland, Mrs. Nelson, that the Majority "Ought Not to Pass" Report be accepted. All those in favor will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.
