PENDING-Motion of Representative CROWLEY of Stockton Springs to Recede and Concur.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from St. George, Representative Scarpino.

Representative SCARPINO: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: In concurrence with the Speaker's request to keep the debate short, I will do that.

I hope you would oppose the pending motion to recede and concur simply because of the fact that there is grounds for compromise on this and I would like to make a motion to insist and request a Committee of Conference. Rather than get involed in all the rest of that based on the possibility of compromise, I would request we oppose the recede and concur in order to insist and request a Committee of Conference.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Stockton Springs, Representative Crowley.

Representative CROWLEY: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: Last Wednesday, when the bill was in a different position of Ought to Pass, the majority on the committee decided not to debate it in respect of the time constraints here in the House. So we let it go to the other body and it came back in the posture that we anticipated.

After Wednesday, I called the Marine Patrol Office concerning this bill and asked them why in the Lord's name they didn't take a stand on this bill and the Marine Patrol Office answered probably we made a mistake because this bill would be totally unenforceable. We could not enforce this bill because 50 percent of the vessels that come into Maine come in from outof-state in the summer. He claimed that the enforcement would be impossible where no other state has this same law. For example, he mentioned the fact that the New York City Yacht clubs come in here with many, many vessels every summer and, if this law were in place then and any of them had these vessels, they would not be able to have the New York City Yacht Club.

I remember when I ran a restaurant a few years back in Boothbay Harbor and the traffic we got in the summer off the water was just fabulous. In fact, it was the making of our little restaurant. I am afraid this bill would interfere with that. I think it is also probably an encroachment on interstate commerce jurisdiction.

So that we won't go on too long with this debate, I think you all have a position on it at this time anyway, I don't think we need to clutter the Maine Statutes with laws such as this.

I hope you will please vote to recede and concur.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from St. George, Representative Scarpino.

Representative SCARPINO: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: I can understand my Chairman's concerns and I can understand the departments concerns with the enforcement of it. However, if one looks at all the marine laws, it is extremely difficult to enforce all marine laws. Basically, what the marine laws depend on is quite simply the fact that 90 or 95 percent of the people, both in the State of Maine and in this country, are law abiding individuals and, if there is law, they will not knowingly and willingly violate it. There are those individuals, however, that will, and I will be the first one to admit that there will be a difficulty in enforcing it with those people, however, by enacting it into law and depending upon the good faith and law abiding character of citizens of this state and other states, this bill will reduce a potential large amount of damage to lobster gear.

I am also very happy that my chairman brought up the New York Yacht Club. I wasn't going to bring it up but seeing he has, let me explain to you the way the yacht club normally comes through. They come through my town of Port Clyde every year. Normally, you have a commodore's vessel, which is a 55 or 60 foot twin screw power vessel, it has the navigator aboard it with the radar equipment to Loran and you have in excess of 100 other vessels following one major vessel. Generally speaking, they are not familiar with the waters, they are not familiar with the channels and they are not familiar with the means and methods that the fishermen use in the setting of their fixed gear, be it stopped seines or lobster gear.

The best way to describe what they look like is a mother duck with 120 little ones following behind her. They cut a swath about one quarter of a mile wide when they transit the waters of this state. If all of those vessels had cutters on them, they, in effect, every place they went, would have the potential of destroying all the lobster gear up to an area one quarter of a mile wide every place they they happen to wander.

Now, my committee chairman talked about the money that the touring yacht clubs and such bring to the restaurants and they bring that money to my town also. However, the lobster industry brings a lot of money into the State of Maine also. Just the landings last year were in excess of \$20 million to the fishermen themselves. When you add up all the support services that exist in shipyards, in restaurants, in trucking, in handling, if we used the federal standards, which is six to one, we are talking about roughly \$100 to \$120 million. Each lobster fisherman has invested in every one of his traps, depending on the size and the amount of wharf, between \$40 and \$50 sitting on the bottom of the ocean. Every one of those cutter that grabs a piece of pot warp and cuts it will cost that fisherman \$40 to \$50 in investments plus lost income for the rest of the season. I think when you judge everything, look at the potential loss to the individual and the potential loss of income to the state, that this is a good bill with whatever minor problems it might have for enforcement. I still believe that there is grounds for a compromise and would ask that you oppose the recede and concur motion in order to accept the motion to insist and set up a Committee of Conference.

The SPEAKER: The Chair will order a vote. The pending question before the House is the motion of the Representative from Stockton Springs, Representative Crowley, that the House recede and concur. All those in favor of the motion to recede and concur will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken.

60 having voted in the affirmative and 68 in the negative, the motion did not prevail.

Representative Vose of Easport moved the House reconsider its action whereby the motion to recede and concur failed.

The same Representative requested a roll call vote.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Eastport, Representative Vose.

Representative VOSE: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I sat and listened to the debate because I think my Chairman, Representative Crowley, had some good points. I am not denying that Representative Scarpino had some good points too. I think it should be brought out that there are no restrictions with the exception of being out into navigational waters or the positioning of the lobster traps. A lobsterman can generally, unless prohibited by the Department in some areas or unless it is in a navigational lane that is a federal lane, they can put the traps just about anywhere they want to. On occassion, there has been situations where you can practically walk on the traps. As a matter of fact, that was what was said by a constituent of mine, a Mr. David Turner, who has a purse seiner and a stop seiner and has asked me to speak against passage of this bill for those reasons

Right now, the committee is considering a trap limit, not only for conservation purposes, but for the very fact that there are too many traps out there If you continue to put traps out there, just anywhere you want to, you are going to be a threat to navigation. There is no reason at all to think that the same boats that have been traveling these waters are now going to deliberately go through the traps and cut them. It is going to be the same number of people, same number of boats, they are going to try to avoid those because there is a buoy marking those traps. Fisherman pretty much know in the area that they are fishing, who owns these traps and where they are and they become accustomed to them and they will avoid them in whatever way possible. I think that when a fellow is out there with a large boat, a 60 footer or whatever, and he is attempting to fish in the waters and becomes entangled in some trap lines and stuff like that, he has to lose a full day. On occasion, you have to send a diver overboard to free the lines and it could cause considerable damage to his vessel. I believe it would necessarily cause more loss of traps, that it is from the same people. I would hope that you would reconsider your action whereby we failed to recede and concur.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from St. George, Representative Scarpino.

Representative SCARPINO: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: In listening to my good friend from Eastport, Representative Vose, one would think that lobstermen just randomly took their traps and threw them wherever they wanted to throw them, that they threw them in the middle of channels, and they clogged all passages and just made navigation generally difficult.

Perhaps the general consenus is, you kick a trap overboard and you haul it back with a lobster in it. That isn't quite the way it works. Lobsters move-different times of the year, you will find traps concentrated in different areas. Generally speaking, the fishermen, because of the potential finanical loss of setting gear in recognized ways of navigation in recognized channels, tend to keep out of those areas because, quite simply, they can't afford that kind of loss. They do not knowingly and willingly place their gear in hazard. They have a large investment in it. However, what does go in is that in the summer in particular when we have tourists boats come up through the area and very understandably they like to do what is called gunk holing, they like to run up into all these little places and look at our scenery and find nice little coves to moor in and that is fine, that is wonderful, that is what out coast is all about, but at certain times of the year, and primarily the months of June, July and August, when the lobster is shedding they are in up close in the rocks. In those areas, there is a lot of traps. I will be the first one to admit it because that is where the lobsters are and that is where you have to be if you want to make a living. So there is a real direct conflict in there. A very direct conflict. And quite simply in order to protect the livelihood of the citizens of Maine, we need this piece of legislation. It is that simple. It can be modified. There is acceptable compromise in it.

If one looks at the problems that the large boats have, as Mr. Vose brought up, now that 60 foot boat of Mr. Turner's, I don't know what he has in it, but if he has an 871 or 873 GM, 500 horse power engine, which isn't an unusual engine for a vessel like that, cutter or no cutter, cage or no cage, that boat will spit out lobster gear like a kid spitting out chicklets. It has got enough power, it takes warp and cuts it up in little pieces. There is considerable loss right now for lobster fishermen from draggers. It is a standard complaint from lobster fishermen about draggers with no cages cutting their gear off. There is a standard problem right now every summer with tourists vessels, with no cages on, cutting their gear off. Nobody is saying we want to make the life for the tourists difficult or impossible for him to be here. All that we are saying is that we have got to come to some kind of balance. The fishermen take a loss now by unprotected propellers. All we are asking is, don't have all of those propellers which have cutters on them, go through and, even without intent, through accident, through improper navigation, through lack of knowledge of local waters, increases the finanical loss to the fishermen in this state that already exists.

I would hope that everyone would hold their positions and we could send this to the Committee of Conference.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Stonington, Representative Rice

Representative RICE: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I was one of the signers of the "Ought Not to Pass" Report on this bill. I believe it is an unenforceable bill as it now stands but I believe there is room for compromise and I hope it does go back to a Committee of Conference.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Stockton Springs, Repre-

sentative Crowley.

Representative CROWLEY: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: To assume that all people that aren't in lobster fishing boats are inconsiderate, this is about what we are saying, because there are many, many fisheries out their in the ocean that would probably agree with our point, our position on this bill and also the hundreds of vachts and so forth that are goint to be out there in those waters this summer. If all of us in the House had yachts and were coming up through the State of Maine, I am sure we would all be law abiding, considerate citizens and I believe these yachtsmen are too. To say that one group is inconsiderate and the other is not is ridiculous. they are all considerate. I think we really need to kill this bill.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been requested. For the Chair to order a roll call, it must have the expressed desire of more than one-fifth of the members present and voting. Those in favor will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken and, obviously, more than one-fifth of the members present and voting having expressed a desire for a roll call, a roll call was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The pending question before the House is the motion of the motion of the Representative from Eastport, Representative Vose, that the House reconsider its action whereby it failed to reced and concur. Those in favor will vote yes; those opposed will vote

Representative SPROUL: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: Before this bill is enacted, I would like to say I have had a call from a constituent who raised a question to me which I did not know the answer. I deal very seldomly in any of the liquor bills or liquor laws. So, if I could, I would like to pose a question through the Chair.

What safeguards are there in this measure relating to the purchase someone going into a florist, purchasing a bouquet or arrangement, having the wine bought with it-what safeguards are there against who that is delivered to, whether it be a minor or some other individual who should otherwise not

have it?

The SPEAKER: Representative Sproul of Augusta poses a question through the Chair to anyone who may respond if they so desire.

The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative Hickey.

Mr. HICKEY: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: These people have a fairly substantial investment in their license and I am sure that all of them intend to abide by Title 28, Section 303 which says, no licensee can sell or deliver to a minor.

Thereupon, the Bill was passed to be enacted, signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.
