The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Brunswick, Representative Rydell. Representative RYDELL: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: I rise today to pay tribute to Olof Palme who was Sweden's Prime Minister -- a statesman who was an inspiration to me 20 years ago and whom I continued to respect and admire in the ensuing years. His untimely death from an assassin's bullet last Friday evening, as he strolled along a Stockholm street arm and arm with his wife, has brought shock and sadness to the people of his native country, to those of us here in Maine with close ties to Sweden and to countless others around the world.

His death will change the shape of Scandinavian politics and indeed of Scandinavian daily life and will bring a new fear to the people of Sweden and to all of Scandinavia for until now, everyone including heads of state, could lead normal family lives and until now, political violence was unknown in modern times.

As leader of the Social Democratic Party in Sweden, Olof Palme was first named Prime Minister in 1969 and he served in that capacity until 1976. Palme and the Social Democratic Party returned to power in 1982 and, just last September, he had been reelected to another three year term.

Olof Palme's own words can best describe his ideals and convictions. He once told a reporter "I was born in the upper class, but I belong to the labor movement. I have come to join the labor movement on its own conditions and by adhering to a movement which desires liberty, equality and fraternity between people." He lived out his life of 59 years adhering to those ideals and beliefs.

Palme's influence extended far beyond the borders of his own country. For me and many others, he was a leading exponent of social democracy. During the past two decades, he was frequently an intermediary between East and West, rich and poor. He was a member of the Brandt Commission on North-South Relations and he led a delegation to Tehran during the Iranian Revolution in an attempt to mediate a peaceful solution there.

In paying tribute to Olof Palme, I would like to echo the word of Sissela Bok, well known philosopher and daughter of Gunnar and Alva Myrdal each of whom were Swedish recipients of a Nobel Prize. After learning of his tragic death she said, "Olof Palme was a leader of exceptional courage, honesty, and brilliance, but what I shall most remember is his passionate concern for peace and for relieving the suffering of people, not only in Sweden but around the world."

Mr. Speaker, I respectfully request that when the House adjourns today, we do so in memory of the Swedish statesman, humanitarian and world leader, Olof Palme.

RESOLVE, Creating a Maine Commission to Commemorate the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution (Emergency) (S.P. 813) (L.D. 2045) which was referred to the Committee on <u>Appropriations and</u> <u>Financial Affairs</u> in the House on March 3, 1986.

Came from the Senate with that body having adhered to its previous action whereby the bill was referred to the Committee on <u>State Government</u> in non-concurrence.

On motion of Representative Nadeau of Saco, the House voted to recede and concur.

Non-Concurrent Matter

Bill "An Act Concerning Private Adoptions" (H.P. 1499) (L.D. 2112) which was referred to the Committee on <u>Judiciary</u> in the House on March 3, 1986.

Came from the Senate referred to the Committee on Legal Affairs in non-concurrence.

On motion of Representative Diamond of Bangor, tabled pending reference in concurrence and tomorrow assigned.

Non-Concurrent Matter

Bill "An Act Pertaining to Local Registration of Watercraft" (H.P. 1216) (L.D. 1724) which was Passed to Engrossed as amended by Committee Amendment "A" (H-522) as amended by House Amendment "B" (H-545) thereto in the House on March 3, 1986.

Came from the Senate with that body having adhered to its previous action whereby the bill was Passed to be Engrossed as amended by Committee Amendment "A" (H-522) in non-concurrence.

Representative Jacques of Waterville moved that the House recede and concur.

Representative Racine of Biddeford requested a roll call vote.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been requested. For the Chair to order a roll call, it must have the expressed desire of more than one-fifth of the members present and voting. Those in favor will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

A vote of the House was taken and more than one-fifth of the members present and voting having expressed a desire for a roll call, a roll call was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Waterville, Representative Jacques.

Representative JACQUES: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: The motion I just made, unfortunately, is the only motion that can be made to keep this bill alive, due to the actions of the other body where it adhered to its previous position.

There has been a little confusion about this bill. If I may read into the Record — I have a letter here from Deputy Commissioner Trask and I will just read a section of it for your benefit. "Our original intent in submitting this bill was to (1) provide a service to boat owners by allowing them to register watercraft in their hometowns and (2) to assist municipalities in the annual collection of watercraft excise taxes. Local registration will probably not have a substantial financial impact on our agency one way or the other. The savings in reduced mailings and over the counter assistance will be offset by having to deal with up to 500 municipal boat registration agents on a monthly basis. On the other hand, annual registration will increase our costs considerably. We will be sending our watercraft registration renewals to towns instead of individuals and computing registrations at the rate of 120,000 annually rather than 60,000 as in the provisions contained in this bill without additional funding.

Over the past four years, watercraft registration revenues, including federal reimbursement, have failed by \$179,390, an average of \$44,848 annually to cover our costs and administering and enforcing the Maine Boat Law. Enactment of L.D. 1724, without any adjustment in registration fees, will increase the annual shortfall by another \$60,000 annually. This shortfall, because we operate on dedicated revenue. would have to be borne by other user groups who purchase our licenses, primarily the hunters, trappers, and fishermen of the state.

We feel strongly that L.D. 1724 should be enacted in accordance of the Majority Report. However, rather than see the entire measure defeated because of a \$1.00 fee increase, we would suggest that the current two year registration period and the \$6.00 registration fee be retained. The municipalities will continue to experience difficulty in collecting annual watercraft excise taxes, but more importantly, boat owners will be able to register watercraft at the local level with minimal financial impact on our agency."

Unfortunately, we are not even in the position to do the last part of that recommendation. If the motion to recede and concur fails, the bill is 100 percent dead.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Biddeford, Representative Racine.

Representative RACINE: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I agree with what the good gentleman from Waterville stated, that if we do not recede and concur, the bill is dead. If we recede and concur, what we are doing is giving the local tax collector control over registering watercraft. However, by the same token, what will happen is that the individual that register their boats will have to pay the sum of \$2.00, one for the tax collector and one for the state on an annual basis. If this is what you want, fine.

I am opposed to it. I feel that if we give local control to the local tax collector and increase the fees -- in other words, it would cost us the sum of \$2.00 more to register under the system if we recede and concur.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Manning.

Representative MANNING: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: We are arguing today over one dollar. I dare say that anybody who has ever owned a boat, and I can say that because I owned a boat, one dollar was the cheapest thing that I probably paid when it came to registering my boat. You have to buy so many other things to deal with a boat -- but \$1.00? I would want that \$1.00 to go to those marine wardens because it might be that some night I might be out there in a friend's boat -- if I am out there -- and it breaks down, I would want that marine warden to be around to help me out.

\$40,000 of this goes to the Marine Resources Committee, which I think we have forgotten. We need to get more money into that department. The lobstermen have said, time and time again, they want more marine wardens out there. The department has already issued a statement to them that they can't work any more than the 40 hours, and if they have to work overtime to come out and rescue me in Casco Bay, I want to make sure they can. I would hope we would look at this by saying, \$1.00 to somebody who has a luxury item, a boat, the motor, a five horse power motor, I might add, probably costs -- even if you had it ten years ago, probably costs \$250, one measly dollar is not going to break any fisherman, any lobsterman, or any dragger in the State of Maine.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Mt. Desert, Representative Zirnkilton.

Representative ZIRNKILTON: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: I agree with Representative Manning but I will add just a couple of points, if I may. Not all boats are luxury boats. There are boats that are commercial. Those commercial boats venture around early in the morning, for the most part, and get back late in the afternoon or early evening. An opportunity to increase, not only the enforcement that helps us to protect the laws that this legislature has made with regard to Marine Resources Law, it gives us an opportunity to, whatever extent possible, make as much protection out there for the lives of those fishermen in the event that they ever become threatened, especially in light of Coast Guard cuts that we all know we face.

To respond to Representative Racine, on line 34 of page one of the bill it says, agents "may charge" and I stress the point (may charge), "a service fee of not more than \$1.00." It is not necessary that they have to charge that, that would be up to them.

It is a bill that emphasizes local control. It is an opportunity to register your watercraft on the local level. It also, as I mentioned the other day, helps one of the problems that we have with enforcement that now exists in the two year cycle of the watercraft excise tax law. That is, not everyone pays when they should. This will ensure that they will, in fact, pay that excise tax in a timely manner, on an annual basis, and it will make it easier for our towns and, with any luck at all, it will save them some money so they won't be out there chasing around those who don't pay their excise tax.

I hope you will support the motion to recede and concur. This is a pro-local bill.

The SPEAKER: The pending question before the House is the motion of Representative Jacques of Waterville that the House recede and concur.

The Chair recognizes the Representative from Harrison, Representative Jackson.

Representative JACKSON: Mr. Speaker, I wish to pair my vote with the Representative from Old Town, Representative Cashman. If he were here and voting, he would be voting yes; I would be voting no.

The SPEAKER: The pending question before the House is the motion of the Representative from Waterville, Representative Jacques, that the House recede and concur. Those in favor will vote yes; those opposed will vote no.

113 having voted in the affirmative and 11 in the negative with 25 being absent and 2 paired, the motion did prevail.
