JOINT RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING MARTIN LUTHER KING DAY WHEREAS, January 19, 1987, marks the second national holiday and the first state holiday in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., commemorating his birth on January 15, 1929; and

WHEREAS, Martin Luther King, Jr., advocated the herance of civil rights for black Americans furtherance through nonviolence; and

WHEREAS, this man of powerful voice and spirit showed this country a dream, a dream of "an oasis of freedom and justice;" and

WHEREAS, for his tireless work to ensure equality and justice, Dr. King was awarded the high and honorable distinction of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964: and

WHEREAS, his eloquence, his perseverance and his faith moved mountains and brought about sweeping changes by appealing to the better instincts and consciences of his fellow human beings; and

WHEREAS, the life of Martin Luther King, which ended so tragically on April 4, 1968, is a shining example to Americans and citizens of the world-at-large of uncompromising dedication to the

highest ideals; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the 113th Legislature in First Regular Session now assembled, acknowledge the extraordinary life and works of this teacher, reformer and humanitarian, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and pause in our deliberations to recognize and commemorate the occasion of his birth; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this Joint Resolution be sent forthwith by the Secretary of State to Coretta Scott King, widow of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and to the Maine office of the NAACP.

Was read.

SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes Representative from Portland, Representative Connolly. Representative CONNOLLY: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House: After a couple of delays, I appreciate the opportunity to present this Joint Resolution which commemorates the anniversary of the birth of Martin Luther King, Jr. and acknowledges the fact that we, as a state, celebrated this past Monday as the first date of the Martin Luther King, Jr.

A year ago, this House served as a stage for perhaps one of the most extraordinary and emotional debates ever to have occurred (at least during the years that I have served in this legislature) as we struggled with the bill that had been presented by Representative Bost to establish Martin Luther King's state holiday. That debate, perhaps as much as anything else that has occurred in the years that $\, {\rm I} \,$ have been in the legislature, I think demonstrated that we still have a long way to go as a society realize the dreams of Martin Luther King, Jr. It is true that bigotry and intolerance still exists in our society. Even today, in 1987, in certain parts of our country, the Ku Klux Klan still marches in opposition to the dreams of justice, freedom and equality for our people.

I think that we, as a legislature, citizens of the State of Maine, can stand proud that we, in not an insignificant way, helped to recognize and support the ultimate dream of Martin Luther King, Jr., that his children and all of our children will grow up and will be recognized, not by color of their skin, but by the quality of their character when we passed that bill into law last year and established

I don't know if the attitudes that produced prejudice and intolerance can ever be completely eradicated from our society but I think perhaps one of the most significant things that has happened in the last couple of years as a result of the attention given to Martin Luther King, Jr. is the extraordinary effort that has been made by educators in our schools at all levels to teach about the life and the dreams of Martin Luther King, Jr.

Mr. Speaker, I would hope that after Resolution is passed and when the House adjourns that we adjourn in memory of the birth of Martin Luther

King, Jr.
Subsequently, the Resolution was adopted and sent up for concurrence.

Representative HARPER: Mr. Speaker, Men Women of the House: It is with feelings of pride and appreciation that we pause today to pay tribute to the late Honorable Marion E. Martin, a native of Kingman, Maine who was first selected to the Maine House of Representatives in 1930. That was just 10 years, ladies and gentlemen, after the women had begun to vote.

Marion Martin served for two terms in the House and she also served two terms in the Maine Senate. She also became the very first woman to serve as the Assistant Chairman of the Republican National a post which she held from the mid-30's until 1947 and that was the year that Governor Horace Hildreth named her to be the Commissioner of Labor and Industry, the first woman to be appointed to a cabinet position in the State of Maine.

Marion Martin served so effectively in position that she continued to hold that post under seven Governors, Republicans and Democrats alike,

25 years.

Her accomplishments were many, including helping to establish a state minimum wage law, equal pay for equal work provisions, industrial safety collective bargaining laws.

This lady, a courageous and very capable pioneer public service, has died at the age of 86. leaves a legacy of remarkable accomplishments and of inspiration to the many who proudly follow her trail of political action for the benefit of the people of the State of Maine.

Mr. Speaker, it is with pride that I also request that this session of the Maine House be adjourned today in memory of the late Honorable Marion E. Martin.
