State of Maine **PROCLAMATION**

WHEREAS, there exists in the State of Maine an extraordinary occasion arising out of a record-high excess of revenues over projections at the end of the just concluded fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, these additional revenues have resulted, in large measure, from higher than anticipated yields from Maine's personal and corporate income taxes; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed to be in the State's best interest and to be the fair and proper thing to do for the Legislature to authorize the return of these revenues to the taxpayers in an equitable, efficient and expeditious manner;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN R. McKERNAN, JR., ernor of the State of Maine, by virtue of constitutional power vested in me as Governor, do hereby convene the Legislature of this State, hereby requesting the Senators and Representatives to assemble in their respective chambers at the Capitol in Augusta on Thursday, the fifteenth (15th) day of September, 1988 at ten (10) o'clock in the morning in order to receive communications, enact legislation to return excess revenues, appropriate additional funds to address critical and urgent needs within the State's mental health delivery system and appropriate additional monies to continue present anti-drug activities, which are currently threatened by cut backs in Federal monies and conduct such other legislative business as may be appropriate.

The Weatherization Program received a total of \$29,778,204 in Federal Block Grant funds and State Legislature allocated funding during the reporting period. Of this total amount, \$3,582,000 was funded through the State Legislature for the three program years: \$1,196,000 for 1986, \$1,190,000 for 1987 and \$1,196,000 for 1988.

A total of 9,220 Maine low-income households were assisted with weatherization services during this period.

Priority weatherization service was given to those eligible low-income households that include elderly, children under age 2 or disabled persons who are hypothermia susceptible.

The Weatherization Assistance Program is administered by the Division of Community Services and is implemented through the 11 Community Action Agencies in Maine.

We appreciate your support for the Division of Community Services and for the programs that we administer and look forward to continued cooperation and assistance.

Seriously, I do want to welcome all of you to Augusta and reassure you that the Olympian effort of reaching a bipartisan agreement on how best to return the state surplus appears to have been accomplished. If indeed that is the case, I believe we all deserve a gold medal, but far more importantly, the citizens of this state will get their silver. (I realize it is early but during the day you will get that.)

is early but during the day you will get that.)

As states across the nation are facing hard times and huge budget deficits, Maine has been blessed with continued prosperity and an unprecedented surplus. As other states find it necessary to raise taxes again, Maine finds itself returning revenues to the taxpayers of this state again.

Faced with more money than we expected or need in this year, state government has done what it should. We are returning the money to those who paid it. Government is not going to get bigger, the wallets of hard working Maine men and women are.

For the past month, members of the Taxation Committee have worked with our administration to ensure that the money is returned as quickly as possible to those who paid it. On Tuesday, the Committee unanimously approved a plan that provides significant relief to the middle-class, as well as property tax relief to our citizens and communities.

I want to thank the two chairs of the Taxation Committee, Representative Cashman and Senator Twitchell, as well as Representative Jackson for their strong desire to reach a consensus on what could have been (within 60 days of an election) a very partisan issue. Because of their involvement, we have been able to devise a fair and practical system of tax relief in 1988 that will not put burdensome demands on future budgets.

But just because we've cleared one hurdle doesn't mean there aren't others before us. Maine faces a number of major challenges that cannot wait until the 114th Legislature to be resolved.

Through work with the Appropriations Committee, we are proposing a funding package that will address major problems in our delivery of services to the mentally ill in our state.

We are proposing adding badly needed staff to the Land Use Regulatory Commission and the Department of Environmental Protection in order to relieve tremendous pressures brought about on those agencies by growth across the state.

We are proposing funds to assure that critical drug enforcement activities will be able to continue at their current level.

state's needs, not only tomorrow, but in the long term.

WHEREAS, it is deemed to be in the State's best interest and to be the fair and proper thing to do for the Legislature to authorize the return of these revenues to the taxpayers in an equitable, efficient

and expeditious manner;
NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN R. MCKERNAN, JR.,
Governor of the State of Maine, by virtue of constitutional power vested in me as Governor, do hereby convene the Legislature of this State, hereby requesting the Senators and Representatives to assemble in their respective chambers at the Capitol in Augusta on Thursday, the fifteenth (15th) day of September, 1988 at ten (10) o'clock in the morning in order to receive communications, enact legislation to return excess revenues, appropriate additional funds to address critical and urgent needs within the State's mental health delivery system and to appropriate additional monies to continue present anti-drug activities, which are currently threatened by cut backs in Federal monies and conduct such other

legislative business as may be appropriate.
