Senator GAUVREAU: Thank you Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I would object to the motion by my good colleague from the County of Aroostook, Senator Collins. This matter, L.D. 430, has received as extensive and thorough of a debate as I believe is possible and practical. I think at this point further discussion would not be warranted. I think we have arrived at our respective positions, and I would therefore urge your opposition to the motion of my good colleague. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Matthews.

Senator MATTHEWS: Thank you Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. With respect to this item, which I am now asking for an opportunity, as well as some of us in this Chamber, to debate this issue, I do not agree with my good friend from Androscoggin, Senator Gauvreau, that this issue has received enough discussion. I ask anyone in this Chamber to stand up and say that they haven't heard from their constituents back home over the last few days. There is a great deal of outcry about the actions that this Legislature, some members of the Legislature, are trying to take on this issue. Many people do not agree with this particular Bill. Myself included. And simply, I must state for the Record my dismay, my somewhat state of shock in walking into this Chamber and finding this issue very quickly voted upon, and I must state further for the Record, that had I been in this Chamber and looked around this Chamber of the Senate and not seen the principal people on the opposition side, I would not have wanted to see this issue come up. That's considered basic protocol and courtesy, and I find that I am a little bit taken aback. This issue does need to be debated, ladies and gentlemen. It goes to the heart of what many of us in this Chamber, Republicans and Democrats, feel is a family issue. A moral issue. As important, in fact, more important then budgetary items, or other kinds of items that

are taking a great deal of time down here. I find it appalling! From the outset of this debate, some individuals would have us believe that the Senate, this Body of duly elected members, and the citizens of this State should not participate in this discussion, is amazing to me. Absolutely amazing. Victory at all costs.

Ladies and gentlemen, I hope that you will vote to reconsider this issue and give this issue an opportunity to be discussed by the membership of this Body. The public demands it, and I believe that your oath demands it as a Senator on an issue of this magnitude, and I hope you will vote to reconsider. Thank you.

On motion by Senator MATTHEWS of Kennebec, supported by a Division of one-fifth of the members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Clark.

Senator CLARK: Thank you Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I must respond to the ever so gently phrased allegation of my good colleague, the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Matthews, in that a breach of protocol and/or courtesy occurred here this evening, and would apologize to any of those among my colleagues who feel that trickery was afoot.

I was requested to remove this item from the Tabled and Specially Assigned Table at the request of two Senators, who have obligations in their Senate Districts early this evening. Surely, we all knew that we were to convene at 5:00 o'clock, and that we were able to hear the bell, and be attendant to our responsibilities in a prompt and prudent fashion. If those among my colleagues this evening are offended, than I would submit that they have the option of accepting my sincere apology, but they also have my equally sincere invitation to be at their post of duty at the appropriate time. Thank you Mr. President.

Senator MATTHEWS: Thank you Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I just want to stand on Record this evening to apologize to the Body, and to you, Mr. President, for the item which appeared on Page 3 of our Calendar, and directly to Mr. Smith, because I in no way meant to oppose his confirmation, and if I have an opportunity some day to see him, I will apologize to him in person.

I also want to mention that I do appreciate the opportunity of the President to have a chance to reconsider an issue which I discussed earlier. I appreciate that opportunity.

I guess I'm really concerned, however, with the direction, as I think many of us in this state and country are, the direction we are headed. Because there are times, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, that I wonder if we sail rudderlessly on the ocean, have lost our bearings, have lost a sense of direction. I'm reminded of an older gentleman from Pittsfield back during the fall, who when we were discussing at a candidates forum the issue of gay rights. When I stated my opposition, afterwards, came up to me an said, "Son, I want to tell you something, that I appreciate your stand, because those that stand for everything, really don't stand for anything. They've lost their bearing, they've lost their moral direction". And I think as an American, if anything stands out in my reading, and understanding, and experience of American history, it is that America has always had a moral sense of purpose.

What I have found in my ten years, or nine years of service in Augusta, is that one of the hardest things for this Body to do, the Legislature, is to vote no. It is always easy to vote yes. On issues of moral values, ethics and direction, its unfortunate that we are floating out of control on a sea that may lead us to serious trouble in years ahead. But I have a great deal of faith in the people of Maine, those that are back home, that are not down here lobbying because they work for a living, they're raising their families, they're concerned about the direction we're headed. I have a great deal of faith in those people to steer the ship, to right the ship back on course, and I am sure that that will happen, ladies and gentlemen. And the public will discuss the issues at the ballot box, in the grange halls, on the church steps, all over the state. And most assuredly, the public will discuss family issues. The greatest, most important issue among a hundred million Christian's in this country. Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator GILL of Cumberland was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate on the Record.

Senator GILL: Thank you Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I appreciate your indulgence this evening, but there was something that I read at the Hearing that we had on the human rights issue, and I would like to read it for the Senators, because a number of you were not there at the Hearings, so this is my opportunity, so please indulge me for just a little bit. The title of this poem is "Saints and Sinners".

"When some fellow yields to temptation and breaks a conventional law, we look for no good in his make-up. But God, how we look for the flaw. No one will ask how tempted, nor allow for the battles he's fought. His name becomes food for the jackal's, for us who have never been caught. He has sinned, we shout from the house tops! We forget the good he has done. We center on one lost battle, and forget the times he has won. Come gaze on this sinner, we thunder, and by his example be taught. That his footstep leads to destruction, cry we who have never been caught. I am a sinner, O Lord, and I know it. I am weak, I blunder, I fall. I am tossed on life's stormy ocean like ships embroiled in a gale. I am willing to trust in my mercy to keep the commandments Thou taught. But deliver me, Lord, from the judgment of saints who have never been caught."

# JOINT RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING YOM HASHOAH, THE "DAYS OF REMEMBRANCE" OF THOSE WHO SUFFERED AS VICTIMS OF NAZISM

WHEREAS, 46 years ago, 6,000,000 Jews were murdered in the Nazi Holocaust as part of a systematic program of genocide and millions of other people suffered as victims of Nazism; and

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Maine should always remember the atrocities committed by the Nazis so that such horrors are never repeated; and

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Maine should continually rededicate themselves to the principle of equal justice for all people, remain eternally vigilant against all tyranny and recognize that bigotry provides a breeding ground for tyranny to flourish; and

WHEREAS, April 11, 1991, has been designated internationally as a Day of Remembrance of Victims of the Nazi Holocaust, known as Yom Hashoah; and

WHEREAS, the national community pursuant to an Act of Congress will be commemorating the week of April 7th to April 14th as the Days of Remembrance of the Victims of the Nazi Holocaust; and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate for the people of the State of Maine to join in this international commemoration; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, pause in solemn memory of the victims of the Nazi Holocaust, and urge one and all to recommit themselves to the lessons of the Nazi Holocaust through this international week of commemoration and express our common desires to continually strive to overcome prejudice and inhumanity through education, vigilance and resistance; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the United States Holocaust Memorial Council in Washington, D.C., on behalf of the people of the State of Maine.

Senator GAUVREAU of Androscoggin was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate on the Record.

Senator **GAUVREAU**: Thank you Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I know the hour is late and I will try to be brief, but I do feel it is important that I do make these brief remarks to you at our close of session this evening.

I came to the Senate Chamber about ten past five today. The Committee on Judiciary heard many Bills, including the very controversial Bill on Hunting Manslaughter. When I arrived in the Chamber, I was late, the Senate had already begun its deliberations for the day, and I was surprised, perhaps, as others were, that one of the Bills, L.D. 430 had been discussed. But I understand the process, and I understand that it was on the Calendar, and I read the Calendar before I came down this afternoon.

I rise this evening because I am concerned with some of the comments that have been made, and perhaps some of the questions which were voiced regarding the intent or the good will of other Legislators. We all operate under a system of rules and procedures, and we all understand those rules. It is very important to state, and state often, and to remind us that we are dealing with issues which are very difficult, very controversial, in fact, highly emotional. But it is also very important that we maintain our strong tradition of discussing these issues in an atmosphere of mutual respect and appreciation for the contributions which all of us have made in our careers in public service.

Likewise, we are in indebted to all of those who take the time to contact us, either in person at our residences, or businesses, or here in Augusta, or who take the time to write to us or to telephone us. I have had dozens, I would say hundreds of contacts over the past few years dealing with the Civil Rights Bill, and as I said in my speech a few weeks ago, I am indebted to all of those who took the time to

share with me their concerns. I think I have grown in that process, and I have learned a great deal. Unfortunately, some people have voiced a concern that I took an action without considering all those who came before our Committee. That simply is not the case.

But I rise tonight because I want to underscore how important it is that when we discuss issues on this floor, we do so at all times with the utmost respect for each other. Because if we allow ourselves to succumb to emotionalism, or to question the good faith of our colleagues, then I think we send a message out to the public that we really encourage, inadvertently no doubt, but we encourage a discussion in the public which gets very emotional and very charged, and really is inimical to a rational explanation and discussion of sensitive issues of public policy.

It is very appropriate, Mr. President, that this evening we rise to honor our colleague from the county of Cumberland, Senator Barbara Gill, who I think really epitomizes what public service is all about in our state. A person who has unselfishly given of herself for many, many years. She has brought her integrity, her intellect, and her compassion to this Chamber, and to the other Chamber. We all benefit from her years of service. I think that Senator Gill should be commended. I think she represents a standard of public service which we should all aspire. As we now wind down the tempestuous days of this first year of our session, let us keep Senator Gill's service in mind, and her standard of public service to which she has aspired.

We know that we will have different issues that will divide us philosophically. There are tensions between the Executive Branch of Government and the Legislative Branch of Government, and there are, in fact, issues which divide us as individual Legislator's. But let us go forward in an atmosphere of mutual respect for each other, because if we fail in this charge, I have grave concerns regarding the forces which might be unleashed in the public at large. We have obligations as public servants, we have responsibilities to engage in a civilized discourse on difficult issues of public policy. If we fail in that charge, I am afraid that we will inadvertently promote a discussion in the public which I think none of us want to see.

With that, again, I would like to commend my colleague from Cumberland, Senator Gill, for her years of service, and again, I certainly hope that all of us can bear her standard in mind as we conclude our legislative session. Thank you Mr. President.
