Senator AMERO: Thank you Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. I hope that you will vote against the pending motion because I think that setting up a permanent Productivity Realization Task Force that has advisory powers makes a lot of sense. If it made sense in 1995 to review what state government was doing to find efficiencies, I think it makes sense in the coming years to continue to do the same. This bill would review the operations of state government, not just the General Fund portion of those operations but it would include the total state budget for review every five years, beginning in 1999 and would be a two year process of review. The Counsil would then report back to the legislature and to the government with their recommendations for improvements in the efficiencies in state government. I think few people realize that more than half, 258 1/2 of the positions that were cut during the productivity realization task force work have now been restored. I think that we have to be vigilant about efficiencies in state government and having a group of people outside of state government itself reviewing our operations, I think, makes a lot of sense and gives more credibility to our procedures up here in Augusta. So I would recommend that you oppose the motion on the floor so that we can go on and accept the minority report. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Nutting.

Senator **NUTTING**: Thank you Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. I'd urge you to support the Majority Ought Not to Pass report. I'll be brief. I just want to point out two or three things as was just alluded to by the good Senator from Cumberland. Some of the recent cuts made by the Productivity Task Force have ended up costing more money than saved and have had to be restored. I'd also point out that any Governor, this one included, or any future Governor can institute a productivity task force if they so wish. And we've already cut over 1300 state employee positions so far, in the last few years. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Harriman.

Senator HARRIMAN: Thank you Mr. President, good afternoon ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. I rise and hope you'll join my good friend from Cumberland, Senator Amero, to defeat the pending motion. I think it's fair that some of the criticism that has been voiced towards the Productivity Realization Task Force in the past was based on the fact that. perhaps not enough thought was given to a long term implications of what the task force may ultimately recommend. But, as members of this Body are well aware, we've recently passed legislation, hopefully on towards the Governor's desk that will, from this point forward, establish standards that will be used to determine whether or not down sizing or privatizing of certain services of state government are in the best interests of the citizens of Maine. And I think that gives reassurance, certainly to the people who work for state government, that there will be a standard and a protocol in determining what types of services should no longer be performed here in Augusta. So I think coupled with that and an ongoing audit, if you will, of the role of state government and productivity, this makes a lot of sense. So I hope you will join me Mr. President, men and women of the Senate, in joining my colleague from Cumberland, Senator Amero, and when the vote is taken Mr. President, I'd like to request a roll call.

Senator CAREY: Thank you Mr. President, members of the Senate. I would hope that you defeat this motion for Ought Not to Pass because if you had run into the same type of people that I did when I was campaigning, even though I run unopposed, I still campaign, but the biggest complaint that I had, had nothing to do with the state budget. It did have problems with the local Appropriation for Education, but really, the biggest problem of all was the problem that people had in trying to get out of the polls without being harassed to sign initiative partitions. And so, I would hope that if you have had that same problem, you could support me in the motion that's made in defeating the Ought Not to Pass motion so that we can go on to do something for the general public, who vote.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Daggett.

Senator DAGGETT: Thank you Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. I would guess that probably most of us have an idea of where we stand on this issue. Having petitioners at the polling place can be a problem, and has been a problem. I've talked with a number of petitioners and, in fact, they tell me that there are different ways of handling the petitioners at virtually every single polling place in this state. I would suggest to you that we have sufficient laws in place to deal with the issues of petitioners. Unfortunately, what has happened is local officials are frequently reluctant to put in place the mechanisms that are there to keep the polling place a safe place for voters. The wardens, the constables, have the authority over the polling place to see that voters are not harassed and to see that no one bothers a voter. If these laws were well enforced at the local polling place, I don't believe that we would have the continued request to ban petitioners from the polling place. I oppose banning them from the polling place because I consider it a limitation on democracy. There's always the temptation to try to stifle a group that we don't agree with. We see that here on a regular basis. We are regularly asked to enter into a conflict, separate the parties and try to help make some sense of it. Today there are sufficient safeguards for voters at the polls. Voters have the right to say no, to not sign petitions. One of the problems that we see is that citizens are reluctant to say no and to turn down their friends and neighbors when they are there at the polling place collecting signatures. The polls are a place of political activity. When you want to get people to sign a petition, when you are active politically, you go to the people who are active politically. There shouldn't be a debate. It shouldn't be an unregulated arena and it isn't. I have had people ask me, when I have campaigned, where they could sign petitions. I know there are a number of people who know that that is exactly where they can go to sign petitions, at the polling place on election day. There are two sides to this coin and I think it is totally inappropriate to prevent petition gatherers from being at the polling place. I think it is an issue of democracy and personal rights and I hope you will join me in defeating the proposal by accepting the Ought Not to Pass report. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Franklin, Senator Benoit.

Senator **BENOIT**: Thank you Mr. President. Perhaps someone would be willing to explain for my edification on this particular measure what it proposes, since in previous proceedings I have not had an opportunity to be present as the measure has moved through the chamber?

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Cathcart.

Senator CATHCART: Thank you Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. I will attempt to answer the good Senator, Senator Benoit's, question. Item 7-1, L.D. 113 is a bill which prohibits the employment of professional strike breakers. There are two bills before the Body. This is the one that would prohibit the companies who make a business of providing professional strike breakers to replace striking workers from continuing that practice in the State of Maine. These are professional strike breakers only that are covered by this bill. Thank you Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Franklin, Senator Benoit.

Senator **BENOIT**: Thank you Mr. President. May I further inquire if the Attorney General's Office has issued a ruling on this measure, that if enacted it would be unconstitutional and in violation of decisional law of the United States Supreme Court?

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from Franklin, Senator Benoit poses a question through the Chair to anyone who may wish to answer. The Chair recognizes the Senator from Somerset, Senator Mills.

Senator MILLS: Thank you Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. As I recall, there was a letter that we received two years ago from the Attorney General's Office indicating that there may be a sufficient local interest in preserving, under the police power of the State of Maine, to justify validating this bill as an exception to the pre-emption provisions of the National Labor Relations Act. I hesitate to characterize or paraphrase these words, because I don't have them in front of me, but my impression of the letter was that this bill, or this measure, would be open to attack on grounds that it is pre-empted by the National Labor Relations Act, but it was not, by any means, certain in the minds of his staff that this bill would be struck down on that basis. I might add that whether the bill itself is likely to be deemed pre-empted by the federal law is a question that depends on judicial interpretation of a precedent from the U.S. Supreme Court because back, I think in 1938, and if it is the judgment of this state that this bill represents good public policy, it is our collective judgment that this measure should be the law here within the State of Maine. We really have no way of bringing that to pass without passing it and then essentially, waiting to see whether it may be challenged, and if it is challenged whether that challenge will be successful. But if a state like ours does not pass a piece of legislation like this, if it does not speak out on the issue by presenting a complete piece of legislation and enacting it, then the courts will have no way of reviewing a precedent that was established almost 60 years ago. They'll have no way of revisiting it, no way of narrowing it, no way of reinterpreting it. So, although there may be a challenge to the validity of this statute, under the supreme and pre-empted power of Congress, it is nevertheless appropriate for members of this Body to exercise their own judgment about whether this should be the law of Maine. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Cathcart.

Senator CATHCART: Thank you Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. I have before me a letter from the Attorney General, but this letter refers to the other bill, L.D. 66, "An Act to Prohibit an Employer from Hiring Replacement Workers During a Strike", not to the piece of legislation that is before us. As I said, I'm not aware of any Attorney General's opinion or any pre-emption of this bill. All that this bill that we are now debating would do is to prohibit the recruitment or employment of professional strike breakers and define the term professional strike breaking activity, so it is only applying to those persons or organizations that have made a practice of supplying replacement workers, professional replacement workers, during labor disputes. I hope that clarifies the issue. Thank you Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Butland.

Senator **BUTLAND:** Mr. President, I'd like to pose a question through the Chair.

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator may pose his question.

Senator **BUTLAND:** Thank you. To anyone who may have the knowledge, the good Senator from Somerset, Senator Mills, has said that we have never passed this legislation and it would never be considered. I can't believe that no other state in the Union has passed similar legislation to this and that we don't have the results of their action. My question would be, has any other state passed legislation similar to this and what has been the response when it's been challenged? Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Senator from Cumberland, Senator Butland poses a question through the Chair to anyone who may wish to answer. The Chair recognizes the Senator from Somerset, Senator Mills.

Senator MILLS: Thank you Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. I'm not sure that I can answer the good Senator's current and pending question. It's just that I must, with some embarrassment, stand up to say that I think I've misinterpreted the impact of this bill if we choose to enact it. I was informed that we already have, essentially, the substance of this law on the books now as a criminal offense. It's a Class E or Class D crime. What is new about the bill is that it gives a right of civil enforcement. In other words, a party who is aggrieved by the presence or the activities of professional strike breakers within our state would have power to go to court to get an injunction, or to obtain civil relief, and that that is the only thing new, apparently, about the measure that's currently before us. The substance of this professional strike breaking activity prohibition has apparently been on the books for 20 or 30 years and I have no idea whether it's been challenged and I certainly have no idea whether it is in effect in any other state. Thank you.

On motion by Senator **AMERO** of Cumberland, supported by a Division of at least one-fifth of the members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered.
