SENATE PAPERS

The following Joint Resolution: (S.P. 772)

JOINT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO INCREASE FUNDING TO SUPPORT SPECIAL EDUCATION

WE, your Memorialists, the Members of the One Hundred and Nineteenth Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the First Regular Session, most respectfully present and petition the members of the Congress of the United States, as follows:

WHEREAS, the people of Maine believe that every student should receive an adequate public education; and

WHEREAS, it costs on average more than twice as much to educate a student with a disability as to educate a student without a disability; and

WHEREAS, the issue of funding special education in our schools is one of the people of Maine's foremost concerns; and

WHEREAS, when the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act was first enacted, Congress committed to covering 40% of the cost of special education in the United States; and

WHEREAS, according to the Maine Department of Education, in fiscal year 1998, the Federal Government covered only 8.15% of the cost of special education in the State of Maine; and

WHEREAS, special education costs paid with local and state taxes have more than doubled in the past 10 years from \$52,697,027 in the 1987-1988 school year to \$139,008,607 in the 1997-1998 school year; and

WHEREAS, special education costs in some Maine communities consume a large percentage of local education dollars including:

1. An amount of \$4,595,769 constituting 19.7% of total education expenditures in the City of Auburn:

2. An amount of \$1,324,791 constituting 13.2% of total education expenditures in the Town of Wiscasset;

3. An amount of \$5,758,750 constituting 21.5% of total education expenditures in the City of Lewiston:

4. An amount of \$2,941,301 constituting 11.7% of total education expenditures in the City of Bangor;

5. An amount of \$14,860 constituting 21.7% of total education expenditures in Monhegan Plantation; and

6. An amount of \$6,357,742 constituting 12.4% of total education expenditures in the City of Portland; and

WHEREAS, the cost of special education has increased dramatically in recent years, causing property taxes in the State of Maine to rise and school districts around the State to cut activities such as art and music programs, field trips and extracurricular activities to maintain balanced budgets; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully urge and request that the United States Congress increase funding to support special education at a level originally envisioned in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Honorable William J. Clinton, President of the United States, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States and to each member of the Maine Congressional Delegation.

Came from the Senate, **READ** and **ADOPTED**.

On motion of Representative MURPHY of Kennebunk, the House **RECONSIDERED** its action whereby the Joint Resolution was **ADOPTED**.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Kennebunk, Representative Murphy.

Representative **MURPHY**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This is a very good resolution. If you had to boil this resolution down to a phrase, it could be called keeping a promise. A 40 percent funding promise and out two US Representatives and our two US Senators have promised to work in a bipartisan way to keep this promise. But one of the beauties of the federal system is that there is a series of steps and each of those steps and levels has its own set of responsibilities and its own set of promises and I would hope that when this legislature adjourns they'll also be able to say this legislature kept its promise for fully funding education K-12 and higher ed and also kept the promises must be kept on each and every level of our federal government. Thank you.

He chaired the fund drive in 92, he was president in 96 and he was term limited out of the Board of Directors with United Way. However, he's retired and now he's back on the Board again and I expect he'll start all over again going the route of fund raising and leadership in that organization.

He's been on the Southern Kennebec Domestic Abuse Council for three years and he is now the Chair of that organization. Mr. Kessler is a dynamic leader when he agrees to do something, he does it well. It has been a pleasure to work with him. He gives generously of himself and to others and he is here with us today and I hope you will join me in recognizing Mr. Kessler for his service to our country and state.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative O'Brien.

Representative **O'BRIEN**: Thank you Mr. Speaker, esteemed Colleagues of the House. I just found out that this sentiment was coming in so I'm very pleased that Representative Fuller alerted me to this because I couldn't let this opportunity go by without saying a few words about Warren Kessler.

I don't know if he's here, if he's here I'm actually surprised, I'm surprised he's not on some warm golf course somewhere or in Greece or somewhere else and if he isn't here it also could be because as he said on several occasions, I've worked closely with Warren and as he says, that when he sees me he runs, because I'm always asking him for something. I'm either asking him for a donation for something or asking him to do something in which he always does.

I have served with Warren on several committees, perhaps the most dynamic committee that we've been together on is the one aforementioned the Southern Domestic Abuse Council and he is really brought the issue of domestic abuse in the Central Maine area to a new level. Warren, when he was head of the hospital and I still believe that he is, each employee, every employee of the hospital had to have training on domestic abuse and that raised this level in the community to an absolutely new level and I very much appreciate that. Warren is also in his quiet way, very, very concerned about children's issues and child abuse. He has under his administration, the Children's Health Collaborative was the Kennebec Valley Children's Health Collaborative was formed. He has worked very closely and very, very dilligently to form the Vickery, a place for children and families which is the building that you've heard me speak about before. The museum is in it, the Child Abuse Council is in it, It's a very family and children service agency, friendly building and that is a huge result of Warren and his dedication and dedication of the hospital.

So, I'm very pleased to be able to say these few words for him and Warren if you are here I do need to speak to you about something else. Thank you. PASSED and sent for concurrence.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lewiston, Representative Mendros.

Representative MENDROS: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I urge you to vote against the pending motion and vote for this bill. This legislation would increase the rates, passed under the hammer in the last session, came out a unanimous report. I've spoken with some people who are on the committee and they told me there was no opposition to this increase. I can tell you why there was no opposition because most of the people that this affected are the poorest people in the state, that can barely keep their cars on the road. They didn't know what was going on. I can also tell you that there was a great deal of opposition, I heard during my campaign, during my door-to-door from some poor people about their rates going up, they were complaining about it.

I'll give you some specific facts. This bill, in theory, was only supposed to increase somebody's rates \$20 to \$40 a year. In fact, one constituent of mine, 37 year old, single male with a clean driving record had his rate increase \$16 a month, \$192 a year. His rates went up, with a clean driving record because of this increase. Not to many people in their forties, fifties and sixties are getting minimum insurance. Most of you people that are that old have assets, they own a house, they get a better rate, maybe their increase wouldn't be as much, but people under 30, in their mid 30's and under 30 are paying much more for insurance and they're the ones who have to get the minimum coverage. I also checked and by the way, I won't say the name of the company, but it's the one we hear about all the time on the radio, that you can call them direct and they give you the cheapest rates. You call five other places and they're all still more expensive, so this is still the best deal at \$192 a year or more.

I also checked in, for \$2 a month, I can get uninsured motorist, which I have, uninsured motorist. So, if somebody doesn't have that \$50,000 or \$100,000 coverage and I hit them or they hit me, I'm in an accident with them, they don't have enough coverage I'll still be protected. So I ask you to defeat the pending motion.

Finally, the thing that really bugged me about this legislation passing is while we're out campaigning, people on my side of the aisle, we say, we believe in less regulations and less burdensome regulations in people's lives and I think even people on the other side of the aisle agree with that and one of the big things I hear from the other side is we believe in working families and helping the low income and I think most of the people on my side agree with that too. So what boggles my mind about this piece of legislation is it puts an unfair burdensome regulation on our lowest income people. I can't support something like that, now I meant it when I said that I was against regulations when I campaigned and I urge everyone else to vote against the pending motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bath, Representative Mayo.

Representative MAYO: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would remind you that two years ago this item was before this body and the good Representative from Lewiston is correct, it went under the hammer. It had previous to that however, a lengthy debate in the committee. The limits that we changed two years ago had been instituted in 1971. They had been with us for over 25 years. Those of us who drive vehicles, who purchase insurance, who need repairs to our vehicles as a result of accidents are well aware of the fact that the cost of the vehicle, the cost of the repair has gone up tremendously in the last 25 years. While I will not dispute the good Representative from Lewistons' remarks about the fact that a particular individual had an increase of nearly \$200 that does not coincide with what took place with everyone. The rates were increased somewhere between \$20 and \$40 per individual per year unless that particular individual was young number one or unless that individual had a bad driving record. Anyone with a bad driving record today will see, regardless of their age, will see an dramatic increase in rates.

I think that Maine was long overdue in making this change. It caught us up with other states around this country which have had legislation with limits similar to ours and I would urge that you support the committee Ought Not to Pass Report which was a twelve to one report. Thank you.

Representative SAXL of Bangor moved that the House **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought Not to Pass** Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bangor, Representative Saxl.

Representative **SAXL**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. At the sound of being repetitious I want to remind you that this bill would prohibit reductions at the age of 70 or over on accident policies. These policies pay benefits for death, dismemberment, disability and or medical expenses resulting from accidents. We would point out that there is common benefit under accident insurance policies to reduce at a certain age, such as 70. The premiums for these policies typically do not vary by age and the benefits reductions reflect the increase incidence of accidents in older ages. If this bill were enacted as written, insurers can circumvent the intent by reducing benefits in the younger age such as 69 rather than 70. If benefit reductions were prohibited entirely, the likely result is that the carriers offering these policies would charge higher premiums at older ages or simply stop offering these policies in Maine.

Some question the value of purchasing insurance that covers accidents only since the need for coverage is the same whether health care services are needed to treat accidents or sickness and most treatment is for sickness. The same argument is made against insurance that covers only specified diseases. However, the state has not tried to discourage the sale of these limited benefit policies as long as the limited nature of the coverage is clearly disclosed. These policies are popular due to their low cost and because they cover risks that people tend to worry about. In fact, in the case in which we had before us the stub indicated clearly, it was printed on the stub that the benefit was reduced at, cut in half at 70 1/2 years. These are experiential policies so it's the experience rate which determines what the premiums will be. I ask you for your support on this twelve to one report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Caribou, Representative Sirois.

Representative SIROIS: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I introduce L.D. 1092 in an effort to put an end to this discriminatory practice by insurance companies of lowering coverage limits to accident insurance for persons the age of 70 and older. This practice came to my attention the hard way. I broke my arm in 1997, I was 72 years old at the time. My insurance company reimbursed me for only 50% of the accident because I am over the age of 70. Yet, I have been paying the same premium that I pay for higher coverage before I turned 70. This practice is blatantly discriminatory since elderly persons must pay the same premium for less coverage. Elderly persons are among a vulnerable sector of our population who can least afford large out of pocket costs. I believe this practice is wrong and I encourage you to join me in ending this form of discrimination against our elderly citizens by supporting L.D. 1092. Thank you.

Representative SIROIS of Caribou **REQUESTED** a roll call on the motion to **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought Not to Pass** Report.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lebanon, Representative Chick.

Representative **CHICK**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is clearly a bill that will cause people to have less coverage paying the same premiums and it comes at a time that everyone is going to reach, it's a time when they have less income and I believe they should be accorded the privilege of the same insurance. It's quite easy for people to rule at a time in life when they're not at that particular reduction, but I would ask sincerely that this motion be defeated and do not separate one segment of our population from the other by less coverage. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bath, Representative Mayo.

Representative **MAYO**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I truly do not enjoy having to speak against the remarks of the good Representative from Caribou or the good Representative from Lebanon. However, I would remind this body that the particular type of insurance coverage that we are talking about here is an accidental insurance policy with the intent to cover those people who do not have insurance and who are young or middle aged. It is not intended to cover those people who are over 65 years of age and that is why the premiums on this particular type of very narrow coverage are as low as they are. It was never intended to be an add on or a supplement to Medicare coverage which those of us who reach 65 hopefully will be able to have. It's a particular narrow, very narrowly focused type of insurance. I would urge that this body leave this alone and accept the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report of the committee. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Brunswick, Representative Richardson.

Representative **RICHARDSON**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I think I should tell you that just one person came before the committee and it was the good Representative from Caribou and as much as it pains me to talk against his bill and as much as the committee wanted to address his needs, we found that this was not the proper vehicle to do so. We had no complaints from the Bureau of Insurance. As a matter of fact when the good Representative came before us, he provided us a copy of the disability claim form which clearly indicated on the face of the form that benefits under policies are reduced by 50% at age 70. So it was clearly disclosed and it's unfortunate that the good Representative did not have his insurance salesperson explain that to him, but it was only a matter of a couple paragraphs and it was certainly set forth therein.

The second issue that we talked about during the committee so that you understand why it was, both bipartisan and a consensus within the committee is that to eliminate the premiums or excuse me to keep the premiums the same, provided people at 70 a constant premium rate from 55 to 70 you have the same or 55 to over 70 you have the same premium rate. Generally, the policy at 65, that's about the time vou're looking for disability income, at 70 you're looking for income loss, but over 70 that's were the actuarial rate goes up and because the actuarial rate goes up, it's more costly for people 70 or over, because they simply have more accidents. This actually is a fine policy because it least gives half, that's half of what you would normally get below the age of 70. It just doesn't cut you off at 70 like term life insurance does. This actually gives some benefits as opposed to no benefits. So we thought it was a great idea. The premiums don't get up because or don't rise after 70 because they get shared with people from 55 to 70. If you mandate this, than this is what the insurance commission and the superintendent indicated to us. Τo mandate insurance companies that it must lower the amount of coverage will drive up costs to everyone else and that is the rest of our seniors and would result in companies deciding to eliminate this benefit in Maine. So I ask you, although the benefit isn't what the good Representative from Caribou would like, do we want to eliminate or potentially eliminate that unintended consequence that we all are concerned about. Do we want to eliminate that for people from 55 all the way to 69? Thanks

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lewiston, Representative Bouffard.

Representative **BOUFFARD**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I was an insurance agent for 29 years before this life and the thing that I have to say about this coverage that everybody is talking about, it's not that the idea of lowering the coverage for people over 70 years old is not allowed. What should not be allowed is that they are still paying the same premium for full coverage and yet get only half of the coverage. Recently, in the health insurance program that I had

and my wife was covered, my wife turned 65 and therefore became eligible for Medicare and immediately the coverage for the health insurance of my wife went to a Medicare supplement. So the premium was lowered. This is the same thing with this here. If you're paying the full amount of premium, you should be getting a full amount of coverage. If your coverage is going to be decreased because of actuarial figures being higher for elderly people, than their premiums should also be decreased and in this instance it is not happening and although the insurance department may seem to think that they understand what they're doing is correct, I don't think it is. I really think that the banking and insurance department in the State of Maine should look severely at some of these insurance companies that are selling limited policies, yet charging the full amount of premiums. So I hope that you do defeat this motion Ought Not to Pass. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Brooklin, Representative Volenik.

Representative VOLENIK: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Sometimes I tend to doodle and do to much math and what I've come up with is that it looks like buying one of these policies is probably going to be a little better risk than spending money on those magazine subscriptions to win the sweepstakes. I think it is a better risk than that. Not much, but a little bit and it looks like if you spend over a lifetime, let's say 50 years and you average \$100 a year, these things start out low and they grow higher. I think Rosaire was paying above \$300 a year, but let's say you average \$100 a year on these policies with the multiplier effect, you're giving these insurance companies somewhere between about \$12,000 and \$50,000 in your lifetime. Now you'd have to have between four and twelve full disability claims to get that money back and I understand that these insurance companies have to control all the assets of the planet and we don't want to try to disrupt that, but it seems to me that the least they could do is pay out a full benefit to anyone who has sent in these premiums for sometimes a full life time. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Pittsfield, Representative Jones.

Representative **JONES**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I spent quite a few years selling insurance. I sold very little of disability insurance or accident insurance because it's expensive. However, what I did sell there are many, many options of buying disability insurance, one of which would cut in half at age 70. I'm sure that if the good Representative from Caribou asked the agent he would have told him about several different options that were available to him. I saw the policy and it clearly stated there's no cover up and I have no quarrel defending the insurance industry that I proudly was a part of for many years.

We talk about the same premium. The premium could have been lowered for, would have been raised for a good many years. I don't know when our good friend took the policy out but it could have been 40 years ago and had he demanded that it continue for the same benefit starting at age 70, I can assure you folks that it would have been greatly increased, greatly increased and that was the reason of it, the actuaries had this figured out and so I urge you to stick with the Ought Not to Pass. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from South Portland, Representative Glynn.

Representative **GLYNN**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in opposition to the pending

motion to defeat LD 1092 and I too wish to join with the sponsor from Caribou and those that have spoken in support of this LD and needed legislation.

I also sit on the Committee of Banking and Insurance and I was the member that voted to bring this issue out because I do believe it is an issue of great importance. To me the pivotal thing about insurance is just that you're looking to buy a policy that's going to cover you when the going gets round and when the health problems start and what we have is a situation of a number of elderly people that have taken out policies, insurance policies, their hedge against illness and when they need it they're finding that their coverage is disappearing as they get older and I have a few constituents in my district that have had similar problems to the experience of the Representative from Caribou and I can tell you that having worked with them on those issues they really are in a rock and a hard place. When you're 75 that's not a time to go out shopping for health insurance. When you're 84 it is not a time to go out and shop for health insurance. You're not going to get good insurance, you're not going to get good accident insurance. These types of coverages are very much if you're paying a set premium I think it's a reasonable expectation to believe that the coverage stays the same. People don't remember that 15 years ago or 20 years ago when they signed a policy that this happens and it really affects them at a time when they're most vulnerable in their lives and as such I do believe that legislation is warranted on this issue and I thank you for your time and consideration.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bangor, Representative Saxl.

Representative **SAXL**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I just want to summarize what we've said here today. I want to remind you that this is a 12 to 1 report and that means that a vast majority of the committee though they hold Representative Sirois in great esteem and affection and wanted very much to do something for him felt that this was not a wise action to take. I want to remind you that at the age of 65 Medicare takes care of medical bills and the one really an accidental policy is designed to help people who are younger who have an uninsured accident that this is not a disability policy it's designed for those who are of working age and therefore is usually not applicable at age 70. Please, please bare these in mind and bare the policy in mind rather than your affections as you vote this bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lebanon, Representative Chick.

Representative **CHICK**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I believe that people that have driven automobiles and had a plan in their mind to protect against becoming involved in illegal practices with the automobile trying to avoid and drive defensively should not be separated from the other citizens on the highway in the State of Maine when they reach a particular age. This is something that doesn't provide for equal treatment and I would sincerely urge all of the wonderful people in this body to protect the rights of that group of Maine citizens.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Dudley.

Representative **DUDLEY**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. With all due respect, I'd like to correct the Representative from Lebanon, Representative Chick. This bill does not pertain to auto insurance but rather accident insurance coverage and I'd also like to point out to the members of the House that this bill does nothing to control the cost of premiums. If people over 70 want to be covered by this insurance under this bill, they are going to pay higher premiums and that's going to reduce access to this type of coverage. Where people at 70 now may have a reduced benefit, they will at least have an easier access to such insurance and I would urge you all to support the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Caribou, Representative Sirois.

Representative **SIROIS**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. A few members of the House mentioned something about Medicare. This has got nothing to do with Medicare whatsoever, this is just a plain accident insurance. You've got to get hurt to get the premium from the company. This has got nothing to do with Medicare, Medicaid because I'm insured with that Medicare, Medicaid with Blue Cross and Blue Shield, I've got the whole bit. This is just a plain accident insurance and I did get hurt and I only got 50% of what I was supposed to get and it strictly discriminatory against me. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lewiston, Representative Mendros.

Representative **MENDROS**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. As a former insurance agent myself, I have a few questions, problems I guess with this, with the Majority Report. This is accident insurance, this isn't health insurance. People get in accidents all the time regardless of their age. Somebody who's over 80 years old, as a matter of fact, I think people over 70 are less likely to get in accidents because they don't go out as much, they don't live as risky a lifestyle as people my age or in their forties.

This is clearly discriminatory. We're not talking about their high health costs, I want to make that clear. This is accidental insurance and I urge you to vote against the pending motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is acceptance of the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.

Representative DUNLAP of Old Town moved that the House **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought to Pass** Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Millinocket, Representative Clark.

Representative **CLARK**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise this morning in hope to defeat the pending motion. Right now the way it is, is when a municipality or another agent sells a hunting or fishing license, \$1 of that license goes to that agent. Now if you pass this bill, it would have \$2 go to that agent. That would mean that we'd have to raise the price of the hunting and fishing licenses all across the state and we don't want that to happen because right now they're at their highest now and people across the state are not just buying their hunting and fishing licenses. So let' keep the licenses down. I wish that we'd support the Minority Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Old Town, Representative Dunlap.

Representative **DUNLAP**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I know a number of you in this chamber have received correspondence from your municipal clerks, other agents who sell these licenses. Very briefly, what this does is it increases agent fee on the licenses that they sell from one dollar to two dollars. The majority of the committee felt that this is appropriate at this time as it had not been done in many years and that especially in rural areas town clerks who are only paid minimum wage, plus their agent fees, so this could be a substantial boost to them. They are asked now to much more in the selling of these licenses than they have been in the past. It used to be you just went in and bought a hunting license, well now there's another option, there's water fowl check off, there's duck stamps, bear stamps, pheasant stamps, muzzle loading stamps; whether or not they're actually a resident. There's the sworn statement on the license which is punishable under provisions of Title 17A. There's a great deal that goes in to selling a license now, a great deal more than there was in the past. So the majority of the committee felt that this was an appropriate increase at the time.

I won't go into what the arguments against were. Simply that the majority felt that they were not compelling. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Penobscot, Representative Perkins.

Representative **PERKINS**: Mr. Speaker, Colleagues of the House. This is a tax increase, let's make no mistake about it, it's an increase in a tax and whenever you want to get less of something, you increase the tax. Every time we raise the license fee we have about three or four years of dip in sales and this is nearly the entire budget for the Fish and Wildlife Department is from sales and this tax increase would probably cause a concomitant reduction in sales. So please use your red button. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Dover-Foxcroft, Representative Cross.

, Representative **CROSS**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is my bill. It was put in in response to three town offices saying when is the state going to assume its responsibilities and pay for the services that we give them, and that's just exactly what has happened. Right now all the charge is a dollar. This has, as far as I know, been that way for 25 years. Twenty-five years ago the town offices were paying \$1.25 per hour to their help. Right now they are spending at least \$8 an hour. Because of the changes in what they do in regard to their license fees, it now takes 15 to 20

minutes on most licenses to do the job. All of the towns are asking and this will go to the towns. This isn't money that goes to the IFW and whatever. This goes to the town and stays in the town and helps pay for those clerks for the agents that are making out the licenses and the whole thing. This would mean that finally, and it won't cover it totally, you have said to the state that we have done this for you for over 25 years, now is the time for you to address it and pay what it is worth. I ask you all to remember this. I hope that you will accept the Ought to Pass report and vote accordingly. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Fryeburg, Representative True.

Representative **TRUE**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Everything has already been said. I would like to perhaps speak only of one thing. I don't know how this can be a tax. The money is coming back to the town. I know it is very minute, but certainly it is tax relief. It will indirectly have something to do with your property tax. I agree that certainly for the number of years that we have had this, it is time that we had a change. If we had several changes of small amounts, maybe our property tax would be much less than they are. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lebanon, Representative Chick.

Representative **CHICK**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I received a great deal of calls and letters on this bill. Here we are again at the point where what happens. It raises the price of a license by \$1. If this is needed and the municipalities feel that the clerk should be compensated, possibly they could find some funds that would achieve this purpose. However, we had problems with IFW on many services that they perform and were not compensated for. This one is clearly going to be paid for by the hunters and fishermen in the State of Maine and there is no way that I would support increasing the price of the license when the real reason is getting money for the people that administrate selling the licenses. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Dover-Foxcroft, Representative Cross.

Representative CROSS: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. There again, two good friends of mine have been in the Legislature with me and are against me on this particular bill. There again, having been a municipal official and a town manager. I have watched this operation happen. I would like to have you know that this particular bill has got the endorsement from the Maine Municipal Association. Again, if we were really going to charge enough to pay for the people who are doing the work, they wouldn't be \$2, it would be \$3 and \$4. You have heard about the fee is a tax. Again, if the fee is a tax, it is all right for different organizations to go up a \$1 here and \$1 there or \$5 here in some kind of a deal and go up in price. All we are asking for is justification of doing a job for the State of Maine for the past 25 years and losing money. All we are asking you to do is to try to rectify that mistake. I thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lewiston, Representative Cote.

Representative **COTE**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I rise today in support of this bill. I have talked to a lot of the fishing organizations in my area. I asked them about this bill and if they favored the \$1 raise for the clerks in their municipalities. They agreed with me that it is right to go ahead and they don't mind paying the extra \$1. They figure they love the sport. They like to go fishing. Everybody likes to go fishing. They figure that the agents who are selling the licenses put a lot of time and effort into what they do. They deserve that \$1 raise. I urge all my colleagues to join me in support of this bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Windham, Representative Tobin.

Representative **TOBIN**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Even though I am new to the House of Representatives, I have served in local government for many, many years. I will be brief. All I have to say is if the state expects the municipalities to perform a service, they should pay for it. This increase will not cover all of the costs, but it will cover part of it. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Scarborough, Representative Clough.

Representative **CLOUGH**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I speak in favor of passage of this bill. I have talked with the town clerks in both of the towns that I represent and the scenario that they explained to me is, first of all, the money doesn't go to the town clerk as has been said here. It goes to the town. The town clerk is an employee that performs a function and they are paid regardless of whether or not you pass this bill. The problem is there is so much time consumed in processing these licenses that they have had to add additional help or additional hours of labor for the existing help. On that basis I would urge you to support this bill.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Penobscot, Representative Perkins.

Representative **PERKINS**: Mr. Speaker, Colleagues of the House. Somebody else mentioned an endorsement on one side of the issue. I would just like to state that Sportsmen Alliance of Maine came out strongly opposed. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rome, Representative Tracy.

Representative **TRACY**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I urge you to oppose the following motion. We did have a good public hearing and a lengthy debate. It is not because I stand here before you wanting to deny any clerk anywhere in the State of Maine for doing a marvelous job, especially in my hometown where Betty Sillanpaa is the clerk. It doesn't matter if it is Sunday, Monday, evenings, holidays or whatever, you give Betty a call and she will be right there to fill out a hunting and fishing license. The problem that I have with this piece of legislation is when the number of hunting and fishing licenses in this state are dramatically going down. If we send out the message to these individuals out there that the cost of hunting and fishing licenses are going up and people in the sporting situation demand more from the Fish and Wildlife Department. Right now they feel as if they are getting less. I urge you to vote against the pending motion and when the vote is taken, Mr. Speaker, I request the yeas and nays. Thank you.

Representative TRACY of Rome **REQUESTED** a roll call on the motion to **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought to Pass** Report.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Dixfield, Representative Bryant.

Representative **BRYANT**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. We did have a good debate on this issue. While the issues already are out here and have been explained, I would just like to remind everybody when they go to buy their hunting and fishing license the clerk will be watching their vote today. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Old Town, Representative Dunlap.

Representative **DUNLAP**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I just wanted to respond to a couple of things that have been said today. Essentially when you talk about the volatility of license sale, it has shown some volatility in the past when a fee increase has gone through. A few people decide not to buy them anymore because they say that the \$20 they have to pay is too much for a years worth of opportunity in hunting and fishing. We have done an awful lot in the last couple of years to expand opportunities for Maine's sportsmen. We have had the expanded archery season and the moose lottery system, we have gotten more permits. We have almost twice as many doe permits right now being proposed this year as were proposed when I first came here. There is a great deal more opportunity that has evolved through these processes and the town clerks have been part of this. They have to implement it. They have to sell this stuff to people. They have to push the super sport and other items. I would really request that you think long and hard about this. Vote your conscience on this one. Is it really worth paying for the service they are providing to this government on behalf of the Maine people. Thank you verv much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Machias, Representative Bagley.

Representative BAGLEY: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise to support the town clerks in the state. Contrary to some of the things you might have heard, not all clerks get big wages. Some clerks do this just for fees in different areas and that is all they get. There a lot more to it than just writing out a license. There are forms that have to be filed every month. There are bank deposits that have to be made. There are a lot of phone calls made when people have questions. Having sold a lot of these licenses, I know what a chore it is and it is time for towns or the clerks, whoever gets the money, get compensated as they should be. Thank you Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Millinocket, Representative Clark.

Representative CLARK: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise this morning, again, it is almost noon time, to give careful consideration. As we deal with public land purchase and things like that throughout the state, let's remind ourselves about public access. This bill would provide fish be stocked so that us as public people can go and fish without going through these paid gates. All this bill does is, if there are fish being stocked beyond paid gates, they will be able to get there as an access issue. I wish you guys to overturn the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report and go with the Minority Report. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Old Town, Representative Dunlap.

Representative **DUNLAP**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Very simply, there is a couple of things that the implications of this bill could have. It does provide to prohibit stocking of state raised fish in waters where there is not completely free access and that implies an awful lot of bodies of water. Starting about 25 years ago, the state started turning over some boat launches that it could not afford to maintain. They turned them over to municipalities, private groups and then charge a modest launch fee, \$5 or \$1. It has

gone up and down in various areas over the years. That money would be used to maintain the launches. Also, you have the paper mill land. Some of which are gated and have fee access to the north Maine woods. There is a fee access. If you prohibited stocking in those areas, then you would basically be reducing by probably around half, but anyway the amount of waters the state stocks, the submerged lands belong to all the people of the state, 10 acres or greater. I think it is reasonable for people to expect that those waters will be maintained for their fisheries habitat and their fisheries production whether or not the access is free or not free. Free access is no longer practical when you are talking about maintaining boat launches and Somebody has to pay for that. maintaining roads. Municipalities have elected to do it through fees and private entities have elected to do it through fees. They do not own the bodies of water, the state does. It is up to the state to maintain those fisheries. I would ask that you vote with the majority on this bill to keep basically moving forward into the future for reasonable access. Thank you very much.

The Chair ordered a division on the motion to ACCEPT the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report.

Representative DUNLAP of Old Town moved that the House ACCEPT the Majority Ought to Pass Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Penobscot, Representative Perkins.

Representative PERKINS: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Right now the way the law is for a person to hunt under age 16 to get a juvenile license they have to be with a parent or a guardian or somebody approved by the parent or the

guardian who is over 18. This bill would require that person, even it approved by the parent or even if the parent or the grandparent goes with that person, that they go through the hunter safety course or have had a grandfathered license, as it were. There again, we are coming along with another proposal for another law. Nobody can cite any problem. It was just possible. No problems exist. This would take the right away from some grandfather or anybody approved by the parent as a responsible adult to go with this youngster when they are hunting. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Fryeburg, Representative True.

Representative **TRUE**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a bill which I presented primarily for safety. This does not take away the right of the person to be there. It only means that they have to buy a license and certainly have to go through a hunter safety course. I have taught my grandchildren how to hunt and I have observed people who do not know about hunting in the woods with young adults. They might as well be home sitting by the stove. As I said, this is mainly safety. It is not a money raising bill or anything. I ask you to support the majority.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Old Town, Representative Dunlap.

Representative **DUNLAP**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This bill does exactly what Representative True from Fryeburg has just described to you. It simply says that if a juvenile hunter is going to go into the woods and because by law they have to be accompanied by an adult. That person should have at least some hunter safety education, which does include firearm training, map and compass, bag limits and ethics so that when the young person is out in the woods they are receiving some reasonable instruction in the pursuit of outdoor activities. Currently there is no assurance that an adult in the company of a juvenile hunter has any of that training and for the safety of the individuals involved and for the peace of mind of the parents or the guardians of those children, it seems reasonable to ask that the accompanying adults have some training. I urge you to vote in favor of the Ought to Pass report. Mr. Speaker, I request a division.

Representative DUNLAP of Old Town **REQUESTED** a division on his motion to **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought to Pass** Report

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Penobscot, Representative Perkins.

Representative **PERKINS**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I am sorry about this, but I did have to comment on that last comment by my good friend from Old Town, Representative Dunlap, that this would give peace of mind to the adults and the supervisors and the guardians that they can request that the person that they give permission to go with get a license or go to the training. I just had to comment on that. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rome, Representative Tracy.

Representative **TRACY**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The problem that I have with this piece of legislation is, and I said it down during the public hearing, if anybody is in the armed services be it he or she and happen to come home on leave during the hunting season and has a nephew, brother or whatever relative and would like to go out into the woods of the State of Maine with this juvenile hunter who has probably taken a safety course and stuff and being a military person be it he or she that has the experience in firearms, I have a problem to say that we as the people of the State of Maine would deny these very individuals the opportunity to go out with these juveniles, but yet as a government and United States government would say that it is all right after we have trained them in this expertise to send them anywhere in the world in harms way to preserve and protect our rights. That is why I have a problem with this bill. Thank you.

The Chair ordered a division on the motion to **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought to Pass** Report.

A vote of the House was taken. 85 voted in favor of the same and 23 against, the the Majority **Ought to Pass** Report was **ACCEPTED**.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Standish, Representative Mack.

Representative **MACK**: Mr. Speaker, Right Honorable Men and Women of the House. This bill is the Maine Civil Rights Act of 1999. What it does is to ban the State of Maine from discriminating against or giving any special rights or privileges to anyone on the basis of race, sex, color ethnicity or national origin in the areas of public hiring, education or contracting. No special rights and no discrimination.

I want to tell you about my family. My stepfather was born in Kingston, Jamaica and is of Chinese and Black ancestry. When he was young the family came to this country for the freedom and opportunity that is available to all in America. He is now an American citizen and very proud of that fact. He always taught me that it is a persons ability that mattered, not who his parents were. Martin Luther King had it right when he argued for a color-blind society and said, "We should base our judgment of someone on the content of their character, not on the color of their skin."

One of the opponents to this bill testified that a color blind society is not a fair society. I cannot speak for everyone in this chamber, but as for myself, I want a color- blind society. Some people hold the attitude that a black, a woman or another minority can only get a job if it is handed to them. They cannot earn it of their own merit and ability. That attitude appalls me and reeks of racism and arrogance. All people, regardless of their parents, have the ability to achieve and become great. That was the goal of the 1964 Civil Rights Act and that is the goal of this bill. In fact, the language from this bill is modeled very closely on the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

Finally, I want to tell you about my baby sister. Tia V. Chang. I have great hopes for her future. She is 10 years old now, but when she grows up, I want her to be proud that she has earned everything she has and that nothing was handed to her because she is Black, a woman, Chinese, Jewish or Indian. I want her to know that she has earned it because of her charm and her intelligence. The only special privileges I ever want her to have are from her big brother spoiling her. I urge you to vote against the pending motion and support this bill. Vote for a color-blind society without special rights, discrimination or preferences for anyone. Thank you.

The SPEAKÉR: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bridgton, Representative Waterhouse.

Representative WATERHOUSE: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The sponsor of the bill is correct. Let me tell you what LD 703 does and doesn't do. LD 703 does track a language of the text in the original federal 1964 Civil Rights Act. It is similar to the California Civil Rights Initiative in 1996 and the Washington Civil Rights Initiative in 1998. Both of which passed by voters with an 8 and 17 point margin respectively. LD 703 does not dismantle all affirmative action. It simply prohibits discriminatory affirmative action, which employs preferences and sets aside quotas. Non-discriminatory programs such as broad based outreach and recruitment which ensure equal opportunity for all individuals regardless of race or creed would be permitted under this legislation. LD 703 puts the civil rights movement back in track in keeping with the original goals and intentions of the 1964 Civil Rights Act. Having said that, let me tell you that personally this issue has been a real problem with me going back many, many years. I couldn't quite rationalize the dichotomy between a 1964 Civil Rights Act which says you cannot discriminate because of age, race and so forth and so on. Then the affirmative action which turns around and does exactly that to try to address past grievances or discrimination done by somebody who you might not even know or not even been born when you were born and so forth and so on.

When I was in college I took a cultural anthropology course. The professor was a woman from India. I did a research paper on affirmative action. I got a B+ on that paper. Across the foot of the paper was, well researched, well written, but naive. It was naive she thought because I thought that everybody could start at the same position in life and be treated as individuals. I think I was right then. I don't think I was naive then. I certainly don't think I am naïve now. I think she was wrong. Group identify and affirmative action with preferences is insidious and divisive.

I asked some interesting questions when we had people who came before our committee in opposition of this bill. One of them was, do you have any children? The ones that said they did I said to them, would you think that if one of your children went for a job or an education or a grant or whatever and was turned down because of the color of their skin or their gender, do you think justice was done to your child? It is a very uncomfortable question because when you put it on a personal basis, you are talking about your children or your wife or your husband or whatever. It kind of hits home. Affirmative action probably would never affect me. I wasn't blessed with any children so it is not going to affect my children, but it might affect somebody else. One person actually said to me after I posed that question to them and they really struggled with it. Finally, they said, I could live with it.

My contention, ladies and gentlemen, is they shouldn't have to live with it. Is it fair? Is it justice to make somebody else pay for past grievances because they belong to an identity group? Does it promote non-racism, non-discrimination and non-tolerance? I would postulate that if somebody suffered under that and I have know some people who have, I can't think of a quicker way of turning somebody into racist, bigot or somebody who is intolerant who suffered under this type of policy. Maybe I am naïve. I am not naive to the point to think that we are ever going to get rid of racism or bigotry. If you study human nature down through the history, we haven't done a very good job. If you look at what is happening over in Kosovo now and around the world in places we don't even know. This utopian view and policies to achieve that utopian view to think that we can change a man's nature causes more misery in human history than any other policy. That is why we have the rule of law to protect us from our human weaknesses. This policy is an aberration to that rule of law because it says exactly opposite of the thing we are trying to get rid of.

Let's end this policy of making somebody else pay the price for intolerance, racism and bigotry done in the years past. I hope you will join me in voting against the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Naples, Representative Thompson.

Representative **THOMPSON**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I would ask that the members of this body join with me in supporting the 11 to 2 Ought Not to Pass report of the Judiciary Committee. We reviewed this matter and the 11 to 2 majority of the committee felt guite strongly that current law was sufficient. Current law already limits any preferences, considerations of gender or race can only be when there is a written affirmative action plan with supportive statistical data and the provisions in which it is set forth are very clearly laid out in the statute. There were no people brought forward to tell us how they have been discriminated against in the State of Maine and needed this change in the law. There were no people that came forward and said they had been discriminated against and needed this law. I would ask that you join the Ought Not to Pass report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Standish, Representative Mack.

Representative **MACK**: Mr. Speaker, Right Honorable Men and Women of the House. The idea that current law already covers this is untrue. It is being done in the State of Maine, most notably the university system. Other places such as with highway funds, this bill does not cover where the federal government requires discrimination for the state to get the highway funds. This bill would not cover that situation. In the

university, it would be covered. The right honorable gentleman from Naples mentioned that it is allowed in places in support of statistical data. Well, statistical numbering means quotas. think it is appalling that the State of Maine would put in any quotas and hire people just because we need a woman or a black or a white or a man on a particular position. We should be basing people just on their content and their ability to do the job. There have been people who have sent letters unsigned because of fear of job reprisal at the University of Southern Maine. They have been the victims of discrimination and who see it all around them and want it stopped at the university. This bill would still allow outreach to get more women, blacks or other minorities to apply for the jobs. That is fine. I would encourage that. Once everyone is applying for the job, the person who is chosen is the one who is best able to perform the job. Please vote against the pending motion and support an end to discrimination and preferences in state hiring. Thank you,

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bridgton, Representative Waterhouse.

Representative WATERHOUSE: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I apologize for rising a second time. I will be very brief. A couple of the people testifying before our committee made a statement that we needed this policy because discrimination still exists and so does racism. Of course it does. My contention is that it will always exist. One of the points that I left out in my previous statements was who decides sometime in the future that we no longer need this type of a policy and that everything is hunky dory and there is no more racism and there is no more bigotry and everybody is tolerant. Who is going to be on Mt. Olympus to say everything is okay, let's get rid of it? Is it going to be the people who are benefiting from the discrimination.? It is going to be the people who are overseeing the program? Is it going to be the people who are suffering under the discrimination? I call this policy discrimination. Let's call it what it is. That is what I think it is. If they are in the minority some time in the future, they are certainly not going to have the votes to overturn this type of a policy. We are going to have to leave it up to somebody who benefits from this policy or somebody who oversees it. I say that is the wrong way to do it. Let's get rid of it now folks. Let's start everybody off on an equal footing.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is Majority Ought Not to Pass Report. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bridgton, Representative Waterhouse.

Representative WATERHOUSE: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I hope you will vote with me against the pending motion. This is a consumer bill. Basically what it does or what it says is that a consumer who has had a problem with billing practices of a lawyer can proceed with an action to the Unfair Trade Practices Act. This was brought to me by a colleague who had a constituent who had a problem. I did some research on it and I found some court decisions throughout the country dealing with the issue of the practice of law and consumer fraud protection statutes in the state. The particular one that I was looking at was in Illinois and was the Kript vs. Lider decision and the Supreme Court in Illinois came to the decision that because the Legislature didn't put in the intention of a possibility of a citizen pursing an action under their fraud act that they couldn't be able to do it. There are four other states in the country, Texas, Washington, Louisiana and Connecticut. The State Supreme Courts in those states let lawyers be punished on the state consumer protection laws. This is my attempt to clarify our statutes, so if a similar occurrence happens in this state, that the language will be there so that the courts can say you will pursue a civil action against fraudulent billing practices of lawyers. The distinction is that most, if not

all, Supreme Courts, in Maine it is the Law Court, oversees the practice of law for the lawyers. The distinction being that billing practices should be separated out from the practice of law. It is really not the practice of law. This would allow citizens of the State of Maine who had trouble with lawyers billing to pursue a civil action. Thank you and I hope you will vote against the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Yarmouth, Representative Buck.

Representative **BUCK**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I was the sponsor of this legislation and brought it forward because of a situation one of my constituents had in terms of dealing with this issue. Let me briefly say that under the present system if a client has a problem with the manner in which an attorney has conducted his case and has indeed later billed him, the process is a close one in terms of those involved in making a decision are all members of that profession. It would seem reasonable to me that if this bill went forward, then when it comes to a case of a question about billing, it would be done outside the purview of those individuals who are in the profession themselves. Therefore, I hope that you would support me on this issue and I would request a roll call. Thank you.

Representative BUCK of Yarmouth **REQUESTED** a roll call on the motion to **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought Not to Pass** Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Naples, Representative Thompson.

Representative THOMPSON: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This again is an 11 to 2 report of the Judiciary Committee. The bill was brought forward as the Representative from Yarmouth, Representative Buck, indicated. The one person who testified in favor of this bill was a constituent of his who did not, in fact, have a billing problem with an attorney. He had a lot of other problems with some attorneys, but one of them was not a billing problem. He came to us and provided us with a two inch loose leaf binder, which I read quite completely and documented a number of problems with attorneys who happened to be sitting on Land Use Boards who made decisions against them and felt there was a conspiracy among the legal profession to keep him from being able to expand the business use of a dwelling. It was a very complicated legal issue in which he appealed to the Law Court and lost and is unhappy with the decision. I don't know whether it was a good decision or a bad decision. The point is, it had nothing to do with billing.

The only other basis for this, we were told, is in Illinois there was a case that said under Illinois statute, the billing is not part of the Unfair Trade Practices Act. We should pass something to make sure that ours is, but there still have been no problems with billing practices presented to us. There is an existing practice that gives people a remedy over and above this court system in the State of Maine. That is the Fee Arbitration System in which the consumer can ask for a fee arbitration which is mandatory on the attorney. They don't have to do that. They can also go to court and sue the attorney if they have a dispute over their fees. Typically, if they have a dispute over their fees, they just don't pay them.

This is an unneeded bill that is not backed by any cases from Maine that support it. I would ask you to support the Ought Not to Pass report. The SPEAKER: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is acceptance of the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.

to the Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court

WHEREAS, it appears to the House of Representatives of the 119th Legislature that the following are important questions of law and that this is a solemn occasion; and

WHEREAS, the Constitution of Maine, Article VI, Section 3 provides for the Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court to render their opinion on these questions; and

WHEREAS, there is now before the 119th Legislature for its consideration Senate Paper 397, Legislative Document 1188, "An Act to Amend Law Enforcement Powers of Maine Forest Rangers"; and

WHEREAS, if Legislative Document 1188 becomes law, there may be serious questions regarding its constitutionality and effect; and

WHEREAS, it is important that the Legislature be informed as to the questions raised in this Order; now, therefore, be it

ORDERED, that, in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of Maine, the House respectfully requests the Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court to give the House their opinion on the following questions of law:

Question No. 1. If Legislative Document 1188 becomes law, do the provisions of that document violate the Declaration of Rights provision of the Constitution of Maine, Article I, Section 1, particularly when construed in conjunction with the provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 8869, subsection 11 regarding rights of access to land provided to agents of the Department of Conservation, Bureau of Forestry?

Question No. 2. If Legislative Document 1188 becomes law, do the provisions of that document violate the doctrine of unreasonable searches and seizures under the Constitution of Maine, Article I, Section 5, particularly when construed in conjunction with the provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 8869, subsection 11 regarding rights of access to land provided to agents of the Department of Conservation, Bureau of Forestry? Question No. 3. If Legislative Document 1188 becomes law, do the provisions of that document violate the unreasonable searches and seizures provisions of the Fourth and Fourteenth Amendments to the United States Constitution, particularly when construed in conjunction with the provisions of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 8869, subsection 11 regarding rights of access to land provided to agents of the Department of Conservation, Bureau of Forestry?
