The following Joint Order: (S.P. 709)

WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that there is a need for a study on the current E-911 system; now, therefore, be it

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Task Force to study the E-911 System is established as follows.

- 1. Task force established. The Task Force to Study the E-911 System, referred to in this order as the "task force," is established.
- **2. Task force membership.** The task force consists of 15 members appointed as follows:
 - A. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall jointly appoint 7 members who serve on the Joint Standing Committee on Utilities and Energy;
 - B. The Public Advocate or the advocate's designee;
 - C. The Commissioner of Public Safety or the commissioner's designee; and
 - D. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall jointly appoint 4 members who represent a state, county or municipal government entity that provides fire, emergency medical or police services and 2 members who represent personnel who directly dispatch emergency service calls.
- 3. Appointments; convening task force; chair. All appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this order. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council must be notified by all appointing authorities once the selections have been made. Within 15 days after the appointment of all members, the Chair of the Legislative Council shall call and convene the first meeting of the task force no later than August 1, 1999. At its first meeting, the task force shall select a chair from among its legislative members.
- 4. Duties. The task force shall conduct a study of the State's E-911 system to assess the use of the E-911 system throughout the State. The study must include a complete analysis on the progress of implementation of the system, including the percentage of the state currently utilizing the system, and must address any difficulties encountered by municipalities in using the system. The task force may also address other issues that are relevant to the E-911 system.
- **5. Staffing.** Upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall provide necessary staffing services to the task force.
- 6. Compensation. Members of the task force who are Legislators are entitled to receive the legislative per diem and expenses, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, for each day's attendance at meetings of the task

force. The members of the task force who are neither employees of the State nor Legislators are entitled to a per diem and expenses equal to the legislative per diem and expenses.

7. Report. The task force shall submit its findings, together with any recommendations, including legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on Utilities and Energy by January 15, 2000.

Re: Report Concerning License Revocation and Child Support Enforcement

Dear Speaker Rowe:

It is the responsibility of the Department of Human Services, Division of Support Enforcement and Recovery (DSER) to report to the Legislature and the Governor regarding license revocation. The first report is due January 31, 1999 and biennially thereafter, in accordance with 19A MRSA §§ 2201 (15) and 2202 (12).

For Professional and Recreational Licenses

Requirement No. 1

The number of support obligors identified as licensees subject to this section.

Answer:

We have identified 2,284 professional licenses involving 2,635 cases. We have been unable to identify recreational licenses on a statewide basis because they are not contained in a centralized data base. Therefore we have tracked them on an individual basis. The Department is working with Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to develop an on-line procedure to automate receipt of this information.

Requirement No. 2

The number of support obligors identified by the Department under this section who are not in compliance with a court order of support.

Answer:

At this time, 1,306 non-custodial parents are presently matched with our child support caseload and an additional 1,333 cases have been closed which did have a professional license in our caseload.

Requirement No. 3

The number of actions taken by the Department under this section and the results of those actions.

Answer:

The Department has taken 309 business and professional licenses. The Department has requested the revocation of only a limited number of recreational licenses. Under present sales procedures for recreational licenses, obligors would be able to purchase a new license almost immediately at any number of locations around the state. Again, we are researching this issue to find ways to make this section more effective.

For Drivers Licenses

Requirement No. 1

The number of notices served upon support obligors by the Department under this section.

Answer:

The Department has served in excess of 24,000 notices upon support obligors. We also had to re-serve obligors after the law changed in 1997 in order to provide due process to all individuals. There has been a steady increase in the number of notices served since the process began in 1993.

Requirement No. 2

The number of obligors served notice under this section who request a hearing.

Answer:

Our records indicate that 267 hearings have been requested as a result of our license revocation initiative. Requirement No. 3

The number of obligors held under this section, the results of the hearings and the number of cases settled without a hearing.

Answer:

Our records indicate 165 hearings were held, and 102 were settled without the need for a hearing. To date, the Department has prevailed in every hearing.

Requirement No. 4

The number of support obligors certified to the Secretary of State for noncompliance with a court order of support under this section.

Answer:

1,827 obligors have been certified as of January 21, 1999. Requirement No. 5

The costs incurred in the implementation and enforcement of this section and the Department's actions under this section.

Answer:

DSER estimates that direct costs of approximately \$212,000 have been incurred in order to implement the enforcement of drivers license revocation since its inception in 1994 through 1998. These costs include service of process of the initial revocation notice(s); printing costs; photocopying; postage; and staff time for one clerical person. DSER acknowledges that additional indirect costs have been incurred, such as operation of computers; administrative hearings; cashier staff to process increased payments; expenditures billed to DSER from BMV, Secretary of State; and computer programming time. We are unable to break out this particular initiative from the total normal operating procedures.

The original four target groups totaling 23,456 cases were identified in a singular, concerted effort to bring an existing, non-paying caseload into compliance by utilizing the threat of license

revocation. Initially two warning letters were sent to noncustodial parents. Effort was then undertaken to serve each of the individuals who ignored the two warning letters with Notices of Intent to Revoke which actually began the revocation action against them.

The backlog of existing cases subject to license revocation in the target groups was diligently worked by professional staff for a considerable period of time, during which time new cases came into the DSER system needing license revocation enforcement action, and paying cases fell out of compliance and became subject to license revocation action. The new cases and cases formerly in compliance have been handled, and continue to be handled, on an exception basis as they are recognized by the DSER data warehouse which extracts information from the DSER New England Child Support Enforcement (Computer) System (NECSES).

The Department has found tracking certain aspects of the license revocation program to be useful. We track total number of license actions, total number of agreements, and payments received from targeted individuals.

The information requested in this report was formulated at the Legislative Session in 1993 prior to the actual implementation of our process. Information contained in this report does not mirror how the law is applied today. The attached LIRV sheet better reflects the actual process and gives a more accurate portrayal of how we use this law and the results to date. This information was developed as a result of a study done by the Office of the Inspector General for a national report studying the effectiveness of several states' license revocation laws. We have attached this report for your information.

Enclosed in a copy of the Inspector General's Report comparing Maine's administrative process with the processes in court states and guasi-administrative states.

Representative HATCH of Skowhegan moved that the House ACCEPT the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Carmel, Representative Treadwell.

Representative **TREADWELL**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This bill may have been worthwhile and may have been necessary. I should say the prevailing wage may have been necessary 60 years ago. This bill would eliminate the prevailing wage which is an antiquated system that all it does is increase the cost of public construction projects. The only industry and the only sector of our economy that is affected by the prevailing wage is the construction industry. The net affect of this is that it inflates the cost of all public projects including school projects. We all know the problems that we are having now with trying to upgrade and renovate the schools in the State of Maine. Our dollars would be allowed to go a lot further to accomplish that task if we didn't have this prevailing wage law, which requires all contractors when they bid a project

to pay the inflated wage that is part of the prevailing wage structure. I would urge you to vote against the pending motion. Mr. Speaker, I request a roll call when the vote is taken.

Representative TREADWELL of Carmel **REQUESTED** a roll call on the motion to **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought Not to Pass** Report.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Skowhegan, Representative Hatch.

Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Representative **HATCH**: Gentlemen of the House. The prevailing wage in the state ensures that bidders competing for state work do not cut wages or hire less experienced workers to the detriment of the state. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that federal prevailing wage law, which is only on federal contracts, which would be our road, adds about 1.5 percent to the contract cost. We have no idea what it costs here in the state, but I assume that it is either that or much lower. The State of Utah after the repeal of the prevailing wage law saw increases in costs, although initial bids were lower. There were more cost overruns. This does not interfere with general employer or employee relationship. It only sets conditions for employers who bid on state projects. This is not unusual. The prevailing wage law does not involve school construction. That is at the local level and they decide who the contractor is going to be. I thank you very much and I would be willing to answer any questions that you might have. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bridgton, Representative Waterhouse.

Representative WATERHOUSE: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. When you look at the prevailing wage law and you look at it honestly, what it is is bid rigging in the marketplace. There is no getting around that. I appreciate the chair of the Labor Committee, somebody who I have great respect for, mentioning the fact for saying that school construction is not included in this. The interesting thing is the National School Board Association in their '98-'99 resolution appealed to the federal government and all state governments to repeal their prevailing wage law because it drives up the cost of school construction and maintenance projects. doesn't affect us here in the State of Maine, but if it costs more on school construction projects and maintenance projects than certainly it costs more on any project. Would you like it if somebody came up to your house and you wanted a house built and they gave you a bid with their labor costs included and somebody came along and said you can't accept that bid, we want you to have this contractor who is going to pay a higher prevailing wage. This anti-free market dips into the pocket of the taxpayer and the argument that the state does this because of oversight and make sure they have quality work on school construction doesn't fair under the straight face test under the market. The state has oversight on all their contracts. I can assure you that if anybody didn't live up to those standards they would be quick to find out. Let's call this what it is. It is bid rigging in the marketplace. It is nothing more and nothing less. If you support that at the taxpayers expense, then you don't want to support my bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from North Berwick, Representative MacDougall.

Representative MACDOUGALL: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would like to throw a couple of ideas out to the full House concerning this bill. I work at a printing

company that employs almost 700 people. We are just finishing up our third expansion in the last several years. I talked to our project manager concerning this bill. I basically asked him that if he had to pay the prevailing wage, would you have gotten more quality work or a better job done? He chose to disagree. Again, he has had three projects at our company alone, as well as several others in his career. One of the features of our last expansion requires the pouring of a floor that requires tolerance of thousandths of an inch for a large area of square footage. Finding someone qualified to do that required us to find someone who is very, very rare and very knowledgeable. In that case that individual was able to charge a pretty good price because there was no one to compete with him. What was required was to have those tolerances built properly so that when this new press went on the floor there would be no vibration which would break the paper as it goes through the press. It was crucial. The decision was made that the quality in that instance was paramount. The individual company that took care of that for us is very skilled in that area and does not have a lot of competition and was able to draw a pretty good rate.

However, other areas of our expansion had several companies which bid on different features of the project. The project manager was able to utilize the past performance of a company, perhaps he has worked with them before over the years, as well as price. I think in terms of what the good Representative from Bridgton, Representative Waterhouse, presenting this bill to the Labor Committee is his attempt to say that when it comes to state projects what is good in the private sector would be good in the public sector. We have no problem finding qualified workers and companies to get the work done. At the end of the project if the quality isn't there, they don't get paid. That is the name of that game. I would ask you, ladies and gentlemen, to vote against the pending motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Carmel, Representative Treadwell.

Representative **TREADWELL**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Another point I would like to make before we take the vote on this bill. If you have an electrician working on a prevailing wage job and associated with that job there may be some other duties cleaning up after the worker or something of that nature, that electrician has to maintain track of each component of the job that he is doing. I think we can all realize that this is going to add administrative cost or additional cost or whatever nature you want to call them. It is going to add cost to the job and, of course, that additional cost is going to be passed right on to the taxpayer. We are talking strictly jobs that are funded by public money, public funded jobs. That is all we are talking about with this bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Gardiner, Representative Colwell.

Representative **COLWELL**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I feel compelled to speak on this bill because I am in the construction business. Much has been said about how the prevailing wage increases the cost of our public construction projects, but not much has been said about how the prevailing wage increases the wages and income of our Maine workers. I think that is really the point. I said this in debate the last session when this bill came up. I am in no way interested in lowering the wages of Maine workers. Essentially, that is what this bill would do in a very limited section of our economy. The fact is, many of my colleagues on the other side the aisle make much of a study that ranks Maine fifth in state and local taxes as related to personal income. Although the true number when you consider all taxes, we are ranked 15th. We have a golden opportunity

here by supporting the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report to assure that Maine workers income increases rather than decreases. There is another point I would like to make in relation to these highway construction projects. The fact is the prevailing wage does level the playing field for Maine companies when they compete with out of state generally much larger construction companies on our highway projects. The simple fact is that since all contractors have to meet this prevailing wage law the competition for these projects is actually where it ought to be in competitiveness and doing the construction projects in a smart and efficient manner. This really does help our Maine contractors as well. I urge you to support the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Westbrook, Representative Duplessie.

Representative **DUPLESSIE**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I must rise to speak on this bill. The good Representative from Gardiner said it very clearly. Are we trying to decrease the wages and race to the bottom in this state? We should be trying to increase the wage potential in this state. I am very concerned with what I have just heard about inflating the cost on construction projects.

As a prime example a few of the multi-million dollar projects done in this state the Portland/South Portland Bridge instate construction firms and the Bath Bridge over the Kennebec next to the Bath Iron Works Facility. Bid rigging as the good Representative from Bridgton said, I doubt it. The Bath Bridge over the Kennebec, two large Maine construction firms one located within 1,000 or 2,000 feet of this new bridge project on the Kennebec. Another one a large construction firm that had the general contractors bid for the Portland/South Portland Bridge. I wish people would call the Maine DOT today and see what they say on that new bridge project apparently under construction over the Kennebec. I was by an out of state firm, a firm that pays above the prevailing wage, they did it at less cost than the two large Maine construction firms that were competing for that project. If it is bid rigging, I would like to know where the additional money would have gone if the Maine firms wouldn't have bid. The large out of state firm pays a lot higher wages and benefits and they are able to do the project and make money on the project. I can't believe it inflates cost and as far as bid rigging, where has the extra been going then on some of these multi-million dollar projects when an out of state company from Chicago can come in here and do it cheaper and on time for the Maine DOT? Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bridgton, Representative Waterhouse. Having spoken twice now requests unanimous consent to address the House a third time. Is there objection? Chair hears no objection, the Representative may proceed.

Representative **WATERHOUSE**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I don't think anybody in here wants people to make less money. That is a ridiculous supposition. I wish everybody had more money than they needed. That is not the point. I believe in the free market. I believe in competitive bidding. I do not believe in government feints that set an arbitrary cost of doing construction. As I said before, if you had a carpenter building your house, I have been in the carpentry business for 20 years and they were going to charge you \$20 an hour and somebody came along and said they have to charge you \$30 an hour, I don't think you would appreciate this. I don't mind if somebody wants to pay more money to have something done, a project in their own house or whatever. We are talking about taxpayer's money. We are called upon to be fiscally

responsible when we use taxpayer's money. The argument that letting the free market work in a competitive environment is going to produce inefficient low quality work just doesn't cut it. We are not talking about quality work and efficient work. We are not talking about lowering the wages of workers. We are talking about free market. I have been in the free market all my life. I set my own wages and my own costs and the free market does that, not government. If you want government to do that, they are doing it arbitrarily and they are not doing it for any other reason than to give money to some workers, but take away from others.

Ladies and gentlemen, most of the people in this state are non-union workers. When you set an arbitrary cost of doing business, a lot of those businesses do not compete for those jobs. People who do not belong to unions will not get that work. I have seen many businesses turn away work and now you are hurting the other workers. Workers are workers no matter what they are or where they come from or what organization they belong to. There are a lot of workers out there that don't get jobs because of arbitrary setting of prices. I have seen it happen a hundred times and everybody that has been in construction or any other line of business sees a cost that is attached to doing something arbitrarily does not benefit anybody. I urge you to vote against the pending motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Skowhegan, Representative Hatch.

Representative **HATCH**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I speak in opposition to this legislation and urge the adoption of the Majority Ought Not to Pass Report. The amendment, in fact, reveals the shallowness of the proposal. The original legislation did two things. It required a competitive bidding process for any contract awarded which was funded by state and municipal assistance. The requirement for competitive bidding process is removed by the Committee Amendment supported by the minority. They are not asking for a fair competitive bidding process. They took that out of their proposal because they recognized that there is no requirement for a fair and competitive bidding process.

What they want to do in this legislation is simply punish employers and employees who entered into agreements to provide for fair wages and fair benefits for Maine workers. This bill does nothing but that. It says to employers in awarding these contracts you cannot require that good wages and good benefits be paid. It prohibits employers from entering into agreements with unions to set standards for wages and benefits on projects which are funded with state or municipal assistance. It makes terrible public policy. It interferes with the rights of employers to enter into such agreements and it does so without even requiring a fair competitive bidding process.

This is a terrible bill. It was a bad bill when it was brought to the committee and it is an even worse bill now. What it really is is an attempt to punish employers who act responsibly and agree to wage and benefit standards for their employees and for the projects which they bring forth. There is also a very good prospect that this legislation is unconstitutional because it attempts to regulate an area governed by the federal government and where federal government has pre-empted the arena. This bill is blatantly against the interest of the Maine workers and blatantly anti-union. We strongly encourage your opposition to this legislation and encourage Ought Not to Pass. When the vote is taken, I request the yeas and nays.

Representative HATCH of Skowhegan **REQUESTED** a roll call on her motion to **ACCEPT** the Majority **Ought Not to Pass** Report.

This bill in the summary says that the purpose is to exclude union or non-union status as a factor in the competitive bidding process. That is all it says. In the State of Maine about 15 percent of the workforce of the state is unionized. We are discriminating against the other 85 percent of the workforce of this state anytime we make the membership of a union mandatory for a worker to go on to a labor project that is funded by state dollars. I think that it is unfair. It is discriminatory and I think that we should bring it to an end. I would urge that you vote against the pending motion on this bill.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Yarmouth, Representative Buck.

Representative **BUCK**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. As the sponsor of this bill, there is a lot of misunderstanding about its intent. I would like to just take less than two minutes to clear this up. Some people are under the impression that this is a bill pitting the labor unions against the non-labor unions. The intent of this bill is far from that. All this bill says is that when a municipal government or a state government puts an item out to bid they cannot make as a bidding requirement that a PLA, project labor agreement, must be included. What it does say is that any private enterprise can bid on a government project and they can include a PLA if they desire or they do not have to include a PLA. All this bill does is ensure that those organizations that do not want to use a PLA in the initial bill are not required to do so. This is not an anti-labor bill at all. All this does is ensure that all of the contractors in this state have a level playing field when the initial bid is made. There is no requirement at all that state or local government has to choose a non-PLA over a PLA. It has nothing to do with it at all. It just means that the initial bills can be evaluated by either the state level or the local level regardless of whether a project labor agreement is involved in that bid.

Representative **KASPRZAK**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. When I saw this bill on the calendar I had

some questions about it. What I received didn't make me feel any more at ease. Some of the questions I have are, why we are establishing a Birth Defects Program within the state when these things are already done in other research facilities around the country? Why are we growing the Department of Human Services yet again? What will we do with this information once collected? Why is there a prenatal intrusion into the woman carrying the child in that relationship? What if the parents object to having this information collected? Where will it go? What will they do with the end result? There is an amendment I understand that allows parents to object to the collection of this information and have it passed out to who knows who. If they have sincere, which I wonder how that would be defined, religious beliefs that would cause them to object to this. Who are these non-profit groups the information will be given to that federal grants will be given to? Are they Planned Parenthood? Are they Family Planning? Who are they? Another question I have is concerning the long-term follow-up. What does that mean? Will the state be coming into people's homes and looking at their children and trying to determine what possible birth defects they have? Who will they be referring them to? How long will they continue in this? Will there be any sort of pressure put on the parent to collect this information and to pass it on?

It seems to me a little bit ironic that we have been talking about confidentiality when it comes to adults in hospitals, but when it comes to an unborn child and then a child after birth having some kind of defect, there doesn't seem to be any interest in confidentiality. I have some questions and I hope that someone could answer them. Mr. Speaker, I ask for a roll call on this vote and would ask that you vote against the pending motion. Thank you.

Representative KASPRZAK of Newport REQUESTED a roll call on the motion to ADOPT Committee Amendment "A" (H-268).

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Saco, Representative Kane.

Representative KANE: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This was a unanimous Ought to Pass report out of the Health and Human Services Committee. The bill establishes a program within the Bureau of Health in the Department of Human Services to identify and collect information on birth defects. The program will undertake research and is authorized to collect information. It has access to health care records and information and may provide information to families on available services. The bill requires a report to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services in January. The Bureau of Health has been the beneficiary of a federal grant. This is the collection of data on birth defects and has been one of the major gaps in the overall responsibility of the Bureau of Health to collect a great deal of information on the incidence of a variety of illnesses among our population in Maine in order to provide some direction in health care policy. It is the historically appropriate area of state government to be collecting information and the bill does nothing more than to authorize and reinforce that particularly at a time of opportunity to utilize federal funds to conduct this research and information gathering. Thank you Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hartland, Representative Stedman.

Representative **STEDMAN**: Mr. Speaker, May I pose a question through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Representative may pose his question.

Representative **STEDMAN**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Does this program in any way duplicate the activities of the Child Development Services in locating students that need assistance to get them ready for school?

The SPEAKER: The Representative from Hartland, Representative Stedman has posed a question through the Chair to anyone who may care to respond. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Manchester, Representative Fuller.

Representative **FULLER**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. In response to the question from the gentleman concerning whether or not this duplicates Child Development Services. It does not. Child Development Services is a program that actually provides services to preschool children, some of whom were born with some birth defects. This is not that kind of service. It is to be able to do research and to follow up. Not all birth defects are noted on the birth certificates because they are identified later. This would make that information a part of the data base for research purposes. Thank you.
