- 1. Commission established. The Commission to Study the Statewide Redemption of Returnable Containers, referred to in this order as the "commission," is established.
- Commission membership. The commission consists of 11 members appointed as follows:
- A. Five members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- B. Three members of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate; and
- C. One representative each from the beverage distribution industry, the redemption center industry and the public, appointed by the Governor.
- 3. Chairs; staffing; expenses. The chair is elected by a majority vote of the members. The commission may request staffing assistance from the Executive Director of the Legislative Council. Those members of the commission who are Legislators are entitled to receive the legislative per diem and reimbursement of necessary expenses incurred for their attendance at authorized meetings.
- 4. Appointments. All appointments must be made by October 1, 1999.
- 5. Duties; report. The commission shall hold public hearings. gather information, create working groups and request necessary data from public and private entities to study problems with the present procedures for the redemption of beverage containers by manufacturers, distributors and dealers of beverage containers statewide pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 32, chapter 28, to explore the feasibility of implementing a statewide system or other system for the redemption of beverage containers in the State and to make recommendations to the Legislature. By January 15, 2000, the commission shall submit a report of its findings to the Joint Standing Committee on Business and Economic Development along with any implementing legislation. The Joint Standing Committee on Business and Economic Development may report out any legislation during the Second Regular Session of the 119th Legislature concerning findings and recommendations of the commission.

ORDERED, that the commission shall present its findings to the Second Regular Session of the 119th Legislature by December 1, 1999. If the commission requires an extension of the reporting deadline, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant the extension; and be it further

ORDERED, that the legislative members of the commission are entitled to receive the legislative per diem for their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission.

JOINT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO DIRECT THE DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT TO RELEASE AN AMOUNT OF FUNDS COMMENSURATE WITH THE EXTENT OF THE DEVASTATION INCURRED BY MAINE'S ELECTRIC UTILITIES AND THEIR CUSTOMERS FROM THE FUNDS APPROPRIATED BY PUBLIC LAW 105-174

WE, your Memorialists, the Members of the One Hundred and Nineteenth Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the First Regular Session, most respectfully present and petition the members of the Congress of the United States, as follows:

WHEREAS, from Monday, January 5, 1998 through Saturday, January 10, 1998, the State of Maine endured an ice storm, the length and severity of which is unprecedented in living memory, now known as the Ice Storm of '98, which produced downed trees, tree limbs and power lines throughout the State; and

WHEREAS, on January 8, 1998, the Honorable Angus S. King, Jr., Governor of the State of Maine, declared that a state of emergency existed throughout the State due to the severe condition and the associated loss of electrical power to many citizens; and

WHEREAS, the storm crippled the State's electric utility infrastructure, leaving almost 1/2 of its residents without power at the peak of the storm, thousands of whom remained without power for a week or more, and, on January 15, 1998, Vice President Albert Gore, upon personally witnessing the devastation in Maine caused by the ice storm, stated it was "like a neutron bomb aimed at the power system"; and

WHEREAS, on January 13, 1998, the Honorable William J. Clinton, President of the United States, declared the Maine counties of Androscoggin, Cumberland, Franklin, Hancock, Kennebec, Knox, Lincoln, Oxford, Penobscot, Piscataquis, Sagadahoc, Somerset, Waldo, Washington and York and a portion of Aroostook major disaster areas; and

WHEREAS, Central Maine Power Company, Bangor Hydro-Electric Company and other public and private entities, through their extraordinary organizational efforts combined with long hours of work, did an exemplary job rebuilding and repairing an electric infrastructure ravaged by this unprecedented storm at a cost of \$81,000,000; and

WHEREAS, the Governor categorized the extraordinary cost of restoring power as "purely a function of protecting life and safety of our people... the quick restoration of power... was not a matter of convenience, but was an unequivocal necessity"; and

WHEREAS, Congress passed and the President signed Public Law 105-174, An Act Making Emergency Supplemental Appropriations for the Fiscal Year Ending September 30, 1998, and Congress accepted a conference report that appropriated \$130,000,000 to be used for disaster relief, long-term recovery, and mitigation in disasters designated during fiscal year 1998; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Emergency Management Agency's "Blueprint for Action" for the Ice Storm of '98 notes that the "HUD Community Development Block Grant Program can supplement

other federal assistance in repairing and reconstructing infrastructure, including privately-owned utilities"; and

WHEREAS, despite the diligent efforts of the Maine Congressional Delegation, administration officials charged with disbursing the emergency funds have failed to recognize the severity of the damage sustained to the State's electric infrastructure caused by the Ice Storm of '98; and

WHEREAS, the amount of emergency funds allocated to the State to date, \$2,100,000, is entirely insufficient to cover the cost to repair damage to the electric infrastructure and without additional emergency funds, the State's electric utility ratepayers will bear the remaining burden of the cost of repair to the infrastructure in the form of extraordinary rate increases; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully urge and request that the United States Congress direct the Department of Housing and Urban Development to release an amount of funds commensurate with the extent of the devastation incurred by the State's electric utilities and their customers from the funds appropriated by Public Law 105-174; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Honorable William J. Clinton, President of the United States, the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States and to each member of the Maine Congressional Delegation.

Senator **DAGGETT** of Kennebec moved the Senate **ACCEPT** the Minority **OUGHT NOT TO PASS** Report.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Daggett.

Senator **DAGGETT**: Thank you, Mr. President, men and women of the Senate. The Bill that is in front of you would allow honorably discharged veterans to be buried in the Veterans Memorial Cemetery. That is all people who have served. While the proposal in itself is certainly laudable, I hope that you will join with me in the Ought Not To Pass Report because our

Committee is currently looking at either a taskforce or a study committee that would look at the many areas in our statutes where the term "veteran" is defined. At the suggestion of General Adams, we are going to take a look at that because apparently there are about 8 - 10 places in the statute where the term "veteran" is defined differently.

It is not simply a question of burial in the cemetery and I think it would be extremely confusing and very difficult for our veterans if we put a Bill out or put an isolated issue out here or there which deals with simply one of the benefits that our veterans get. There are many of them and there are some very complicated issues regarding veterans benefits. I would just like to read to you here a list of benefits that Maine's veterans get so that you can see the variety of benefits and see how confusing it could be, and perhaps is, as our veterans are eligible for different benefits depending on what the definition of "veteran" is for those circumstances. Currently veterans, and this is for the veterans cemetery, this is men and women who have served during a statutorily defined period that is also defined at the Federal level. In some instances we do mirror the Federal legislation and I would add that we also are currently not in conformity with the Federal statutes regarding Vietnam veterans and hopefully we would have an opportunity to clear that up. Certain veterans are eligible for certain license plates; certain vehicle registration fees; eligible to be in the Maine Veterans Home. They are eligible for certain hunting and fishing licenses. They have certain eligibility for the State Retirement System. They have certain preferences in hiring. There are several different property tax exemptions depending on the veteran and disability. They are eligible for certain programs through the Finance Authority of Maine. They are eligible for certain mortgage insurance for veterans; dependent education benefits as well as the Housing Authority. Hopefully the committee will have an opportunity during the offsession or have a taskforce that will take a look at all of the benefits, not just one, which this is. So I hope that you will join with me in the Ought Not To Pass Report and give the Committee an opportunity to bring some conformity.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Ferguson.

Senator **FERGUSON**: Thank you very much, Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. I will hope you will join me in voting against the prevailing motion. This is a very simple Bill. What it allows is all honorably discharged veterans to be buried in the Veterans Memorial Cemetery. I'm going to give you some statistics and I hope you will bear with me for a second or two. There are 149,000 veterans living in Maine. 114,000 of these veterans are war-time veterans and there are 35,000 non-war-time veterans. This is the group that we are talking about, these 35,000. Presently there are 600 veterans or spouses being buried in the cemetery. They expect another 144 veterans or spouses per year to be buried if this Bill goes through.

Approximately 24% of the veterans take advantage of this benefit currently. We do have a new section in the cemetery. There is enough space to accommodate the veterans. In the current budget it was reported to us by General Adams, whose name was invoked here earlier. His representative, Col. Tinkham, indicated to us that they could accommodate these additional veterans within the current staff and the current budget. There were several veterans at the hearing and it seemed to me that

the consensus that I could gather was that a majority of the veterans seemed to be in favor of this. Larry Dearborn, who was the State Commander of the American Legion, which is the largest veterans' organization, is very supportive of this piece of legislation and has indicated this on more than one occasion. I personally have no personal conflict in this. I'm eligible. I'm a Korean War veteran. I fall in the timeframe. So there would be no personal benefit for me if this legislation goes through. Came out of Committee 10-2 Ought To Pass and I would hope that you would join me and defeat the prevailing motion and go on and Accept the Majority Ought To Pass. I thank you for your indulgence.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Harriman.

Senator HARRIMAN: Thank you very much, Mr. President. Good morning, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. I hope you will join me and my very good friend from Oxford, Senator Ferguson, in defeating the pending motion by the Minority Ought Not To Pass Report. I had the honor of being the sponsor of this piece of legislation and was happy to do so when one of my constituents, who was speaking for many veterans I'm sure around the State of Maine, said to me you know I served my country honorably and did my best to uphold the principles of democracy. I held the line in Europe against Communism. Indeed my service to my country, in some large measure, in a peaceful way, tore down the Iron Curtain. It would seem to me, he went on to say, that it's not too much to ask that my final resting place, if I so choose, should be amongst my colleagues in the Veterans Memorial Cemetery. To which I said why can't you be buried there? His reply was well I'm discriminated against because only those who are recognized as being involved in armed conflicts are allowed to be interned there. I said well that's not fair. I'd be happy on your behalf and on behalf of Maine veterans to sponsor this legislation. So here we have it, an opportunity to say a heartfelt thanks to those who served in our military, particularly those who through peaceful means accomplished something we all are proud of today. As my colleague from Oxford, Senator Ferguson, indicated, we have the land, the Department can accommodate those who may want to use this service and it won't cost us any money. So why would we say no to our veterans? Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President I request when the vote is taken it be taken by the Yeas and Nays.

At the request of Senator **HARRIMAN** of Cumberland, supported by a Division of at least one-fifth of the members present and voting, a Roll Call was ordered.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Daggett.

Senator **DAGGETT**: Thank you, Mr. President and men and women of the Senate. I certainly appreciate the sentiments of both of the good Senators who have spoken earlier and, in fact, also sponsored a Bill that in fact was heard the other day and would have allowed all of those who served to have not only burial in the cemetery but also to have the property tax exemption and I'm expecting that I will have an Ought Not To Pass on the Bill that I sponsored, with the understanding that we will be looking at the entire range of issues. When it comes to veterans' issues, there are many competing interests and I would suggest

that it would be extremely difficult for anyone who served to stand up at a public hearing and say that they were opposed to others who served with them being buried in the Veterans Memorial Cemetery. In fact I had a conversation that very day with Chuck Ciccioti, who is the State Administrator for the American Legion, and he expressed to me at that time his interest in having the taskforce or study committee take a look at all of these issues, burial in the cemetery as well as the property tax exemption and others.

I'd just like to move for a moment to the issue of burial in the cemetery and, while there is land that has been acquired and will be developed in the northern part of the State for an expansion of the Veterans Memorial Cemetery, it is very difficult for me to believe that there is absolutely no cost to anyone to bury an additional number of people there. It might be a minor cost, but I would also remind people here that in the early part of this decade the budget cuts to the Veterans Cemetery were so severe that the burials were 2 - 3 weeks behind schedule. And, in fact, there were serious problems regarding those burials. In conjunction with another Bill that we heard, I did have a Bill in myself regarding private burial at the cemetery because of the severe budget cuts and the fact that the staff there were not even able to take care of those people who at this point have the right to be buried there. I would say that there have been some additional allocations so things have improved somewhat. But in the process of our public hearing, it became very obvious that there are indeed problems with burial at the cemetery and that only a very small number of people actually choose to be buried there because the process of getting burial at the Veterans Memorial Cemetery is extremely ridged and does not encourage those who wish to use it. It was somewhat of a surprise to me to find that it seemed to be a fairly general held opinion that there were problems related to the burials at that cemetery. I would suggest that we really don't know exactly how many people would be using the cemetery if, in fact, the cemetery were more open to accommodating those people who actually have the right to be buried there. Like a lot of issues, this seems pretty straight forward on the surface but I would suggest to you that there are many issues behind this and the Committee really needs an opportunity to look at all of them. I'm certainly not opposed to this. As I said I had my own Bill and it would have allowed the same thing. I encourage you to please vote with me on the Ought Not To Pass so that the committee or taskforce will have an opportunity to look at all of the issues. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Ferguson.

Senator **FERGUSON**: Thank you, Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. I have no problem with the studies, you can conduct all the studies. There are some problems out there and we can look at that later. This is a very, very straight forward Bill. It opens it up to the Cold War veterans who kept the peace for so many years. We have several veterans on our Committee and most of them seem to be in favor of this Ought To Pass Report that came out. It was a 10-2 report. I think we ought to put this to bed right now. I would hope that you would join in me in voting against the prevailing motion so we can go on and adopt the 10-2 Ought To Pass. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The pending question before the Senate is the motion by the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Daggett to Accept the Minority Ought Not to Pass Report. A Roll Call has been ordered. Is the Senate ready for the question?
