The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Frenchville, Representative Paradis.

Representative PARADIS: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This is highly reminiscent of *Twelve Angry Men* standing alone. The reason I am opposing this is that I would like to see a comprehensive bill on noise pollution. If that had been included in such a bill, I would have joined the majority. We have many sources of noise pollution. There are some that are supported by very strong lobbyists. The laws are not enforced adequately. I think this is singling out one group, the young people, maybe it is the teacher in me. I don't like to see that, but somewhere along the line I hope there is a bill introduced that would call for a study of noise pollution and more stringent enforcement of the laws. Anybody who wishes to join me in the red column, I would appreciate it. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Wells, Representative Collins.

Representative **COLLINS**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I seldom rise to speak to you, but this morning I feel obligated to speak to you. I think we have all heard the cars with the deep base on the radios. They are noise polluters. You wonder sometimes how the operator of that vehicle can hear emergency sirens coming up behind him to move out of the way. You question where the motive is to interfere with our constituents when they are trying to sleep at night during the summer months. I have had a vehicle come by my house and it seems as though I could hear it a quarter of a mile before it even got to my house with this deep base tone to

the radio. I have constituents on a number of occasions say to me, Ron, there ought to be a law. This is a nuisance. I was reluctant to even present legislation, but fortunately a member of the other body did. I am a member of the Transportation Committee and we supported this, not unanimously, however, a majority supported this legislation. I ask that you would also. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Brewer, Representative Fisher.

Representative FISHER: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I saw *Twelve Angry Men* also and as my good friend from Aroostook, he was right like Henry Fonda. This bill is considerably narrower than the gentleman from Aroostook would like it to be. It specifically aims itself at the boom box heavy base songs emanating from vehicles today. It gives us a tool to kind of tone things down in the neighborhoods. The Representative from Wells mentioned our former colleague who is down at the other end of the building now, the good Senator from York. He did a great presentation. We are going to name him an honorary choirboy for his rendition of the noises that come from cars. If you see him in the halls, I would ask to request to hear him do his song again.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hartland, Representative Stedman.

Representative STEDMAN: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I couldn't let this bill go without making some comments. I thought it was something we were treating like private and special laws where we all put our signals on one side and then immediately change it upon calling for the final vote. It didn't happen. The lights stayed where they were. I guess the vote was a serious one taken the first time. I would suggest that we could use the same logic to solve another serious problem in the State of Maine and that is domestic abuse and battered women. If we keep all women out of the state, we would remove the victims and solve the problem. It would appear to me that we have reached a point where the victim is being removed solves a problem. This is a suggestion for dealing with the issue in another realm. The whole image that was created on the little videos that we all got was very well staged, but I suggest that video did not represent what goes on here in the State of Maine when elephants are brought in for shows. I would urge that you would change your vote and vote Ought Not to Pass on this particular bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from South Portland, Representative Muse.

Representative MUSE: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I am pretty amazed at what I just heard. I would like to think that that was just a comical remark. We had a lengthy debate on this issue. I don't want to drag it on any longer. I would like to remind just about everybody in this room how good you felt when we passed this bill and we all walked out of here.

Mr. Speaker, very briefly, I would like to introduce the membership to a woman named Carol Buckley who I will introduce by way of just mentioning her and what she does. Carol Buckley has stated firmly that the circus industry lies. They have lied to you. She says that because she was a part of that industry for more than 12 years. She was a member of the circus for 12 years as an elephant trainer. A bond developed between her and her own elephant and she left the circus because she knew that what she was doing was wrong. She left

the circus and she put her elephant into a zoo where it staved for another two years. She finally decided that this wasn't quite right either. Carol Buckley then negotiated with International Paper for a tract of land in Tennessee. International Paper gave her 3,000 acres where she has opened an elephant sanctuary, which now houses seven elephants. She is prepared to house as many as 15 and many more. The elephants are confined in an 800 acre area. The additional 2,300 acres is a buffer zone for them. Unlike Ringling, she opens her facility to the public, not by allowing you to go inside, but through the use of cameras that are available on the internet, 24 hours a day so that you can go in and see what these animals are doing. They are never changed. The barn that is available to them is available to them to come and go as they please. The floor is heated. There is an automated system to remove the urine and feces so they don't have to stand in it chained by all four legs overnight, as is the case with Ringling Brothers who insisted on flying up here with their private jet to lobby against this bill. Unlike any other part of the circus, whether it is Ringling or anyone, who have told us this is an education for our children. We need this to educate the children. Carol Buckley, in her elephant sanctuary, it is available for any of you to look at, it is at www.elephants.com. You can see the elephants. You can watch them, but she has an educational component. I downloaded two of her lesson plans and I obviously wasn't about to pass them out. Over a semester, one is almost a years worth of study for grades four through eight that she uses to teach children with interactive television through the internet. She has taught over 45,000 children in Tennessee. The lesson plan covers history, math, geography and science, all geared around elephants. Ladies and gentlemen, when was the last time or when was the first time that you went to a circus and they gave you so much as a card or you saw a sign that said this animal comes from this part of the world. This is what they like. This is what they don't like. They teach nothing. There are facilities that do. They support this bill. Ladies and gentlemen, I would hope that you keep your vote right where it was. We can send this bill down to the other body and let's move on. Mr. Speaker, I would ask for the year and nays. Thank you.

Representative MUSE of South Portland REQUESTED a roll call on PASSAGE TO BE ENGROSSED.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Brewer, Representative Fisher.

Representative **FISHER**: Mr. Speaker, May I pose a question through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Representative may pose his question.

Representative **FISHER**: Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Is this the same International Paper Company that just put 300 of its workers out to pasture too?

The SPEAKER: The Representative from Brewer, Representative Fisher has posed a question through the Chair to anyone who may care to respond. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Farmington, Representative Gooley.

Representative GOOLEY: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I am not sure, but it seems to be as Maine goes, so goes the nation. We have heard that over the years, I guess. I would hope that Representative Muse would work to further his goals on a national level in the protection of elephants and other wild species throughout the world.

Representative **FOSTER**: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I think so often it happens in this institution we are trying to treat the symptoms and as a result of this, we will deny the people of Maine and not solve the problem. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rockland, Representative McNeil.

Representative MCNEIL: Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. If any of you watched TV the other night on one of the animal education shows, there was a program that told about this sanctuary on TV. I think if many of you had watched it, you would continue to vote for Representative Muse's bill. It is a very sad thing that happens to a very large animal when we as human beings think that we should tie them up and put them on display for us to see. I hope you will think very seriously about this bill. I don't think it is fair for us to put these animals on display for our entertainment and take the value of their life away. If you had seen the things on this program and heard the things that had happened to these animals and the lifelong suffering that they have gone through as a result of what is happening to them in the circus, I think you would think twice about voting against this bill. Thank you.

JOINT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING THE

PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE

CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO SUPPORT PAY

EQUITY

WE, your Memorialists, the Members of the One Hundred and Twentieth Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the First Regular Session, most respectfully present and petition the President of the United States and the Congress of the United States, as follows:

WHEREAS, the average American woman who works full time earns approximately 74¢ for each dollar that an average man earns working full time, and the average woman working full time in Maine earns approximately 73¢ for each dollar that an average man working full time in Maine earns; and

WHEREAS, the significant pay gap between men and women performing jobs of comparable skill, effort and responsibility, even when wages are adjusted for levels of education, contributes to the disproportionately high poverty rate among women and children in the State and across the Nation; and

WHEREAS, Congress has found that the gender-based wage gap depresses living standards for American women and their families, harms their health and efficiency, prevents the maximum utilization of available labor resources and tends to cause labor disputes, thereby burdening, affecting and obstructing commerce and creating unfair methods of competition; and

WHEREAS, justice requires that women be paid fairly for the value of their work; and

WHEREAS, the average wage gap between men and women has continued for decades without significant improvement, notwithstanding federal and state laws that prohibit discrimination in compensation for equal work on the basis of sex, including the federal Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, Title VII of the federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 26, section 628; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully urge and request that the President of the United States and the Congress of the United States strengthen efforts to ensure that women are paid fairly for their work; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Honorable George W. Bush, President of the United States, to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the

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United States House of Representatives and to each Member of the Maine Congressional Delegation.
