Prayer by Reverend Edward Hatch of the Palermo Christian Church in Palermo.

REVEREND HATCH: Before we pray I just want to share a couple of remarks with you if I could. The last time you had me here was on February 6th and there was a major snow storm. I looked out this morning and heard the weather report and I said, "these folks may never want me to come back again." There is not an awful lot for people to do in Palermo. Part of my job consists of going to peoples' homes, drinking coffee, and eating cookies. A few years ago I realized the need to get myself in shape, so I started running. I have come to the place now where I run marathons because I'm obsessive and compulsive. I have a lot of other problems too, but those are a couple that I would just mention. It's good this morning that the snow held off. I was able to go and run. Any of you who have gone from Augusta to Belfast know that where the Sheepscot Lake is there are a couple of hills. For me to go any distance at all, I have to go up those hills. I've learned an important lesson in the times I've gone out for a run. The lesson is simply this, don't determine how far you're going to go when you're going up a hill. I find that as I'm going up fatigue sets in and I think maybe I'll just quit at the end of this mile. I find that when I'm going on the down-hill, things are an awful lot easier. It's a lot easier for me to keep going. My hero is Jesus Christ. I'm a minister of the gospel. For text today I just thought I'd read this;..."that Jesus went a little further and fell on his face and prayed saying, 'my Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me.' He didn't receive an answer and then he said, 'God, not my will but Yours' be done.'" He went up a hill too, to the hill of Calgary and there he died. It looked sad, but then Easter morning, the resurrection, and he rose again. I'm so thankful he was willing to go that extra mile. I thought of you folks that are in here, both in your life as you are working here in the Senate for the people of the State of Maine, but also in your personal life, how you often come across hills. I think it's very important to understand that if those hills are important and the goals that you have are worthy, you don't want to guit in the middle of the hill. You want to keep going. I encourage you today, if you are feeling tired or discouraged in any part of your life to, perhaps, stop and evaluate and take a look. Let's bow for prayer.

Our Heavenly Father, I'm thankful for each one of the people that are here as part of the Senate. God, we have voted these people in to represent us and we pray that You will help them to do that in a manner that will be fitting and would be right. We pray that You will give them the wisdom to know what is best to do. Sometimes in the issues that come before them it doesn't appear as though there is a clear cut right and wrong. Sometimes they are looking for what is best. We pray that You

will help them to know and find that out. We pray that as they are in deliberations today, as they are talking in the halls, as they may be involved in hearings or in other matters, we pray that as they listen today that they would truly listen so that they might be able to hear and discern Your will. I pray for those who are here today, perhaps any especially who are running up hills, that you will give them the strength to continue on, that those things that are truly important might be accomplished in and through them. We'll thank You in Jesus' name. Amen.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Ferguson.

Senator FERGUSON: Thank you very much, Mr. President. I would like to speak against the motion that's on the table. What this bill does is it allows a person that is 70 years old to be excused from jury duty if they so choose. I did speak to the caucus downstairs and the discretion was left to the court. The court may, in the original bill, excuse a person. In the minority report it inserts that the court must excuse a person 70 years of age or older if they so wish. I would hope that we would vote against the motion that is on the floor and go on to accept the minority report. I would say that, as I look around, a lot of these folks are younger than me and I would just hope that no one here grows old and has to confront this situation. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Somerset, Senator Mills.

Senator MILLS: Mr. President and men and women of the Senate. I've had experiences with many jurors and I have often found that the most valuable jurors that you see are those that are 70 years old and older. Many of them have had the advantage of having had a real high school education, undiluted by whatever has happened to our educational establishments. The people of that age group are a very, very valuable pool of people to draw from to put intelligent, thoughtful, and common sense filled people on the jury pool so that you've got a real balance of people to speak to. If you let people self-select, and that's what this bill would do if you passed it, then you will have the tendency for people to put themselves into the jury pool who've got an ax to grind one way or the other. That is what you don't want. You get enough of those so called ringers as it is, particularly in a criminal jury pool. If you have somebody who's hell bent for conviction on every case and you give them some discretion about whether they can be in the pool or not, they'll fight to be in. Or on the other hand, by the same token, you may have somebody who doesn't believe that anybody ought to be convicted of crime, that crime is simply a social disease and we should vote for acquittal on every case. If you let people selfselect it's bad public policy for getting a genuine cross-section of humanity on that jury pool. If you've ever been there and had to have your own fortunes judged by a jury of your peers, either in a civil case, or heaven forbid, a criminal case, you want a good, honest cross-section of average people. You don't want people on there who have an ax to grind one way or the other. Now it's true that some people over 70 have some difficulty hearing or seeing or comprehending or paying attention. That's also true of younger people, frankly. But we do have ways of selecting those people out. Many of them are aware of their own deficiencies. They'll stand up and tell the judge or they'll say on the written questionnaire that they fill out "I don't hear well." Often times those people are excused automatically if they don't hear well or can't see. So the system does filter out people with disabilities if they make themselves known. Quite often, if somebody's mind has gone, you can tell by looking at how they respond to the written questions in the questionnaires that they are required to fill out. You can tell if somebody is over the edge quite often and the judge can tell. These people are often times excused quietly and gently and encouraged to go home. They are thanked for showing up that day and they're given their \$10 and sent along. So the system works as it is. People with disabilities that make them ineligible to serve are filtered out as it is. But to give somebody the discretion to define himself as a member of the pool or not means that you're going to distort the essence of that

cross-section that you want for a fair-minded jury. For that reason, I would join with the good Senator from Cumberland in voting in favor of the pending motion of ought not to pass. Thank you.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Rand.

Senator RAND: Thank you, Mr. President and men and women of the Senate. I thank the good Senator Mills for his remarks and there is very little more I can add to that except that jury duty is not a punishment. Jury duty is not a bad thing that is inflicted upon us. Jury duty is an intricate part of our democracy, of our democratic and free way of life. I think that we would be remised to actually cut off the ability to access that part of public service to a group of people simply because they have reached the age of 70. We should embrace those who have experience and welcome them into this public service. We have many exceptions built into the law. The court already has the right to use its discretion to excuse people of any age who, for one reason or another, cannot perform that public service of jury duty. Just as a note of interest, 24 states allow no exceptions whatsoever. I certainly would not subscribe to that policy. It's an important function of our democratic process, and simply because somebody has reached the age of 70, I don't believe that that should be a basis to deny their participation in this very, very important process. Thank you. I do hope that you will support the ought not to pass motion.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Oxford, Senator Ferguson.

Senator **FERGUSON**: Thank you very much, Mr. President. I don't want to belabor this, but any person that is 70 years of age and wants to serve on a jury, can serve on a jury. I just want to point that out. This doesn't exclude anyone. You have a lot of elderly people for whom, for one reason or another, it may be an embarrassment for them to go in and admit that they have diminished minds or whatever it is. I would urge that the body vote against the pending motion and go on and accept the minority report.

At the request of Senator FERGUSON of Oxford a Division was had. 29 Senators having voted in the affirmative and 2 Senators having voted in the negative, the motion by Senator RAND of Cumberland to ACCEPT the Majority OUGHT NOT TO PASS Report, in concurrence, PREVAILED.
