Representative **VALENTINO**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Today we are here honoring Phyllis Deschambeault on her 95th birthday. It was actually last Thursday, but Phyllis was too busy to be here last Thursday between here activities with the Red Hat Society, her bowling league twice a week, her Saco Historical Society, her directorships on the board of directors for two different organizations in Saco, her hair appointments and visiting elderly shut-ins, this was the first time we could arrange in her busy, busy schedule at 95 years old to have Mrs. Deschambeault here today.

Phyllis was a wife, a mother of two children and working woman long before it was fashionable. She had worked at a local lumber yard for years when the owner of the business was once heard over-saying that Phyllis has sawdust in her vein and if she were a man she might be running this place. Well, luckily for York County she wasn't because she ran for the Registrar of Deeds. She won that first election and she won every election after that for over 25 years.

Phyllis has been a fixture in politics for over 70 years in York County. When I was running for election last year she put up signs, called voters, collected absentee ballots, wrote letters to the editor and attended every campaign meeting and party that she was invited to. I am almost embarrassed to say that not realizing she was 95, I actually dropped signs off at her house and had her put them up for me.

She lives alone in her home, she drives the car, she opens her summer camp on Ossipee Lake every year. Her past accomplishments, including clubs and committees she has belonged to, would fill a book. Phyllis has done it all with grace and style. She is truly a remarkable mother, grandmother and a very independent woman. Thank you Phyllis.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Biddeford, Representative Twomey.

Representative **TWOMEY**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I too want to

congratulate Phyllis on her birthday and I should have read my calendar. I didn't know that she was coming in today and this is great. Phyllis not only helps the people in Saco, she also helped me in my campaign. She was my secret weapon because for many years I was an activist in my local town and people said, "Well how did she get elected?" They will never know that I had Phyllis Deschambeault do my absentee ballots and no one can do absentee ballots like Phyllis Deschambeault.

Phyllis had befriended my little neighbor across the street. I have gone to Phyllis' camp. This woman cannot be stopped. Age just doesn't matter with Phyllis. She has more energy than all of us put together and I am not surprised that she is with the Red Hat Club. She is great; she is terrific. Happy birthday Phyllis, I am so glad to see you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Sanford, Representative Tuttle.

Representative TUTTLE: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I remember when I was a young man many years ago running for office, she always told me not to take myself too serious and Phyllis I think that because of your help I have tried to live up to that over the years.

It is hard to put into words the work that Phyllis has done, not just for people like me, but I think for the people of York County. She has spent many extra hours when she wasn't actually working to go out and communicate with people and she does it in the old fashioned way and it is something that I wish would continue today.

As has been mentioned she was the Register of Deeds for 25 years and if Phyllis had wanted to run for 50 years she still would have been elected. I salute her for her work and it's a pleasure to have her here today. God bless you Phyllis, and happy birthday.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Saco, Representative Pilon.

Representative PILON: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I too would like to congratulate Phyllis on her 95th birthday. Although I haven't known her that long I have known her to be an example to people in politics and people in the Saco Democratic Party and she has been an inspiration to me and to people in the party that have come along. I hope that she will continue to encourage, and to keep going with getting people into the party. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from York, Representative Moulton.

Representative MOULTON: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would like to congratulate Phyllis on her recent birthday. It was a little less than 25 years ago, when newly admitted to the bar that I became acquainted with the hard work of an organization which was then still processing many of those deeds down at York County by hand. I remember Phyllis and one of her staff members, Holly and the others who were patient enough with the regulars and us new ones that they helped us to do our jobs better. In fact, even years before, she even had extra time on her hands to do some of the abstracting which is now taken care of by the so called independents. Again, Mr. Speaker, I wish to congratulate her on many years of productive work. Thank you.

Representative BABBIDGE: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. For those that actually don't know Phyllis Deschambeault I would like to share that in 1981 when I moved south to York County and became politically active in that area local leaders, statewide leaders who I respected very much, and even dignitaries visiting from the national scene would as a first agenda item at any meeting,

honor or recognize Phyllis Deschambeault and to myself I would say, "Who is this person, this person that is so revered?" I soon came to know who Phyllis Deschambeault was. She exemplifies good humor and dedicated public service and I congratulate her very much on her accomplishment.

Representative DUPREY of Hampden REQUESTED a roll call on the motion to ACCEPT the Majority Ought to Pass As Amended Report.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hampden, Representative Duprey.

Representative **DUPREY**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This is a bill that is basically a strikebreaker bill in a different disguise. It has to do with hazardous materials. We are going to say to companies that deal with hazardous materials, that if you bring replacement workers in and if you are going to start a company than you have to have your people hazardous materials trained. There are already laws to protect that, but what we are going to tell you here is that if you were to go on strike and bring replacement workers into your company then they have to have a certain qualification. The Department of Labor is going to come in and check them out.

The Department of Labor wasn't too hot on this idea and what they also testified to was that when they do come in, according to the bill they are going to be able to shut down that operation if even one person is not trained in these hazardous materials. Now, this also includes a Wal-Mart distribution center that is being built. Any new operations being built that have 250 more employees are going to be covered under this bill.

You know what, a forklift is considered to have hazardous materials in it. So, the Department of Labor can shut them down if they can find one person in there that might not be trained. The bill has very serious ramifications. I know what the intent was trying to do and I applaud the strikebreaker people from the mill in Jay. They have been very persistent on this, but I really don't think this is the right way to go. This includes more than just mills. It includes any business that is going to employ over 250 people. That is a lot of people. That is a big employer:

For us to send this message to any other states or to businesses that want to move to Maine that we are going to be that unfriendly then you know what, when you open your operations we are going to watch you and the Department of Labor can shut you down and have you cease operations if even one person might not be trained. I urge you to vote against the pending motion.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Van Buren, Representative Smith.

Representative **SMITH**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. First point, this is not a strikebreaker bill. This is a safety bill. This provides that when a mill employing more than 250 people has shut down and then resumes operation that there will be a safety inspection by the Bureau of Labor Standards to see that it is in compliance with the safety regulations. This is what ensures safety for employees and for people living near the mills.

Keep in mind that the original bill provided for a shutdown of the operation until after the inspection. This bill's amendment does not do that. The amendment provides that the mill is in operation but if something shows up in the course of inspection that requires it can't be fixed without shutdown then it will be shut down to fix the problem. We are talking safety and we are talking human lives. We are talking keeping the people of Maine able to work in a safe environment. We ask you to support the Ought to Pass as Amended Report. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Cornish, Representative Cressey.

Representative CRESSEY: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. In Labor Committee, William Peabody, Director of the Bureau of Labor Standards for the Maine Department of Labor stated and just to preface, Representative Smith is correct, the business will be shut down, but I would like to fill in the gap of what he left out, which is how long the business will be shut down. Quoting from Mr. Peabody's testimony to the Labor Committee given the notice requirements such a determination is unlikely to occur in less than a month - a costly, non-productive month for the employer. Do you really want employees in the State of Maine to permanently loose their jobs? No business, not one single business in the State of Maine can afford to be shut down for one month and not be receiving or generating any revenue." Vote against this bill.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Jay, Representative Pineau.

Representative **PINEAU**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is my bill.

This bill came forward from a lesson we learned in Jay when an entire workforce was replaced in a manufacturing plant. February 5, 1988, when the replacement workers were working at the plant, a piece of equipment was broken that released a huge amount of chlorine dioxide gas. Fortunately, for the Town of Jay at the time the temperature was five degrees above zero. The plant is across the Androscoggin River from our entire school system – high school, middle school and grammar school. Had the temperature been warmer that gas would have drifted across with the prevailing westerly wind right toward our school.

The fact is that these people who replaced the workers in that plant were not qualified or trained to deal with the materials that they were dealing with. What this bill would allow is for the department to come in and verify that if you have a new workforce or a workforce that you have changed be qualified to handle it. Had that happened in this case the department would have stepped in, shut the plant down and allowed the company time to train these people to properly handle that material. Since 1988 not only have we learned from that experience, we have all kinds of hazardous materials being handled now by workers who in some instances don't even speak English.

The Department of Labor needs to get a better handle, especially in our communities, on who is doing what. This bill would allow the department to come in and do that. Thank you Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Van Buren, Representative Smith.

Representative **SMITH**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I just want to respond very briefly to Representative Cressey's remarks.

The statement that Representative Cressey read to you from William Peabody was his statement at the hearing on the initial bill. We have corrected the provision in that bill which provided for inspection before commencement of operations. The amendment specifically provides that operations commence and the inspection comes in while the operation is going on. There is no shut down from the initial operation.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Waldoboro, Representative Trahan.

Representative TRAHAN: Mr. Speaker, may I pose a question through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Representative may pose his question. Representative **TRAHAN**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. To anyone who might

answer, in the case of very controversial strikes, it has been my experience that both sides on a strike can do things that they probably shouldn't do. In my personal experience, equipment was destroyed by angry workers and then when the strike was over people had to go back to work. How would this bill affect that sort of situation, where actual strikers destroyed equipment and then when they went back to work it is very well likely that the plant could be shut down, not because of the fault of the employer, but because of the fault of the workers who destroyed the equipment? Could someone answer that question please.

The SPEAKER: The Representative from Waldoboro, Representative Trahan has posed a question through the Chair to anyone who may care to respond. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Van Buren, Representative Smith.

Representative **SMITH**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Certainly any criminal acts for damaging equipment are something that none of us in this House would want to see and any such evidence of such should be criminally prosecuted. However, we would expect that any reasonable employer, before commencing work would have inspected their own facilities anyway and would have tested their equipment to determine its ability to function. So, I would assume that that particular problem is something that would be considered in the course of resuming operation.

One other thing that I would like to mention at this time however is that mill employers recognize the need for safety and training and it is exemplified at the Lincoln Pulp and Paper mill when last year it resumed employment. It came to the State of Maine and secured over \$400,000 in VTI funds for training of its employees, so I believe that everybody in the industry, employer and employees, recognize the need for safety and training and this bill exemplifies that. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Holden, Representative Hall.

Representative HALL: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. It is great to have my voice back this morning. A couple of things about this bill. The first thing that we heard about Jay in 1988 - that was 17 years ago folks - we had one incidence and it is my understanding that that incident in Jay there were some subcontractors who were brought in who were not even employees at the mill and who, because of the fact that it was so cold out and because Mars was aligned with Jupiter just right, a freak accident happened. Had it not been so cold the valve that broke releasing the chlorine gas would not have broken. So, there were an awful lot of ifs - if this. if that - then this wouldn't have happened. The bottom line is this law that we have and this bill that we have in front of us today would have done nothing to prevent that accident that occurred in Furthermore, you may all be aware that we have an organization called OSHA, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration that has jurisdiction in this matter. They are out inspecting all the time if there is something going on. If there is a strike and all the workers are replaced with replacement workers and there are unsafe situations then anybody can pick up the phone and call OSHA and say, hey there is stuff going on here, OSHA will come and do the inspection.

This bill, if passed has a fiscal note on it. It is going to cost between \$50,000 to \$70,000 per year, every year to do inspections that OSHA will willingly come do if they need to be done in order to prevent all of the accidents that have happened in the last 17 years. They can't come up with anything other than this one incident that happened in Jay, which this bill wouldn't have even corrected. So, you are being asked bottom line to spend between \$50,000 to \$70,000 a year. Let's not play games. Let's not call it something it isn't. This bill is designed to transfer

a little bit of balance from business owners to employees that want to go on strike. It has nothing to do with safety. It is a wolf in sheep's clothing is what it is. It is cleverly designed to look like a bill that is about safety and I will tell you the same thing that I asked the folks that came in to testify.

I said, "If this is such a huge public safety issue and lots of lives are at risk than why don't we just do the same thing that we do with our public safety officials? Why don't we do the same thing that we do with air traffic controllers? You can't go on strike because your job is so important and it is so vital to public safety that you can't leave and go on strike or you are going to create a huge, huge public safety issue." The answer was, "We couldn't possibly do that." Why? Because it would shift the power in labor negotiations toward the business owners and that is not what we are trying to accomplish. So, I am going to urge you to not accept the Majority Ought to Pass. Do one more thing that is guaranteed in addition to the \$50,000 to \$70,000 that is going to be spent by the department of labor every year.

There is going to be substantial litigation costs. If you look at the history of strikebreaker bills that we have tried and tried and tried, year after year to pass. This body has passed several of them and millions of dollars have been spent litigating these and we have lost. The laws have been held to be unconstitutional time and time and time again. This is a very clever, very unique attempt to pass a strikebreaker law and call it something different. I urge you to vote against the pending motion. Do not accept the Majority Ought to Pass. Leave the status quo as it is. There is not a safety issue here. Thank you men and women of the house.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Jay, Representative Pineau.

Representative PINEAU: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. OSHA was in effect in 1988 and OSHA did come to the plant on many occasions in 1988 to address all kinds of items in the plant including the death of some employees, some of the new employees; that weren't qualified to handle the jobs.

This bill is not a strike bill. It is a bill to change of work force. At a certain time it probably would have been a good strikebreaker bill, but that is not what it is. If you have a new work force or if you change a work force it will allow the department to come in and verify that these people are qualified to handle the materials that they did. Had the temperature on that morning in February been warmer 1,000 of our children would have probably died and a number of citizens along the riverbanks of the Androscoggin River. Again, this is a change of workforce bill. If the change happens to be because of a strike or you are building a huge facility or if you are changing part of a work force, this will allow the department to come in, take a look and make sure that these people are qualified to handle the material that is there. If not, your community is at risk and I will tell you that. Your community is at risk. Thank you Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Dixfield, Representative Hotham.

Representative HOTHAM: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Having lived the experience of a work stoppage or a strike in 1988 I can tell you that I was concerned, as someone standing on the outside, about who was doing what on the inside. Safety experts will tell you that when there is an issue. When people are at danger the most is when they are doing something that they are not accustomed to and that is a dangerous situation. I can also tell you that OSHA is not very quick to respond to complaints during a work stoppage, because they feel a little bit like they are a pawn in all that. The point made just a few minutes ago by the good

Representative from Jay, Representative Pineau is right on the money. We have communities that live around these mills. These mills are chemical plants. We need to know that safety is first and foremost under these very strenuous situations when there is a work stoppage in place and the owners and managers of that mill are trying to meet orders and obligations. The community needs to know that it is safe and I believe that this bill will help assure that. Thank you Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rumford, Representative Patrick.

Representative **PATRICK**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I think I heard that it was really not a safety or training issue. I beg to differ with that. I work in one of these companies that make me take hundreds of hours of training in order to perform my job and my job is a basic mechanic in the paper industry.

I have to go into areas in pulp mills, recovery boilers, chemical plants and those people have to have four times the amount of training. As a matter of fact these companies will not allow an employee to go from one job to the other without having weeks upon weeks of training to make sure that won't blow up the plant and blow up the communities around them.

I think that this is more like an OSHA safety bill where, after the fact that something catastrophic happens then they will come over, but most of the time you will probably have a better chance of seeing Bigfoot than getting OSHA there. Just because you call them doesn't mean that they are going to come. You have got to have some compelling reason for them to come, but every job in that paper industry, even the sweeper, has to have a minimal amount of training. Then you get the chemical unloaders that unload 8,000 gallons of chlorine-dioxide, sodium hypochlorite, sulfuric acid, hydrochloric acid and many other things.

If you look at the MSDS sheets in the paper industry it is probably eight, ten or twelve inches thick. I cannot imagine that if a coworker comes to work for me right off the street I would want to work with that guy because one, I don't know what he has got for skills and two, I want to see his training. I can punch the computer in my plant and hit print on training and I will get page upon page upon page of mandatory trainings that I have. Not voluntary trainings, mandatory trainings by these companies. This is a training issue. To me, if we don't pass this bill we have done an injustice to the workers of the State of Maine and to businesses in the State of Maine. Why is it that an industry and businesses themselves require this training until they decide to get rid of their whole work force and will then take every Tom, Dick and Harry. Please follow my light and support the Ought to Pass as Amended Report. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Holden, Representative Hall.

Representative HALL: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I rise again just to reiterate points that I made earlier. There was one incident that happened 17 years ago. It was a freak accident. It happened because the weather was so cold on that day. Had the weather not been so cold the accident wouldn't have happened. You keep hearing that if it had been warmer than this chlorine gas cloud would have floated across the river. If it had been warmer the valve would not have broke. Please remember that. There has been no other incident in 17 years since then involving replacement workers. This issue at this mill did not involve replacement workers. This was an outside business that came in and was doing work and they caused this accident to happen. Again, it was a freak accident. Accidents happen.

If the regular crew that was out on strike had been there working at the Jay mill when this accident happened it still would

have happened. Don't let anybody convince you that this bill is anything other than what it is. This bill is going to cost the state of Maine \$50,000 to \$70,000 per year and it is going to cause substantial difficulty as we are trying to replace all of these jobs that have been lost to military base closings. Ultimately, when we are done spending who knows how much money fighting this out in court it is going to be struck down again as unconstitutional and workers who have gone out on strike thinking they were protected by this bill are not going to have a job. Everybody loses when we pass this bill. Please, I urge you follow my light and vote to reject the pending motion.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Woolwich, Representative Grose.

Representative **GROSE**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Having worked at Bath Iron Works for eight years and during the strike of 1985 we had people coming in to replace us. We had more accidents during that time with people who did not have the qualifications to do the job that they should have had the training for. Needless to say, we ended up with a ship that was built with a crooked bow. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is Acceptance of the Majority Ought to Pass as Amended Report. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Unity, Representative Piotti.

Representative PIOTTI: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Allow me to take a moment to explain this bill. At present in the Department of Agriculture only the Commissioner and the Deputy Commissioner are political appointments. In most, if not all other departments the next tier of management is also politically appointed. This bill would make the five division directors political appointments as well, beginning in January 2007, after the next gubernatorial election. This would make the Department of Agriculture similar to other departments and it would also return the Department of Agriculture to what it was until six to eight years ago when the Legislature took this action.

Now, the Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry has worked very hard and very successfully this year on developing consensus on issues, which is why you will not see too many of our bills before you for debate. But, this is one where, despite our tendency for consensus, we fell short. That is because it is really something that you can easily argue both ways. So, ladies and gentlemen we leave it in the wiser hands of this body to decide. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Biddeford, Representative Twomey.

Representative **TWOMEY**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Yes indeed. I am on the other side on this one as other members of our committee are and I would like to tell you why I chose to vote against this. I believe that we have some very good people working in the Ag Department. There are some ugly rumors about a certain member that has done wrong things and I don't think that is for me to judge. I think that this is a vehicle to do that. I think we have just cause in the State of Maine. We have free will. This is an at-will state rather, and if you have just cause someone can be fired.

I think that this targets good people and we have many. I think that is made them nervous and I am not going to be judge and jury. I think that if someone has done something wrong then they should be fired for that and I think that we shouldn't take this vehicle. I feel that I should take the responsibility for pushing that button and making good people be declassified. So, I could not support that. It was an instinct. It was something that I felt was being targeted for the wrong reasons and I am truly convinced that this is not the right thing to do. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lincoln, Representative Carr.

Representative CARR: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I just want to take a short time to explain my concerns with allowing this to go forward. Number one, I think that it sets a bad precedent. The precedent being that if there is somebody in a department that you don't wish to be there then it would be very easy to put a bill in and to move those to a classified position so that the hierarchy of the administration could remove those people. It has only been six or seven years, as I remember, that these people had been changed to become classified people and there was a reason for that at the time. That was to keep some continuity of the work force that you have in the department and that is why we have those people in a lot of the other departments.

If these people were moved then we would be allowing them to be dismissed. Effective after the next election, whoever comes in would be able to replace these people. Some of those people have been there for many years, more than 20 years. I think that

it is a bad precedent to start and I think that if it works here then we can do it in other departments. That is the reason I vote against it and I would urge you to vote against it as well. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hodgdon, Representative Sherman.

Representative SHERMAN: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. As the good Chair of the committee said, this can be argued either way. I would rather not argue with the individuals involved because that then personalizes it. I think the commissioner really needs the power to run his department. As already said, this was a case up until six years ago and I think that that individual comes in to run the department needs to be able, if you will, to put his imprint on that department. Maybe, without going into some detail, maybe more aggressive about some of the programs that they run. So, I think that to me this is not about personalities. Anytime that you put a bill in like this it tends to go that way, but it is the idea of whether a commissioner who goes into any of these departments can run that department as he sees fit or as a new governor would like to see that department run. So for that reason, I voted to declassify these positions as they had been six years ago.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lincoln, Representative Carr.

Representative CARR: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I do want to just make it clear, and I don't think that it has been cleared up, this bill did not come from the department. This was not a department request. This came from a member of our committee actually and I think that is important.
