# **Non-Concurrent Matter**

Bill "An Act To Establish a High-risk Health Insurance Pool" (H.P. 1365) (L.D. 1945)

Minority (6) OUGHT TO PASS AS AMENDED Report of the Committee on INSURANCE AND FINANCIAL SERVICES READ and ACCEPTED and the Bill PASSED TO BE ENGROSSED AS AMENDED BY COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-950) in the House on April 13, 2006.

Came from the Senate with the Reports **READ** and the Bill and Accompanying Papers **RULED NOT PROPERLY BEFORE THE BODY** in **NON-CONCURRENCE**.

The House voted to ADHERE.

### **ORDERS**

On motion of Representative DAVIS of Falmouth, the following Joint Order: (H.P. 1502)

ORDERED, the Senate concurring, that the Commission To Study Access to Birth Certificates and Medical Records for Adult Adoptees is established as follows.

- **1. Commission established.** The Commission To Study Access to Birth Certificates and Medical Records for Adult Adoptees, referred to in this order as "the commission," is established.
- **2. Membership.** The commission consists of the following 7 members:
- A. Three members of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate; and
- B. Four members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House.
- **3. Commission chairs.** The first-named Senator is the Senate chair of the commission and the first-named member of the House is the House chair of the commission.
- **4. Appointments; convening of commission.** All appointments must be made no later than 30 days following passage of this order. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all

appointments have been made. When the appointment of all members has been completed, the chairs of the commission shall call and convene the first meeting of the commission, which must be no later than June 1, 2006.

- **5. Duties.** The commission shall hold its meetings at various locations in the State to be determined by the chairs. The commission shall gather information and request necessary data from public and private entities and stakeholders in order to:
- A. Study the issues surrounding access by adult adoptees to original birth certificates;
- B. Study the issues surrounding access by adult adoptees to relevant medical records; and
- C. Review the laws of other states regarding access by adult adoptees to original birth certificates and medical records, including, but not limited to, Oregon, New Hampshire and Alabama.
- **6. Staff assistance.** The Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission.
- 7. Compensation. Legislative members of the commission are entitled to receive the legislative per diem and reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses related to their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission.
- 8. Report. No later than November 1, 2006, the commission shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, for presentation to the Joint Standing Committee on Judiciary and the Legislative Council.
- **9. Extension.** If the commission requires a limited extension of time to complete its study and make its report, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant an extension. Upon submission of its required report, the commission terminates.
- 10. Budget. The chairs of the commission, with assistance from the commission staff, shall administer the commission's budget. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the commission shall present a work plan and proposed budget to the Legislative Council for its approval. The commission may not incur expenses that would result in the commission's exceeding its approved budget. Upon request from the commission, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council shall promptly provide the commission chairs and staff with a status report on the commission's budget, expenditures incurred and paid and available funds.

Representative CARR: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. If I may, I just checked the amendment and sitting on that committee and I know that we had a lot of discussion on it. I was just wondering if we could have a little explanation as to why we had to have the amendment and I'm sure that there is, I am just not aware of it. If we could have a little explanation I would appreciate it. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Simpson.

Representative **SIMPSON**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I would be happy to answer the good Representative Carr's question. The purpose of the amendment is to take out identifying information of the person that would be the subject of the complaint being public, the individual person. Because they would have no due process in the investigation or anything else. There was concern for people's privacy.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Waldoboro, Representative Trahan.

Representative TRAHAN: Mr. Speaker, may I pose a couple of questions through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Representative may pose his questions. Representative **TRAHAN**: Could someone please explain why this legislation is needed considering the fact that last year we established a very similar program within DAFS?. I remember this bill going through here and being discussed. That created a similar hotline for state employees and others to report to DAFS, this type of thing. Also we now have a legislative oversight committee along with OPEGA to do a lot of this work. I am wondering why we are creating third one in 3 years. Can somebody answer that?

The SPEAKER: The Representative from Waldoboro, Representative Trahan has posed a question through the Chair

to anyone who may care to respond. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Auburn, Representative Simpson.

Representative **SIMPSON**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. The purpose of this fraud hotline in the Department of Audit and the reason we were working to create it in the way that it would work, is that nationally the auditors in many states have these. They have found millions and millions of taxpayer dollars that were not being used as wisely as they could have and in an effort to find as many ways as possible to promote good government and to give citizens access to a place to inform someone who'd have the ability to investigate what they see as a problem is in our opinion good government. The Department of Audit has the ability to examine the records of ever agency and department within State government and agencies with which we contract.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Waldoboro, Representative Trahan.

Representative TRAHAN: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. That is what I was afraid of. I really want to ask the members of the body if we really want to do this and I will tell you a couple of reasons why. The State Auditor is charged with auditing an umbrella, a single audit of State government. When you have a hotline within the State Auditor's office to report inefficiency and waste in government, really what you are saying is that the State Audit office missed something. That is their job to do this type of thing and if there is going to be a hotline we already have a couple and we now have a legislative OPEGA office to do this type of thing. What I really think is going on ladies and gentlemen is a little bit of a territory war going on between these different audit functions. I know that the State Auditor is concerned and I don't blame her because she's brought those concerns to me, that officers will be, I guess, duplicating services. That has been brought to my attention by the auditor several times when I was working to bring OPEGA to this legislative body as an oversight arm. It appears to me that they are doing exactly what they asked me not to do when I brought OPEGA forward and that is duplicate services. I think this is totally unneeded, I think that it is more of a territory war going on between OPEGA and the Audit office and I am going to vote against this.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hampden, Representative Duprey.

Representative DUPREY: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. This is part of the living wage commission that was passed last year that I had the privilege to serve on. I must tell you that, I did vote for and one of the, I guess decisions that I regret, I did vote for the study for the living wage. Let me explain why I did it, because I don't think that there is such a thing and I wanted to be able to go on a commission to prove it. Actually I think that I proved to myself that there is no such thing as a living wage. Now let me explain. Every single person in here has a different living wage, depends where you live, depends how may kids you have, what kind of house you have, what kind of car you drive, how much driving habit you have, how warm you keep your house. Everybody has a different wage at which you live at and for us to tell the State or state workers or anybody what a living wage is for a certain group of people would absolutely be wrong. We could have a target area where we think people are at, but actually peg a number and say \$17.00 an hour for a single mom with 2 children. We just don't know where they live, we don't know what their habits are, we don't know how much they drive, we don't know how far they commute ever day. It is a moving target and it is always changing based on the price of gas, the price of oil, it is constantly moving up and down. What we are going to do here, is we are going to say, we are actually going to try and peg it and have the Department of Labor come up with a figure every single year, we are going to have them come up with this figure. I just think that is absolutely wrong. Now to put this in statue would be wrong too and that is a bill that I'm going to talk about in a few minutes, but this one actually creates two positions. We are actually going to create two positions of government with a fiscal note of \$187,000.00 a year to calculate this living wage. Why would we want to create 2 more positions just to do that?

Representative LERMAN: Point of order.

The SPEAKER: Would the Representative defer for a minute? The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative Lerman and inquires to why he rises.

Representative **LERMAN**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Point of order. I don't believe that the Representative is addressing issues relevant to this particular piece of legislation. I think his comments are relevant to a piece of legislation that will come before this body at a later date.

On **POINT OF ORDER**, Representative LERMAN of Augusta asked the Chair if the remarks of Representative DUPREY of Hampden were germane to the pending question.

The SPEAKER: The Chair would indicate that the Representative's comments are relevant, the fiscal note indicates the addition of a public service manager position and an economic research analyst position. Those were the discussion and the comments to which he was referring to earlier in his

discussion. His comments were both germane to the fiscal note and to the report itself. The Representative may proceed.

The Chair advised Representative LERMAN of Augusta that the remarks of Representative DUPREY of Hampden were germane to the pending question.

Representative **DUPREY**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. In this bill we are going to try to raise the wages for Maine workers, but we are also going to interfere with the collective bargaining process. Far be it for me to ever want to interfere with the collective bargaining process by trying to raise wages for state workers, school teachers, and municipal employees, but we are going to do it and it is going to cost \$187,000.00 a year for us to do something that should be done through collective bargaining. If the unions want to get a living wage they need to negotiate it.

Representative DUPREY of Hampden REQUESTED a roll call on the motion to ACCEPT the Majority Ought to Pass as Amended Report.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative Lerman.

Representative LERMAN: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I would like to clarify exactly what this bill does because I believe that you may have gotten some information that isn't completely accurate. Again this is one of the recommendations that came out of the Study Commission on Liveable Wages. It is 1 of a number of pieces of legislation that we have considered in 1 of 17 recommendations overall that were made by the Commission. As we have discussed in the past just a reminder, 1/3 of the workers in the State of Maine, 1 out of 3 workers in the State of Maine currently earn less than the liveable wage. Alright, so we are talking about a significant number of people in our State, a significant number of our constituents in each and every one of our districts who are having a very difficult time making ends meet. That is only increasing over time as their wages get adjusted on an annual basis less than the cost of acquiring those things that are fundamental to meeting the basic needs of themselves and their families. This particular bill says it recognizes that the policies established and the statues passed by this body and the legislature as a whole influence the number of people in Maine who earn less than the liveable wage. Some portion of that 1/3 of our friends and neighbors who barely can make ends meet, if at all, are making that amount of money because of actions that we take. What this is is an attempt at is to look at, what are those policies, what adjustments would be appropriate to bring people up to the point where they are acknowledged for the hard work that they do, that they can in fact make ends meet at a very, very basic level as a result of working hard on a full time basis. So this particular piece of legislation, this particular recommendation of the Liveable Wage Commission simply says lets look at what it would take to bring up to a liveable wage, wages of people who work in various governmental levels or whose pay is influenced by policies and rates of reimbursement paid by State government. So, it's a long term plan for certain portions of the population I just defined; it's a 5-year plan for others for others it's a 10-year plan. The intention to characterize this as something that gets in the way of collective bargaining I believe is inaccurate and an effort to mislead you. This doesn't suggest that, it just looks at what can we do as a body, what can we do as State government to adjust the way we do what we do to bring people up to a liveable wage level, that's all this bill does. Now you may choose to support it or not, but please be clear as to exactly what this legislation says. I hope you'll support it, I think it is important

that we indicate a commitment to Maine workers, that we understand that they should be amply paid or reasonably paid for the work that they do. That we believe that it isn't right that people work on a full time basis and can't feed or house their families that that isn't right that it isn't right that we pay wages that require that they take public assistance to be able to meet the needs of their family. That it isn't right that they have to go on MaineCare to make sure that their families get healthcare even though they and possibly their partner or spouse works on a fulltime basis. That it simply isn't right that we are setting up a lot of people within our society who can't rely on the hard work that they do to be able to acquire basic things, food, shelter, clothing, housing, transportation, to be able to stay viable parts of the workforce. You know it's because people earn less than liveable wage that some people in fact can not stay as part of the workforce, they can't afford a car that will get them to work, they can't afford housing to stay warm, they can't afford to live where they work, so it only exacerbates for them the cost of maintaining employment. This is an effort to do it. By the way at point we will actually get to the bill that talks about the calculation of the liveable wage and I look forward to that discussion to be able to show you that, in fact, the target that we are talking about 1st of all is sensitive to regional differences, 2nd of all is sensitive household size and 3rd is very conservative based on some very, very conservative assumptions, but that is a discussion for another day. I urge you to support this legislation, I think it's the right message to send to the hard working folks of the State of Maine and I think it should reflect our commitment to making sure that people who do work full time, who are important working contributing members of our society or family here in Maine can support their families. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Winterport, Representative Kaelin.

Representative **KAELIN**: Mr. Speaker, may I pose a question through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Representative may pose his question.

Representative **KAELIN**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Is there anything in this study or this bill that ties a person's educational attainment or job experience to the concept of a living wage?

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative Lerman.

Representative **LERMAN**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. In response to the question the answer is, no. It really looks at, in this particular case, well the concept of liveable wage is really tied to somebody, to what people make, not necessarily to their educational level, but what in fact do they make, what in fact does it cost for them to be able to secure the basics, housing, transportation, food and other basic needs. So it's not tied to educational level.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Winterport, Representative Kaelin.

Representative **KAELIN**: I appreciate that answer and for that reason I'm going to push red on this bill because I think that this is how you get to liveable wages in this society, through your own personal initiative and that I don't think that it's our responsibility to make sure that everybody gets a standard wage for just showing up. For that reason I'm going to push a red button here. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative Lerman.

Representative **LERMAN**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Just to address the concerns expressed by Representative Kaelin, this is one piece

of our recommendations as I have said on the floor of this body in the past. There were a number of recommendations that came out of the commission including a very strong recommendation to invest significantly in higher education and in economic development. This particular legislation simply, it can't exist within a vacuum and it isn't saying that people shouldn't take the initiative, what it is saying for those people who do some things that are fundamental to us getting by on a day to day basic, for the people who clean our houses, clean our chamber; distribute materials to us so that we can do our business, alright, the people who work in dietary positions in our schools systems. How about our teachers, that we pay our teachers a liveable wage, alright, how about the people who pump our gas, alright, how about the people who care for our parents or our children or for some of us in a few years, us. These are people who fulfill very important roles in our society and the point is not to give them other opportunities to get more education, not to say because you do that because you care for older people that's as far as you go, that we want you to stay there, you know, we want people to have access to education so that they can improve their lot. We want to do the research and development that will bring good paying jobs to the State of Maine, that's all part of our recommendation and part of what I think we all embrace and know is very important at this point for our State, but what this does say is for those people who fulfill roles in our society that we have valued at the point where they can't make ends meet, alright. For those people for however long they are in those positions that they should be given the decent enough treatment by society to have enough dignity, you know, to give them the dignity so that they can make ends meet while they are in those positions, whether it be for a few months, or whether it be for a lifetime. It's not insensitive to the excellent point of providing more opportunity for people to get more education and to better their lot, but it does acknowledge the fact that we need to do better for those people who are in the position of being on the lower end of the pay scale. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Berwick, Representative Burns.

Representative **BURNS**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. As the good Representative from Augusta pointed out, it is about dignity, as he also pointed out and I haven't seen the documentation for this and I take him at his word that they are a third of our population that work hard and receive less than a liveable wage. I know from our discussions/debates on the minimum wage that I received literature from my colleagues who sit to the left of me, that indicated that those folks who receive the minimum wage, the less than a liveable wage, also are subsidized by the rest of us. So the reality is that we all pay the living wage already, but the taxpayers subsidize the living wage. There is no dignity, those folks who work hard for a living, whether they pump our gas and I don't know that they do that in this State anymore. because I know that I pump my own. Those folks that make that cup of coffee for me at Dunkin' Donuts, those folks who cook that vacuum packed steak for me up at the new elevation of fast food, they work hard for their money and when they go home what they've earned does not provide them sufficiently to fend for themselves. There is no self-reliance in these meager wages that we pay for this very necessary work that they do for us, but the reality is, we pay for it, we subsidize these meager wages. So it is truly in our interest and the interest of the people of the State of Maine to work in the direction of a liveable wage, a respectable wage. I urge you to vote in support of this measure.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hampden, Representative Duprey. Having spoken twice now requests unanimous consent to address the House a third time. Is there objection? Chair hears no objection, the Representative may proceed.

Representative **DUPREY**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. We hear a lot about the recommendations of the Living Wage Commission. Now, anybody who knows me in here knows that when I worked on the Labor Committee, I always worked to compromise. I'm very fair for the most part. This commission was put together with people, 4 for and 3 against it, so we are stacked right against this right from the beginning. There was no reasons for us to run to a compromise, we were outnumbered right from the beginning. So there was no reason to say okay, let's find some common ground because when you got a majority you don't have to do that. So we're pretty much, yeah we had some input and yeah they did listen to us, but they pretty much came out with 15 bills or 13 bills or whatever that was what they wanted. Now we talk about this living wage concept, I spend two weeks in the Philippines in September: I do some missions and charity overseas every year, working at orphanages. You know the minimum wage over there is \$3.50 a day, you're like oh my god \$3.50 a day, who can live on that? That is poverty, that's slave labor, but when I was at MacDonald's there and I had a Big Mac, large fry and a large coke, it cost me 38 cents. It put everything in perspective. These people can live on that because that is a living wage for that country, they could live on \$3.50 a day. See if we were to take the minimum wage here and raise it to \$16.00 it would cost you \$15.00 for a Big Mac, large fry and a coke. We would still be subsidizing those people, except now we would be subsidizing at a much higher income level. See the target is always moving, the higher we raise wages, the higher things are going to cost, so the people at the bottom are always going to be poor except they are going to be poor at a higher income level, because 20 years ago we could all live on \$15,000.00 a year, comfortably. Things change over time. If we raise minimum wage to \$100.00 an hour, a \$100.00 an hour would be poverty. It's not the amount of money, you're always going to have people at the bottom; you're always going to have people at the top. The ones who want to work their way up, this is America you can do that. Nine years ago I didn't have anything. I lost everything in a failed business, worked hard for nine years, have done ok, because this is America and everybody has a level playing field, if you want to play. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Representative from Auburn, Representative Shields has posed a question through the Chair to anyone who may care to respond. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Shields, Representative Shields.

Representative **SHIELDS**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. For anyone who wishes to answer it. The bill indicates that part of this is to develop a 5 year plan to increase the wages of all State workers to a liveable wage. Now the other day, tell me if I am correct or not, I was told the liveable wage was \$9.00 to \$14.00 an hour, is that correct and are State employees being paid less than that?

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Augusta, Representative Lerman.

Representative **LERMAN**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. In response to the question posed by the good Representative from Auburn. In fact the calculation of liveable wage for this year using the methodology that being recommended by the study commission would range from \$9.00 to about \$14.00 - \$14.60 I believe it is,

depending upon household size, so you are accurate in that sense. Second, yes there are a number of State employees who make less than a liveable wage, even at the \$9.00 and change rate per hour. Also, just to clarify one further thing because of the apparent confusion between the two separate pieces of legislation, the fiscal note on this bill is to hire the staff to conduct the study and to develop the plan. It is not to calculate the liveable wage on an annual basis. That is not what the fiscal note on this bill represents, nor are the positions that are built in this bill. They don't have anything to do with the liveable wage; they have to do with the development of the plan as outlined in the legislation itself. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Skowhegan, Representative Richardson.

Representative RICHARDSON: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I want to make two points that the good Representative from Augusta brought up. He said that the people who were, or that he went to a gas station and found out that he didn't get anybody to pump his gas, he had to do it himself. I think that one of the things that has happened in gas stations is that the owners or the financers of gas stations have found out that the can't afford to pay to have people to pump your gas so they've mechanized it. This is going to happen every time you get the price of labor so high that it can't be factored into the sale of the product. The other point that he made was that we are subsidizing the lower, or the wage of the people he claims are suffering. My point, I guess, is that if these are State workers where is the money going to come from, but from us to pay their wages. Won't we still be subsidizing them after we have raised their wages another \$2, \$3, \$4 or \$5 it's all going to come from the taxes of the State of Maine. I don't understand how you can figure out that you're not subsidizing them, whether you're doing it with social programs or whether you're dong it with taxes. The pants have only got two pockets in them where our money is and it is going to come from one side or the other.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is acceptance of the Majority Ought to Pass as Amended Report. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.

All this study does is it allows them to study whatever it is they think they want to study. We took away any authority for them to act on any of that and that's really all it does. Is a small thing, I suppose we could have just wiped the whole thing out, but they were fearful they were losing something that they wanted to talk about and that's about it.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hodgdon, Representative Sherman.

Representative **SHERMAN**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'm not sure if my question was answered directly, but I think it was indirectly. After we had a discussion last night about the labor market areas, the demise of rural school districts it seems to me that there is a big target on the back of the rural district. I would oppose this amendment.
