John C. Witherspoon, of Kingfield, who has been named Maine's Financial Services Champion for 2007 by the United States Small Business Administration. Mr. Witherspoon is the Chief Executive Officer of the Finance Authority of Maine. Under Mr. Witherspoon's leadership, the Finance Authority of Maine designed a loan program to provide financing to businesses in the York area that were affected by the severe floods of last spring. We extend our congratulations to Mr. Witherspoon on his receiving this award;

Representative **CARTER**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise to recognize John Witherspoon, a 25-year resident of Kingfield, Maine. He is a direct descendent of John Witherspoon, a former president of Princeton University and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. His wife is a high-level administrator for both Sugarloaf and Sunday River Ski Areas.

After graduating from the University of Maine at Orono, he moved to Kingfield to take a position with the Kingfield Savings Bank. He soon rose to be president of the bank. He led the bank in exponential growth and conversion from a stock bank to a mutual bank, one of the few banks in Maine in recent years to do that. It later merged with the Camden Bank.

He is currently the CEO of FAME. In this capacity, last spring he invited the agency to create timely low-interest loans, for small businesses in York County that were adversely affected by the flood. This action of quickly setting up these loans for a lot of these businesses, to become prepared for the Memorial Day weekend, which they would not have been able to do otherwise. These loans are still in place to assure the total recovery of these small businesses.

I would be remiss if I did not stand today in recognition of Mr. Witherspoon, having spent the last 6 years prior to my coming here, working at the Finance Authority of Maine. It was a great pleasure to be working with John. Since I have known him for a number of years, he was a legislative partner of mine back in the 1990's. He came down here, spent a day with me. I went up and spent a day learning something about banking. This honor is well deserved and frankly, coming from the SBA, there is much to be admired by Mr. Witherspoon and rightfully so. He is a member of the National Honor Society and first place winner in VFW Voice of Democracy Speech Contest for the region. He will be attending the American Legion Boys' State Conference in June. He plays the guitar, drums, and trumpet. He was selected to sing in the Maine All-State Music Festival this weekend. He is very active in drama in high school and an excellent cook, especially Mexican food.

Adriana Walsh, who graced us with her talent this morning singing the National Anthem, is currently an 8th grade student at Winslow Junior High School. At this point, she would like to be an English teacher and/or teach drama or dance, but we all really know that Adriana would really love to go on Broadway as a jazz singer. She was the first place winner at the VFW Patriot's Pen essay contest, a first place winner in the Holocaust and Human Rights Center of the Maine Arts Contest, for a song she and another student wrote, but the music and words were about the Holocaust, and will be attending a luncheon for that celebration on Sunday. She plays the trumpet, sings, dances, and loves drama, especially musical theatre. She has performed in several shows at the Waterville Opera House. She has been on the Civil Rights Team at school for the past three years, and for the past year, has been a monthly volunteer at the evening sandwich program in Waterville.

The legacy that Steve offers his community and state is best seen in his family. It was wonderful to have the opportunity, Mr. Speaker, in honoring Steve today, to honor the only way he would have it, frankly—to honor his family with him. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Somerville, Representative Miller.

Representative **MILLER**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. Steve Walsh was my husband's boss; my husband is a physician in a rural health center. He was a remarkable man. He was a great and gentle manager of a large pack of cranky and volatile clinicians throughout the health center network, and my husband is not the least of them. My husband would call Steve and people said this: Sometimes the phone would be held out to here. A terrific businessman, it is not easy managing several primary care sites because it is a business that is very difficult these days. He was a terrific advocate for rural health centers in these halls, and he will be greatly missed by all of us. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

the importance of early detection and screening for those at risk for chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, in order to reduce the financial and clinical burden of the illness upon the citizens of Maine. Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), also known as chronic bronchitis and emphysema, is the 4th leading cause of death in the United States and the only one of the top 5 causes for which prevalence and death rates are rising. It is a

progressive disease that affects over 59,000 residents of Maine and it generates an annual estimated cost of \$37 billion. Over 60% of those diagnosed with COPD are under the age of 65 and the incidence of the disease in women has surpassed that of men. Many patients with COPD are not diagnosed until they have reached an advanced stage of the disease, which often includes a disabling degree of lung dysfunction. Early diagnosis of COPD, including the use of spirometry, can reduce the financial burden of the illness within public programs such as Medicaid and MaineCare. Studies have proven that COPD patients benefit from disease management programs and yet COPD has often been overlooked as a chronic disease suitable for inclusion into such programs. We encourage the Maine Department of Health and Human Services, Dirigo Health's Maine Quality Forum and other stakeholders in Maine's health care community to include chronic obstructive pulmonary disease in their chronic disease management programs in an effort to reduce the financial and clinical burden of the illness to our public programs and to the citizens of Maine:

Representative **MILLER**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. When it comes to chronic disease in Maine, our report card has three C's and a D. I think we are all familiar with cardiovascular disease, we know the burdens we have in cancer, we are very caught up with our problems with diabetes, but few of us know that chronic obstructive pulmonary disease is the other bad grade on our report card.

Our death rates in Maine are higher than the national average, but the good news is that they are dropping. We do a lot in this Chamber to prevent this disease: We work on asthma issues, we work on smoking prevention, we work on air quality, and that is contributing to the drop in the disease, but access to care is another issue. The good news is that you can detect chronic obstructive pulmonary disease early with spirometry and we have arranged today, some activities that you will see on your yellow sheet, somewhere in the mess on your desk. I will talk about it more at the end of session today, but I just wanted you to know that this is a serious burden in our state. It is sort of the quiet disease that we do not often think about. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Several weeks ago we got, probably about a two-inch thick report; it is actually the Biennial Work Plan from the Department of Transportation that is for all of the projects that are

going forward for the next two years. We all immediately open it up to find what in that project plan is being funded throughout the state, statewide projects. That is predicated on this bill, just as it is predicated on bond funding and on gas tax revenues. I think you might recall two weeks there, just talking about the Biennial Work Plan.

Go back to fairly close to the beginning part of the session when we talked about the supplemental budget. We talked about how we had cut \$14 million out of that supplemental budget because of decreased revenues coming in to the state. Without the indexing that we are talking about, take that line—remember I asked you to draw a straight line and say that is the flat gas tax revenue that is coming in, and that is why we have this boom and bust cycle of construction in our state, and why we needed such a large transportation bond this session—take out this indexing piece and draw that line downward. This will cut \$17 million from that two-year work plan and that is quite a number of projects.

As people are asking for better roads, this is a thoughtful, systematic, consistent, and very small increase in the gas tax. A gas tax, which we all have noticed had gone up \$0.30+, simply because the market driven force is, this is less than, I believe, 7/10ths of a penny. The roads need it and I hope you support the motion, which is supported by 12 members of the Committee. Thank you.

Representative **STRANG BURGESS**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Colleagues of the House. I rise this morning, if it is still morning, yes it is, to urge you to think about this very carefully and to actually consider a red Not to Pass vote. The reason for that is I have found that there is just a tremendous amount of bills that we have up here. We seem to stick our fingers in a lot of people's business. I have sort of philosophical issue with that, that we have so many bills, nearly 3,000 bills here, that it is almost sort of making our job, we are sort of self fulfilling our jobs here. So, on more of a philosophical basis, I

rise to dispute this because as the Legislature, we in fact review and approve the trustees for all of our public higher education, including the University System.

Furthermore, you all are involved in approving the budget to run the University System and various campuses. We have a body of smart trustees that are there. They have to make decisions on a regular basis about the different subjects, the different majors, the different colleges, the different departments. That is what is involved day-to-day in running an active, responsive, public institution. There are many, many, many issues that come before the Board of Trustees on a regular basis, I can assure you. For a variety of reasons, they have to make those decisions that fit the market analysis and what they are doing for the education of our students in the State of Maine. We need to let them do their job.

This particular job did come through the Committee that I sit on and there were a lot of wonderful things about doing this. My issue is not about the specific subject about this bill, but about the process. If every time any of us or any of our constituency, has an idea for a new major or a new college or a new department within the University, and you circumvent the Board of Trustees or the administration of that particular university and come directly the Legislature, then we might as well not have a Board of Trustees. It negates their job.

So, my philosophy is that this is an example of a bill, of an idea that did not in fact go through the administration of the University of Southern Maine; it did not go before the Board of Trustees of the University of Maine System. It is important to go through the process. I could understand if someone felt passionately and was turned down at each step of the way and came here, which I still philosophically would not support it, but I could understand it. This particular subject did not even do those two steps. So, therefore, I would urge you to vote against this particular bill for the philosophical reasons of letting our Board of Trustees and our Universities, do the job that you all have appointed the Trustees and given them the budget to work with. Please follow my vote and vote red. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair will interrupt debate at a point of procedure. Technically, we had moved beyond the Majority Report and moved into discussion of Committee Amendment "A," which is simply the Fiscal Note. Further debate, unfortunately by our rules, needs to be restricted to the discussion of the Fiscal Note only, Committee Amendment "A."

JOINT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING THE DELEGATION OF THE 2007 NEW ENGLAND FISHERY MANAGEMENT COUNCIL TO USE THE AREA MANAGEMENT CONCEPT FOR GROUNDFISH MANAGEMENT

WE, your Memorialists, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-third Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the First Regular Session, most respectfully present and petition the delegates to the 2007 New England Fishery Management Council as follows:

WHEREAS, the rich and fabled fishing grounds of the American northeast coast first brought from the Old World to the New World Europeans who found the abundance that became the foundation of New England; and

WHEREAS, the legendary abundance of cod and other Gulf of Maine groundfish provided the bounty that sustained thousands of hardy Maine deepwater fishermen sailing seasonally from hundreds of Maine harbors; and

WHEREAS, in the last half century, the groundfish stock within the Gulf of Maine has suffered a sad depletion and has not rebounded as it has in other regions, which threatens the economy of Maine's historic fishing communities and inflicts economic hardships for Maine's remaining groundfishing families today: and

WHEREAS, as a symbol of this decline, in the 10 years from 1996 to 2006 alone Maine's active federal groundfishing permits have declined in number from 165 to 91, a dramatic 45% decline; and

WHEREAS, such impacts are reflected in the continuing loss and declining numbers of shoreside support industries, including ice suppliers, fuel vendors, fish buyers and processors, fishing gear shops, bait suppliers, boat repair businesses and transport firms, among others, and the accompanying value each added;

WHEREAS, this loss of fish and the loss of fishing livelihoods has occurred under the current approach to management, known as "Days at Sea," which limits the number of days permit holders may go to sea and make legal landings of their catch; and

WHEREAS, "Days at Sea" has not, in the judgment of your Memorialists, achieved the overarching goal of fisheries management, which is to ensure the regeneration of long-term abundance of groundfish in the Gulf of Maine and in the New England region and to thus rebuild the equitable redistribution of our fisheries resource among fishing communities and economies: and

WHEREAS, the New England Fishery Management Council has asked for public proposals for alternative systems of management for the New England fishery to provide for a more

sustainable, renewable and equitable distribution of our historic fishing resources; and

WHEREAS, a diverse regional coalition of Maine and New England stakeholders has thus formed, including fishermen, scientists, interested citizens and conservation and harvesting interests, and has proposed a new system of resource management that meets the New England Fishery Management Council requirements, entitled "Area Management"; and

WHEREAS, "Area Management" takes into account the ecological differences between ocean regions and species and aligns the economic incentives of the fishing business with ecologically sound practices to promote greater accountability, ecological sustainability and an enduring long-term fishing industry for New England, embracing the widespread environmental, economic and social good; and

WHEREAS, the concept of "Area Management" offers the best promise to rebuild our once-fertile fishing grounds, to sustain our State's fishermen, to replenish traditional fishing stocks, to provide for the ancient livelihood of our coastal communities up and down the rugged reaches of the Gulf of Maine and to provide abundant harvests and healthy food for the present and future citizens of our nation from the waters of New England; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to request the delegates from the State of Maine to the 2007 New England Fishery Management Council to support the "Area Management" concept and actively advocate for an "Area Management" concept of groundfish management for the benefit of all who now and in days to come "go down to the sea in ships, that do business in great waters"; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to John Pappalardo, Chairman of the New England Fishery Management Council, to Rip Cunningham, Chairman of the Multispecies (Groundfish) Committee, to Paul Howard, Executive Director of the New England Fishery Management Council, to Pat Kurkul, Regional Director of the National Marine Fishery Service, to each member of the New England Fishery Management Council and to each member of the Maine Congressional Delegation.

Craig Pendleton, who is in the Gallery and a number of people across the state, have been working really hard on this concept, which would allow area management back into our communities. I think it is an incredibly important concept. We are urging our Delegation, who is going to be considering this concept this weekend, to take a look at it, especially our good Commissioner. I certainly appreciate this body's support.
