The following Joint Resolution: (S.P. 703) JOINT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO REQUIRE THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE TO REINSTATE THE TERMINOLOGY OF "POW" OR "PRISONER OF WAR" INTO THE CLASSIFICATION OF MILITARY PERSONNEL

WE, your Memorialists, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-third Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the First Regular Session, most respectfully present and petition the United States Congress as follows:

WHEREAS, for many years in the past the United States Department of Defense used the terminology of "POW" or "Prisoner of War" to describe a member of the military's casualty status and category for reporting purposes; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Defense's current term, "Missing/Captured," dramatically reduces the impact of reports and alters the responses from national and international organizations that have historically interceded in such cases; and

WHEREAS, the nature of war has changed markedly and permanently and, rather than change accordingly to provide maximum protection of all we send in harm's way, our government has established requirements that are too specific to be workable, too vague to be applicable or too confusing to achieve understanding; and

WHEREAS, the protection that should be automatically accorded those in harm's way is seriously eroded with the "Missing/Captured" classification; and

WHEREAS, American servicemen and servicewomen are not disposable items and their security and well-being are more significant than the concerns, goals, sensitivities and idiosyncrasies of our enemies, or of any other nation; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully urge and request that the United States Congress require the United States Department of Defense to reinstate "POW" or "Prisoner of War" into the casualty status and category classification of military personnel; and be it further

RÉSOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, to the United States Secretary of Defense and to each Member of the Maine Congressional Delegation.

Representative EATON of Sullivan moved that the House **ACCEPT** Report "B" **Ought to Pass as Amended**.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Sullivan, Representative Eaton.

Representative **EATON**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. First, I would like to let everybody know because there have been these questions; a lot of people are not familiar with elvers. Elvers are not alewives, they are not herrings. They are small baby eels, a young American eel, for any of those who might be wondering and they have created quite a stir for us in Marine Resources during this session.

I would like to talk a little bit about the motion for this bill and Report "B." I put this bill in as an Emergency. In the State of Maine, from the Patriots' Day storm, after 10 inches of snow, half a foot of rain, we had issues that created a disaster in many counties here in the State of Maine. Sometimes, some people do not have the opportunity for compensation or the opportunity for us, as the House of Representatives, to help people who are damaged through these kinds of circumstances—today we do.

The elver season runs from March 22 to May 31. That is a total of 70 days; excluding days that they cannot fish which are traditionally weekends. The reason why we leave Saturdays and Sundays as non-fishing days, are so that these elvers have the opportunity to make their way up streams into our lakes and our ponds, where they live for many years. Our fishermen were thumped in a very serious way by the weather that we encountered in early April. There were no elvers running until very early in May, meaning that they lost the entire month of

March, the entire month of April, leaving them in effect about 20 days with an opportunity to fish this year.

There was a time when we were over-fished in a very big way, as we have done in many industries in fishing in Maine, and we have done many steps to try to alleviate that and reduce the pressure on the resource. We have done the same with elver licenses. You cannot, any longer, obtain an elver license and there are approximately 600 elver fishermen left in the State of Maine.

I put in a Report, originally, as an Emergency measure, to try to provide relief for these fishermen, by allowing them to fish the weekends for the remainder of the season. Most elver fishermen are not full-time fishermen. They are ladies and gentlemen who go out there part-time, piecemealing their lives so that they can make their livelihood, so they can feed their families, and they can take care of the people in their communities. My proposal would have given them every day, but unfortunately, as you may be aware, it sometimes takes time to get things to the House floor in emergency situations. We are now reduced to two weekends remaining in the elver fishing season.

What my bill, actually this Resolve, and the Amendment that was brought forth by Senator Damon, cuts in half the requests that I had made. There will be two fishing days, two additional days, in the entire season, granted to the elver fishermen if this motion for this Resolve passes here today. We have an opportunity to help these people with two additional days. This is a Resolve; it is for this year and this year only, for the 2007 Season. It is not for future years, it is not for future circumstances.

This is a great compromise: It gives our fishermen a few days; it does not place a huge effort on our resource of which we are unsure, by the way, of its actual volume and how dangerously close this resource might be. We really do not know. The statistics really are not there, the science in not there, unfortunately. I am looking at balancing our desire to protect a resource with our desire to protect the men and women working in the State of Maine, trying to make a living, and as we all know, frequently is a very difficult task.

I would ask you today to please help these 600 fishermen, by providing them with two additional days in the remainder of this fishing season, to help them take care of their families. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Rockland, Representative Mazurek.

Representative **MAZUREK**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I understand what Representative Eaton is attempting to do; however, I am going to ask you to vote Not to Pass on this bill because first of all, it establishes a very bad precedent. If we allow this fishery to have its two days, the next time a fishery has a rough beginning of a season, we are going to have to allow that fishery to have extra times as well. We do not know, for example, what effect those extra two days will have on the future of this fishery. As Representative Eaton said, there is no concrete number.

We do know, however, that we can look at the groundfish industry and sea urchin industry, and see what over fishing has done to those two industries. The groundfish industry, right now, is on the brink of going out of business, as ceasing to exist here in Maine, one of our traditional industries along the coast of Maine. The sea urchin industry, a few years ago, people were raking in thousands of dollars. Today, you cannot find a sea urchin. Why, because it was over-fished.

The elvers, we do not know what that effect will have by taking these fish these extra days. The precedent is very dangerous; it is a very slippery slope for us to get involved in. I

am asking you to vote against this bill to save the fishery and to allow the Department of Marine Resources, to do the job that they are created for and that is to handle the fishery as they see fit. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Columbia, Representative Tibbetts

Representative **TIBBETTS**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Colleagues of the House. I am speaking and asking you to follow my light, my green light, on Amendment "A." These two days, what we are asking for or what the fishermen are asking for is actually only one day. For any of you that might have harvested smelts, the sea-run smelts, these fish run at night, the same way with the eels. The only actual day the fishermen feel that is going to be adequate for them and benefit them in any way, is this coming Saturday, Friday and Saturday. The week after, they may get some fish, but the tides are right for this coming weekend. We would like to get it through so that they can have at least one day to fish.

Now, we had all coastal communities, except for Washington County would be called a disaster area by the Chief Executive, and I feel that these fishermen are not asking too much to ask for these two extra days. Again, like I say, the way the tides are, this coming weekend is the only weekend that is actually going to be a benefit. Thank you and please follow my light on "A."

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Scarborough, Representative McDonough.

Representative **McDONOUGH**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I rise to support the Ought Not to Pass motion and I do it with a heavy heart, because I know that the good Representative Eaton and Representative Tibbetts are representing their constituents, but the Marine Resources Committee has given an awful lot of thought to this whole issue. The Marine Resources Department has come out in opposition to it. We went to the Chief Executive's Office, saying if this is truly an emergency; let the Executive's Office declare it as they did in other parts of the state.

I realize that it is only two days and it does not sound like a very big deal, and I suspect it probably is to the folks that are down there, but the eels, elvers, are running all over the state now. They have set up traps. I received a call yesterday from Boothbay Harbor, telling me the trap was in place, and I plan on going down there and looking at it because I have never seen one before. But as Representative Mazurek said, this is precedent setting. I have some concerns about that because I have a Class I Lobster License.

We recently heard testimony from Matinicus Island about their zone and the restrictions, in terms of days that they can fish out there. If we have a storm coming in, they will be back here asking us for two more days or a week, to make up for the difference when they cannot go to sea. So, I think, my friends, that you can see that trying to do the right thing could cause further problems for us down the road, so I would ask you to think strongly about how you are going to vote on this. I am going to vote no and I hope that you will also do that. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Boothbay, Representative MacDonald.

Representative **MacDONALD**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. You see the Marine Resources Committee was well divided on this, we remained friends, and we worked hard on this. Reasonable people can disagree on this and any other bill as we have discovered. However, let me point out that the bill came in originally looking for six days of additional time, to help the elver fishermen over a very difficult season this year. The compromise that was moved by Representative Eaton, brought that down to three days and as you heard Representative Tibbetts say, it probably may be even two or one day that we are adding to the season for the elver fishermen.

If you are in the Marine Resources Committee hearing the testimony of the Department and the Department scientists, you would have heard that they cannot tell you what the status of the elvers is. There is an absence of information about the health of that stock. We have limited licenses for the future. There are only 600, approximately, licenses in the state now, and no new ones are being introduced. We are hardly fishing hard on this stock. We have slowed the effort down and are slowly going to zero because of our state policies, but this year these fishermen need this help. I submit that when you do not have sound scientific information to make a decision, then you have people whose livelihoods depend upon a decision that we can make.

I think the wise move is to split the difference: You do not deny them completely, nor do you let them completely go after the resource. We did hear that if we gave them the whole six days, that because the run will be very short due to the weather, they could capture all of the elvers that were going upstream this year in Maine. That is why I went and supported the compromise motion for just three days, and now it is really down to two and possibly one. I urge you to support Representative Eaton's compromise amendment to the motion, to give a modest bit of help to the elver fishers, in what is already a declining fishery and that is well managed by the State of Maine. I do not believe this will do any serious harm to that elver fishery. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bath, Representative Watson.

Representative **WATSON**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The only party not present at this compromise is the resource. Now, these tiny elvers have traveled all the way from the Sargasso Sea to Maine rivers, into the rivers and ponds, to grow to adulthood, to leave again in 15 or 20 years, go back to the Sargasso Sea, spawn, and start the whole process over again. If the Department cannot tell us the health of this fishery, then why do we err on the side of the fishermen? Why are we not erring on the side of the resource?

This fishery is being decimated, not only by elver fishermen, 600 of them piled into the mouths of our few rivers, but by the dams that kill the adult eels on the way back down, on the way back out to the Sargasso Sea. We do not know, so we are going to over-fish them. We did not know about urchins, although there was some science to say that if you over fish, they are going to go away and that is exactly what happened. Two days of fishing is not going to make a difference in the overall financial lives of these elver fishermen, when you weigh that against the possibility of decimating a resource that our own Department of Marine Resources cannot give us scientific information about.

We are constantly asked by groups to "give us a break, give us a break." The only people that cannot speak on this, the only source that cannot speak on this today, are the elvers themselves. I do not want to be part of decimating a fishery that we are certainly going to regret five, ten years from now. I will vote red on this and I hope you follow that light. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Bowdoinham, Representative Berry.

Representative **BERRY**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I just rise today to tell you that my uncle is an eel fisherman. I remember very fondly, growing up with him on Merrymeeting Bay, and going out on his boat and catching mature eels.

For several decades now that fishery has been exhausted, and I only rise to say that because I think it is important for folks to know that there once upon a time in this state, there were eel fishermen, and now the elvers appear to be the only fishermen that remain. I think Representative Watson spoke very well to some of the reasons why that may have occurred, but the truth is we do not have a lot of data. We probably do not know exactly how many eel fishermen there once were, but I can tell you that very few of them remain. I think those are some of the jobs that we also need to be thinking about here. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Phippsburg, Representative Percy.

Representative **PERCY**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The Committee process is wonderful. Representative Eaton has done a terrific job working this bill through the House, and I admire his efforts and his energies, and he spoke well. I would like to say that I still disagree with him and that he is wrong.

Fact: Right now, the only state on the coast that has an eel fishery is the State of Maine. Fact: Last year, the Federal Government came this close, the size of a baby eel, to putting the American Eel on the Endangered Species Act, and they decided not to. The Federal Government watches how we manage this fishery. The scientists down at DMR, Dr. Wippelhauser, are actually on the Technical Committee at the federal level for eels. She is the person who came and spoke in front of our Committee.

Right now, the eels are not running, Ladies and Gentlemen, but we do not know if they are not running because of the temperature of the water. We do not know if they are not running because of the storm. We do not know if they are not running because they are not there, because there is not as much of the resource as there has been in the past. Elvers are at the bottom of the food chain. They are very important in terms of being a forage fish for all of our other fisheries, the striped bass recreational fishery. The elvers have not started moving upstream. We do not know if it is because of the high water, and again as I said, we do not know if it is because they are not there. Two days is an enormous amount of effort.

Right now, the fishermen are allowed to fish Monday through Friday. The Amendment that Representative Eaton is putting forth would allow a sixth day. This fishing season has been managed specifically to allow there to be a catch, as well as to specifically allow two days of passage. So, are we as a Legislature, responsible for the resources of our state, willing to vote for more economic exploitation on a resource that is very fragile? Or do we take the hard position of saying, "No, you must deal with the fishing season that you have, that has been set in law for the last ten years?" The reason the weekend closed period was put into effect, was specifically to ensure that the eels could get upstream for their migration, and every year this is incredibly important because as Representative Watson said, this is about getting the eels upriver so they can grow and mature.

Right now, when we started working on this bill a couple of weeks ago, the price of eels was \$50 a pound. Today, I have been told it is up to \$400 a pound. I have an enormous fear that if we allow an extra two days of fishing, that the intense effort to catch the baby eels is going to be extreme and can be detrimental. I would rather be safe in terms of protecting the resource. I would rather be safe in terms of guaranteeing that we have more eels to study, Ladies and Gentlemen. I would rather send the message to the Federal Government that we are managing and protecting our fisheries. So, I will not be supporting Representative Eaton's motion, I will be voting Ought Not to Pass, the red button, and I hope that you will follow my light.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative

from Scarborough, Representative Pendleton.

Representative **PENDLETON**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. There are a few facts that have not been mentioned in this debate, so I just want to bring them to your attention. I hope that you will be voting green, in favor of the Report "B" Amendment, which is a compromise. If you were able to look at the Report, you would see that with the compromise, there are nine people on the Committee voting in favor of allowing fishermen to have the two extra days. But if you have ever gone elver fishing, which I have—I do not have a license but I did go to observe—it is not an easy task, especially when you are 61 and rotund.

However, there is one thing that has not been mentioned and it is this: that when you go elver fishing, even if we have these two days, the fish, these little critters, run up the streams and rivers at high tide at night. So the high tide has to be at night. So, the two days now is boiled down to hours because with the next two weekends, even if we have the Friday to Saturday, one weekend, Friday, Saturday, and the next, if the high tide is not at night, it is useless to go fishing. So, I just hope that you will keep that in mind. We are not devastating the resource, we do not know, we are not sure.

I can tell you one thing that I have learned over the years dealing with elvers, is that the elvers start to run when the leaves on the oak tree are the size of a mouse's ear. That happened last week, so if you count that and you count the very short time of high tide at night, you count the fact that nine members are in favor of this compromise, then certainly I think that you would want to vote in favor of this piece of legislation. Mr. Speaker, I would ask for a roll call please.

Representative PENDLETON of Scarborough **REQUESTED** a roll call on the motion to **ACCEPT** Report "B" **Ought to Pass as Amended**.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Scarborough, Representative McDonough.

Representative **McDONOUGH**: Mr. Speaker, may I pose a question through the Chair?

The SPEAKER: The Representative may pose his question.

Representative **McDONOUGH**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I am wondering if anybody can tell me if Elvis is in the House.

The SPEAKER: The Representative from Scarborough, Representative McDonough has posed a question through the Chair to anyone who may care to respond. The Chair recognizes the Representative from Phippsburg, Representative Percy.

Representative **PERCY**: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I just got what Representative McDonough said. I do not have an answer to whether Elvis is in the House. However, I do have an answer that as the Chair of the Marine Resources Committee, it was a hard decision to go against the other members of my Committee. However, if we are being asked to be responsible for the entire resource, I take that so very seriously.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I would also ask you to remember that the lobstermen are conserving their resource, just like all the other fisheries. The elver fishermen, there is nobody that makes their living solely as an elver fisherman. All of us have to do that, work at different jobs. I am a singer and I am a legislator and that it what I do for work. My point being that we have lobstermen who do other things as well as elver fishing and so I would ask you to please remember that my biggest concern is that the Federal Government is watching how we manage this resource. If you approve two more days of fishing, we are increasing the effort on the baby elvers, by an enormous amount. If we do not know the consequences of this effort, if we are voting for it because we think that we do not have enough science, that is not a reason to support this kind of attempt to possibly hurt the resource to the point of extinction. So, I please ask you to follow my red light. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: A roll call has been ordered. The pending question before the House is Acceptance of Report "B" Ought to Pass as Amended. All those in favor will vote yes, those opposed will vote no.
