The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Greenville, Representative Johnson, who wishes to address the House on the record.

Representative **JOHNSON**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Today we are privileged to have in the Hall of Flags the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary, and the Sons of the American Legion.

The American Legion, in my opinion, is a prefect organization. That doesn't say that sometimes it's populated by a few scoundrels, but it is a perfect organization. All members of the American Legion, as they go through their community service and have official meetings, recite the preamble to their constitution. This preamble has survived more than nine decades with one change. The one change in the preamble was to change the word "war" to "wars." It was written in 1919 and has served for more than nine decades. I believe this preamble epitomizes what the American Legion is about, and I would like to describe for you the elements of this preamble. The preamble itself it only 115 words in length and some of the themes that are highlighted in that preamble:

For God and country, we associate ourselves together for the following purposes: This is the opening statement that declares the Legion recognizes the influence of Almighty God in all worthwhile endeavors — and links the allegiance of American Legionnaires to both God and nation. First things are first. A guidepost is erected. All that follows is in conformity.

To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America. Our American Constitution contains the fundamentals of our system of government. It is one guarantee of liberty, freedom and democracy. Written by inspired men, it has served our people for more than 200 years and is destined to serve us as long as our nation endures.

To maintain law and order. Members of the American Legion have fought in several wars and peace-keeping missions to uphold law and order among nations. It is as important that law and order be likewise supported in our domestic affairs.

To foster and perpetuate a one hundred percent Americanism. Americanism is an ideal. It stands for individual rights, fair play and justice. It stands for equal opportunity for all. It gives equal rights to each and all in the way they would worship their God. It gives each and all the freedom to cast a secret ballot for the party and person of their choice.

To make right the master of might. And this is my favorite. The ideal situation is right, backed by might. But many times it does not prevail.

To promote peace and good will on earth. This principle of the preamble seems far from attainment – and that makes it more important as we continue the effort.

To safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy. Our nation grows strong by its adherence to these principles. Lands which we conquered in war have been given back to their own people with their own chosen leaders as we have helped heal the wounds of war.

To preserve the memories and incidents of our associations in the Great Wars. Service under arms in defense of this nation is a great experience of almost every veteran's life. But it means more than a memory of the excitement of battle, the grime of muddy fields, the depths of sub-infested oceans, and the long miles of green seas, or the wild blue yonder.

It means recalling the comradeship, the endurance, the bravery of friends who come from all levels of society building bonds to sustain them in battle.

To inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation. Always interested in building a better nation, the founders of the American Legion believed then and the American Legion believes now that such building must start first with the individual. This means initiating and supporting projects for community involvement — in schools, churches, recreation and at the ballot box.

It also means paying taxes, contributing to charity, and giving blood for those who need it.

It means Legionnaires must take responsibility for their contribution to all of those things that will make their town a better town, their state a better state, and their country a better nation. This task needs constant action, for it is never done.

To combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses. Our democracy is composed of all nationalities, races, creeds, and economic groups. Our citizens form the melting pot that has given us leadership of the world in so many fields of endeavor. There are bound to be both classes and masses. Indeed, the masses are composed of class – but all groups within the mass must feel assured that reason and fairness will prevail in all human activities and relations.

To consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness. This is the dominant characteristic of the American Legion and of Legionnaires. This sends the banker out to help harvest the crop for the sick farmer comrade. This brings the workman to an operation to offer blood or to an injured employer. This spells out our interest in the welfare of the widow and the children of those who wore the uniform of service.

This sends us to a hospital to care for those for whom the war is not over. It persuades us to provide equipment for wards and operating rooms; scholarships for children; a helping hand whenever it is needed by a comrade or a comrade's family.

This is the meaning of the preamble to The American Legion Constitution. It is our foundation. It was made solid in 1919 – and it has never cracked in nine decades. It is from this foundation that the Legionnaires of the 21st century draw their strength and guidance for continued service to God and country.

Please stop by and visit the Legionnaires today in the Hall of Flags. They are America's nobility.
