Bill "An Act To Amend the Labor Laws Relating to Certain Agricultural Employees"

(H.P. 898) (L.D. 1207) (C. "B" H-691)

Was reported by the Committee on **Bills in the Second Reading** and **READ** the second time.

On motion of Representative TUTTLE of Sanford, was **SET ASIDE**.

The same Representative REQUESTED a roll call on PASSAGE TO BE ENGROSSED as Amended.

More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Sanford, Representative Tuttle.

Representative TUTTLE: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. As we heard in the debate yesterday, there are many disagreements on this bill, a very close vote, and for that reason I had asked to have another roll call today. Many of us received testimony in opposition from the Roman Catholic Diocese of Portland and I'd like to share a letter with you. It said that the Catholic Church has for decades been outspoken in its defense of the worker and worker rights. We take this position out of the conviction that work must always be at the core of respect and serve to enhance the dignity of a human person. Work of its own accord has no value. It is the human element present in work that brings value. It is for this perspective that we oppose LD 1207. If enacted, in our opinion, it would impact upon the lives of the most abused, most forgotten, and most ignored laborers in America, the agricultural worker and specifically those working in the egg processing industry. My personal history with the issue impacting upon the egg processing workers in a certain particular plant goes back several decades. I can still vividly remember the documented abuses to workers which led to the lawsuit in which the Catholic Diocese partnered. The revelations that emerged from the legal process were sad and spoke to the blatant disregard for the Godgiven dignity of each and every human being. LD 1207 may be well intentioned, but unfortunately I fear it, in reality, will further provide opportunities for those without scruples to exploit egg processing workers who already are poor and lacking in the fundamental tools to defend their own interests. Members of the Legislature, I humbly ask you to scrutinize this proposal and to judge it on its own merits, that this bill recognize the respect, the God-given dignity of a worker, and what it proposes to do, or does it as an unintended consequence further exploit vulnerable agricultural workers. Indeed, the answer is the latter. You have no choice but to vote no on this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
