JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING MAINE'S CREDIT UNIONS

WHEREAS, Maine's credit unions are member-owned and member-governed financial cooperatives dedicated and committed to serving the needs of their members and communities. The not-for-profit structure of credit unions provides each member with an equal voice and representation in the operations of the credit union. Serving members in all 16 Maine counties and in every community, Maine's credit unions operate with the primary purpose of benefiting the more than 615,000 Maine consumers who use credit unions; and

WHEREAS, the economic benefit that Maine's credit unions provide to Maine consumers is approximately \$38,000,000 annually, as a result of lower and fewer fees on products and services, lower interest rates on loans and higher interest rates on savings; and

WHEREAS, Maine is once again ranked as the nation's 5th strongest credit union state based on the percentage of the population that uses a credit union, a position Maine has held for 10 consecutive years. With more than 615,000 members, credit unions serve nearly one in every 2 Maine residents; and

WHEREAS, the 2,050 full-time and part-time employees of Maine's credit unions and the more than 1,000 unpaid volunteers who serve on credit union boards and committees demonstrate the core credit union values, philosophy and mission of people helping people by contributing to the communities they serve; and

WHEREAS, since 1990 Maine's credit unions and their members have raised \$4,300,000 to help end hunger in Maine. One hundred percent of all money that is raised through the Maine Credit Unions' Campaign for Ending Hunger stays in Maine and goes directly to assist thousands of Maine families and individuals who otherwise would go hungry. In addition to contributing thousands of dollars to food pantries in communities across the State, Maine's credit unions also help to provide funds for statewide initiatives to help end hunger, such as being the primary source of funding for the State's only Food Mobile. In partnership with Good Shepherd Food Bank, the Food Mobile has delivered over 2,280,000 pounds of food to food pantries in every Maine county since it began in 2005; and

WHEREAS, in 2011 Maine's credit unions contributed more than \$1,000,000 to a variety of causes, including a record-setting \$446,929.56 to ending hunger, and to a number of organizations, such as financial literacy programs, the American Red Cross and Special Olympics. In the past 9 years, members of Maine's credit unions contributed more than 180,000 hours, including a record of more than 31,000 hours last year, volunteering for organizations and activities in communities throughout the State, making a significant and positive impact not only on the organizations that received this assistance but also on the people who were served by and benefited from the services and resources provided; and

WHEREAS, since 1921 Maine's credit unions have been enhancing the lives of thousands of Maine people, who have been helped to financial success and stability. Throughout Maine, credit unions continue to play a vital economic and socially responsible role in the lives of individuals and remain a local, significant and stable presence in the communities they serve; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Legislature, now assembled in the Second Regular Session, take this opportunity to recognize the Maine Credit Union League and Maine's credit unions for their positive contributions and the significant role they have played in the lives of Maine citizens and their communities for more than 91 years. More than one-fifth of the members present expressed a desire for a roll call which was ordered.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Dion.

Representative **DION**: Good morning, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. I want to extend my congratulations to the majority, having moved this Order forward. In light of that I would make two brief comments, one regarding Question 1 and the idea of mere ownership. I would pray that the court would focus on the term of ownership. My concern is a legal one. My concern is that ownership encapsulate not simply the propriety interest in the business, but examines the day to day activity, the nature of control and the potential for fiduciary conflicts that exist in the ownership of that entity.

Second, there has been some critique that the Order propounded by this Representative was political in terms of the language that was applied in my Order. I only think it's fair to say this: That language arose from the language expressed by the Attorney General himself. That was not novel language that I crafted, but I simply employed the very terms and facts that he

had expressed in his letter to me some weeks ago. I did not declare those to be political but simply limited, and I would hope that that would inform you that, to my mind, in addressing the court, one not only needs to ask questions but provide the court with some facts, some context in which to place those questions before they answer. So that's what I wanted to say today. That's my comments to all of you. But again, I appreciate the fact that as legislators we've agreed in principle that these questions need to be asked so that we can fully understand, appreciate, and move forward as to what the legal parameters that surround the office of Treasurer. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Lewiston, Representative Rotundo.

Representative **ROTUNDO**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Men and Women of the House. The Appropriations Committee is beginning our work on bond questions, and there are several pending items that will be considered by this body in the coming weeks. We have some concern that any ambiguity about the status of the Treasurer's ability to issue those bonds or carry out other duties could put at risk the intent of the Legislature and voters to issue bonds this year. For that reason, we find it critical to get a definitive answer on the Treasurer's status as we take action together on this critical work. Thank you.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Hampden, Representative Cushing.

Representative CUSHING: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. In regards to this important question, we appreciate the fact that it was raised. We agree that issues of constitutionality should not be politicized, and I believe that the Order before us clearly asks the court in a respectful manner for a definition of issues that may affect perhaps this Treasurer, but also reflect on other constitutional officers going forward. The Treasurer himself is very pleased that we are asking these questions, and as we move forward, we do so in a spirit of recognizing the importance of protecting the public from inappropriate actions without taking this occasion to cast aspersions on anyone who has served this state in either a constitutional office or in the Legislature. The court has the opportunity to provide us with a clear directive and we look forward to them considering this issue and reporting back to the House. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Newport, Representative Fredette.

Representative **FREDETTE**: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise to again recognize the fact that we do this in a bipartisan fashion, moving forward on this issue so that we can resolve this issue and put it before us, that we created a Constitution that in fact creates a system of checks and balances and this is one of the opportunities that we are able to exercise, an opportunity to in fact check on that system, and that to clearly recognize that no one is above the law. I certainly will be supporting this motion.
