JOINT RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZING THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO IMPROVE THE PROCESS USED TO NEGOTIATE AND APPROVE INTERNATIONAL TRADE AGREEMENTS

WE, your Memorialists, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Maine now assembled in the Second Regular Session, most respectfully present and petition the President of the United States and the Congress of the United States as follows:

WHEREAS, the State of Maine strongly supports international trade when fair rules of trade are in place and seeks to be an active participant in the global economy in order to encourage meaningful transparency, appropriately acknowledge the vital role of state sovereignty and afford more meaningful congressional review and acceptance; and

WHEREAS, the State of Maine seeks to maximize the benefits and minimize any negative effects of international trade; and

WHEREAS, existing trade agreements have effects that extend significantly beyond the bounds of traditional trade matters, such as tariffs and quotas, and can undermine Maine's regulatory authority and constitutionally guaranteed authority to protect the public health, safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, a succession of federal trade negotiators from both political parties over the years has failed to operate in a transparent manner and failed to meaningfully consult with states on the far-reaching impact of trade agreements on state and local laws, even when binding the State of Maine to the terms of these agreements; and

WHEREAS, existing trade agreements have not done enough to ensure a level playing field for Maine workers and businesses or to include meaningful human rights, labor and environmental standards, which hurts Maine businesses, workers and communities: and

WHEREAS, the negative effect of existing trade agreements on Maine's regulatory authority and constitutionally guaranteed authority to protect the public health, safety and welfare has occurred in part because United States trade policy has been formulated and implemented in a process that lacks transparency, fails to properly recognize the principles of state sovereignty and lacks any meaningful opportunity for congressional review and acceptance; and

WHEREAS, the United States Trade Representative is currently negotiating the terms of a proposed Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement, which will have a significant effect upon the citizens and commerce of the State of Maine; and

WHEREAS, there is a current opportunity for improving the process by which significant foreign trade policy agreements such as the Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement are negotiated; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, your Memorialists, respectfully urge and request the President of the United States and the Congress of the United States to improve the process by which United States trade agreements are developed and implemented in order to encourage meaningful transparency and appropriately acknowledge the vital role of state sovereignty and afford more

meaningful opportunity for congressional review and acceptance; and be it further

Representative LOVEJOY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I apologize for my timing on this. I wanted to speak about Chief Warrant Officer Five David Longstaff. It was mentioned that, in 2003, he received the Bronze Star and that was for a RPG attack on he and his men. They managed to save those men, bring them all out without injury and, for that, he received the Bronze Star. The Legion of Merit is the sixth highest award that can be given under the military award system and it's for exceptionally meritorious conduct and service. To give you an idea of the level of this, this is awarded to officers. It's also awarded to, in some cases, foreign leaders. But I thought I would give a couple of names to put this in context, a couple of notable names who have received this medal. One is Dwight Eisenhower and the other one is John McCain. So I think it is truly exceptional and of course he is the son of our own Tom Longstaff, so I wanted to stand and recognize that. I had suggested that Tom put in a Sentiment and he's too modest to do that, but he certainly has a lot of reason to be very proud of his son.

The SPEAKER PRO TEM: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Greenville, Representative Johnson.

Representative JOHNSON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. As an old soldier. I'd like this honor to say a few words about Chief Warrant Officer David Longstaff. When I was in the Army we just instituted the rank of Master Warrant Officer. We call it Chief Warrant Officer Five now. In the Army, the warrant officers are really the technical experts in specialized fields. Becoming a CW Five is an extraordinary accomplishment and represents a true expert in his specialty. Chief Warrant Officer Five Longstreet was a food service expert and a technician. In addition to that, the award of the Legion of Merit and the Bronze Star for valor are unique qualifications or accomplishments for a man that is in a specialty. It is indicative of the types of conflicts that our modern Army has to cover these days, when you find people engaged in battle that are in some of these technical specialties. His attainment of the rank attests that he was a true expert in his specialty. His award for valor is testimony that he was a true expert in the military art and I think the final line on the citation of the Legion of Merit encompasses what this man's credentials are. It says that Chief Warrant Officer Five Longstaff's actions are keeping with the finest traditions of the military service; reflect great credit upon him, his unit, the United States Army Central Command and the United States Army. I think today we are honoring a true American hero. Thank you very much.

Linda Nelson, Judith Jerome, Carol Estey and Linda Pattie formed Opera House Arts as a nonprofit in 1999, bought the building, cleaned it out and reopened it just a year later. The revitalization of the opera house is seen by many in Stonington as a key piece to the revitalization of Main Street. A show at the opera house means full tables at local restaurants and full rooms at local lodging establishments. It is a perfect example of a creative economy and how a nonprofit organization can create profits for the surrounding businesses. For many young people, some of whom are here today, the opera house provides their first chance to appear on the stage outside school. JOINT RESOLUTION IN HONOR OF ST. PÁTRICK'S DAY AND IN RECOGNITION OF THE IRISH CONTRIBUTION TO MAINE AND TO THE UNITED STATES

WHEREAS, St. Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland, known for bringing Christianity to Ireland and, it is said, for instilling a sense of literacy and learning that allowed Ireland to become the "isle of saints and scholars" when the rest of Europe was in the Dark Ages; and

WHEREAS, the feast day of St. Patrick is the only national holiday that is given recognition outside its native land, which indicates the Irish influence throughout the world; and

WHEREAS, the modern secular holiday of St. Patrick's Day was first celebrated in America in Boston during colonial days and the first St. Patrick's Day Parade in New York City was in 1766 and now all Americans celebrate St. Patrick's Day with pride; and

WHEREAS, millions of Irish people emigrated from Ireland in the 1800s to escape brutal poverty and starvation due to the Irish potato famine, and most of those people came to America to start new lives and to embrace and contribute to a new land; and

WHEREAS, tens of thousands of Irish immigrants arrived in New England and many came to Maine, and the Irish have been an important part of Maine's culture, history and society ever since; and

WHEREAS, within a few years of their arrival in the United States and in Maine, these Irish immigrants became part of the American cultural landscape while preserving the best of their native culture, and they dedicated themselves to helping build this Nation and State; and

WHEREAS, 4 signers of the Declaration of Independence were Irish-born and 9 signers were of Irish ancestry and 20 Presidents of the United States have proudly claimed Irish heritage, including George Washington, the father of our country; John Fitzgerald Kennedy; and Ronald Reagan; and

WHEREAS, the 44,000,000 Americans of Irish ancestry, like their forebears, continue to enrich all aspects of life in the United States, in science, education, art, agriculture, business, industry, literature, music, athletics, entertainment and military and government service; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to encourage the celebration of St. Patrick's Day, and, recognizing the valuable contribution to our State and to our Nation of all Irish-American citizens, we urge the citizens of the State to commend and celebrate the integrity and richness of the Irish culture.
