# JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE MARCH FROM SELMA TO MONTGOMERY

WHEREAS, March 25, 2015 marks the 50th anniversary of the end of the 3rd of 3 marches from Selma, Alabama to Montgomery, Alabama in support of the voting rights movement, which in turn contributed to passage of the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, a landmark achievement of the civil rights movement in the 1960s; and

WHEREAS, on March 7, 1965 approximately 600 civil rights marchers, led by John Lewis of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, who is now a member of the United States House of Representatives, and Reverend Hosea Williams of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, headed east out of Selma, Alabama to the State Capitol in Montgomery, Alabama; and

WHEREAS, the civil rights activists sought to nonviolently protest discriminatory voter registration practices and the shooting of Jimmie Lee Jackson, who was shot after protecting his mother and grandfather in a civil rights demonstration on February 18, 1965 in a restaurant in Marion, Alabama and who died 8 days later on February 26, 1965; and

WHEREAS, the nonviolent marchers were met and attacked with clubs, whips, police dogs and tear gas by state troopers, local law enforcement officers and townspeople at the Edmund Pettus Bridge as they were leaving Selma; and

WHEREAS, dozens of peaceful marchers were injured by state troopers, local law enforcement officers and townspeople in the forced retreat; and

WHEREAS, images of innocent protestors brutally beaten and severely injured on March 7, 1965, remembered as "Bloody Sunday," were depicted on television screens and in newspaper articles across the country; and

WHEREAS, Bloody Sunday galvanized a generation of nonviolent civil rights activists and heightened support and awareness for the civil rights movement; and WHEREAS, on March 9, 1965, 2 days later, Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., led a nonviolent protest of reportedly as many as 2,500 people before turning around after crossing the Edmund Pettus Bridge due to a barricade of state troopers; and

WHEREAS, on March 15, 1965, despite pressure from political figures, United States District Court Judge Frank M. Johnson, Jr., issued an injunction allowing the voting rights march from Selma to Montgomery to proceed, overturning Governor George Wallace's prohibition of the protest; and

WHEREAS, on March 21, 1965, with the protection of United States Army troops, the Alabama National Guard under federal command, the FBI and federal marshals, more than 3,000 people, led by Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., set out from Selma to Montgomery, a 54-mile journey, marching an average of 10 miles a day along Route 80 and sleeping in fields; and

WHEREAS, the nonviolent protestors safely reached the steps of the State Capitol building on March 25, 1965, at which point their numbers had grown to 25,000, including many religious and community leaders of all denominations, races and backgrounds; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 1965, with the Selma protestors at the forefront of the news, President Lyndon B. Johnson addressed a joint session of Congress, calling for federal voting rights legislation to dismantle the barriers that prevented African Americans from voting; and

WHEREAS, with the country captivated by the courage and conviction displayed by the civil rights marchers and activists, the United States Congress passed and President Lyndon B. Johnson enacted into law the landmark Voting Rights Act of 1965 on August 6, 1965; and

WHEREAS, many people from Maine, of all races and religions, were involved in not only the march from Selma to Montgomery, but the civil rights struggle as well; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the historic civil rights marches from Selma to Montgomery and to honor all those who struggled in search of equality and the freedom to participate in our democracy.

#### READ.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Alfond.

Senator ALFOND: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, today I rise to talk about the significance of the march from Selma to Montgomery. Today we remember the march from Selma to Montgomery mostly for its conclusion, the passage of the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 which changed the landscape of America forever. It's important

to remember just how much courage and hope it took for those 25,000 people to march those 55 miles. They were a diverse group. Every color, age, and religion was represented. They faced violence and hatred and bigotry, but they were united in their commitment to America and their commitment to nonviolence. It took courage. It took faith. These marchers had faith in America, in our people, and in our institutions. They believed that America could be and should be a better place, a place where the color of your skin does not dictate where you can eat, where you can go to school, and whether or not you can vote. We have made great progress in the last 50 years and we owe a great debt of gratitude to the Selma marchers and their leaders like John Lewis and Martin Luther King, Jr. They and so many others have brought so many changes to our country. Let's hope, too, that we have the courage and faith to stand up for equality, to reject racism in all its forms, and to continue to change and shape America and Maine so that everyone can live the American Dream. Thank you, Mr. President.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Volk.

Senator VOLK: Thank you, Mr. President. I just want to take a moment to speak about the significance of Martin Luther King in my own life and in all of our lives. When I was a little girl my parents rarely traveled together but one year my Mom did go with my father to Atlanta and left the three of us kids home with my grandmother. This is a woman who grew up in the tiny town of Lee, Maine and probably never had met a black person in her life until she was at least 18 years old. She went to Atlanta and while my Dad was busy with business she went and visited Martin Luther King's museum there and was very, very impressed and brought home this little book. I always loved to read. As a child I was so fascinated by this story. I can remember the pages now. I wish that, it somehow had gotten lost, I had a copy of it and I have, in fact, looked for it for my own children because it had a lot of nice black and white photographs from Martin Luther King's life. It was a biography of all of his accomplishments. Even as a child, I was probably 9 or 10 years old at the time, it really, really struck me about how sad it was that this wonderful man, who was so filled with courage and conviction and who led the people, particularly in the South, against the laws of Jim Crowe and the laws that had kept his people down. He never hesitated to put himself right out in front of these marches. How tragic it was that he was struck down in the prime of life. I just want to say that I, for one, really, really regret that piece of our history and I really, really regret that we don't know what this country would look like had that never occurred. I firmly believe that we wouldn't have a different country right now had that tragedy not occurred. Selma was extraordinarily important historically. This was a very, very significant point in time where President Johnson finally recognized the need for action. I, for one, am just glad that we get to honor the march from Selma to Montgomery and, again, we get to honor Martin Luther King, Jr.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Katz.

Senator KATZ: Thank you very much, Mr. President. Men and women of the Senate, I remember back to the day in Selma. I was here in Augusta. I remember watching those images on our little black and white television set. I was a junior in high school

and the events seemed a world away. It seemed like it was a foreign country almost. Conflict between the races was something that someone from Maine had a difficult time even understanding. We had one Black in our school at that time. Of course than he was a Negro. He wasn't a Black, he was a Negro at Cony High School. His name was Bill Burney. Bill Burney went on to become the Mayor of the City of Augusta. I thought we wouldn't do that here in Maine because we are pure of heart here and would never discriminate against whole peoples. It was only after I went away to college, and looked back on Augusta, Maine, that I realized that I had grown up in a community that had a ghetto as well. It wasn't Blacks, it was Franco-Americans. They lived in one part of town. They couldn't get the good jobs. They couldn't get elected to political office in Augusta or in Maine. As I watched that struggle, I often related it back to the struggle of Afro-Americans. When there is such a struggle, Mr. President, I think it's easy to stay home. What those people showed us was that it's hard to go out and face the dogs, it's hard to go out and face the firehoses, it's hard to go out and face the Billy clubs. We certainly could use more examples of statesmen like Dr. Martin Luther King in our society today. I think we can only hope, Mr. President, that having seen that example, that when our time comes, when the time comes to stand up, that we each, individually, will have the courage to do so. Thank you, Mr. President.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Diamond.

Senator DIAMOND: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I, too, am glad to see this item on our calendar today. It takes me back to 1973, when I was fortunate enough to be on a year's Ford Fellowship and I could travel around this country and others. I chose one of the places to go as McClain, Mississippi. McClain, Mississippi was very attractive to me because the school I worked in was totally integrated. It was an elementary school. When the kids left to go home they went to a racially divided community. The reason that that school, and a few others, were able to gain that kind of progress was because we were told, and I believe it to be true, that it was because of the work of Martin Luther King and other things that had happened, other people who played such a key role there. This whole idea of honoring the march, I think, is wonderful. I think it brings many of us back to a different day and I am pleased to see it on our calendar. Thank you, Mr. President.

**THE PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Lincoln, Senator Johnson.

Senator JOHNSON: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen, I rise as well in support of this Resolution. I think back on those times in our history and I think of the Civil Rights that our Constitution holds, that belongs to all of us, that we are all created equal. If only all people received equal rights, equal opportunity, then our job, respecting what began in this time of turmoil, would be over, but it's not. I think it's very important that we recognize just how hard that struggle has been, that we have yet to complete. Today we're recognizing the high road taken in the march from Selma to Montgomery, the bravery shown. Something that strikes me about this historic event is the human dignity that was worn as a mantle by the participants, not as a weapon but shining their importance as people, as equals, in that

simple action. I think we should remember that and remember that we carry the mantle now to continue that work. Thank you.
