JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING APRIL 2015 AS AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH

Senate at Ease.

Off Record Remarks

Senate called to order by the President.

WHEREAS, autism is a spectrum disorder, which means no 2 people with autism are affected the same way, and it is a complex developmental disability that usually appears during the first 3 years of life and results in a neurological disorder that affects the functioning of the brain and social interaction and communication skills; and

WHEREAS, one in 68 children is diagnosed with this spectrum disorder and prevalence has increased 30% since the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's study in 2008; and

WHEREAS, autism knows no racial, ethnic or social boundaries and neither income nor lifestyle nor education affects its occurrence and it is estimated that 1,500,000 people live with autism spectrum disorder in the United States; and

WHEREAS, autism costs the United States \$137,000,000,000 in annual health care costs, 90% of which are in adult services, and these costs are estimated to increase in the next 10 years to between \$200,000,000,000 and \$400,000,000; and

WHEREAS, while a single specific cause of autism is not known, current research links it to biological or neurological differences in the brain, and outdated theories and myths, such as autism being a mental illness, have been proven to be false; and

WHEREAS, with support, people with autism can live full lives and make meaningful contributions to society; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, pause in our deliberations to acknowledge that the month of April 2015 is Autism Awareness Month and to pledge our support and encouragement to all those affected by autism; and be it further

RESOLVED: That suitable copies of this resolution, duly authenticated by the Secretary of State, be transmitted to the Autism Society of Maine as a token of our respect and support.

READ.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland, Senator Volk.

Senator **VOLK**: Thank you, Mr. President. Today is World Autism Awareness Day, otherwise known as Light It Up Blue, which is a movement by Autism Speaks. If you are somebody who Tweets a lot like I do, you can use the hashtag LIUB to talk about Autism today. Autism Spectrum Disorder is reported to occur in all racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic groups. About 1% of the world population has Autism Spectrum Disorder. The prevalence in the United States is estimated today at 1 in 68 births, which is staggering. The prevalence of Autism in children increased by 119.4% between 2000 and 2010. It's the fastest growing developmental disability. The prevalence has increased by 6% to 15% each year during that time. It is almost five times more common in boys. 1 in 42, than in girls. 1 in 189. On your desks this morning you'll see this, I came across this last night. It's entitled 15 Things I'm Aware Of As The Mother of a Son With Autism. Those of you who know me, and have heard me speak on this issue in the past, know that we have a 23 year old, almost 24 year old now, son with Autism Spectrum Disorder. He is termed Asperger Syndrome. He's had a very interesting journey, which is all detailed in a book he and my husband have written called Chasing the Rabbit which will be published in May. I just thought this was particularly good and I'd urge you to read it and share it. You can find it on social media, through Autism Speaks, and maybe share it with your constituents because one of the things that, as a mother of a child with Autism, really helps is to know that you're not alone and that other people share in this journey with you. That's been one of the things that we found, in talking to people about this book, that they're just really, really happy to get, particularly, a Dad's perspective on raising a child on the Spectrum. I thought I'd just read these points, I'm not going to read the whole thing. This resonated with me. She has four children, like we have. Her oldest, like in our family, is the one that has Autism. "I'm aware that my family has been fortunate. I'm aware that although it's often hard to do typical things with children on the Spectrum it's worth the effort. I'm aware that laughter can get us through anything." That's been particularly true in our family. "I'm aware that I'm a better person because of Autism." Definitely true in my case. I think that had I not had a child with Autism I would have been the type of person that just thought that I was, you know, a great parent. We had planned the pregnancy. We planned the birth. He was a great baby. I thought I had it all together until he started having these major meltdowns when he was around 2-1/2 years old and quickly became a child that I really had very little control over and didn't understand for a very, very long time what was going on with him. He had many, many different diagnoses before he was diagnosed with Autism. I think that that's something that has definitely improved since that time. He was finally diagnosed was when he was 8 years old. "I'm aware that I've grown thicker skin." Those of us who have run for office understand that feeling. I believe that raising a child on the Spectrum prepared me for what I endured on the campaign trail. "I'm aware that slow and steady wins the race. I'm aware that time heals all wounds." Certainly true. "I'm aware of the power of miracles. I'm aware that a little education and communication can change people's views." That's what I'm hoping you'll do today. "I'm aware that there are angels among us. I'm aware that I'm part of a special sorority." That being other parents with similar children. "I'm aware of what it means to be truly grateful, because I am. I'm aware that love can conquer all. I'm aware that faith can be tenuous on this journey, but without it I've got nothing." Very true in our case. "I'm aware that kindness and acceptance are all around us." I'd just urge you to reach out to your constituents today about this issue. It's having a huge effect in our school system, in our neighborhoods, and in our government. We're only beginning to see the tide of children aging into adulthood, trying to figure out how we deal with that. What do you do when a child turns 18 and yet has the maturity level of a 14 or a 13 year old? That is a terrifying moment for a parent, I can tell you from firsthand experience. We'll continue to grapple with these issues, but know that your constituents are grappling as well.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Washington, Senator Burns.

Senator BURNS: Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I just want to say a few words, also, following Senator Volk. This is an extremely important month to Senator Volk and myself and others who share the lives of somebody who has Autism or fetal alcohol syndrome or other debilitating conditions. As many of you know, my wife and I have a 31 year old son that has both Autism and also fetal alcohol syndrome. I say that with great joy. He has been the joy of our life. Yes, it's been difficult. There's no question about it. As the good Senator just spoke about, it's been quite an experience. guite a ride if you will, from the time that he first came to us almost 30 years ago and it was an eye opener for us, it was a good experience for my children, my three birth children and also our other adopted daughter. They learned things that they never would have learned had they not grown up with a brother that had Autism. In spite of all the difficult time, the good times have made it all worthwhile and we have grown as individuals by growing up with Eric. He is the joy of our life. The difficult thing, I think, as parents of people with special needs, is the support system. When Eric came to us 30 years ago we were just starting to realize the impact of Autism in this country and other debilitating issues and we really weren't prepared for it. There is much more in place now. There is much more awareness. These folks, because of no fault of their own, are now able to get some support systems in their lives, especially when they transition out of the school age and into adulthood. That's a good thing. Our job is not done. Our job needs to continue. We need to continue to focus on providing support systems for these wonderful people that cannot support themselves. As I look at this Resolution today, it's very pertinent to me. I guess if I had written it I would have written it a little bit differently concerning these folks that can live full lives and meaningful contributions to society. That's a good thing. That also means that Moms and Dads and caregivers can also have that same experience, even if they do have somebody with special needs in their home. Lastly, I guess I would refer to the very last part, where it says that we are all, hopefully, going to support this Resolution today, that we pledge our support and encouragement to all those affected by Autism. That's a very sacred pledge, ladies and gentlemen. It's important to me and I hope it's important to you. Thank you for your support.

THE PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Gratwick.

Senator **GRATWICK**: Thank you very much, Mr. President. Ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I wish to just rise briefly in support of this Resolution and what Senator Volk has brought forth for us. I, too, have family involved with this problem and I would simply say that on the Financial Services and Insurance Committee we've dealt with this a great deal. There's a great deal that we, as a society, can do. The ABA, the Applied Behavioral treatment, can really make an enormous difference. We have a role to help in this and make this a much more optimistic future for these kids and their families. Thank you.

The 127th Legislature of the State of Maine State House Augusta, ME

Dear Honorable Members of the 127th Legislature:

Under the authority vested in me by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing LD 13 "An Act To Provide an Exemption from Sales Tax and Service Provider Tax to Nonprofit Collaboratives of Libraries."

I am concerned when the Legislature decides bills that grant exemptions from paying taxes early in the session and outside of the context of the overall budget. As you know, the Legislature is currently considering a comprehensive budget proposal that addresses the sales tax, and doesn't appear to have neared conclusion on those deliberations. Therefore, I do not believe it would be appropriate to support targeted exemptions on an isolated basis before the Legislature has acted comprehensively to address the future of the sales tax and reduce the oppressive burden that the Income Tax has placed on families and businesses in Maine. That is why the Maine people elected us and why I have vetoed this bill today.

This bill may have merit in its own right, and other services provided at a municipal level may benefit from examining the initiative that libraries have taken to coordinate regionally and explore opportunities to reduce the cost of providing services. However, now is not the time to grant targeted exemptions. Now is the time to address tax reform comprehensively in the State of Maine.

For these reasons, I return LD 13 unsigned and vetoed. I strongly urge the

Legislature to sustain it.

JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING MAINE'S CREDIT UNIONS

WHEREAS, Maine's credit unions are member-owned and member-governed financial cooperatives dedicated and committed to serving the needs of their members and communities. The nonprofit structure of credit unions provides each member with an equal voice and representation in the operations of the credit union. Serving members in all 16 Maine counties and in every community, Maine's credit unions operate with the primary purpose of benefiting the more than 651,000 Maine consumers who use credit unions; and

WHEREAS, the economic benefit that Maine's credit unions provide to Maine consumers is approximately \$48,000,000 annually, as a result of lower and fewer fees on products and services, lower interest rates on loans and higher interest rates on savings; and

WHEREAS, Maine is once again ranked as the nation's 5th strongest credit union state based on the percentage of the population that uses a credit union, a position Maine has held for 12 consecutive years. With more than 651,000 members, credit unions serve nearly one of every 2 Maine residents; and

WHEREAS, the 2,200 full-time and part-time employees of Maine's credit unions and the more than 1,000 unpaid volunteers who serve on credit union boards and committees demonstrate the core credit union values, philosophy and mission of people helping people by contributing to the communities they serve; and

WHEREAS, since 1990 Maine's credit unions and their members have raised \$5,300,000 to help end hunger in Maine, including a record-setting \$552,257 in 2014. One hundred percent of all money that is raised through the Maine Credit Unions' Campaign for Ending Hunger stays in Maine and goes directly to assist thousands of Maine families and individuals who otherwise would go hungry. In addition to contributing thousands of dollars to food pantries in communities across the State, Maine's credit unions also help to provide funds for statewide initiatives to help end hunger, such as being the primary source of funding for the State's only Food Mobile. In partnership with the Good Shepherd Food Bank, the Food Mobile has delivered over 4,000,000 pounds of food to food pantries in every Maine county since it began in 2005; and

WHEREAS, the Maine Credit Unions' Campaign for Ending Hunger has a commitment to the Good Shepherd Food Bank's efforts to end childhood hunger in Maine with its support of the Good Shepherd Food Bank's BackPack and School Pantry programs, as well as other childhood hunger initiatives serving more than 40 schools and over 1,000 students weekly; and

WHEREAS, in 2014 Maine's credit unions contributed more than \$1,500,000 to a variety of causes and to a number of organizations, such as financial literacy programs, the American Red Cross and Special Olympics. In the past 12 years, members of Maine's credit unions contributed more than 350,000 hours, including more than 39,000 hours last year, volunteering for organizations and activities in communities throughout the State, making a significant and positive impact not only on the organizations that received this assistance but also on the people who were served by and benefited from the services and resources provided; and

WHEREAS, since 1921 Maine's credit unions have been enhancing the lives of thousands of Maine people, who have been helped to financial success and stability. Throughout Maine, credit unions continue to play a vital economic and socially responsible role in the lives of individuals and remain a local, significant and stable presence in the communities they serve; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Legislature, now assembled in the First Regular Session, take this opportunity to recognize the Maine Credit Union League and Maine's credit unions for their positive contributions and the significant role they have played in the lives of Maine citizens and their communities for more than 90 years.
